## City Gets Some Reaction on its Tax Stand

In response to the protest by the Buchanan city commissioners over the present system of assessing personal property, inventories, and real estate, Mayor Joseph Bachman said that he'd received several statements of support. The supervisor of Baroda township said that he'd been fighting the whole system for years and would do anything he could to help.

Bachman said that the city commission of Buchanan is examining its own budget with close scrutiny and is hopeful that the city can be operated efficiently with a possible lowering of its millage requirements. The city of Buchanan, he said, is urging other bodies receiving revenues from taxes to closely examine their own budgets.

## Still Seeking Historical Data

A committee under the auspices of Buchanan's Outdoor Education Program are working hard to develop a meaningful and lasting program in connection with the nation's Bicentennial observance. They are attempting to prepare a series of slides for a permanent presentation on the area's history. They have already received some pictures of interest and they are able to reproduce and return them immediately.

It is hoped that anyone having old photographs of historical events or landmarks will share them with the community. Committee members plan also to interview some of the older residents and would welcome hearing from people who've moved away who would care to contribute points of interest having to do with the area's history.

Letters will be welcomed, which can appear in the Berrien County Record. If a person is reluctant to write down his recollections, it is possible to have them taped for future use.

Eventually it is planned to compile a permanent collection of slides concerning the history of the area which can be accompanied by a taped dialogue for study by young people.

Later it is hoped to take students on bus tours to visit the historical sites in the area, and the material gathered will act as a valuable aid to prepare students for the field trips.

Anyone willing to loan pictures or other historical data is requested to bring them to Moccasin School between 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. any week day. The material can be duplicated and returned immediately.

request for operating millage will be on the ballot June 9. The school board is studying their budget which should be presented at their May meeting. They must determine their budget without final knowledge of what the S.E.V. will be or how much state aid they can expect. The school administration says that the amount of state aid for the district will decrease in proportion to the increase in assessed valuation. They say, however, that if the S.E.V. is increased enough, less millage for retirement of the district's debt may be required.

The general public is, for the most part, favorable to the city's action. The question now is how to keep the momentum going so that some action could finally be taken at the state level.

## Agreement With Teachers is Ratified

The school board had its meeting at Indian Hills School Monday. At first, everybody broke up into little groups for discussions with individual board members.

The board approved ratification of a new agreement with the Buchanan Education Association. The board expressed pleasure at the professionalism of the B.E.A. and B.E.A. president Robert Underly expressed pleasure with the contract as he and Margaret Swartz signed it. Major changes include a clause which would provide for an orderly method of reducing staff should that be necessary, and the school district has agreed to pay retirement contributions for each teacher.

For those teachers on the higher end of the scale, the maximum was raised. Previously it had been \$8,200 to \$13,120 for those with bachelor degrees and it was raised to \$8,200 to \$13,284. For those with master's degrees, it went to \$8,800 to \$14,696. That maximum had been \$14,520.

The board has been wrestling with individual cases who wanted to graduate earlier. It had been set up so that each case would be decided individually, but the board has disagreed on criteria for granting earlier graduation. It was first suggested Monday to rescind the board's January policy decision on this matter, but later the board decided to review the whole matter to see if agreement on criteria could be reached.

Assistant superintendent Norman Kreager explained that,

if the S.E.V. for the district is increased, the state aid expected will decrease, making it difficult to lower the millage. He gave the board some figures on a capital outlay plan for five years which apparently included items for building repairs, additions, and new equipment, but he wasn't ready to share these figures with the public. He also reported the final figures on the costs of remodeling the high school. In 1973 bonds had been purchased in the amount of \$775,000. Interest earned on them amounted to \$26,652. Altogether the remodeling has cost \$798,154, leaving a balance of \$3,498. This, Kreager said, would be spent on some yet unfinished work.

The school calendar was approved. School will start for the students on September 2. Christmas vacation will be from December 19 to January 5, and spring vacation will be April 2-12. School will close June 4.

Bill Fischer gave a review of the needs assessment survey. He said that the results still need study for a true evaluation of them. He said that out of 3500 surveys delivered, some 500 had been returned.

A guest at the meeting was Richard Weaver, superintendent of the Mason County schools in Scottville. Superintendent Dougherty had visited his board meeting earlier.

At the end of the meeting, Mr. and Mrs. W.F. Firehammer inquired if it weren't possible either to have an extra hour of school or to add an hour for those who wanted extra study. They said that the present time schedule doesn't allow students to take all the courses they wish.

## Form Junior Garden Clubs

Fifty Buchanan Elementary School children and their parents met April 16 in the Ottawa School gym for an annual Youth Garden indoctrination course. The Youth Garden Program, now in its third year, is co-sponsored by the Buchanan Garden Club and the Buchanan Elementary School Outdoor Education Program. 1975 is pilot year for newly formed Junior Garden Clubs sponsored by the Buchanan Garden Club, member of the Federated Garden Clubs of Michigan, Inc.

Organized under this plan were the Moccasin Junior Garden Club, Stark Junior Garden Club, Ottawa Junior Garden Club and Indian Hills Junior Garden Club. This organization makes all members eligible for State, Regional and National competition and enables each child to submit records in the form of "Books of Evidence" for recognition on each level, as well as participation in the Berrien Youth Fair held each August in Berrien Springs.

The schedule requires programs on Horticulture, Conservation, Nature Study, Arctic Design and Flower Show Practice or Participation, spaced to fit into the school year and summer months with Youth Fair Participation as one of the meetings.

The annual field trip and picnic is being planned after the fair before the start of school to be late in September.

Mrs. Kenneth Bever is the 1975 Junior Garden Chairman for the Buchanan Garden Club and David Casey, Director of the Outdoor Education Program, represents the Buchanan Public School System.

During the meeting, Mrs. Bever explained the Youth Gar-

den Manuals distributed to each club member present. Signed-up members unable to attend this first meeting and any 3rd, 4th or 5th grader wishing to join may call Mrs. Bever at 695-6081, or Mrs. John Zeider, 695-3529 for further information.

Mrs. Zeider, Youth Activities Coordinating Chairman for the Buchanan Garden Club, showed slides based on the 1974 gardens picturing all phases of growth in various types of soil. This program has been shown at many of the surrounding clubs and district meetings during the past year.

Garden inspectors and youth leaders names will be announced in May, according to Mrs. Bever.

Mrs. Zeider explained plans for an Intermediate Garden Club for 6th, 7th and 8th graders of middle school. Mrs. John Cress will be the project chairman and plans for organization will be announced soon.

The next joint meeting will be on conservation in May, when continuing soil preparation and enrichment will be discussed. Tips discussed were the use of nasturtiums and marigolds as natural bug control devices, and that row "eight" of the ten row plan can be carrots, as well as row "ten" if family needs indicate.

## Arrested On Warrant

Last Week Earl Bennett of Clear Lake Road was arrested on a warrant charging aggravated assault after he turned himself in at the police department. He was charged in the stabbing incident on February 20 in which Larry Wickinger of South Bend was injured. Bennett was released on \$100 bond.

## Clark Earnings Were Up

Clark Equipment Company announced increases in both sales and earnings for the first quarter of 1975, compared to the same period a year ago.

Net income climbed to \$12.3 million, or 94 cents a share, an increase of 17 percent from \$10.9 million, or 80 cents per share, in the first quarter of 1974. Sales totaled \$353.5 million, an improvement of more than 10 percent over sales of \$319.6 million for the first period last year.

Results for both years are stated on the Lifo (Last-in, First-out) basis of valuing domestic inventories, which was adopted in 1974.

"Some of the earnings improvement was due to the absence of federal price controls, which had forced pressure on profit margins during the first quarter of 1974," said Bert E. Phillips, Clark president and chief executive officer.

He also pointed out that if sales of the trailer division, which is being phased out, were excluded from first quarter totals for both 1975 and 1974, the sales increase would be 17 percent.

The company ended truck trailer production at its Michigan City, Indiana, plant in February 1975, and is now disposing of the division's inventories. European trailer production continues as Clark seeks a buyer for the business, which has been profitable.

"Our total order backlog stood at \$683 million at the end of March 1975, so we believe we can sustain a satisfactory level of operations through the second quarter," Mr. Phillips said. The backlog was \$23 million higher than at the same time last year, but down from \$946 million at the end of 1974.

"The incoming order rate has continued to be soft in most lines of our business, making operations in the second half more uncertain," Phillips said. "For the long run, however, we see continued growth in our basic business."

He said the company is moving ahead with its previously announced expansion plans, but has delayed the start of some plant construction. Total capital expenditures in 1975 are expected to be about \$90 million.

## Nine Arrested

At 2:50 Sunday morning, police observed a van speeding on Front Street. The vehicle was finally stopped outside the city limits, and the Niles township police were called for assistance.

Nine people in the van were asked to get out. The police searched and found several beer cans, a partially full bottle of whiskey and a partially full bottle of wine. They also found what was believed to be marijuana and two pipes.

Arrested were seven men and two women from the Detroit area. Their bond was set at \$75 each.

## Let's Be Fair

During the career of this writer there have been many letters to the editor, some of which can't be printed. We've been called many names. We have been anti-Christ, a fascist and even a dirty Jew. But last week's experience of being called an anti-non-Christian was a first.

We believe strongly in the right of a person to sound off and to state what he believes by letter. A small weekly is one of the few places where people still have this privilege, and that's the way it should be.

As one who grew up in a predominately Jewish neighborhood and fully appreciates the sensitivity of those people and as one who's experienced first hand the simple tranquility of meditation in a Zen temple, we feel qualified to offer rebuttal to last week's writer.

To be a white, Anglo-Saxon Protestant during the last few years bears the connotation among many of being something for which to be ashamed. But there's been no group in the whole world which has made greater strides in the past decades toward racial tolerance and religious understanding.

There's too much tendency among people today to be overly sensitive about their rights. Women's libbers worry about ads which they say exploit womanhood. People who don't smoke are spending large sums to prevent everybody from smoking. Some racial and religious minorities tend to attack every issue on those two subjects.

The point which last week's writer forgets is that the majorities also have rights. Since the vast majority of people in Buchanan happen to lean toward Christianity, it's perfectly appropriate that the city's only newspaper features the Christian observance of Easter. If the Berrien County Record were published in a neighborhood predominately Hindu, such a front page might be inappropriate.

But keep those letters coming. Try to be fair. Try to refrain from libel, and the Record will print them.

Just remember, that what happened 200 years ago by a group of W.A.S.P.s is the only reason you're allowed to say what you believe.

Dave Habicht was tremendous. He played the role of Tevye with considerable sensitivity and exhibited a great deal of maturity. His was a difficult part, physically demanding, and he showed a lot of stage presence throughout his frequent and long appearances.

Cheryl McDonald made a marvelous Golde, the wife of Tevye. Her dialect was good, and her singing voice pleasant. She too demonstrated maturity.

Laurie Nelson was the matchmaker and stole every scene in which she appeared. She was completely in character, which made it difficult to realize what an attractive young girl she really is.

Adding greatly to the excellence of the whole production were the girls who played the five daughters of Tevye. Karen

Judy didn't have as much of a chance to use her beautiful voice, but her presence on the stage gave brightness and warmth to it. Maggie Moon was lovely and Shelley Leyer was delightful. Tony Wold, Scott Entenman and David Gault all played their roles as the suitors and lovers with authenticity and feeling. Tony's singing of "Miracle of Miracles" was particularly effective.

It was literally a cast of hundreds. Outstanding among other fine performances were Doug Post as the rejected suitor, Eric Mollberg as the rabbi, and the two little sisters, Sue Trull and Sue Wold. Debbie Tyus had an important role as the Fiddler.

Years were shed during some of the more tender moments, and there was laughter from the warm humor. A particular favorite of this writer was the tender duet "Do You Love Me?" by Tevye and Golde.

If an Oscar were given, it would certainly have to go to Mr. Habicht, although he received masterful support from a competent cast. Personally, we were intrigued by the bottle dancers and have particular envy for Dave Nelson's athletic ability to do the impossible (for most people) Hopak. Little touches like that all added up to a first rate production for which Buchanan is now famous.

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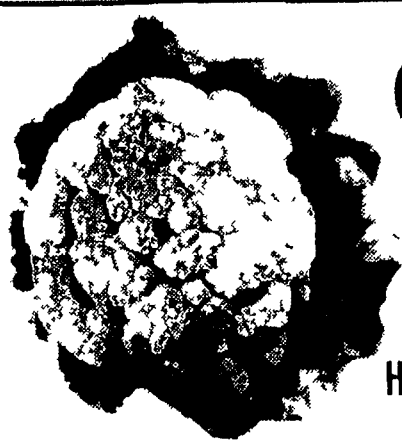

### B C A Winterizing Program Continues

The winterizing program is one facet of Berrien County Action's anti-poverty agency. The late spring with unseasonably cold weather is causing financial stress on those low income families living on fixed income.

Armed with a special grant from the Michigan Department of Labor, Berrien County Action attempts to alleviate the problems of the poor in a three county area. Berrien County Action is able to go into the homes of low income home owners and winterize their homes free of charge, including insulation of storm windows and storm doors and weather stripping.

Since December over forty-six homes have been completed in Berrien, Van Buren and Cass Counties resulting in a marked savings in fuel and warmer homes with heating systems working more efficiently.

The Berrien County Action winterizing crew is paid by the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act from a \$12,600 grant. The actual materials used are paid from another \$7,712 grant received by the anti-poverty agency through June of 1975.

Although drastic savings have been reported it is estimated that an average of only \$30.20 per house has been spent to bring about home winterizing improvements.

BCA winterizing can also provide emergency fuel supply for families finding themselves without fuel or available money. Although summer is approaching rapidly, Berrien County Action will continue to winterize homes through the summer. 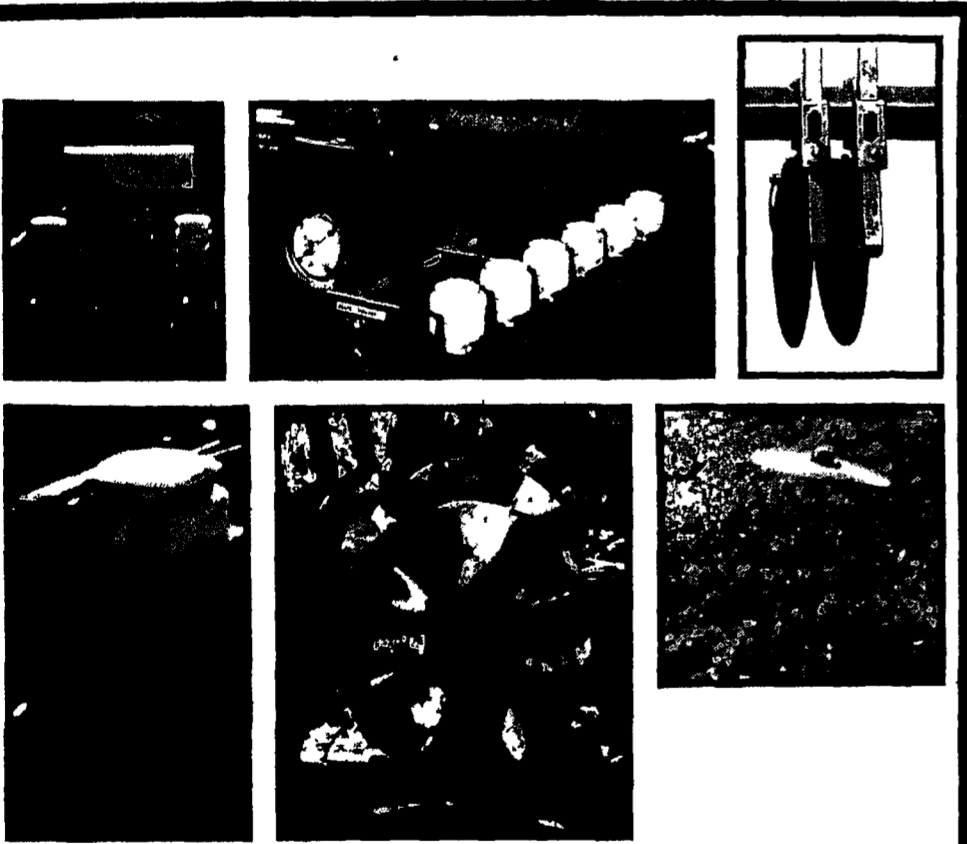

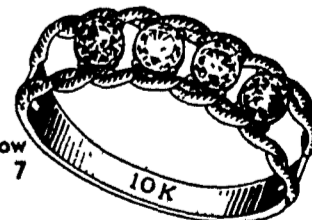

The family farm is a durable and resilient institution. It will survive and prosper if it makes wise use of the principles of co-operation and efficiently practices modern management methods -- together with available research and education.

It was pointed out that seasonal bank credit is essential as well as the good-will of the public -- but that all things are possible if we decide we want it that way.

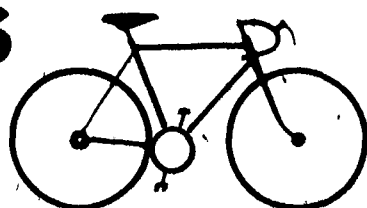

### State Chairman Speaks To Club

Mrs. H.J. Henris, Roadside Development - Litter Control State Chairman from Gibraltar Michigan, was guest speaker for the Buchanan Garden Club Monday presenting a program and slides on "Operation Wildflower." The program, providing an opportunity for all garden club members to actively participate in the planting and preservation of wildflowers along Michigan Highways, is a cooperative venture of Federated Garden Clubs of Michigan and the Michigan Department of State Highways and Transportation.

Participation in these wildflower projects may be done in three ways -- through wildflower seed furnished by garden clubs to the highway department for inclusion in the roadside seeding operation for turf establishment by the highway contractors by planting of wildflower seeds or plants on the highway roadside by local garden clubs on approval of a Highway Department permit secured through their municipal government, and third clubs might collect wildflower seeds or propagate plants to supply at proper planting time to other garden club projects throughout the state.

Mrs. Henris advised it would be wise to start with the following suggested wildflowers which normally are established throughout Michigan: daily, butterflyweed, coneflowers, black eyed susan, lupine (Michigan bluebonnet), and asters. There are many other equally desirable wildflowers clubs may wish to collect and experiment with, perhaps purchasing a wildflower seed mixture to plant and identify.

She stressed that Michigan wildflowers protected by law through Public Acts 1962, No. 182, Sec. include trailing arbutus, birdfoot violet, climbing bitter-sweet, club moss (ground pine), flowering dogwood, North American lotus, Michigan holly (winterberry), jupissisewa (Princess's pine), lady's slipper and orchids, all trillium and all gentian.

Mrs. Henris added that "Operation Wildflower" can be a fine continuing project for all garden clubs, inspiring many related programs, a study of horticulture, and herbs.

### Name Mrs. Rohde To 4-H Position

Mrs Charles (Germaine) Rohde has been appointed resource leader for the Berrien County 4-H Foundation to serve in the Greater Buchanan and Niles area, according to Donald W Gast, Foundation president. Her duties will be to contact corporations and individuals in this area in behalf of the continuing fund for the Foundation.

Mrs Rohde, a thirteen-year leader of the Happy Three 4-H Club, resides at 320 Terre Coupe with her husband. Their sons have all been extremely active in the Berrien 4-H Program.

"To aid the public's understanding of the 4-H Foundation and our continued solicitation for funds, we want to stress two important things," stated Gast. "First, that all monies contributed to the Foundation are kept intact and are invested to earn interest, with only the interest used to support the daily activities of 4-H, never the original contribution."

"Second, that our continuing fund drive is aimed to reach people who have not previously contributed to Berrien's 4-H Foundation. We appreciate the support of those who generously helped us in the beginning and do not plan to ask them for a second contribution."

At present, the Foundation has a total of \$76,825.27 invested in a corporate note and a bank certificate of deposit. For the 12 months' period, this is budgeted to bring an income of approximately \$7,000. Another \$5,000 in pledges has been recorded. The income contributes toward financing the activities of 97 4-H Clubs now serving more than 6,523 boys and girls in every city, village and township in Berrien County. Over 854 adult leaders work with the young people on a volunteer basis.

Since 1967, the membership in Berrien 4-H activities has grown over 500 percent. To cope with a projected 10 to 20 percent growth this year and to help offset the effects of inflation on club expenses, the Foundation's directors have set a total goal of \$120,000 for the investment fund.

The purpose of 4-H Clubs is to help young people learn by doing -- and become better citizens of our community by being involved in wholesome, useful projects.

In Berrien County the most popular projects with boys and girls are conservation, clothing, arts and crafts, followed by horses, foods and nutrition and gardening. Dog care and training, auto repair and safety, electronics, woodworking, first aid and small engine repair are also becoming popular projects.
