

City To Hold Hearings On Widening W. Front

During the regular session Monday evening, May 24, the city commission took up definite discussion of a long-considered project, the further widening of West Front street from Moccasin avenue to the junction of West Front and Terre Coupe Road.

Reasons for the widening are plain. Front street is the main "arterial" avenue of traffic through Buchanan. It is desirable that, as far as possible, no conditions remain that will create obstacles to the smooth flow of traffic.

Two such problems exist in the stretch from Moccasin to Terre Coupe. The Swen Funeral Home is on this street, and at times large numbers of cars are parked on each side of the street. The same holds for the St. Paul's Lutheran church. When lines of cars park on both sides of the street, the passage of two traffic lines of cars involves some traffic hazards within the present street widths, both for traffic and for residents.

This was true in the case of the First Presbyterian church before the street was widened there. The widening of the street reduced hazards, expedited traffic, and the continuation of the widening westward will accomplish the same ends.

The present width of West Front street is 30 feet from back to back of curbs. The curb is six inches thick, so the net traffic space is 29 feet. The city has set three standard widths for the future development of its streets: Standard Residence, 29 feet; Sub-Arterial, 33 feet; Arterial, 37 feet. The present width of West Front is 30 feet, and the proposed width is 37 feet.

The city commission has set the night of June 14 for a public hearing, in order to obtain the thinking of property owners along the extent of street involved in the proposed widening. Notices will be sent out to all property owners affected, with an estimate of costs and other pertinent data. If the project is finally approved the work will probably be done in early fall.

Installation Of Sanitary Sewer
Installation of a sanitary sewer on Moravia street was declared a necessity by the city commission, following the receipt of a petition for such improvement signed by all of the property owners along the street. A special assessment had been set up on a three-payment basis. The estimated cost of the installation is \$98 per lot, plus \$30 for the installment of a lateral from the curb to the residence.

Open Fire Hydrant Raises Haves On Liberty Avenue
Residents along Liberty had considerable trouble from rust that had been stirred up in the street water main, because a resident at the south end of the street had opened a fire hydrant full force. This resulted in rousing a heavy sediment of rust in the water main, which required several hours of labor by city employees to correct.

The city manager issued a warning that any person tampering with the water system in any way without authorization was automatically subject to prosecution and heavy fine, if the city elected to enforce the regulations.

Seniors Embark On 4-Day Cruise Tuesday, June 1

It will be a great day at 10:30 a.m. in the morning of Tuesday, June 1, when the 1954 Senior class of Buchanan high school embarks on the Senior Cruise.

Shortly after 10:30 a.m. of June 1 the handsomely appointed Wolverine will stop at the pier at the Michigan Central depot here and 75 seniors and a badly outnumbered corps of three sponsors will walk the gang plank aboard the deluxe pride of the Michigan Central on the first leg of the cruise.

The Wolverine will cruise into Chicago and dock at the LaSalle street station at 12:20 p.m.—cast the anchor with a hearty "Heave ho!" and the seniors etc. will embark and sail across the city in a fleet of taxi cabs. They will then embark on the South American, a boat which is specially chartered for this cruise by a considerable number of senior classes.

The second leg of the cruise is to be from Chicago to Mackinac Island, where they will arrive at 1 p.m. on Wednesday, June 2, and will disembark for a 4½-hour stay. They will then board the boat and go through the Sault Ste. Marie canal, stopping in the city of Sault Ste. Marie for 2 hours on June 3. Their boat will then go to Detroit, where they will disembark at 10 a.m. June 4, and return by rail to Buchanan that same day. Special stops will be made in Buchanan both on the outgoing and incoming cruises.

She is survived by the husband, three daughters, Mrs. Robert Hamilton of Niles, Miss Jane Rizer, student at the University of Kentucky, Lexington, and Jackie, at home; one brother, Lowell O. Swen, and three grandchildren. Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Tuesday in the Swen Funeral Home, with the pastor, the Rev. Wesley Oldt, officiating. Burial was in Oak Ridge cemetery. Pallbearers were Frank Heezen, John Elbers, Lawrence Decker, Dean Swen, Arthur Anderson and Bert Bouws.

City Reviews Spec. Assessment Policies

At the regular May 24 meet the city commission launched on a review of special assessment policies, making the following decisions:

1. The city will assume the expense of street oiling, sealcoating and temporary surfacing, in accordance with funds available from the general tax levy.

2. Discussion of replacements of curb and gutter was taken up. The first installment of these improvements has been by special assessment on property owners. It was decided by the commission that where such curbs had lasted for a "reasonable life", to exceed 25 years, it would be difficult for the city to assume the cost of replacement from general tax receipts and get the work done within reasonable time. There are now about 15,000 feet of curb and gutter which have exceeded the 25-year duration named above.

Throughout this 18,000-foot extent there is now increasing deterioration, worse some places than others of course. The commission voted that where such installations had had a reasonable life, replacement should be paid for on the following basis: city 35%, property owners 65%.

The city assumes total costs of widening streets in residential districts where the original width was not less than 29 feet, that being considered the extent to which the residence owner can be fairly held liable.

The commission further concluded that in the financing and expediting of public improvements the city should, as far as possible, make it easy for the property owners who are getting improvements under the special assessment procedure, to the extent of spreading costs over several years.

The city attorney and the city manager were authorized to draw up an amendment to the special assessment ordinance to eliminate interest on unpaid assessments and furthermore to discount at the rate of 4% all payments made in advance of the date due. They were also authorized to change the ordinance by reducing to 50% the share of costs which must be paid prior to commencement of construction.

The commissioners further voted to increase the "revolving fund" from the present \$9,500 to \$15,000 to aid in financing special assessment districts.

Will Install Asphalt Tile In Y.C. Room

The Buchanan Youth Council recreation building on North Oak will close Saturday evening, May 29, after which the city-school recreation program will go out-of-doors for the summer.

As soon as the schools close, Sexton's Furniture will install complete floor coverage of asphalt tile in the recreation building. Sexton's were low bidders for the contract, offering materials at cost, plus cost of installation. The color of the tile will be brown, tintured with an orange-maroon.

The use of asphalt tile as a floor covering had been debated off and on for several years. The original cement floor of the building tends to disintegrate on the top surface, creating a concrete dust that fills the air when the use of the room is heaviest. This dust is irritating to the lungs, and until now the Youth Council Board has attempted to remedy it with painting. But experience has proven that paint coverage is worn through in a few weeks by the heavy floor play in the building. The past year the floor was painted twice at a total cost of \$200 and the problem remained unsolved.

It is believed that the floor tile covering will not be more expensive in the long run than the frequent paintings, and meanwhile the lung-irritating dust will be reduced while it does last.

The Buchanan Youth Council Board wishes to extend its thanks to the mothers who took over supervision Friday evenings to afford the supervisor one night per week off. 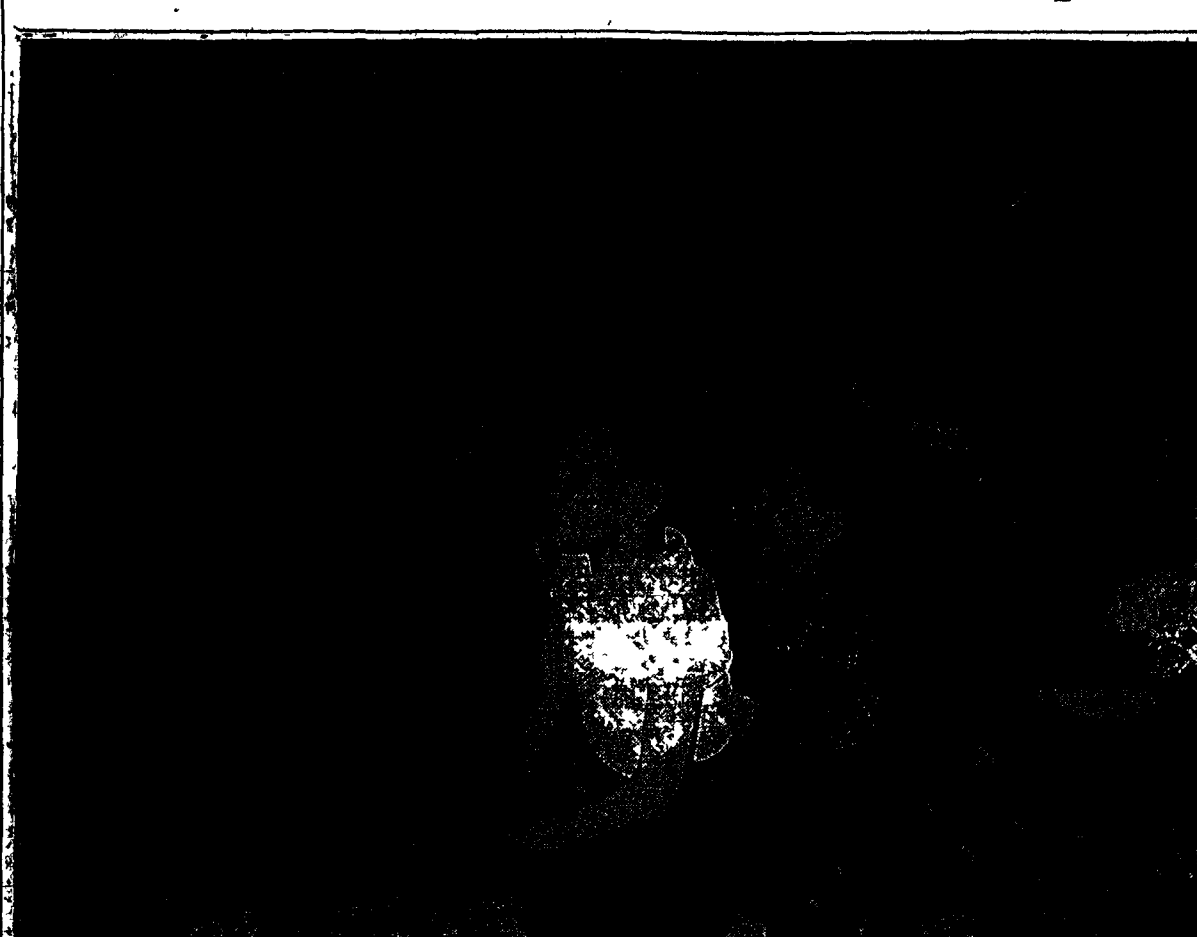

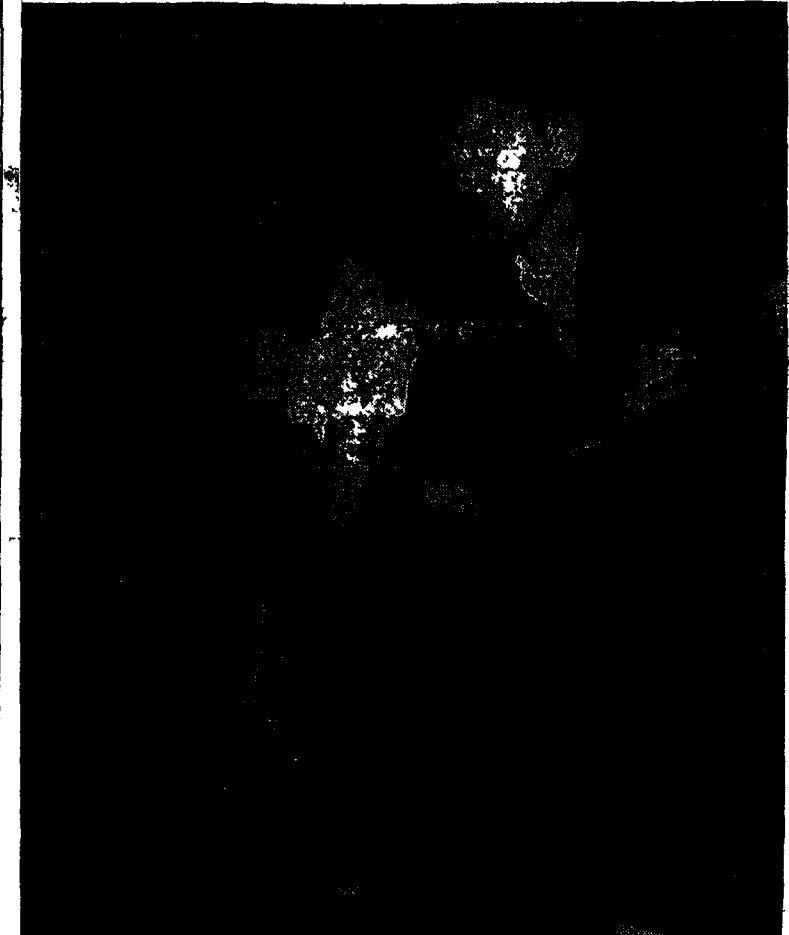
Commission Proceedings

Parade To Form On East Front

Organization Area On E. Front, Between Portage and Liberty Streets

The Buchanan community is due to have one of the finest Memorial Day Parades the town has seen since the days immediately following the Civil War, when the holiday was declared for memorial purposes and observed for that purpose.

Assuming (and heartily hoping) that the day will be warm and fair, the program lined up by Dean Swen, chairman, and Bill Baker, parade marshal, has been well done. They are entitled to a good response.

The parade will form on East Front street, between the Liberty street intersection at the east and the East Front and Portage traffic light. In between these limits all marchers are asked to gather promptly at 9:30 a.m. at the latest. Each one will go immediately to the placard displaying the number of his or her unit. These numbers originally ranged from 1 to 18. Eight of these units have dropped out, but the numbers of the units of those remaining in the parade cannot be changed, since they have already been assigned to the various units. This will explain two gaps in numbers, and the elimination of Nos. 17, and 18 at the end. Instructions by the marshal, William Baker, and the order of units in the parade are as follows:

"All units will be marching units with the exception of Spanish-American war veterans and Gold Star Mothers, who will be transported.
"Order of march as indicated below, units will assemble on markers bearing corresponding number as listed, each unit to send guide to parade marshal Bill Baker at assembly area at 9:30 a.m."

- (1) Buchanan High School band.
- (2) Jeep bearing Spanish-American war veteran.
- (3) American Legion Post No. 51 (colors and color guard, firing squad, main body).
- (4) Veterans of Foreign Wars Post No. 3102.
- (9) Gold Star Mothers.
- (10) G. A. R.
- (11) Junior Band.
- (12) Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts.
- (13) Girl Scouts.
- (14) National Guard personnel.
- (16) Bertrand Fire Department.

The parade will start across Portage street westward at 10:05 a.m. sharp. The route of march will be west on Front street to Terre Coupe, thence on Terre Coupe to the southern cemetery entrance.

The speaker for the day is Ray E. Conlon, Past Commander of the Michigan American Legion. Before the outbreak of World War I he had been active in the National Guard. At the outbreak of World War I he was commissioned a captain at Ft. Sheridan, Ill. He served as commanding officer of Co. B, 337th Infantry, during the war.

Mr. Conlon held many offices in state and national American Legion fields. At the present time he is field officer of the Department of Michigan, a post he has held during the last 11 years.

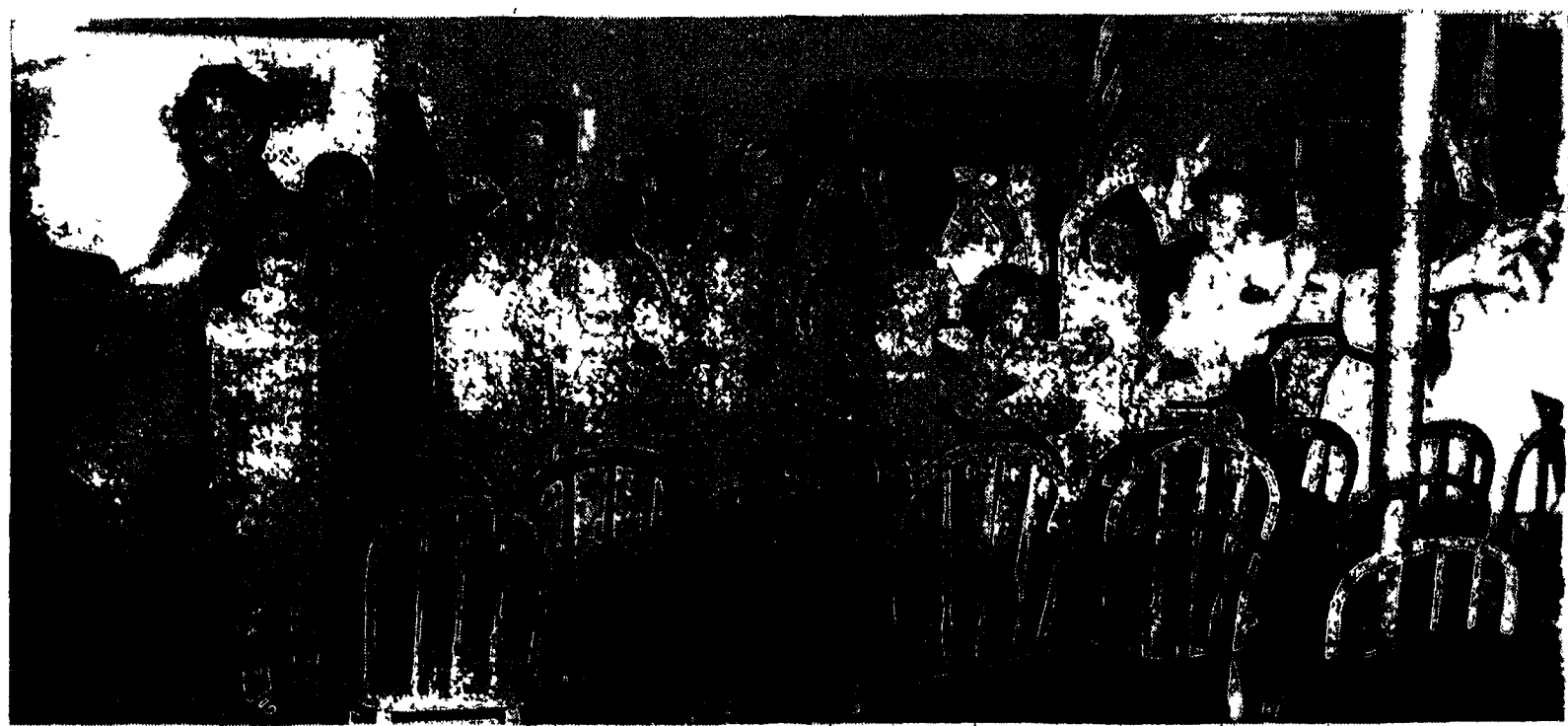
He will address the Buchanan audience at the Legion Circle in accordance with his selected theme, "Memorial Day and What It Means To America."

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Commission Proceedings

Comm. Deming.
WHEREAS, This Commission has set this date May 24, 1954, for a public hearing and such hearing having been duly advertised, and
WHEREAS, this Commission deems it necessary to construct a Sanitary sewer on Moravia Street from River Street north a distance of 986 feet, pursuant to the provisions of Ordinance No. 97, and
WHEREAS, a preliminary estimate of approximately \$98.00 per lot, for the main sewer only has been prepared by the City Manager.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the proposed improvement is necessary, desirable and in the public interest, and
BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City at large will pay 10% of the total estimate. All other cost of construction to be assessed on a Special Assessment Roll against Lots 34 through 54 in 18 Strikers Addition to the City of Buchanan.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City Manager be instructed to prepare plans, specifications and final estimate of cost and that the City Assessor be instructed to prepare an Assessment Roll, based on the final estimate of costs on a three payment basis.

Resolution was adopted by the following vote on roll call, Yea, Derfingier, Anderson, Hagley, Deming and Smith Nay None.

Roscoe Jesse and Joe R. Daniel were present and complained about Fifth Street from Michigan Street to Moravia Street. While the street is a dedicated street, it has never been opened for traffic and they requested that the street be vacated.

Moved by Comm. Smith, seconded by Comm. Derfingier, that the matter of vacating E Fifth Street between Michigan Street and Moravia Street, be referred to the Planning Commission for recommendation.

Motion carried on roll call.

A letter from the Liquor Control Commission stating that George Haag had requested permission to add the name of his wife Mildred Haag on his 1954 Tavern and S.D.M. licenses was presented.

Moved by Comm. Smith, seconded by Comm. Deming, that the City Commission has no objection to adding the name Mildred Haag to the George Haag Tavern and S.D.M. licenses.

Motion carried on roll call.

The Manager called the attention of the Commission to the water and sewer utilities which were abandoned by the P.H.A. at the time the Trailer Camp and Dormitories abandoned, and that part of the sewer was on private property and that it was impossible to maintain the sewer on private property.

The Manager advised that the same problem would again arise when the Housing project is abandoned and recommended that all utilities coming into our system over private property be plugged when the Housing project is vacated.

755
The request of an individual to build a curb or low wall across the front of his property in the public right of way was discussed. The Commission felt that as a policy individuals should not be permitted to build curbs in front of their homes for several reasons, namely the putting in of a curb would tend to increase the storm water run off, the curb would not be constructed to fit in with final street plans and an individual putting in a curb would then oppose an assessment district for curb, gutter and drainage for the entire street.

The Commission felt that the individual should work toward getting curb and gutter on the entire street.
In reviewing the assessment policies of the City the City Commission made the following policy decisions.
1 That the City would do all oiling, seal coating and street surfacing at City expense and only in accordance with funds available from general tax funds.
2 That whereas the life of concrete curb and gutter should be at least 25 years a property owner should expect this amount of service from curb and gutter. Where curb and gutter has been in more than 25 years and the value of the installation has been realized and replacement becomes necessary due to deterioration then the cost of replacement shall be assessed with the city accepting 35% of the cost of replacement and the property owner paying 65% on an assessment basis.

Moved by Comm. Hagley, seconded by Comm. Deming, that the above recommendations be adopted.

Motion carried by the following vote on roll call, Yea, Derfingier, Anderson, Hagley and Deming, Nay Smith.

After reviewing our assessment procedure and discussing the matter at some length, it was moved by Comm. Hagley, seconded by Comm. Smith, that the City Attorney and Manager be authorized to draft an amendment to Ordinance No. 97, eliminating interest on the unpaid portion of special assessments and providing instead for a discount of 4% to those who pay their assessments in advance of the due date.

This change was also to include a provision that the City reduce the property owners share that must be in prior to construction from 75% to 50% and that the City reserve the right to schedule construction sooner if it fits in with the program and finances available for public improvement.

Motion carried on roll call.

Peter Cauffman Dies At Hartford

Peter Cauffman, age 60, a resident of Buchanan for a number of years, died in his home at Hartford, Mich., Wednesday, May 26, following a heart attack.
He was born in Three Oaks on Aug. 8, 1894, the son of John and Carrie Cauffman. He married Lola Roberts of Dowagiac in 1917. They lived here for some time before moving to Hartford 25 years ago. Their only child, Robert, was killed in an accident while he and a companion were playing with a gun.

Besides his wife he leaves two brothers, Ross and Benjamin Cauffman, Buchanan, and two sisters, Mrs. Ethel Frichard, Danville, Ind., and Mrs. Laura Peterson, Tampa, Fla. He was a veteran of World War I and a member of the Hartford post of Vet-

erans of Foreign Wars.

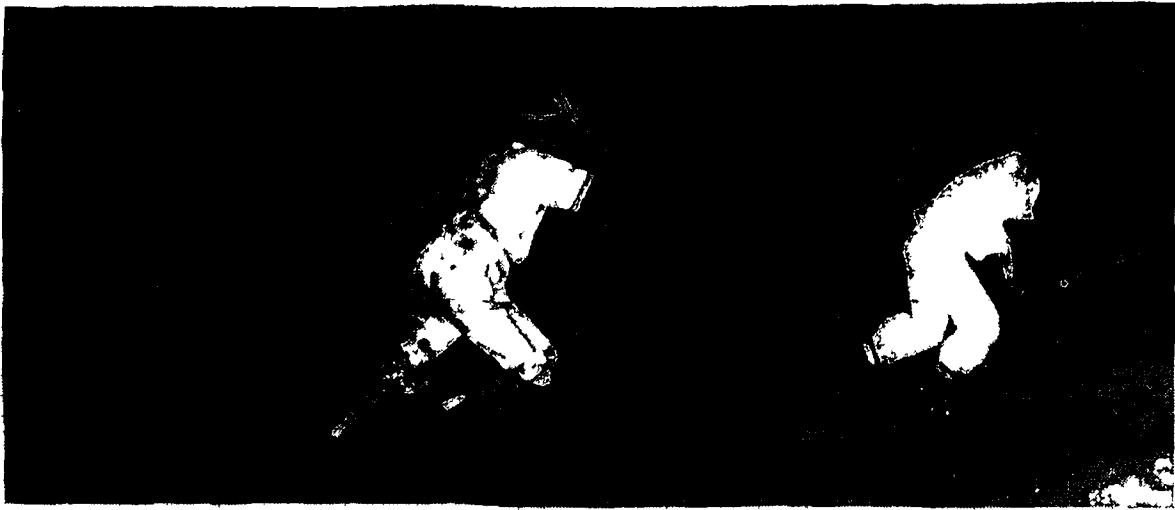

South Berrien Dairy Herds Lead In County Tests

The South Berrien Dairy Herd Improvement Association nosed out the North Association in production as the average production of the South Association was 35.6 pounds of butterfat while that of the North Association was 35.3 pounds. The Central Association had an average production of 31.4 pounds during the month of April.

Practically all the dairymen were not turning out at all as the spring was backward and the pasture was slow in starting. In the South Association there were 105 cows that each produced more than 50 pounds of butterfat. In the North there were 84 and in the Central there were 58 cows that produced over this amount.

High cows in each age-class, according to butterfat basis, were as follows (South Association):

Under 3 years: Lewis Prentner's registered holstein, "No. 11" with 1,050 lb. of milk and 76 lb. of butterfat.

Under 4 years: Larry Donner's grade holstein, "Betsy" with 1,500 lb. of milk and 65 lb. of butterfat.

Under 5 years: Roy Payne's registered holstein, "Glady's" with 2,540 lb. of milk and 86 lb. of butterfat.

Over 5 years: Edward Healey's

registered guernsey, "Kate", with 1,850 lb. of milk and 104 lb. of butterfat.

High herds, according to herd size, were as follows in South Association:

Small herd: Russell Wright's herd of 8 registered and grade guernseys with 548.8 lb. of milk and 40.38 lb. of butterfat.

Medium herd: Lewis Prentner's herd of 17 registered holsteins with 1,052.6 of milk and 46.33 lb of butterfat.

Large herd: Roy Payne's herd of 24 registered and grade holsteins with 1,367.3 lb of milk and 49.03 lb of butterfat.

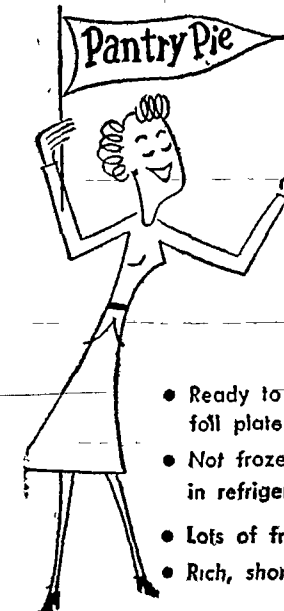

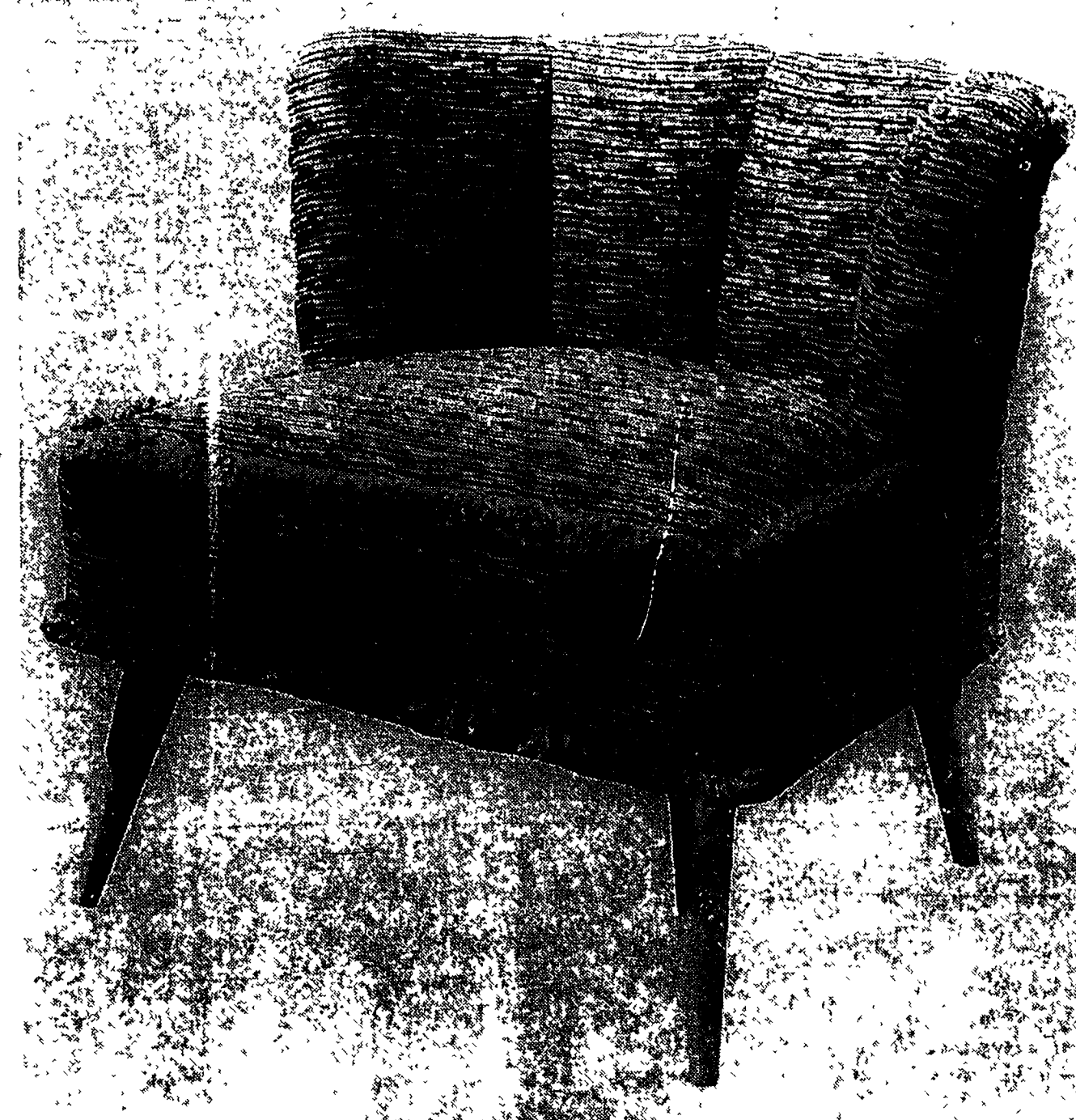

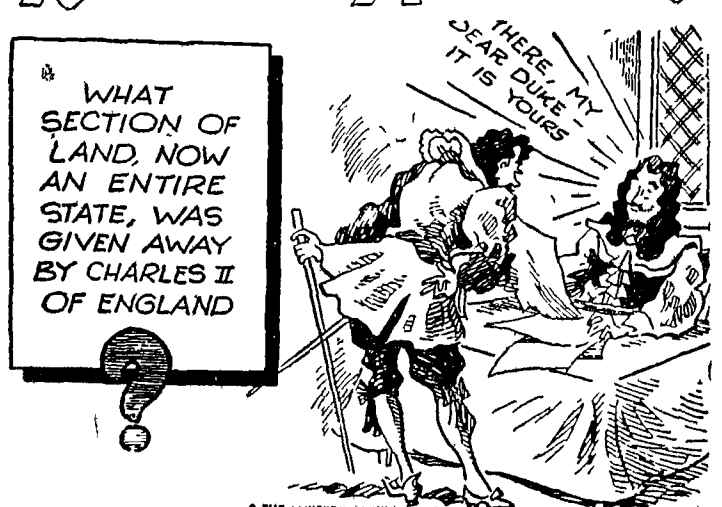

Heyday Of The Wagonmakers

The start of wagon-making by Jacob Luther previous to 1845 in

the old Main and Dewey building (then Main and Second) has been related earlier in this series. It was not until after the Civil War that the wagon wheels really started rolling out in a large way. First of the larger wagonmakers were Elijah H. Beardsley and son, David E. Beardsley, who bought

the then-existing plant from William Miller & Brother in January of 1865, three months before the end of the Civil War. The elder Beardsley had recently moved from Ohio to Elkhart, Ind., where he got wind in some way that the Miller shop was for sale. The letter he wrote to his son, given in part below, presents a picture of old Buchanan.

Elkhart, Indiana
January 19, 1865

Dear Son:
I drove to Buchanan Tuesday in a two-horse cutter. I found there a village of from 1,200 to 1,500 inhabitants, five churches, a large schoolhouse (present Dewey Avenue school), a large grist mill with a 13-ft. fall, two steam sawmills, two steam stone cutters, two steam turning (wood turning) establishments, two cabinet shops, a number of cooper shops, two wagon shops with three hands in each.

One of the shops is for sale, situated one square from the center of business. The shop is 20 feet wide, 33 feet long, two stories high. To make it look right needs some repairing. He wants \$800 for it, \$400 down, balance in two years.

Prices for fitting wheels are \$16 per set, \$3 for axle, putting on thimbles or tongues \$2. He has 1,000 good seasoned spokes of hickory at \$120 per thousand. There is any quantity of timber in the country, 19 sawmills in convenient range, and a rich country around.

The railroad is one-half mile away and the St. Joseph river on the other side. Houses rent at \$5 to \$10 a month and are hard to get. I can get a house and lot 4x10 rods, 2 square rooms, 2 bedrooms, eastern and well in pretty good condition for \$800, \$500 down, balance on time.

If the deal strikes you favorably... write immediately and I will secure it.

Yours affectionately,
E. H. Beardsley

The elder Beardsley bought both wagon plant and house, the latter being the present (1954) home of Mrs. George Cassler at 206 Moccasin Avenue. The son, David, came on from Dayton, O., and bought the house still owned by his daughter, Mrs. W. R. Tuttle, 111 Moccasin. In 1866, the father sold his interest in the wagon plant and the firm name became

An advertisement of its products in the Berrien County Record of Dec. 30, 1869, reads as follows:

Drivers Can Check Survival Chances Over Week-End

If you want to see in advance what your chances are for escaping injury or death on crowded highways over the Memorial Day week-end, go over this check list prepared by Greyhound driver John Vogel, picture at right. He has a perfect safety record covering more than 28 years and nearly 2,000,000 miles of bus driving between Detroit and Toledo on US-24, one of the nation's most dangerous highways. The fatality rate is one death per year for every 1.26 miles of the 58-mile stretch. His check list is a clue to how he avoids accidents and how you, too, can drive safely this week-end:

✓ Any degree of intoxication can prove fatal to yourself and others.

✓ Car in top mechanical condition. Brakes, lights, horn, windshield wipers, turn signals properly adjusted. All windows clean. Mirrors and front seat properly adjusted. Be sure car has side-view mirror on drivers' side.

✓ Driver wide awake, in good physical condition and not under mental or emotional stress.

✓ Keep in mind that a car traveling 65 m.p.h. cannot be stopped on clean, dry concrete in less than 323.4 feet, which is about the length of a football field, therefore allow plenty of space behind the car you follow.

✓ Always signal your intentions correctly and well in advance of executing the maneuver.

✓ Passing precautions are vital. Never pass at intersections, on hills or curves, four-lane or at any other time where you might set up a "squeeze-play".

✓ Dim high beam lights for oncoming traffic.

✓ When stopped by traffic light at "Y" intersections, stay well back of light so your car does not put out into fast-moving traffic. Be extremely alert for cars stopped in center lanes of busy highways to make left turns. Also be alert for slowly moving farm tractors and other highway obstructions.

✓ Always drive defensively. Allow for other drivers' lack of knowledge, skill or good judgment. Recognize that you have no control over the unpredictable actions of other drivers and pedestrians, nor over road, weather and traffic conditions. Consequently, you must develop a defense against all of these hazards. Concede your right-of-way and make other concessions when necessary to avoid collisions. Be careful to commit no driving errors yourself and be defensively alert to avoid the accident traps and hazards created by weather, roads, pedestrians and other drivers.

Drivers who follow these rules, Vogel contends, can look forward to a long life of motoring pleasure. Failure to observe any one of them can be fatal. Based on your own driving practices, how do your chances stack up?

Refrigerators May Be Death Traps For Kids

How to let air in or keep children out of discarded iceboxes is the subject of a recent publication by the National Safety Council. A stepped-up information campaign is underway to warn parents of the greater danger during the summer months. Citing an unofficial count of 79 child deaths in the last five years, the Council details several methods for preventing suffocation in iceboxes, refrigerators and other airtight cabinets.

A worn-out refrigerator should be disposed of to a junk dealer, but if that can't be done immediately, then:

1. Remove the door. This is the safest way, since a chest especially may have a door or lid so heavy that a child could not open it even if unlatched.

2. Remove the latch stop. This usually can be done easily by removing the screws from the plate.

3. Drill rows of holes in the cabinet sides and pry off the rubber gasket around the door. These methods, used together, will reduce the danger of suffocation in a refrigerator kept in use as a storage cabinet.

If refrigerators are temporarily out of use while the owners wait to move them to another location, sell them, or pass them on to relatives, then:

1. Remove the latch stop, which can be easily replaced.

2. Turn the box with the door against the wall. Most boxes are too heavy for children to move.

3. Bind the door shut with wire or stout rope.

4. Padlock the door when the handle is so constructed.

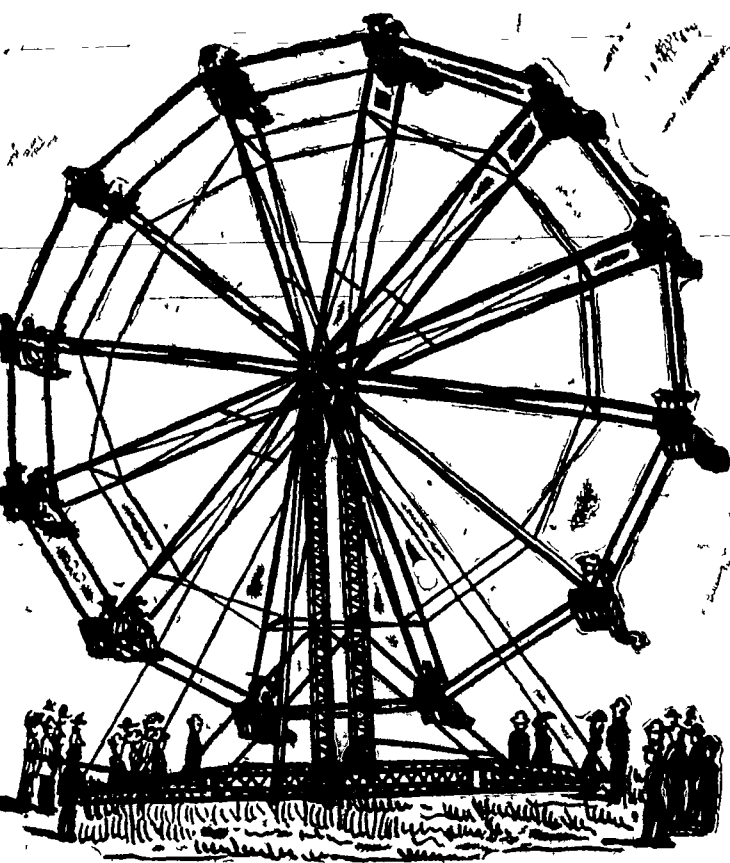

An article in the old Chicago Times dated Oct. 24, 1883, had the following to say, in its account of the Illinois State Fair: "The finest display of wagons on the fairgrounds will be found in a large tent inside the circle of the race track. These wagons are manufactured by the Rough Brothers Wagon Works of Buchanan, Mich. There are six wagons on exhibit. One is a common stock wagon, one with

dark wine-colored body and straw-colored gearings, elegantly decorated, another two bodies are of white walnut, oiled and polished, revealing the beauty of the texture and grain. The sides of one are beautifully and richly decorated in Japanese designs in gold, ivory and color, executed by hand and displaying exceedingly fine taste and artistic skill.

The hubs are of Pennsylvania black birch. The spokes and felloes are of Indiana oak. The axle-trees are of hickory."

Other and more technical description, hardly understood these later days, is omitted. It was apparent, however, that the local supply of timber was running out, and the Buchanan industry was importing materials. This meant the end. When local timber supplies were exhausted wooden manufacturing inevitably transferred to main crossroads of transportation, as Grand Rapids or Detroit, or even Niles or St. Joseph, with more immediate access to raw materials.

So, in the late 1880s the Wooden Age of Buchanan was dwindling to a close. When this writer came to Buchanan in 1923 the story was common that the Buchanan wagon factory went out of business because it had used improperly seasoned timber for a year's output, which was marketed in Kansas and Nebraska, where the dry winds soon shrunk the lumber and the wagons rattled to pieces. This might have been true, but the industry was on its way out anyway.

In the next chapter growth of the furniture industry will be described.

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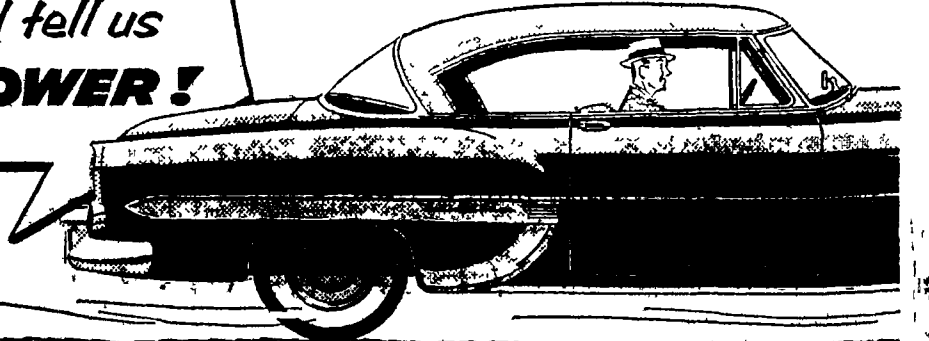

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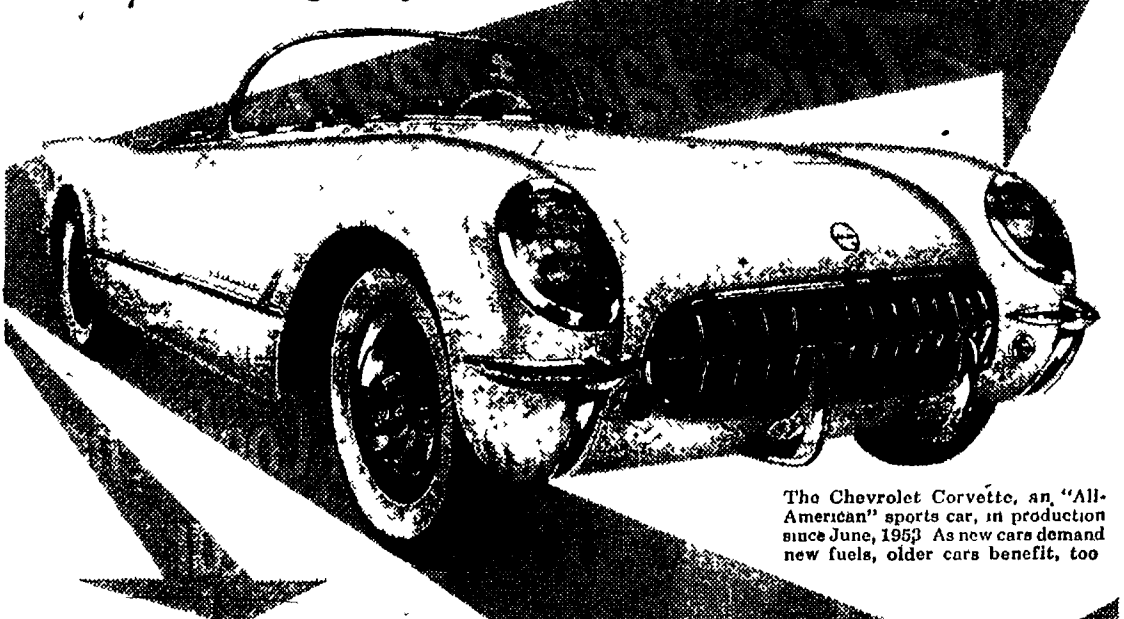

Heart Disease Is Main Killer

Heart disease still outranks all other killers of Michigan people, Dr. Albert E. Heustis, state health commissioner, announced recently in reporting Michigan's 10 leading causes of death for 1953.

Heart disease claimed the lives of 1 out of every 3 people who died in 1953. Diseases of the heart caused 22,425 of Michigan's 62,087 deaths last year.

Cancer was in second place but caused less than half as many deaths as heart disease. One out of every 6 died of cancer. Blood vessel injuries or degeneration affecting the central nervous system (largely apoplexy) ranked third in the causes of death. Accidents were in fourth place.

These four causes accounted for 7 out of every 10 deaths in Michigan last year.

Meet Your Merchant



In this current edition of "Meet Your Merchant," the Record presents Mr. Harry Kennedy, who is pictured standing on the thirteenth side of one of the current editions of his merchandise, an entrancing 1954 Pontiac convertible.

This isn't exactly the sort of merchandise you balance in one hand as you explain its merits to make its merits plain, you have to coax the prospect to get in it and take a ride. And when he gets out of this car, after a ride, he is no longer a mere "prospect," he is a customer.

This is part of the business, but it is more pleasure and also more profitable than Harry's first love, which was cutting circles in the St. Joseph river with a motor boat. It's even more fun than Harry's 1944-45 job of peddling block-busters to Herr Hitler, during some 35 missions over Germany.

The selling of cars is in fact the achievement of an ambition for Kennedy. It usually takes some careful planning and some determined procedure to do the thing you want to do in life. But in the above picture you see a man whose dream came true.

Harry came to Buchanan from his native Dowagiac in 1937 to accept a job as office manager for the Montague Motor company, then the Ford agency in Buchanan. He stayed on that job until 1941. And as he toted up the finances daily, the money in, the money out, the resulting net, he used to think that he'd be very glad to trade his salary for that net, and that sometime he was going to do just that.

But it would take time and money. So as an intermediate and more easily accomplished business he rented an upstairs room in a local business building and "hung out his shingle" advertising an accounting service. That was, at least, escaping the straight jacket of the salary. This business prospered. In two years he had a nice string of customers from points over the Michiana region.

But in the meantime this business, previously referred to, of doing a little accounting for Mr. Hitler, became pressing. So one day Harry turned his books, adding machine and clients to his faithful employees and went to the wars. That was in May, 1943. He received a commission as first lieutenant and was assigned the post of navigator on a B-17 with a regular route as a distributor of trouble over Germany.

In December of 1945, with that job well done and over with, Harry was released to return to Buchanan and the more peaceful type of accounting service. In the meantime Don Harger had been made a partner in 1944. Business as usual—but growing—went on for seven more years.

Then it happened. An automobile sales franchise became available a few doors away in the same block. He made his bid and as a result in December of 1952 he became an auto dealer in his own right. He rented the north side of the DiGiacomo building at Main and Dewey, remodeled and remade a front section into an attractive office and display room. During the year following Kennedy and his force broke all records for the sale of Buicks and Pontiacs in this area. He has also rounded out his business with a service shop and a body shop, with a total personnel of 18 in shop and office.

Of course Harry had more to come back to than an accounting

business' at the end of the war. He had married Louise Howe, daughter of a very well-known Buchanan family, in 1939. They have a pleasant suburban home at 609 Rynearson street, a son, aged 7, named Jerry, and a daughter, aged 6, named Patricia. Also an automobile franchise, aged 18 months, named Buick-Pontiac.

That, taken all together, should make life just about complete for Harry Kennedy.

USO Entertains 1,000,000 Yanks In Arms Overseas

USO is giving number one priority to the more than one million Americans in the armed forces overseas, according to an announcement made recently.

Moving in advance of the Sixth Fleet in the Mediterranean area, USO mobilizes Americans and local residents in Istanbul, Salonika, Athens, Rhodes, Naples and the ports of southern France to welcome sailors and marines on shore leave. When the ships drop anchor, their crews find transportation to churches and synagogues, sports events, social activities and tours of the historic cities and countryside arranged for them. Canteens and other

typical USO services are at their disposal.

Good relations in foreign countries are being cemented by these American GIs. In a letter to USO, John B. Holt, American Consul General in Greece, said, "I should like to commend the excellent and important achievement of USO in Salonika. It is not only the recreation for the enjoyment of the men that is important but also the contribution to good relations between the visiting thousands of sailors and the Greek population."

USO services regularly extended to the Sixth Fleet are now requested by military leaders for servicemen returning home from Korea by way of the Suez Canal. More than 1,600 returning Korean veterans enjoyed USO services when their ship docked in Athens early in March.

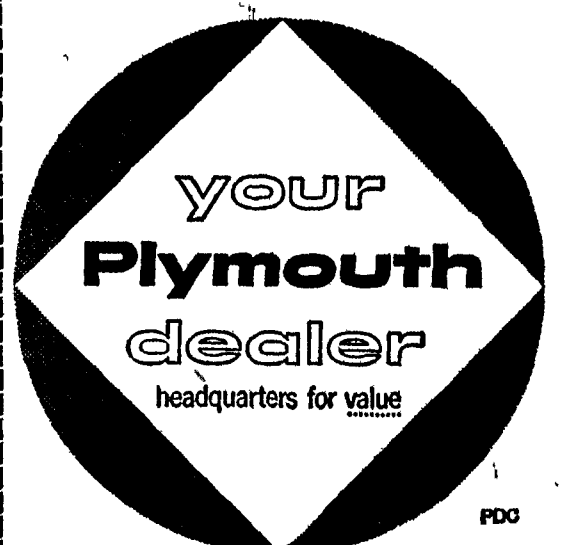

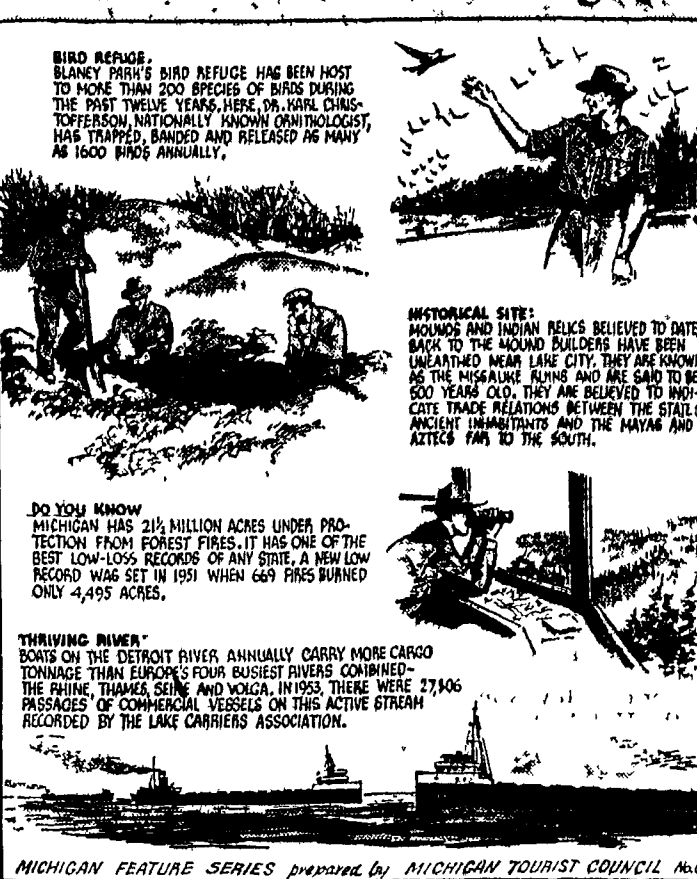

Chicago TV Antenna Will Be 747 Feet High

WVNBQ will become the first Chicago television station to operate at its maximum authorized power when early next month a boosted channel 5 signal is transmitted from a new antenna which will be the highest structure in the city of Chicago.

The new antenna will stretch 191 feet above the ridge of the Kemper building roof. Its 35 tons of steel will be supported by a massive 5-ton structure erected under the roof at the north end of the 45th floor.

With its flashing aircraft warning beacon 747 feet above the streets of the Loop, the new antenna will top by 35 feet the crest of the statue Ceres, the lady who graces the top of the Board of Trade building and presently the tallest point in Chicago.

Co. Agent Tells Best Way Of Washing Eggs

If you have to wash eggs that you market, do the job right if you want to market the best quality product, suggests J. P.

Hoeckema, Berrien county agricultural agent. He passes along these suggestions from L. E. Dayson, a poultry marketing specialist at Michigan State College.

Wash only dirty eggs. Otherwise you may spread bacteria to the clean eggs and they're more apt to spoil than if they were not sorted and washed.

Wash eggs soon after they are laid; maintain water warmer than the eggs—about 100° F.; use a detergent-sanitizer according to the manufacturer's directions; change water every day, or after every 7 baskets, keep machine and equipment clean, dry eggs immediately after washing, use a fan; cool eggs in cool and dry fillers and flats, market eggs often.

Other details on how to do the egg washing job are contained in the new Michigan State Extension Bulletin 322, "More Money for Clean Eggs." It's available at the county extension office or by writing the bulletin office, Michigan State College, East Lansing.

Dental Health

(Following is one of a series of articles on "Your Dental Health" presented by the Berrien County Record in co-operation with the Tri-County Dental Society.)

It's elbow grease that cleans teeth — not toothpastes.

The elbow grease must be applied to the toothbrush, still the best weapon in oral hygiene. Despite lavish therapeutic claims made for various toothpastes and powders, there has been none recognized by the American Dental Association's Council on Dental Therapeutics.

"There is still no green miracle or white miracle or red miracle toothpaste that will magically prevent dental caries (tooth decay) or eradicate gingival (gum) disease," say A.D.A. officials.

An editorial in The Journal of the American Dental Association has pointed out that the "increasingly exaggerated" claims for toothpastes and powders are producing growing concern among the dental profession.

"Many of these superclaims are on the same low level as those made for discredited cancer cures and arthritis remedies," the editorial says.

Like dentifrices, mouthwashes have little, if any, therapeutic effect, dentists say. While it is wise to rinse the mouth after brushing to flush out any remaining debris, the least expensive and most available wash is water.

Scanty Rains Of May Cause Surface Drouth

As of Monday morning, when this was written, none of Berrien county's crop regions had enjoyed as much as an inch rainfall during the entire month of May. Clifton Conrad reported 2 of an inch this far into May in the Benton Harbor region.

As a result of the heavy rains of April which filled the lower reservoirs of soil which had been depleted as far as six to ten feet down, the winter wheat made some really spectacular gains. From a thin stand in early winter, the plants stood out heavily until many fields were well matted.

But the very heaviness of the stand has drained May's scanty moisture contributions as far as six inches down, according to one farmer. This farmer says that he will have the start of a good wheat crop if we get a good rain this week. This also goes for the strawberry crops that escaped the frost.

The approximately 70% of corn which was planted last week will need moisture to bring it out of the ground, and in many fields the seed will be unsprouted in the ground until rain comes. Stated Robert Koenigshof, Buchanan Co-ops manager, the first cutting hay got off to an excellent start but the crop will be retarded unless rain arrives this week. This also goes for wheat and oats and pastures. The warm weather that set in Sunday will probably kill some midwest wheat plants, and will also starve the soil that will give it better color.

Robinson Strawberries

The Robinson variety of strawberries were in full bloom when the frost hit in the Baroda, Berrien Springs and Eau Claire area Wednesday last week. The fruit growers had for the most part confidence that there was no longer danger of frost and were caught off guard. So the patches of Robinsons were an entire loss. Clifton Conrad, county fruit specialist, assessed the local strawberry loss to date at 50% in Berrien county. Temperatures of 24 and 26 above were general in the Berrien-Baroda-Eau Claire area.

The cold weather of late April and early May has very likely cut

Turkey Growers Warned Against Overproduction

Michigan families will be eating much cheaper turkey during the 1954 holiday season than last year if turkey raisers don't cut their production. That's the word from J. M. (Mac) Moore, extension poultryman at Michigan State College.

Moore cites figures compiled by the U. S. Department of Agriculture turkey industry committee which show about 10% more heavy breed turkeys than in 1953. This indicated crop, Moore points out, will be larger than the market can take at prices profitable to growers.

If feed prices stay where they are now, the USDA industry committee says, production costs will be up at least 3 cents a pound over last year — on a live weight basis. That's besides the expected increase in the crop which could cut off several more cents a pound. So the committee recommends that (1) growers market flocks of heavy breeds as soon as possible; (2) hatcherymen cut down on hatchings of heavy breed poults as quickly as they can and close their season as soon as practicable; (3) growers reduce production of late turkeys (heavies); (4) industry and USDA do everything they can to get people to eat more turkey.
