City Commission Approves The 1975-76 Budget

On Monday the Buchanan city commission approved its 1975-1976 budget with revisions which made cuts in some departments. The budget now stands at \$880,224.

The commission passed a resolution establishing the equalized valuation for the city based on the evaluations established by the county board of commissioners. Using that formula, they arrived at a total evaluation of the city tax roll of \$50,791,172.

A bid was received and accepted from Walter Moore to paint the city hall for \$1,756.

It was voted to again establish a token charge of \$1 a year for the Upity Hospital sewer bill in recognition of the services provided to the community by the hospital.

The commission voted to advertise a review of a completed impact study for purposes of obtaining the federal funding for the community development project. They also applied for a planning grant to provide for local planning assistance. The city committed itself to provide its one-third local share of the program cost, \$7,046.

Mr. and Mrs. Joe Donlon were present to see if something could be done to prevent people from going over and under the fence through their property on the

way to the park. They said there is a stream of traffic which causes annoyance to the residents of the apartments on Redbud, and that a great deal of litter is discarded there. The commissioners discussed more police enforcement, relocation of the basketball courts in the area, and an addition to the fence with barbed wire if necessary. They recognized their responsibility to provide protection of private property and will seek ways to do it.

The commission accepted an offer from Acme Disposal Co for \$2,500 for the old garbage truck.

Engineering estimates for curbs, gutters and drainage in the northeast section on Victory, Richards and Bluff Streets was received totaling \$82,780. This is part of the project using federal revenue sharing.

Invoices were approved from Yerington for \$23,899.19 for storm sewers on Brookway extension and \$34,600.02 for the work on that road. It was reported that trail bikes are causing trouble in that area, riding over the newly seeded banks.

A request from Linda Ballard on 305 Phelps St was denied. Her family is engaged in a janitorial service, part of which included the burning of confidential papers in their yard.

Open House For New Apartments

The West Wind apartments will be open for public inspection this weekend. Twenty apartments will be available then, and another 20 on July 1. Eventually there will be 140 one bedroom, two bedroom and studio apartments in the complex.

The units include central gas heat, air conditioning, range, refrigerators and stoves, as well as garbage disposals and dishwashers. Each unit is soundproofed and contains wall to wall carpeting. They contain private patios and decks.

Eventually there will be a clubhouse with indoor pool, sauna, exercise room, craft center and dance facilities. Each apartment will have smoke and fire detectors. There is 24 hour maintenance service.

The open house will be Saturday and Sunday from noon to five. Manager Joe Kieser is available and has his office in apartment 8.

Millage Approved

On Monday the Buchanan school district voters approved the operating millage of 17 mills by a vote of 538 to 362 in a comparatively light vote.

Bill DeVos and Mary Beth (Mrs. Conrad) Larson were elected to the school board to replace Vern Lubben and Dr. Richard Beistle. Mrs. Larson led the ticket with 536 votes. DeVos had 463 votes, Robert Luke 422 and Cletha Wade 260 votes.

The operating millage is down slightly from the 17.75 mills last year.

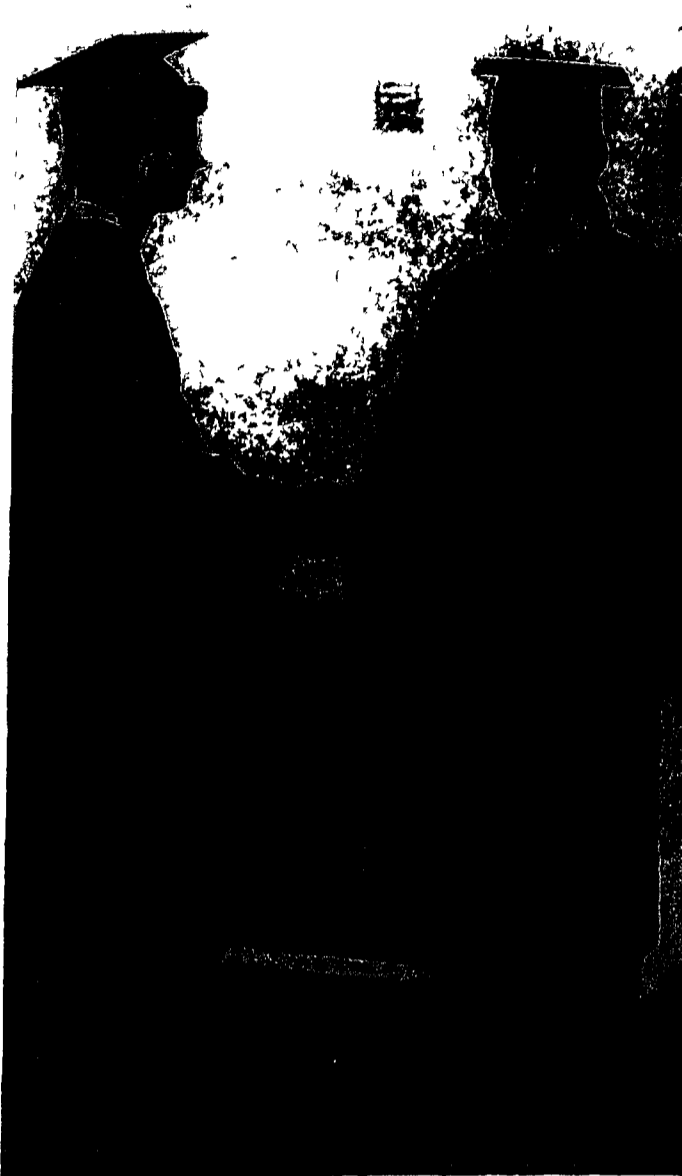
Seniors Graduate

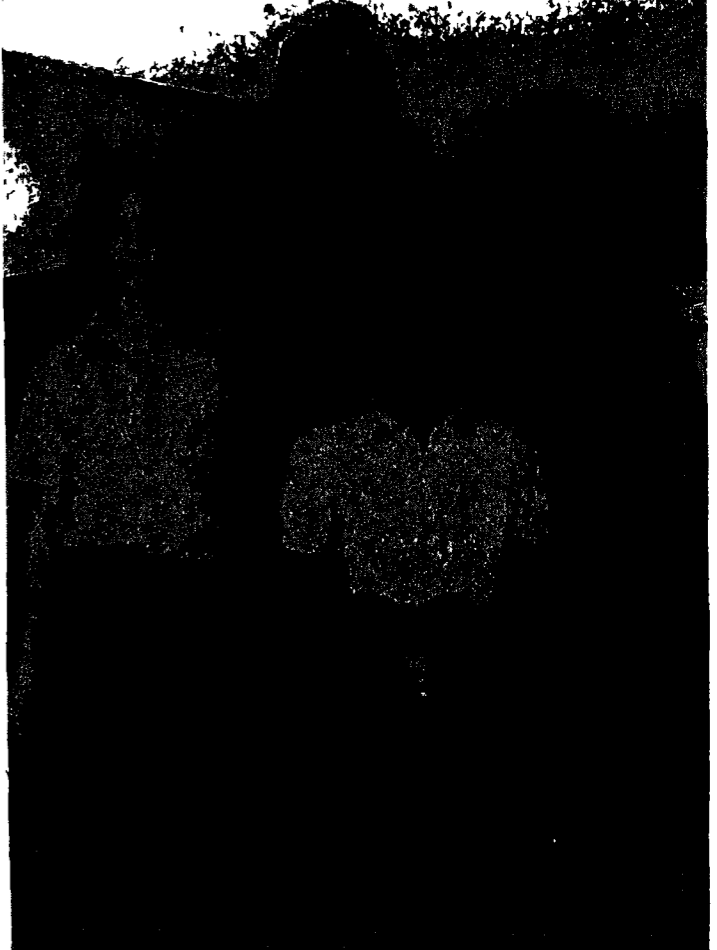

Meals On Wheels Drive Now On
 Niles-Buchanan Meals on Wheels, Inc kicked off its 1975 fund drive at the May 29 directors meeting. A fund goal of \$5,000 was approved by the directors. The 1975 budget is \$6,000 and it is expected to raise about \$1,000 of it from the sale of meals to patients served by the program. This leaves a balance of \$5,000 to be contributed by the community.
 During the first four months of 1975 an average of 726 diet controlled meals per month have been delivered. The number of patients served ranges from 35 to 40 per week, and about 100 volunteers contribute their time to provide delivery service.
 The fund drive is to be conducted by selling memberships in the organization, available at \$2, \$5, \$10 and \$25. Anyone may be a member and all members are entitled to vote at the annual meeting for the election of directors.

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May Be Time To Transplant Bulbs

If your tulips and hyacinth flowers were smaller this spring than you remember them, it may be time to replant them. According to Jesse Saylor, Michigan State University horticulturist, tulips and hyacinths normally decline in three years unless they are dug up and replanted. Signs of decline include small flowers, few flowers, or both

The cause, Saylor says, is usually overcrowding. To improve blooming, or simply to move the bulbs to a new location, dig the bulbs, store them and replant in the fall. Summer is the best time to dig bulbs. Wait until the leaves turn yellow, and then uncover a few bulbs. If the bulb coats have turned brown, the bulbs are ready to be dug.

Keep only large, healthy bulbs that are firm and free of decayed spots. Wash off any soil that remains on the bulbs and remove any old, dry scales. Treat them with a fungicide to prevent diseases during storage. Spread the bulbs in a shaded place to dry. When the outer scales have dried, store the bulbs away from sunlight in a dry basement, cellar, garage or shed. Avoid temperatures below 50 degrees F or above 70

degrees. To avoid confusion at planting time, Saylor recommends separating the bulbs by species or varieties and labeling the containers. A few bulbs can be stored in paper bags. Hang the bags from the ceiling or wall. Large quantities of bulbs should be stored on shallow trays with screen bottoms. Be sure that air can circulate around the bulbs, and check them periodically, discarding any that show signs of disease or decay.

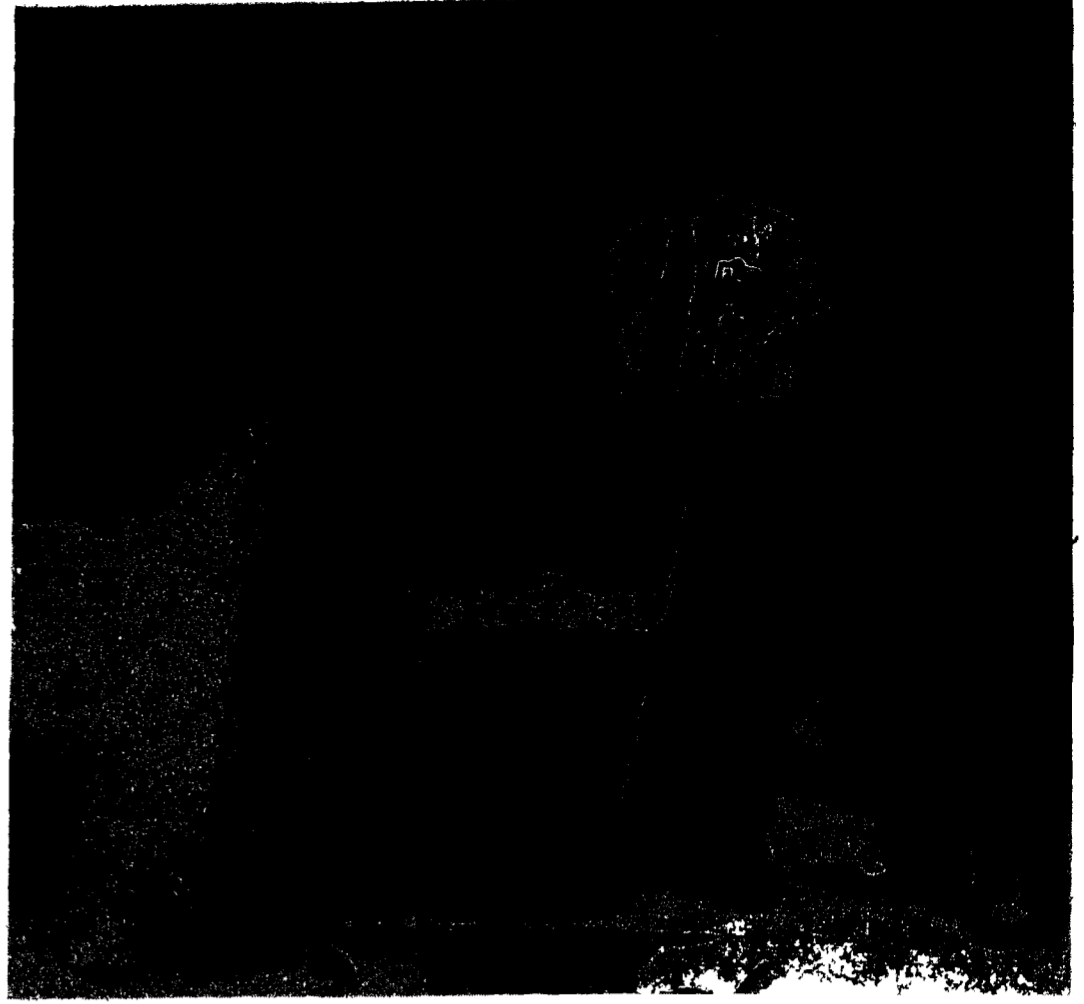

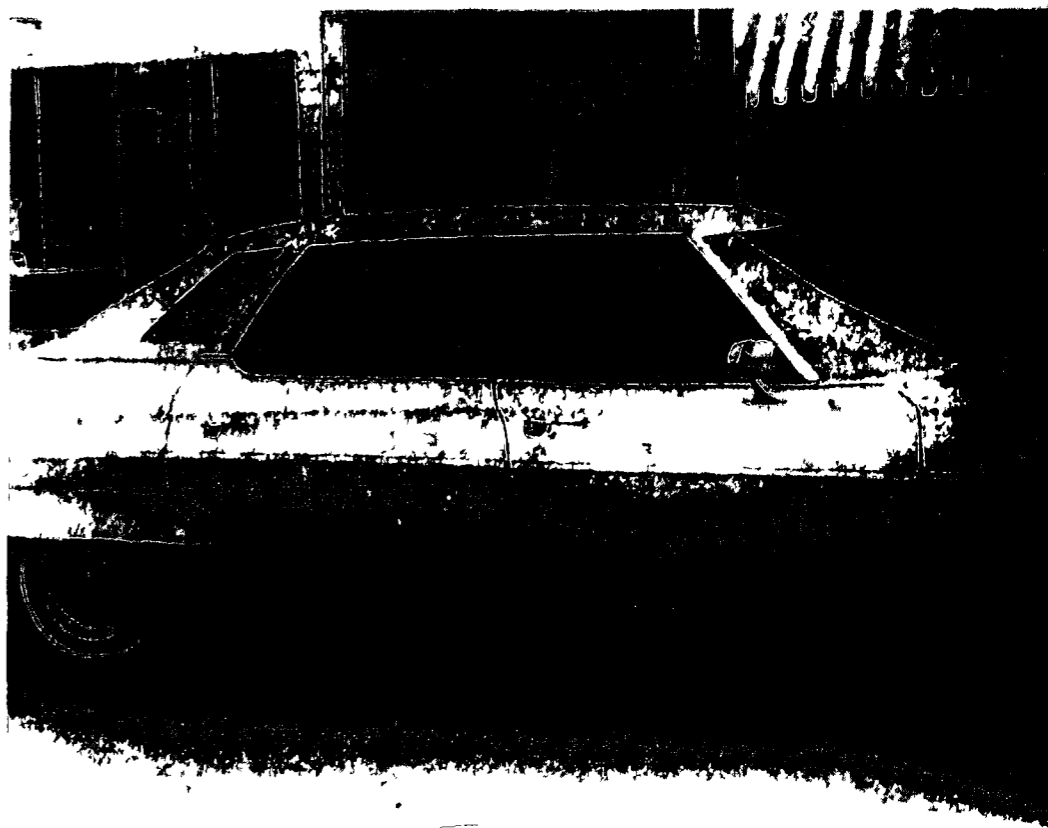

When To Prune Flowering Shrubs

Before you take the pruning shears to your flowering shrubs, know what you're working with, advises Joe Cox, Extension landscape architect at Michigan State University.

"Know when the plant blooms so your pruning helps, not hinders," he says.

Both early and late blooming shrubs are usually pruned in the spring, but for different reasons, he says.

"Early flowering types, like forsythia, pussy willow, lilacs and quince form their flower buds on last year's growth," he explains. "Prune them in the spring after flowering to remove dead or diseased branches and to promote strong new growth to bear next year's flowers."

Late flowering types, such as mock orange, butterfly bush and hydrangea, form their flower buds on the present year's growth. They should be pruned in the spring, Cox says, to promote vigorous new growth and remove unwanted or excessively long stems. Late bloomers may also be pruned in late fall, after growth has stopped, he notes.

Novice home landscapers tend to neglect pruning because they're uncertain how to do it or feel it's not important, Cox observes. Pruning is an important part of landscape maintenance, he declares. Removing old, dead or diseased wood keeps plants healthy and vigorous.

"Neglected shrubs also tend to become straggly and wild-looking with age and need pruning to enhance their natural beauty," he adds.

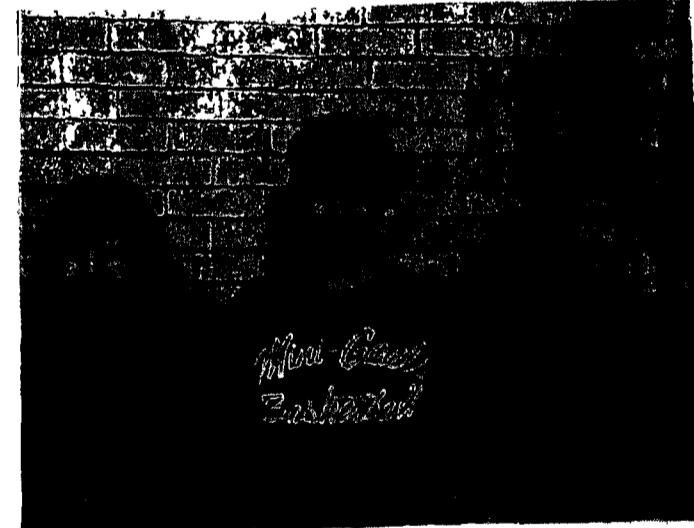

Two quarts of fresh strawberries will give you approximately three pints of frozen berries. Frozen berries will keep 8-12 months.

Hot Strawberry Sauce for Ice Cream
2 pints fresh strawberries
1 cup sugar
Water
2 tablespoons cornstarch
3 tablespoons orange juice
Puree one pint strawberries. Cut remaining pint of strawberries in halves. Combine sugar and one cup water in saucepan and bring to boil, reduce heat and simmer five minutes. Stir in strawberry halves and pureed berries. In small dish, blend cornstarch and 2 tablespoons water. Stir into strawberry mixture in saucepan. Heat and stir until sauce boils 1/2 minute. Cool slightly and stir in orange juice. Serve over ice cream. Makes 3 cups sauce.

Strawberries Are Here!
The state's avid strawberry lovers are "seeing red" and loving it. Our Michigan strawberries are a wonderful source of vitamin C -- one cup contains about the same amount as a 6-ounce glass of orange juice or nearly four-fifths of our daily need.

Strawberries at their peak of quality are a full, solid red, dry and glossy, still attached to bright green caps, and free from dirt and decay.

Strawberries are a delicate fruit so be gentle and handle them as little as possible. Remove damaged or decayed berries before storing them in the refrigerator. Before serving, wash the berries quickly and carefully in cold water. Remove the caps after the berries are clean and dry.

Freezing Strawberries
Use only moisture-vapor proof containers in any freezing project. Wash, drain, and hull the strawberries. Pack in one of the following ways:

- 1 Dry Pack** - Put berries in container. Seal label and freeze. Dry-packed berries keep a shorter time than those packed in sugar. The berries fade and lose their flavor.
- 2 Sugar Pack** - Leave the berries whole or slice them. Sprinkle 1/4 cup sugar over each quart of berries. Turn berries over and over until the sugar is dissolved and juice forms. Pack berries in container, leaving 1/2 inch headspace in quarts, 1/4 inch in pints. Seal label and freeze.
- 3 Syrup Pack** - Leave berries whole or slice. Put berries in container. Cover with a 50 percent syrup leaving 1/2 inch headspace in quarts, 1/4 inch in pints. Seal label and freeze. The syrup
