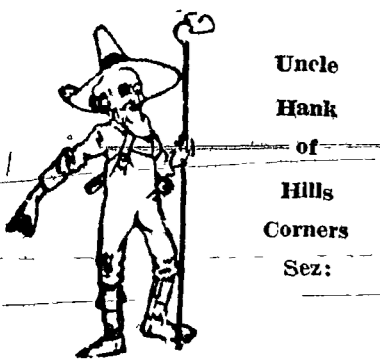

Upon graduation, he will be made a flying officer

5th Death Local World War II Men Occurs at Ft. Leonard Wood, Mo.

The Buchanan community was saddened last week by news of its fifth service death, that of Jack Ednie, 19, son of Mr and Mrs William B Ednie, the young soldier having passed away at Fort Leonard Wood, Mo., at 1:15 p.m. Friday as the result of an attack of scarlet fever followed by pneumonia and other complications

Young Ednie had entered the army from Flint, Feb. 6, 1943, having previously been a student at the General Motors Technical school at Flint, Mich., for a year and a half He had been assigned as a mechanic for a medical unit, located in recent months at Fort Leonard Wood, Mo. Relatives and friends have the consolation of knowing that friends were with him in his last illness. I C. Ernst, who came from Fort Leonard Wood as escort for the body, was his bunk mate Corp Bill Beardsley, who also came back to Buchanan for the funeral, was in the same unit, as were Christ Aalfs and George Phiscator All these boys had been in training together

Young Ednie was ill only about 5 1/2 days The attack of scarlet fever was not severe, but his case became serious when bronchial pneumonia set in about three days later Blood complications made his case more difficult He developed a very high fever which the attending physicians were not able to break

A military funeral was arranged for Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 p.m., with six local boys serving as soldiers and sailors, but home on furloughs, acting as pallbearers, and a firing squad from Fort Custer

He was born in Buchanan on August 12, 1924, the son of William and Elva Ednie. He attended the local schools and was graduated from the Buchanan high school with the class of 1941. He is survived by his parents, Mr and Mrs William Ednie, Berrien Springs road, by two brothers, William Ednie, serving with a naval hospital unit in New Zealand, and Keith Ednie at home, by two half-sisters, Mrs Fay Richardson of New Troy and Mrs Helen Olmstead of California.

Bertrand Board Votes Down Two Tavern Licenses

Refusal by the Bertrand township board for the permit for the renewal of the tavern licenses of the Bakertown and Dayton taverns as establishments where beer and wine may be sold for consumption on the premises went into effect May 1, with some consequent reverberation by the town

The action was taken by a vote of the township board, reflecting dissatisfaction by a considerable part of the public with conditions which have prevailed at the taverns It is argued by those supporting the refusal of the licenses that taverns in rural districts which do not have adequate police supervision tend to become detrimental to public welfare

It is pointed out that the action does prevent the continuance of the establishments as places where beer and wine may be bought for consumption outside Opponents contend that more control could be secured to guard against unfavorable conditions, that the trade draws many people from Indiana, who spend their money in the township; that the township is deprived of the license money without adequate reason; that the action is not in the interest of temperance or public order as it merely means a shift in the place of drinking

Voters to Pass on Creation of Fund on June 14

Board Recommends Setting Aside \$7,000 This Year In Anticipation of Post War Building

Voters of Fractional School District No. 1, comprising mainly Buchanan, will vote on the creation of a special fund for a future addition to the city school buildings, as the result of a resolution passed by the school board Friday evening

The action taken by the school board merely defines that issue for decision by the voters at the annual meeting on June 14. It would provide for withdrawing \$7,000 from the general fund to be the nucleus of a special building fund in anticipation of a growth in school population which is in fact already crowding the school facilities

In the neighborhood of 100 additional children have already been brought in by the influx of factory war workers It is expected that this influx will continue and will very likely leave a permanent addition to the school population In fact building facilities have been needed for several years Dr J C Strayer, president of the board, stated that the board is recommending the creation of the special fund in anticipation of a nation-wide program of government aid following the end of the present war This fund would take care of the local part in financing building

Margaret Conway Hears Husband Is Missing in Action

Mrs. Margaret Conway, teacher of the second grade at the Dewey school, received word last week that her husband, Lt. John D. Conway, aerial bombardier in army air service in Australia, had been missing in action since Jan. 6

Mrs Conway stated that the last letter she received from her husband had been written Jan 1 and reached her in late January. He had entered army service in March of 1941 and later achieved a commission in the army air corps. He was graduated in 1939 from Northwestern University, Evanston, Ill. Mrs. Conway was also graduated from an Evanston school, the National College of Education, in June, 1942 Following his graduation, young Conway was in the employ of the Dupont company in the Chicago offices. He was married to Miss Margaret McAllister of Irvine, Ky, in July, 1942, and left in September for active duty in the south Pacific area

Lt. Conway was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas M. Conway, 710 Forest Avenue, Evanston, Ill His father is general traffic manager of the Illinois Bell Telephone Co., in the Chicago offices. The notification by the War department of course leaves leeway for hope

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family of a person serving in the armed forces of the United States during the current war.

The regulations and design covering the approved service flag were released to the public by the war department in February, 1943, as follows:

1. The official design consists of a blue star or stars on a white rectangular field within a red border. There is no specification as to the size of the flag or to the proportion of the red border or white center.

2. The number of stars will correspond to the number of individuals from the "immediate" family who are symbolized on the flag. The flag for the immediate family may be displayed by the mother, father, wife, son, daughter, brother, sister, or husband of the person in the armed service.

3. The service flag when vertically displayed will have the stars arranged in a vertical line or lines with one point of each star up.

4. If the individual symbolized is killed or dies while serving from causes other than dishonorable the star representing that individual will have superimposed thereon a gold star of smaller size so that the blue forms a border to the gold star.

Service flag for organizations

1. The design for the service flag for an organization is the

same as that described for the family.

2. The word "organization" refers to all groups such as places of business, churches, schools, colleges, fraternities, sororities, societies, lodges, etc., with which the individual was associated.

3. The service flag displayed by an organization may, instead of using a separate star for each member use one blue star with the number of members, indicated by blue numerals which will appear below the star. If any members

are deceased a gold star will be placed above the blue star when the flag is vertically displayed. If the flag is horizontally displayed from a staff, the gold star is placed nearest the staff. Blue Arabic numerals are used under both the blue star and the gold star.

4. The service flag will never have placed upon it any mark, insignia, letter, word, design, picture, or drawing of any nature, except those provided for in the approved design.

5. The service flag will never be used as a pennant or streamer.

6. The service flag will never be used as a flag for a building.

7. The service flag will never be used as a flag for a motor vehicle.

8. The service flag will never be used as a flag for a boat.

9. The service flag will never be used as a flag for a flagpole.

10. The service flag will never be used as a flag for a flagstaff.
