**Marten Convention In Clark's Grove In 7th Week**  
In one of the most interesting natural phenomena that has occurred in the bird world in many years, the tremendous caucus of the martens continues in the woods in the rear of the Charles O. Clark lot, the gathering being now in its seventh week.

When the martens assembled there once before, several years ago, they remained not to exceed three weeks. Now it's nearly seven weeks. Perhaps if that means anything, the martens are betting on a warm fall and a late start of winter, thinks Edward Abell, in the rear of whose home the martens are convening. There appears to be more martens now than in the start of the convention.

It would be difficult to make an estimate of the number of martens that gather there at night only, but it must be many tens of thousands. Ordinarily there are not more than two or three dozen pairs of martens in Buchanan. That is based on the estimate that there are not more than that many of the specially built marten houses in Buchanan.

The birds start coming in flocks from the northeast each evening, about a half hour before dark and continue to come in flocks until almost dark. Once, said Mr. Abell, a very large flock came in together, perhaps in the thousands in number, poised a moment and then dove with a sound like soft thunder into the grove. A casual eye can estimate that the ordinary succession of relays of birds coming in number from a dozen or so to several hundred in a flight.

In the morning the birds start flying back to the northeast, an hour before sunrise. Over half must be gone in successive flights before the whole remnant takes off at once. The moment of departure is quite dramatic. Starting with the crack of dawn the grove is full of a tremendous chatter for perhaps nearly an hour. Then suddenly the chattering stops—there is deathly silence. And in a very few seconds, the thousands of the remaining birds lift suddenly all at once straight up into the air with that thunderous sound, and off they go to their feeding grounds.

The last time she crawled under the old car chassis, she stuck fast and started squealing. The police came and pried one end of the car up with a pole so she could crawl out.

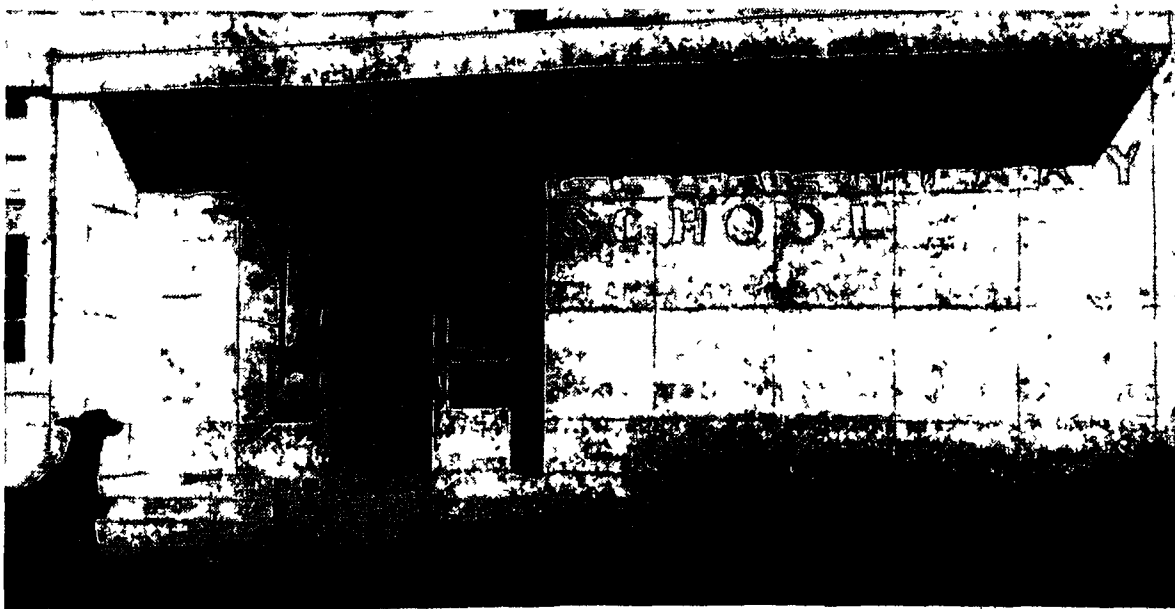
So out she crawled and waddled off, not even offering them a couple of pork chops.

## Expect Big Crowd At L. Babcock Farm

Plans are being worked out for the Southwestern Corn Field Day to be held on Tuesday, Sept. 28, at the Leonard Babcock farm, located 2 miles north of Gahen on Cleveland Avenue.

It is expected that 8 or 10 extension specialists from Michigan State College will be present for this event. Each one will be responsible for the discussion at one stop. The members of the soils department will discuss fertilizers and methods of application. Members of the crops department will discuss plant populations, varieties, wide rows, etc. From the agricultural engineering department the members will discuss tillage and speed of planting. Others will discuss chemical weed control, etc.

Farmers from all over southern Michigan and northern Indiana are expected to attend and see the latest developments in corn production. This event is sponsored by the Berrien county extension service, county agricultural advisory committee, and many others who are interested in promoting the most efficient methods of producing corn.

The various phases of news which are concerned with the opening of the 1954-55 school year in Buchanan are for the most part a series of unfinished beginnings as the Record goes to press this week.

Among these unfinished matters are the following: 1. Enrollment in schools; 2. Nature and extent of the school safety program; 3. Date of completion of the school shop addition.

**School Enrollment**  
With the enrollment of students in the Buchanan schools still continuing after the news deadline of the Record this week, the school officials and many others are waiting with interest to learn the size of the student body.

A chief reason for this interest is the possible effect of the closing of the Moccasin Court housing project on school enrollment. Between the first notification of the closing of the project issued March 15, 1953, and the deadline for departure on July 1, 1954, 138 housing units were closed, with as many families or their equivalent moving out of the project. The number of family living quarters closed is believed to equal or exceed in number the homes built in the district limits since World War II. The departing families scattered, some of them remaining in Buchanan, but more moving outside to rural locations, or to Niles, South Bend, or the St. Joseph-Benton Harbor area.

In a preliminary statement released by Supt. Stark Wednesday morning, before all enrollments were in, the school head stated that it was at least known at that time there had been a drop in grade school students, discernible in the northeastern part of town, and due mainly to the closing of the Moccasin Housing Project.

This sectional decrease will most likely affect both the Riverside and Moccasin avenue schools. One fact had emerged strangely contrary to the expectation of reductions in the northeast section is that the Riverside kindergarten enrollment is known to be higher this year than last. Enrollment of kindergarten at Moccasin had not been compiled at that time.

The high school enrollment has not been affected, and it is expected that there will be some increase in enrollments.

**School Safety Program**  
The organization of the school safety program in Buchanan for the coming year is still in progress and will probably not be completed before a week or 10 days after the opening of school, states Supt. Stark.

Extra time and thought are being devoted to the subject, the reason being the determination of the school heads to shift more responsibility from the pupil safety patrols to adult officers, owing to the growing climb of automobile traffic.

This increase is the whole of the problem. It has reached a point, said Stark, where we can no longer depend on the judgment of sixth grade boys in its control. The selection of school personnel for patrols had been gradually lowered to the students of the fifth and sixth grades because older students refused to take the responsibility seriously. Now it is apparent that the students of this age cannot be asked to control auto traffic, since the judgment required is beyond their years and experience.

In the reorganized form of control these school patrols will probably remain to help in directing foot traffic, but it will be necessary to have men for the purpose of controlling automobile traffic.

School and city governments are now considering how this added adult control is to be secured, whether in increased police personnel or by the employment of special guards to take charge during the hours of heavy traffic of school children. These matters will be up for consideration at the city commission meeting next Monday.

## Warm Dry Days, Nights, Boost Corn Prospects

The weather during the past week has been a general farmer's dream — and that doesn't mean a nightmare either — said Robert Koengshof of the Buchanan Co-ops.

The main beneficiary of the hot weather has been the promising corn crop, which had practically stood still as far as maturing was concerned during the last three weeks in August. Not all corn is good, but a large percent, especially in the loam farms of Portage Prairie and Terre Coupe Prairie, is actually looking very good. The ends of ears protrude from the husks two or three inches, with kernels well filled to the tip. The ears are already so heavy that they hang down from the stalk, which is evidence of a good corn crop.

The second crop of hay, which farmers had been unable to cut for three weeks during the latter part of August, was finally stowed away, as was also the grain straw, which had been lying for weeks in the wake of the combines, too wet to bale.

The main work done during the wet season was plowing ground for winter wheat and barley. Between the rains the ground was in an ideal condition for plowing. Farmers took advantage of this, with the result that barley is already sown or being sown, and much of the prospective wheat land is ready to plant after the 1954 fly-free date of Sept. 23.

Dry weather will be best for nearly all farm crops, both in general farming and in the fruit sections. Warm days and nights are needed particularly by the corn, in order to mature it before a killing frost.

## Joseph F. Swartz, Buchanan Native, Dies At 90 Years

Joseph F. Swartz, a native and resident of the Buchanan community during his entire life, died at the Berrien Center hospital at 1:30 a. m. Tuesday, Sept. 7, 1954, two weeks after he had incurred a hip fracture at his home at 405 West Front street.

He had been in ill health for the past four years, with rapidly failing eyesight and mental condition.

He was born June 2, 1864 on a farm about four miles west of Buchanan, the son of Christian and Catherine Swartz. When quite young he developed the practical skills that marked him during his active life. As a boy he worked as a moulder in B. T. Morley's Star Foundry, just east of the intersection of Front and

Portage street. Winter and summer he did his stint as a moulder, walking four miles to work and home, daily. He then worked some years as a mechanic for the Lee & Porter Axle Works, until 1910, when he bought the farm on Portage Prairie where his son, Irving Swartz, now lives.

He married Flora Andrews in Buchanan on Nov. 1, 1888. They moved to the home at 405 West Front, in Buchanan, in 1922. After that Mr. Swartz worked several years at the Clark Equipment plant, until he was 70 years old.

During most of the 1930's and 1940's his garden on his large home lot of West Front, remained a model until failing health overtook him.

He is survived by his wife, by a son, Irving; by two grandsons, Herbert and Donald, both of Portage Prairie, by a brother, William, of West Buchanan. He was a member of the Evangelical U. B. church of Buchanan and of the Maccabee lodge of Buchanan.

Friends may call at Swem's until 1 p. m. Thursday, when the body will be taken to the E. U. B. church, where his funeral will be held at 3 p. m. Thursday, with Rev. L. E. Lee in charge. Burial will be made in Oak Ridge cemetery.

Fryman had been taken to the hospital from his home in Berrien Springs, Thursday. Attending physicians stated that he had the symptoms of polio. Mr. Fryman was born Oct. 24, 1884, in Oronoko township. He married Lucy Hall on Dec. 14, 1905. He is survived by his wife, by a son, Walter Fryman, of Buchanan township, by four grandchildren.

He had been a member of the Oronoko Grange and active in Grange affairs many years. He was, at death, a member of the Farm Bureau and of the Evangelical U. B. church of Berrien Springs.

He retired from his farm four miles north of Buchanan on the Red Bud Trail, 14 years ago, moving to Berrien Springs. His son, Walter, remains on the farm. During World War II he worked for a time at the Clark Equipment plant then in Berrien Springs, and at the plant of the Love Tractor company at Eau Claire.

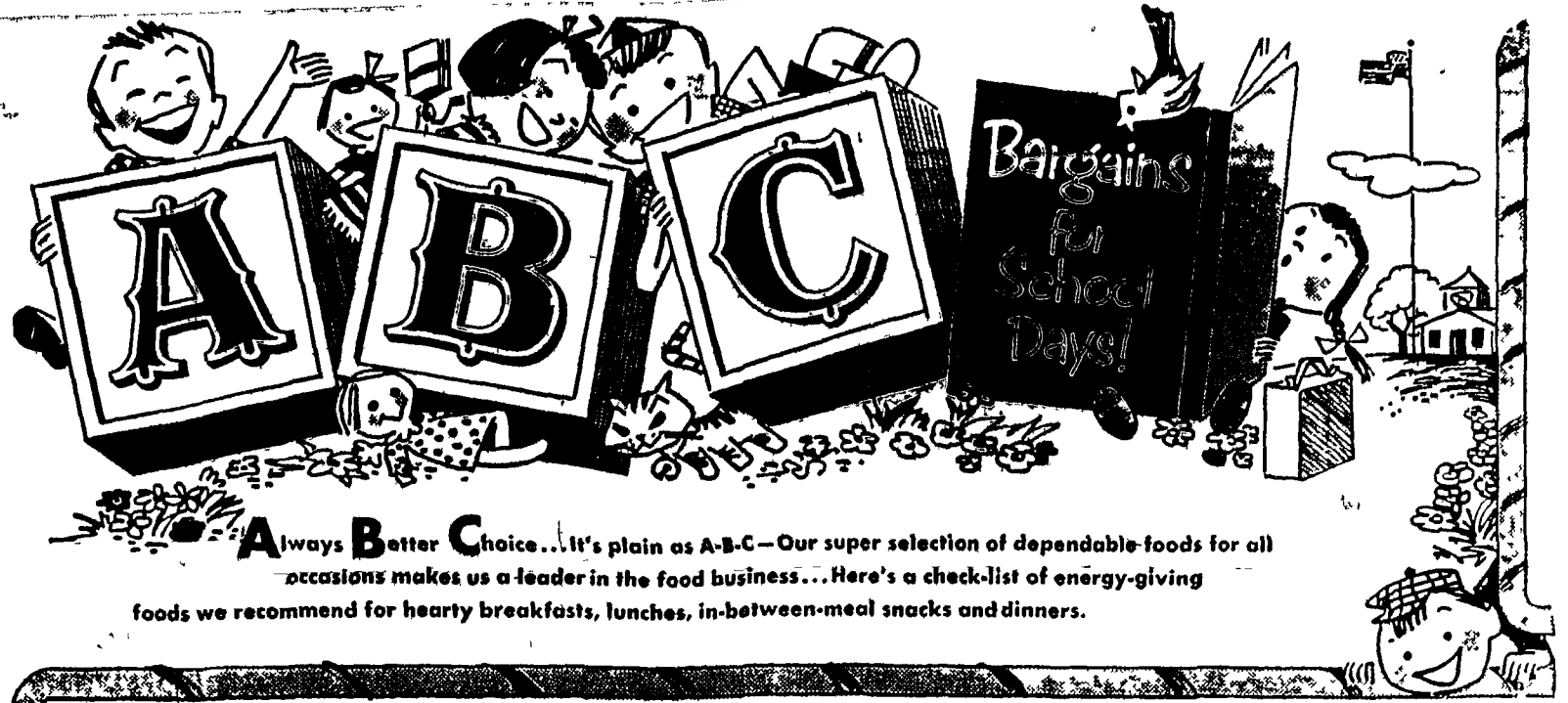

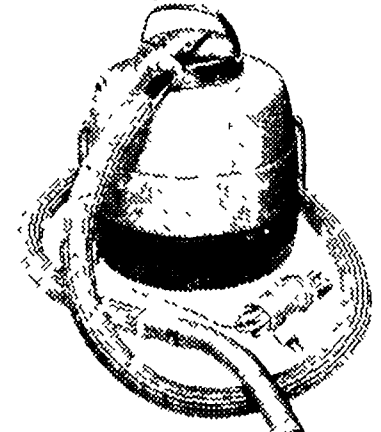

## Court house round-up

**ST. JOSEPH, Mich.**—There has always been an air of mystery shrouding the colonies of religious followers of Benjamin and Mary Purnell in Benton Harbor because they prefer to live in a little close-mouthed world of their own. So, naturally, there is widespread interest when that virtual iron curtain is raised even enough for a tiny peek under. And it was this week when a new chapter was started in the long stormy court documented histories of the House of David and its break-away sequel, Mary's City of David. The "peek under" served primarily to show that even people who will isolate themselves from the rest of the world in the search for "peace on earth and good will to men" can't always find it.

The latest legal hassle involves Mary's Israelite City of David, the colony founded by Mary Purnell back in 1930 after her followers broke away from the original House of David colony founded by Mary and her late husband, King Ben, at the turn of the century. The hassle is shaping up in the Berrien county probate court and promises to enliven court proceedings considerably before it is resolved.

King Ben died back in 1927. But "Queen Mary" lived on to guide the spiritual and administrative destinies of her followers until just a year ago. The couple, who began as itinerant preachers well before the turn of the century, had two children. Both met accidental deaths at early ages. The son, S. Coy Purnell, lived long enough to marry and have three children. It is those grandchildren of Mary Purnell, who, like her immediate offsprings, never were members of either colony, who touched off the latest legal battle involving the Purnell dynasties.

The grandchildren, S. Coy Purnell of Benton Harbor, and Mrs. Hetty Marks of Coloma, and Mrs. Lucille Hunt of Put-in-Bay, Ohio, filed petitions in probate court this week which, if granted, indicated they would fight for Mary Purnell's personal estate as her only "natural" heirs. The petitions asked the appointment of the grandson as administrator.

The grandchildren, represented by Atty. George Keller of Niles, estimated that Mary Purnell had some \$300,000 worth of real estate in her own name at the time of her death. That is what the fight will be over when it boils to a head in probate court. Colonists scoff at the idea that Mary owned anything at the time of her death. Property ownership is against their religious belief and even Mary could only hold it in the name of the colony, they say. So strict is their communal way of life that they "kick up" all their personal assets to the colony when they join, also pledging, at the same time, all their private earnings in the future.

Atty. Humphrey S. Gray, who has represented Mary's City of David for the past 25 years, admitted it was possible that the property in question may be in her name, but added that "if so, it was there purely by inadvertence." He continued, "The property was bought, improved and maintained from moneys which Mary administered first as sole trustee of the trust under which the colony operates and more recently as presiding officer of a board of trustees."

Mary abdicated her administrative throne in favor of the board about a year before her death. The board continues to govern affairs of the colony. "I feel sure the court will find that the property is in fact a part of that trust," Atty. Gray went on.

## Tom Kingsbury Back From Wars In B.H.S. Again

A welcome face back in Buchanan high school is that of Tom Kingsbury, only lately 2nd Lt. Thomas B. Kingsbury of the U. S. Marines.

Kingsbury, native and former resident of Cassopolis, was graduated from Western State College, Kalamazoo, in 1950, and that fall entered the faculty of the Niles schools. In August of 1951 he married Miss Lois Brant, girls' physical education director in Buchanan high school. That fall he entered the employ of the Buchanan schools as instructor in junior high school studies.

All of a sudden the Korean War got hot, and Uncle Sam was breathing down Kingsbury's neck as a potential draftee. Tom beat his game by enlisting in the U. S. Marines in November, 1952. He was sent to an officers' training school at Quantico, Va., and was graduated Feb. 2 with a second lieutenant's commission. He remained at Quantico in officers' training until August, 1952.

in their Buchanan home at 119 Lake street, he received a call to go to the home of his parents at Cassopolis, where he met an army officer and a daily newspaper photographer.

His military record had just caught up with him and he was to receive the Bronze Star medal for bravery in battle. The citation which accompanied the medal read in part as follows: "Serving as a platoon commander, 2nd Lt. Kingsbury displayed exceptional ability, initiative and professional skill. He unhesitatingly exposed himself to enemy fire in order to better direct the defense of the main line of resistance. He led army patrols far into enemy territory and at all times discharged his duties with efficiency and remarkable resourcefulness under fire."

When assigned as a liaison officer to a company occupying a vital sector of machine resistance, he skillfully effected the liaison and co-ordination necessary to insure the company's successful relief of the lines. Later, while exposed to an intense hostile fire as he was directing counter mortar fire, he was seriously wounded. Second Lieutenant Kingsbury's perseverance, outstanding attention to duty and indomitable spirit served as an inspiration to all who served him."

After remaining at the front from October 4, 1952, to March 25, 1953, he was seriously wounded and was eventually flown to a military hospital in Oakland, Calif., where he met his wife and saw for the first time his daughter, Jane, age 5 months.

He was released from the Oakland hospital in March of 1954 and came to the home of his parents in Cassopolis. He spent the past summer at Western State College, and was again appointed to his former position in the Buchanan schools.

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## State Will Aid In Filling Gaps In Town Recreation

There is little excuse for any Michigan community to be without a practical recreation program if people there want one.

A small office in Lansing with a big-sounding name is ready,

willing and able to supply important consultation and technical advice to help make such a program become a reality.

This office is particularly interested in working with communities of less than 5,000 population, but it will tackle any problem concerning recreation anywhere in the state. And at no cost to the community!

To secure this service is simple. Only thing required is a request. A letter can come from a town board, a village council, a city

commission, a PTA, a school board — even an individual.

The inquiry should be directed to the Michigan Inter-Agency Council for Recreation, Stevens T. Mason Building, Lansing. Ernest V. Blohm, executive secretary, will consider the subject, perhaps visit the area. He will aid in solving the problem.

"Clumsy" title for this activity stems from the days it was organized in 1950. The office had no "official" status as a commission or a department. Representatives from many state agencies were trying to help it along. Hence the "Inter-Agency Council for Recreation."

At present, 17 state agencies cooperate as part of the council. It is from these that Blohm can draw when technical information is needed. He can find answers to questions about health, law, engineering, personnel, and many others by contacting experts in state administration.

This arrangement, efficient for recreational needs, is also economical for the taxpayer. Cost of the Inter-Agency Council is only \$12,000 per year, an extremely low budget as state offices go. In other states, much more is usually set aside for similar service. A western state spends \$150,000 per year, a southern state \$100,000.

Recreation, already big business in Michigan, is expected to become much more important. Blohm defines the term more broadly than most people. "What people do for pleasure when not eating, sleeping, working at employment or chores."

The government is interested because it is important that leisure time be spent according to accepted social standards and in a productive manner. Several areas have already been serviced by the council. Among them are Central Lake, which seeks to build a city dock and park area; Elkton, planning a year-around program for teenagers, Ypsilanti, and in making

park plans. Others are St. Johns, Detroit, Parchment, Walz, Wilow and New Boston.

Blohm's office stands by to help start hobby clubs, baseball leagues, dramatic societies, square dance clubs, parks, camps, and shoot anything connected with people, free time and play.

"Most needs exist at present for sensible programs for teenage girls," says Blohm. Other "recreational areas of neglect" he defines as young adults and "senior citizens." "Much work needs to be done in the field of family recreation," he said, "where members of the family can enjoy activities together."

Most work needs to be done in fringe sections of metropolitan areas. In many instances subdivisions developed rapidly since the war and did not provide room for a "normal" play.

Real value of the Inter-Agency Council is that of a clearing house for recreational problems.

It can provide warnings about common pitfalls so that one community can benefit from the experience of others. It can adapt the program of one area to fit the needs of another with minimum difficulty.

Recurring problems in most cases, says Blohm, are leadership, finance, facilities and organization.

"Biggest mistake in communities is a tendency to put on a strong campaign for one big costly facility that benefits a limited number of people."

School systems offer a good starting place for recreational programs, according to Blohm. He pointed out that school buildings stand idle many evenings and much of the summer when they could easily be used. Recreation people in many cities already have excellent arrangements between school administrators or school boards. In this group Blohm listed Muskegon,

As more and more people have more and more time to devote to their own interests, Blohm believes that the importance of recreation will be felt more strongly.

The office he heads is trying hard to anticipate the recreation needs of the state and help individual communities solve these problems before they grow too big.

Official opening of autumn and the shining Harvest Moon will be among September's astronomical activities, according to University of Michigan's Miss Hazel M. Losh.

As associate professor of astronomy, Miss Losh explains that the Harvest Moon scheduled to appear Sept. 12, at 3.19 p. m., is that occurring nearest the autumnal equinox.

"The autumnal equinox is scheduled to begin at 8:56 a. m. on Sept. 23 when the sun crosses the equator on its way South," she points out. This is the day the

sun rises and sets at the east and west points of the horizon, and the day and night will be said to be equal, she adds.

This is not strictly true, though, the professor says. For as the sunlight enters the atmosphere, it comes into a more dense region and its light is bent so that it appears to be "lifted" making the sun visible before it comes above the horizon and after it sets.

Among September's planetary configurations will be Venus in the West, which, although bright, will not reach its greatest splendor until October. Miss Losh also mentions Mars, the conspicuous planet in the southern evening sky. Saturn will be low in the southwest and by the end of the month, bright Jupiter will be rising in the northeast around midnight.
