Pair of Weather Balloons Arouse Excitement

A great deal of curiosity was aroused in parts of Buchanan, at least, over the presence of two bright and shining objects a little more than half way up between the horizon and the zenith in the northern sky, and traveling slowly eastward Saturday afternoon.

One observer had a small telescope magnifying 20 times which clearly showed the nature of the two objects. One was a balloon of white nylon estimated to be about 30 feet in height perpendicularly. Over it was a not harness of light rope from which was suspended below a much smaller white nylon balloon, and suspended below that was a much smaller object which was doubtless the weather recording instrument case.

The observer stated that this eastward traveling object may have been released from the air landing field at Glenview, Ill. Many such balloons are released from Jackson, Mich. Usually a car or cars follow beneath them. The time fuse is usually set so that the top balloon will flare in quick flame a short time before dark. The lower balloon then provides sufficient buoyancy to check the speed of the fall of the instrument case so that the recording equipment will not be damaged.

This doubtless explains the small weather balloon such as the one found in the pasture of the Kenneth Smith farm about two years ago. Two cars spaced according to accurate speedometer readings a few miles apart and equipped with a telephone set on a small stand so that the angle of observation may be set can determine how high the balloon is, how far distance in any direction it is, and consequently about where it will fall.

Purple Martins Leave After Record Stay

The purple martins, the aristocrats of the swallow family, have taken off for their winter haunts in the south, after a late summer and fall convention of unprecedented size and duration in the grove in the north end of the C. O. Clark estate on West 4th street.

Says our 1920 edition of Webster's Unabridged "Purple martins, a large swallow, widely distributed in North America; formerly abundant in towns and villages." It is disappearing from localities where the house sparrow has become abundant.

How the times change! Sparrows are not so numerous but for about two months a tremendous flock of purple martins whose numbers have been estimated anywhere from thousands to scores of thousands, congregated for two months in the Clark grove. The martins have assembled here before, at least one year, in large numbers, but remained less than a month. This year they remained two months, and appeared to increase in numbers until the first of last week, when they began to leave gradually. The first of this week a very few were still left.

Mixed in with the purple martins were a number of starlings, stated Edward Abell, whose home is nearest to the Clark grove.

A recent Sunday issue of the New York Times magazine has a short article on starlings which calls them "a tramp breed of birds, whose importation from Europe 664 years ago has done little but unbalance the good nature of Americans and their culture." (Continued on Page 2)

Canvass For S.W. Mich. Scout Council Needs To Start Here Oct. 1st

Tomorrow, Friday, Oct. 1, the annual canvass for operating funds for the Southwestern Michigan Council of Boy Scouts of America for the coming year will be launched in Buchanan.

Again in charge will be Robert F. Habicht, who has headed the canvass here successfully for the past two years. The figure \$1,500 has been accepted as the local goal. The goal for the entire Southwestern Michigan Council is nearly \$40,000.

The Boy Scout program has now very firmly established itself as one of the main channels of training youth for citizenship. Boys become Scouts for the sake of the fun they get. But the program has been developed by experts as a continuous growing-up program for youth.

The manner of handling the funds received has been as carefully considered as the program for handling the boys themselves. Personnel of the governing officers of the Southwestern Michigan Council are selected as much for high integrity of character as for managerial ability. The use of the funds is carefully planned, and they are prudently disbursed.

For the most part the evidence of the expenditure is plainly visible to us. Over 25% of the \$40,000 raised goes to the maintenance of three camps: Camp Madron, near Buchanan, Camp Northpoint, near South Haven, Camp Bonnie, near Vandalia.

Approximately 11% goes to a program in advancing Scouts, including expense of merit badges, displays, camporees, camporals, "good turns" to communities. Another 12.5% goes to training adult Scout workers, including 46 Scoutmasters, 37 Cubmasters, 22 Commanders, and others.

When all channels of expenditure of the \$40,000 income of the Southwestern Michigan Scout Council are analyzed, approximately 89% is spent on services and organization expenditures and maintenance of camps, while a mere 1% goes outside the Council area in payment of the

National Charter fee and the Council's contribution for service from the National Office. All the financial records are carefully audited by a certified accountant.

Makes First Run To Oil Burner Blow-Up

The Buchanan township fire department made its first fire run about 2 p.m. Friday, having been called to the home of George Cooper at 510 Carroll street. They found a red-hot oil burner which had been flooded with oil when the carburetor of the burner exploded, burning out all of the ising glass, but no oil was thrown out on the floor and the damage was limited to the burner. Chief Wesner put out the flames with a fire extinguisher.

Chief Charles Wesner said that the siren had brought out a crew of six, which was adequate. The 5-hp siren now installed and hooked to electrical power connections has a lower pitch than that of the city, but it was heard by one of the members on the Buchanan cemetery force.

Burning Doll Buggy Sets Fire To Side Of Birdshaw Home

The Buchanan fire department was called at 4:45 p.m. Saturday to the home of Walter Birdshaw, 406 Eber street. The firemen found a doll buggy on fire next to the side of the house and a patch of shingles burning, ignited from the cab flames.

Acting Chief Earl Cramer stated that little damage was done. It was estimated that about 12 square feet of tar shingles would have to be replaced. The siding and structure of the house were not damaged.

City Approves Alexander St. Improvements

The improvement roll was confirmed for the installation of curb, gutter and storm sewer drainage on Alexander street from Oak street west to Phelps street.

The total estimated cost is \$7,486.50 of which the city is to pay \$2,154.45 and the property owners \$5,332.05. The work will include improvement of the structures at the crossing over the mill race, where separate structures will bridge the street and the foot passenger traffic on sidewalks on either side. The work was approved by the majority of property owners affected.

Resurfacing and rebuilding of the Smith street culvert across McCoy's creek is now in progress. The city crew is keeping the bridge open while they extend the overall width to 50 feet. The street existing of 15 feet street pavement will be widened 16 feet, with concrete sidewalks on each side that will widen the entire culvert to 50 feet, with guard rails on each side.

A special committee of the Berrien County Medical Society today issued a statement warning that an osteopathic hospital proposed for Buchanan will not be self-supporting and is likely to become a serious financial drag on the community.

The committee also expressed its view that federal aid for the project is unlikely to materialize. An organization of private citizens and osteopaths, Buchanan Community Hospital, Inc., currently is conducting a drive to raise \$300,000 to build the 40-bed community hospital.

The committee of doctors of medicine that issued today's statement is an arm of the county medical society assigned the task of surveying hospital needs in south Berrien county.

It includes these members: Dr. J. Colin Elliot, president-elect of the county society; Buchanan; Dr. John Strayer, past president of the county society; Niles; Dr. Robert L. Landgraf, chief of staff at Niles' Pawating hospital; Dr. Frederick H. Lindenfeld, Niles; and Dr. D. Kent Hassan and Dr. Russell J. Vastine, both of Buchanan.

Explaining the purpose behind today's statement, the committee said:

"This committee has only praise for anyone working to promote better facilities for care of the ill. It is not our purpose to criticize. But as medical practitioners in this community familiar with hospital problems, we feel an obligation to inform residents of the area of the true facts about hospital operation, both in general and also regarding difficulties peculiar to the Buchanan area."

On the subject of hospital operation, the committee said: "There were a total of 830 patients admitted to Pawating hospital in 1950 from all the area west of Niles, including Buchanan, Three Oaks, Galesburg, and north to Berrien Springs and Eau Claire. In that same year, the average patient stay was 5.4 days.

"This means there would be a total of 4,480 patient days used from this source in the proposed Buchanan hospital. Yet with 40 beds, there would be 14,600 patient days available.

"This indicates that the new hospital, if it receives all of these admissions, will still be operating at less than one-third of capacity. Nation-wide records show that the break-even point for the vast majority of hospitals is 70 to 80%. Below that, they lose money."

Continuing, the committee said: "It seems unlikely that the proposed hospital can depend on an amount of business equal to that which came from the Buchanan area in 1950. Nation-wide, doctors of medicine are prevented by professional standards from sharing its use under the suggested program. Their patients seem likely to enter other hospitals where they can be treated by physicians of their choice."

"In addition, many patients from Buchanan and its environs will choose for personal reasons—social or economic ties—to use other nearby hospitals."

example, is only five miles distant. And federal and state surveys indicate that its expansion to 121 beds, now being accomplished will be more than adequate for several years to meet existing needs for hospital beds in the Buchanan-Niles area.

"If this were not enough, Berrien county hospital at Berrien Center allocates 40 of its beds to accommodate residents of the south end."

The committee said that back ers of the osteopathic hospital have estimated the expense of operating it at \$150,000 a year.

"This committee feels there is considerable doubt whether this is an adequate figure, assuming satisfactory care is provided."

Turning to the subject of construction costs of the proposed Buchanan hospital, the doctors' committee said it doubted that \$300,000 would be enough to build it.

"Once more quoting federal and state survey figures, the fact is that the nation-wide average for hospital construction is \$10,000 to \$12,000 a bed. This would put the proposed Buchanan institution at \$400,000 or more. The new addition to Pawating hospital is costing \$16,000 a bed, with the heating plant, kitchen and laundry already built."

The doctors' committee said that Buchanan ranks 37th in Michigan for priority in obtaining federal funds under the Hill-Burton act to help build a hospital.

"This priority is so near the bottom of the list that it appears virtually a certainty Buchanan will not obtain federal aid for hospital construction in the foreseeable future."

The committee concluded with the observation that "we sincerely believe adequate hospital facilities now exist for proper care of residents of the Buchanan area."

The sole purpose of this committee in making this statement is to present the facts so that the Buchanan community, armed with accurate information, may make a wise decision on whether construction of the proposed hospital will be a benefit or a burden."

National Guard Aid Cuts Traffic Fatalities Labor Day Week-end

Latest figures leave little doubt that National Guardsmen performed a valuable public service when they joined hands with local and state police departments to patrol streets and highways during the Labor Day week-end.

The record is now accumulated and speaks for itself.

Under the plan 682 volunteer guardsmen, offered to help from Friday to Tuesday morning. Of these 51 were assigned to cities, villages and townships, 156 to sheriff's departments. The balance worked with Michigan State Police.

Guardsmen, who received a daily pay allowance according to rank and expenses, worked the same shift as police officers.

State Police totals show that rural trunklines, where 20 people were killed last year in 14 accidents, had only 4 deaths in 4 accidents this year. Of the 4 killed this year, 2 were in an isolated area in the Upper Peninsula. None of the fatal collisions oc-

curred in the most heavily policed areas known as the "29 high-accident sections."

The 22 killed in 1954 compares with the 31 killed in 1953. It looks more impressive when compared with average highway death during the summer of 1953—23.5 dead people per each Friday through Sunday. The Labor Day week-end total was slightly lower and included an additional 24-hour period.

Nearly twice as many arrests were made for violation of highway regulations. In 1953 there were 2,802 drivers ticketed. This weekend 5,209 violators had reason to wish they had been more careful. This increase of 2,407 resulted from the higher number of police officers and from a policy in force since spring that called for more arresting as well as cautioning of traffic violators.

Violations during the Labor Day period fell into the same pattern of percentages as other periods. 46% speeding, 15% disre-

garding stop signs or signals, 10% driving on wrong side of road, 7% improper passing, 5% drunk; the balance for miscellaneous reasons.

Not one adverse criticism reached police headquarters. Questionnaires sent to sheriffs were returned with glowing compliments. One sheriff from a sparsely populated county pointed out gratefully that his force without guardsmen would have consisted of himself and one deputy.

State Police Commissioner Joseph A. Childs, was also warm in his comments. He explained that use of guardsmen permitted twice as many state police cars at night. Troopers patrol in pairs after dark. A guardsman could act as the second officer.

During the day, when troopers work alone, the second man increased efficiency because only one car needed to be called to a collision. Since it takes two officers to handle an accident, two cars are summoned in usual procedure.

"Our experience with the National Guard was good," said the Commissioner. "They stayed on the job, worked about 10 hours per shift and didn't complain."

Interesting angle to campaigning, now in full force, is the tendency of Governor Williams to give Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler a hard time. Ziegler, who was also elected by the people of Michigan, is not a candidate for anything right now. His term does not expire for three years.

Requests for special reports by the chief administrative official keep the highway staff busy. Ziegler is in a delicate position regarding the governor's request for information. Accumulating the facts takes staff people off other important duties. Costs money that wouldn't need to be spent otherwise. In addition, the Commissioner seems a little suspicious about the governor's motives. He appears to worry that Williams is applying pressure for reports because of political reasons rather than an actual desire for knowledge.

Answer to the latest such request sent in a letter to the governor. The first paragraph read: "This will acknowledge your letter of Sept. 15, in which you request an enormous amount of detailed information and maps to supplement reports which I have previously made in complete accordance with the provisions of Act 51, P. A. of 1951."

Other sentences describe the busy activity in the department. The letter ends with a reference to a report now being accumulated and the curt information that it will be ready for the 1955 legislature.

More sales tax per person is collected from Michigan residents than from any other state except Wyoming according to Louis M. Nims, State Revenue Commissioner. In 1953-54 Michigan people paid an average of \$42.21 each. The per capita rate for Wyoming is \$43.93, only 77c higher than the Wolverine state. California was third with \$38.04. Nims said Michigan's rate is high because the state's income is very high, the tax base is very broad, and his department works very hard to collect it.

This Week We Present City's Oldest Store

In this issue of Sept. 30, 1954, the Record presents as its regular "Meet Your Merchant" feature, Tamerson Carlyle Binns, owner and manager of the oldest business in Buchanan, Binns' Magnet Store.

Mrs. Binns has managed the store since her husband, Harry Binns, died on July 7, 1951. Harry Binns had lived to be the senior ranking merchant in number of years in business for quite some time before he died. He was then 85 and had been in charge of the same business, though in different locations, for 67 years. He acquired the enterprise in 1883, when he was a boy 18 years old.

The enterprise was, in the beginning, only a news and stationary stand, located in the lobby of the Buchanan post office. The

post office was then located in a wooden building on the site of the present Michigan Bell building at 108 West Front street.

During the years intervening between then and now the store has been in five locations. The first four changes were made within 17 years after Harry Binns took over. In 1900 Mr. Binns moved into its present quarters, in a building owned by his father, Joseph P. Binns, and has remained there 54 years.

owner and manager will not resent the fact that most of this story will deal with the course of the business during the 67 years when it was conducted by her late husband.

Harry Binns entered the enterprise as a clerk when he was 15 years old, and the business belonged to a young man, George Hall. Mr. Hall became ill and went west for his health, dying shortly afterward. The business was then bought by Edward Ballengee, a justice of the peace, and Harry continued to work as clerk. The business lost money and Ballengee sold it to Binns.

The postmaster at that time was L. P. Alexander, one of Buchanan's early contractors and builders, and builder of the town's first high school building in 1871-72. One of the regular patrons of young Harry's newstand was the first settler on McCoy's creek, Charles Cowles. Mr. Cowles, a bear-like giant who was a river pole boat operator before he settled on McCoy's creek, would buy a paper, and start reading

it at once, slowly backing across the floor while he read, until he finally settled down with his back against the wall.

In 1889 John Graham became postmaster and the post office was moved to the present quarters of Fabiano's bar. Harry's business, after a hustler took over, had grown rapidly. It went with the post office to the room at 124 East Front. There Binns store took up over half the space and paid most of the rent. At that time Binns had two rivals in his business, in news and stationary stands, one in the Runner Drug store, where the Union State Bank now is, and the other operated by Baimore & Dodds. These two rivals brought pressure on Binns to move from the post office quarters. So in 1890 the Binns store was moved to the present quarters of Roti Roti Shoes. There Binns' business stock soon filled the store room, including a soft drink bar. In 1896 he moved his store again to 102 West Front street, in the east half of the present bottom floor

of Sexton's Furniture store. Then in 1900 he moved the store to its present home.

Mrs. Binns, then Tamerson Carlyle, entered his store in 1906 as a clerk, and has been associated with it ever since, first as clerk and later as wife and working partner of Mr. Binns. The Record wishes many more happy birthdays for both Mrs. Binns and her store.

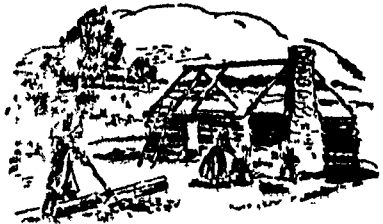

More Pictures Of Buchanan In Civil War

Of the seven wars that have to date left their red mark on the

history of the United States, the conflict that stirred most deeply the national feeling and drew most heavily on the manhood, young and middle-aged, was the "war of the brothers," the Civil War of 1861-65.

The population of Berrien county, compiled toward the end of the war in 1864, was 25,704. Over one-eighth of that number,

3,779, entered the Union armies as enlistment or draft. Of that total, 1,724 enlisted during the first half of the war before the Enrollment or Draft Act which went into effect Sept. 19, 1863. No such drain was made on the nation's youth in either of the so-called World War I and World War II. No such inner divisions in communities were ever raised by other wars.

The fires of division had been fanned to near-hysteria by seven years of political conflict between the rising Republican party and the Democrats, until the dissension was not sectional but actually sliced many communities down the middle. There was consequently a note of hysteria that was usually very advantageous to recruiters.

The Buchanan district was predominantly Republican in feeling, while Niles was predominantly Democrat. Not all Democrats were in favor of slavery—they believed rather that it was not an issue that should split the nation in war. Of course the attitudes of the party ran the gamut from patriotism to treason. During two periods of the Civil War, the tensions on the "home front" were highest, immediately following the outbreak of the war, and the months following the Enrollment (draft) Act in late 1863 and early 1864.

During such tension there was real fear that civil war might break out on the home front. The feeling of the loyal Democrats were expressed by an editorial by Darius Cook, publisher of the Niles Republican (a name Cook had selected for his paper before the new Republican party had adopted it).

Cook spoke for the majority of the Northern Democrats when he wrote, "We are ready to go when it is necessary to defend the flag of our country, but not to defend Chicago platforms and abolitionism." As we have repeatedly said, the South had no just cause for attempting to destroy the Union. Not a single act has been passed which was oppressive to them. On the contrary they have received all the protection they have asked for, and the rebellion must be crushed if it costs the nation all of its resources. The sooner it is done the better, and to accomplish this every true blooded Democrat will labor with all his energies." This was in the Niles Republican June 15, 1861.

There were of course extremists in each party. Radical Republicans dragged men from their beds at night in areas of dominating Democrat opinion near Niles, taking them to halls maintained by patriotic organizations in South Bend, where they were given a rigid cross-examination, but usually turned loose. Said Cook in the Niles Republican: "Republicans should remember that if Civil War breaks out in the North they will have as much to lose by it as the Democrats. The death of a single man for his opinion may lead to the death of thousands."

Cook's warning was not without its basis. Edwin Russell, a member of an old Buchanan family, living then in the Bend of the River, was a staunch Democrat who expressed his views and who was publicly threatened with lynching.

The early recruiting early in the war deepened the division. The "recruiters" were usually young men motivated by ambition as well as patriotism, who canvassed the homes on the promise of being appointed lieutenant or captain if they gained sufficient enlistments. Active in recruiting in Buchanan were John Graham, Benjamin Binns (an uncle of the late Harry Binns),

William Parrott and Richard DeMont. All became officers, with the rank of lieutenant or captain. This sort of individual initiative was occasionally badly abused.

In 1862 and afterwards the war news was relayed to most of the Buchanan community by the fore-runner of the Berrien County Record, the Buchanan Union, published on the third floor of the new 3-story brick, now known as the Hotel Buchanan by the firm of Lloyd & Turner.

The writer was once favored by a description of the weekly ritual of reading the war news in the Buchanan Union as told by the late Mrs. D. D. Pangborn. The father, Albert Tomlinson, lived in a log cabin located about a quarter of a mile west of the Miller school.

Tomlinson was a southern Democrat, but the reading of the Union was a ritual in the Tomlinson home. Mr. Tomlinson was one of the Democrats who thought the Civil War was unnecessary and blamed it on Lincoln. When the mail from town containing the weekly copy of the "Union" came, the paper was let strictly alone until after supper and chores were over.

Then, at the end of one of those days of interminable labor that characterized the frontier farm, Mr. Tomlinson would sit down at a plain table, with the mother and children around it sitting on benches made of half logs with smoothed sides up and pegs stuck in bored holes for the legs.

Then by the dim light of a sputtering candle the father read the war news. Though the children had learned to read in the Miller school, they must listen to their Democratic father who would read with the proper inflections and interpretations. Each time he came to the name of Abraham Lincoln his face would darken and he would mutter "Old black Abe." The term "black" was given Republicans who favored freeing the negroes from slavery.

Pre-Harvest Corn Picker Check Urged

It won't be long until farmers start to get their corn pickers in operating condition for the fall harvest.

Clarence M. Hansen, Michigan State College agricultural engineer, has this note of warning: Time the picking and harvesting of corn to make sure the corn is mature.

It's just as bad to pick immature corn as it is to let it wait too long, Hansen says. Most of the corn in Michigan will mature between Oct. 10 and 20.

Hansen also cautions farmers against leaving corn in the field

until the middle of winter before it is picked. And, he adds: It wouldn't hurt to get the picker out of the tool shed and check on its condition and power take-off speed. The power take-off should be kept up to the recommended speed — with the tractor running at full throttle.

Hansen recommends a slow traveling speed. Excessive traveling speed will shell a lot of corn and build up losses. Most manufacturers recommend a speed slower than 2 miles per hour.

Hansen suggests tightening husker roll springs to reduce shelling. The ear retarder may also give trouble if it is adjusted too close.

A tight retarder may force ex-

cessive trash into the wagon. An efficient fan is needed to remove the trash and give a clean load of corn, he advises.

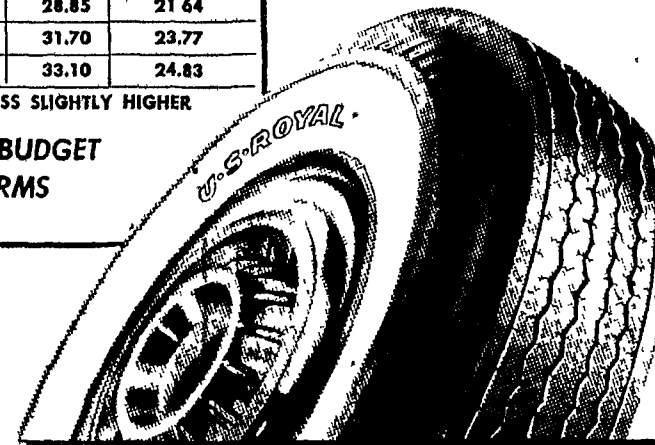

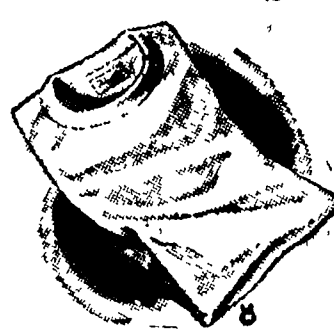

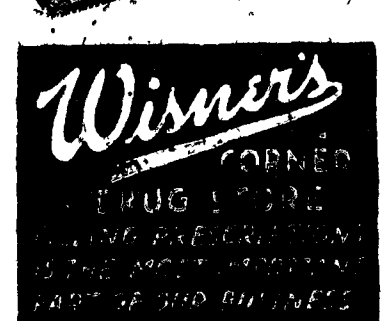

Mich. Agr. Dept. Now Completing Bug Battle

This year's concluding shots in Michigan's battle on bugs will be fired within the next few days on the southwestern front against Japanese Beetle while the war on Gypsy Moth around Lansing will become a scouting activity until the invading army shows itself next spring, according to G. S. McIntyre, director of the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

Airplane spraying of 800 acres in the heavy fruit areas around Coloma will be undertaken within the next few days in attempts to destroy any Japanese beetle larvae that may have dug in. At the same time 110 acres of land at Niles will be manually treated against the invading pest. The Federal government will aid the state financially, and Berrien county will pay for spray materials.

Japanese beetles were found at Coloma last summer, the first time that the dangerous insects were ever discovered in that state in a rural area. Several hundred were trapped there and at Niles. Last spring Gypsy Moth was discovered for the first time in Michigan in the outskirts of Lansing. 86,400 acres around Lansing were sprayed with DDT solution by airplanes. A thorough check of the sprayed territory by Federal and State specialists proved that eradication had been complete.

However evidence of Gypsy Moth was discovered outside the sprayed area in other adjacent lands. Between now and spring the Michigan Department of Agriculture will scout parts of 17 townships around Lansing in Ingham, Eaton, Clinton and Ionia counties, and the regions to be

sprayed next spring when the caterpillars emerge will be determined by surveys this fall and winter.

Septic Tank "Remedies" Ignore Facts

Don't be fooled by people who want to sell you "this new method of keeping septic tanks sweet and clean."

That's the advice from Walter L. Mallman, a bacteriologist at Michigan State College. He says that many such so-called remedies have appeared on the market from time to time.

The latest is a "highly concentrated mixture of enzymes." It is supposed to replace "lost or worn out bacteria" with new bacterial cultures. It is supposed to speed up the reduction of solid waste matter for easier drainage.

In the first place, says Mallman, the right kind of bacteria are in normal raw sewage. In the second place, he adds, they don't become lost or worn out. They reproduce by dividing themselves.

"I don't know of any substance on the market," he insists, "that will speed up the bacteria in doing their job."

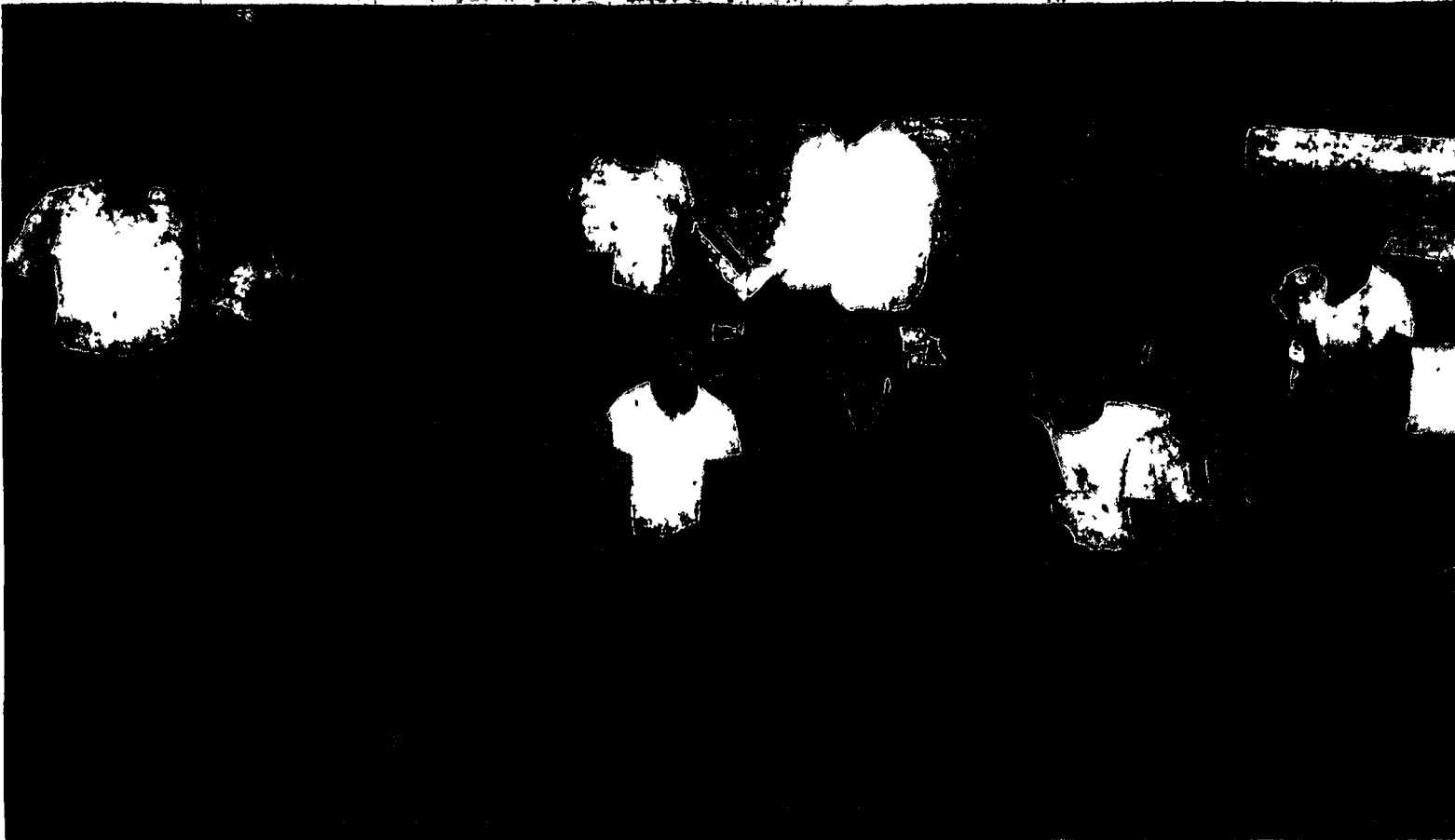
And remember, he adds, a septic tank has to be cleaned once in a while.
