\$7,000 Fund Up For Vote Is For Building Site Berrien County Council of Churches through its education committee announced a conference for vacation school leaders to be held Tuesday, May 25, 7:30 p. m. in the Chamberlain Museum.

The proposed transfer of \$7,000 from the surplus-operating fund of Fractional District No. 1 to a special fund in anticipation of future building needs is actually for the purpose of securing a site in advance, according to Supt. H. C. Stark.

Stark stated that the selection of a site in advance would greatly simplify the problem of future building. It is quite usual to grapple with the problems of site selection and construction at the same time. In such cases it is quite usual to delay the beginning of construction for long, indefinite periods.

The \$7,000 is to be set aside as ample provision for financing the purchase of a site of suitable size and location and for suitable architectural plans. This procedure is now being followed by many cities, including practically all of the larger cities, in anticipation of program of government aid for public works following the war.

What is the matter with the Dewey ave. school? In the first place it is probably one of the oldest school buildings in south-western Michigan. It is in fact older than Buchanan as an incorporated town. It went into use in the fall of 1856. Its first principal was George M. Dewey.

Grandfather of the present governor of New York, Thomas E. Dewey, Dewey served in the building one year and then quit teaching and entered newspaper work, as the editor of one of the first Republican papers in Michigan, the Niles Enquirer.

The story of the Dewey ave. building is rather peculiar. In the early seventies the new school building, of which the present shop and furnace department at the high school is the remaining part, was completed, and the entire school population and equipment was moved out, lock stock and barrel, to the "new building."

For years after the Dewey avenue building was not used and was considered, according to older residents, outmoded. For some years it was leased as a private school - but that's another story which can be told later.

Aside from the fact that the building was erected 87 years ago, its facilities are not adequate for the present school population. Supt. Stark states that in his opinion the grounds do not afford enough space for playgrounds for the present student body attending. Consequently it is likely that a new site will be secured and the Dewey avenue school will then be disposed of.

Board Asks For Canning Sugar Applications

Mrs. Zupke, Local Ration Clerk, Reports That Applicants Must Turn in War Ration Book I Mrs. Henry Zupke, local ration board clerk began receiving applications for the 1943 quota of canning sugar at the city hall Monday, and will continue indefinitely. Foremost in the requirements is the turning in to her by each applicant of War Ration Book No. 1. Mrs. Zupke has been instructed by the Niles rationing office, which has jurisdiction here, that it is essential to send in this book, which will be returned. Since this book contains the sugar, coffee and shoe stamps, Mrs. Zupke states that some people are hesitant about letting go of it.

The application blanks which Mrs. Zupke sends to the Niles office, include the following information: 1. Number of copies of War Ration Book One enclosed. 2. Total number of quarts of finished fruit to be canned. 3. Amount of sugar to be used in making jams and jellies. Not over five pounds per person will be given for making jams and jellies, and sugar for fruit canning will be issued at the rate of one pound for each four quarts.

## S.W. Mich. Foremen Meet in Kalamazoo

Foremen from the entire southwestern portion of Michigan will meet in Kalamazoo for a day of conferences and exchange of ideas next Saturday. The meeting is in reality a war production conference, and with the meeting of a similar nature in Detroit in February takes the place of the usual annual foremen's conference in Ann Arbor.  
Sponsors of the event are the foremen's clubs of Kalamazoo, Battle Creek, Muskegon and Grand Rapids, the National Association of Foremen, and the extension department of the University of Michigan Transportation restrictions made it necessary to abandon the usual annual conference at Ann Arbor, but the success of the February meeting in Detroit made it seem advisable to hold a similar conference in the western part of the state.  
William B Tippy, president of the Foremen's club of Kalamazoo is in general charge of arrangements, with the vice president of the club, Delmore Moffett, general chairman of the local committee. All foremen, whether members of a foremen's club or not, are invited to attend.  
A registration fee will be asked, to cover cost of the luncheon and other incidental expenses. Registrations are being made with Dr Charles A Fisher, U. of M extension service director at Ann Arbor. Luncheon will be served in the school cafeteria and reservations for lunch will have to be limited to 800, the capacity of the cafeteria.  
Keynote of the conference will be given at the general assembly at 9 in the auditorium. The speaker will be Alfred P Haake, economist, consultant and lecturer, of Oak Park, Ill. Tippy will preside at the assembly and conference speakers will then be introduced.  
Two general conferences will be held during the luncheon hour, one being held for each of two groups while the other group is in the cafeteria. Harold S Woodley, acting area director for the Battle Creek-Kalamazoo area of the war manpower commission, his subject will be "How an Area Stabilization Plan Works". Presiding officers at these two gatherings will be Harry Kelley manager of industrial relations of the American Seating Company, Grand Rapids,

and H. J Post, Buchanan, president of the National Association of Foremen.  
Between the luncheon periods which will come at 11:30 and 12:30, a general assembly will be held at which Philip Annow, wage stabilization director of the regional war labor board at Detroit will speak on "What the So-called 'Wage Freeze' Really Means."  
Seven morning and eight afternoon conferences will be held covering a wide range of subjects, each with its leader and its presiding officers. In the morning the conference subject will be: "The foreman's place in plant safety, how to lead a group meeting with your men; supervising women workers; the organization of a foreman's club, the foreman's part in improving job methods, what should new employees know about their company? and using tests for employment, transfer and promotion in industry."  
In the afternoon the subjects will be: The use and interpretation of company policies, handling employees under existing labor conditions, election and development of prospective foremen, how to express yourself effectively, supervising women workers, the foreman's control of absenteeism, important factors in food human relations, and responsibility of foremen to top managements.

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
