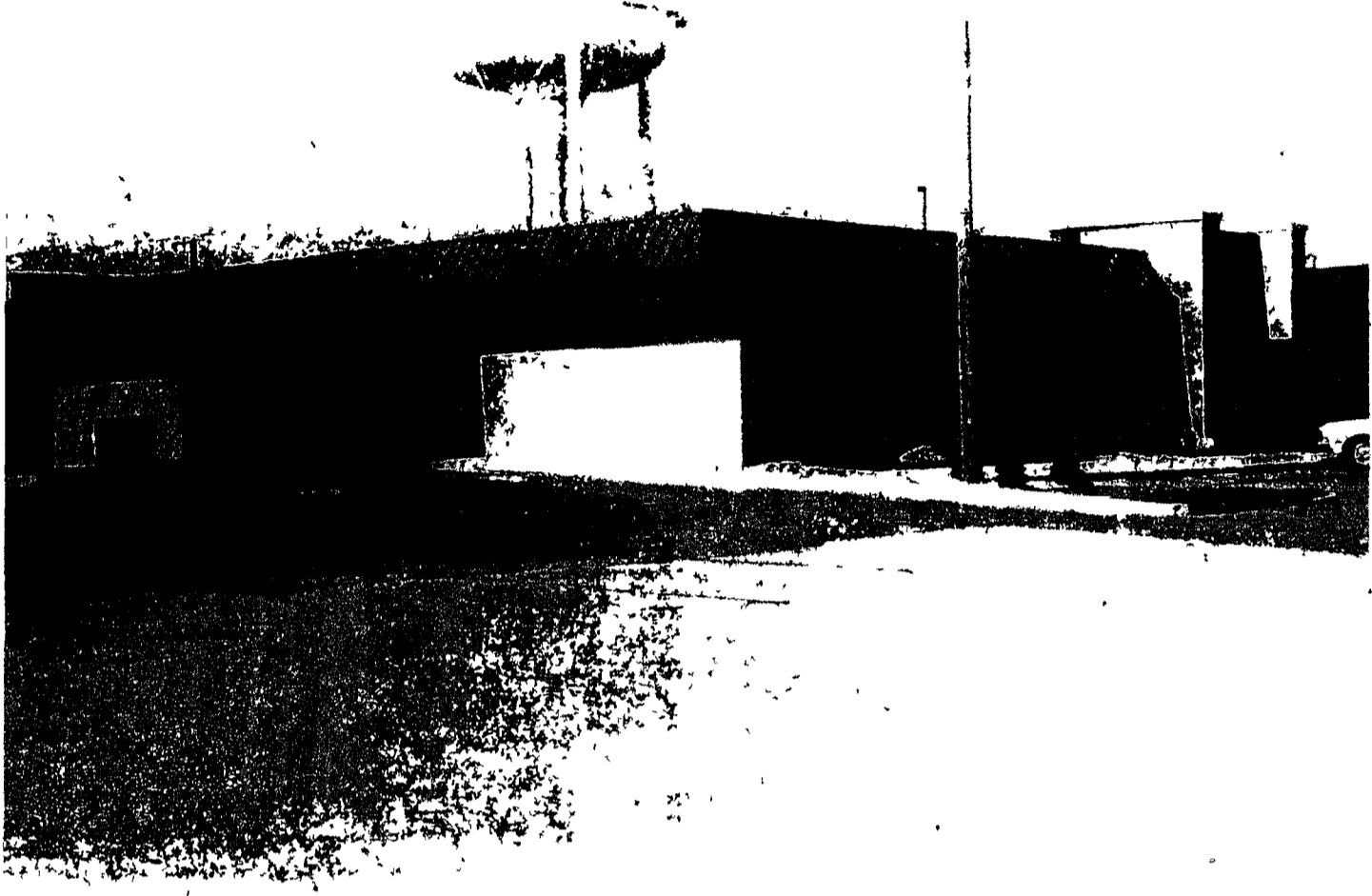

Commission Rejects Plea For Sidewalk Waiver

At the city commission meeting Monday Ramon Sexton appeared to appeal the city's decision that a sidewalk be installed in front of his property on Fourth Street. He said that a sidewalk would be impractical at this point, and he asked who was going to use it. He pointed out other places which didn't have sidewalks, the main one being Clark Equipment on the south side of River Street. The commission stood firm and insisted that everybody in the city would eventually have sidewalks wherever feasible. Sexton was reminded that the deadline for getting the sidewalks in was July 1.

The city has been asked to continue participation in the county metro crime unit and the metro narcotic squad (two separate units). They decided that they wouldn't spend further tax money on either unit until there is more participation among the other municipalities in the county.

Bids were received from Schuell Fence Co to enclose the pistol range. It was decided to try and get more bids. The estimates from Cole Associates

bridge across the millrace at Charles Court were also questioned, and it was decided to investigate further.

Ray Suabedissen was present to explain the final budget revisions for the end of this fiscal year. With expenditures over budget and with revenues more than expected, the net amount over the budget was \$64,000.

Herb Russell made another presentation in behalf of the recreation board to get city help in installing lights on the softball field south of McCoy's Creek. Original estimates were cut considerably. The city approved a request for \$16,000, and the recreation board is applying for a matching grant of \$16,000 from the Department of Natural Resources.

Bill Wahlstrom and his wife sat patiently through the whole meeting to ask if something couldn't be done to get the contractor to finish the work on Fourth Street. They are at the corner of 4th and Cayuga, and the dust, flooding and erosion to their property has been excessive. The city commission agreed that they had a problem and promised to see what could be done to speed completion of the street project there.

There'll Be Fireworks

Buchanan will have Fourth of July fireworks again this year. They will start at dark on the fourth at Memorial Field. There will be ground displays as well as aerial rockets.

Last year's fireworks provided over an hour of display and were rated one of the best in the area. The Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring the fireworks, although sufficient funds haven't been raised yet. They have been selling Bicentennial T shirts and tickets on a drawing for a side of beef, both of which are still available.

Open House Is Planned

LaSalle Federal Savings and Loan Association is going to have an open house to show off their new expanded quarters and to celebrate their 65th anniversary. Gifts and refreshments and an opportunity to tour the building will be offered from Monday, June 30 through Thursday, July 3. There will be prizes and drawings.

LaSalle Federal moved to its present location in 1959. The original building was 40 by 68 feet. The whole building has been remodeled and the space of 28 by 68 feet have been added. This has provided expanded drive-in space, a full basement with room for future growth and six additional private offices to allow more convenience and privacy to customers. The new vault is 14 feet wide and runs the whole 28 feet, and there is another vault of the same size downstairs.

The Industrial Building and Loan opened on February 16, 1910 in Buchanan. M.L. Hanlin was the first president. In 1938, the name was changed to Buchanan Federal Savings and Loan. It became LaSalle Federal Savings and Loan Association in 1965, named after the explorer LaSalle, who sailed down the St. Joseph River and landed south of the present Buchanan site at the Council Oak.

Milford Schultz joined the company in March, 1946 and became its managing officer. He was elected president in 1971.

Assets have grown from \$22,168,882.79 in 1970 to \$40,886,874.45 in 1974. LaSalle has offices in Coloma and Bridgman.

Robert Koemgshof is chairman of the board. He joined the company in October, 1961, coming from the Buchanan Co-ops. Eugene Rokely is president. Vice president and controller is Barry Borst. Robert Baldwin is vice president and secretary. Alice Gardner and Mary Dellinger are assistant secretaries, and Betty Russell is assistant treasurer.

The present directors include Koemgshof and Rokely, Bernard Ellis, Marshall Badt, George Sullivan, Robert Habicht, Harry Nye and Walter Williams, Jr.

During the open house celebration, there will be gifts given for the opening of various sized accounts, a chance to win money in a drawing, a chance to guess the correct amount of money in a jar, and an opportunity to open a treasure chest. Punch and cake will be served to guests during the week.



On Tuesday, Paul Montgomery was appointed business manager at Buchanan High School.

When Gerald Moulds submitted his resignation from the Buchanan board of education after the school board election, it was up to the school board to appoint another member. On Tuesday the board decided to appoint Robert Luke to serve for the year remaining of the term.

Luke received 422 votes to finish third in the election in which Bill DeVos and Mrs. Conrad Larson were the winners. He is employed by Simplicity Pattern. He and his wife Mary have three children, two of whom are still in school.

Luke has been interested in various school activities and has acted in an advisory capacity for some intra-mural activities.

Special Meeting

On Tuesday the Buchanan board of education had a special meeting at which they accepted with regret the resignation of Gerald Moulds from the board, and appointed Robert Luke as the new member. They appointed Paul Montgomery as business manager.

The graduation of Gloria Lewis was certified.

Administrative salaries were announced for the coming year: Dr. Walter Vanderbush \$22,178, Don Rennhack \$17,291, William Fischer \$19,427, Ellis May \$18,213, Wayne Writer \$17,023, David Casey, \$16,667, Richard Proud \$19,264, and Paul Montgomery \$18,000.

The new agreement with the bus drivers was approved, indicating a 7 percent increase.

We Hope He Runs

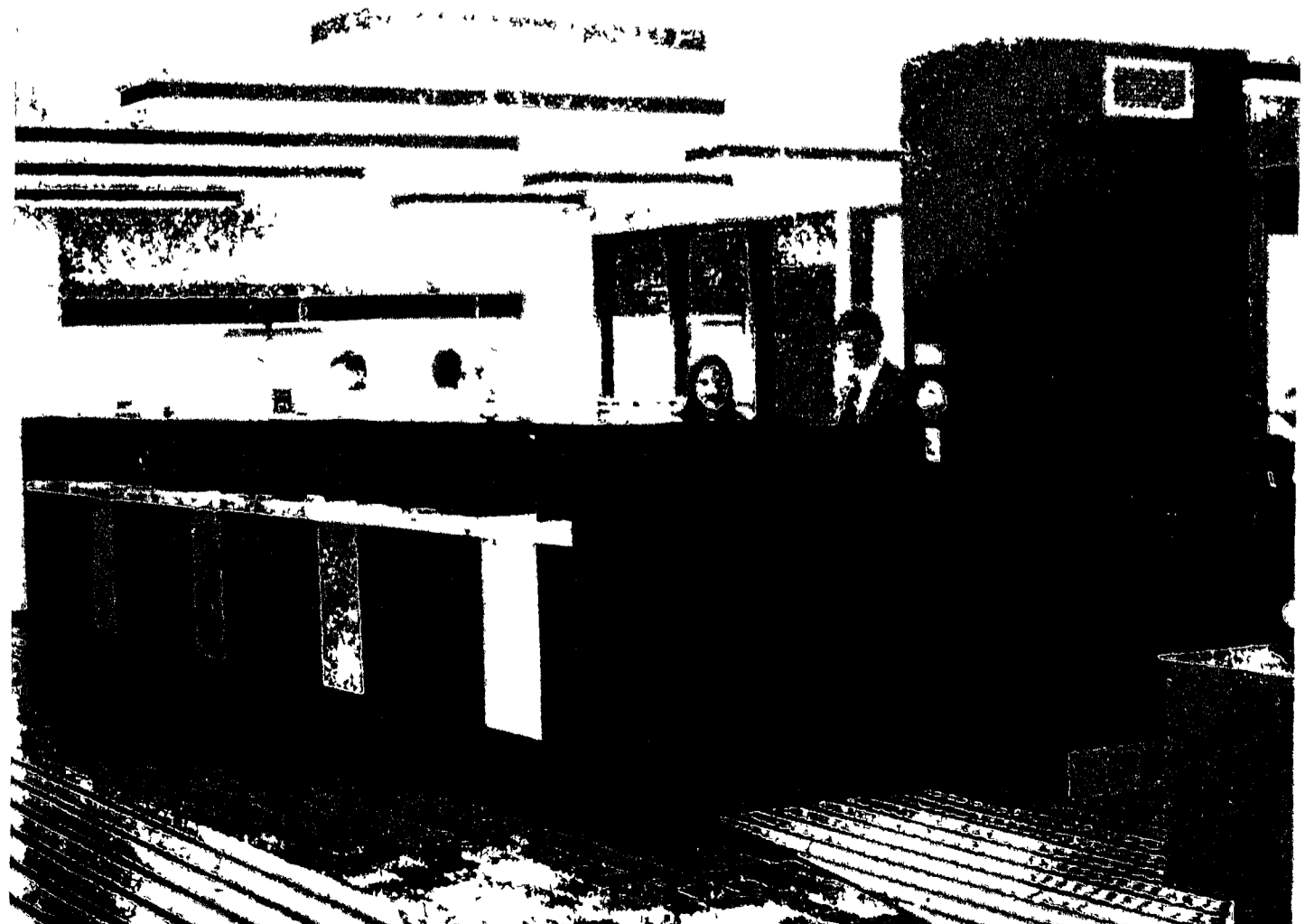

If he loses, he'll have gained valuable experience, and the District will still be in good hands. If he runs, he'll be running against the foolish spending, bad legislation and poor fiscal policies of the present Congress.

Nobody knows if Ed Hutchinson will seek a seventh term. If he should step down in favor of this younger man, he is deserving of some federal appointment by the president whom he's serving well. If he doesn't run, he could offer invaluable help to his successor.

If he does run, the election could provide the stimulation afforded by the Zollar-Hutchinson race, which was the only exciting event for this district in 1974. It could be a good thing for the party and could automatically infuse some new blood and new thinking into it.

Imagine my surprise when, on June 20, I went again to the cemetery and found a Marine Corps bulldozer driving around on my grandparents' graves and the graves of about 35 more persons I asked the dozer operator whom he was working for and he said, "The mayor." I went to City Hall to see His Honor and ask some questions but he was not in his office. Neither was the city attorney in his office.

I wondered why these people had to be buried deeper. You want to know why? So it would be easier to mow. Isn't that something? It's been mowed for years, but, now, it is too difficult. Why not, then, level the whole cemetery? Wouldn't that be nice?

I think your city officials are in need of help.

How many thousand dollars of your tax money is this project costing? Or isn't the city going to pay for that, either?

They have missed the graves of my parents, my daughter, uncles and aunt with the bulldozer, but, it sure doesn't diminish my anger. How would you all like it if the same thing happened to your ancestors?

Sure, it isn't the best location in the cemetery, but, possibly, that is the best they could afford.

With my limited command of the English language, I can't adequately express my contempt for this kind of action.

I recall when I was young, Redbud Trail North was being built through an Indian burial ground. Skulls and various bones were put on display in local store windows. Isn't anything sacred?

Suppose it was your family. How would you feel?

I hope a few people spend some troubled nights.

Malpractice Moves
 Slowly, and with deliberate diagnosis a legislative package aimed at giving Michigan "the healthiest medico-legal climate of any state in the nation" is winding its way into state law. Gov. William Milliken, who proposed the 18-bill package earlier this year, recently signed two portions of the program into law.

One new law would require professional societies of osteopathic physicians to report any information about disciplinary action against a member to the Board of Osteopathic Registration and Examination. The second requires professional societies of medical doctors to make similar reports to the Medical Practice Board.

"These bills are designed to increase information to the state licensing boards -- allowing for closer scrutiny of doctors," Milliken says.

"They form an important part of (the) package," he adds, and could -- along with other parts of the program, help avert in Michigan any doctor strikes and work stoppages such as have occurred in other parts of the country.

Related bills already in the law books are those setting up a malpractice insurance fund and requiring insurers to provide information to the state insurance commissioner.

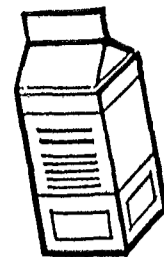

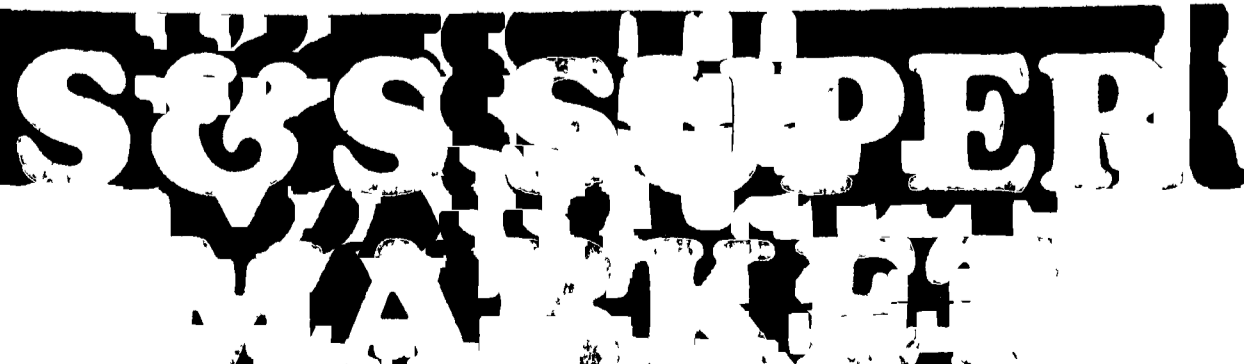
