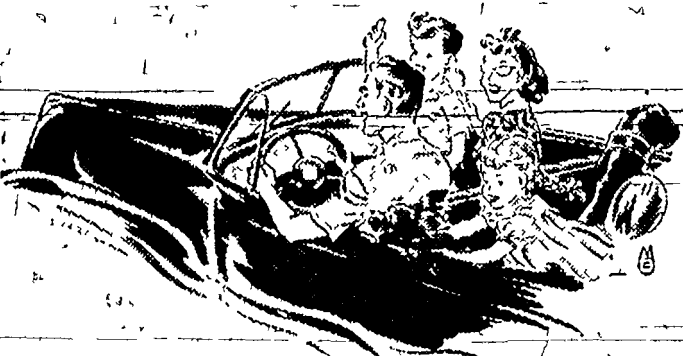

## Volume Freight Rate Cut To Record Low By United Air Lines

United Air Lines has announced plans to place in effect the lowest freight rates in the history of scheduled common carrier airlines for the movement of volume shipments over its coast-to-coast and Pacific coast system.

In an air freight tariff filed with the Civil Aeronautics Board this week for an effective date of Aug. 17, United shows rates as low as 17 1/2 cents a pound on volume shipments of 16,000 pounds across the country, according to Harold Clary, vice-president, traffic and sales. The rates are scaled to decrease as the volume increases from the present 3,000-pound load up to a maximum of 16,000 pounds.

A feature of the tariff is a provision to allow a shipper the volume rates on the total poundage of individual shipments made in any 24-hour period. No change is made in existing rates on shipments up to 3,000 pounds.

So low will be the volume rates that a shipper in Boston will be able to send 16,000 pounds from Boston to Chicago for as little as \$6.30 per 100 pounds or a 7,500-pound shipment for \$5.70 per 100 pounds. Other typical examples are 7,500 pounds from Boston to Cleveland, \$5.92 per 100 pounds; to Denver, \$7.05 per 100 pounds; and to San Francisco, \$24.47 per 100 pounds.

State Acquires 9 Lake Front Sites To Keep Sport Open To keep random parcels of state-owned land having frontage on lakes and rivers forever in state ownership to insure access for fishermen and hunters, the conservation commission at its July meeting here dedicated 19 sites in 11 counties.

These lands have all been in state ownership for some time, but have not been developed because of their location outside established conservation department projects. The first group of these lands to be dedicated for public water access includes "three sites on Intermediate Lake and river, Antrim county, one on Saginaw river, Arenac county, one on Beaufort Lake, Baraga county, three in Charlevoix county on South Branch of Boyne river, South Arm of Lake Charlevoix, and Twin Lakes, three in Cheboygan county on Silver, Munro and Douglas Lakes, two in Crawford county on Bluegill and Horseshoe Lakes, two in Gladwin county on North Branch of Cedar river and Wiggins Lake, and one each in Grand Traverse county on Boardman Lake, Isocoo county on Lonk Lake, Mackinac county on Hamstigue Lake, and Ogemaw county on Elk Lake.

These dedicated public water access sites will be grouped with purchased sites in the program of developing such locations for hunters and fishermen's use. At the same meeting the commission approved purchase of 1,040 acres in Porcupine mountains state park, 1,430 acres in five southeastern Michigan state recreation areas Brighton, Pinckney, Eroul Lake, Rochester-Utica and Waterlot 177 acres in four southern Michigan state game areas Rose Lake, Lapeer, Port Huron and Gratiot-Saginaw, 2,331 acres in Iron state forest, Iron county, Allegan state forest, Allegan county, and Hemlock Rapids, Porter Creek and Cable and Porter Lakes deeryards, Iron county, and fishing access sites on Hemlock Lake, Cass county, Bear

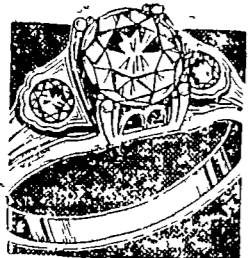
