Contract for treatment of the paved streets of Buchanan was let to the Reith-Riley Construction company of South Bend at the special meeting of the city commission held Monday evening. The contract figure was 39 cents per square yard, which represents a total of about \$5,500 for the approximately 14,000 square yards of pavement to be treated. The contract calls for a double application of asphalt and stone chips. The commission also voted to advertise for bids for the installation of 2,000 feet of 6-inch water mains on Chippewa from 4th to Walnut.

On a sunny day in the early summer of 1946 I was toiling a few hours in the old Mt. Zion cemetery south of Dayton, endeavoring to prevent the old burying ground becoming an eyesore from grass and weeds to the passers-by. As in the other days I spent there, my thoughts were on the friends whom I had known who were buried there and also I was thinking of those pioneers, buried for a century or more wondering what they would say if they could return and see the changes. With a few exceptions, the pioneers are buried in the west end of the cemetery. The oldest marker is at the grave of Pemelia-Redding, who died in 1836. Pemelia was the first wife of Benjamin M. Redding, who founded the Redding Mill, after which the settlement was named until it was changed to Dayton in 1851.

Some time after Redding arrived here, his parents, Ezekiel and Rebecca, followed him in a few years they passed away, Ezekiel dying Oct. 18, 1838 and Rebecca Nov. 17, 1838. Both are buried in the same lot with Benjamin's first wife and several of his children. Ezekiel's family consisted of 11 children and Benjamin's of 12 children. Benjamin's second wife is buried in the Silverbrook cemetery in Niles beside the body of her husband. But how is the admiral related to the Reddings? As nearly as I can tell you, his great-grandmother on the paternal side was a daughter of Ezekiel Redding and the sister of Benjamin Redding. That makes her the great-aunt of the admiral. The Ingersolls have collected extensive information on Benjamin, part of which I will give you.

Dangers of a late summer drought repeating the weather patterns of 1945 and 1947 became remote during the past week, during which 95 of an inch of rain fell in scattered showers, moving the July total up to 1.82 inches, according to the measurements at the Ind.-Mich. Electric company hydro-electric plant station. This is still short of the July normal of 2.50 inches, but that shortage was compensated by the abundant rains which fell until the end of June. The rain has helped all late crops, especially the corn, which is now developing with prospects of a banner crop. Combines were again moving into the wheat fields yesterday (Wednesday) after several days of partial idleness on account of rain. Not more than a third of the wheat has been combined to date. On Monday, 3,000 bushels came into the Buchanan Co-ops from combining done Sunday afternoon. Only 500 bushels came in Tuesday, following rains Monday. Normally 10,000 to 12,000 bushels would be coming daily at this time, with favorable weather conditions, according to Robert Koeninghoff, manager of the Buchanan Co-ops. The oats are suffering more from the rains than the wheat and many farmers have moved from the wheat into the oat fields, as the oats tend to deteriorate rapidly from wet conditions when the grain is ripe. Wheat has not been damaged to date. The present week's wetness, the end of the cherry and raspberry harvests, with the beginning of the peach harvest over two weeks away. It is expected that the Jubilee peaches will be ready for harvest about Aug. 15. While summer conditions have been very favorable, the cold wet weather of May caused an increase of brown rot in twigs and stems that caused many of the fruit to drop. Stand of peaches on the orchards in this district is from medium thin to normal. The only fruit harvest in progress during the interval is in the orchards of early apples. The yield of early apples has been generally good. The yellow Transparents are about harvested and pickers are now moving into the Dutchess trees. Wealthy apples will be ready in two or three weeks. In the fall apples, McIntosh apples are a failure in most orchards. Good crop prospects are reported in the Hubbardston and Maiden Blush varieties, both winter apples. Other winter varieties are reported carrying a light stand.

There has been increased evidence during the past week that the ten-year campaign for a new grade school building is about to result in reality. Excavation for needed basement rooms and for the foundation was practically done yesterday except for a small amount of hand work. The basement rooms which were excavated will be the boiler room, fuel room, meter room, store room, fan room and locker room which is to be under the stage of the "community room" on the south side of the building. A force of eight men with a crane has been employed to date, but Jack Stross, construction superintendent for the Christman construction company, states that the force will be considerably increased as soon as the steel reinforcements for the concrete foundations and basement walls arrive. Before excavations were begun, the building site was shifted to the north to allow for the proposed 10-foot widening of Fifth street. The building will be set back 60 feet from Moccasin avenue and 34 feet, 11 inches from 5th street.



Eugene S. Briggs New International President of Lions

Eugene S. Briggs, Emd, Oklahoma, is the new president of the International Association of Lions Clubs. He was elected by unanimous vote at the 31st annual convention of the Association which closed in New York today. Briggs succeeds Fred W. Smith, of Ventura, Calif.

The convention concluded one of the most successful years in the history of Lions International, according to the report made by the Secretary-General and founder of the Association, Melvin Jones, of Chicago, Ill. He reported the formation of 819 new Lions clubs and the addition of 31,696 men to the twelve-month period ended June 30, 1948, for a total of 6,805 clubs and 358,144 members. He stated also that during the year Lions clubs were established in four additional countries—Sweden, Switzerland, Chile and Newfoundland, Lions International, he added, is "now the largest, strongest and most active service club organization in the world, with Lions clubs in 23 countries on five continents."

Briggs, in accepting the presidency, said "Peace is the number one problem of today. It is the first obligation against our efforts and resources. It is the primary obligation of our generation. Since Lions International is so vitally interested in every constructive movement for world peace and good-will around the world, it shall be our unwavering purpose to see to it that well-qualified representatives of our organization attend all meetings of Specialized Agencies of the United Nations, such as UNESCO, if it appears that we can be of service in charting a way to better international understanding."

"It is a distinct privilege for me as President of Lions International, officially to appoint our esteemed Lion and retiring International President, Fred W. Smith, to represent Lions International at the General Assembly of the United Nations to be held this autumn in Paris, France. As your President I am calling on every genuinely devoted Lion to do his part wherever he can go to hasten the day when good will among men shall reign upon the earth."

Briggs was born in Howard county, Missouri. He received B.S. degrees from Central College at Fayette, Missouri, and from the University of Missouri. From the latter institution he also received his M.A. degree in 1934. He received his Ph.D. degree from the Teachers College of Columbia University in New York City.

For many years, Mr. Briggs has been a very prominent figure in educational circles and since 1928 has been President of Phillips University in Emd, Oklahoma. He is the author of several books on education and is a contributor to educational and religious magazines. In 1929, he founded the Oklahoma Vocational Guidance Conference and he is a life member of the Oklahoma and National Education Association.

In Lionsism, President Briggs has held the offices of International Director, and Third, Second and First Vice-President. For six years he served the Okmulgee, Oklahoma, Lions club as director and during the year 1926-27 was president of that club. In 1929-30, while he was a member of the Durant, Oklahoma, Lions Club, he was District Governor of all the Lions clubs in the state of Oklahoma.

Lion Briggs is married and has two children. He is a member of all the Masonic bodies except the Shrine and is affiliated with a number of religious, welfare and educational organizations. He also belongs to Phi Delta Kappa, Kappa Delta Pi (honorary educational fraternities), and Pi Gamma Mu (honorary social science fraternity).

Would Break Up Big Cities in Clusters of Towns of 50,000

In the Bulletin of the Atomic Scientists, Tracy B. August, president of the American Institute of Planners, suggests that if we break up our large cities into clusters of small towns separated by a few miles of open country, much could be done to reduce the destruction that atomic bombs could wreck. He even thinks "the attack is not likely to come" if his suggestion is adopted.
At the present rate of building, we could redesign our cities in the way proposed in the next twenty-five years. "How and where that building is done will, in a large degree, determine the kind of nation we become in the years ahead," warns Mr. August. His words command respect because he helped to plan the city of Oak Ridge, Tenn., where bomb material is made.

According to Mr. August's plan, a city of a million population would be broken up into twenty towns of 50,000 persons each. Four or five miles of open country would separate one town from another. Hence the original city of a million would cover 886 square miles instead of a minimum of sixty-three. An atomic bomb dropped within the larger territory of clustered towns would have only a one-in-fourteen chance of hitting its target, compared with a sure hit in the case of Chicago or New York. Besides, a cluster of cities would enable people to get into the open coun-

ty more easily in peacetime, which ought to be good for their health.

Bessemer Process
One of the oldest and most spectacular of all the present processes employed in steel-making is the Bessemer process. A blast of air is blown through the molten iron, and elements such as carbon and silicon are oxidized in the intense heat that is generated. Modern converters can produce about 25 tons of steel in as many minutes as a single "blow."

Asteroid Appears, Vanishes

In 1927, an asteroid about a mile in diameter was sighted moving swiftly against the background of the stars. Before news of the discovery could be circulated, the body had swooped away and was lost. It has not been seen since that time. It was given a name, however, and that is Hermes; for the swift messenger of the gods whom the Romans called Mercury. From a few accidental observations of this body, made within a day or two of its discovery it was calculated that its nearest approach was about 500,000 miles, only twice the moon's distance.
