Eleventh-Hour Truce Before Walk-Out Is Followed By Settlement

A hasty walk-out by production employees of the Indiana & Michigan Electric Co., company, scheduled for Tuesday night of last week, was averted by an "eleventh-hour" truce arranged an hour before the deadline, followed by further negotiations which resulted in a satisfactory settlement Friday.

The Company and the union announced the signing of a contract on Friday providing among other things for a general wage increase of nine cents per hour for all production, distribution and maintenance employees and an additional three cents to be used in making adjustment in present rates of various job classifications.

Urge For Sharp Rise in Pay of Teachers of U.S.

50% General Increase Is Suggested to Start Drift Back to Profession

The beginnings of a campaign to double teachers' salaries in various parts of the United States are being discussed at the summer session of Teachers College, Columbia University. Aimed with a digest of factual comparisons of what is paid other workers, headlined by the statement that "the grand total of income for all groups has more than doubled since 1940," teachers from many states are planning to put up a stiff fight for more money.

Among their arguments are the following, as announced by Prof. Harold W. Clark, following extensive studies of nation-wide school conditions: The income for farmers rose from less than \$6,000,000,000 in 1940 to \$15,000,000,000 in 1946; skilled labor has more than doubled its income since 1940, unskilled labor last year was paid more than the teaching profession.

With an already serious shortage of teachers and a 33 1/2% increase over last year in the number of children entering first grade the coming fall, the need for an about-face in communities that have short-changed their school systems has reached a threatening point, Prof. Clark says.

"Unless adjustments are made quickly, results are going to be disastrous. Ultimately a lower and lower grade of person will be handling our youngsters. As a nation we can't afford to run the risk of having our teachers any poorer," Professor Clark warned. When teachers are driven from a profession, the community inevitably suffers, he reminded his audience.

Arguing that teachers were not overpaid in 1940, Professor Clark emphasized that teachers are worse off than they were then, because of the rise in living costs and the increase in taxes.

"There will be a shortage of probably 100,000 teachers in the fall. Meantime there are not enough persons entering the profession to replace ordinary losses. We must get at once to the people of this country that we are not going to have either teachers or school systems unless there is a drastic increase in teachers' salaries. We ought to go on every platform of the country and ask for a 50% increase. A good school system will pay for itself."

Whereas \$2,500 may have been considered a top salary for teachers of first graders, the community must think in terms of \$5,000, \$6,000 or \$7,000 for this group, according to Professor Clark. He has prepared a "blueprint" of 50 pages from which material for campaign use is to be excerpted.

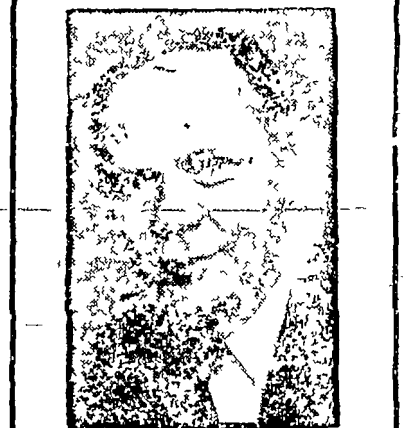
