Michigan Gas Repairs Leaks On West Front

Company Now Installing Gas Regulators On All Meters Here

Howard McDougall, local manager of the Michigan Gas & Electric Company, announced Wednesday that the repair of the most serious leaks in the company's mains is nearing completion. These leaks were located by the Heath Survey Consultants Company when they made a survey of the company's system late in June. The Heath Company of Wellesley, Massachusetts, is an organization of specialists who have been engaged by the local company each year for the past three years to survey the local gas system for leaks. McDougall stated that the leak repair program is progressing favorably. The repair force has been working the fore part of this week on the gas main on the first block on West Front street.

It was also announced that the Gas Company is now engaged in installing pressure regulators on all gas meters in the city of Buchanan. The regulators are being installed in order to provide a more equalized pressure to the appliances served. Gas Company crews will be working in the city during July and August on this project. All regulators will be installed by the first week in September, McDougall said.

Seriously Hurt In M-60 Collision



TWO JUNK FILES THAT ONCE WERE CARS—At the top of the above two-ones is the Packard driven by John Henry Bolton of Gary, when he crashed into the Buick driven by Lewis Cohen of South Bend, 4 of a mile west of the Halls corners on M-60 Friday. Both cars were estimated as total or near-total losses by garages. The occupants, three hospitalized with serious injuries at Pawating, are luckier. They are recovering satisfactorily.

Two cars crashed at 2:05 p.m. Friday about 1/4 mile west of Halls Corners on M-60 when John Henry Bolton, Gary, Ind., failed to see in time a flagman's warning where the south half of the pavement was temporarily blocked for tarring operations.

Another car from the west had stopped at the signal until a westbound car could clear the partial roadblock. In order to dodge a rear collision Bolton swung his car into the left lane and crashed head-on with the westbound car, driven by Lewis Cohen, 53, of South Bend.

John Henry Bolton, 58, incurred fractured ribs. Two Gary residents in his car were hurt, Marlin Jackson, 50, received internal injuries, and Ruby Jackson, 38, received a lacerated forehead, right arm and left cheek.

Lewis Cohen of South Bend, received a fractured left elbow and leg and a lacerated forehead. The hurts of Marlin Jackson and Lewis Cohen were most serious. All injured were placed in the Swem ambulance and taken to Pawating hospital, Niles.

John Henry Bolton was charged with reckless driving. Both cars were badly damaged.

Heavy Lightning Sets 2 Small Fires, Other Damage

Wide-spread damage from lightning in the Buchanan area during the storm Tuesday night and Wednesday morning was reported by the Indiana & Michigan Electric Co. The damage was especially heavy west of Buchanan where transformers were burned out and other damage which required the Buchanan trouble-crews to be out all night.

The Buchanan Fire Department responded promptly to a call from Clear Lake Woods about 6:15 Tuesday evening, when lightning struck a 220 fuse box in the home of Mrs. John Jacobson at the corner of Elm street and the county road. Mrs. Grace O'Malley, next door, called the department and phoned Tom Micheniz at the pavilion when the electric range in the kitchen was sparking badly. Tom pulled the box and the wires in the stove, so the fire was out by the time the department reached the home.

During the same storm, lightning struck a large tree in front of the Howard Ketchum home on Walton road. The fire was not discovered for some time, as the Ketchums were in the kitchen. However Mrs. Ketchum reacted to the bolt with a tingling in her hands which lasted about twenty minutes. The Niles Township fire department put out the fire. The tree will have to be topped. The farm is the property of Mrs. Andrew Huss, who now lives in South Bend.

Wheat Growers Vote July 23 On 1954-55 Quotas

Farmers in wheat-raising areas all over the U. S. will be going to the polls Friday, July 23, to vote their choice on how wheat marketing should be handled in 1955.

Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson has called for the vote because wheat supplies are estimated now at 79% of the need. Two-thirds of the voting farmers—anyone planning to have more than 15 acres of wheat to harvest in 1955—must approve marketing quotas to make them law.

County offices of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation program have set acreage allotments and marketing quotas for farmers on the basis of projected national and state figures. If two-thirds of the farmers vote "yes" then marketing quotas will govern all farmers with more than 15 acres of wheat to harvest and cash penalties will be assessed on their "excess" wheat. Price supports at the national level will be available only to farmers who comply with their acreage allotments on wheat, any other crop allotments set up, and total acreage of crops set for their farms.

If more than one-third vote "no" there will be no marketing quotas and no cash penalties on "excess" wheat, and the price support level will be 50% of parity. Acreage allotments will still hold for farmers who grow an excess of wheat, or of other crops under allotment, will not be eligible for price supports. It will be a "free" market otherwise.

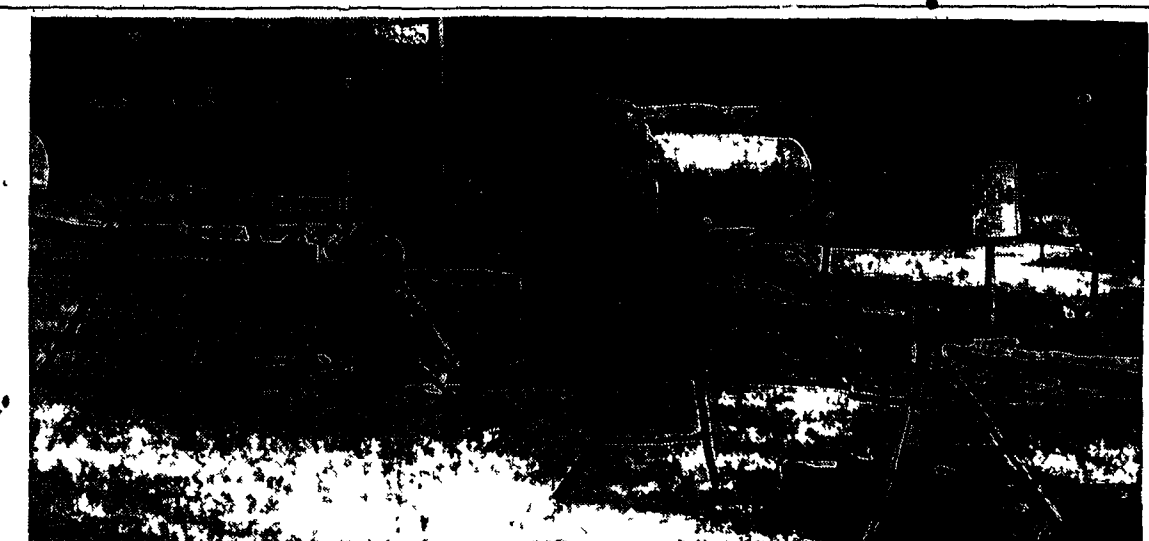
I. & M. Employees Hold 1954 Picnic

What stands in the way of the orderly growth of Buchanan? What is responsible for a working force that does not expand in step with the growth of industry? Just what is mainly responsible for the trek of industry out of the community?

The answer to all three questions, says Phil Sexton, in a talk before the Buchanan Business Association, Wednesday night, is just this: the \$3,000 down payment requirement on the purchase of a home in the \$10,000 bracket.

In a community the size of Buchanan, the need for houses can be answered only by the construction of homes for sale to people who want them. It is not practical to build them for rental, as the builder of a \$10,000 home must have a rental of \$100 per month. The other solution, the building of multiple home units, is suitable to comparatively larger towns, but not to Buchanan.

Sexton spoke from considerable experience, as he has collaborated in the construction of 27 new homes in the Buchanan community during the past 13 years. The situation is due, said Sexton, to a lack of teamwork between the 3 B's of housing—the Buyer, the Builder, the Banker.

The community should normally increase in population in ratio to the growth of its industries. This means more houses. As a matter of fact, houses deteriorate and become obsolescent in time, and their replacement requires new houses. There has been a very glaring example of this in Buchanan—the closing of 138 home units in Moccasin Court. This is not exactly a normal instance. But the light jerry-built structures were erected as temporary homes for war workers only 10 years ago, and do not have much value today. This total of 138 exceeds the total of all new homes built here since the end of World War II.

The 3 B's each have a responsibility to the community, said Sexton, and that means that each of the B's should be willing to dare a little. None of them can entirely sidestep a measure of responsibility, if they are to measure up to the standard of good citizenship.

Does the down payment need to be 30%? Not if the first B, the buyer, measures up to the standard required, said Sexton. His stature as a potential risk does not lie entirely in money in hand. It should lie mainly in his reputation for thrift and responsibility.

The obligation of the builder is to gather up all the loose ends in the home building problem, and present the potential buyer with a finished package.

It is not only an obligation but ultimately a necessity for survival for the banker to put the money entrusted to him at work in the community. The three great necessities are food, clothing and housing.

The need of a home is the problem which particularly requires finance. Certainly if there were no houses there would be no one living here. And if there were no one living here there would be no bank. The need is entirely reciprocal.

The banker, or any institution that makes loans on homes, must use discretion in the placement of funds in his care. But ultimately he must assume responsibility for financing housing to the utmost extent possible. Together with the buyer and the builder he is one of the three key figures. Unless the financial jam for the purchase of homes by the young but money-lacking families can be broken here, they will go where they will fare better. And the industry needing workers will follow.

Attend Legion Convention

Commander Gay Hardebeck and Claude McGowan are attending the annual convention of the American Legion, Department of Michigan, in session July 22, 23, 24, 25 in Grand Rapids as delegates of the Ralph Rumbaugh Post No. 51 of Buchanan.

This will be the 36th annual Legion convention in Michigan. There are now 100,000 men and women members of the American Legion and Auxiliary. The Legion was organized in Paris in 1919, with an initial membership of about 1,000.

Court house round-up

ST. JOSEPH—Voracious Lake Michigan, which has been nibbling on Berrien county's 36 miles of shoreline for the past four years, may soon be feeding on Berrien county's finances as well.

At least, Supervisor Theodore Katsbach, of Bridgman, thinks the county should foot the bill for a "what-to-do-about-it" survey, and he is going to see that the board of supervisors gets such a proposal at its Aug. 9 regular meeting.

"It's a countywide problem," declares Katsbach. "The people in our hinterland townships come by truckloads to use our beaches."

And Katsbach will be backed up by such authorities on erosion problems as George Foster, chief engineer for the Michigan State Highway Department, and Victor H. Hedman, civil engineer for the Milwaukee district of the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers.

Both have agreed to appear also before the county board Aug. 9 to support Katsbach's appeal. The

Corps of Engineers can, upon request of local units of government, conduct such fact-finding surveys on a cost split basis. Half of the money must come from the local units, the other half from the federal treasury.

The lake's insatiable appetite has eaten away millions of dollars worth of Berrien county shoreline since the water level began rising four years ago. Lake front residences have tumbled into the whitecapped waters, municipal water systems have been threatened at Bridgman and St. Joseph, and tons of shoreline sand and clay that once was valuable lake front property have landslided in.

The move to get a Corps of Engineers survey started when a delegation from St. Joseph went to Washington recently to appeal for federal assistance in a program to combat erosion. They were told they would first have to have the survey. The St. Joseph commission promptly made appli-

cation for such a survey. Hedman responded that the 3-mile St. Joseph shoreline was inadequate to ferret out the "real causes of erosion." He talked in terms of at least a 20-mile survey and asked lake front township and city leaders to attend an exploratory session in St. Joseph last week.

That is where Katsbach made the suggestion that the problem was just as countywide in its import as was the Paw Paw lake food control program to which the county board appropriated \$9,000 a couple of years ago.

Berrien county sheriff Erwin H. Kunath perked up like a coterie pot when a stranger approached him on the street this week to ask:

"Wanna buy a pound of coffee, Mister?"

"Where'd you steal it," queried the always-skeptical sheriff.

"I didn't steal it," the man replied. "I told the Red Cross I had a hungry wife and three hungry kids and they gave it to me," he confessed.

A check at Red Cross headquarters in St. Joseph confirmed that the man had brought a hard luck story there earlier in the day and had been given a food order.

Whereupon, Kunath took Warren Willis, 43, of Martin, Tenn., by the collar and marched him out to the county jail, there to wait until the grounds of justice could start percolating.

From coffee to milk—that is not such a difficult switch for a column like the "Roundup" to make. It was a great deal tougher for the Berrien Board of Supervisors to swallow last week.

Indeed, it was a \$3,400 gulp. The board had to appropriate that much to bring their milk handling process at the Berrien County Fair at Berrien Center up to the standards required by the state last week.

The county's herd of 21 cows have been producing 11 cans of milk a day. Four have been hauled to the nearby county infirmary and hospital for patient use; the rest have been sold.

Supervisor Herman Gnodtke, of Weesaw township, however, informed the board last week that state law prohibits use of bulk milk in hospitals. State Dairy Inspector Walter Haas, of Lansing, confirmed Gnodtke's report.

"It's definitely out," he declared in no uncertain terms. Gnodtke proposed that the farm sell all its milk production, then use the proceeds to buy back enough for the hospital in individual containers. He said the cost of installing bottling equipment would be prohibitive.

"The board bought his suggestion by a vote of 38 to 0—but that still wasn't enough. They had to appropriate the money to cover installation of what Haas described as the proper refrigeration equipment for its present pasteurization process.

The supervisors had no choice. They had to either rid themselves of the herd or install the cooling devices required by the state. And they agreed the herd was too valuable an asset to give up. Nevertheless, the milk appropriation curdled some of the budget-conscious supervisors.

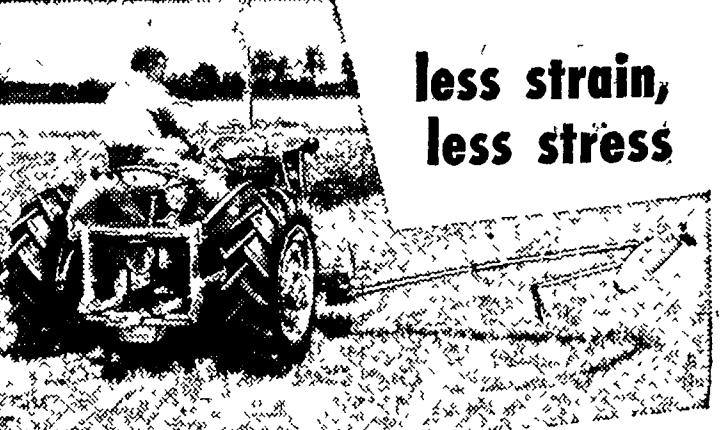

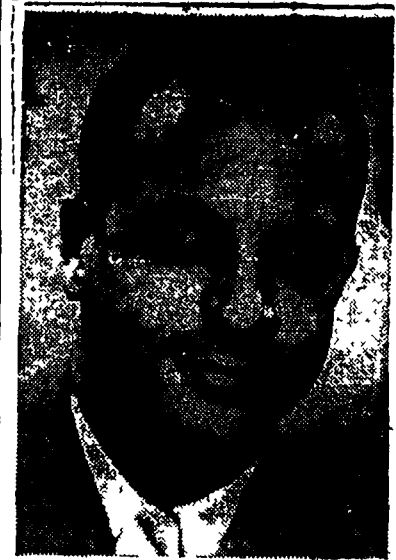

Leland W. Dean Is Advanced At Michigan State

An announcement has been received by the Record of the advancement of Leland W. Dean from the post of head of the department of special courses and

conferences for the Continuing Education Service to that of assistant to the Dean of Education.

Leland Dean was a member of the Buchanan high school faculty for three years, from 1948 until 1951, in the post of guidance director. While in that position he won a reputation in the community as a wise and capable leader. None of his many friends here are surprised at the news of his advancement. His new appointment became effective on July 15.

Dean, who joined the M.S.C. staff in 1951, will be responsible for student registration, advisement on courses and all other matters pertaining to students in the School of Education.

A native of McBride, Mich., Dean received his A.B. degree at Western Michigan College in 1939 and the M.A. degree at Michigan State in 1951. He served as principal at Brighton from 1940 to 1942 and was an instructor at the A.A.F. Radio School at Scott Field, Ill., during World War II. He was guidance director at Buchanan high school from 1948 until joining the M.S.C. staff three

years ago. Under Dean the department of short courses and conferences has expanded and is recognized as one of the pace-setters in the nation, Dean Harden said. "This operation has gained much stature and is an integral part of Michigan State," he said.

Rain Halts Wheat Harvest; Boosts Corn Prospects

The Buchanan wheat harvest was temporarily halted by the 40 inches of rain Tuesday evening and Wednesday morning. However 75% of the wheat had already been harvested and any damage was balanced by the need of other crops for moisture.

Average yield of the wheat crop on the basis of the returns now in is estimated at 25 bushels per acre by Robert Koenigshof, Co-ops manager.

The largest returns in to date are the 44-bushel per acre yield on a 15-acre field at the Carl Rotzein farm. Some indication of the smaller yield this year may be seen in the fact that during the first week of harvest this year the Buchanan Co-ops shipped 45 carloads of wheat out by rail. During the first week of the 1954 harvest only 17 carloads have been shipped.

Because of the dry weather the moisture content has dropped to about 10.5%. However the quality of the wheat as indicated by the weight is averaging No. 3, with an average weight of 56 pounds per bushel. No. 1 wheat must weigh 60 pounds per bushel or better.

The rain of Tuesday evening came just in time to help the corn crop, which is now more promising than the grain crops. If the 1954 crop goes through the summer with adequate moisture there will be a bumper crop. Rarely in Buchanan farm history has the crop been so far advanced as at present.

But last year a drouth which set in Aug. 8, cut a promising corn yield in half.

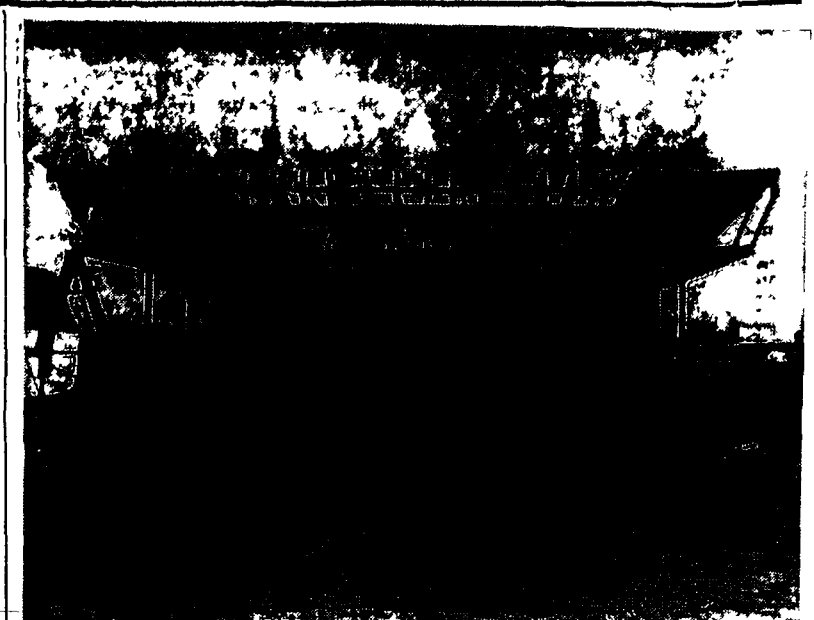
Honored On 50th Wedding Anniversary

Japanese Beetle Not Menace This Year: Hoekzema. Discovery of the Japanese beetle in the vicinity of Niles and Coloma was reported the latter part of last week and plans were laid to guard against further spread which might become a crop and vegetation menace next year.

The Japanese beetle has been seen before in this area, states Clifton Conrad, Berrien county fruit expert. Three years ago a very intense infestation was discovered in a golf course in the southern environs of South Bend.

An immediate campaign of spraying stopped them, although scattered traces were seen up through most frequent in dangerous number in the South where there was no general spraying practice, said County Agent Hoekzema, but are not so likely to get out from under control in Berrien fruit sections, where intensive spraying is a common practice.

More than 50 beetles were trapped and picked off trees in a mile-and-a-half radius near Coloma by state agricultural field scouts. Another eight were trapped near Niles.

There are not enough yet to constitute a present menace, stated County Agent Hoekzema. The female beetles are already laying their eggs in the soil, and will continue through August. The standard prevention method is to treat the ground where they have been seen in the fall. Since the Japanese beetle is a pest that sub-

jects any heavily infested area to federal quarantine, it is expected that the federal government will participate in work on extermination. It is the rule for federal authorities to provide the trucks, the state the skilled man-power, and the local neighborhoods the materials. This requires a three-way agreement.

Since the eggs are laying dormant in the ground for ten months there is no immediate need of action, said Hoekzema. Preventive action will logically be taken in the fall to destroy the larva in its dormant state. The ground is usually treated for several hundred feet around every place where one of the beetles had been seen. The first step will be to secure an agreement on mutual action by the federal, state and local government authorities.

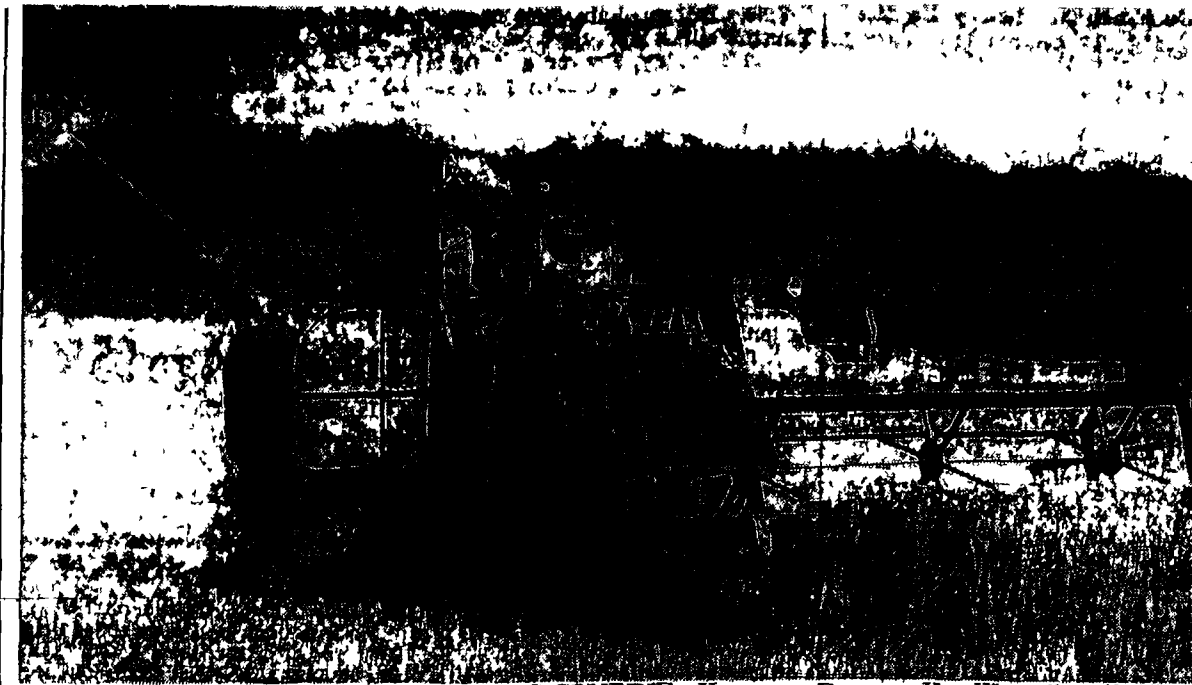

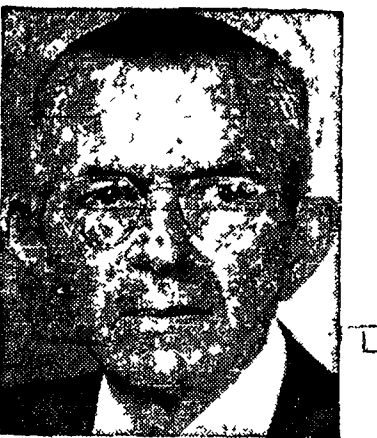

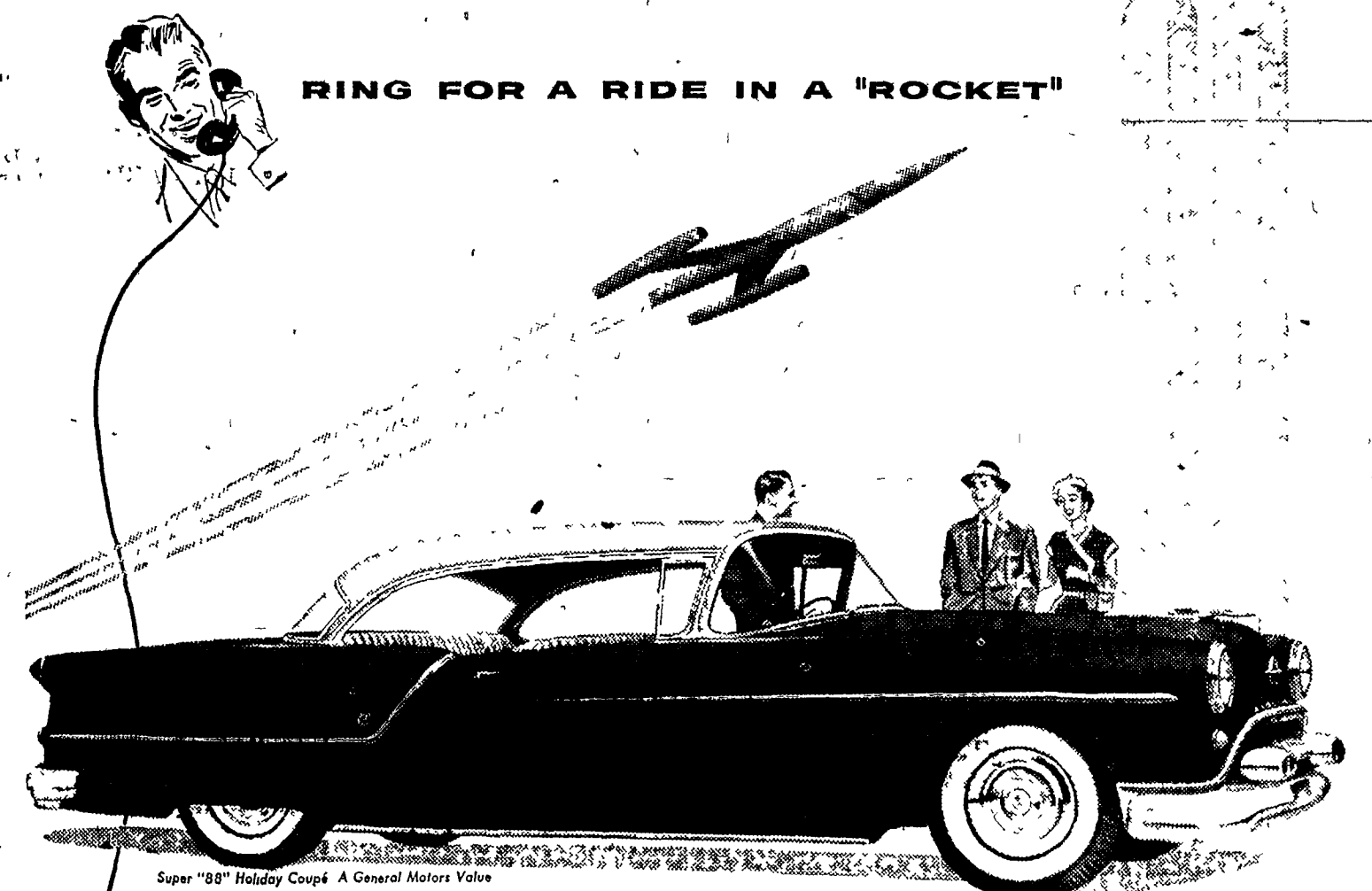

James A. Glover Dies At Age 95

James Albert Glover died at his home at 108 West 3rd street at 8:30 p.m. Monday, July 19, 1954, at the age of 95 years. The funeral rites are being held at the Swem Funeral Home at 2 p.m. today (Thursday), with W. Robert Palmer, minister of the Church of Christ, in charge. Burial will be made in Oak Ridge cemetery.

He was born on the prairie near Emporia, Kansas, Nov. 1, 1858, the son of Uriah and Barabba Glover. When he was a child and later as a young man he made several trips by covered wagon in company with his brothers to and from the region of Salda, Colo., then a famous mining town. This was during the decade of the 1870's when the region was to an extent Indian ground.

He and his brothers hired out as miners, and later he and a

brother took over an abandoned gold mine and worked it.

He had staid a short time in Buchanan when his parents came here from Emporia when he was eight, but they soon returned to Kansas. He finally came here in 1892, while attending Chicago's Columbian Exposition. While he was here he went to work at the Buchanan Cabinet Works, liked it and remained there until 1918, being several years the foreman of the shipping department. When the government called for the closing of all wood-work factories in 1918 Alfred Richards sold the factory, housed in the two-story brick now used as the Buchanan Co-ops warehouse to the Clark Equipment Co. He bought a farm on Main Street Road, now owned by Walter Reese. He farmed several years and finally returned to town.

In 1923 he moved to the home at 108 West 3rd street, where he lived the remainder of his life. He retained his sight, hearing and memory to an unusual degree until he was over 90. At one time employees of the fishing license department of the Michigan Department of Conservation erroneously credited him with being the oldest licensed fisherman in Michigan. However, after a check he had to yield that rank to a 100-year-old fisherman from Kalamazoo.

He married Lute Roe at her home in Buchanan on Nov. 24,

1898. She preceded him in death on April 21, 1944.

He had no immediate relatives surviving, but the following four nieces had remained in touch with him. Mrs. Effie Crawford and Mrs. Alena Smith of South Pasadena, Calif.; Mrs. Olive Todd of Santa Monica, Calif.; Mrs. Maude Pitzer of Helena, Calif.; Mrs. Effie Lott of Carlsbad, New Mexico.

Bessie Clements, Resident Here 24 Years, Dies

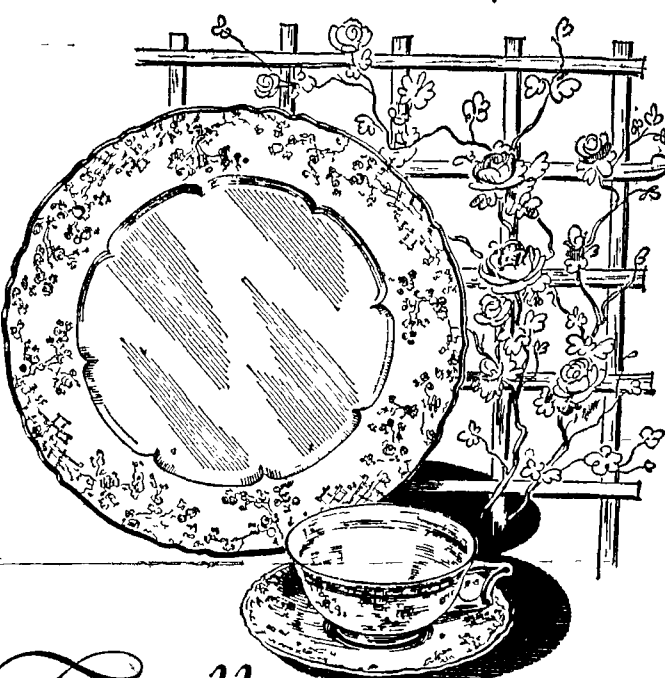

Wheat Farmers Told To Take Advantage of Support Prices

(The following is taken from a talk made recently by Robert Koenigshof, Buchanan Co-ops manager, over Radio Station WHFB)

The obstacles that face the farmer in his patient attempt to feed the nation and the world are indeed numerous and staggering. Nature, usually a generous provider, is sometimes rebellious and unco-operative. Not only does the farmer put up with floods, wind, drouth, insects, diseases, extreme cold and heat, but he also has to cope with the ancient

rules of the market which takes the pricing of his products out of his hands

Yet in spite of these burdens, the farmer continuously struggles to fulfill his destiny. In 1880 the farmer produced enough to feed himself and five other people. In 1900 he produced enough to feed himself and eight others. Today he produces enough to feed himself and 14 others.

Every day there are 10,000 more mouths to feed in our nation. Today we are told our population is over 160,000,000. In a few years it will reach 175,000,000, and then perhaps 200,000,000.

Soon the farmer will have to increase his production to feed 17 others.

But today's problem is that we have raised more than the markets can immediately absorb. This so-called surplus, which we obtained by request to feed a hungry, war-torn world, is no longer demanded by the markets. Our farm exports have dropped sharply and there does not seem to be much chance of increasing them at present. So today's problem is how to use our abundance and still stimulate prosperity in agriculture.

Farmers On 2-3 of Equality Basis In Income

Agriculture has today an income of about 2-3 of equality when compared with the rest of the nation. It is a "long haul" to farm equality, even with parity prices.

Today the farmer is faced with the problem of what to do with another wheat crop, which, according to crop reports, is better than the average. This poses a larger problem than anticipated because, according to last reports, the government has approximately 900,000,000 bushels

of wheat in storage at the present time.

The biggest problem facing the wheat producer today is whether or not to get a government loan on his wheat. In general the farmers do not like the support program, as in some respects it seems to be heading the country toward socialism. On the other hand it is often stated and proven that as agriculture goes, so goes the nation.

With today's market price of wheat approximately 25% less than Government Support prices, we cannot help suggesting that as many farmers as possible take advantage of government wheat loans. Again I want to repeat that we farmers don't like support prices but we do want equality in the market places.

Also I want to repeat that farmers and support prices are not responsible for high food prices. The price of wheat is no longer a guide to the price of bread. The average price of bread today is 6 1/2¢ per loaf more than it was eight to ten years ago, and yet the price the farmer receives for his wheat is less. The average cost of farm-produced ingredients in a loaf of bread is only 3.2¢ per loaf. But you housewives know what you are paying for bread.

Perhaps if we knew about other government subsidies, we would not get quite so irritated about those farm subsidies. Agriculture actually received government aid in 1953 of approximately \$305,000,000. During the same year business received aid to the extent of \$934,000,000. In 1952 agriculture received in government aid a total of \$463,000,000 while business received the same year (including reconversion, oil depletion, tax amortization, airline subsidies, and others) the total of \$1,041,000,000.

I give you the above figures just to let you know that we are practically all subsidized in one way or another.

Let me again suggest that you grain farmers hold your wheat off the market. If a sufficient quantity of wheat is dumped on the market at harvest, it is bound to flood the market and create a lower price. On the other hand, if farmers hold their wheat back, it will create a demand and force the price of wheat up. If you need storage, contact your local elevator regarding storage thru the Michigan Elevator Exchange.

If you keep your wheat at home it will be well to treat your wheat with some kind of weevil treatment about three weeks after harvest.

Also if your wheat is a little tough when you put it in the bin, it will be well to mix in some form of drying compound to absorb some of the excess moisture.

Mrs. Pearl Scott Dies In Saugatuck

Mrs. Pearl Scott, age 62, sister of Mrs. Robert Franklin Buchanan, died Friday morning in her home in Saugatuck, following an illness of several months. She was born in Oxford, Ind., Feb. 18, 1892, the daughter of Oscar and Emily Anderson. She married J. N. Scott in 1912 in Denver, Colo., and they went to Los Angeles, Calif., in 1918. He died in 1926. Last February she came to Buchanan and lived with her sister until April, when she went to Saugatuck. Having spent several months here each year she was quite well known. She leaves, besides the sister, two brothers, Ray Anderson, Saugatuck, and LeRoy Anderson, Rensselaer, Ind. Funeral services were held in Rensselaer at 2 p. m. Monday.

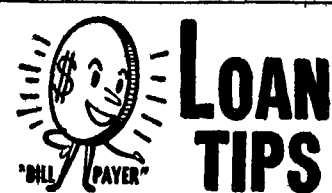

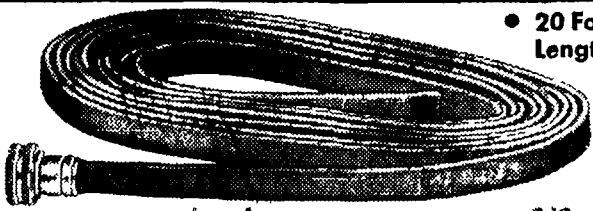

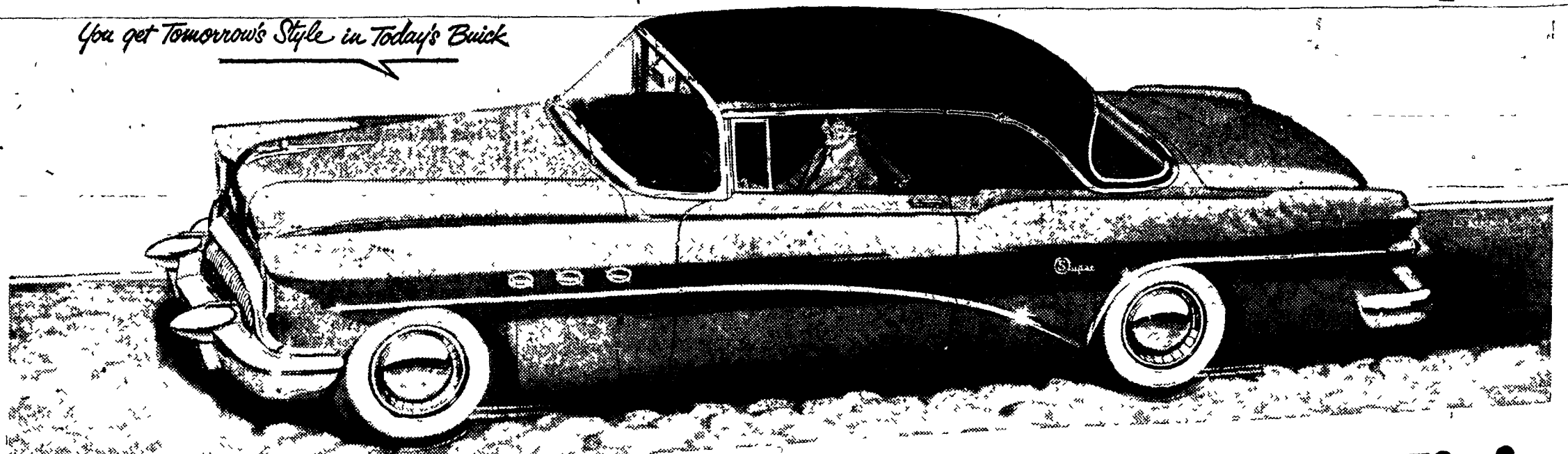

The Story of Buchanan



Farms Followed The Woodlands During 1880's

The Berrien County Record of Dec 2, 1880 stated that all wood, even for fires, had been stripped from the immediate vicinity of Buchanan "long ago." Wood had previously, because of its cheapness, been the principal fuel. Hundreds of cords were bought annually for the schools. But at the time cited above Holmes stated that he would have to buy two coal stoves, as wood was too hard to get, even in payment of subscriptions. Many Buchanan homes were installing coal stoves.

Here and there were choice pieces of timber, held perhaps for higher prices. The Record of Feb 1, 1881, reported that a tree had been cut on the William Burrus farm, about three miles west of Buchanan, which was sawn into 7 12-foot logs without a sign of a limb or knot. The log was 5 feet in diameter at the bottom. However, the story does not tell the species.

George Burrus, a grandson-of the William Burrus mentioned above, states that, according to tradition, part of that farm had been cleared by burning off the timber. Robert Franklin, Sr., states that his ancestral farm, in possession of the family for over 100 years, was also cleared in part by burning.

One of the very few living who has intimate memories of the virgin timber days is Sanford Carpenter, who lives on the old Carpenter farm immediately north of the Colvin school. When he was a boy in the early 1880's he used to cut and haul beech and maple firewood to Buchanan in the winter, getting first \$1.50 a rank (third of a cord). The rank, 8 feet long, 4 feet high, 16 inches wide, weighed a ton if the wood was solid. He would haul two ranks of nearly two tons, on the

sled. His father, Marcus Carpenter, had bought and settled on a 130-acre tract, mostly timber, in 1860. Their home was first a log cabin, in which Sanford was born. Sanford in his young manhood, in the 1880's, cut whitewood logs in winter and hauled them to the St. Joseph river banks and there bound them together in rafts, to be floated to the plant of the Thayer Basket company at St. Joseph. The soft, clear whitewood was ideal for pint and quart berry boxes.

At the river's edge he would drive steel pins with eyelets at the top into each log, exactly in the center. Through these eyelets he would string rope. Most of the logs were 10 to 12 feet long, sometimes longer. He made rafts in this way as much as 1,200 feet long. Two men would man the raft, one at the front and one at the rear, equipped with from 15 to 20-foot pole poles with which they guided the raft.

He used to sell the whitewood logs to the factory for \$1.50 to \$2 per 1,000 board feet in the log. He had a regular woodsman's computing rule with which the board content of the log could be satisfactorily figured. He charged 50 cents per 1,000 feet for cutting and \$1.75 for hauling the logs to the edge of the river. There is no particular present significance in figuring what the original timber of the Gallen Woods would have been worth if they were standing now. But they are not here. Only a part of it went into the main it belted, the fine wagons which were the bird pride of the town.

To the vast thousands of acres of timber were shaven to stumps, to provide firewood for Chicago, also to a lesser extent for Niles, St. Joseph and Buchanan itself. More thousands of acres were cut for construction in Chicago after the great fire of 1887, to furnish ties for the Michigan Central Railway.

Even while the furniture factories were flourishing here, fine hardwood logs were being shipped to the bigger furniture centers, as Grand Rapids. The Berrien County Record of March 7, 1877, reported that the largest log ever delivered in Grand Rapids had been cut near Buchanan and sawn and shipped by Weisgarner's sawmill, about where the Buchanan Lumber company yard is now located. The log was 12 feet long and 6 feet 2 inches in diameter, a solid

black walnut log.

During the winter of 1879, probably the last great timber harvest year from forests in this vicinity, 2,300,000 lineal board feet of logs had been hauled into the sawmill yards, a mere matter of about 450 miles of boards, if laid end-to-end. Of this amount, 1,000,000 feet went into the Roe & Rough sawmill yard, another 1,000,000 to the Weisgarner yard, and the remainder into the Roe & Case yard. In the case of the Weisgarner mill, the whole flat extending south and west and northwest to the high school hill (several blocks in all, would be covered with logs.

By 1880 the Buchanan community had experienced and ended an industrial boom without comparison during its entire history with one exception — the period of heavy manufacture by the Clark Equipment company for army equipment during the Lend-Lease prelude and the period of active participation in World War II.

By 1880 the straggling village of the 1850's had reached a population of nearly 2,000, almost as large as St. Joseph and nearly half the size of Niles, then the county metropolis. This burgeoning of industry was coincident with a period of inactivity over the United States. It continued until the magnificent hardwood timber of the vicinity had been mined out. Then the song of the gang-saws died in the mills and

the skilled wood carvers left to ply their craft elsewhere.

Nearly 450 Bank Scholarships Are Available in Michigan

Nearly 250 Michigan bank scholarships are available for young people who want to study in 8-week courses in agriculture and home economics at Michigan State College.

The banks provide these \$100 scholarships to help young people do a better job on the farm and in the home and to be leaders in their communities, points out Short Course Director Ralph W. Tenny. Classes starting Oct 25 will cover agriculture or home economics for two-thirds of the time. The other third will be on

rural leadership, family living, parliamentary procedure and public speaking.

Recreational programs also are provided the students, who will live in Short Course dormitories and eat at the Short Course cafeteria. Sports, lectures, parties and musical programs are included.

Youth interest in scholarships — or adults who want more information or to make a recommendation — should contact a vocational agriculture teacher, a home economics teacher, a county agricultural agent, a local banker or the Short Course Department, Michigan State College.

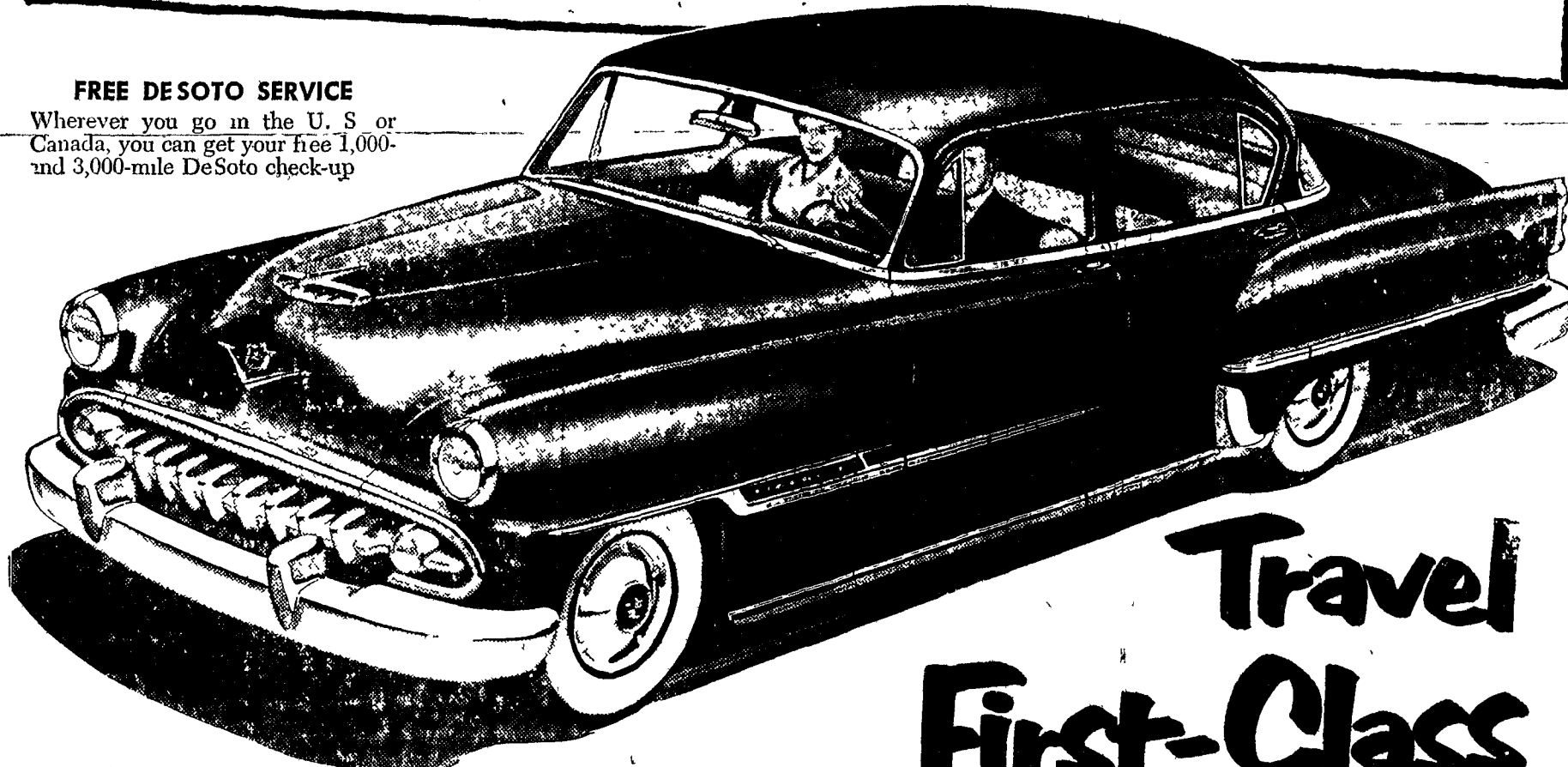

Boost Home-Grown Peaches

Special To The Record—

Increasing irritation among peach growers of the state is responsible for a campaign to encourage housewives to "put off until tomorrow what they could do today."

Peach people here have been stewing, sweating and swearing for several years about the break they get on National Peach Week. This year the presentation was scheduled for July 19-25, weeks before a Michigan peach is picked. The early date is a distinct advantage to southern growers, whose orchards are ready for picking early in the summer.

This season, for the first time, the Michigan Department of Agriculture took definite steps to help the Michigan grower market his product.

"We have long been concerned over Peach Week publicity coming a month ahead of Michigan harvest," said G. S. McIntyre, director.

The department made available \$2,500 in funds, which could be matched by the peach growing industry and used to remind housewives that Michigan peaches would be ready about Labor Day.

"Michigan-grown peaches are worth waiting for," states McIntyre. "They are excellent in quality, and low in price. The crop this year is expected to reach 2½ million bushels, somewhat smaller than other years."

Conferences to provide a better market for northern peaches were arranged. Representatives from independent and chain grocery growers and packers met with agricultural department leaders to see what each could do to help.

Was the \$100,000 battle with the gypsy moth a success?

The first part of June state officials were shocked to learn that the pest, which destroys nearly all great plants, had been detected for the first time in the western part of Pennsylvania—it had been found in several areas

in central Michigan. Plans were hastily prepared for a spraying project aimed at killing every moth in the state. It took four airplanes about a week to finish the attempt.

"As of today no live gypsy moth has been seen in Michigan since we sprayed," said C. A. Boyer, chief of the Bureau of Plant Industry.

A necessary part of the fight against this pest, Boyer explained, is a trapping program to test the efficiency of the spray. Traps have been located over a 1,000,000-acre area in a 25-mile radius of Lansing; 10 miles further in each direction along key highways.

They are baited with portions of the female moth which will attract males from a distance of ½ mile. "We feel our traps are 100% foolproof but we can't say for sure for another 50 trapping days that our spray has killed all the moths," explained Boyer.

"Even if none are trapped," he added, "a visual search will be continued for eggs that might have been laid by untrapped females."

"It looks very good, so far," Boyer stated.

First "dry run" tests of the new State Police emergency trailer were entirely successful according to Commissioner Joseph A. Childs.

The trailer was built by police personnel after a need for such a vehicle was experienced at the Flint and Port Huron disasters. Barring unexpected emergencies plans call for the official use of the trailer at the International Air Show in Detroit, July 24-25.

Principal use of the trailer is to serve as headquarters control point for state police when they are called into an area. It provides communications between men in the field and with other areas. There are four radio transmitters and a specially designed telephone switchboard supplying five trunk and 12 extension lines. The telephone equipment, designed and built by Michigan Bell engineers, may be hooked up to regular commercial facilities or powered by local battery power.

When working under disaster or congested conditions, value-talkie units permit excellent communications with officers in the field.

County Agent Advises Maple Tree Spray

For the past week or two now the female Cottony Maple Scale has loosened itself from the bark of the tree and is now secreting a mass of white cottony material, from which it gets its name. In this mass of cottony material are found the eggs of which there may be from 1,500-3,000 laid by each female.

As this mother scale moves very slowly along the limb, the young scale insects are hatched from the eggs and are dropped along the way to make their own way through life. These young scale insects often move out to the leaves upon which they feed for a while before they go back to a limb or twig upon which they attach themselves until next summer. It is while these scale insects are moving along the limbs or are feeding upon the leaves that they can best be killed by a spray.

Heretofore, we have found this Cottony Maple Scale only on maples and more particularly on the Soft or Silver Maples. But their habit must be changing a bit because we are finding them this year not only on maples but on elm, willow and, no doubt, they can be found on other shade trees as well.

These scale insects are very harmful to trees. They suck their food out through the bark of the tree as they remain sealed to the bark throughout about eleven months of the year. The result is that the lower limbs of the tree die as these scale insects work on the lower limbs first and gradually work up the tree each year killing the limbs as they go.

These Cottony Maple Scales will continue to be in their migratory stage for the next couple weeks. If you haven't checked your trees recently for this Cottony Maple, I

Hush! Hush! Put On New Outboard Motors

Since the introduction of a "quiet" outboard motor by Johnson Motors last fall, fishermen have been wondering what effect this development would have on fish and fishing results.

Although definite results have not been established as yet, scattered reports from anglers indicate that the lack of noise and vibration of the new motor may be as pleasing to bass, northern

urge you to do so before they do serious damage to your trees. They can be easily seen as they are usually found on the lower side of the limb and you can easily see the Cottony mass protruding out from underneath the shell of female insects.

The Parks Division of the Department of Public Works in both Benton Harbor and St. Joseph sprayed the maple trees on the tree lawns in the two cities last year and at least one of them has started already this year to spray the tree lawns. That doesn't take care of the trees back of the tree lawn or in the back yard because they are the individual home owners' responsibility.

For the best control of these scale insects, we suggest that you spray your trees or have them sprayed with a combination of 50% Wettable DDT and 15% Wettable Malathion used at the rate of 2 tablespoons of each of the DDT and Malathion in one gallon of water or for commercial spraying, it would be 2 lb. of 50% Wettable DDT and 2 lb. of 15% Wettable Malathion in 100 gallons of water.

pike and bonefish as it is to fishermen.

One northwoods angler, for instance, stated that walleyes and northern pike were inclined to strike trolled lures closer to the stern of the boat when he was using the "quiet" motor. He attributes this to the flash of the propeller, the natural attraction of fish to moving water, and the absence of the usual outboard vibration and noise.

A bass fisherman found the new motor particularly adaptable for use in casting along the shoreline. With the motor idling in gear he was able to proceed slowly enough to work the bank properly. He reports that the motor was so quiet at this speed that he could approach bass feeding on the surface and fish the rises.

Another angler and well known outdoor writer is using one of the "quiet" Johnsons to stalk bonefish in the Florida Keys. Although he claims to have accomplished this feat with the "quiet" outboard motors, no one would believe him. He hopes the new motor will give his story credence.

Perhaps the ultimate answer to the outboard noise-fishing question may remain as undecided as the question of what lure is best for what species of fish. Tackle manufacturers go to great decorative pains in painting the top of surface lures—yet, to the fish, a dozen different colored lures all present the same pale white underside. Lures are made to please the fisherman, and we have a hunch that motors are manufactured for the same purpose.

So we'll probably never know whether fish go for the new "quiet" Sea-Horse motor or not. Fishermen say they do, but on rare occasions they have been known to stretch the truth.

Spot-Checkers Report Short Grocery Weights

Shortages Found In Pre-Packaged Foods 3,161 Out Of 8,054 Packages Weighed

Spotchecking of weights on pre-packaged food offered in grocery stores throughout the state disclosed 3,161 instances of short-weight out of 8,054 packages tested last month.

This is shown in a report submitted to C. S. McIntyre, director of the Michigan Department of Agriculture, recently by the Department's chief of the bureau of marketing and enforcement, Miles A. Nelson.

Mr. Nelson explains that while there were 3,161 instances of short-weight, actually the amount is low in comparison with the hundreds of thousands of packages offered to housewives. Just a few inaccurate scales could easily account for all of the instances of short-weight. Inaccurate scales amounted to 11% of those tested. Overweight was found as well as underweight.

"In other words," said Mr. Nelson, "where a spotcheck in a store discloses an incorrect weight on a package, all other packages in the lot are checked. This boosts the short-weight percentage in relation to the total number inspected. Perhaps 500 packages might show short-weight, and boost the short-weight total by that amount. In another store a check of 10 packages, all correct, would only increase the total packs inspected by 10. This accounts for the comparative high percentage of short-weight found in relation to total packages inspected."

Nevertheless inspectors of the

Michigan Department of Agriculture are constantly visiting stores throughout the state searching for short-weight and other violations. The duties are many because sanitation, adulteration, false advertising, misbranding, must be watched as well.

Then, too, such inspectors also are responsible for checking gas pumps, scales of all kinds, fruits and vegetables, bakeries, bottling works, eggs, meats and anything which deals with food products. The total cost of all of these various services is estimated to be less than a nickel per capita a year, according to Mr. McIntyre.

How Controls Will Affect Farms In 1955

Farmers Vote On Extent Of Supports vs. Quotas On July 23

Controls on cropping next year are no longer an "if" question to farmers, points out J. P. Hoekzema, Berrien county agricultural agent. Farmers are asking now: "How will controls affect my farm in 1955?"

U. S. Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson has set the national wheat allotment at 55 million acres — about 8 million short of this year's harvest and 23 million less than last year. This allotment, and the individual farmer's share, will remain unchanged even if wheat marketing quotas are voted down on July 23.

The vote will be between quota wheat — with excess planting cash penalties — at a support price between 75 and 90 percent of parity, or 50 percent supported wheat — with no penalties. Farmers will not qualify even for 50 percent price support if they overplant.

Every farmer in Berrien county who plans to plant more than 15 acres of wheat this year can vote on July 23.

Agent Hoekzema passes along this review of the situation from

Journal Held, agricultural economist at M. S. C.

"Controls on other crops are sure to follow, especially on corn and quite probably on other grain. Marketing quotas are not likely to be used on these Michigan-grown crops but acreage allotments for next year will have some very real teeth. The cross-compliance feature, announced by Secretary Benson, will make eligibility for price supports and 'all or nothing' proposition. The wheat producer will still have to stay within his acreage allotment to avoid difficulty. But he won't be eligible for the support price on wheat unless he also stays within his corn acreage allotment and any other allotment he may be given."

If a farmer has more than 10 diverted acres, he can not shift them into anything but hay, pasture or green manure unless he wants to forfeit all price supports, explains Held. Close substitute crops would cancel the effects of the wheat outback.

Cross compliance will be in force next year no matter what the vote on July 23, stresses Held. If a farmer overplants corn, he won't be able to get a loan or purchase agreement on wheat.

Farmers with 15 or less acres of wheat would not pay a penalty for overplanting under a quota, Held explains, but they would forfeit price support benefits. Planting of more than 15 acres — if in excess of allotments — will carry a penalty of \$1.10 for each excess bushel before any wheat can be sold. This penalty would apply even if wheat is fed or given away.

Soil conservation has meant a savings to the farmer in seed, fertilizer, labor, and power and increased income.

Featuring the meeting was a round-table discussion of Michigan's new marketing program led by Orval Newport. During the business meeting, conducted by Chairman Jack Harroff, Herbert Wallquist, Paul Place and Orval Newport, were appointed on a committee to prepare a slate of officers for the annual election at the meeting Sept. 8, with Mr. and Mrs. Carl Ferris.

Plans were made to hold a weener roast and potluck supper at 7:30 p.m., Aug. 11, at Warren Dunes state park, Sawyer, which will take the place of the regular meeting. A report on the Berrien county Farm Bureau Women's Committee meeting in June, when talks were given by Sheriff E. H. Kuback and Niles Police Chief Art Pears, was given by Mrs. Elmer Clark. Verne Shreve reported on the June meeting of the Buchanan township board, and was re-appointed to attend the next meeting.

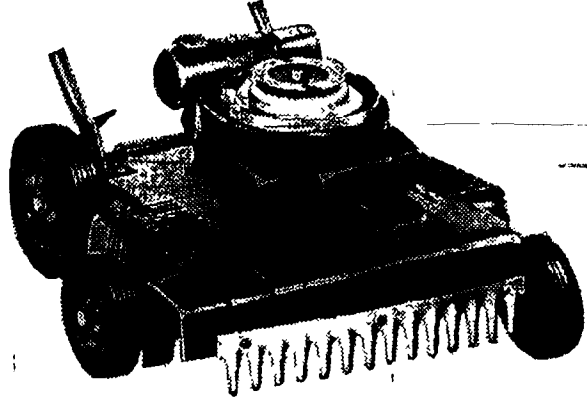

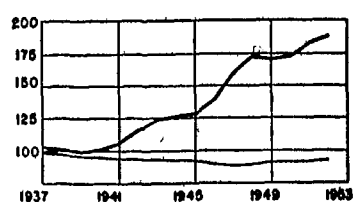

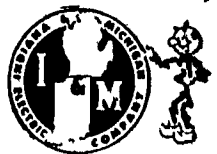
