## County Proposes To Do City Tax Notices and Bills

The city commission had more than the usual amount of visitors Monday. The first was Fran Rawlinson, director of the county equalization department, who came with a proposal to computerize the city's tax rolls and bills. The county is now able to feed into a computer all the pertinent data of local taxing bodies. They'd do it for Buchanan for no more than 42 cents a parcel of property. There are about 2,000 parcels in the city. The commission said they'd study the proposal and let the county know.

A request had been made from the Canamer games for \$500 from the city to help meet expenses. Two representatives from Canamer were there. They said that out of 415 young athletes who went to Canada, 63 were from Buchanan. The whole matter was referred to the

park and recreation board.

Mrs. Don Ryman and some of her Bicentennial committee were present with a progress report. The committee of Mr. and Mrs. Ryman, Helen Chan, Tom Irvine, Ron Moses and Mike Walker asked the city to appoint two more members. Mrs. Ryman presented the commission with a Bicentennial flag and reported that she had letters from the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration and from Congressman Hutchinson giving official status to her committee. She reported that work is progressing on trying to discover the original mill site and that the committee has been discussing plans for a parade next Fourth of July.

The matter of letting people paint the city's fire hydrants was discussed, although little enthusiasm was indicated.

The city passed two necessary resolutions to enable them to receive the \$116,600 community development grant from H.U.D. The commission approved a change order for the work on Schurmer Parkway providing for more guard rails. The cost was \$1,400.

They approved invoices from Cole Associates for \$1,808.45 for inspection and supervision of the street and sewer at Schurmer Parkway, for \$338.10 for inspection and supervision of street and drainage in the middle school area, for \$5,133.86 for inspection of the northeast area improvements, for \$323.63 for engineering of the Riverside Park entrance and for \$1,860.25 for engineering on the Charles Court bridge replacement.

A bill for \$1,770.50 for Walter Moore for painting the city hall was approved and payment of \$23,394.06 out of revenue sharing funds was approved for Yerington Construction for work on the northeast area street improvements.

## Tires Taken

Police are investigating the theft of three spare tires taken from cars on the lot of Habicht Ford. They were taken by prying the trunks open on three cars.

Sometime between 8 and midnight on August 4, somebody had entered a car owned by Wendell Runyon which had been parked in Clark's River Street lot. Entry was made by inserting a wire or coat hanger between the window and the weather stripping and lifting the lock. A spare tire was taken from that car.

## It Was Criminal

As one who participated actively in the last days of the war in the Pacific, we've always been disturbed about America's attitude over the dropping of the atom bombs.

After Okinawa was secured, the Japanese were literally unable to wage war. The navy and air force had successfully eliminated the last of their shipping, and supplies weren't getting near the main islands. B-29s were flying the entire width of the country without opposition from fighter planes or anti-aircraft, and they were bombing out of existence towns the size of Buchanan, because there were no major targets left to bomb. Halsey's fleet was sitting outside of Tokyo Bay, daring the enemy to do anything about it.

The Japanese knew they were through and had been making serious contacts to bring about a peace. Our government knew this and yet prepared to use the most devastating weapon yet known.

The dropping of the first atom bomb was an atrocity, but the dropping of the second has to be measured as the greatest war crime in history.

This week is the 30th anniversary of the dropping of the second bomb on Nagasaki. That city and Hiroshima were never considered military targets during the war, although either one of them were easier for bombers to reach than most targets which were hit.

Hiroshima is justified by several as proof to the Japanese that for them the war was over. The point was made by the first bomb, and nobody can give a good explanation why the second was necessary.

In our trip to Japan, we were treated cordially in every place but Hiroshima where the hostility was still apparent. An American should be filled with shame over what was done there.

Television made much of the anniversary of the bombing of Hiroshima, but nobody said anything about Nagasaki. Harry Truman is regarded by many as a great president and is excused for his part in the decision to massacre thousands of civilians. He either was receiving bad intelligence reports or he was completely insensible to the suffering that he knew had been caused by the first bomb.

It is wrong for television commentators to glorify for the new generation those who participated in this, the greatest atrocity in history. Germany's massacre of the Jews cannot in any way be justified, nor can this nation's slaughtering of Nagasaki's families be excused because it "may have shortened the war".

## There's Still Hope For Howe School This Fall

The Howe School pre-school program has a good chance of continuing at Howe School at least for next year if some of the interested parents and teachers are successful in their present efforts to raise money needed to support it.

For three years the school had received federal funds to support a program of conditioning preschoolers to help them get ready to adjust to their school experiences. The program had been conducted in the isolated but charming environment of Howe School. Parents and highly trained personnel worked together for the benefit of a certain type of child needing extra help. The program was so successful in Buchanan that it drew statewide attention.

Last spring it was indicated that the grant wouldn't be as large as expected and that costs of transportation and maintenance of the building had risen so that other arrangements would have to be made. The alternate plan would be to provide a room in an elementary school and to try to arrange transportation for the pre-schoolers on the regular school buses. This alternate

didn't appeal to most of the parents and teachers involved, so they decided to see what they could do.

The school indicated that about \$6,000 would be needed if Howe School were to be used again. The building is in good shape and well equipped for the program, but the cost of continuing to provide a special bus and to take care of the regular expenses of the building would be needed over and above the expected funds from the government.

The parents and teachers are now in the process of seeking help within the community. Clark Equipment Company is willing to provide \$3,000 if matching funds are raised from other companies and organizations. Thus interested persons will be contacting everybody they can think of for help.

They only have a few weeks to get the job done if Howe School is to be ready for work this fall.

## Thoughts On Emergency Idea

Responding to a letter in last week's Record concerning an emergency ambulance service, Mrs. William Bowker came into the Record office with some information.

She speaks enthusiastically of such a service undertaken in her hometown of Bellevue, Michigan, a small community of nearly 1,300 located north of Battle Creek and southwest of Charlotte.

Approximately eight years ago, Bellevue started a volunteer service with one emergency vehicle. Over the years the emergency service has grown to three vehicles. The service is staffed 24 hours a day by volunteer members of a trained rescue squad.

The facility is supported by the entire community with various endeavors undertaken by all ages to help maintain it, including street dances and frequent projects by the school children. In the process a nice feeling of community closeness has developed in line with editorial comment expressed in the Record in recent months.

It would seem that Bellevue's experience is well worth learning more about. Mrs. Bowker has expressed her willingness to put any interested Buchanan residents or organizations in touch with those in Bellevue who can tell how their goal was reached and how they now operate this service. They will be glad to share their experiences with interested people as they have done before in several instances.

## M.S. Band Sets Practice

Rehearsals will begin Monday, August 18 for all Buchanan Middle School Band members it is announced by the director, Mrs. Corbin Detgen, to run through August 22. Each member is scheduled for a practice twice each day. The 7th and 8th grade band will march during halftime of the September 26 game here, considerably earlier than they have previously appeared and Mrs. Detgen stresses practice will be especially important.

Any students who have not yet picked up their music may do so immediately by calling Mrs. Detgen at 695-5653.

Each morning during the week of August rehearsals, the full band, this means all band members, is to practice daily from 8 to 9:30 a.m.

Additional practices for sections will be held daily on the following schedule: Monday through Friday.

Percussion from 9:30 to 10:15. Cornets and French horns from 10:15 to 11:15. Clarinets from 11:15 to 12:15.

From 12:30 to 1:30 it will be trombones, baritone and tubas. From 1:30 to 2:15, saxophones. Flutes will end the daily sessions with 2:15 to 3:00 practice.

Tryouts for drum majorette and twirlers will be Monday, August 18 at 3 p.m.

Since additional blazers ordered to outfit the entire combined band will not arrive until November, students are being asked to wear black slacks, shoes and socks and a plain white long-sleeved shirt with a black tie. Band members are reminded of the black pant exchange at the home of Mrs. James Riley, 504 Liberty.

## Mollberg Case Is Dismissed

Subpoenas had been delivered for witnesses to appear in the trial of the Mollberg brothers for malicious destruction in connection with their attempts to reclaim the sidewalk for which they hadn't been paid by the contractor. A jury had been requested and was standing by. But the attorneys for both sides met in the judge's chambers at Fifth District Court last week and, after a brief court appearance without jury, the case was dismissed and the Mollbergs had to pay \$100 in costs.

The matter of getting paid for the sidewalk which Michigan Bell Telephone Company had hired Segard Construction Co. to put in is still unsettled for Mollberg Construction Co. who were subcontractors for the project. A case is pending in circuit court in Grand Rapids involving several parties.

Observers were puzzled by the whole procedure since soon after the February 14 incident, the Buchanan city commission had voted to drop the whole case.

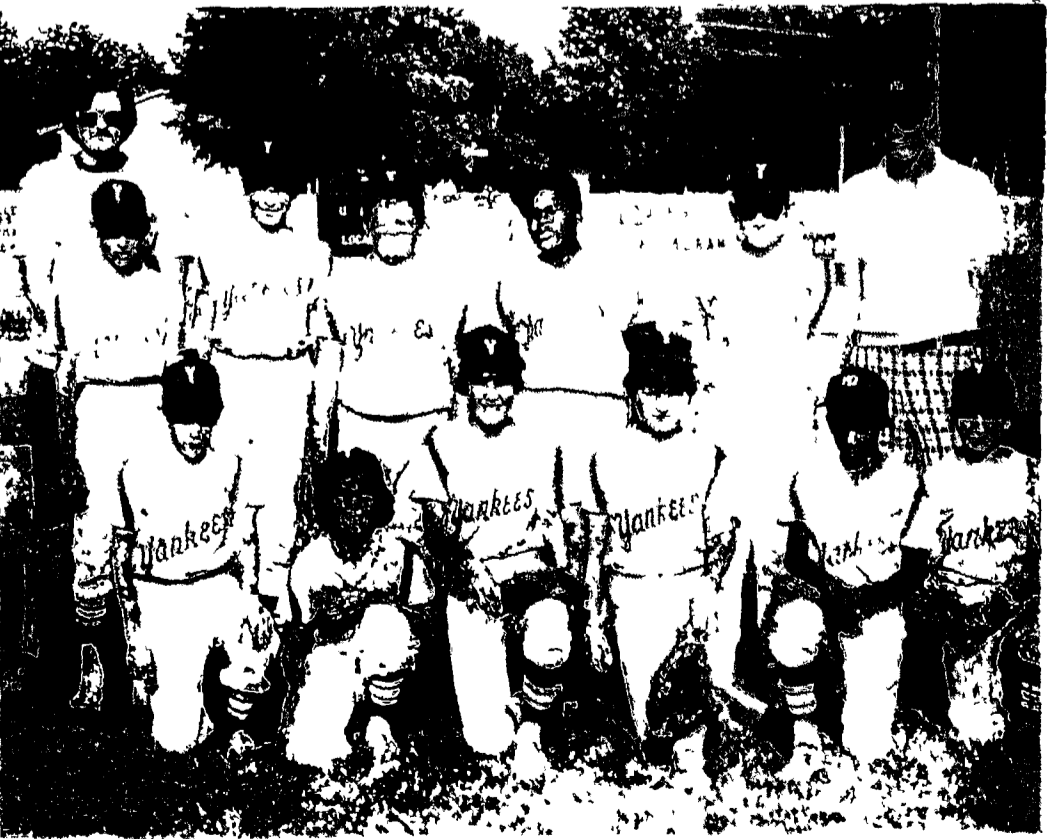

## Acme Sues

Acme Disposal, which collects garbage and trash from about 3,000 residents in Niles and Niles Township, has its own landfill, and it doesn't want to use the new Southeast Berrien County Landfill on Chamberlain Road. The municipalities of Buchanan, Niles, Buchanan Township, Niles Township, and Bertrand Township all set up the landfill authority and want Acme to use these facilities. Without Acme, the whole revenue structure as set up will not be realized.

Charging that the Landfill Authority is seeking to create a monopoly, the company filed suit asking the court to issue a temporary and permanent restraining order against the ordinances to force them to use the landfill. Buchanan and the four other municipalities were listed as defendants. On Monday in a special hearing, Judge Byrns granted the injunction and set September 26 as the date for the hearing on the case.

Acme Disposal operates a landfill in Howard Township in Cass County and estimates that it has about 70 percent of the collection business in the Niles-Niles Township area. They claim that the extra costs to them in using the new landfill would be \$1,000 a week.

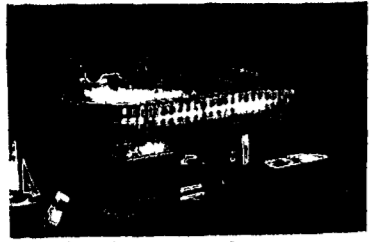

**THE MICHIGAN BIG STORY**

Mackinaw City (November 1, 1957) Mighty Mackinac Bridge, the five-mile-long colossus linking Michigan's Upper and Lower Peninsulas, was formally opened today by Governor G. Mennen Williams amid pomp and pageantry.

With helicopters buzzing overhead and an army of newsmen and photographers recording the

event, Governor Williams led a motorgade of dignitaries across the massive span from St. Ignace to Mackinaw City to become the first person in history to pay the bridge toll.

In presenting his check for the \$3.25 toll, Governor Williams said "I hope this check will help the toll takers to reduce the debt of \$100 million to this bridge, which will tie all of Michigan closely together."

It was a triumphant moment for Williams, whose support for the bridge project encouraged its detractors in the legislature to call it "Soapy's Folly".

Former Senator Prentiss Brown, chairman of the Mackinac Bridge Authority, called the

opening "the most significant event to take place in this region since the first explorers came here."

"Just like their arrival, this bridge opens a new land to be used and enjoyed by the citizens of Michigan and neighboring states", said Brown. "I predict that this bridge will bring a new period of prosperity to the Straits of Mackinac region and to the west in the Upper Peninsula."

The bridge, considered an engineering marvel, is the world's longest suspension bridge -- 8,614 feet. Dr. David Steinman, designer and chief engineer for the bridge's construction, claims it is also one of

the safest bridges in the world. "The fact that this bridge was built in a basically hostile environment required that the bridge be safe", Dr. Steinman said. "Theoretically, this bridge could withstand winds exceeding 600 miles per hour. Even up here at the Straits, such winds are unlikely."

Construction of the span was a colossal project. It took 10,000 workers three years to build it. The structure contains one million tons of steel and cement. Its suspension cables, if unwoven, would reach twice around the world.

The center span -- second longest in the world at 3,800 feet (Continued on Page 3)

An interesting spectacle can be seen at the Warren Dunes beach on Sundays. Hundreds of brave people can be seen soaring off the sides of the sand dunes, clinging to Hang-Gliders, colorful triangles of fabric.

Last Sunday welcome guests at the Oronoko outdoor service at the beach home of Rev Strauss were Mrs Ila Dall and Mrs Jim Christian of Beverly Hills, Chicago, who were enroute to Kalamazoo to meet Mrs Lydia Christian. Mrs Dall was a former Redbud Trail resident.

Mr and Mrs Mason Lane of Terre Haute, Indiana, were twenty-four hour guests of Mrs Otis Shouk, the past weekend. They were accompanied by their daughter, Mrs Shirley Douckenour, a well known interior decorator.

Mr and Mrs Hugh Coult of Oak Park, Illinois, were guests over the weekend at the Edwin Marsh home. Mrs Coult will be remembered as the former Lucille Marsh of Mount Tabor Road.

As this nation celebrates its Bicentennial, the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of the State of Michigan celebrates its Sesquicentennial. Many of the men so prominent in the establishment of our Nation were also active in the establishment of Masonry in the United States. One such person was Paul Revere.

Paul Revere was the author of a portion of the Masonic ritual (a charge in the Third Degree as well as the charges to the Master, Wardens, officers, and brethren in the public installation of officers). Revere, immortalized by Longfellow in his poem "The Midnight Ride of Paul Revere", was born in Boston of Huguenot immigrant parents. Paul was the third of twelve children. He worked with his father in the metalworking trade.

Revere became a skilled craftsman recognized for his creative works with copper. As his work became known, tradesmen soon discovered his qualities of strong leadership. They reacted by joining the guild he organized to redress political grievances and govern their trade. These political activities attracted the attention of such other Masons as John Hancock, Dr Joseph Warren and Samuel Adams. This group of men organized the Committee on Correspondence whose purpose was to alert the citizens of the thirteen colonies to the freedom activities Paul became a trusted worker, respected for his ability to observe people and places with a critical eye and quick mind.

His dependability enabled him to be selected as a courier of confidential information between Boston, New York and Philadelphia. On one trip, he carefully noted details of the British gunpowder plant in Philadelphia. From these observations he was able to construct a similar plant near Boston to supply gunpowder to the patriots.

Revere had enlisted in the French and Indian War and became an instructor in the servicing of field artillery. This experience became valuable during the Revolutionary War. General George Washington, a brother Mason as well as Commander of the Continental Army, used cannons and shot made in foundries under the direction of Paul Revere.

Revere was well known for his design and manufacture of candlesticks, shoe buckles, bells, anvils, and branding irons. Colonial currency was printed from Revere engraved copper plates. He also made dentures for Washington, but because they were not very comfortable, Washington did not always use them. Other accomplishments included the production of the first copper sheet rolled in America used to replate the USS Constitution, "Old Ironsides". In 1809, Robert Fulton obtained copper boiler plates from Revere for his steamship.

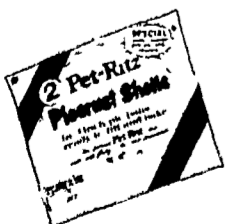
