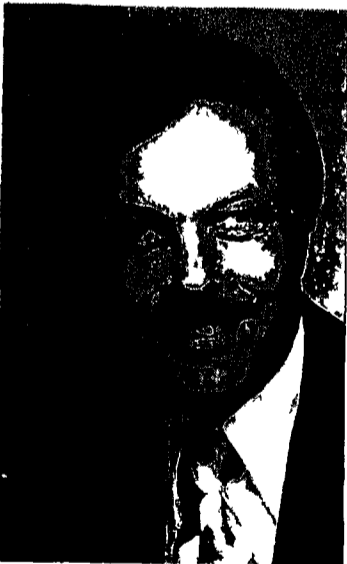

New Manager



Thomas M. Fry has been named Manager of Industrial Engineering for Clark Equipment Company's Axle Division here, according to Louis Proctor, Vice President of Manufacturing.

Fry joins the Axle Division after having served with the Roper Corporation of Bradley, Illinois, where he was a Project Engineer for three years, and in 1971, was named Supervisor of Industrial Engineering.

Prior to that, he spent five years with Owens Brugh Company of Iowa City, Iowa, as Plant Manager, and five years with the Industrial Equipment Division of John Deere in Moline, Illinois, as Standards Engineer.

He attended General Motors Institute and the University of Iowa. Active in the Jaycees and the Boy Scouts, Fry is a member of the American Institute of Industrial Engineers, the American Society of Lubricating Engineers, and the Society of Mechanical Engineers.

Principal Reports On Buchanan High School

High school principal Dr. Walter Vanderbush gave a comprehensive report on the high school to the Buchanan Board of Education.

There are a total of 679 students in high school. Boys outnumber girls by 355 to 324. There are 184 in the ninth grade and only 141 in the senior class. Vanderbush noted that there have been 42 dropouts, 9 fewer than last year.

During this school year there are 40 teachers. Breaking that down to full-time equivalency there is a pupil-teacher ratio of about one to 20. In addition there are three counselors.

Dr. Vanderbush reported that the school was accredited by North Central and by the University of Michigan. It was noted that one administrator needed more course work, and he is now taking the required courses. One teacher is now making up a deficiency in a required course.

A major staff project is a North Central self-evaluation. A team of about twenty educators will visit the school on March 17, 18 and 19 and will review and evaluate the self-evaluation and make recommendations. In the meantime department committees will meet to evaluate their own departments.

Vanderbush reported that about 39 percent of the members of the class of 1975 have enrolled in either two or four year colleges. This is in contrast to 47 percent (unusually high) in 1974.

Curriculum changes were noted including a course in practical math, business law and clerical office practice, child care, housing and home furnishing, handicraft and sewing, a semester of local history. It was reported that changes in the physical education department involve physical fitness, lifetime recreation, gymnastics and sports appreciation. The English department now requires that all students pass at least two semesters of grammar and composition, two of literature and one in drama and speech.

Vanderbush said that there are now 33 students participating in shared time vocational programs which include 12 in advanced natural science at Fernwood. Other outlets are graphics at Niles, electronics, auto body at Berrien Springs, food service, nurses aide at Brandywine, health and vocational electronics.

School Farm Advisory Committee Makes Plans For The Spring

In March 1974 the Buchanan board of education appointed a School Farm Advisory Committee which has since then studied the feasibility and financing of a school farm on Andrews Road. Since that time, the programs connected with the school farm have continued to grow, and a great many of Buchanan's children and young people have been involved.

The advisory committee consists of Otto Jury, president, Judy Bever, secretary, Robert Koenigshof, Don Nichols, Gerald Tichenor, B. R. Desenberg, Richard Rossow, Teresa Zieder, Howard Lahring and David Casey.

At a recent meeting, the committee started making plans for next year. They suggested a land use report from Howard Lahring to indicate the success of last year's FFA efforts. From this report the committee will make recommendations for the future use of the land now being used by the FFA and the land which has been leased to outside interests in the past.

The committee and others involved with the farm will compile a list of the most needed equipment and improvements, both from an immediate and long range basis. It is hoped that members of the community will want to help with some of the projects.

Also discussed was a community-wide festival with a bicentennial theme featuring local craftsmen and talents and

He told of the teacher's aide, tutoring and office aid program involving 86 students who are helping teachers in the elementary schools and are working in the library, high school office, guidance office and in the Ottawa office. These students free teachers for more teaching and receive 1/2 credit per semester. In addition, the Spanish students helped by working with Spanish speaking children of migrant workers.

Vanderbush cited the academic achievements of many Buchanan students including three who were recently named national merit semi-finalists, two who are finalists in the state mathematics contest. He noted the accomplishments of several in the National Spanish test. He took pride in the marching band's Division I rating at the district festival, and the Future Farmers outstanding chapter award and their first place in leadership camp.

Vanderbush pointed out that the golf team, girls' basketball team, boys' basketball team and the baseball team had all won conference championships during the year.

He gave recognition to the fine performances of Fiddler on the Roof and Our Town and announced that the next musical will be Music Man.

In his report Dr. Vanderbush mentioned the attempt of the high school administration to establish better communications with the parents. A group was formed last year with that purpose in mind and has been meeting regularly to discuss mutual concerns.

In conclusion, Vanderbush outlined the latest ACT results of students here. Each year, college-bound students take this examination. It is an achievement, rather than an aptitude test. The results showed that Buchanan students ranked equal with the state mean and slightly above the national mean, ranking higher than the state mean in English, social studies and natural sciences and below the state mean but above the national mean in mathematics. He reported that of 52 students, a composite of seven ranked in the top 10 percent of the state and six ranked in the lowest ten percent. Nationally, there were five students in the composite who ranked in the top ten percent and five in the bottom 10 percent.

Another Rip-Off

An attorney friend sent bulletins from the Michigan Manufacturers Association which indicates that the inequities of the workmen's compensation laws in Michigan cost companies far more than does the maladministration of unemployment compensation.

According to the bulletins, the present situation is driving more industries out of the state. It cites the case of the Kellogg Corporation opening a new facility in Pennsylvania and the Budd Co. choosing Ohio instead of Michigan because of the state's workmen's compensation laws.

Just as in everything else that costs money, Michigan ranks second only to California in the workmen's compensation rates. The Detroit News reported that the Budd Co. pays out 70 percent of its compensation costs in Michigan although only 20 percent of its work force is located in this state.

The reasons for the high costs are shocking. According to reports, there is a small group of lawyers in the Detroit area who, aided by a few questionable doctors, do nothing else but work on compensation claims and are doing extremely well getting large settlements for many undeserving people.

A newspaper boy asked a friend to take his route. The friend's five year old little brother tagged along and was injured by a car. The newspaper had to pay the boy \$27 a week for the rest of the boy's life, even though they had never laid eyes on the boy or his brother. A man who had been retired seven years ago, got a doctor to claim that he had a respiratory ailment as a result of his working in the factory. Although another doctor examined him and found no respiratory ailment, the man received a good settlement of which his lawyer collected 15 percent. One attorney in Detroit was reported to have made \$500,000 last year merely by handling workmen's compensation cases.

On the other hand, the bulletins point out, the deserving claimants are often the losers. Their cases are frequently drawn out for years in the courts, adding tremendous extra costs to the individuals and the companies.

All this costs Michigan's industries millions of dollars and leads them to look elsewhere in states where the laws are more equitable. All this costs us, the taxpayers, more money and results in fewer jobs in the state.

Industries right here in Buchanan can tell you horror stories about their own particular cases. Reputable attorneys and doctors are finally getting together to see what can be done.

Have you let the Governor know of your feelings? It would help.

Third Suspect Is Arrested In Rees Robbery

There are now three suspects who have been arrested and arraigned in Fifth District Court in connection of the armed robbery of Rees Jewelry Store on November 3. Earlier Robert Lee Williams had been charged after he had also been arrested in connection with another armed robbery in St. Joseph. Roy Moore of Benton township was later arrested. The third and final suspect was arrested in Harvey, Illinois, by police on a Berrien County warrant. Richard Rufus, who gave a Benton Harbor address, was arrested last week at his room at the YMCA in Harvey.

The three men are accused of taking \$20,251 in cash and jewels at gunpoint. They are all three in county jail under bonds of \$50,000 each awaiting preliminary hearings.

None of the stolen jewels or cash have been recovered. At first it had been thought that there were only two men involved, but later evidence pointed to a third man.

The Buchanan police have been working along with the county sheriff's department investigating clues and suspects.

A Minute With Mary

Care of Continuous-Cleaning Ovens
Some very valuable information is contained in the Task Force Report on Suggested Use and Care Guidelines for All Continuous-Cleaning Oven Surfaces done by the Procelain Enamel Institute, Inc.

DO'S
1. Always see that the bottom of the oven is protected from spillovers. Continuous-cleaning ovens are designed to promote heat oxidation of soils by (a) many minute irregularities in the coating which in effect expand the surface area and spread the soil, causing it to oxidize faster, and (b) the action of certain ingredients in the coating. Major spillovers block both actions and inhibit the cleaning process. Placing a cookie sheet slightly larger than the baking dish on a lower rack or covering the bottom surface with heavy duty aluminum foil will help as long as the heating elements are not blocked.

2 If massive spills or spatters do occur, they should be cleaned up promptly -- regardless of the area.

3 Occasionally wipe out the whole interior surface with a nylon pad and plain water, then blot dry and run the oven for two hours at 475 degrees. This is a preventive procedure that can help the cleaning system "catch up" with accumulated grease and grime (It does use extra fuel energy though).

DON'TS
1. Never use commercial oven cleaners on a continuous-cleaning surface. It is best to avoid the use of any type of aerosol cleaner. What can be done is this: Once the oven has completely cooled, spray on an all-purpose spray-on wipe-off cleaner (such as "Fantastic," "409" or equivalent). Work the cleaner in with a nylon-bristle brush or nylon net pad. Leave the cleaner on the soiled area for 15-30 minutes. Then completely rinse with cold water. These cleaners volatilize very rapidly under heat and can leave a chalky residue which is difficult to remove.

2 In manual cleaning, do not use metallic soap pads, wire brushes, steel wool or any similar type abrasive cleaning aid. Not only are they likely to abrade the coating, but any metal filings left behind may affect the cleaning mechanism. Instead, use a stiff nylon brush, nylon net scrub ball or similar non-abrasive pad.

3 Also avoid the use of scouring powders. Any powdered cleanser can clog the tiny surface indentations so necessary to the continuous-cleaning system. It is very important to:
a. always apply spray-on wipe-off cleansers to a cooled down oven, and
b. to be sure that the cleaned area is thoroughly rinsed afterward. The residual stains that may be left are very difficult to get off after the oven surface is heated.

Continuous-cleaning ovens are not "miracles". The user still has to do some work in keeping them clean. The first and most important step in oven cleaning is careful cooking, avoiding spill-overs, etc.

Wake Up, America

Life for many Americans is probably a routine which begins and ends each day without event. Can you imagine what might happen if some morning Mr and Mrs Complacency were to awaken and hear, "American Agriculture is Declared Bankrupt -- No longer able to produce." That's right -- no more food supply. The last true bastion of free enterprise bankrupt. Why? Because the cost of producing is greater than the income received from selling the product.

President Ford mentioned during a recent speech, "No city, no state or no family can constantly spend more than it takes in." Oddly enough, this applies to an industry as well.

Agriculture is being bombarded from all sides. Legislators from metropolitan constituencies and professional bureaucrats who have a limited knowledge of the agricultural sector are constantly devising new methods of increasing the cost of doing business. As an example, revisions in the Workmen's Compensation Law could double or possibly triple premium costs. Time and one-half wages for agricultural workers and elimination of piece rates as a mode of payment are more examples. OSHA regulations, pesticide restrictions and increasing labor work rules are only further examples of the same syndrome.

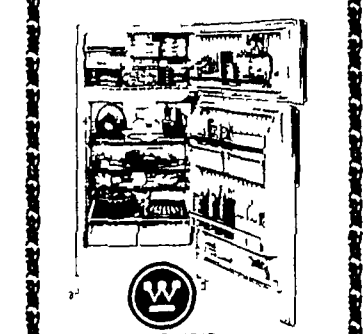
Rising costs of doing business plague many businesses today. However, farmers, unlike other businessmen, cannot pass these costs of operation on to the consumer. As a result, profits in agriculture continue to decline.

It's that decreasing net income in spite of record investments in land, equipment and supplies that's creating the bind that worries many agricultural experts. That's the kind of situation that leads to bankruptcy.

A society with a bankrupt agriculture really has a routine day -- just one hungry minute after another.

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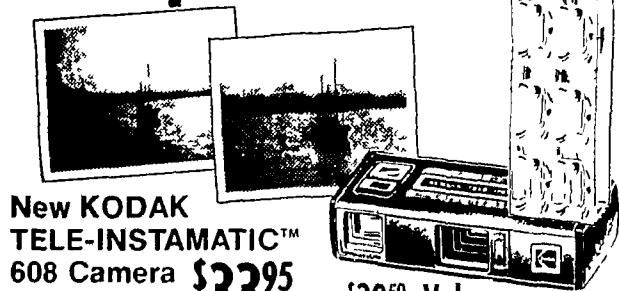
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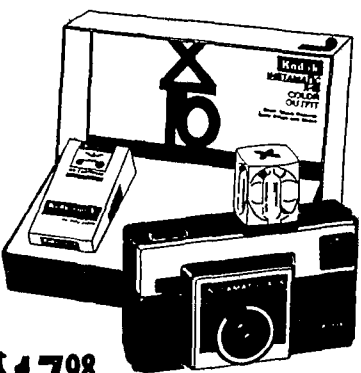
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Two Ovations For Weldy

From the first notes of the soothing Bach-busoni "Ich Ruf' zu dir" and "In dir ist Freude", through the lyrical Brahms "Intermezzo", the fantastic Beethoven "Appassionata", Gershwin's well loved "Preludes for Piano", the romantic Debussy "L'Isle Joyeuse", building up to the Rachmaninoff "Prelude - B minor, Op. 32, No. 10" and finally the impressive Liszt "Funeralles" he proved the perfection of technique and interpretation that enabled him to be the 1975 Grinnell Foundation Grant winner and the current Cranbrook Music Guild, Bloomfield Hills, Betty Brewster Award recipient.

The crystal clear notes, every nuance of each phrase, reflected the superb mastery Mr. Weldy exercised from the tip of the toe on the pedal to the brain that controlled the expressions coming from the heart which flowed so faultlessly from his strong and facile fingers. Standing ovations were given for the first half of the program which was climaxed with the Beethoven "Appassionata", as well as for the "Funeralles" which won him the award, and closed the Tuesday night program. Despite such a heavy program, Mr. Weldy graciously responded to his audience's appreciation with the moving Debussy "Clair de Lune" as an encore.

Frederick Weldy's career began to expand six years ago. At that time, Buchanan High School Junior, he became the recipient of the first full Interlochen National Music Camp Campership presented by the Niles Music Club Scholarship Committee. Impressed administrators at the camp opened doors for a second campership the following year from Interlochen itself. This led to his becoming the only University of Michigan undergraduate music student of Dr. Marion Owen, whose students ordinarily are only those working on their Masters or Doctorates. From that time, Dr. Owen was the major guiding factor in Mr. Weldy's progress until he was prepared to compete for the coveted Grinnell Foundation Grant given by the Grinnell Piano Company.

When the Niles Music Club Scholarship Committee established the "Josephine Kelley Memorial Scholarship" in memory of her work and that of the many others who made the Scholarship Program a working entity, it was fitting that Mr. Weldy, Josephine's former student, should once more be the first recipient.

To have attained such a degree of musical maturity at such an early age, twenty-two year old Mr. Weldy can truly be an inspiration for young people aspiring to accomplishments of the highest order.

Not since Van Cliburn, the noted International Tchaikovsky Award winner astounded people of the Michiana area when appearing with the South Bend Symphony Orchestra, has such an outstanding talent been presented in the vicinity. It is a privilege for Buchanan to claim Fred as our home town boy - our "rising star"!

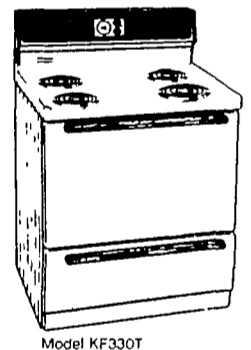

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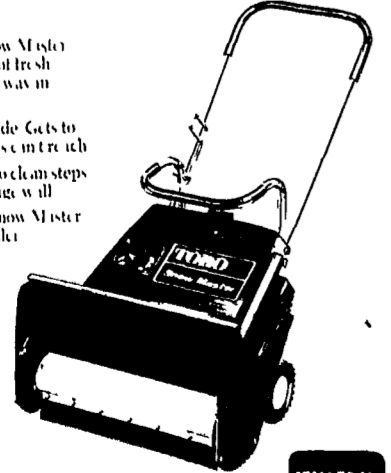

Trees Of Many Countries In Girl Scout Display



During the Sunday afternoon Girl Scout Bicentennial observance at the Teen Center "Christmas is the Birthday of Freedom" accompanied by a reunion of former members, a special presentation was made to honor the memory of the late Maude Slate, who was instrumental in the founding of Girl Scouting in Buchanan.

Mrs. Duane Koenig, chairman of the event, is shown presenting a bust of Girl Scout founder Juliette Low to Leo Slate, the brother of Maude, and himself a tireless, perennial leader of Boy Scouting as Scoutmaster of Troop 541. The Slates' contribution to scouting in this area is immeasurable. The bust will be on display permanently in the Buchanan Public Library as a memorial to Maude Slate in appreciation of her over 26 years of devoted service to the young people of this community.

The Buchanan Teen Center was turned into a veritable fairyland setting last Sunday for the Bicentennial observance of the Ox-Li Girl Scouts with girls from Buchanan and Galien presenting together Christmas is the Birthday of Freedom Special guests at the event were former girl scouts who were invited to attend the festivities.

During past weeks the many area troops have been working to prepare Christmas tree ornaments representative of various countries. Trees were then decorated in the manner used in Holland, Brazil, England, Mexico, Germany, Sweden, Norway, Italy, Lithuania, Ukraine and France with the addition of three others, an Advent tree and two for this country — one typical of the USA today and the other an Early American Bicentennial tree. Program books gave evidence of considerable research as Christmas customs of the various countries were given in detail.

It was obvious to all attending, the display was opened to the public on Monday and Tuesday nights, that considerable work and thought had gone into the unusual creations festooning the

Phone Calls Will Be Heavy

Michigan Bell is predicting that state residents will make more than one million long distance calls on Christmas Day.

Because Christmas is traditionally one of the busiest calling holidays of the year, the telephone company is advising customers to schedule their calls during the less busy hours.

On Christmas Day itself, early morning or afternoon calls have a better chance of going right through. "This means you will be better off phoning before 8 a.m. or between 1 and 5 p.m. in the time zone of the family or friends you are calling," according to Wanda Shirley, local Michigan Bell manager.

Callers can avoid the Christmas Day rush by phoning earlier in the week or before 6 p.m. on Christmas Eve, she said. If customers do not have the phone number they need in a distant city, they should call Information in the distant city before the

holiday rush. "And for the lowest possible rates, dial your own calls," Mrs. Shirley said. "Direct dial rates — no matter what the hour — are lower than operator-assisted rates."

The majority of Michigan long distance Christmas calls are expected to be made to other points within the state. The company anticipates about 515,000 long distance calls within the state and another 512,000 calls to other states, she noted. Nationwide, the Bell System is expecting holiday callers to make a record total of about 13.7 million interstate calls this year, including about 500,000 overseas calls.

Across the country, the telephone industry rearranges circuits generally used for heavy business day calling to make available a maximum number of transmission paths for Christmas calls.

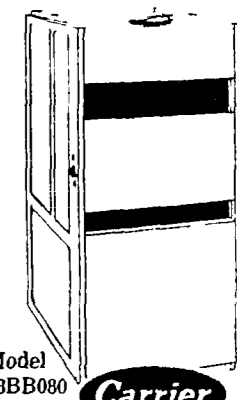

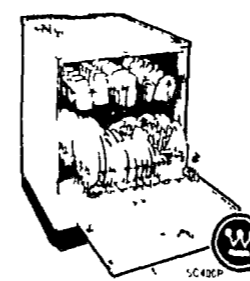



Board of Education Minutes

The Board of Education, Buchanan Community Schools, Berrien County, Michigan, held its regular monthly meeting Monday, December 8, 1975 at the high school building. Members present David Hanson, William Moon, Jeannette Mahan, Richard Rossow, Mary Beth Larson, and Robert Luke. Absent: Paul DeVos. The President hereby declares that six Board Members are present and one (Mr DeVos) is absent. Also present Administration, members of the press, SRA Delegate, and 4 visitors. President Hanson called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m., welcomed visitors, and asked for questions or comments from the audience. There being none, the regular agenda was initiated. Minutes of the November 17 meeting were approved as presented.

Motion by Member Rossow, seconded by Member M an, that bills in the amount of \$195,688.95 (of which \$171,719.91 is for two payrolls) be approved for payment. Unanimously carried.

Under Old Business, there was nothing new to report on the Middle School traffic study. The city has done some surveying in the area of the Rynearson Road traffic hazard. There is nothing further to report on written Board policies. Correspondence from the Warren Holmes Company (Ottawa School architect) was noted regarding the roof repair, and a reply concerning language clarification is awaited. A letter of appreciation was sent to the JC's in respect to the offer of assistance in repairing Memorial Field's public address system, and Paul Montgomery was chosen to work with the JC representative in evaluating the present sound system.

Motion by Member Larson, seconded by Member Rossow, that the eight-semester graduation requirement be waived in the case of Miss Tom Robards, allowing her to graduate with her class in June, 1976, providing, however, that the prescribed coursework is completed satisfactorily. Unanimously carried.

Let the official minutes show that Board Member DeVos arrived at 8 p.m.

After lengthy discussion, a motion was made by Member Larson, seconded by Member Luke, that a 1976 4-wheel-drive pickup truck be purchased from Gene Wesner Chevrolet, Inc., for \$6,044. Motion carried with a five-to-one majority vote, Member Moon casting the negative vote.

The Business Manager reported that all paperwork on the sale of the Howe School building will be completed by the end of December.

Under New Business, the Business Manager requested that appointment of an auditor for the calendar year be tabled to the January meeting. The request was approved.

The Business Manager reported that budget cuts had been initiated which would realize a savings of \$11,175, such amount to be applied to deficit areas of the general budget. He also requested permission to present a more detailed report at the January meeting.

The Board President appointed the Superintendent as official coordinator for implementation of the Title IX Educational Amendment.

The High School Principal's annual report to the Board and the Business Manager's report on unemployment compensation were read and filed.

Meeting adjourned at 9:15 p.m.

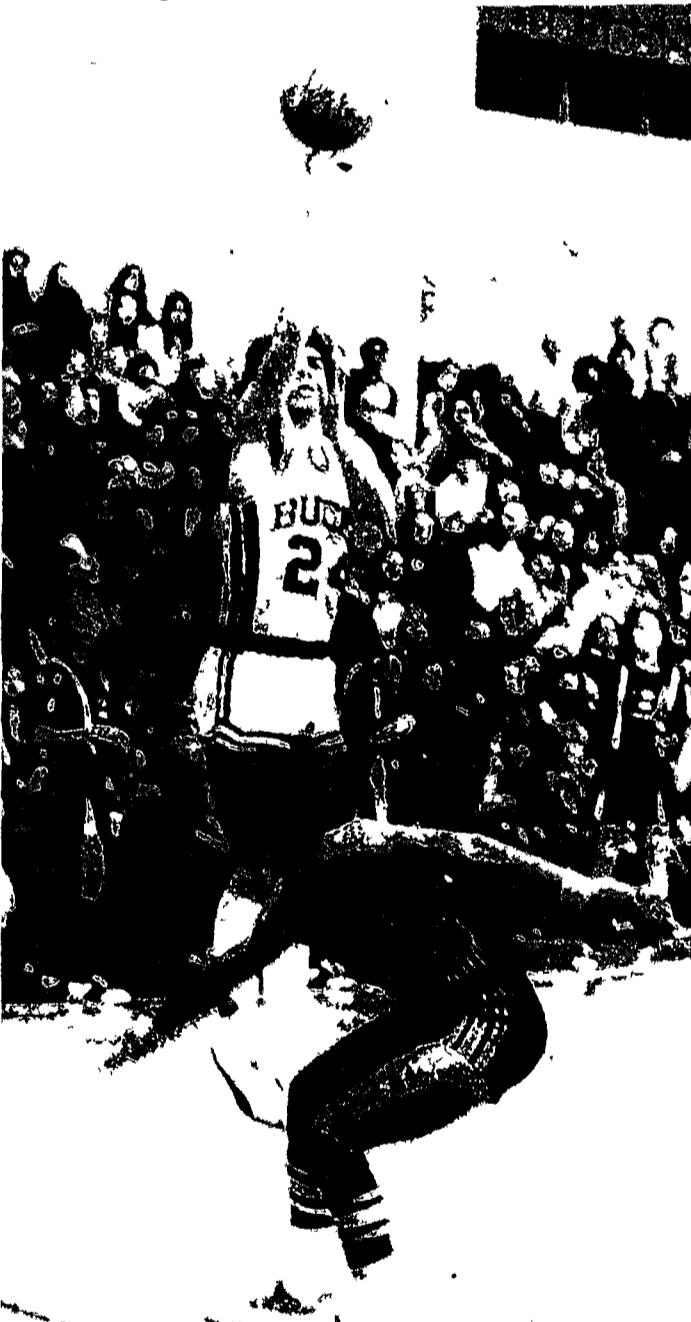

Bucks Make It Four In A Row

After winning two games on the road the Buck basketball team returned home last Friday to defeat Coloma 79-58. Playing their second home game, Buchanan found that victory never comes too easy no matter where they play, as the Comets were not push overs.

Center Ken Garrett controlled the opening tip giving Buchanan the prime opportunity to score, but they were soon to find out they just couldn't walk all over Coloma. Walt Vanderbush finally broke the ice scoring the first two baskets of the game. Garrett was already showing a preview of his performance pulling down most of the teams rebounds. Gerald Busby played an outstanding game also grabbing rebounds and scoring effectively when called upon. The first quarter ended with Buchanan on top 16-7.

Action picked up in the second quarter as Buchanan moved their man to man defense to a zone to control Coloma's drive and force them into outside shooting. It seemed that the Bucks might have early foul trouble when Ken Garrett and Mike Busby picked up three and two fouls respectively before the second quarter was finished. Good rebounding defensively was the factor that held the Comets from catching up to Buchanan and not giving them the second and third opportunity at the basket. The Bucks were positively able to control their opponent throughout the whole first half going into the locker room with a 33-18 lead. An interesting statistic for the first half is the comparison of free throws. Coloma made two of eight while Buchanan hit five of five, all by Gerald Busby.

Once more Ken Garrett controlled the tip, but this time followed it with the first two baskets of the second half as the team moved back to its man to man defense. Mike Busby received his fourth foul and was released from action by coach Bill Wilson. During the third quarter the Bucks had trouble holding Coloma's drive to the basket as they began to work the ball inside for the close shots. Buchanan however, did not fall behind. They just picked up the speed of their own play to score as often as Coloma did. A lot of the action in the third period was back and forth but Buchanan was yet to be out done, finishing

on top 56-36 at the end of the quarter.

Going into the fourth quarter the Bucks were holding the upper hand on the game. Efficient team work seemed to be lacking and it was this factor that hurt the play of Buchanan. Coming back into the game, Mike Busby along with Ken Garrett, started to break this barrier as they responded by passing off to each other becoming a deadly combination. Having a wide enough margin of lead to satisfy himself coach Wilson substituted the second string into the game, with five minutes left in the quarter. Although there is great strength on the second team, they too had trouble controlling Coloma but finished out the game for Buchanan. High point men for Buchanan were Ken Garrett with 22, Gerald Busby 17, and Walt Vanderbush 16. Commenting on the game afterwards Wilson said, "We looked good at times, but we're not playing the team ball we should. Gary Jones had a good game along with Gerald Busby, who did a heck of a job. Ken Garrett also played a great game and dominated the board whenever he was on the floor."

The Gardeners' Corner

Q. The lower leaves on some of my houseplants are turning yellow and dropping off. What could be the problem? (I water them every three or four days, just like I did all summer.)

A. Unless you are growing your plants under artificial light, they are not growing as fast as they did during the summer. Therefore, they do not need as much water or fertilizer as they needed then. Rather than watering on a regular schedule, water when the soil feels dry to the touch.

Q. My dumbcane has lost a lot of its lower leaves. Is there anything I can do to make it fill out again?

A. Your best bet is to propagate a new plant from the old one by air-layering. With this technique you encourage a plant to generate roots from a section of the stem. After the roots form, you cut off the plant with its new roots and repot it, eliminating that length of ugly, bare stem.

Begin by making a slanting cut one third to one-half through the stem where you want the roots to form. If you cut too deeply, you may weaken the stem and will have to stake it to keep it from falling over.

Insert a wooden match or toothpick sideways into the cut to hold it open. Apply a rooting hormone in the cut to encourage root formation.

Thoroughly wet a handful of sphagnum moss and squeeze excess moisture out so the moss is damp but not dripping. Then wrap the moss completely around the cut portion of stem, forcing it into the cut, and secure it with several tight wraps of twine. Then cover the moss ball completely with polyethylene plastic and tie it above and below the moss ball with twine.

Examine the moss weekly and add a small amount of water if it is drying out. Be sure to replace the plastic and tie it tightly after each check.

Continue to care for the plant as usual. It may take anywhere from one month to six or eight months for roots to form. When you can see many white roots through the plastic, remove the covering and cut the new plant away from the parent plant just below the mass of roots. Pot it in a new container and set it out of direct sun for a week or two and mist daily. After the plant has established itself in its new pot, move it to its permanent place and care for it as usual.

Need Volunteers For Work With Area Youth

The Volunteer Program of the Youth Service Bureau is in need of several male volunteers in the Buchanan area. A volunteer

works independently of the Bureau, coordinating his available time with that of his match. He is asked for a time commitment of three to six months only, to insure the youth with a sense of security within the match.

The Youth Service Bureau is a county-wide agency which was created to form a non-coercive, non-punitive alternative to the juvenile justice system. Five workers are utilized throughout the county, two for the South Berrien County area.

The counselors contact youth who have been referred by agencies, friends, or concerned citizens. The monthly average for new clients is 70. The ongoing caseload is 30 to 40 youth per counselor. Very few clients receive in-depth counseling because of the time element. This is why volunteers are so valuable to the bureau.

A volunteer can expect to receive two hours of training including viewing a film and a filmstrip, pertinent to one-to-one relationships. Role identity problems will be discussed. The volunteer is run through a police check, and interviewed by the coordinator before the match and coached throughout the duration of the match. In-service training and discussion groups are held monthly to insure the Bureau contact with the volunteers.
