

## Bus Stop Problem Faces Board, New Teachers Hired

A bus transportation problem concerned the Gallien Township Board of Education at its regular meeting Monday night.

Robert Payne, who lives on the south side of US 12 approximately one-fourth mile west of Dayton corner, was present to protest the moving of the school bus stop closer to Dayton corner. In a letter to the board of education, Payne said that he was concerned for the safety of involved children. The Paynes have two daughters, 5 and 6 years old, respectively. Payne also stated that the bus had stopped in his driveway for 14 years.

Bus supervisor Richard Biggs stated at the meeting that the stop was moved last spring at the recommendation of a State Trooper, who thought that the stop then used was hazardous. The Trooper suggested that the bus stop at a "Pass with Care" sign, east of the Paynes. However, as Payne stated, "there is not any place for the children to stand." Twelve children are picked up at the stop.

The board decided to ask Don Cameron, administrative assistant to the Intermediate School district, to act on the matter and recommend a location for the bus stop.

**Approve New Teachers**

The hiring of four teachers was approved by the board, on recommendation of Superintendent Harold Whipple. The teachers and their assignments are Dianne Sue Patton, junior-high English and social studies, John Gaumer, sixth grade, Min Hang Dao, primary and Joyce Kooy, fifth grade.

It was decided to change school board policy regarding the giving of flu shots to all employees each fall. This will now be a matter of policy and annual approval of the board will not be necessary.

Superintendent Whipple reported to the board that final approval had been received from the State Fire Marshall for the metal shop addition.

Also, that a grant for the community school program in the amount of \$2,850, had been received. This grant along with Title I federal funds covers the cost of the program, Whipple said.

Whipple also reported that \$8,527 had been approved for the district in Title I federal funds.

**Hear Reports**

The board heard reports from Dave Bartz, community school director, Stanley Macklin, elementary principal, and Walter Schwarz, high school principal.

Bartz stated that he thought the summer program operated very successfully. However, he said, there is always room for improvement. Programs offered were summer band, reading and recreation in the morning and an afternoon secondary program of recreation in which 30 to 35 people participated. Bartz also aided in the Little League and Pony League programs and a popular recreation for girls was use of the trampoline. Other activities that the girls participated in were croquet, badminton and tether ball.

Three dances were held with an average attendance of 75

Bartz added that he would be very willing to help any organization on a community project.

Macklin stated that the new elementary remodeling facilities were well received by the students and teachers. Kindergarten thru fourth grades are now all in the north building and grades five and six have been moved to the east wing. Macklin reported enrollment of 481 elementary students with a pupil teacher ratio of 26 to 1.

High School Principal Walter Schwarz reported that, although building programs are not fully completed, operation in the opening days of school seemed to be a lot smoother this year. Accounting for this, he said, were the facts that the band room was now located in the far end of the building and small elementary children are now removed from the high school building. He said also that lunch hours are operating very smoothly. Schwarz reported 387 students in seven thru twelve grades with a pupil teacher ratio of 21.5.

**Other Action**

In other business the board approved a request from teachers for payroll deduction for tax sheltered annuities, with the stipulation that five teachers must participate in the program.

Named Board Member James Hemmlinger as delegate to the school boards association meeting in Grand Rapids in November.

Heard a report from Superintendent Whipple that the district ended the fiscal year in the black. This is the first time since 1963 that this has occurred. The general fund equity is \$8,314 according to the report.

During the meeting of the Housing corporation, President Ed Payne appointed Foster Potter, Robert Marshall and Duane Smith to study housing fund expenditures.

Preceding the regular meeting, the board toured the new building additions.

## Bertrand Records Quarter Million In Construction

Building in Bertrand township amounted to more than a quarter of a million dollars since January 1, 1968, according to Wilmer Baker, township building inspector.

The announcement was made Thursday, Sept. 12, at the regular meeting of the township board. Of the seventeen building permits issued, eleven were for homes, two for garages and four for additions to structures. Estimated value of the permits is \$266,500.

Other business at the evening meeting included an announcement by Township Supervisor Brayton Yaw that financing had been secured by the township for the fire department's new truck. A balance of \$15,000 will be financed over a six year period by the First National Bank of Southwestern Michigan in Niles.

A request by Roy P. Narragon for permission to locate a mobile home on property owned by his father on Batten road near Dayton was denied by the township trustees.

The board took steps to secure portable shelves to be used in voting machine booths to make voting on paper ballots more convenient for township voters. Miss Trella Rough, township clerk, reported that makeshift tables used in the Aug. 6 primary election prompted the move.

"Altho paper ballots will not be present at every election," she explained, "the township felt it would be wise to be equipped for those instances when a writing space is necessary."

Voters living in the West River Terrace addition of Bertrand township were required to vote on paper ballots at the primary on the question of incorporating the City of Brandvane. The township owns two voting machines.

The trustee board voted a partial payment of \$12,000 toward township road construction and paid bills amounting to \$811.61.

Present for the meeting were Yaw, Miss Rough, trustees Robert Kell and Dale Gillette, Treasurer William Vite and Narragon.

## Local Students Rank High In Grant Testing

Three students at Buchanan high school have been named as semi-finalists in the 1968-69 National Merit Scholarship program according to Donald B. Trull, Buchanan principal.

The students are Michele White, Jack Leggett and Martin Wessendorf.

Miss White is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. B. White 110 Clark St., Leggett is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack R. Leggett, 305 Cecil and Wessendorf is the son of Mrs. Chester Wessendorf, 111 Lake street.

The trio placed in the top 500 of more than 39,000 Michigan students taking the National Merit qualifying tests. The tests were given last February in 17,500 schools nationwide.

The semifinalists show high promise for leadership in their adult careers, according to John M. Stalnaker, president of the National Merit Scholarship corporation. "They have already demonstrated both high intellectual capacity and a readiness to develop their abilities," he said.

The Buchanan winners became finalists by receiving the endorsement of their schools, submitting scores from a second examination, and providing information about their achievements and interests.

Finalists will be considered for one of the 1,000 National Merit \$1,000 scholarships allocated in Michigan. Many will also be considered for the four-year Merit Scholarships provided by some 400 corporations, foundations, colleges, unions, trusts, professional associations, other organizations and individuals.

## Drivers Get Pay Hike; Howe School On Block

Major items of business at the regular meeting of the Buchanan school district Board of Education Monday evening included the public offering for sale of the Howe school in Bertrand township and an across-the-board raise in pay for school bus drivers.

The pay raise, retroactive to the beginning of school, provides for a 10 cent an hour raise to \$2.50 for "beginning" drivers, \$2.75 per hour for drivers after one semester and \$3.00 per hour for drivers after two semesters of driving.

Similar raises are set for substitute drivers, reports Paul

Spaulding, director of transportation for the system.

New driver working policies and procedures, in which the raises were outlined and presented, were discussed and approved by the Board. The procedures outline qualifications, wages, seniority, sick leave, procedures for extra scheduled trips, leaves of absence and other items.

**Last To Go**

Howe school, the last of properties acquired through annexation, was offered for public sale at the Monday meeting. The school, and four acres of land, is located on Buffalo road west

of the South Bend road in Bertrand township.

Built in 1955, Howe school has two classrooms as well as a boiler and supply room. The structure, constructed of brick, measures approximately 100 by 30 feet.

In taking their action, the Board indicated that bids of less than \$20,000 would not be considered in their resolution, they indicated that bussing of all pupils to school facilities within the district has rendered use of the school obsolete and "no longer required for school purposes."

The Board ordered that bids must be received no later than 7:30 p.m. Monday, Oct. 21, the next regular monthly meeting of the group. All bids are to be for cash and a certified check deposit for ten percent of the bid must accompany the bidder's statement, the Board indicated.

On Oct. 16, 1967, the Board disposed of four other buildings acquired through annexation. They were the Broesus school, the Kansas school building, the Wagner school and the old Womer school house.

**Other Business**

In other business Monday night, the Board

—deferred action for further study, on a request from the city for \$5,000 toward the employment of a city recreation director. Said Richard Post, acting president in the absence of Bernard Ellis, "We want to discuss it very carefully before taking any move on the request."

—received word from Norman Kreeger, assistant superintendent of schools for business affairs, the auditorium is nearing completion with only plaster patching and painting required. The payment of cost for repairing the room after the collapse of the ceiling earlier this year, will be approximately \$15,300. Funds for the work will be available from revenue resulting in the 1967 sale of property.

—announced the April 15-16, 1969 visitation of the North Central association, one of five regional accreditation groups, to Buchanan. The system has been approved by the association since 1924.

—heard a report from Superintendent Dougherty indicating the district teaching staff includes 113 persons. Indian Hills has six teachers, Moccasin 19, Ottawa 14, Stark 13, special education 8, and the junior and senior department includes 53 teachers.

—approved a leave of absence for Mike Walker, teacher of social studies. Walker was inducted into the U.S. Army on Sept. 9.

—paid bills amounting to \$67,467.15 of which \$56,404.61 is salaries.

## Township Voters Face Question Of Liquor Sale

Voters in Buchanan township will have the question of the sale of liquor by the glass put before them at the November 5 general election as the result of a move in the township during the last week.

Petitions with the signatures of 350 persons were submitted to township Clerk Clayton Spaulding requesting the question be placed on the ballot.

Analysis by Spaulding indicated 41 signatures were not qualified but the remaining figure of 309 was well above the 243 signatures needed.

The number of needed signatures is set by law. In order for a question to be placed, 35 per cent of the number of voters voting for Secretary of State in 1968 must be obtained. The percentage is related to the voting area concerned.

The question, as it will appear on the ballot, is: "Shall the sale of spirits in addition to beer and wine be permitted for consumption on the premises within the township of Buchanan under the provisions of the law governing same?"

Voters who approve of the sale of liquor by the glass should vote "yes" to the question. Voters who disapprove of such sale should vote "no".

## Progress Keystone For Legion Member Drive

In pioneer days the circle of wagons meant protection from the ravages of wagon trail travel. Today, that circle is a "Circle of Progress" and the keystone of a massive membership drive being staged by members of Ralph Rumbaugh post 51 of the American Legion.

Commander Robert Dodge launched the drive Monday by pointing out to non member veterans that with their membership in the Legion they "become part of a civilian organization which is backing, in every possible way, the fight

for freedom." Said Dodge, "When veterans join our 'Circle of Progress,' they become a part of positive programs which lend support to the very principles for which they fought."

Chuck Irwin, chairman of the Golden year, 50th anniversary drive for a membership topping 625, said veterans having had active and honorable military service during certain periods are eligible to join the "Circle of Progress."

Periods of eligibility include: April 6, 1917 to November 11, 1918; Dec 7, 1941 to Sept 2, 1945; June 25, 1950 to July 27, 1953 and Aug 5, 1964 to the end of cessation of hostilities as determined by the U.S. government.


In order to qualify for the rank, a scout must have successfully completed 21 merit badge requirements. For each five merit badges completed beyond that point, a palm is awarded.

The revised minutes of the August 19, 1968, regular meeting were read and approved as submitted.

Motion by Mr. Schneider, seconded by Mr. Stout, that bills in the amount of \$67,467.15, of which \$56,404.61 is for salaries, be approved for payment. Unanimously carried.

Motion by Mr. Schneider, seconded by Mr. Post, that the requests of Pamela Moore Rogers (Mrs. Billy Rogers) and Linda Skinner (Mrs. David Prater) to continue school as married students be granted subject to the usual regulations and with the stipulation that they be residents of the Buchanan school district. Unanimously carried.

Motion by Mr. Schneider, seconded by Mr. Flenar, that a military leave of absence be granted Mr. Michael Walker effective September 9, 1968. Unanimously carried.

Motion by Mr. Stout, seconded by Mr. Hanson, that the Bus Driver Policies and Procedures be accepted as read with two minor changes, to wit, Item V, "Each regular driver..." and Item VIII, "...report faulty equipment to Director of Transportation in writing." Unanimously carried.

Upon motion by Mr. Schneider, seconded by Mr. Hanson, the following resolution was offered, to wit:

WHEREAS School District No. 61, Berrien County, Buchanan, Michigan, is as a result of acquisitions of one kind or another the owner of the real estate and school building of the former school district known as Howe, and

WHEREAS The school building of said former district is presently not in use for normal school purposes and will not be so used in the foreseeable future, and

WHEREAS The building and property of said district has been held upward of three (3) years since used for school purposes and has been a source of expense for maintenance and other purposes, and

WHEREAS It is the opinion of this Board that said school property and building should be sold if reasonable prices can be obtained therefor.

Now, therefore, Be It Resolved, that all property hereinafter described more in detail, be put up for bids on a cash basis, with the right reserved by this District to refuse to accept any and all bids submitted, the legal description of said property being as follows:

Whereas by deed dated September 15, 1955 and recorded at Book 560 of Deeds, page 153, on September 26, 1955 from Swartz and wife to School District No. 6, Bertand Township, Berrien County, Michigan, and by proceedings of the Berrien County Board of Education un-

# Far East Adventure Ends For John Swem

For John Swem, the summer has been a busy one with 18 hours each week devoted to the teaching of English. Another 10 hours each week was spent learning modern Chinese.

While twenty-eight hours a week in study and teaching may not seem unusual, John did his work in Taiwan (Republic of China) on the island of Formosa in the China sea. He returned home Sept. 2.

Valedictorian of the Buchanan high school class of '66 and presently a Junior at Yale university, John left June 29 for Taipei, where he attended classes at Taiwan Normal university's Mandarin Training center.

His teaching duties included helping Chinese to learn English. He taught six classes encompassing all age groups from small children to older women.

Swem's trip was financed in part by a grant from Yale. The young collegian is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Dean Swem of 152 Brookwood Dr.

In talking of some of his impressions, Swem pointed to the apparent differences between the native Taiwanese and the Mainlanders.

on the island, they have been grafted to the population and the graft really hasn't taken."

Swem told of the suspicion Mainlanders shared for the Taiwanese, "and, the suspicion is not one-sided," he added, "it exists between both groups."

"What of politics?"

"There is little political freedom in Taiwan," said Swem. He noted that at the same time there was very little striving for political expression. "Things are going reasonably well on Taiwan," he noted. "Economic growth is about 9 per cent per year and the people, especially an emerging middle class are materially satisfied—a condition which can often lead to political apathy."

"The people, especially the Mainlanders, follow the government," he said, "because of a desire to return to the mainland China."

He noted that while there is political stability, young people on the island have a poor assessment of their goals. Many study English avidly and follow a heavy science curriculum which will help them migrate to the United States.

"Once they leave the island," said John, "chances are slim they will return."

Any unusual occurrences on the trip?

John noted the unusual fascination of the Chinese, especially the children, for the hair on his arms.

"The Chinese are a smooth-skinned race and it was not unusual," John remembers, "for children to come where I was sitting and pet my arms—completely engrossed with the

growth of hair that would draw very little attention in the States."

What of dating?

"It was difficult," reported John. "It was an unusual feeling to be on the reverse side of prejudice. Chinese frown upon a girl who would date an American. When I did date," he added, "I would try to talk Chinese to my date and she, at the same time, would be trying to practice her English on me."

What of shopping for souvenirs?

He told of the Chinese barter system. "The buyer cuts in half the asked price which the merchant has probably doubled and the haggling begins at that point," he explained. "It was experience—I felt

foolish the first time I got involved. I probably wound up paying about a third more than the merchant normally would have settled for," he said.

He noted that hating generally takes place in the downtown area of the city of 1.2 million people. "Neighborhood prices are generally pretty well set and the tourists very seldom get into neighborhood shops," he added.

The two-month summer trip was an excellent opportunity for John Swem who plans a career with the foreign service. He returned to Yale Monday to resume classes with him he takes memories and lessons learned on his adventure in the Far East.

### Achievements of Phillippi Told in Hughes' Letter

A year ago, Sept. 12, 1967, the crash of a private plane claimed the lives of two local residents and two former residents.

Killed were Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert S. Renbarger of this city and their son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Frederick C. Phillippi of Torrance, Calif.

The plane owned and piloted by Phillippi, crashed near the "Airport in the Sky" on Santa Catalina Island, about 30 miles off the coast of California.

The crash cut short a promising career for Phillippi in the expanding space age industry.

Phillippi's mother, Mrs. Edith Pruett of 109 Fulton St., recently received a letter from the Hughes Aircraft company describing her son's work on the Surveyor Spacecraft team.

His responsibilities during a Surveyor mission were first as Spacecraft Control System Performance analyst while the spacecraft was in transit to the moon. This included translating a few basic telemetry points on the spacecraft into a real time vocal description of performance of booster rocket, Centaur second stage and Surveyor from launch at Cape Kennedy thru fixed orientation of the Surveyor for its trip to the moon.

Edward T. Pfund, Surveyor test pilot, stated in the letter, "Fred's vivid and accurate interpretation enabled all analyst teams to have immediate and direct access to information vital to proper analytical interpretation of actual spacecraft performance."

After the spacecraft landed on the moon, Phillippi participated as an alternate Systems Analyst leader, with responsibilities expanded to encompass the performance of the entire spacecraft.

Between missions he participated in optimizing plans and procedures, and also as a test team member on a number of Surveyor spacecraft.

A 1956 Buchanan high school graduate, he served three years in the army and had completed three years of study at Michigan State university. He was completing his studies at University of California at Los Angeles at the time of his death.

Mrs. Phillippi, the former Sally Renbarger, graduated from Buchanan high school in 1957 as an honor student. The Phillippis were the parents of three children: Veloris, now 10, Rodney Dale, 8, and Mark Daniel, 3 1/2. They are now living with their uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. James Phillippi of Windsor Ave., South Bend, Ind.

Mr. Renbarger, was employed as supervisor of the tool division at Clark Equipment com-

pany, where he had worked since 1948. He first joined the company in 1925 and his continuous service dates back to April 23, 1932. He was a member of the Clark Management club.

Mrs. Renbarger, the former Ailene Warman, was employed by Wisner's Drug store, where she had worked for about 12 years.

For the purpose of reviewing the registration and registering such of the qualified electors in said township as shall properly apply therefor.

The name of no person but an actual Resident of the township at the time of registration, and entitled under the Constitution, if remaining such resident, to vote at the next election, shall be entered in the registration book.

Any elector who is unable to make personal application for registration because of physical disability or absence from the township in which his legal residence is located, may be registered prior to the close of registration before any election by securing from the clerk of the township, city or village in which is located his legal residence, duplicate registration cards and executing in duplicate the registration affidavit before a notary public or other officer legally authorized to administer oaths and returning such registration cards to the clerk of the township, city or village before the close of office hours on the last day of registration prior to any election.

The inspectors of election at any election shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the township in which he offers to vote.

# Fundamentals Lacking; Bucks Take Loss 26-0

A lethargic Bucks squad took defeat Friday at the hands of the Niles Vikings who rolled to a 26-0 victory on the turf of the Niles high school stadium.

A capacity crowd was on hand as the Niles squad gained the revenge it had sought for a five year victory drought. In the series, the Bucks had beaten Niles four times and last year the contest ended in a 7-7 draw.

Revenge was sweet—Niles scored in each quarter after Vike quarterback Bill Haslett got things off and running by snagging a pass from the Bucks' Pat Sexton and making a dazzling 88-yard run for paydirt. Jon Vollman's point attempt after touchdown was good and, in the opening minutes of the game, it was Niles 7, Buchanan 0.

**Victory Marred**

The Friday victory was marred with the death of Edward H. Miller, 68, of Niles who suffered a heart attack in the stadium stands in the closing minutes of the game.

Miller was dead on arrival at Pawating hospital shortly after 9:30 p.m. He was a former manager of the city's J. C. Fenney store and prominent in Niles civic affairs.

Minutes before he was stricken, he had watched his grandson, second string Niles quarterback Skip Miller, take the helm of the Vikings.

**A Good Start**

The Buchanan co-captains Pat Sexton and Mike Murphy lost the toss before the opening gun and Niles elected to receive

After their kickoff, the Bucks showed promise as they held the Vikes to a five yard gain in the first series of downs, forcing a 4th and 5th punt situation.

Buck fullback Eugene Bailey received the kick and made a five yard return to the Buchanan 44 yard line.

The fans stared in disbelief as the Bucks came up to the line of scrimmage, shifted to a shotgun offensive alignment and Sexton tossed a screen pass to running back Gary Elliott for a gain of four yards.

With second and six, Sexton bulled thru the middle of the Vikes' defensive line for six more yards and a first down before being brought to the ground by Niles' right guard Doug Julian.

The shotgun offense was beginning to look good.

Sexton took a five-yard loss on the next play but a penalty marker cost the Vikings fifteen yards and a down. The Bucks were back to a first and ten on the Niles 35 yard line.

On the next play, Sexton's pass for end Steve Berry was incomplete. A penalty against the Bucks for illegal procedure was declined and they faced a second down and ten yards to go.

Sexton took the option on a handoff, tucked the ball into a hard-fought three yards, brought to the ground by Niles' defensive left end Craig Kater.

**A Telling Blow**

With the game less than 4 1/2 minutes old, the Bucks had driven 33 yards to the Niles 23 yard line and the shotgun offense engineered by Head Coach Doug Borgert seemed to be paying off.

With the first and ten on the Vikes' 23, Sexton went back to pass, got off a long shot down field, intended for Berry, when the Vikes' Haslett jumped into the play at 12 yard line, grabbed the ball from the air and romped 88 yards for the touchdown.

The game was four minutes and fifty-two seconds old. The score after a successful conversion Niles 7, Buchanan 0. The crucial interception, was a blow from which the Bucks would not recover entirely.
