Veteran Organizations Arrange Memorial Program for Monday

Rev. W. Y. Pohly Is Selected For Address Of Day

Program To Be Held At American Legion Circle

Buchanan will have its best Memorial service in many years with both Veterans of Foreign Wars and American Legion organizations co-operating in a carefully planned program.

The service organizations emphasize that they are anxious to have all service men and women of past wars who are in the community out for the parade and service in uniform if possible.

The line of march will form at 8:30 a. m. Monday, which is the day officially designated by Governor Kim Sigler of Michigan as Memorial Day. The march will start at 10 sharp, west on Front street, then on Terre Coupe to the south entrance of Oak Ridge cemetery, thence to the American Legion Circle.

The various parts of the parade will march with a space of 15 paces between each. At the head will be two national colors with two color guards marching abreast, one from the American Legion and one from the Veterans of Foreign Wars. Following behind will be two post colors for each service organization, with accompanying color guards.

The subsequent order of march will be: Two rifle squads, Legion and VFW.

High School band, American veterans with Spanish American War service men and women.

Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts, Girl Scouts and Brownies.

Children.

Invocation by Rev. Hunt.

Address by Rev. Pohly.

Placing of wreaths on graves by representatives from Legion Auxiliary, VFW Auxiliary, G. A. R., Mothers of World War I, and Mothers.

Raising of colors, with rendition of Star Spangled Banner.

Firing squad.

Flags will be placed on the graves of all veterans of all American wars on Saturday, May 29. The American Legion asks that anyone who notices a grave that is missed on the preceding Sunday, notify Lester McGowan so that the omission may be taken care of by the time of the service.

In the event of rain, the program will be held at the Buchanan high school.

Ada D. Sanders Gives Bequest of \$1,000 to Library

Atty. T. D. Childs Of Three Oaks Named Administrator

The Buchanan Public Library was named as a beneficiary in the will of the late Ada D. Sanders, filed Monday in the Probate court at St. Joseph. The library receives \$1,000 from the estate, valued at \$25,000. The will, found two weeks after her death, was dated March 11, 1948. Atty. Theron D. Childs of Three Oaks was named as administrator.

Preliminary directions provided for payment of sums to the Oak Ridge cemetery for perpetual care of the lot where she and her husband are buried and for the erection of a stone, ordered previous to her death. It also provided for perpetual care of the cemetery lot of Sam Rouse and for the lot where her mother is buried. Further provision was made for the erection of a stone at a cost not to exceed \$50 at the grave of her brother, Archie D. Dacy, Chicago, and for perpetual care of the lot where he is buried. Perpetual care was provided for the graves of her husband's parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Ephraim Sanders in Oak Ridge cemetery.

Smith, Niles, \$500; Barbara Parsons, Beverly Hills, Ill., \$500; Donna Lee Mathie, Buchanan, \$200; Salvation Army, Niles, \$500; Buchanan library, \$1,000. The will states that the residue of the estate shall be divided between Bruce and Thomas Marshall, cousins.

The bequest to the Salvation Army stated that the \$500 should be left to the Salvation Army of Buchanan unless there should be no official branch here, in which case the sum should be given to the Salvation Army post at Niles. The sums named are to be available when her real estate is sold, at such time as shall be most feasible in the judgment of her administrator.

Ross Reynolds, 93 Years Old Tuesday

Ross Reynolds, 109 South Detroit street, one of several nonagenarians in the city, was 93 years old Tuesday. The day was quietly observed, as Mr. Reynolds has been confined to his bed since last October. He has been gradually losing his eyesight for the last three years.

He was born near Hamilton, Ind., May 25, 1855, and was the son of Virgil and Nancy Crum Reynolds. In 1888, the family came to Michigan and Mr. Reynolds purchased a farm five miles north of Buchanan, which is known as the Oak Hill farm and still owned by the Reynolds family. They lived there for 47 years and after the death of their father in 1901, Ross and his brother Abe, operated the homestead until 1935, when they retired and moved to the home on Detroit street. Abe died in 1946 at the age of 87. Miss Mary E. Reynolds, retired school teacher, lives with her brother.

Tales of An Old Town An Attempt to Reproduce a Cross Section of The American Scene, As Witnessed Here Through the Past Century

A Letter Written By John G. Holmes, Pioneer Newspaper Man

The following letter was written by John G. Holmes, publisher of the Berrien County Record from 1875 to 1895, to be read at the meeting of the Chicago-Buchanan society in 1933. That was the last meeting of the society. It was sent to the Record by the last secretary, Mrs. W. R. Tuttle. The letter has been filed in the collection of pioneer articles in the Buchanan library.

Letter From John Holmes
In 1836, my folks lived in Claranton, N. Y., and father took a prospecting trip to locate a home. He traveled through Michigan by stage westward from Detroit, over what was then and is now known as the Chicago road. Along that road was a line of taverns about ten miles apart. One of these was the Cottage Hill tavern, southwest of Buchanan, and south of Bakertown. He and my father stopped but went on west through Linnos. He returned disgusted, reporting Illinois to be nothing but a worthless waste, not good enough to grow timber.

On his return he arranged with Joseph Jones, keeper of Cottage Hill tavern, to buy land for him. Two years later he moved onto the land that Jones bought for him, which was of much poorer quality than he might have had for the same price.

In coming west finally with his family, his route was through the Erie Canal to Buffalo, by the Great Lakes, Erie, Ontario and Michigan, to Chicago. From Chicago he reshipped across the lake by boat to St. Joseph and came up the river to Buchanan by keel boat. The only keel boat I ever saw was on the Chicago river. It was about 50 feet long, 20 feet wide and stood up out of the water about the same as a sailboat of the same dimensions on the deck there were runways along each side and along the middle. The motive power was a dozen or more men with poles which they stuck in the bottom of the stream, placed their shoulders against the top and traveled on all fours along the side catwalk and then back up the middle walk to the place or beginning. That sort of contraption was depended on to get the freight up the river as far as Elkhardt there were a couple of warehouses near the river at Buchanan for handling freight.

When our family arrived, there was a man named John Baker living in a house, the second south from the corners of Postage, River and Fourth streets. There father parked his family while he built some sort of shelter for the winter. Some of you may remember the Baker family, Abe and Hattie Baker Matthews.

The next spring there was a log house to be built. The neighbors all took hold and helped. It took two gangs to do this work. While one gang was rolling up the logs, the other gang was home having the ague. Next day that gang went to work and the other gang had the ague.

"The first visit of civilized men to the county was made by three Catholic priests from Quebec in 1669". Through the succeeding years up to and after 1800 the "civilized" men and those who came after them continued the work of dickerling the Indians out of their land. Rev. Isaac McCoy, the missionary, made the first opening in the wilderness of the St. Joseph valley when he established the Carey mission on Sec. 28 of Niles township, where he had secured a square mile of land three miles east from Buchanan in 1822. The first grist mill was established at the mission in 1825, operated by horse power.

Russell McCoy is credited with building the first house on which was afterward a part of Buchanan, in 1834. Hiram Wray occupied it with his family and Russell McCoy, being a single man, boarded with them. He said his property consisting of his claim, a cow and a half acre of potatoes, to Andrew C. Day, who lived there until he died in 1885. That claim extended from Front street to the railroad and west

from Postage street to the west line of the school grounds. The first recollection I have of being in a store in Buchanan was that of Ross & Sons, at the corner diagonally across from the National Bank. I went in with mother when she wanted to buy some hairpins. I had to stand on my toes to bring my eyes above the counter. What she thought emptied the box and Thomas Ross pushed the empty box to me. That box is still doing duty holding family tintypes.

That store was a frame building. The first brick business building in town was on what is now the National Bank corner, a three-story structure fronting Main street and running east to the east side of the Dodd Drug store. The ground floor was occupied by the store of Ross, Clark & Alexander, with offices on the second story and some sort of hall on the third.

In 1860 there was a cabinet shop built on the south side of the tail race to the Pears mill. It was run by an "overshot" water wheel, getting water from the head flume of the Pears mill, which was about twenty feet fall. One day (I think it was in October, 1861), the elements got active in that mill, and in a very short time all the wooden row on the south side of Front street from Main to Days avenue, all on the north side of Front street from Main to the creek and from Front street to Second street, were in smoke and ashes, including the Ross, Clark, and Alexander brick.

Previous to that there was a small one-story frame cottage on what is now the opera house corner, gable to the west and open on the Front street side, occupied as a bakery and restaurant by Mary Arthur, her oven being in the rear. The east half side of the lot had on it the Collins & Weaver hardware store.

Flames Destroy Barn, Sawmill at Weaver's Home
Buchanan Fire Department Makes Run; Works To Save House.

The Buchanan fire department went Tuesday morning to the farm of Noah Weaver, five miles northwest of Buchanan on the Wagner Road, where flames were ravaging the building housing the sawmill and barn.

Mr. Weaver had awakened about 5 a. m. to find the fire already breaking from the roof. Chief Ted Cramer, accompanied by Charles Wesner, Pete Miller and Carl Thanning made the run with the township truck. They found the building already almost destroyed and devoted their efforts to saving the house, about 60 feet from the barn. The fury of the flames was fed by a large amount of lumber which had been started by the mill. The fire started in the northwest corner of the barn, clear across the building from the mill motors, and winding. It is thought possible that the cause may have been spontaneous combustion in refuse piles.

The firemen hooked a 2 1/2 and 1 1/2 inch hose on the truck pump and pumped water over 500 feet from the creek running through the place. The Galien fire department also came, but soon left.

Lumber sufficient for the construction of two homes had been sawed and stored in the building, for homes for their two sons, one of whom was to be married soon. Electric motors, power tools and general sawmill equipment were destroyed. The loss was estimated to be from \$8,000 to \$10,000. Only the barn was covered by insurance.

Flags Should Be On Streets For Memorial Parade Monday Morning

Stores and offices in the business district and elsewhere in Buchanan will be generally closed Monday, in accordance with general custom, for the observance of Memorial Day.

This is in accordance with the proclamation by Gov. Kim Sigler, which names Monday as the official date for Memorial Day observance in Michigan, as provided by the state law which, in the event that a legal holiday falls on Sunday, provides that the following Monday shall be a legal holiday.

It is also in accordance with the recommendation of the Buchanan Business Association, which named six annual holidays for general closing, with the understanding that such general closing be understood on the following Monday if any of the holidays were on Sunday.

This year both Memorial Day and the 4th of July will come on Sunday.

All business men are asked to display the American flag in front of their establishments on Monday. The request is made by William Baker, commander of the American Legion post, the observance to be a part of the Memorial Day exercises arranged by that post and the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

SUPPORT B. E. A. SOLICITATION CONTROL PLAN

There is evidence that Buchanan is no longer the soft touch that once it was for the fly-by-night solicitor selling a project of little or no value to anyone except himself.

Merchants state that not nearly so many solicitors approach them as in previous years. Apparently the measures taken by the Buchanan Business Association to discourage such solicitations are responsible. Under this plan local business men are asked to make certain that all solicitors have been granted a card of approval signed by the secretary of the association.

Decision on the granting of the card is in the hands of a committee, whose members are not announced. This committee judges each project with four considerations in mind:

1. Is the project anything more than a money-making scheme?
2. Is the project one which this community has real responsibility for supporting?
3. Does the project involve promotion expense that unduly wastes the money donated?
4. If there are promotion expenses that are not out of bounds, can the expenditures in work or materials be made in Buchanan?

In the case of the last-named considerations, it is felt by the Business Association that money given should as far as possible go entirely to the cause to be served. Too many projects in the past have been initiated by a professional promoter who uses a worthy cause to get his foot in the door. In such projects, either a stipulated sum plus expenses or a split of the gross receipts go to the promoter. In addition considerable expense in printing and other productive charges further reduce the net to the beneficiary. It is a waste of the community's ability to support its enterprises when business men give large amounts of which it is evident that less than one half go to the cause to be served. Cases have been known here where the promoter's "take" and other expenses consumed nearly the entire amount made.

The Buchanan Business Association believes that it is important that all solicitors, however well established their project may be, observe the program set up for issuance of approval cards by the secretary of the association. Any project which has a long-standing record of acceptance here will receive the approval as a matter of form. But if solicitors take their approval for granted, and by-pass the association card, then they help to let the bars down for all. For if business men receive too many solicitations without approval cards, they will cease to require them in any case.

The enforcement of this plan is in the interest of the business men of the community. And they can enforce it if they will merely ask for the card before considering the solicitation.

This is not alone in the interest of the business community. There is a limit to the gross amount that can be given in a year. The association plan attempts to assure that as large an amount as possible go to the projects we have a real responsibility in supporting.

Let's all co-operate to see that the proceeds of local generosity are not wasted.

Clifford Hill Pinned Beneath Jeep On Red Bud

Rampant Jeep Mows Off 10 Guard Rail Posts And Somersaults

Clifford Hill, who lives in Niles township a mile northeast of Buchanan, received painful but not serious injuries when he was pinned underneath his jeep on Red Bud Trail early Saturday morning.

Hill was traveling north, apparently at a high rate of speed, when he lost control of the jeep on the curve at the bottom of Moccasin bluff, approaching the Edwin Stultz home. He traveled along the eastern shoulder of the road next to the river for 145 feet, shearing off 10 guard rail posts, when the jeep struck a deep rut on the shoulder and turned a forward somersault, landing wheels up in the center of the pavement with Hill underneath.

Shortly afterward, Charles Miller, 23, Mishawaka, came around the curve from the south. He was unable to avoid the jeep, crashing into it.

The jeep was righted by officers and passing motorists and Hill was taken to the Pawating hospital, suffering from a dislocated hip and fractured ribs. His condition is reported good and his injuries not of a serious nature.

Elderly Need Milk To Fortify Bones Against Breakage

Middle-aged and elderly people should have at least a pint of milk in their daily diets for good health and to fortify their bones against breakage.

Many older people believe that they don't need milk or that their body doesn't use it This is not true reports Ina Redman, home demonstration agent Studies made recently in Iowa show that a lack of calcium in their diet leads to broken bones in old age. Too little calcium, protein and phosphorus older persons need. It has been suggested that many a broken bone in an older person caused the person to fall rather than the fall causing the broken bone Lack of minerals in bones causes them to become weak so that they break easily.

If you would like to make sure of the amount of calcium in your daily diet, write to the Home Economics Extension Service, East Lansing, for their score card, "What Is Your Calcium Count?" A recipe leaflet, "Milk in Modern Meals" also may be obtained from the Home Economics Extension Service

You may not have the experience that the person who planned the industrial lighting had, but you can do something about lighting Ina Redman, home demonstration agent, believes that the most common fault is that lighting is planned in terms of fixtures rather than the eyes of the family.

If you wonder how much light is enough, remember that you are much more likely to have too little than too much Our eyes will adjust themselves to any amount of light but specialists have proved that we see more slowly when there is not enough light.

We also see more easily and do not become tired as quickly when there is enough light Industry has learned that any eye strain caused by furnishing good lighting pays for itself.

Did you know that just having enough light on the page—you are reading or the sock you are darned isn't enough? If the rest of the room is dark when you glance up, your eyes have to adjust to the contrast in lighting. This adjustment to sharp contrasts in lighting is the greatest single cause of eye strain.

For a living room you should have a reasonable all-over light and concentrated direct light where it is needed You also will find that three-way lamps that permit the light to be raised or lowered are a help Several wall outlets in a room also add to the flexibility of the lighting. Maybe new shades or adding a white lamp to your present ones can be the first step in your lighting improvement.

More people own their own homes today than ever before, the Institute of Life Insurance said. The biggest proportion of home ownership is found in the rural and farm areas, where about two thirds of the dwellings were owner-occupied in 1947, as against little more than half in 1940, the institute said. Based on a U.S. census report the number of owner-occupied dwellings in the United States rose to 21,300,000 in 1947, a 49 per cent gain over 1940. In all there are 39,100,000 occupied dwellings in the country, the institute estimated.

Chicken Dinners Might Be Scarce During Year 1948

It may be a long way between

chicken dinners next year, a report on the shortage of poultry on Midwest farms, it is stated that baby chicks sales have dropped from 20 to 25% this spring. The shortage of cockerels is serious, says Clarence Ems, superintendent of poultry husbandry department in Illinois. According to Ems, this may mean not enough breeding stock for next year. And many broiler men have gone out of business because of the high cost of feed.

More Men Than Women Succeed In Taking Own Lives

More men than women succeed in committing suicide, but there are usually more attempts, hysterical and fake, among women, according to a recently completed study of 500 suicidal attempts, made by Alex. J. Arief, associate in nervous and mental diseases in the Northwestern University Medical School, in association with David B. Rotman, of the Municipal Court of Chicago, and others. In the age group under 20, the majority of attempts (52 per cent) were hysterical or fake. In the age group 20 to 30, 48 per cent were fake, and in that from 30 to 70, only about 1 per cent. The older the person, therefore, the more genuine and ominous the attempt. Only in the age group below 20 is alcoholism a negligible factor. In other groups, it is the precipitating agent in from 40 to 50 per cent of the cases. There are more suicides in urban than in rural communities, fewer among Catholics and Jews than among followers of other faiths, and fewer among married persons than among the single, widowed or divorced.

Arrangement of Work-Material May Save Kitchen Steps

To make your kitchen jobs easier and quicker think about the way you arrange your working materials. If you have to reach for articles that are too high, or in inconvenient places, you will soon become tired. Before you tackle a job in your kitchen, place all the articles you will need in easy reach, suggests Ina Redman, home demonstration agent. Easy reach can be measured by placing your elbows on the edge of the work space and noticing the arc formed when you move your arms either toward your body or away from it. Maximum reach can be measured in the same way except that you form the arc by moving your arm in both directions from the shoulder.







BHS Latin Class Is Rated High In National Tests

3 Boys Take Honors In Competition With 14,000 Youth

The eighteen students in the Latin classes of the Buchanan high school emerged with honors from participation in the 17th annual competitive examinations sponsored by Auxilium Latinum, the interscholastic magazine devoted to the Latin students of the United States and Canada. Sixteen of the eighteen students of the Buchanan high school Latin classes ranked above the average among the 14,000 scholars entered in the competition. Three of the eighteen received certificates of "Honorable Merit Cum Laude" given only to the top-eight students who graded over 90 as compared with an average score of 88. These three were Joseph Huebner, 91, Jim Meitfield, 90, Graydon Heim, 90.

Fifteen of the eighteen students received Latin diploma certificates from the National Students Latin Honor Society for having attained

grades of 90 or over in their school work for the first three-quarters of the school year. The Latin students annual ballot for the award of four sterling silver keys to class members on the basis of accuracy, student participation and contribution to class. This year the keys were awarded to Mary Ann Hagley, Graydon Heim, Jim Meitfield and Joseph Huebner.

The competitive examinations referred to above were given to 14,000 Latin students in the United States, Hawaii, Alaska and Canada on the same day, under the same conditions. The tests were made under the strictest conditions of supervision, and under standard limitations of time. After completion they were immediately sent to the magazine, where the 14,000 papers received uniform grading. An unusual feature of the results in the local classes was that three boys won top honors in a subject where boys usually are not as good students as girls.
