



WATER MAIN BLOWS UP—Monday afternoon Buchanan experienced a rather unusual outburst from unknown phenomena—a water main blew up on East Front street. This just happened—it had no connection with the hot weather, states City Manager Omans. The water mains carry an average of 65 pounds per square inch, which is about twice the average pressure in an auto tire. The main was not an old one—it probably had a structural flaw in the form of a minute opening or crack, where the pipe wall eventually gave way. The main is five feet under the surface. The force of the released water heaved the earth above and broke through the pavement. If there had been no pavement, the force of the break might have shot the dirt far into the air.

City Defers Action On Widening West Front St.

Invites Mutual Study After Hearing Protests

The project of further widening of West Front street was deferred indefinitely, pending mutual consideration by both city commission and street residents affected, at the end of a brisk discussion lasting about 1½ hours at the regular meeting of the commission held Monday night.

The commission had arranged for a public hearing on further widening at the regular meeting Monday, June 14. At the same time the commission had stated a proposed change of policy in financing the installation of new curbs and gutters on both sides of the street which would be involved.

The West Front street property owners who packed the audience seating capacity in the commission chamber came to protest the finance policy rather than the widening. The majority did not even consider widening an issue. When Mayor Anderson called for a sentiment vote on the widening issue, six voted for and four against, with the majority of the property owners present abstaining.

The argument came to grips on the city's proposal to change financing policy on replacement of curbs and gutters, where the replaced section had had an "average life" of 25 years or more, the owners to pay 65% of cost and the

city 35%.

Atty. William White of the Niles firm of White, Klute & White, had been retained by the objectors to lead off in their argument against the shift of financial responsibility from general to special assessment. Atty. White stated that the commission had full power to enact such change, without even referring the matter to the residents affected.

However they had referred the matter for hearing at that meeting. His clients, said White, were objecting to a shift of financial responsibility to the residents. This general policy of improvement of Front street, including eventual resurfacing and widening from the top of East Front street hill to the intersection of Terre Coupe and West Front had been under consideration for three years. It had been treated as a progressive project, to be completed in sections as money became available.

Now, stated Atty. White, having charged curbs and gutters thus far to general assessments, the city proposes a shift of nearly two-thirds of the cost to the property owners. This, said White, is naturally objected to by property owners affected as unfair.

For the duration of this project at least, said White, the city should stay by the original policy of charging such cost to general assessments. In such case, if the improvement is necessary and funds are lacking, the general tax should

be raised to cover added expense.

The intent of widening and resurfacing Front, said Atty. White, looks to the convenience and safety of arterial traffic on the city's busiest street, which is in the general interest and should accordingly be paid for by general assessment.

The property owners on the North side of West Front had a specific objection, since there is less deterioration of curb and gutter on that side, they request the city to carefully consider whether or not to repair in particular places. The property owners on the south side state that they should not be levied with a special assessment for a project which is in the general interest rather than their own. Several from the south side also protested that the proposed widening on that side would involve a shift of power wires which would "burn up" the large trees which lend a special beauty and distinction to the avenue.

Representatives of the city commission stated that letters had been sent to all property owners affected, and the open hearing had been advertised, for the purpose of giving everyone a chance to protest if they so desired. Their final action was to table consideration of the project indefinitely, and to invite a mutual study of the project, which can be revived at any time.

Lions Will Induct Heads At Meet With Berrien Springs Club

The Buchanan Lions club will induct its officers in a joint installation service and dinner with the Berrien Springs Lions club on the evening of Thursday, June 24, in the American Legion home in Buchanan. The Buchanan club will arrange the dinner and the Berrien Springs club will arrange the program. Wives of the members will be guests.

Mr. Henkelmann, president of Buchanan Lions, was the speaker at the regular meeting of the Buchanan Lions, Thursday evening of last week, with Robert Strayer in the capacity of chairman of the program.

Henkelmann described in general the scope of the undertaking. It will begin at Montreal, the regular terminal for transoceanic shipping, and will thenceforth create a channel for ships as large as 10,500 tons displacement, or seven times larger than the 1,500 tons upper limit of present shipping through the bottleneck of the Welland Canal.

The course to the western terminals at the Ports of Gary, and Chicago will include 2,350 miles of natural channel and 260 miles of man-improved channel. It will be necessary to deepen the channel of the Welland Canal around Niagara Falls from its present 13 feet to 27 feet.

Other major deepening or widening of channels (or both) will be the St. Clair river past Detroit, the Sault Ste. Marie canal, and the Mackinaw Straits.

Total cost is estimated at \$318,000,000, of which the United States will assume \$566,000,000, including \$192,000,000 for the hydro-electric power dam in New York state and the \$374,000,000 costs of channel enlargement in the United States.

Buchanan Has A Three-Way Business Change

An interesting sequence of business events occurred in the past week in Buchanan, involving the sale of two filling stations and the announcement of the election of a new station on East Front street.

The publicity sequence began with the announcement by Robert Olson that he was selling his station to Owen Rifenberg, preparatory to building a station of his own on a site which he recently purchased in the northwest corner at the intersection of East Front street and Sky Lane Drive. He expects to complete his new building there in about 50 days. His business will be known as Bob's Zephyr Service.

Olsen Sells To Owen Rifenberg

Yesterday (June 14) Owen Rifenberg took over the former Bob's Standard Service at E. Front and North Portage, having purchased the merchandise and equipment. Rifenberg had previously sold his station on Days avenue to Walter Ross. He had bought the business from Leonard Wood on Nov. 25, 1952, operating it 19 months.

A new man, Walter Ross, came here in 1946 and entered business for the first time with the purchase of the Rifenberg Standard Service. He took charge last week, changing the name to the Ross Standard Service.

The community extends best wishes to all three of the young business men for good luck in their new enterprises.

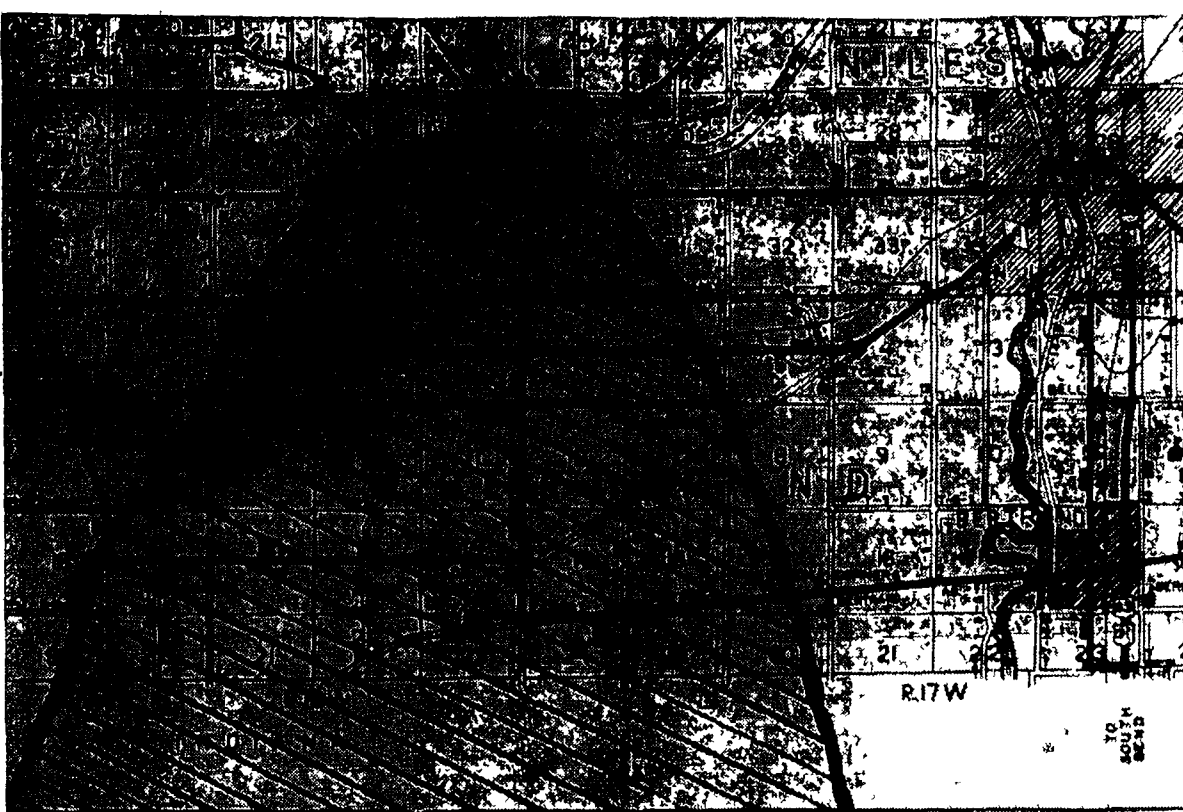

Fire Hits 2 Homes In Area

Fire Damages Interior Of Home Of Philip Brong, Thursday

Fire, which is believed to have started from an electric range, inflicted considerable damage to two rooms in the home of Philip Brong, north of Buchanan, Thursday afternoon.

The family were all away at the time. It was discovered accidentally by John Earl, local telephone maintenance man, who noted that the connection was dead and went out to the home to check. He found the house locked and full of smoke. He tapped the telephone wire outside, connecting with a field phone, and notified the Buchanan fire department.

The department made a run in the township fire truck. The home is a basement house located about a half mile east of the Calvin school on the dirt road which connects the Red Bud Trail with the Main street, or Glendora Road at that corner.

The interior of the house was finished in plasterboard and has four rooms, a large room occupying one side and front with a double door as though intended eventually for a garage, a combination kitchen and dining room and two bedrooms. One door leading to the smaller rooms has a large pane above, which the firemen broke to secure access to the lock.

They found the heat intense and most of the damage in the combination kitchen and dining room. In a corner stood the electric range, the back of which had been very close to the wallboard. The flames had apparently caught at this place and had run over the entire interior, charring practically all walls of that room, also damaging the floor and all furnishings. Damage in the two bedrooms was due mainly to smoke. Clothing and all furnishings were heavily encrusted with soot.

When the firemen first reached the place one of them investigated the outside electric meter box and found the needle whirling rapidly, round and round. This indicated that the range was turned on inside. He cut the connection at once. Firemen stated that in all likelihood the entire building would have been burned before the arrival of John Earl, except for the fact that all doors and windows were tightly closed, allowing no circulation of air.

City To Replace Creek Bridge On Smith Street

The city manager was authorized to buy materials to replace the Smith street culvert across McCoy's Creek, also to secure guard rails.

The present culvert is only 22 feet wide, creating traffic congestion and having become an eyesore. City Manager Omans recommended that a new arch be installed, at least 48 feet in length. This would allow 33 feet of street pavement, 10 feet of sidewalk and 5 feet to carry the guard rails.

The 1954-55 budget has a provision for \$2,450 for this improvement. It was suggested that the work be done during August. See City Page 3.

Ground Spray Rigs Battle Infested Fields

Saturday afternoon Carl Koenigshof, living southwest of Bakerstown, found army worms eating on the edge of a corn field next to a field of barley.

He immediately started scouring the district for a ground spray rig and also for a plane "crop duster". He located a ground rig Saturday afternoon. Meanwhile the army worms had eaten bare the north side of the corn field, entirely consuming about five acres. He completed spraying the remainder of the 18.9 acre field and stopped further damage.

However, he was unable to get a plane spray outfit until Wednesday morning. These plane rigs are usually secured from Central or southern Illinois and Indiana, since crop-dusting or spraying for field insects is more necessary there.

There is now a heavy infestation in those regions which kept the planes tied up. One plane which was promised to Koenigshof by the first of the week was delayed by an accident.

Crop Dusting Plane Here

The crop dusting plane arrived at 7 a.m. yesterday (Wednesday) from Valparaiso, Ind., having been delayed by an accident earlier in the week. It landed immediately across the road from the Currier school at the end of an impromptu strip on the L. Sebasty farm. The field has not been cultivated this season and the ground is hard, suiting the requirements. The farmers of the area scraped a strip 160 rods in length as a take-off and landing strip. The Bertrand township fire department truck stood by near the landing strip in the event of an accident. The plane has a considerable acreage contracted in this area.

County Agent Hoekzema and Ray Janes, Michigan State College entomologist, were in the Buchanan area all day Tuesday, inspecting the damage done and locating present areas of infestation. They stated that the infestation seemed to spread like the arc of a circle with Buchanan at the point of the arc, which extends south and a bit west to include farms in the area of the Irving Swartz and Walter Rhoades farms to the south and southeast, the Fred Andrews acreage to the immediate southwest, and on in that direction to include the Carl Koenigshof, Sylvester Clark, Ora Welbaum, Leslie Sebasty farms as a focal point of heavy infestation, and lesser infestation in an undeterminable area around them.

Chlordane is being used to kill the worms. It comes in the form of a powder which is made into a solution and spread at the rate of 2½ to 3 pounds per acre. County Agent Hoekzema states that it is not feasible to treat barley fields, as the tight shuck or hull containing the barley

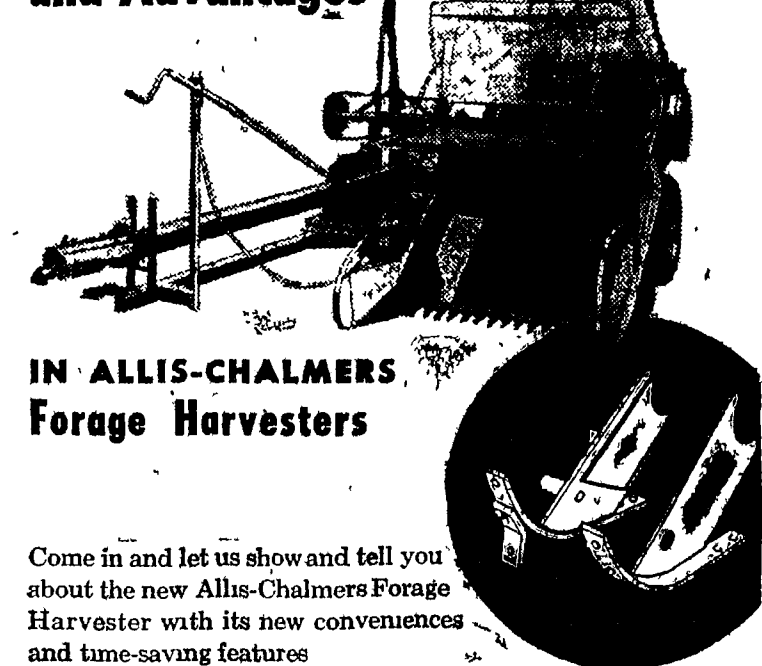

Mysterious Fire Ruins Home Of Kate Carlson, Tuesday

The home of Mrs. Mildred Kate Carlson at 202 South Oak street

suffered severe damages from fire of unknown origin late Tuesday evening.

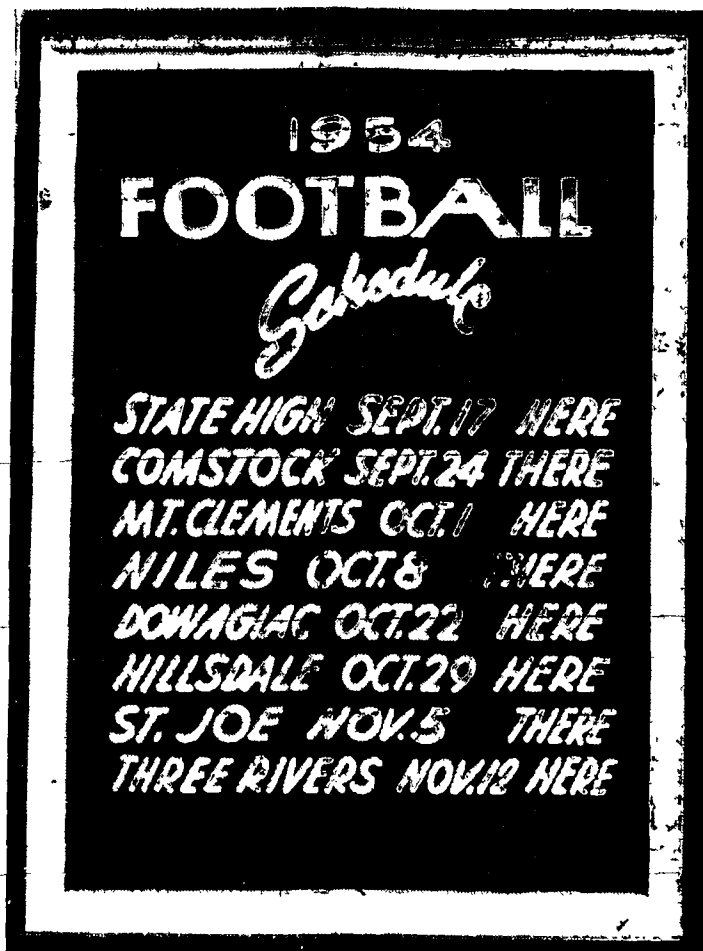
They had decided that it was from an outside fire in the neighborhood, when the light in an ad-

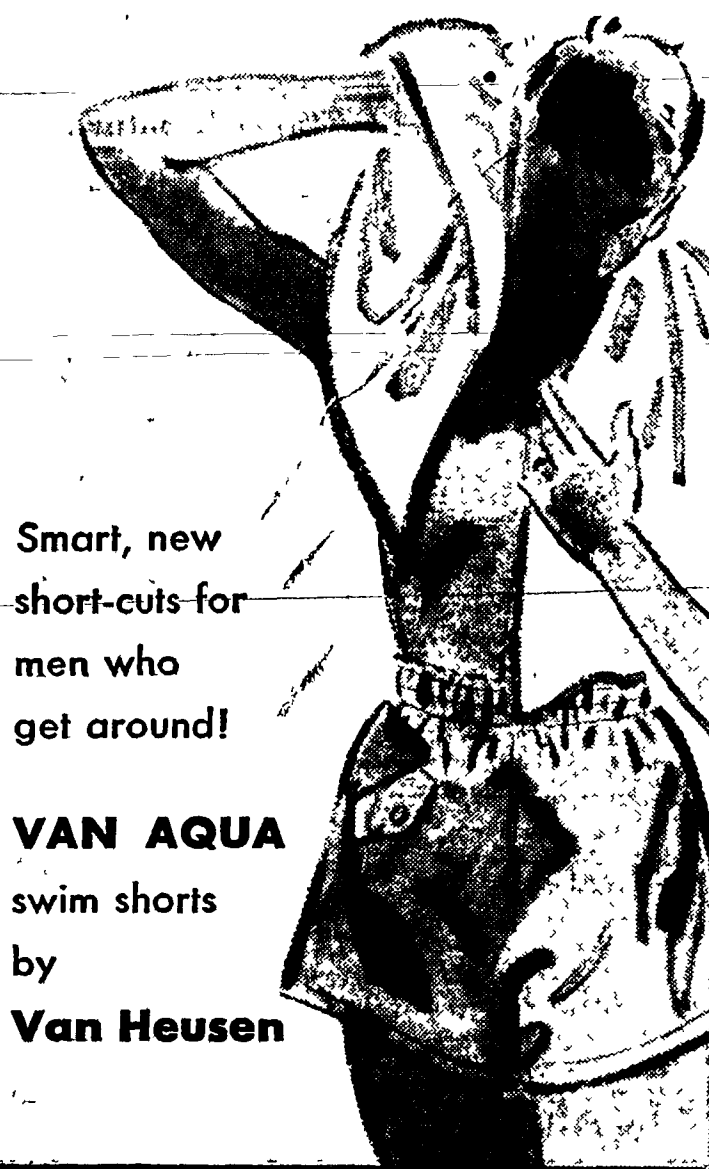

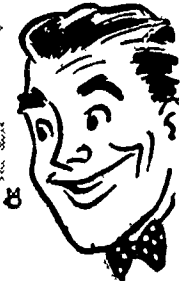

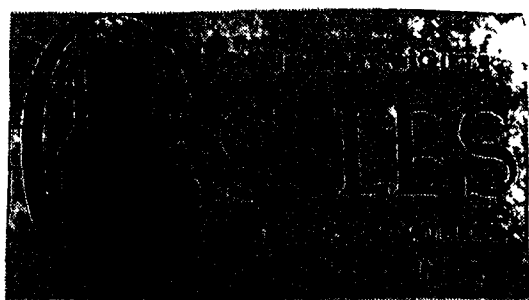

Famous English Divine At South Haven, June 20

Church people of Buchanan and other interested persons are invited to hear Dr. Cecil Northcott, London, England, world-renowned minister and speaker, who will speak in the First Methodist church in South Haven at 8 o'clock Sunday evening, June 20, under auspices of the South Haven Ministerial Association, the United Church Women of South Haven and the Berrien County Council of Churches, and the Van Buren County Ministerial Association.
This will be another worship service in preparation for the Second Assembly of the World Council of Churches and will be almost a duplicate of the ecumenical service held in St. Joseph on May 24, which was acclaimed to be the best ever held in Berrien county.
Dr. Northcott is a Congregational minister and is editorial secretary of the United Society for Christian Literature, the oldest of the ecumenical and cooperative organizations in Britain for the provision of Christian literature in all parts of the world. He is also editor of the Lutterworth Press. He is well known in this country as the London correspondent of "The Christian Century," and has visited here on two other speaking engagements.

Motorists Urged to "Slow Down and Live Longer"

"Slow down and live longer. Drive too fast and die that much sooner."
That's the message of Sgt. Harold Moore, commanding officer of the Niles post of the Michigan State Police, in pointing out that June, July and August are the months when speed, the No. 1 public enemy on the highway, takes its greatest toll.
Michigan law enforcement agencies are now cooperating in a state-wide campaign to make motorists more speed conscious.
"Last year 45% of the traffic violations reported in fatal accidents were for speeding or driving too fast for conditions," Sgt. Moore said. "Safety appeals are meant for all. If drivers will gear their speed to existing conditions, such as traffic and weather, it will definitely cut down the number of fatalities."
In 1953 there were more than 1,900 persons killed and nearly 58,000 injured in 184,000 accidents in Michigan. This was an increase over 1952 of 9% in deaths, 18% in injuries, and 15% in accidents.
Ran-off-roadway accidents, the type most commonly attributed to driving too fast for conditions, accounted for 435 of the deaths. Motor vehicle travel in Michigan during the summer months will jump from the daily average of 71,000,000 miles to 80 million. "This means greater exposure to accidents," Sgt. Moore said. "The state law does not set a specific speed limit, but it does require that speeds be no greater than conditions justify. In other words, be sensible and use good judgment at the wheel. Avoid that accident. It's possible."
About 350,000 American citizens live outside the United States.

Agt. Hoekzema Describes Army Worm; Its Work

The army worm is a species of the cutworm family, states county agent J. P. Hoekzema. It is always present in practically all crop areas, and only occasionally grows into dangerous numbers. It is a dark green in color, never over two inches long. It has two parallel white stripes, one on each side of the back and running the full length. There are other stripes running the extent of the back, but of varying colors. The head is brown in color.

A dry spring is said to be the most favorable condition for the piling up of army worms in large numbers. In this section the rather rare invasions come from the south and southwest from Indiana and middle to southern Illinois, where their infestations are much more common. The prevailing winds in the Buchanan area come from the southwest. When the army worms are beyond usual numbers the winds carry them in the moth stage into Michigan. When they are dropped, they lay their eggs in trash and shallow soil, where they hatch into worms in five days. The army worm grows to full size in about 20 days and remains active in the worm stage about 10 days after that, when it enters the cocoon stage, to emerge a moth again. This species of army worm only produces one generation in a season, said Hoekzema.

This is the most dangerous season for invasion of corn fields by army worms, as they will devour the entire plant. When the corn approaches full height the worms may feed on its younger and more tender leaves without serious damage. The worm crawls up the leaf devouring entirely the part in front as they go.

In the grain fields, they tend to crawl to the top of the stalks and work in the heads, or in other cases they cut off the straw

just below the heads. grain may retain enough of the poisonous residue to render it unfit for feed. Fields of wheat and oats and all kinds of hay and grass may be treated.

Chlordane is ineffective in temperatures of 65° and below, but is very effective in temperatures such as ranged this week, from 80° to 95° or more above zero.

County Agent Hoekzema and State Entomologist Jane stated the type of army worm here does not have a birth and death cycle of 7 to 8 generations in one summer. The army worms working here tend to produce only one generation and are consequently more easily controlled.

She was born in Lancaster county, Pa., Aug. 31, 1851, the daughter of Jacob and Martha Dufrenoy. She married Adam T. LeFevre in 1871. They made their home in Sterling, Ill., for a number of years, later moving to Milwaukee, Wis., where Mr. LeFevre died in 1924. Mrs. LeFevre was a member of the Woman's Benefit Association and was active in the organization until after her 100th birthday. Besides Mrs. Barbour, she leaves another daughter, Mrs. Addie VanNost, and, Libertyville, Ill., 11 grandchildren, 21 great-grandchildren and 2 great-great-grandchildren.

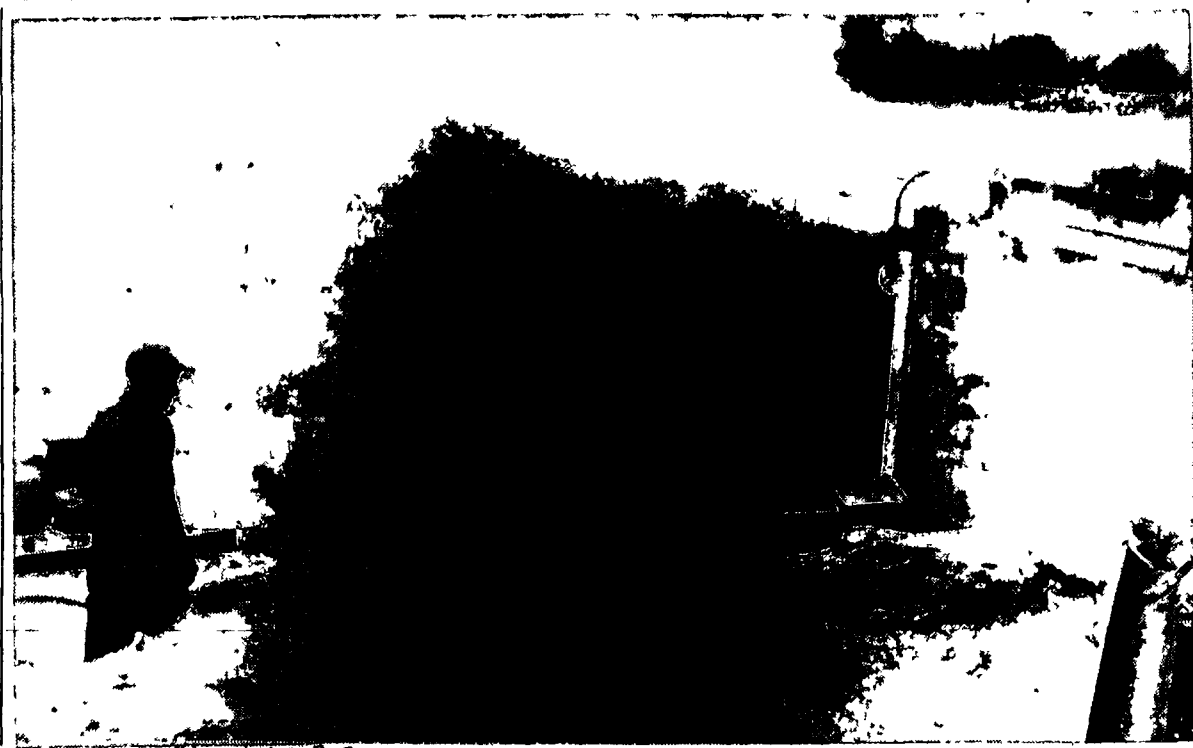

He's doing well. The secret? Dale will tell you it lies in the first word in the name on his window, "Quality Bakery." A lot of his patrons will back him up on that. It is very likely more than that. 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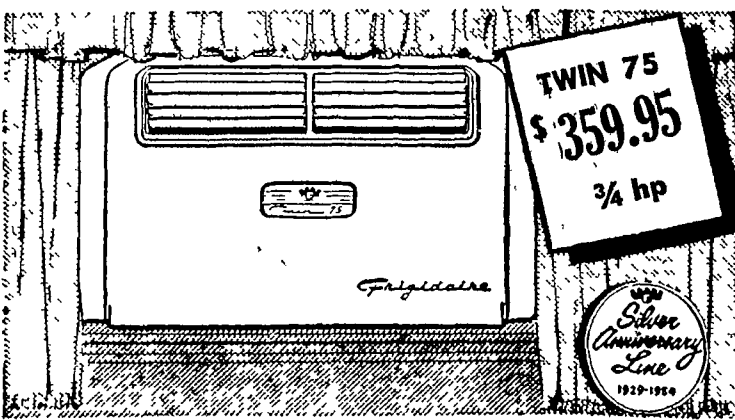
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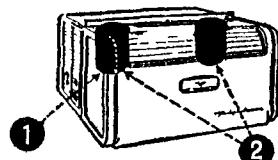
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Our Goal Must Be For Quality, says Knoblauch

Presents Vivid Picture Of Achievements, And Faults In American Education

"Ours is a rich heritage and the future is before us. When we are driven by chilling fears as we wait for time to run out on us?" asked Dr. Arthur Knoblauch, former principal of Buchanan high school at the conclusion of his address at the commencement program for the 1954 graduating class of the Buchanan high school. "We fear because we are not prepared — that is the basis of all fear."

"In the race for quantity in population we are already hopelessly outnumbered," said Knoblauch, "but that does not matter if we can win the race for qualitative supremacy. But if we fail in distancing the rest of the world's peoples in this supremacy, we shall shortly become only one more of the world's lost civilizations."

The main productive factor toward this end of qualitative supremacy is public education. "This

was the plea of the former local teacher who has, during the 20 intervening years since he left, become a nationally-known educator. His plea was faith in a greater investment in education. "We may believe," he said, "that we have done more for our youth than was ever done before by any previous generation in America, at least in terms of money spent for educational facilities. But a final verdict on that judgment requires that we drop several other conditions on the scales."

"Here," said Knoblauch, "are some other things we have done for the generation which is now passing from the period of youth to the adult stage."

"1. The certainty that all (the male element at least) will serve in the army."

"2. A tax debt of approximately 300 billion dollars on the national level alone. And the local taxes and local public debt and it will all add up to quite a heritage."

"3. A culture as confused and as complex as ever faced any generation."

"4. We have guaranteed that none of them are likely to get very rich (in the extent to which some people used to get rich)."

"5. We have given them an economic system that may be the best in the world, but which is full of economic gaps. A high wage rate is not of much significance to men who are out of work."

"6. We have given them a system which affords children only a limited opportunity to labor for wages, and we have failed to provide a substitute. At the same time we have attempted to imprison those who fail to measure

up to society's citizenship standard. Delinquency, both juvenile and adult, seem to fit into our national picture."

"7. We have given them an industrial system that can create more machines, which will be manned by less men, than in any previous era of our history — although we are destined to have more men nevertheless."

How does our generation of youth rank in number in comparison with the rest of the world? Here are the approximate figures for youth up to 15 years of age:

Asia	493,000,000
Europe	172,000,000
Africa	76,000,000
Latin America	61,000,000
United States	37,000,000
South Pacific	3,000,000
Canada	2,000,000
World Total	844,000,000

The population of the world is 2,500,000,000. Our population is a very small minority — aided by a few friends, such as elements of western Europe.

We shall remain a small minority. Our only hope is improvement in our stock, in which better education will be a main instrument. We are not doing too well for ourselves in some directions. Russia is producing 45,000 trained engineers annually, the United States only 23,000. Russia is training twice as many young scientists as we are.

Said the president of the California Institute of Technology: "If our government spent only 1/20th as much for sciences as for weapons development, we would be fairly well off."

Here are a few simple recommendations to solve the shortage of scientists:

1. Find the good and promising scientists. This is quite easy.
 2. Pay them so they can stay in science rather than go into administration. This is not so easy.
 3. Provide them with the facilities they need.
 4. Encourage the education of young scientists.
- Aside from such special problems as producing more and better scientists, here are some other aspects of education. Take a quick look at public education in the United States in 1954:

We spent approximately \$5,000,000,000 on education the past year, or about \$15 per year per school child, or 10 cents a day for a school year.

This progressive falling off of classes is too rapid and too large, but it is not far from the general average.

South Berrien Milk Testing Report For May

The South Berrien Dairy Herd Improvement Association had an average production of 1,000 pounds of milk and 39.25 pounds of butterfat, according to Charles Blais, tester. All 25 herds were on pasture during the month of May and grain consumption had decreased — due to the use of good pastures. A small percentage of cows were dry (only 8.8%) and of the 480 cows tested, 108 cows, each produced over 80 pounds of butterfat each.

High cows in each age class were as follows:

Under 3 years: Larry Donner's grade Holstein "Cal", with 1,490 pounds of milk and 61 pounds of butterfat.

Under 4 years: Hubert Wright's grade Guernsey "Nell", with 1,970 pounds of milk and 107 pounds of butterfat.

Under 5 years: Larry Donner's grade Holstein "Jo", with 1,970 pounds of milk and 97 pounds of butterfat.

Over 5 years: Ed Healey's registered Guernsey "Kate", with 2,510 pounds of milk and 131 pounds of butterfat.

High herds according to herd size were as follows:

Small herd: Russell Wright's herd of 8 grade and registered Guernseys with 1,230 pounds of milk and 62.88 pounds of butterfat.

Medium herd: Dean and Dean Straub's herd of 13 registered Holsteins with 1,371.6 pounds of milk and 53.69 pounds of butterfat.

Large herd: Larry Donner's herd of 28 grade and registered Holsteins with 1,150.8 pounds of milk and 50.32 pounds of butterfat.

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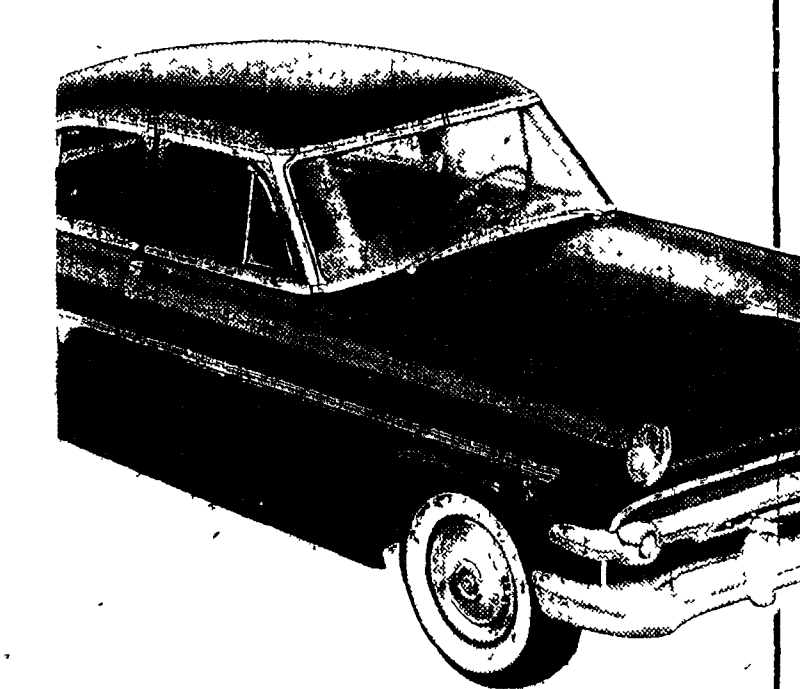

Greatest Need Of Engineers Is In Air Defense

America's great need for engineers is nowhere more pressing than in the field of air defense. This is pointed up by some figures from Mundy I. Peale, president of Republic Aviation Corporation.

It takes 27 times as much engineering talent to build today's superfast, complex jet planes as it did to turn out World War II fighters. Mr. Peale gives the figures as 41,000 engineering man-hours for a World War II fighter, 1,132,000 for one of the newest Air Force planes.

Building Republic's 650-mph Thunderstreak, the Air Force's first swept-wing fighter-bomber requires the skills of 38 different kinds of engineers. This complexity stems from the increasingly varied and difficult tasks military planes must perform. The Thunderstreak, for example, is not only an atomic bomb carrier, it is designed also for speed enough to fly high-altitude intercept missions, and for long-range escort duty.

Fluoridation — Its Safety
Three of the greatest public health programs in history are generally acknowledged to be immunization against infectious diseases, chlorination of drinking water and pasteurization of milk. Now, after 40 years of experience, many public health leaders add a fourth — fluoridation of water for control of dental decay.

For the first time, they believe, a means is offered for mass control of man's most common malady.

Returns coming in from more than 900 communities that have fluoridated their drinking water to the level of one part per million show that tooth decay among children has been reduced as much as two-thirds.

Safety of fluoridation has been established beyond doubt. The amount of fluoride added to water is so small — the equivalent of about one drop to 16 gallons of water — that toxicity is not possible.

For generations over 4,000,000 persons have been living all their lives in areas where the drinking water naturally contains fluorides in concentrations as high as or higher than that used in the fluoridation process. Yet no one has found adverse physiological effects.

Best All-Purpose Fruit Spray Mix For A Few Trees

What's the best "all-purpose" spray mixture to use on just a few fruit trees in the back yard? That's a question homeowners are asking Michigan State College horticulturists these days. Horticulturist Arthur E. Mitchell has this advice for people who want to mix their own all-purpose spray. Use 1½ level teaspoons of 74% to 76% ferbam, 3 teaspoons of 50% wettable methoxychlor and 2 tablespoons of 25% wettable malathion. These amounts are mixed together per gallon of water.

But, says Mitchell, many people may find it more convenient to buy a commercial "all-purpose" spray. It's available at most hardware stores.

He suggests that the spray — either the commercial preparation or your own mixture — should be applied at intervals of a week to two weeks during the season. How often you should apply the spray depends on how favorable the weather is for disease and insect development. The spray can be applied up to 2 weeks before harvest.

It's good for grapes and raspberry bushes as well as fruit trees.
