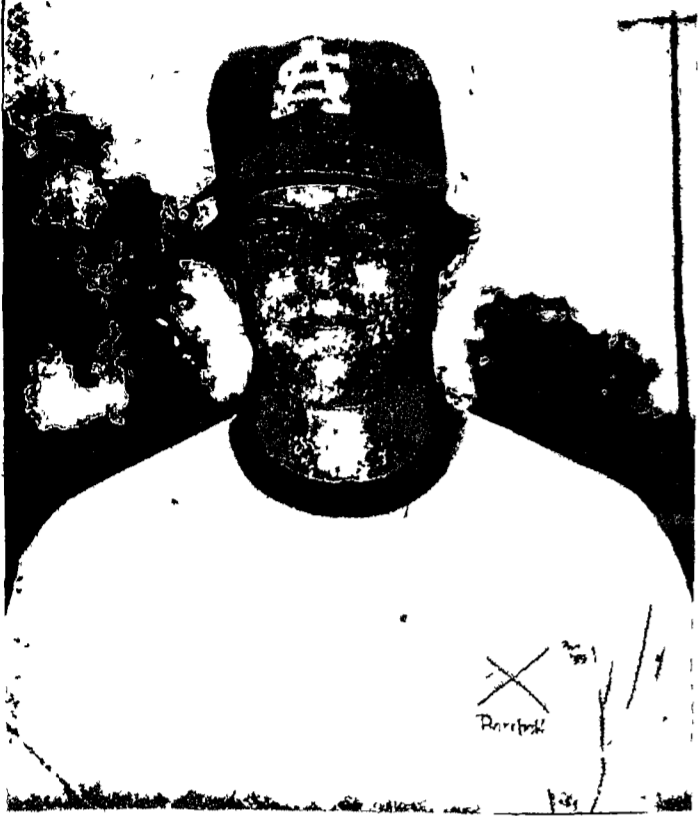

## Leader Dogs Offer Independence To People

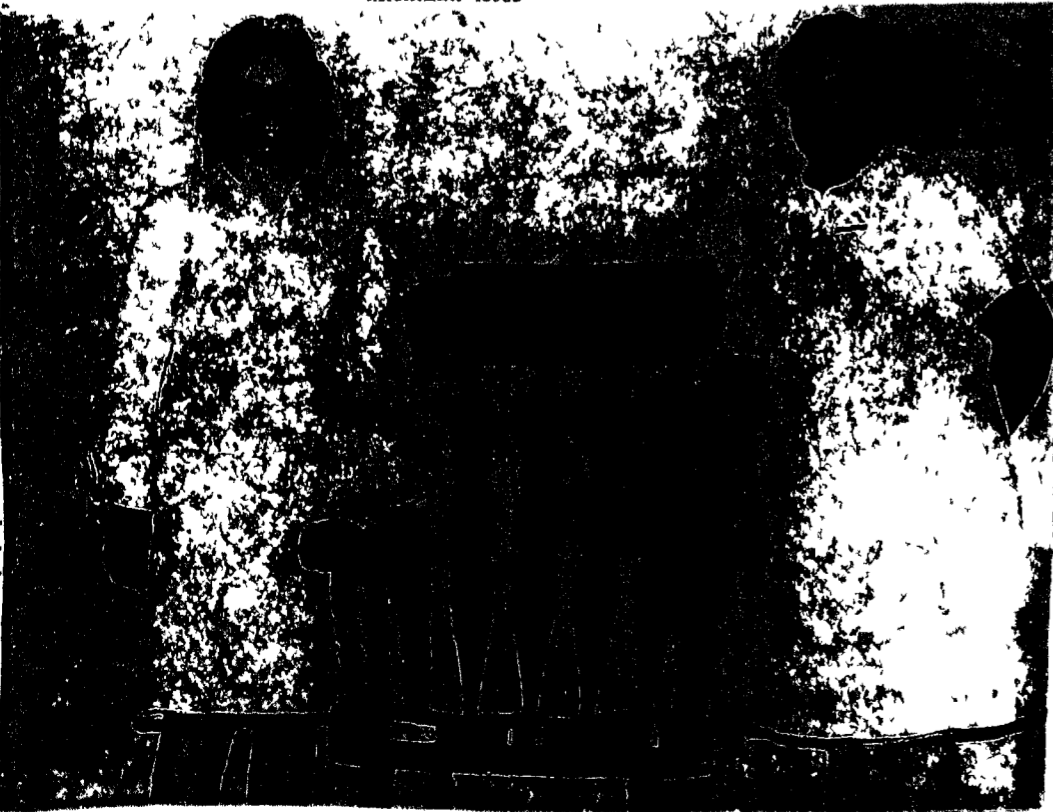
When Lowell Swem died, his family suggested that a suitable memorial to him could be made to Leader Dogs for the Blind. This was appropriate because Mr. Swem was a charter member of the Buchanan Lions Club which has long supported the Leader Dog program. Indirectly also the Buchanan United Way helps Leader Dog for the Blind in its annual gift to the Michigan United Way. One of the 25 agencies benefiting from the state United Way is Leader Dogs.

Harold Pocklington has been vice president and executive director for nearly 25 years. During that time 2,415 blind persons have acquired leader dogs at his school. The Lions started the Leader Dogs for the Blind in 1939 when they purchased an old farmhouse near Rochester, Michigan. Presently the school graduates about 250 persons a year in four-week classes with about 15 to 20 blind persons in a class. While the blind persons are in school 4 weeks, the dogs themselves are trained for a total of sixteen weeks. Pocklington said that the school only accepts German shepherds, labradors

and golden retrievers. He said that collies have a problem of shedding, and boxers are stubborn and drool too much. All dogs are contributed to the program, and none are purchased. Only dogs between the ages of one and two will be accepted. Any dog which fails his training is either shipped back to his original owner or placed in a good home.

The leader dogs eliminate one of the handicaps of blindness by providing independence to their new owners. There is no charge made for the dogs given to the blind nor is there a charge for the four-week course. However, the cost to Leader Dogs for the Blind is \$2600 for each team of dog and master. Buchanan's United Way allotment to this program last year was \$77. The Buchanan Lions Club gives several hundreds of dollars each year through their White Cane Week and through their money-raising projects throughout the year. Presently they are planning to man their concession stand at the County Fair, proceeds of which go to their projects to help the blind.

## City Gets \$116,600 In HUD Funds

It was announced at the city commission meeting Monday that Buchanan will receive \$116,600 in HUD funds to be used for community development. This was only \$3,000 less than the city had requested.

To make certain that everything is being done properly, the commission voted that their earlier confirmation of S.A.D. #21 for the remaining sidewalks in the middle school area be stricken from the records. In its place they accepted a resolution calling for August 25, 1975 to be the date for a public hearing on confirmation of the roll.

The city had received a request for \$500 from the Berrien County Canam Games and decided they needed more information before taking any action.

Adrian Koert, the traffic consultant, had submitted recommendations for certain parts of the city. He pointed out that the crosswalks in the downtown area which are now painted green should be painted white. He said green isn't an acceptable color. For reasons nobody could explain, it was stated that the

chamber of commerce had bought the green paint for that project. Other recommendations from Koert had to do with the Schirmer Parkway signs and with traffic control around the middle school.

Estimates for building a fence around the pistol range were tabled pending more information from one bidder.

The city denied John Jerue's request for a special burning permit mostly on the basis that it would open up a deluge of similar requests.

Last September, \$1,500 was authorized for a special Bi-Centennial committee. Nothing has been heard from this group, and the commission requested a progress report from them. There was some discussion about painting the fire hydrants for the Bi-Centennial, and the commission said that it would welcome any suggestions from individuals.

A bill for \$19,496.65 from Yerington Concrete Company was approved for work on the northeast area street improvements.

## Commission Urges Governor's Veto

The Buchanan city commission went on record Monday as opposing House Bill 5250 and Senate Bill 880 and urging Governor Milliken to veto them. The so-called political reform bills appear to be almost ready for the governor's signature.

Joseph Garbert, Jr. wrote a letter to Milliken pointing out that this legislation with its provisions for complete financial disclosure at all levels of government would have an adverse effect in attracting anyone to serve his local government. He said that it was an invasion of privacy which had been guaranteed us by the First Amendment. State representative Harry Gast and state senator Charles Zollar have both opposed these bills. Gast said that resolutions against them have been passed by most governmental bodies in his district.

Common Cause is the organization which has been lobbying for these bills which were originally designed to eliminate fraudulent practices in the Detroit area. The Buchanan city commission took the stand that if Detroit has problems, they should pass their own legislation to combat them.

It was indicated that many city officials would consider resigning their posts if the bills became law.

## United Way Is Making Plans

The many people involved in Buchanan United Way are now hard at work in preparation to this year's drive. It's slated to start September 25 for 1976 funds.

The admissions and budget committee has finished its initial work of interviewing and examining the agencies who share in United Way. All agencies were called in for extensive examination. The committee has been using a priority system in questioning and interviewing using such criteria as what the community derives from a particular agency and what services each agency provides. C.E. Reddig is chairman of the admissions and budget committee, and his members include Dorothy Stout, Martha LaSane, Ruth Bromley, John Montgomery, Robert Powers, Barry Borst and Corbin Detgen. These people are currently working on a proposed budget which they will present for approval to the board of directors of United Way.

The board consists of Bert Rowe, president, Robert Bellaire, vice president, Robert Janski, Steve Young, Keith Morrow, J. Russell Wales, Vincent Otteson, Earl Brownfield, Dan Cronin, Jeanne Roti, Harold Mosier, Dean Swem, Joseph Garbert, Ruth Irvine and Jane Housand. This board is made up of equal number of labor, management and at-large members. Agencies who have been interviewed include Berrien County Cancer Service, Riverwood Mental Health, Gateway (sheltered workshop), Handicapped Camping, Child and Family Service, Big Brothers, Salvation Army, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Y.M.C.A., Michigan United Way and Red Cross.

Last year's goal was \$52,000 which fell short by about \$3,000. It will be up to the committee and to the board to decide a practical goal for this year and to allot funds to the agencies accordingly.

When all is prepared, the 1975 drive will begin with another list of citizens who have volunteered to help. Robert Powers is this year's chairman, and John Montgomery is vice-chairman.

In subsequent issues of the Record, attempts will be made to explain various agencies involved.

## Band To Attend Camp In August

Preparing for their 1975 season, 2,700 bandmen from 31 Michigan high schools will visit the Michigan State campus to sharpen their playing and marching skills during August.

Each band will have one week's study under the leadership of its own director, with guidance from senior members of the Michigan State University band and counsel from MSU Band Directors Kenneth Bloomquist and Thad Hegerberg. Special attention will be devoted to flag bearers, drum majors and majorettes and percussion sections.

The bands, along with bandparent chaperons will live on the campus, practice on MSU fields and utilize MSU recreational facilities. Each band will perform briefly at a public show.

The week of August 25-30, Buchanan High School band will attend with other bands from Berrien Springs, Grosse Ile, Parkside (Jackson), Riverside (Dearborn Heights), Summerfield (Petersburg), Trenton and Utica.

The annual Marching Band Clinic is sponsored by MSU's Department of Music and Continuing Education Service.

Harleigh W. Riley

July 21st, one of Buchanan's oldest residents, Harleigh W. Riley of 403 West Front Street, celebrated his 87th birthday. He has resided here since his birth July 21, 1888 and has seen Buchanan grow from a small farming community to a city now containing major manufacturing concerns.

Mr. Riley looks back on an interesting and active career. He worked briefly as a telephone lineman and then as a lineman for the first power company in this area, The Charles A. Chapin Electric Co. At the age of 21, he had advanced to the position of superintendent of the Buchanan generating station, a facility which cost over \$1 million to construct -- a large sum in the year 1909. In 1927 he was named district manager of the company which had become the Indiana and Michigan Electric Company. In 1934 he was promoted to merchandising manager which meant working in the main office in South Bend. He continued to reside in Buchanan and retired from that company in 1949.

His life here can be summed up best perhaps by his comments some months ago when he saw a demonstration of a TV Video Tape Recorder. "Well, now I've seen everything," he commented. "Instant movies!" I saw Lincoln Beachey in a Curtiss biplane race Barney Oldfield, who was in an automobile. Barney won, by the way. I shook hands with Thomas Edison once at an American Gas & Electric Company banquet when he was about 55 years old and still have his autographed picture in my home. And I met Albert Stenmetz who was known as 'the genius of General Electric' and who was the only man there who could write his own salary. I saw the automobile replace the horse and the airplane grow from a dangerous curiosity to common

transportation. But photography has been a long-time hobby with me and with these 'instant movies', I've seen everything!"

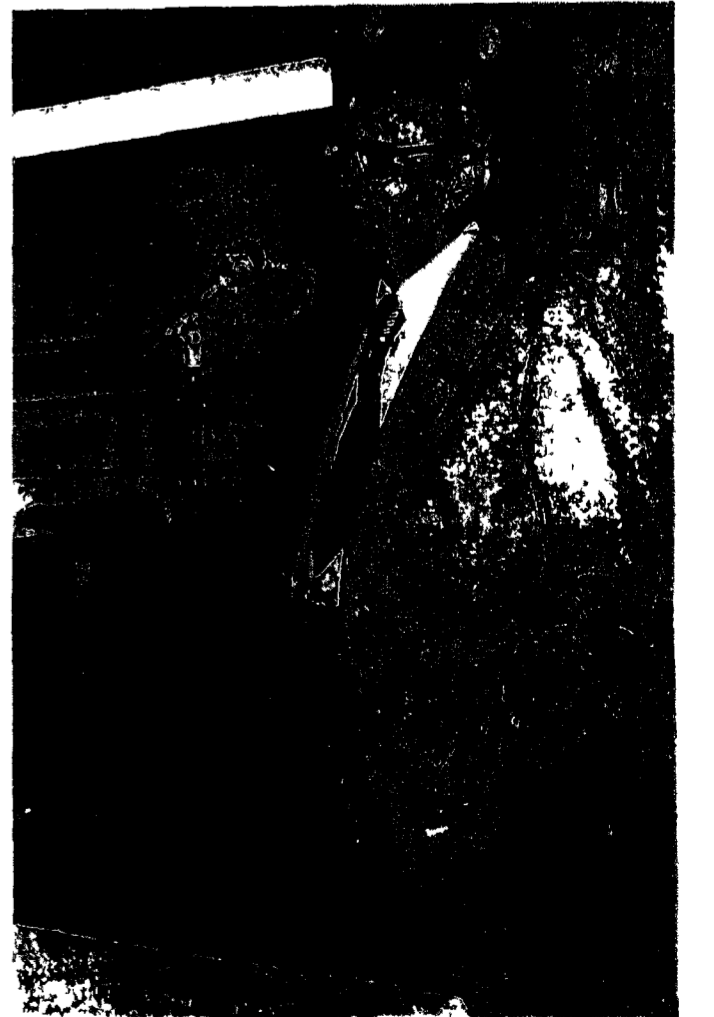
In 1909, Harleigh lost his wife, Verna, who had left her job as a typewriter operator for the Berrien County Record at age 16 to marry him. They were parents of three boys and three girls, four of whom still reside in this area.

A certificate recently received from The Descendants and Veterans of America's Wars proclaims the Riley Family to be an Official Freedom Bi-Centennial Family, since Mr. Riley's great grandfather, John Harper Jordan, fought at Bunker Hill and Fort Ticonderoga. John Jordan's family resided in Vermont after the Revolutionary War, later moving to Michigan and settling the area now known as Vermontville, near Lansing. Harleigh's father, Wallace, was reputed to be the youngest soldier in the Union Forces during the Civil War. His enlistment papers in the National Archives show the age of 14 and he was honorably discharged a four-year veteran at the age of 18 years. Harleigh, with five small children, saw no military service in World War I but served the government as a special agent for what was then the Secret Service.

Although he had many opportunities to leave Buchanan, he felt too close to the community and its people to leave home. Through his promotion of the use of electricity at a time when gas was used for cooking and lighting, and his aggressive expansion of rural electrification, he came to know virtually every family in southern Berrien County. There is a local proverb which states that once you get your feet wet wading in McCoy's Creek, you will never leave Buchanan. Harleigh could confirm that long before most of us were born.

## A Minute With Mary

### Abrasive Cleaners May Harm Bathroom Fixtures

The toughest cleanser you can buy may not be the best for every job, according to Dr. Anne Field, Michigan State University Extension specialist.

Some cleaners may do more harm than good to your bathroom fixtures -- if the cleansers are harsher than they need to be. Here's a test to check the hardness of your cleanser.

You'll need two small, flat pieces of glass and your cleanser. Place one piece of glass on a clean flat surface, and sprinkle the glass with cleanser. Then put the other piece of glass square on top of the cleanser. Press down lightly with your fingers and move the top glass in a circular motion. If you can hear glass being cut, your cleanser contains damaging abrasives.

After 10 seconds, clean off all the cleanser and hold the glass pieces up to a light. If you can see fine scratches, the cleanser you used may ruin your bathroom fixtures. It may cause scratches when you clean the fixtures covered with porcelain enamel, which is also glass.

Abrasive cleansers are for special surfaces and stains. If you use them every day, they will dull fixtures, making them

difficult to clean.

So what can you use to get fixtures clean? Try plain old detergent and water. Rinse with clear water. Or substitute a solution of one tablespoon trisodium phosphate in one gallon of warm water to make surface shine again. Trisodium phosphate is usually available from paint stores.

If you have been using harsh cleansers for a long time, the surfaces are probably already scratched; so, you'll have to keep using the same harsh cleansers to get dirt out of the already formed scratches.

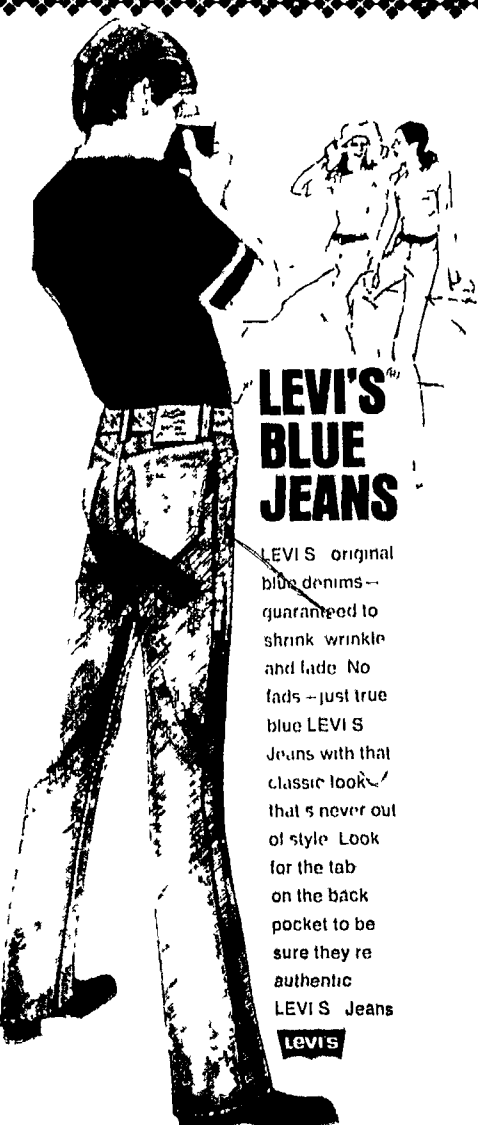

Detroit (October 31, 1776) A coalition of Indian tribes led by the fabled Pontiac has today ended a siege of Fort Detroit.

The siege which began six months ago was unsuccessful because British supplies arrived by river to keep those inside alive.

A trader, inside the Fort during the siege said that the Indians first tried to take the Fort by surprise. The commander was warned ahead of time and the Indian trick didn't work. The Indians turned on all the English living outside the gate. Not many of them got out alive, he said.

Major Henry Gladwin, 33, commander of the Fort, said that his tactic was to outwit the Indians. The Indians outnumbered us. We started the siege with only 300 regulars. Our best estimate is that Pontiac had more than 800 men.

A local French farmer said many of his neighbors helped the Indians. He said that the English did not understand or appreciate the Indians.

The British are not like the French. They do not willingly give gifts to the Indians. They're farmers and want only the Indians' land. They allow private traders to raise prices for goods needed by the Indians, he said.

"The British do not respect the Indians. They want the Indians' trade but not their company," the French farmer added.

Major Gladwin said that he was surprised by Pontiac's tactics. "It is unheard of for Indians to lay siege for so long. Pontiac might have won too if it had not been for our outlet to the river," he said.

### Clark Earnings Up Slightly

Clark Equipment Company announced an 11 percent increase in sales and a slight rise in earnings for the second quarter of 1975.

Net income for the second quarter was \$13.6 million or \$1.00 per share, compared to \$13.5 million or 99 cents per share for the same period in 1974. Quarterly sales were \$384.7 million, up from the \$343.8 million reported in the second quarter last year.

For the first six months of 1975, Clark recorded net income of \$26.4 million or \$1.94 per share on sales of \$738.2 million. In 1974 the company had net income of \$24.3 million or \$1.79 a share on sales of \$663.4 million for the first half of the year.

Results for both years are stated on the LIFO (last-in-first-out) basis of valuing domestic inventories.

"The higher sales resulted primarily from price increases, as unit shipments declined somewhat in most product lines," said Bert E. Phillips, president and chief executive officer. Another factor was a backlog of orders that stood at \$46 million at year end 1974 and had declined to \$515 million on June 30, 1975.

He pointed out that although some capital expansion plans have been delayed because of the current softness in business, the company expects capital expenditures to approximate last year's record \$72 million.

"Over the long term we still foresee excellent growth potential," Mr. Phillips said. "Our primary goal today is to continue to improve operating efficiencies and deploy assets to our most promising areas of business in order to enable the company to compete profitably in the anticipated rebound of the world economy in general and the capital goods sector in particular."

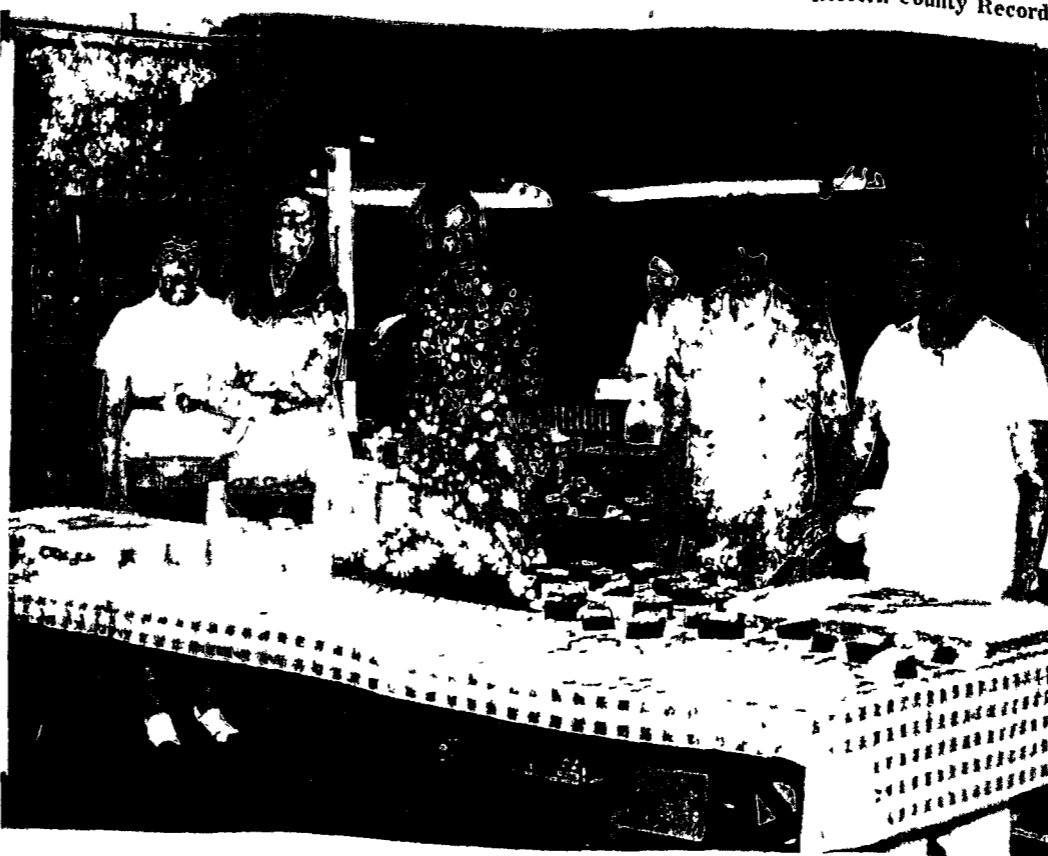

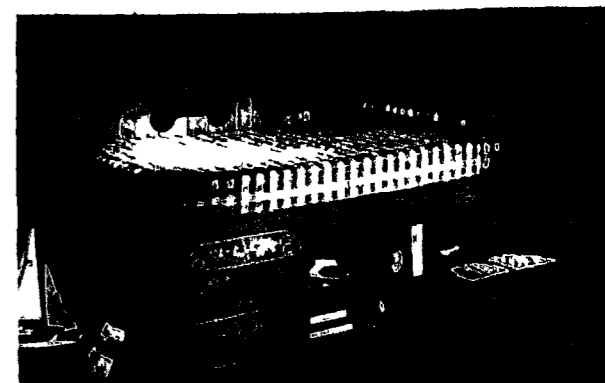

Indiana & Michigan Electric Company announces it will resume construction work immediately on the 1.1-million-kilowatt No 2 generating unit at its Donald C Cook Nuclear Plant at Bridgman.

Work on the unit had been halted last November as the result of mounting economic pressures on I&M. Construction of the unit had been 57 percent completed at the time

Robert M Kopper, executive vice president of I&M, said the rate relief granted to the company by the Public Service Commissions of both Indiana and Michigan had made possible the resumption of construction work at the plant on Lake Michigan

He said that plans called for the gradual build-up of the construction work force to approximately 200 by December, with the objective of having the generating unit in service by the fourth quarter of 1977

Meanwhile, the Cook Plant's Unit 1 has been in successful test operation and is expected to be placed in commercial operation within the next few months. It is presently licensed to operate at 820,000 kw

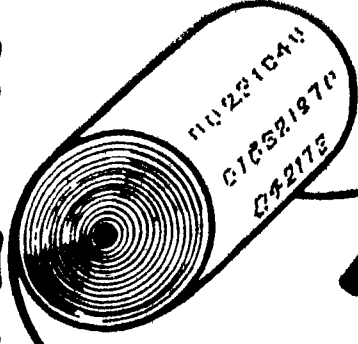

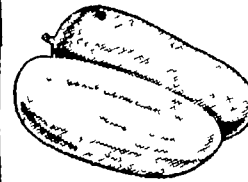
