A crowd of from 2500 to 3000 people is confidently expected if the weather man shows himself cooperative for the occasion, the estimated number being about 1500 employees and 1500 candidates for county offices, mixed in equal parts and well shaken.

B. & B. of Niles to Meet Clark Drill in Play-Off Friday Eve

THE TRAILER CAMP DILEMMA

It seems quite likely that as the shortage of tires becomes more acute, and the coming of winter adds to the complexities of life in this part of the world, the problem of living quarters for defense workers here will become harder rather than easier.

Or what do you think? Which is mere preface to a discussion of the status of Leo Davis' trailer camp on North Portage street. Some months ago a trailer camp started to spring up around the Davis garage and service station. It did not start at the invitation of Davis, he says. Rather trailerites cruising about for a spot where they could light selected it and insisted that some arrangement be made so they could stay there.

Now there are a dozen settled residents, if you can ever call a trailer colony "settled". They are good hardworking folks, even as you and I or as you anyway. They are practically all defense workers, employed for the great part at the Clark Equipment company. They come mostly from Michigan and Indiana towns, Three Rivers, South Bend and New Carlisle being represented to our knowledge. The head of one family ("head of a family" is mere figure of speech as you know) is Roy Hinman, who was born in Buchanan and lived here until he was grown, returning here from New Carlisle. The story of each is the same. They couldn't find a house so they got a trailer.

So the trailer colony grew there as naturally as puffballs in a stump, in response to that most human of all needs, family shelter. As his colony grew, Davis started to develop conveniences and sanitary essentials. Now he has what looks, at least to a backwoodsman like the writer, the makings of a reasonably modern trailer colony. In his garage he has separate showers and toilets for men and women, an automatic central supply of hot and cold water and a central laundry. The grounds have been cleaned up and what was once one of those unattractive public dumping grounds has been cleared away.

All in all, the conditions of living appear to be at least as modern and as sanitary as they are a couple of stone throws away where you can see, jutting against the skyline in sharp angles like minor Matterhorns the gables of a row of those old fashioned comfort stations such as we used to know down on the farm. There even though in the city lights, they have wells instead of city water. And nothing can be done about it now, they say, because of the shortage of "critical materials."

But when Davis tried to make his colony legal, he ran into difficulties. He applied to the city for a license. But it seems that there is a state law to the effect that all colonies of more than three trailers, even though located in a large city, are licensed and regulated by the state. And the state health dept. has much to say about that. The landlord must give a bond to the state and must pay a license of \$25 per year, and each trailer-dweller must pay a fee, not a part of his rental, to the state of \$1.50, of which 75 cents goes to the school, 50 cents to the state and 25 cents to the city. All that sounds easy. But further, says the state, Davis must have a sanitary trap in every separate trailer, with sewer connections.

Here is where the shoe starts to pinch. That means investment. And this trailer colony is, purely and simply, a war baby. When the current crisis ends, the dwellers will fold their tents like the Arabs and as silently, and a good deal more swiftly, steal away. Davis says that they may do it before that if he is required to make too large outlay in expense. This camp looks to be better in sanitary essentials than several of the settled sections of Buchanan whose living arrangements have never been seriously challenged. And this camp is an emergency matter, if there ever was an emergency. Just supposing the colony has to break up. These trailers might then conceivably go singly or in twosomes to private premises where they would be regulated only by the city. There you and I out of the goodness of our hearts might extend our sewer connections to them, or permit them the use of our family bathrooms for the duration.

Or would we? This is an emergency proposition. And winter is just around the corner. Perhaps there's other angles to this story. If so this writer would be glad to hear them. And also to know the reasonable way out.

Buchanan Churches to Ally With County, Get Funds Warren Foundation

A new organization to increase the impact of church influence on the social life of Berrien county is now in process of organization in the form of a Berrien County Council of Churches, with a unit in process of formation here.

The Buchanan organization is now under the direction of a temporary organization, headed by Rev. Norman Klump as chairman and Rev. Charles Hahn as secretary. Rev. Klump with the responsibility of forming a nominating committee which will report with a slate at an organization meeting to be held Sept. 14. Any member of any Buchanan church which has taken action will be eligible to attend and vote. It is the intention of the county council to enlist the cooperation of all denominations, including Jewish, Catholic and Protestant. If the council can function, it will have the benefit of the endowment of the Warren Foundation, originally given to the Berrien County Sunday School Association.

The new organization has had the benefit of the advice of Dr. Artman, former professor in the University of Chicago and a community organizer of experience.

E. C. Hoffman, manager of the Hollywood Theatre, has received letters from Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer Pictures, leading producers and distributors of films in the world, noting his statement as advertised in the Record each week that he will invest 10% of the gross income of his theatre in War Savings Bonds.

Scouts Out Today, Friday and Monday; Trucks to Follow Canvass

Starting today (Thursday) the members of Scout Troops 41 and 80 start a three-day canvass of Buchanan to list the amount of scrap metal available in homes in the city.

The boys will begin today and continue the canvass on Friday and Monday. Their canvass will be very materially speeded up if the householders of the city will assess the scrap metal of their premises and have an approximate list ready. Following the completion of their canvass, trucks under the direction of the Scout salvage committee, headed by Fred Johansen, will follow up and collect.
