A. Kahn Reports Record Mark In Employment Roll

Plant Sells Equipment To All Major Television Networks

Employment rolls at the Electro-Voice, Inc. plant here have tripled since the company moved here from South Bend five years ago and stand now at a record total of 350, states President Albert Kahn.

While microphone production and sales are still the backbone of the company's business, new ideas both in that and other electronic and acoustic fields have been developed recently to the point of production or are nearing that stage. The company is now firmly established in the television field to the point of selling equipment to all of the major networks.

Among the promising development projects is a television distribution system for apartment houses, making it possible to receive the programs for many sets through one aerial. Another development that has already won a foothold in the market is a speaker enclosure which will broaden radio reception. Howard Southern, an importation from Hollywood, and now manager of the speaker department of Electro-Voice, Inc., developed this device. Its principal, in brief, is a speaker to be mounted in the corner of a room, with sound coming both from the front and the back, so designed that the walls of the room will reflect the sound. This development has been caught on rapidly in the market and about 3,000 sets have been sold.

In addition the company has received authorization from the United States government to develop a number of acoustical devices for military use which are not for immediate production.

Significant of the company's effort to maintain its leading position in the field of acoustics, production is the recent enlargement of the engineering staff and the addition of greatly enlarged laboratory room and equipment which is now in progress. Present production fills the entire ground floor space of the building and quarters for the enlarged laboratory system are in an overhead balcony 60x60 feet in dimension, immediately back of the main offices. In all this space will house 12 rooms, including space for a new anechoic (echoless) chamber, electronic laboratory, microphone laboratory, speaker laboratory, phonographic pick-up laboratory, listening room and recording studio and others.

The enlarged research staff includes 15 engineers, five model makers, and four draughtsmen. New additions to the engineering staff are Norman Friedman, formerly of the University of Iowa speech department, and Dr. Carl Moem, former assistant professor in physics at Penn State College.

An important addition overhead staff is Lawrence LeKashman, former advertising manager for the RCA tube division, now vice-president of Electro-Voice, Inc.

Plan World Day of Prayer Here Friday Night, E.U.B. Church

The Story of Buchanan



Let's pause before going on with this story and take a look at Buchanan as it was in the beginning, in 1842.

We have several sources to draw on: the three county histories, articles written for the Record by "oldtimers" soon after the writer came here in the late 1920's and early 1930's and stories and letters reprinted from the bound editions of the Record from 1869 to 1908, from which time there was a lapse of preservation until 1927. Occasionally the histories clash with each other and with the letters and stories of the oldtimers. In such cases we can present both or use our own discretion if there seems to be grounds for discrimination. There is also an old map drawn by the government surveyor in 1834 and preserved at the courthouse in St. Joseph.

According to the surveyor's map, made the year that settlement began at the mouth of McCoy's creek, most of the present site of the city was covered by forest, interspersed with "barrens," which must have meant timberless land, whether upland openings or marsh. A tract of barrens followed the course of McCoy's creek southwest, consisting of the area west of South Portage and south of Days avenue, and then pinching off and widening again into what was once Athletic Field and on southwest. An area of barrens which must have been merely forest openings was indicated on part of Liberty Heights. Another barrens was indicated in the marshy tract still existing on both sides of West Front west of Oak Ridge cemetery and extending north an Indian trail running southeast through the east part of town out across McCoy's creek between the street culverts under the paving of the end of Days avenue and East Front and under Portage street. Thence it cut across Front, angling to South Portage through the site of the present (1952) Gambles store and followed on southeast just south of the course of Rynearson street, crossing the extension of that street to follow the ravine north of the home of Fred Samson. "Indian corn fields" were indicated at the south end of what we call Hazen Lake.

But at the time of the plating of Buchanan the Indians were gone and the forest through which the trail passed adjoining the downtown district had undoubtedly been cut away. There was a sawmill operated by Jacob Dutton on the site known in recent times as the Bainton mill, and now nearly obliterated by the grounds built up around a new Clark Equipment company machine shop. There was another smaller sawmill at the mouth of the creek. These mills furnished work for a few sawmill hands living in scattered cabins. Edward Cowles in his "History and Directory of Berrien County," published in 1872, states that there were about a dozen houses in the village of Buchanan when it was founded. It seems likely that nearly all of these houses were on land adjoining but outside the first plat. Esniger's "History of Berrien and VanBuren Counties," published in 1880, states that the home of the founder, John Hamilton himself, was not on the platted ground but on the site of the John D. Ross mansion, now the city hall. A letter written by Jane Mansfield Wagner stated that his home stood on the "Amos House corner" which is the present (1952) site of the Housworth & Mathie store and residence building. This site, however, was for many years part of the grounds of the John D. Ross home, which extended to Oak street.

Ira Mansfield, the father of Jane Mansfield Wagner, arrived in Buchanan from Carleton, N. Y., on July 4, 1842, just 17 days before John Hamilton's plat was recorded July 21 of that year. She stated in her letter, first published in the Record in 1904, that there were only three houses immediately near the present site (but not on it). They included the Hamilton, David Sanford, and Andrew Day homes. David Sanford's home was on the south side of what is now East Front street a short distance east of Portage.

Sanford having a farm in the angle between East Front and South Portage, cornering with the Hamilton plat. The Andrew Day home was on the south side of Front street adjoining Portage, south of the town plat. Day came to McCoy's creek in 1836 and bought the claim Leonard Madron which included the greater part of the present city south of Front and west of Portage street. His home was on premises cornering on Front and South Portage, with his house on the site of the present Gambles store.

Cowles alleges that the firm of Stanley & Staples had built and were operating their general store on the present site of the Union State Bank, with family quarters overhead, when the plat was recorded. He also states that Edward Ballengee had a home "near his present residence." The only listing Ballengee had in the Cowles directory of Buchanan was for his office as justice of the peace on a site immediately west of the present Union State Bank.

The notes of the original plat recorded July 21, 1842, indicate that John Hamilton had sold Staples a lot on the north side of Front and extending from Main to Oak street, on June 20, 1842, a month before he recorded the town site. Either the Stanley & Staples store was built in a hurry, or on land secured by the merchants by lease or by chance before they owned it.

When the Hamilton plat was recorded, Andrew Day was developing his farm. The area now known as Athletic Field was his cow pasture, where he maintained a small dairy herd. A legend lingered when this writer came to Buchanan of the children of Andrew Day, mounted on a white horse, driving the herd back and forth night and morning between the farmstead site at Front and Portage and the pasture. Day operated Buchanan's first dairy, as the families of the mill hands came to his home at morning and night with tin pails to buy milk. The area bounded by East Front, South Portage, Central Court and Days avenue, excluding the McCoy marsh and the farm buildings, he had planted to orchard. The remaining part of the old day home was torn down by Bruce Meffert in 1929.

The first home of the Ira Mansfield family in 1842 was a log cabin near the Dutton sawmill. There were doubtless other log cabins scattered here and there. The home of Jacob Dutton was on the site of the present William Forst residence at 421 River street. The community school was a log building erected originally by Justice of the Peace (Square) Hiram Weese a short distance northeast of the Dutton home as a blacksmith shop.

If a present-day Buchananite could be carried back through time and set down in the original settlement as it was then he would scarcely recognize the little pioneer settlement in the irregular area of storm stumps extending from the limited operations of the small sawmills. Even the contours of the land have been changed. The course of the creek has been altered, the original marshes filled and leveled. The only memory it could possibly recall would be that of some backwoods settlement remote in the Canadian wilds where he had gone hunting or fishing.

John H. Leiter, Life Resident Of Buchanan Is Dead

Son Of Pioneer Bakertown Family Honored By Odd Fellow Ritual At Grave

John H. Leiter, whose life was spent entirely in this community, died Friday, Feb. 28, 1952, in the Berrien Center hospital. He has been in poor health for over a year, but had been bedfast only a month.

He was born Sept. 24, 1872, in Bertrand township, the son of Abraham and Sarah Leiter. The farm on which he was born and lived until after he reached manhood is now a part of the Carl Koenigshof farm southwest of Bakertown. He was next to the youngest of seven brothers, of whom only two now survive.

After his marriage he moved to Buchanan and for many years was engaged in teaming and farm work. A lover of horses, he was the last custom teamster in the Buchanan community. He married Ona B. Parker in South Bend July 13, 1917. She died Oct. 7, 1949. He is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Flossie Shadle, Pennsylvania; by two brothers, Wilson and Will Leiter of Buchanan. Until a month ago he lived with his sister-in-law, Mrs. Ed Leiter, Bakertown.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon in the Swem Funeral Home with Rev. W. Y. Pohl in charge. The Dayton Odd Fellow Lodge, of which he was a member, conducted their graveside service. Pallbearers were Fred Richter, Ivan Price, Valmore Speckie, Ray Frame, Claude Sheldon, James Reep.

Niles Nails Down Third Place By Spanking Bucks

A driving Niles Viking squad is camped in third place today, thanks to the Buchanan Bucks' same old story of a poor period. Trailing early in the second period the Vikings warmed up for the hard task ahead by piling on 15 points while holding Buchanan to 4 points. This enabled the Bucks to drop a 58-44 decision and put them in fourth place. The contest was played on the Vikings' floor, Friday.

The story of the contest lies in the two Niles guards, Les Miller and Pat Neesley. Combined they hit for 26 points with most of their buckets coming via the diving pump shot.

But Jerry Adler and Tom Crocker hit the Bucks in the big second period as they both hit for 10 points between them and if these two lads haven't put their two cents in it would have been a different story.

Niles jumped ahead to open the contest on a jump shot by Fred Kreiger, his only bucket of the night, but Harold Pendley hit one-pointers for the locals and they led 1-1. Adler made it 4-1 as he drove down the Buchanan middle for a solo shot and the Bucks called time to talk things over.

The talk by Coach Steffen brought the Buchanan lads alive, for Lowell Gamble hit on a tip-in from underneath the basket and it made the count 4-3.

Moments later found the score tied at 5-5 and 7-7 but the Bucks finally hit for a slim 11-7 lead. Midway in the first period Gamble counted for the first three Bucks buckets in this surge but this turned out to be the only scoring he did for the rest of the contest. The quarter ended at 17-12, Buchanan.

But the blue skies over the Bucks dreams for an upset clouded up and the Vikings struck like a storm in the second period. Down 14-21, Niles' Kreiger hit on a free throw along with Crocker, Adler tipped in a short one and Crocker hit from seven feet out to make it 21-20.

Ted Fitch scored with a push shot from a short range, and then Niles roared into a lead they never gave up. Adler and Crocker followed up missed shots to put the Bucks ahead 24-23 and seconds later Neesley, along with Miller put it up to 28-23.

Pendley added two free throws here but Adler with a four shot and Miller on a long chest shot made it 31-25 at half-time.

As this turned out, the second period wrecked the locals' hopes for a victory, for the second half found Niles in command all the way.

Fitch turned in a grand performance on both offense and defense. Besides being high-point man for the game with 16 points he held Kreiger to four points (he has averaged a 13 point average) and pulled in 16 rebounds, 12 of which were defensive.

J.V. Beaten 38-28. Down but 31-28 with four minutes remaining in the contest the Bucks J.V. failed to muster any more points and thus lost 33-28. Smith was high with 12 points for Buchanan and Maddox had 15 for Niles.

Ruth, was killed during World War II on Nov. 12, 1942.

Services were held Tuesday, Feb. 26, at 2 p.m. in the Swem Funeral Home. Burial was in Oak Ridge cemetery. Rev. Charles H. Standifer officiated. Pallbearers were Herbert, Allen, and Wiley Shoemaker, Ernest Jones and William Rutherford.

Damage Confined To Main Auditorium And The Sanctuary

St. Anthony's Roman Catholic church was damaged by fire discovered shortly after noon Tuesday, the loss from fire and smoke being estimated at from \$5,000 to \$6,000.

The fire was first detected by the immediate neighbor north of the church, Atty. Henry Dongillo, who saw the smoke through church windows. Father Norbert Wheeler and the fire department were immediately notified. The fire crew and equipment made a quick run Chief Ted Cramer tried to gain admittance through doors but the men were driven back by the intense smoke and heat.

They broke a large lower pane from the main northern window and effected an entrance. The flames were confined mainly to the northeast corner of the church, where the altar and statue of Mary were entirely destroyed. The walls behind and ceiling over the altar were also destroyed or damaged.

Apparently blown by wind which entered when a window next to the flames was broken, the fire leaped 20 feet across the front of the church, setting fire to the draperies behind the Altar of the Sacred Heart in the southeast corner, also to the draperies behind the main altar in the sanctuary. Most of the panes of the large north window were cracked by heat. All of the church walls were stained by smoke. The basement did not suffer damage.

The report that the fire started from a lighted candle is apparently incorrect. There was no lighted candle at Mary's altar where the fire started. The only lighted candle in the church at the time was on the Altar of the Sacred Heart fully 20 feet away.

Builders Supply Service Gets Off To Flying Start

The Builders Supply Service, opened on East Jordan street between Days avenue and Front street Jan. 1 by Russell Waiters and Paul Arnold, has already built up a flourishing business. 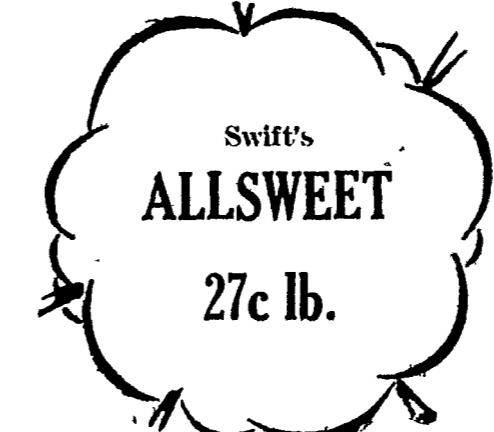

Govt. Announces Prices Supports For 1952 Soybean Crop

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced today that 1952-crop corn will be price-supported at not less than a national average of \$1.60 a bushel and soybeans at \$2.55 a bushel. Dollars and cents supports are announced at this time—in advance of spring planting—in accordance with forward pricing provisions of the Agricultural Act of 1946.

Corn support for corn—a basic commodity—was announced at a minimum level, subject to upward revision if 90 per cent of parity for corn at the beginning of the 1952 marketing year next October is greater than \$1.60 a bushel. In no event, however, will the support for corn be lower than a national average of \$1.60 a bushel. Support for 1951-crop corn is \$1.57 a bushel. Price support will be implemented, as hereafter, by means of Commodity Credit Corporation loans and purchase agreements.

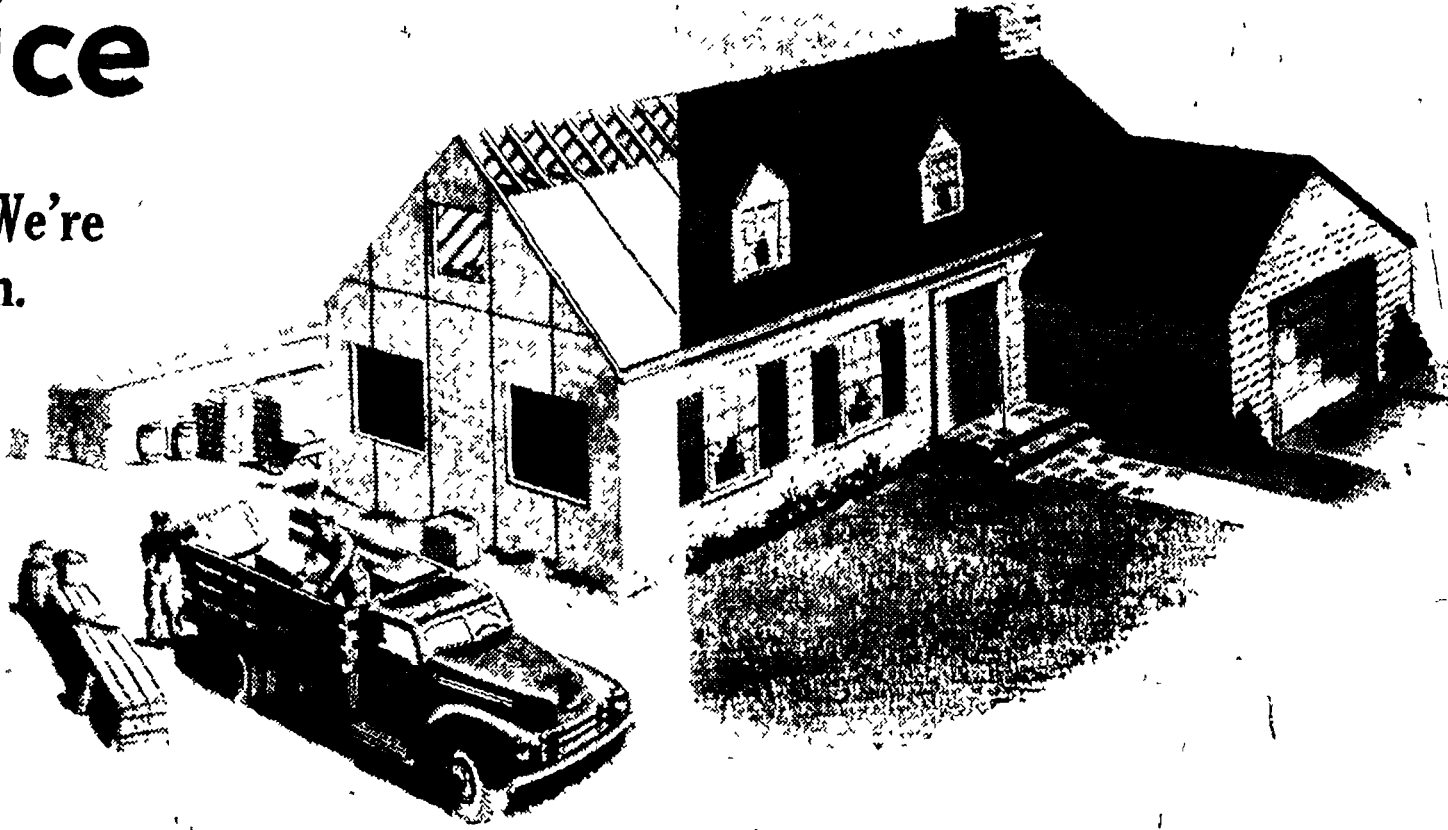
Soybeans support for 1952-crop soybeans—a nonbasic commodity—was announced at a fixed level of \$2.55 a bushel, which reflects 90 per cent of parity as of November 15, 1951, in accordance with a support-level announcement made by Secretary Brannan last November. Support for 1951-crop soybeans is \$2.45 a bushel. Price support will be implemented by CCC loans and purchase agreements.

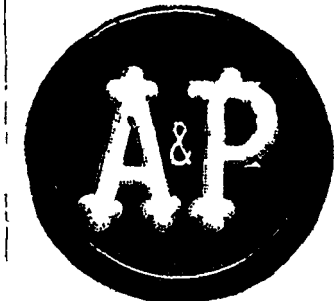

COMMISSION PROCEEDINGS

Buchanan, Michigan February 11, 1952 Regular meeting of the City Commission of the City of Buchanan, Michigan, held in the City Hall of said City on Monday, February 11, 1952, at 7:30 P.M. Meeting was called to order by Mayor Strayer. Roll call showed the following members present, Irvine, Anderson, Smith, Schultz, Strayer, City Manager, Clerk and City Attes of previous meeting presented. Moved by Comm Irvine seconded by Comm Schultz that the minutes be approved as circulated and published. Resolution adopted on roll call, 124 Ordinance No. 86, An Ordinance to amend the Parking Meter Ordinance was presented for the second and final reading. The following Ordinance was offered by Comm Irvine seconded by Comm Schultz An Ordinance to Amend Ordinance Number 86, known as the "Parking Meter Ordinance" by Amending Section 5 thereof. The City of Buchanan Ordains That Section 5 of Ordinance Number 86 be amended to read as follows: "Section 5 Regulation of Parking in Individual Parking Spaces. Whenever a vehicle shall be parked in an individual parking space, where a parking meter has been installed, the person parking such vehicle shall deposit one cent coins, or a five cent coin or coins of United States money in said parking meter, if such meter displays the signal showing that legal parking is only permitted on such deposit. "The City Police Department shall in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance, determine the length of time that parking is permissible in an individual parking space for which a meter is installed upon the deposit of one or more one cent or five cent coins of the United States in the parking meter as hereinafter provided. Notice to the public shall be given by appropriate signs setting forth the length of time for which parking is permitted and the conditions thereof. These may be on the parking meter stand or in the immediate vicinity. Any vehicle which remains in an individual parking space after the prescribed parking is hereby determined to be illegally parked. The depositing of additional coins, after once having done so as herein required, to gain additional parking time for any other purpose, is prohibited. "The provisions of this Ordinance shall not apply to vehicles parked or standing upon the streets of the City of Buchanan hereinafter designated when such vehicles are parked or standing upon such streets between the hours of 6:00 P.M. in the evening until 9:00 A.M. the following morning. The provisions of this Ordinance shall not apply on Sundays or on the following National holidays: New Years Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, and Christmas Day." This Ordinance shall take effect fifteen (15) days after passage hereof. Ordinance was adopted by the following vote on roll call, Yea Irvine, Anderson, Smith, Schultz and Strayer. Legislative News Letter

Feeling the strain of the fast tempo of the session, a few members eyed longingly the thought of a long week-end recess from Thursday until Monday night, and a half-hearted attempt was unsuccessfully made to take advantage of the legal holiday, Washington's birthday on Friday, the 22nd, by adjourning on Thursday. When adjournment was called the calendars of bedsheet proportions awaiting action, and of the limited time for committee consideration of the bills awaiting action in committee, sufficient votes could not be mustered Wednesday to suspend the rules and act on a Senate Concurrent Resolution providing for the long adjournment.

Just a year ago this month your attention was called to a communication we received from the War Claims Commission requesting the cooperation of the State Legislators in reminding World War II veterans and their families that March 1, 1951 was the deadline for filing of World War II POW, civilian internees and survivor claims under the War Claims Act of 1948. We are now advised that the deadline for filing such claims has been extended to March 31, 1952. We are also told that many possible claimants have not yet filed, and once again the Commission has requested that we remind our people in our districts that regardless of eligibility, they cannot be paid unless they file claims with the War Claims Commission before March 31. If any person is eligible for benefits living in my district and have not as yet filed, I urge that they immediately obtain from their local veterans' organization, a claim form and mail it at once to the War Claims Commission, Washington 25, D. C.

On the 19th, the House and Senate in joint convention, received a verbal report from the Macinac Bridge Authority, in which they claimed the bridge is entirely practicable both physically and economically. Claiming to have gone into every phase of the problem, the Authority said there

was nothing at the Straits including ice, wind, current and the combination of all three, that they had not encountered before and for which they have not been able to design. Replying to questions by the members, the Authority stated the cost price of 76 million to be conservative, and recommended two courses for the Legislature. One, a loan of 2 million to the Authority to be repaid from future financing so that it can go ahead with final design plans. (This would hasten the project and also save several million in the long run because when such a project is financed the cost of financing during the early planning and construction stages has to be paid for, and during that period there is no income from the bridge.)

The second recommendation would involve the Legislature empowering the Authority to proceed with the financing of the Bridge from private or public funds which we were assured would not in any way involve pledging the State's faith and credit. Two such bills were introduced in the Senate following the recommendations of the Authority. House Committees reported out 46 bills considered in committees on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday.

Among bills passed are bills raising the minimum age for a driver's license from 16 to 17 years with restricted licenses for those from 14 through 16, increasing the cost of examination fees for trust companies from \$10 to \$25 a day (the average cost per day for such examination according to the Banking Department

is \$23.72); removing the tax exemption now enjoyed by privately owned armories rented to the military and putting said property back on the tax rolls; an amendment to the act licensing child welfare agencies and boarding homes to provide for enforcing all reasonable orders of the Department of Social Welfare and at the same time, the reasonableness of the order of the department would be subject to review by the court, and a bill giving the Public Service Commission power to set up and enforce regulations governing gas lines. This legislation resulted from exhaustive studies made by a legislative interim study committee investigating the numerous gas explosions that had occurred.

A long time sore spot among minority members as an affront to the Federal Government, is the action taken by the 1941 Legislature calling upon the Congress to call a convention for the purpose of amending the federal constitution restricting federal tax on incomes, inheritances and gifts to 25%, except in case of war. A second attempt is now being made to rescind the 1941 resolution through the introduction of a concurrent resolution. It is not likely that such a resolution will see the light of day and it will probably die quietly in committee.

Following long debate, the House voted down a Conservation Department sponsored bill permitting the Department to set up dog training areas on State lands. After killing the bill, the vote was reconsidered and the measure failed.

The House also killed a bill

which would crack down on railroads for tying up traffic at crossings by blocking the crossing for more than 5 minutes.

Women Operate Clark Fork-Lift Trucks On Okinawa Island

Away out in the blue Pacific on Okinawa, where the women do all the work, they are having it easier nowadays, with the introduction of Clark fork-lifts. The army, which is always conservatively routine, tried first as a matter of course to train men. But while the engineers and others concerned with weight-lifting and moving jobs tried to train

the men, the women looked on and caught on much faster. They would listen awhile, then jump on and operate the trucks while the men were wondering what it was all about. After all, work had never been down their alley.

This was true not only with the small fork-lifts but with huge equipment, as bulldozers, caterpillars and the like. When the army learned the ropes they fell in line and trained the women. Consequently it is a common sight to see women at the controls of these mechanical monsters. They still do the work, but they do it easier. Many of the fork-lifts in use on Okinawa were made by the Clark Equipment company.

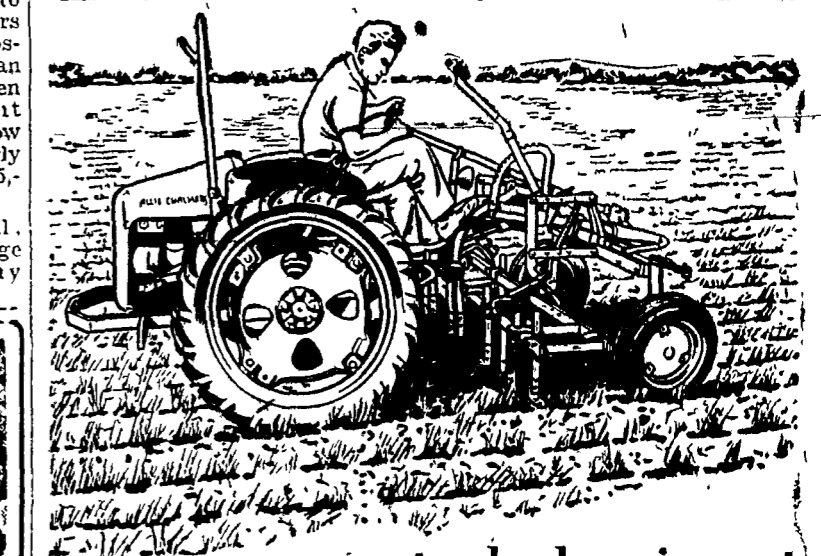

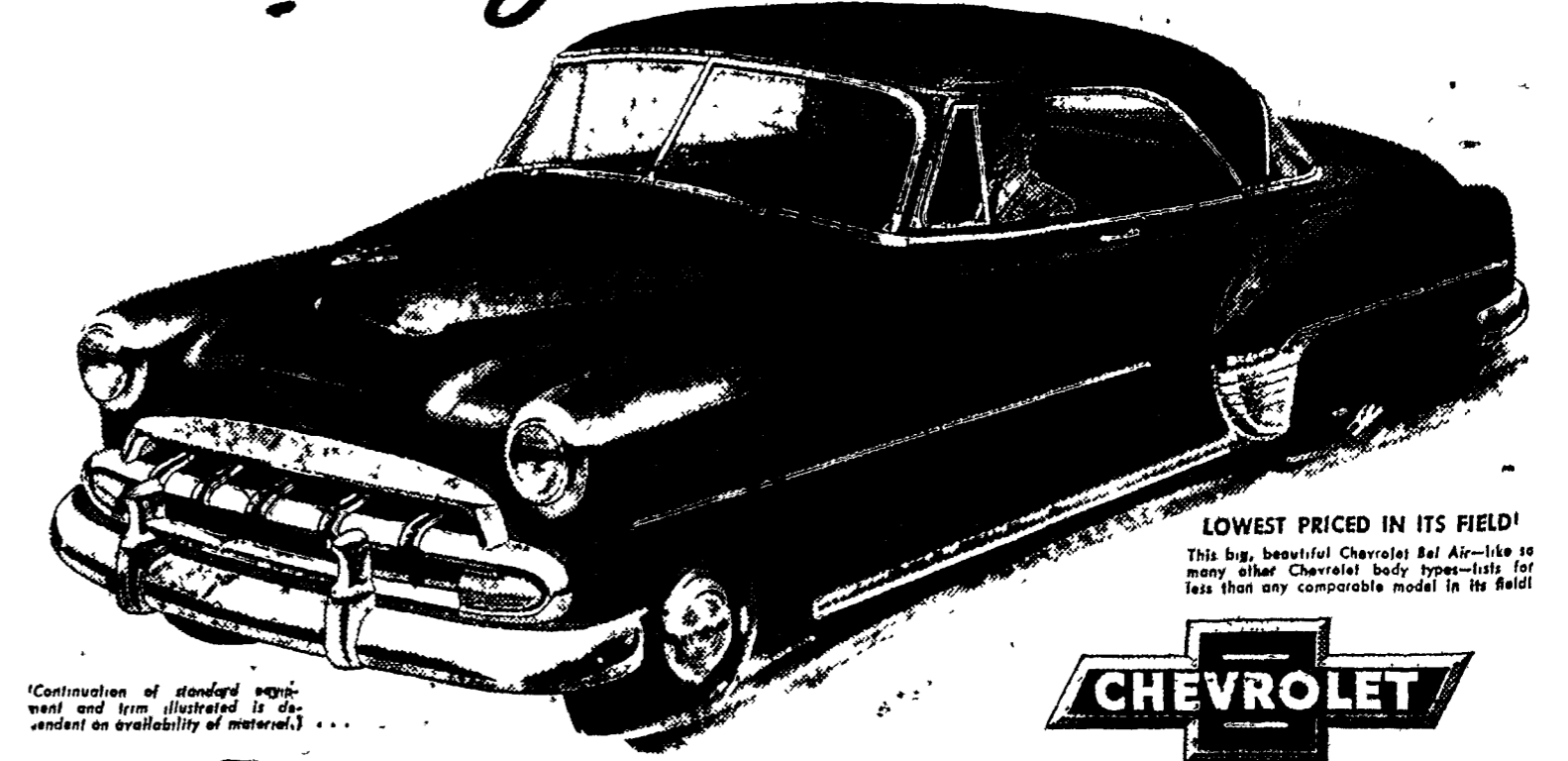
