Theoretical safe driving will be taught in a regular class hour by Earl Rizer, who will then give driver training outside regular school hours. A fee which will in part cover the cost to the school will be charged. The amount has not yet been agreed on. Instruction will be limited to twenty students per semester.

Earl Rizer qualified as a driving instructor in 1939, and attended the University of Michigan last

week for a refresher course. Local automobile dealers had volunteered to furnish cars for the driving lessons.

Remember - The Polio Drive Is Still On

All Buchanans are urged to remember that the special Polio Fund drive remains on with a canvass now on through the mails and canisters in local stores.

Buchanan had some very pointed experience with polio in the past year, when one of the most brilliant and promising of the senior class was stricken. He is now slowly but surely recovering, but his recovery is due to the aid of costly treatment and equipment which could have been financed only through the receipts from the March-of-Dimes.

A chief reason for the special drive is the increasing percentage of the more severely paralyzed patients. Iron lungs and other respiratory equipment have meant the chance of survival for 1,000 polio patients.

3-Car Accident Results In Slight Injuries To Four

Kathryn Bender of Niles, who was following behind stopped her car by slamming on the brakes. The third car, driven by Mrs. Bowerman, failed to stop and crashed into the rear end of the Bender car.

Mrs. Bowerman incurred a slight cut and bruises over the left eye and on the eyelid. Three children riding in her car also received slight injuries. Ronnie Stone, 5, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tony Stone, 809 W. Front street, was thrown clear of the Bowerman car onto the pavement, suffering body bruises and possible shock. Vera Walls, 5, suffered a slight nose injury, facial bruises and shock. Jackie Walls, 4, incurred shock and confusion of the upper lip. The latter are children of Mr. and Mrs. Judd Walls, Liberty Ave., Buchanan. Kathryn Walls received possible neck injuries but refused medical attention. Her car received slight damages in the rear. The Bowerman car received frontal damages but both left the scene of the accident without the aid of wreckers.

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Only \$10,000 More Needed To Make Dream Of New Library Building A Reality

City Buys Land For Future Site Storage Tower

The city commission took a long look ahead at the regular meeting Monday night in buying two adjoining parcels of land on Moccasin avenue.

A parcel with a Moccasin frontage of 41 1/2 feet and a length westward of 330 feet was bought from Mrs. Elietta Littrell to secure an area for a street opening westward later.

Another parcel 82 1/2 x 100 feet in dimensions was bought from Arthur Voorhees. This extends along the southern side of the west end of the Littrell property, the two being the site at a future date for a water storage tank to be built within the next five years, for the purpose of equalizing water pressures all over the city for more adequate fire protection.

Action was deferred by the commission Monday night on a proposal for an open ditch along the west side of Memorial Field, to carry off flood water from the Terre Coupe and West Roe street areas to McCoy's creek.

The idea was introduced by City Manager Omans, as a possible solution to the dilemma of the Terre Coupe and West Roe and Colonial Gardens area, where storm sewer installations have been barred to date, because of the cost of a trunk-sewer outlet from the area to McCoy's creek.

The city would assume the cost of making the open ditch, and costs of property owners for installation of storm sewers on Terre Coupe and West Roe were estimated at \$2.25 a front foot.

Fire Department Makes 2 Runs

The city fire department made two runs to rubbish fires at the city dump Sunday, one at 1:30 a.m. and the other in the afternoon. The flames had eaten back under the dirt filling.

The drive for funds for a new library building in Buchanan is now under way, the dates bracketing the effort being Aug. 23 thru Sept. 10.

The Buchanan Library Building Fund Committee, named last spring to organize the campaign, has laid its plans carefully, and \$37,000 or over 75% of the estimated cost has already been gathered in from a relative few, headed by the Clark Equipment's gift of \$20,000. The total estimated expenditure has been broken down by the committee as follows: building, \$36,000; architect supervision, \$2,100; land site (already purchased), \$2,100; landscaping, \$2,000; furnishings, \$2,000; drive and parking lot, \$2,800.

When the present library was organized there was considerable complaining over the fact that provision for a home for the institution had not been made, as it had in much smaller neighboring towns. But now we are fortunate that we can build entirely new. There has been a great deal of progress in the art of combining utility and appearance in public buildings.

The structure we are about to build will be permanent in the sense that it might function for a century or more, with possible enlargements foreseen in the library plans. So the fund we are raising is not an annual recurrence, it is "for always." Those who are shaping the effort would like to see the financial structure have a comparatively broad base, given by many donors large and small. So, if you cannot give much, we welcome your "little." Your money will be respected. It will be "your building" in a special sense.

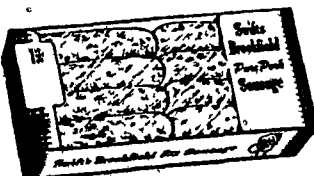

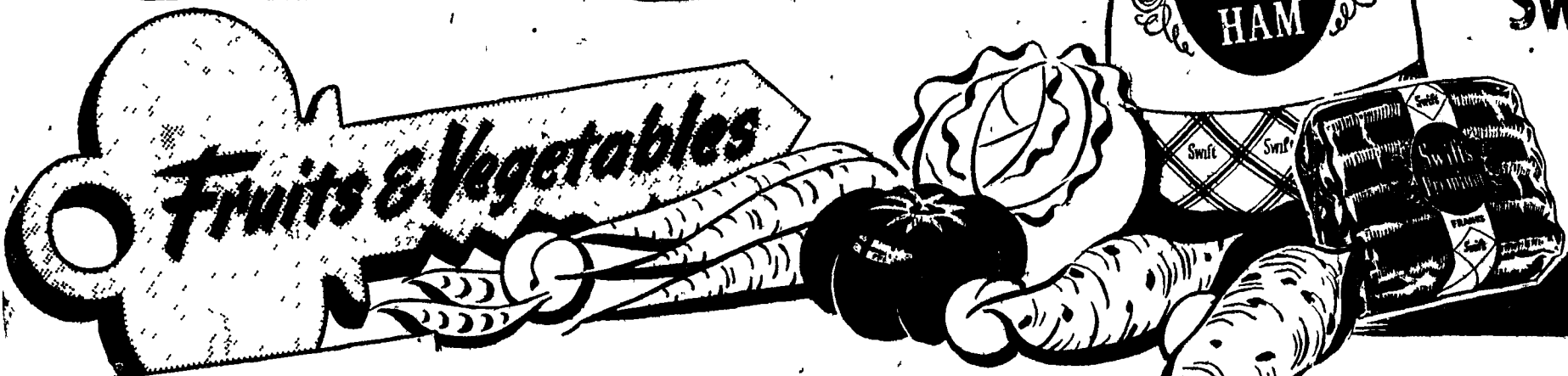

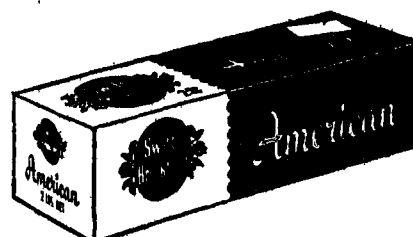

Court house round-up

ST. JOSEPH, MICH.—He looked young and he laughed easily, like one who looks young should. His black hair and twinkling eyes failed to belie his age.

But Harry King was 63, and his age caught up with him this week.

Harry, one of the veterans among veterans on the Berrien county Board of Supervisors, died suddenly at his Sodus township home Sunday afternoon. He succumbed to a heart attack.

Strangely, Harry King died in the same house in which he was born, the same house in which his family has occupied for five generations. The Kings through all those years were prominent Sodus township fruit growers, and Harry continued that tradition.

But Harry did his ancestors one better. He also took an active part in civic and governmental affairs.

That same Sodus township which has known the King name so long has been represented over the past quarter-century on the Berrien county board of supervisors by Harry. And, of course, as supervisor, Harry was the presiding officer over the township's own governing body, the township board.

Harry went even further. Part of those years as a member of the Board of Supervisors, he served as its chairman. At the time of his death, he was chairman of the important roads and bridges committee.

Nor was Harry one to sit back and let others talk when the board convened. Never a meeting passed but what he had something to say about the issues at hand.

The board will be cognizant of that void when it convenes in regular session Sept. 13.

A little known, but legally necessary group served two weeks at hard labor in the Berrien county courthouse this month, but everyone who reads the papers knew the answers they were seeking before they ever started.

It was the Berrien county Board of Canvassers, the body that has the job after each county election of tallying the ballots cast in Berrien's 68 voting precincts. The figures they come up with are recorded as the official election tally.

Election night tallies are strictly unofficial, but this time, as usual, there was no significant change in the figures. There were adjustments, a few votes up or down here and there. But the end result left the candidates' standings just as they were election night.

It showed that a total of 11,314 ballots had been cast in the Aug. 3 primary for the office of governor—the nearest thing to a total vote count to come out of the official canvass. It also left Berrien's political complexion unchanged. There were 9,299 ballots cast for the four Republican gubernatorial candidates and only 2,515 for the unopposed Democratic incumbent, G. Mennen Williams.

Nor did it narrow the gaps between winner and loser in the two primary races that did manage to generate some heat. Both of them were on the Republican side of the primary ballot.

Election night returns gave incumbent county treasurer Alfred Bartz a 6,180 to 4,989 edge over former Sheriff Al J. Hastings, who was trying to unseat the veteran Bartz. The official canvass gave the election to Bartz by 6,141 to 5,026.

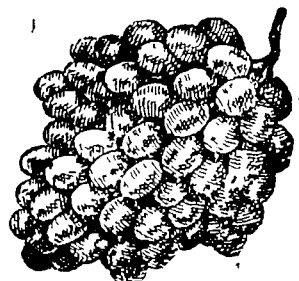

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I. & M. Employees See Demonstrations Of Extinguishers

The accompanying pictures are illustrative of the instructions and instructions, given to the employees of the Buchanan district of the Indiana & Michigan Electric company at the company pole-yard on North Portage, Thursday of last week.

The lecturer was R. J. Hoffman, battalion chief in charge of the instruction Bureau of the South Bend Fire Department. The fireman assisting him in the demonstration (at left) was John Lawosz, member of Engine 21, South Bend Fire Department.

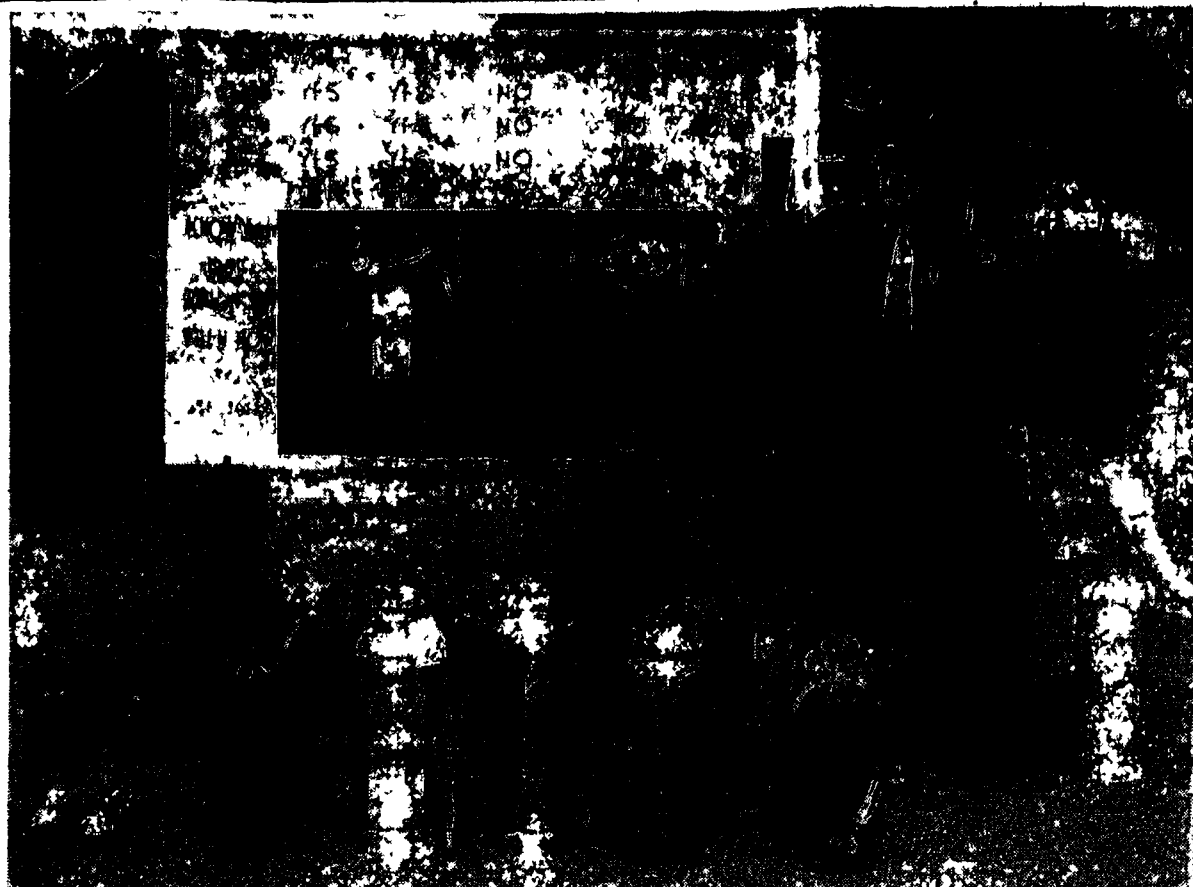
The demonstrations were confined to the correct use of fire extinguishers for the various classifications of fires. In the larger picture is a display board

which analyzes the types and use. Examples of fire extinguisher types are stationed in an inset in the display board. On the ground below are seen the same extinguishers to be used in the demonstrations.

The chart loses some of its effectiveness in the illustrations because of the smallness and dimness of the wording at the extreme upper left hand corner, listing the classifications of fires. The classifications read as follows:

Class A: Rubbish, wood, paper.
Class B: Oil, grease, gasoline.
Class C: Electric
Class D: Motor vehicle

The "yes" or "no" signifying approval or disapproval of the types used are listed across according to type of fire and up and down according to types of extinguishers, which are designated, left to right: PYRENE,



PRESSURE PYRENE, SODA-ACID, FOAMITE, CO2 (Carbon Dioxide)

In the picture at right Fireman John Wilosz, is using a Foamite extinguisher, designated as the best for extinguishing fires in oil confined to a tank.

Wilosz has just shot the first application low, causing a flare-up in a fire playing on the surface of oil confined in an open pan. He then raised the aim, covering the flames with a blanket of Foamite, which is the best manner of extinguishing oil and gasoline fires. The blanket cuts off oxygen, without which fires, like people, suffocate.

Foamite is listed as efficient in all types of fires except where electricity is the consuming agent. Electricity is not affected by cutting off the oxygen supply.

Two Auto Races At State Fair

National Championship Stock Car Events On Sept. 4 and 12

Two national championship stock car races at the Michigan State Fair will mark the opening of the State Fair, grandstand and track now being completely rebuilt.

Charles Scharf, veteran promoter of State Fair races, has scheduled a 100-mile feature for Saturday afternoon, Sept. 4, and the 250-mile "Circuit of Champions" New Car Classic on Sunday afternoon, Sept. 12.

Scharf also announced an "auto beauty contest" to be held in connection with the 100-mile Sept. 4 race. Competing will be both American and foreign custom-built cars and well-kept older and unusual cars.

The mile oval already has been completely rebuilt with new blue clay which, according to Scharf, has made it the finest clay mile track in the country.

The uncovered portion of the grandstand, condemned earlier this year, will be brand-new including new seats. The other portion also is being renovated.

Scharf said that because of the new clay track he expects the track record of 4 hours and 12 minutes, set last year, will be broken this year. The nation's leading drivers will be on hand for both races, according to Scharf, who has been receiving entries and making arrangements for both races for the past month.

Inside The Capitol

by Clair L. Taylor, Superintendent of Public Instruction

Reorganization of school districts is going on at a pace unequalled in the history of Michigan. In 1930, there were 8,700 school districts in the state. 20 years later in 1950, the number was down to 4,918. Districts were joining together at the rate of about 110 per year.

This year 1954 the number in operation is 4,237 or a reduction of about 700 in four years. Actually, since January 1, districts have been disappearing at the rate of one per day. There are several reasons for reorganization; the first one is the Area Studies Act passed by the Legislature. This Act sets up machinery for citizens to study their own educational problems at the local level. This act of the Legislature has proved to be a most constructive step in developing sound economic and efficient school districts. There are several other reasons why the reorganization program is going ahead. A few years ago, towns, villages, and city schools were out searching for children to fill their buildings. Today, with enrollments going up at the rate of 70,000 per year, parents are finding it difficult to locate schools that will accept their children. Another reason for reorganization is the fact that there is more interest in education among all citizens. G.I.'s who returned from World War II discovered there was a definite edge in favor of the boys who had a high school education and an added advantage for those who were college trained. These G.I.'s today are parents of children. They are demanding better schools than they had for themselves. Business and industry, too, are set-

more time in the reorganization of its school districts, but it is my belief we are doing it on a sound educational basis, preserving strong local control of the school districts. Michigan is on the march and in the end its children and youth will be the winners.

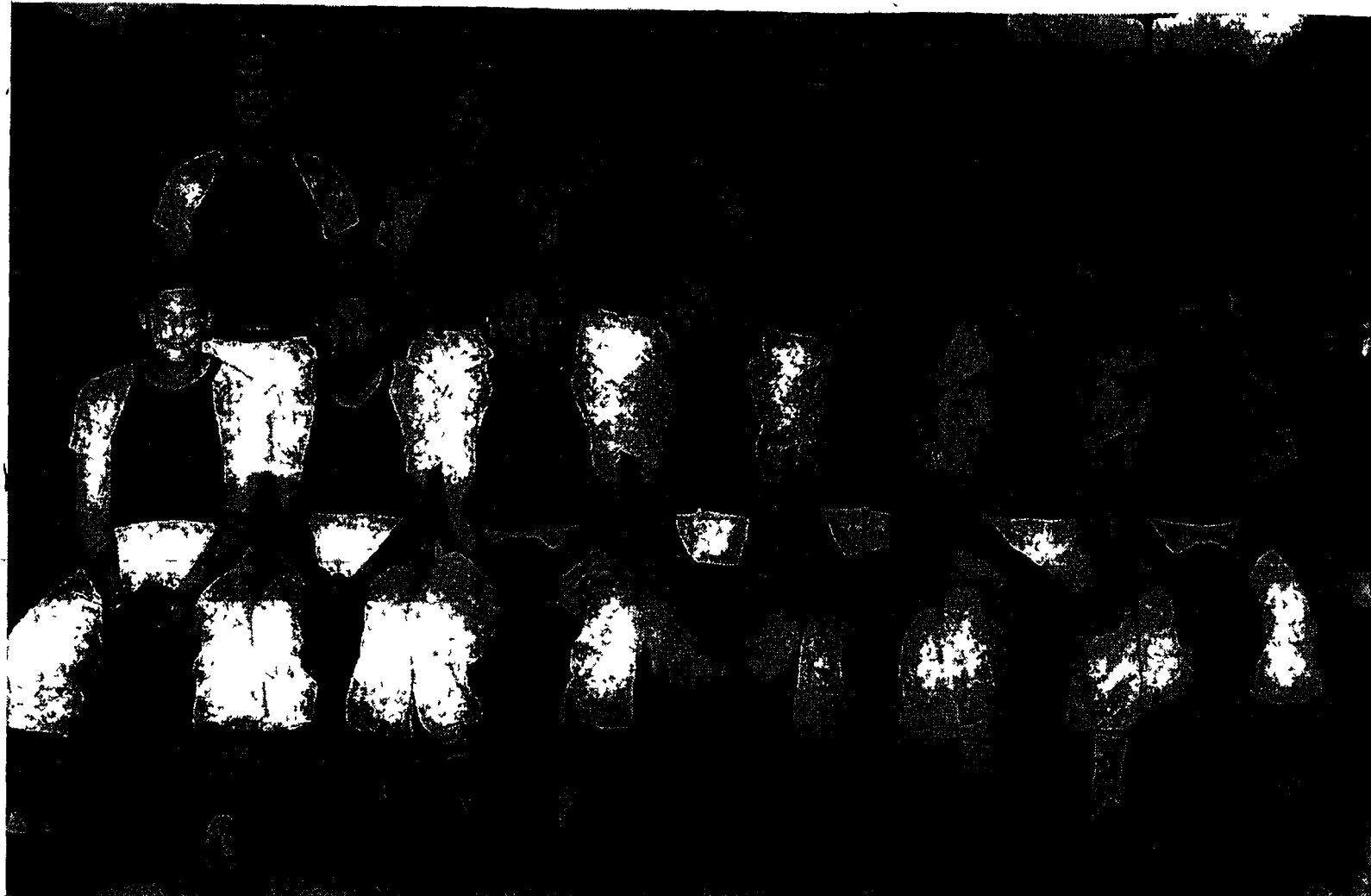

Michigan Public Service Commission Guards Rights of Individuals

Think you were treated unfairly by a mover? The gas or electric company? Do you think the telephone company should give better service for the rate you pay?

If your sentiment is justified, you have a powerful ally to enforce a fair settlement.

Standing guard over the rights of individuals in such cases is the state Public Service Commission.

When a consumer becomes dissatisfied with a grocery or hardware store, he can trade elsewhere. When he is dissatisfied with a utility, he has no such

alternative.

He can, however, appeal to the Public Service Commission. All they ask is that the complaint be made in writing. This eliminates misunderstanding and requires the complainant to spell out a specific charge.

If investigation proves a complaint to be groundless, the person who originated it receives a letter to that effect. But if there is reason to believe that it is justified, the Commission can order the agency involved to make adjustments. PSC also make new regulations that will prevent repetition.

But the Public Service Commission is designed to be fair to the agency serving the public as well. In addition to controlling utilities, PSC has jurisdiction of motor transportation, bus and freight lines that serve more than one municipal area. Besides making regulations to protect public safety, the Commission sets rates which shall be charged and must approve the financial stability of organizations that want to deal with the public.

The law provides for three commissioners appointed by the governor. At present only two are in office, and the vacancy will probably exist until after the fall election. It is natural to assume that the governor would appoint a Democrat while the Senate would prefer a Republican. No qualified person has turned up who will run the risk of a temporary appointment.

Issues could be deadlocked with only two commissioners, should each vote differently on an issue, but this has not caused serious trouble.

Commission verdicts can be taken to the courts if a party feels them to be unfair. They are considered in Ingham county Circuit Court or in the State Supreme Court.

Judges can confirm, or reverse the Commission's ruling, or send it back to PSC with a recommendation for restudy. The third road can be a face-saving device. Chairman of the Commission is John H. McCarthy, a Democrat from Mt. Clemens. Maurice E. Hunt, a Sault Ste. Marie businessman and a Republican, is the other member. Both now live in Lansing because the job requires a full working schedule.

Secretary of PSC is Sophus Lund, who has held the position since 1939 except for one year. He supervises the recording of the Commission's rulings and manages personnel.

"In general, the firms we control are most cooperative," said Mr. Lund. He described as an example, the activities of telephone companies. "Although there are more than 140 telephone companies doing business in Michigan," he said, "nearly 90% is done by the three big ones—Bell, General and Union."

"Sometimes, a very small firm will want to sell out and cannot find a buyer," he continued. "We can contact one of the big companies. They will establish a fair price, and make the purchase."

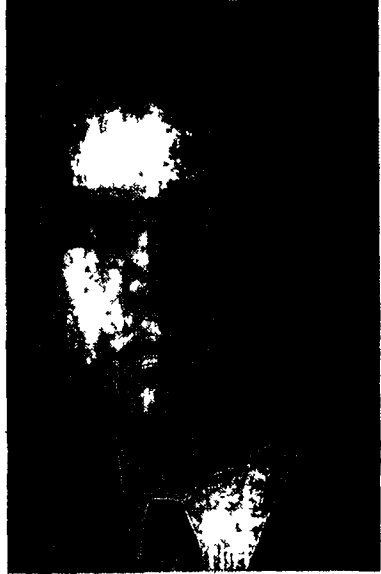
Commissioners set times for hearings and interested parties—from attorneys for large cities to individual customers—are allowed to present their views.

The Commission can also order rebates and sometimes does. In 1945 a general rebate to Bell's customers was ordered. It totaled \$10 million and took years to complete.

Enforcement officers of PSC patrol the roads. They stop trucks to be sure haulers are moving loads according to legal conditions.

The Commission thinks the motor transit operators welcome this enforcement. It protects the legitimate lines from "fly-by-night" truckers offering unfair competition because they do not observe the standards of safety or other requirements of the Commission.

Township Hall Opening Waits On Drives, Grounds

While the construction work is entirely completed on the new Buchanan township hall, lighting, plumbing and heating installations are not yet complete and much work remains on the grounds and entrances, states Ivan Price, township supervisor.

Plans are made for a graveled drive entrance on the north which will be primarily for the fire engine exit and entrance, plus room for firemen to park their cars. Supervisor Price stated that the "open house" would be delayed until these drives were complete and the landscape areas are seeded to grass, which may be some time in late September. The township board is still shopping with ideas for a fire signal. The idea of an air horn was given up after the board had heard from a rural fire company near Muskegon, Mich., which had tried it out and returned to the siren. The air horn blares at its full quota of decibels as soon as the signal is contacted, and remains at full volume. There was so much public protest, particularly to the start at full sound volume instead of building up like a siren that the Muskegon board had to revert to the latter signal.

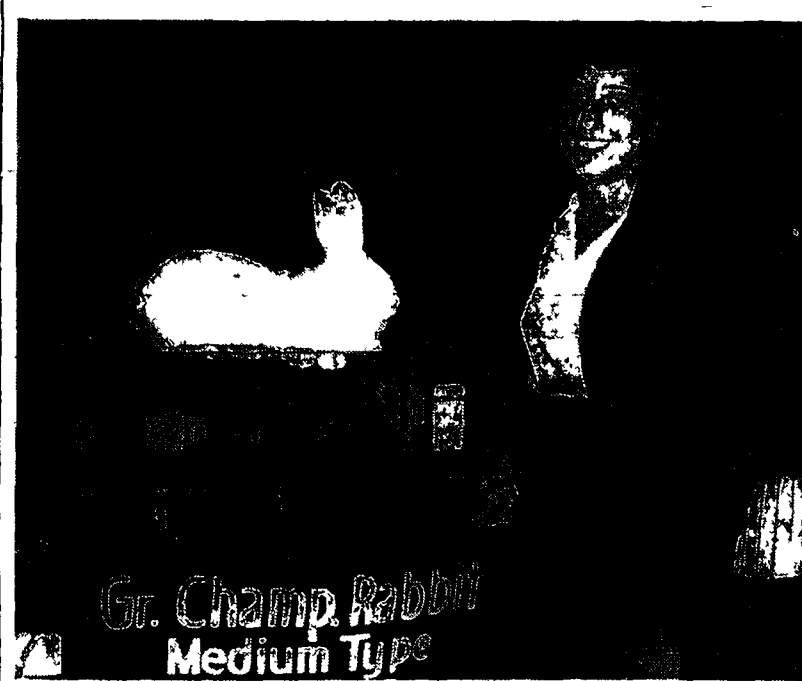

Check Support Law Before You Plant Wheat Says Co. Agt.

Before you plant wheat this fall better take a closer look at the new "cross-compliance" provisions of the farm price support law.

Under this ruling you will have to stay within your acreage allotment of all crops on your farm in 1955 to be eligible for supports on any crop. That is emphasized by Clarence Prentice, Michigan Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) administrator.

For example, this year if your wheat quota was 10 acres, you could still sell a 15-acre crop, but without price supports. Now, however, if you exceed your wheat quota you won't be able to get support prices on corn or any other supportable crop. Total acreage allotments will also be in effect for all farms which have more than 10 diverted acres in 1955. Diverted acres are those which have been forced out of production of cash crops by allotment restrictions.

For example, if you had to cut down more than 10 acres on your wheat crop you won't be able to shift these acres over to another cash crop. You will not be able to have more acres of cash crops this year than last.

You will have to leave the diverted acres idle or put them into hay, grass, or some other forage. The Agricultural Conservation

Program is helping farmers with cost-sharing to put these acres into soil building crops. Here again, a farmer will have to stay within the total acreage allotments for his farm to be eligible for any supports. Prentice adds that state ASC officials do not know as yet whether there will be other crops under allotment other than wheat and corn for 1955.

Wait For Hessian Fly-Free Date For Planting Wheat

Keep your seed wheat in a sack or a bin until you're sure the Hessian Fly will give you no trouble.

That's a suggestion from J. P. Hoeltzema, Berrien county agricultural agent. The fly-free date for Berrien county is Sept. 23, according to word from Ray Jones, Michigan State College extension entomologist.

The Hessian fly is one of the insects that attacks wheat in both fall and spring. The insect's larvae (maggots) feeds beneath the leaf sheath, usually next to the ground. That's the reason the fly is dangerous.

The fly overwinters in the "flaxseed" stage on the wheat. Maggots that come out of the "flaxseed" in the spring become

the flies that lay the eggs for the spring generation. The only way to control the insect is by planting wheat in the autumn after the late summer generation of the insects has died off. That prevents damage to the wheat in the fall from the maggots and cuts down on the number of flies overwintering for the spring generation.

Janes advises farmers who have been having trouble with Hessian fly to plant their wheat later than the fly-free date—if the wheat can make enough growth before its dormant period. A late fall, he explains, sometimes upsets the calculations on the fly-free date and some flies continue to lay eggs. Observing the fly-free date also helps avoid damage from some other insects, Jane says.

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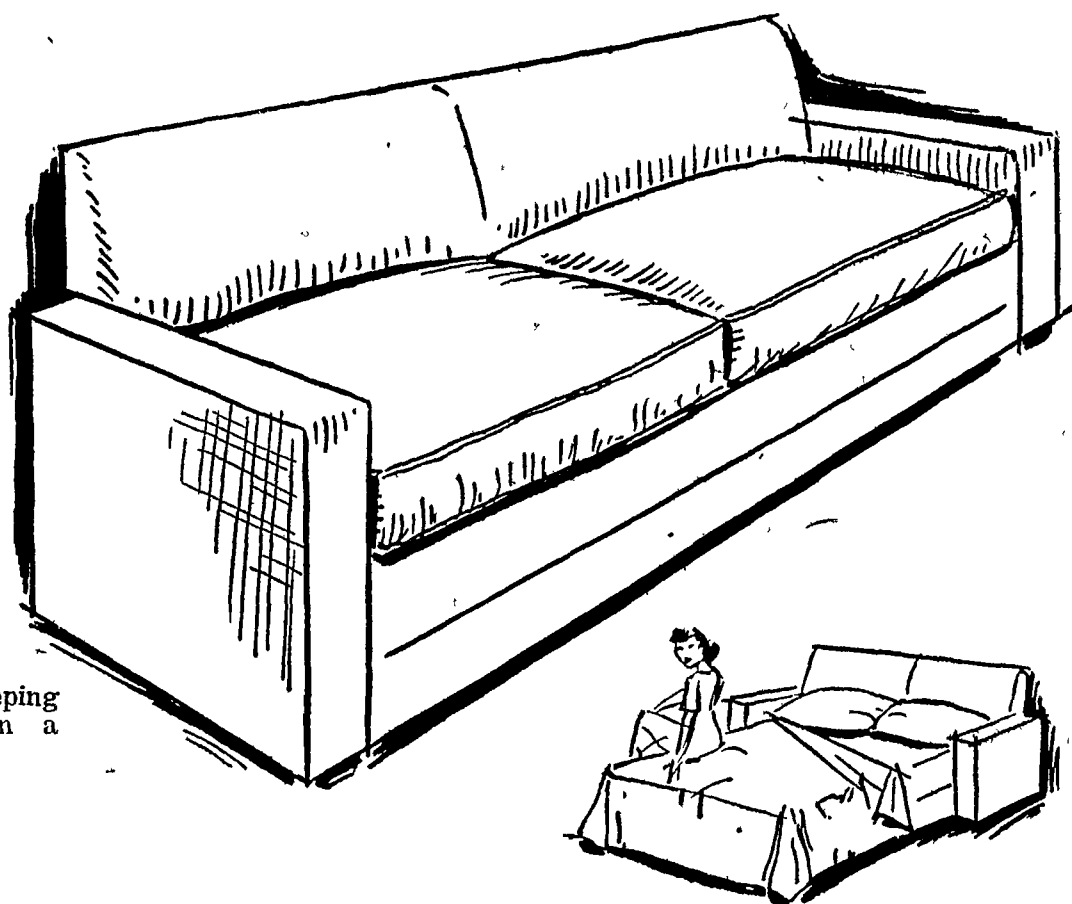
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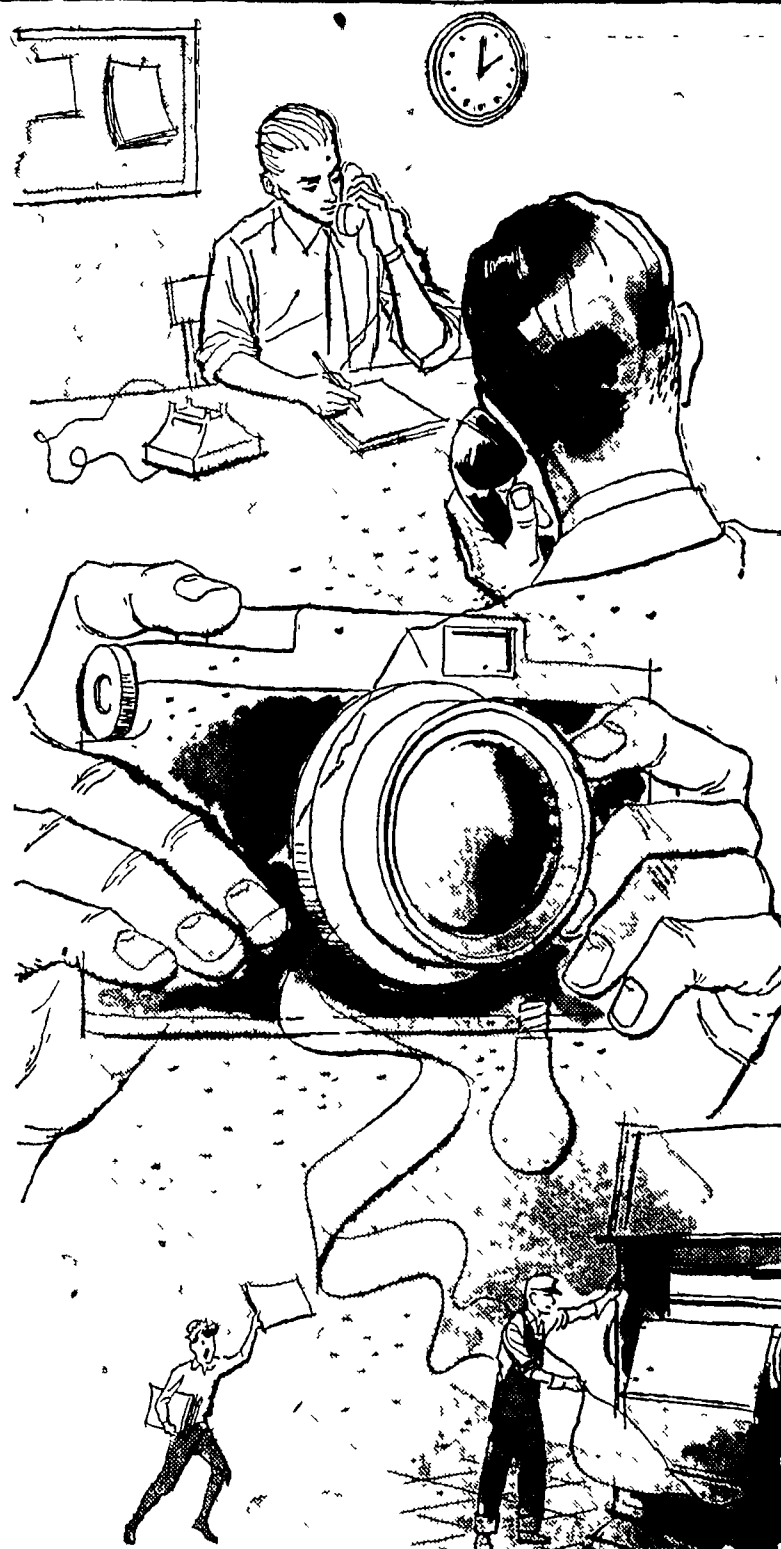
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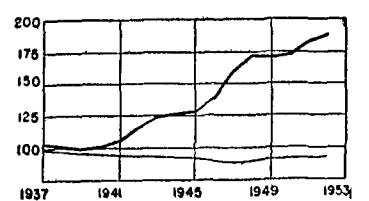

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Goodwill To U. S. Grows In Germ'y Says Col. Pears

Col. Richard W. Pears left Sunday for Elgin, Ill., for an overnight visit with his sister, Mrs. Hugh W. Blair (nee Gale Pears) before leaving Monday for his post of duty in Germany after a 6-week's vacation spent for the most part in his Buchanan home. He boarded a United Airlines plane at Chicago, Monday, for New York City, and there boarded a TWA plane at 6 p.m. for Frankfurt, Germany. He was scheduled to arrive at Frankfurt at 2 p.m. Tuesday of this week and to assume his duties at once as Airport Administrator at the Rhein-Main Airport. His wife and two sons, Ralph and Richard, will leave by boat from New York on Sept. 26 to join him at Frankfurt. His daughter, Marcia, will attend Vassar College. Life in Germany is relatively pleasant now, said Col. Pears. Relations between Germans and the occupying Americans have been

good since he went to Germany first in 1949 as a member of the U. S. Air Force to participate in the Berlin Airlift.

"I have never met with a single expression of hostility from a German, either toward me or toward the country I represent. Instead there has been a growing friendliness, especially with young people. The girl exchange student you had in Buchanan this past year was no exception in the matter of interest in America. The young people have an immense interest in everything that has to do with America and American ways of living and of doing things."

"I think that in general the American soldiers have been well-liked and have in general deported themselves in a way to make friends for their country. I believe that most Germans were, after all, trapped by Hitlerism, and now, especially the young, look toward America as their savior from Nazi rule."

When Col. Pears went to Germany in 1949, the people were still in a state of shock and deep discouragement. They were just beginning to show a will to dig themselves out from under the ruins of their defeat. Once started, their morale has grown tremendously, since what was a faint stirring of life and hope in 1949 has, in the five years since, mounted to near-miraculous reconstruction, both of morale and in the physical repair of war damage. There has been almost unbelievable progress in housing, business and factory rebuilding, and in the reconstruction of old and creation of new highways and modern traffic facilities.

The Germans are capable of maintaining a democracy in the opinion of Col. Pears. However, it would not be exactly the same sort as in the United States. They will accept more controls without rebellion or grumbling than Americans do. Their situation will likely make it necessary. Since Pears started residence there in 1949, it has seemed to him that the United States has far outstripped the Russians in winning the confidence and the friendship of the Germans. The bars were not up in 1949 between East and West Germany as they are now. In Berlin, even in 1950, large numbers of Germans from the Russian sector used to come across the dividing line in the evenings to attend the night clubs, even to attend cocktail parties of friends in West Berlin. Their presence could be detected by cars with East Berlin license plates. Since that time there has been a complete blockade of all travel between the two sectors. The only cars from East Germany are those seen at rare intervals carrying passengers for air lines to airports in West Germany.

Meet Your Merchant



One of the outstanding instances in Buchanan of a merchant who has been able to combine private success with a wide range of interests and participation in public affairs is Frank Poorman, owner and sole manager of Poorman's Home Store. Not all men are able to juggle the management of their business with executive duties in several organizations and public boards. It's something of a knack at that. In 1943 Poorman again enlarged his business to its present 30x120-ft. size. As his business grew and achieved a more solid footing, he began to devote more of his time to public relations. Best known and most significant is his 10 years' membership in the county board of supervisors, where his energy and ability have earned leading positions for him. He is now chairman of the Committee on Health and Welfare, which involved him in intimate relationships with the important departments of health and juvenile work of the county. He is vice-chairman of the Sheriff and Justice Committee. In his home town he has been in constant demand for leading positions in local organizations. He is now president of the Buchanan Lions club. Retired workers in Berrien county were getting, about 45.5% of the \$236,045.00 in old-age and survivors insurance payments being made monthly in the county at the end of last year, Clarence F. Lockwood, Berrien county representative of the social security office, reported today. Beneficiaries of all groups on the rolls in December totalled 5,426 in Berrien county, getting \$236,045.00 monthly, he said. This would be at a rate of \$2,822,540 annually. In making this announcement Mr. Lockwood released newly available figures showing the number of persons in the several beneficiary groups in the county and the total in benefits being paid. In December, 2,957 retired workers received a total of \$133,926; 853 aged wives and dependent husbands got \$23,810, a total of \$31,536 went to 943 children, including a few children of retired aged workers, 188 mothers with minor children in their care were receiving a total of \$7,337 monthly, and \$485 in survivors payments went to 12 dependent aged parents on the beneficiary rolls. 473 aged widows and widowers—\$18,951 monthly. Retired insured workers continued to be the largest group of beneficiaries. These are persons age 65 or over who qualified for monthly payments through employment or self-employment covered by the social security law. Children of deceased insured workers made up the greater number of survivors insurance beneficiaries. The second largest group of

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survivor beneficiaries was made up of widows of deceased workers with minor children also entitled to benefit payments in their care. In such cases, the age of the widow is not a consideration in eligibility for survivors payments. These local figures for old-age insurance payments also reflect a national trend. In the country as a whole, more than 6 million persons were receiving such benefit payments at the end of 1953, almost a million more than in December, 1952. "While these statistics may seem to be just so many figures in cold print," Mr. Lockwood said, "the payment monthly of \$46,045 to 5,426 persons in this county is of real significance to the economic well-being of the community at large, and in many cases represents the greatest or only source of income to the individual family concerned." He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Beatrice Hutchison Barr.

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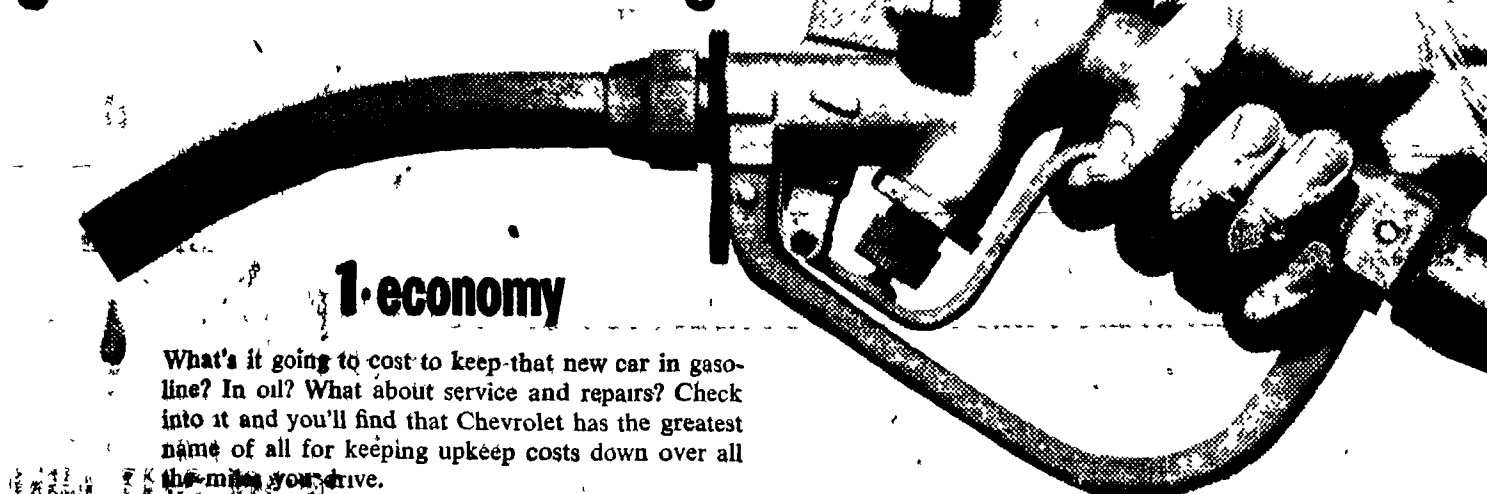
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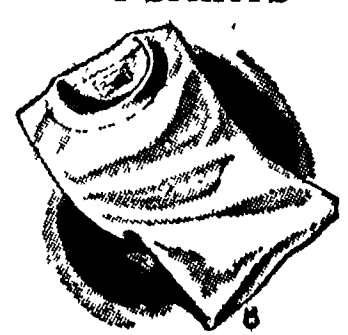
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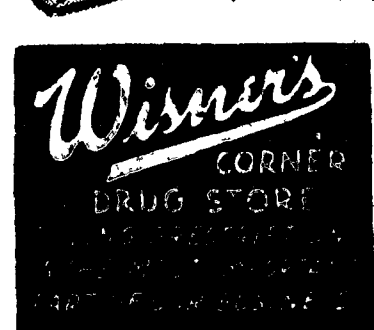
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
