

Buchanan Votes for Wallace in The Primaries

Buchanan's Democrats followed Michigan's pattern and gave Governor George Wallace a big vote in Tuesday's presidential primaries. Out of 775 votes cast, the Democrats polled 524 to the Republican total of 211.

In Buchanan, Wallace got 286, McGovern 126, Humphrey 66, Muskie 16, Shirley Chisholm 10, Jackson 5 and Hartke 1. Buchanan gave President Nixon 198 votes to McCloskey's 3. The voters in the city voted yes to Proposal A having to do with authorizing lotteries by a vote of 401 to 266. Proposition B on resignation of legislators won 755 to 285.

Buchanan Township gave 234 of its 549 votes cast to Wallace. Humphrey was second with 45, and McGovern 43. Nixon received 114 votes to McCloskey's 1. Proposition A won 301 to 232. B won 298 to 227. In Buchanan Township, which uses

the paper ballot, 80 ballots were spoiled by people attempting to split their tickets. The voter turnout was good there, especially in the River Shores addition.

Bertrand Township gave Wallace 174 votes to Humphrey's 43 and McGovern 41. Nixon received 121 votes, in Bertrand to McCloskey's 1. Proposition A won 188 to 107 and B won 217 to 130.

Gallen had 320 votes cast. Wallace got 159, McGovern 43, Humphrey 19 and Muskie 15. Nixon had 66 to McCloskey 2. Proposition A won 140 to 118, and B lost 131 to 112.

Democratic candidates for delegates in Buchanan from the 1st precinct, Martha Kingsbury 51, Thomas Kingsbury 40. In the second, James Booth got 85, Barry Hultema 60. In third, Kathleen Thompson 42, Donald Holmes 60 in the fourth.

Republican delegates, Maurice Nelson 41, Gerald Radde 34, Cheryl Warner 33. In second, Catherine Cress 62, Lucille Gnodtke 59, Veto McKenzie 53, DeLos Proseus 62. In the third, Joseph Garbert, Jr. 17, William Tyus 18. In the fourth, Elaine Knapp 37, Nancy Patschet 37, Audrey Rose 36.

Four Candidates Seek 2 Seats

Four candidates will seek two seats on the Buchanan Board of Education. The post to be vacated by Gordon Schneider and the one up for reelection of David Hanson, who is running again, will be decided at the school election Monday, June 12.

A last minute filing came from Gerald L. Moulds. He is manager of manufacturing research at Clark Equipment, a graduate of Buchanan High School, he has been in the community 26 years. He and his wife, the former Jane Rizer, have three children, Christopher, Beth Ann and Abby.

The other candidates are David Hanson, present president of the Board of Education, Mrs. Sam (Teaola Jean) Tutson and Elton Laah.

At the June 12 election the Buchanan Schools will ask for a continuation of the 16.35 mills for operation of the school. They have no way of knowing just how they will make out on this until the amount of State aid is known and after the County Tax Allocation Board has decided just how much of 15 mills to allocate to the schools. The expired millage which the Board of Education hopes to renew for two years had been voted in two packages. In 1971, 11.85 mills was voted for five years, and in 1970, 4.50 mills was voted for two years.

Republicans Elect New Officers

The Buchanan Republican Club elected Joe Garbert, Jr., their new chairman, Mrs. Roger Warner was elected vice president, Mrs. Bill Gnodtke, treasurer, and Mrs. John Cress, secretary.

Plans were formulated for the Republican Spring Convention which will be in the Buchanan high school auditorium May 31.

It was decided that Republicans should be encouraged to vote in their own primary rather than switching over to the more contested Democratic primary.

County Seeks Help For Berrien General

The Berrien General Hospital has 255 beds and a regular staff of 10 to 12 doctors. It has an emergency room staffed 24 hours a day and thoroughly modern facilities. It has been losing money at a rapid rate because of the fact that the costs

per patient exceed the income received from many of them who do not have adequate insurance. Many counties in the State supplement their hospitals, and the County Commissioners voted to ask for a levy up to three-tenths of a mill for operating expenses for the hospital. This proposal will be on the ballot in the August primary. It was estimated that this fraction of a mill would raise about \$250,000 a year. It was pointed out that there was a great need for the continuation of Berrien General's operation as a facility which serves a definite need within Berrien County. There was general agreement among the Commissioners that efforts must be made to save the hospital and to prevent a staff of doctors from having to move out of the county.

Benedicts To Go To Honduras

Dr. and Mrs. Eugene Benedict are leaving Saturday for a working trip to Honduras. Under the auspices of the United Church of Christ, he will be utilizing his skills as an optometrist to help among the deprived peoples of Honduras. Hopefully, Mrs. Benedict says she will be useful and be able to help her husband.

The mission at San Pedro has been inviting men and women from the fields of medicine, dentistry and optometry to come to Honduras to give much needed help on a volunteer basis. The Benedicts will serve the mission for a month, and they hope they will be used in the rural areas. The natives of Honduras are a mixture of Aztec, Indian and Spanish. Dr. Benedict who has had two corneal transplants himself, expects to learn and to help at the same time. With him he will take old eyeglasses, which are greatly needed there.

A letter from the mission asked Dr. Benedict to bring certain medical equipment, more easily obtainable in the States, and indicated that instant coffee would be appreciated.

To help the Benedicts on their trip, both the congregations of the First Presbyterian Church of Buchanan and the United Church of Christ of Niles received special offerings to partially defray expenses.

Dr. Benedict is a native of Indiana. He attended MacMurray College and graduated from Indiana University. He has been in Buchanan five and a half years. The Benedicts have three children, Sarah, Susan and Gene, who are not accompanying their parents on the trip.

Park Board Adopts An Area Concept

At their last meeting the Buchanan Park and Recreation Board had rejected a proposal to change its name to Buchanan Area Recreation Council. This was the name used in the application for funds from the State Department of Natural Resources. The funds, some \$22,000, were approved by that body, and were to be used for the "Magic Square" for tennis, volleyball and basketball. The Park Board had already accepted a bid for the construction of the square.

It was learned that the area concept for recreation was still important to the body allocating the funds. A special meeting of the Park Board was called Monday to reconsider the

proposal. After a great deal of discussion, it was decided to pass a resolution whereby the Board would assume responsibility and authority for area recreation. They did not agree to a change of name, but apparently their recognition of the area concept as opposed to being limited merely to the park and recreation of Buchanan, will be satisfactory to the body which is releasing the funds.

At the last Buchanan City Commission meeting it was indicated that a re-examination of the whole ordinance having to do with the Park Board would be undertaken.

School Board Is Still Worrying Over The Overcrowded Classrooms

The Buchanan Board of Education took their traveling road show to Moccasin School where they conducted their monthly meeting before parents and teachers. Questions were asked about plans for high school. It was wondered if the Board, realizing that a new building is not a possibility at this time, were considering a split school session next year. The Board

said that it was studying all kinds of alternatives to relieve the crowded conditions, but they had come to no final decision. At the end of the meeting, Superintendent Richard Dougherty showed a film strip about the 4715 Continuous School Plan whereby the school population would be divided in four parts. Each part would go to school 45 days and then have a 15 day vacation in this way only three-fourths of the students would be in school at any one time. Dougherty listed some of the advantages as well as many disadvantages to such a plan for Buchanan.

For the annual school election on Monday, June 12 it was announced that the school would ask for a renewal of what they have had for the past two years of millage of 16 1/2 for the school operation. It is still not known what state aid will be received and the County Tax Allocation Board won't meet until Thursday for the first time, so it is difficult to determine what help will be received from there. There will be four candidates for two seats on the Board of Education.

Although it is my preference to talk personally with people who have questions, I think last week's letter to the editor expresses a common misconception — one that was publicly answered last year in the Berrien County Record I repeat.

During the time of teacher shortage in Michigan, we did, as did most schools, recruit out Michigan universities plus one outside source. Since I had contacts in South Dakota, we did concentrate our effort there. The situation has changed drastically within the last two years. We did not recruit outside out State this year, with the exception of Indiana University in South Bend, nor do we intend to do so. It is no longer necessary.

When a vacancy occurs we notify the teacher placement offices of 20 colleges and universities. We accept applications from all qualified candidates. Our sole purpose is to select the best teachers that we can attract to teach in the Buchanan school system.

For your interest, the following statistics might be helpful, keeping in mind that some very good local residents choose to go to out of state schools for their education.

 The Berrien County Unit of the American Cancer Society is not a United Fund affiliate because it believes that cancer is a national problem, primarily of RESEARCH and EDUCATION. The Berrien County Cancer Service, Inc., the other cancer control group in Berrien County, is a United Fund affiliate. As I understand it, its main purpose is to provide a nursing service for the already afflicted

cancer patient in this area. This is an obvious and necessary need.

As a United Fund affiliate, the Berrien County Cancer Service, Inc. secures its funding every year from a very generous allocation from the local United Fund to support all of its activities. It does not solicit any funds at any time other than through the United Fund.

The American Cancer Society, on the other hand, is a national organization coordinating all its efforts to educate the nation's citizenry to recognize cancer's seven warning signals so that it can seek professional care before it is too late. This intensive and extensive education effort culminates in ACS's door-to-door Cancer Crusade in April of each year. The volunteer who calls at your door for a contribution is also expected to be able to answer your questions concerning cancer. Newspapers, magazines, radio, television, all cooperate on the national level. The spread of information by two million crusaders produces more dollars for research, increased funds, in turn, produce more knowledge and both save lives.

You can't do intensive and extensive cancer research on a local level. It has to be a coordinated national endeavor.



Modern agriculture depends on the rise of agricultural chemicals and drugs providing sufficient quantities of high quality food and fiber to meet this nation's needs.

The problems involved in the use of agricultural chemicals and drugs as they relate to our environment have been clearly recognized by farmers. They have spoken out loud and clear for safe and sound use of farm chemicals and drugs. Agriculture has also promoted additional responsible research to determine specific dangers of farm chemicals and drugs on human life and the total environment.

Considerable progress has been made in reducing live stock and poultry diseases and parasites, but they continue to be a serious problem. Great strides have been made in controlling noxious weeds to increase productivity of crops. All through the use of farm chemicals and drugs.

Our government needs to cooperate with the governments of other countries in controlling live-stock and plant disease, in order to prevent them from spreading to our nation.

Many cities are heard for the complete ban of agricultural chemicals and drugs. This could have a serious effect on how we eat, dress and live.

The State Library collection numbers almost two million vol-umes. Nearly 60,000 of these re-late to Michigan past and present, another 40,000 pertain to family history research. These two collections make up the Michigan Unit.

State Troopers Help Motorists

The Michigan State Police Department, recognized as one of the finest in the nation, has steadily grown in the esteem and confidence of the public.

Present authorized enlisted strength, including detectives and others on special assignments, is more than 1800. The department throughout the state comprises 61 posts, eight district headquarters and the main headquarters at East Lansing.

Troopers last year as-sisted 63,500 motorists and issued 437,000 verbal warnings to driver's. Officers made 265,000 inspections of property and 29,000 of liquor establishments. This also marked the fourth year of the department's vehicle inspection program.

State police recruits undergo an intensive course of instruction at the department's own East Lansing training school. Through both classroom work and physical training, the recruit studies criminal law and procedure, methods of investi-gating and reporting com-plaints, first aid, self-defense, ballistics, fingerprint identifica-tion and riot control. The cur-riculum also includes state gov-ernment, typing, state geogra-phy, civil government, trans-portion and highway systems, instruction on the pistol range and scientific crime detection.

Director of the state police is Col. John R. Platts, himself a trooper who rose from the ranks to the top position in the organization.




After the initial shock and grief of the loss of a loved one by accident becomes less poignant it is supplanted, in part, by a feeling of resentment toward the person whose carelessness, recklessness, negligence, crime, etc., caused the death of a family member. This unjust deprivation of the companionship of a loved one need no longer go unredressed.

Michigan has had a "Wrongful Death" legal action since 1961. The law passed that year gave the surviving spouse or next of kin the legal right to recover the pecuniary loss en-dured because of the wrongful demise of the relative.

The 1971 Legislative act has amended and improved this law. Now, those losing a near and dear one because of some-one's wrongful behavior, be it criminal or "plain carelessness," are not limited to recovering only the medical, hospital, fun-eral, burial expenses, and loss of support, but may receive re-imbursement from the tort-feasor for "the loss of society and companionship of the de-ceased."

The amended act, however, retains the reimbursement pro-vision for pain and suffering the deceased endured from the time of injury to the time of death.





Garden Notes

FROM ENCHANTED ACRES

Another weekend jaunt is over. It was a quick, short vacation. I have learned that one way to stop working overtime is simply to get completely away from home for a few days. We returned, counting our blessings and feeling very grateful for the bounties we have.

Since the first of April, I have continually heard complaints about the weather, the chilly days, the rain and the fact that spring is going to be late this year. I never bother to check weather forecasts or planting instructions from the Farmers' Almanac, altho one hangs in our kitchen. Neither do I put much credence in the local weather forecaster, most of them repeat what is passed on to them and by the time it is broadcast, changes have been made.

I date all seasons by the developing of tree buds and the changing of leaf coloring. Each spring I watch for the dogwood trees to be in full blossom in this zone by May 20th. Should you go south about 225 miles from us, you will find them in full bloom about April 20th. As I write this, on May 14th, our dogwood trees, both pink and white are in full blossom and most exceptional this spring. Yet there are a lot of people saying spring is late.

This weekend, we traveled north along the western side of Michigan following the lake. In that area about 225 miles north of Berrien County, the soil is as dry as the western dust bowl. They have had one rain since their last snowfall. We walked into the thick woods to look for mushrooms and even in there, under the layers of leaves, the soil was dry dust. There is very little work to be accomplished by the farmers under such conditions.

Look around you at the trees in flower, lush green or freshly plowed fields and home gardens already up and growing. In the 48 years I have lived in this area, never do I recall seeing the cherry orchards so beautiful, they are now after a row of white mounds. The pear trees are full of buds, some apple blossoms are starting to open. Fields of strawberries are already white with flowers in our section of the state.

This I call bounty. It's time to stop complaining and start giving thanks for all we have. We have so much and all because we had the cool days that allowed the buds to properly develop. We had the rain which created the required moisture so necessary for the spring growth.

The next complaint I can hear coming up. No help to pick the fruit this year. There are still thousands unemployed in this nation. Wouldn't it be nice if we could all get together at the right time? That is but a dream on my part and it can never be realized, for if it were, what then would we complain about?
