Buchanan Steel To Add Seventy Employees

Buchanan's labor force will be increased by 70 people, according to James D. Kowalski, sales manager for the Buchanan Steel Products division of National-Standard company.

Kowalski made the announcement at the Tuesday morning meeting of the Buchanan Area Chamber of Commerce's monthly Perc club.

The labor increase has come about, Kowalski explained for the 50 members present, by the addition to the Buchanan facilities of the firm of a new quarter million dollar forge shop.

The cold forge operation is located in an "L" shaped building which has more than 20,000 feet of floor space under a single roof.

After being presented by Chamber president Donald Ryan, Kowalski gave a brief history of the forging industry ranging from the dawn of recorded history when forgings

were only simple hand tools and small weapons compared to today's complex aerospace, automotive and ordnance requirements.

He explained that Buchanan Steel Products was acquired by the National-Standard company in 1964 and is the 12th major producer of forgings in the United States.

The division is the major forging operation of National-Standard. Before the addition of the cold forge shop, its major product was a forged sickle for agriculture implements. It also manufactured large numbers of universal joint components, pitman arms and steering arms.

With the addition of the cold forging operation, he explained, "you don't see Buchanan Steel going down the road, but it's there in every Chrysler, Dodge and Plymouth auto."

"Whenever you land in a Boeing 737 jet airliner," he added, "a portion of the landing gear includes parts forged by Buchanan Steel."

While showing samples of products made by the firm, Kowalski explained that Buchanan Steel can now produce parts for customers to their specifications, from the closest tolerances (possible in cold forge) to items requiring hot forging applications.

Kowalski pointed out that Buchanan Steel is continuously carrying on product and market research and development to insure its important place in the forging industry.

Guests at the early morning meeting included Don Fernwal, proprietor of Flower, by Fernwal, 212 Sylvan Ave.

Construction Imminent On New Booster's Tavern

The Buchanan central business district improvement program will take a big step forward with the beginning of construction of a New Booster's Tavern, expected to get under way within the next 10 days.

In an announcement made Tuesday, Kenneth and Kay Gill, proprietors of the establishment, said the new building would be finished within approximately 90 days on the site of the present building—the oldest in the downtown area.

"We are making every effort to insure its completion before the 90 day limit set by the city," said Gill.

The City Commission in awarding its approval for a liquor by the glass license to the Gills at a special meeting Wednesday, Nov. 20, said it would allow the recipients 90 days to comply with the city's liquor ordinance before withdrawing approval.

The cost of the new building will exceed \$50,000, Gill reported and will be completely new.

The facade will feature red cedar "shakes" sheltering stylized colonial windows and a red buck veneer to the ground. The top of the building will be faced off with rough sawn cedar. Seating in the new building will accommodate 78 patrons.

Interior design of the building will follow an early American motif.

Gill said specifications were released recently to bidders.

He is expected to serve an increased menu with the addition of a modern, new and enlarged kitchen.

Booster's has been known throughout the area for its hearty "Boosterburger" served with hot mustard.

Christmas Club Payoff Listed

Christmas is coming early to more than 1,500 Buchanan area residents who took advantage of Christmas Club saving programs in area banking institutions.

According to Dan Smith, manager of the Buchanan office of Inter-City bank, 1,000 1968 Christmas club members will receive more than \$140,000.

Christmas clubs normally include 50 deposits of a specified amount throughout the year with the total savings and accumulated interest being paid in time to help with Christmas buying.

At Inter-City bank, said Smith, if the Club is up to date at the end of the 50 week period next year, the bank will give the depositor a 51st week's payment.

At the Buchanan Farmers-Credit Union, Manager Ron Church reports that 140 Club members will receive \$18,828.11 in principal and the credit union will be paying \$188.31 in interest.

LaSalle Federal Savings and Loan association reports 450 Christmas Club account holders will receive more than \$66,391.00.

Checks from all three institutions were mailed to club members by November 12.

New Law Requires City Meeting List

Published in this week's Record is the first "notice of public meetings" issued by the city under a new state law, Public Act 261.

The law provides that each municipality in the state must publish a list of all public meetings scheduled by local governments. The first list, which appears this week, includes the two dates of City Commission meetings remaining in 1968.

On Dec. 26, there will appear a list of all City Commission meetings for the year 1969.

Alarm Answered

Buchanan city firemen were called to the new motel-restaurant site on N. Portage Thursday, Nov. 21 at 10:23 a.m. to extinguish a small fire which began when a spark from a welding tool allegedly ignited nearby paint.

Damage was confined to a small portion of a room in the proposed restaurant, according to Neil Burks, city fire chief.

Cancellations To Be Noted By Radio Stations

School officials in Buchanan were making plans Tuesday for notifying students of school cancellations, due to adverse weather reports Richard Dougherty, superintendent of schools.

"During the winter season," said Dougherty, "we may be faced with the possibility of having to cancel bus service if weather makes it unsafe or impossible to operate the buses due to snow clogged roads."

He advised parents of school children to keep radios tuned to the following radio stations for school bus advisory messages: WNIL, Niles, WHFB, Benton Harbor and WSBT, South Bend.

"Changes in bus service or school schedules will be announced over these facilities regularly," he explained.

Parents are advised not to call the radio stations or school during inclement periods since neither are equipped to handle all their calls.

Yearly Visit Set By Santa

The jolly old man with the 105 cheeks, a hearty laugh and a bag full of goodies for good little boys and girls is making plans to visit Buchanan, according to a North Pole news release received by the Record Wednesday.

Santa will arrive in the city at 2:00 p.m., Saturday, Dec. 14, by helicopter.

After landing in the bank parking lot, he will be in his special seasonal Buchanan headquarters which will be located in the downtown area.

The specific location has not yet been determined since Santa is attempting to make arrangements to have a portion of his reindeer herd brought to Buchanan for the holiday visit.

Beginning Monday, Dec. 16, and continuing through Monday, Dec. 23, Santa's house will be open from 6:00 to 8:00 p.m. each day. On Saturday, Dec. 21, the house will also be open from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m.

On Christmas Eve day, Dec. 24, the house will be open from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m., after which Santa will depart to make his yearly visit to children everywhere.

Local coordination with Santa for his appearance in the city is being handled by the Chamber of Commerce.

The study is being completed by a member of the division, James Jesse, with the cooperation of the Michigan Retail Association and the Small Business Administration.



Gill, Haag Named New Liquor License Holders

The awarding of approval for two liquor licenses for Buchanan taverns was determined by the drawing of lots at a special meeting of the City Commission, Wednesday, Nov. 20.

Kenneth Gill, owner of Booster's tavern, 215 E. Front St., and George Haag, owner of the Flamingo bar, 239 E. Front St., won the city's approval pending their compliance with Ordinance 156, as amended.

Their compliance will involve correcting minor infractions in their respective places of business. An amendment, expected to be in effect in a matter of 30

days, will exempt taverns from the 150 seating capacity requirement written in the present ordinance.

The awarding was accomplished by the drawing of one of four numbered balls from a canister by a representative of each of the four taverns in the city.

Two corresponding numbers were sealed in an envelope which was opened by Mayor Kenneth Witt following the drawing.

Gill held the number 50 while Haag had 20.

After laboring through a pro-

tracted history of liquor by the glass legislation in the city, Mayor Witt explained how the drawing of lots came about.

Executive Sessions Held

The Commission held an executive session on Tuesday, Nov. 12 at which it was decided to have the premises of each of the taverns inspected in order to get facts with which to arrive at a decision on approval of liquor by the glass licenses. A second meeting was held Monday, Nov. 18 and a decision made.

The drawing by lot, said Witt, "isn't going to please everybody, because there aren't enough of these (licenses) to go around."

He explained the city is entitled to only four such licenses on the basis of a formula which stipulates one license per 1,500 residents.

Following a proposal of the Chamber of Commerce, the Commission agreed to issue two licenses to restaurants (seating 150 persons or more) and two to taverns (soon to be exempt from the seating requirement).

The Commission also set a three-month time limit within which the chosen tavern owners must act on their awarded approval.

"The move was made, the Commission explained, to keep a person from holding the permission granted by the governing body.

"If somebody who draws the right to have liquor by the glass does not meet the requirements of the ordinance within three months," the Mayor explained, "then we would propose to have another drawing if there are two others who want it and select one of them."

He added, however, that if an extensive remodeling or building program were underway at the three month limit, the Commission would not be "too rigid."

The call for the special meeting limited the Commission to see CITY, Page 4.

Sewer Project Provides Fuel For Meeting Talk

Streets, moisture and citizen complaints were the order of business at the regular Monday evening meeting of the Buchanan City Commission.

Otho Farrell, 403 Elizabeth, told Commissioners he was without gas for cooking for three months because of construction of the Northeast Area Sanitary Sewer project.

"The contractor bought us a hotplate," said Farrell, "but have you tried to cook for six children for three months on a hotplate?"

Farrell said his electric bill during the period was as high as \$42.00 and his petition to the gas company for credit on future bills because of the inconvenience it allegedly cost him was denied.

Gas service in the area is provided by Michigan Gas and Electric company which has offices in Niles. An office once located at 122 E. Front St. in Buchanan has been closed.

The dilemma came about with the construction of the new sewer

being completed by the L. W. Lamb company of Holland.

James Lamb, representing the company, told Commissioners the streets in the Northeast area have been a problem. "We are attempting to put gravel on the streets and get it compacted," he explained, "but weather has been a factor."

He pointed out that in his opinion, all streets in the area are passable except for two or three houses on the east end of Richards street.

Farrell said his street was in such a condition that he could not drive to his house and it is necessary to carry groceries and other items "almost a block."

Looking toward the approaching winter, Farrell said, "If I can't get home in the mud, how am I going to get home in the snow?"

Lamb told Commissioners the gas problem came about when his crews discovered the line had been laid in the street, rather than under it.

Came Here From Germany

Mrs. Canfield came to this country from Osnaberg, Germany, 12 years ago with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Otto Deselbinger, now of Berrien Springs. A graduate of Berrien Springs high school, she married her husband in 1963. They have two children, Tina, 4, and Scott, 2. Mrs. Canfield is employed at Simplicity Pattern Co.,

Niles, and her husband is with National-Standard, also in Niles.

Entered Mooseheart

Born in Canada, Mrs. Moore went to Scotland with her mother, Mrs. Mary Bryce, at the age of one year. She lived there until 1959, when she immigrated to Canada with her first husband, Dominic DiCiacca, and their three children. I find justification for this line of thinking in two quick examples:

Buchanan leaders are looking toward the possibility of a community school agent program. Gallen presently has a working program which is quite successful. While Gallen's benefit from cooperation on such a program might be minimal, Buchanan could gain much.

Gallen is presently having some monetary difficulties—it was forced to withdraw its cooperation with Buchanan township on a sanitary landfill because of failure of voters to approve a millage increase for operating expenses.

Anything which would move to the broadening of the tax base in Gallen would be a major gain for the village and cooperation between the two communities could conceivably have such an end.

Homer put it quite well when he said, "Light is the work where many share the task."

It takes little imagination to see the possibilities in bi-community cooperation — perhaps the Buchanan AREA Chamber of Commerce's Community Development Committee can address itself to fostering this cooperation.



David Gleber, representing the R W. Petrie and Associates, consulting engineers for the city project, told Commissioners that "on Victory street, where the gas line was four feet in the load, the situation was corrected by the gas company in about five days."

Neither Gleber or Lamb had an explanation for the lack of service at the Fairell residence

The Commission, after considerable discussion with its engineers and the contractor, advised the city manager that grading and fill on streets in the northeast area should be carried out as winter weather dictates Major problems caused by the construction are to be resolved by the contractor





Bucks Give Up 159 Points To Challengers

The final statistics for the Bucks gridiron squad were released this week and show the Buchanan opponents taking a wide lead in scoring over the nine-game schedule.

The Bucks gave up 159 points while scoring a total of 60 in net yardage, seven Bud conference teams plus Niles and Dowagiac managed to gain a total of 2,115 yards against 1,130 for Buchanan.

The net yardage for opponents was made up of 1,717 yards on the ground and 397 in the air. The Bucks followed their competitors on the ground with only 786 yards gained, but managed to stay in the same circuit on air yardage with 344 yards to the good.

The aerial yardage for the Bucks was gained on 102 pass attempts, of which 37 were completed. Opponents managed to get 77 attempts, completing

32. The Bucks had 10 passes snagged by opponents while picking off eight.

Buchanan had 43 opportunities for punts during the season and kickers punted a total of 276.6 yards for an average of 30.7 yards per kick.

Bucks opponents had 36 punt opportunities, and kicked a total of 270.3 yards, or a per-kick average of 30.3 yards.

Fourteen fumbles were lost to opponents during the season while the Bucks picked off the same number.

Only 375 yards were charged against Buchanan for penalties while opponents were charged with 500 yards.

All Conference

One Buck, quarterback Pat Sexton, got the nod as an All-conference back — picked as quarterback for the offensive squad and as a halfback for the defensive squad.

Three teammates, Darrell Chappell, Bob Davis and Bill Glossinger won honorable mention in all conference voting.

Davis, a senior was picked as the second squad offensive center while Chappell, a Junior, and Glossinger, a Senior, won berths on the conference second string defensive unit.

The Bucks wound up their season with an overall 2-6-1 record and marked 2-4-1 for the conference matches.




