Seek Rezoning for 42 Townhouse Units

Plans for construction of 42 townhouse units were made known Monday night as a request for rezoning was filed with the City Commission Action on the rezoning was referred to the City Plan Commission for consideration at a special meeting.

The rezoning request was for 5 acres of property on West Fourth street owned by Genevieve Currier, located west of St. Anthony's Roman Catholic church. The request is for rezoning from R-1 single family to R-3 multi family residential.

Robert S. Malone, spokesman for the corporation planning to build the units, said construction is scheduled to start as soon as rezoning is approved. The 42 units will be housed in six buildings, seven per building. Three buildings will be constructed this summer and construction will be started on the other three before winter, so they will be completed next spring.

The townhouse buildings will be of two-story colonial design, similar to the Village West in Niles. The six buildings will be located so as to form a 2-acre courtyard in which there will be a swimming pool park and recreational area for townhouse residents.

One two and three bedroom townhouses will be available, each with its private entrance and patio. Each townhouse will feature carpeting thruout and be equipped with air conditioning, complete home laundry equipment built in range, refrigerator, dishwasher, garbage disposal and hard maple cabinets. Each unit will be completely sound proofed and heated by natural gas.

Malone said rent for the units will range from \$130 to \$180 per month including heat and water. Tenants will pay for their own electricity. Garages will be available at additional cost.

Cost of the entire project including land is estimated at \$700,000.

Attention, kiddies! Mr. Leap Ears, the Easter bunny, is coming Saturday afternoon.

He will be at Memorial field at 1 o'clock Saturday with candy and prizes for everyone, ages 2 thru 12 years.

Don Fernwalt, chairman of the Easter egg hunt, sponsored annually by the Jaycees, said Mr. Leap Ears will hide his Easter eggs at Memorial field and then be on hand Saturday to make sure each child finds an egg.

Rain date for the hunt will be Easter Sunday at Memorial field, starting at 3 p.m.

Kenneth Witt was re-elected to his fifth one-year term as mayor during reorganization of the City Commission Monday night, the first meeting of the 1968-69 year. Joseph Bachman was re-elected to his third term as mayor pro-tem.

The election followed swearing-in ceremonies as Maurice Nelson took oath of office for his fourth three-year term as a city commissioner and Trent Hall took his first oath of office.

Following a lengthy discussion, the commission deferred action on procedures to follow in implementing provisions of the city's sidewalk ordinance.

Repair and construction of new sidewalk has been a pet project of Commissioner Herbert Henderson. After the ordinance was passed last year, property owners whose sidewalk needed repair were asked to make the repairs on a voluntary basis. Approximately 2 miles of sidewalk were constructed, most of it as replacement of sidewalk in bad repair.

Because of the success of the volunteer program last year, Henderson proposed that the remaining sidewalk repair be placed on a special assessment basis this summer and that construction of sidewalk in areas not now serviced be placed on a voluntary basis. Next summer construction of new sidewalks would be placed on special assessment on an enforcement area basis rather than the city as a whole. Construction of new sidewalks would then be enforced in a new area each year until the entire program was completed.

In other action the commission

—Approved sale of a 4-foot strip of city-owned land adjacent to Booster's tavern to Kenneth Gill, owner, at a price of \$2 per square foot. Gill said the additional land was necessary for his proposed new building.

—Voted to extend the bid opening time for the northeast area sanitary sewer project from April 18 to April 24. This was necessitated by a delay in obtaining soil borings on which

Clark Contract Talks Continuing

"Negotiations are continuing and progress is being made" was the report from the bargaining table Tuesday as the contract deadline between Local 468 UAW-AFL-CIO and Clark Equipment company nears.

Lemuel Barker, local president and Malcolm House, director of industrial relations at Clark, each reported progress.

The current three year contract expires at midnight Easter Sunday.

Negotiations were moved from Clark to the Four Flag Motor Inn in Niles Monday, where they are continuing daily.

Members of Local 468 balloted Tuesday and approved a strike by a vote of 1301 to 149. Barker explained that a strike vote is routine when a union faces a contract deadline.

Hire Landscape Architect To Plan Park Development

The landscape architectural firm of Robert L. O'Boyle and Associates of Kalamazoo has been engaged to prepare a master plan for development of the

northside park in the urban renewal area. The firm was offered a contract by the Park and Recreation board at its regular meeting Thursday night.

It is hoped that a preliminary plan can be accomplished before July 1 and that some park development may be completed this summer. Completion of at least the first phase of the park is scheduled for next summer.

After the major plan is presented, the park board will decide in what order various stages of development can be completed with available funds. The board currently has about \$20,000 available. A master plan will permit orderly development of the park as funds become available.

Cost of the master plan has been estimated at \$1,700. Estimated cost of the park thru the first stage of development, including \$14,000 for land purchase, is at least \$35,000. The land presently is owned by the city.

In other business, the board

—Authorized the Little League to erect a permanent outfield fence for the league field at Smith park. The fence is to be 4 feet high and of chain-link. The estimated \$600 cost is to be paid by the league.

—Authorized advertising for a summer recreation director. —Instructed Doug Borgert to set up the summer recreation program prior to July 1 when his contract as recreation director expires. Borgert has indicated he does not plan to continue as director.

"ROUND THE TOWN"

The possibility that Buchanians were the "cleanest people on earth" was raised in a recent story in the Record, based on the unusually high water consumption.

This story would have been considered as the joke of the year by an outsider touring the city Monday. A complete lack of civic pride by many of our residents was very evident as strong gusts of wind scattered paper and tin cans along streets and across yards.

City residents are indeed fortunate to have regular weekly rubbish pickup. However, unless continued abuse of this privilege is stopped the City Commission might be wise to consider discontinuing the service.

City ordinance provides that all rubbish placed at the curb shall be in a can with a tight-fitting cover. However, residents continually place loose paper and other rubbish in open cans, in open paper sacks and baskets, and other open containers. As result trash is blown about the city almost daily, but it does not come to the attention of many people until it reaches the magnitude it did Monday. City hall received numerous complaints from residents who objected to having their lawns and flower beds buried under wind tossed litter.

What is lacking in the city ordinance is regulation as to how much in advance of regular pickup time rubbish, even in closed containers, may be placed at the curb. It is not uncommon for rubbish to be placed at the curb, sometimes in

The fund was started by a donation by Mrs. Burdette (Berda) King, owner of Buchanan Grill. Rev. Harris reported that Mrs. King donated proceeds of the Grill for the 2-hour period Tuesday morning during which many businesses were closed.

As a part of the local, state and national tribute to Dr.

King, school was dismissed all day Tuesday and many businesses and city hall closed from 10 o'clock to noon during the funeral in Atlanta, Ga.

Suspect Arson In Rural Blaze

Berrien County Sheriff department deputies are investigating the possibility of arson in connection with another abandoned house fire which occurred early Wednesday morning in Buchanan township.

The Buchanan township fire department was called to the Herb Walter farm on Coveney road, just south of Glendon road, at approximately 1 a.m. Firemen found the farmhouse completely ablaze. Fire Chief Charles Wesner said, and were concerned mainly with keeping the fire under control as there is considerable underbrush around the house. The house was destroyed by fire.

Soon after the Buchanan township fire truck arrived at the scene of the fire, it was reported that the Bertrand fire department had received a call that a barn was burning on Bertrand road. Bertrand firemen spent considerable time trying to locate the fire but could not find such a fire and viewed the call as a false alarm. Deputies are investigating the possibility that there might be a connection between the farmhouse fire and the fire call to the Bertrand department.

Grass Fires Plague Firemen

Grass fires kept area firemen busy thruout the day Monday as strong winds swept the area.

Bertrand township firemen answered three alarms and Buchanan township firemen answered two Monday and one Tuesday. Buchanan city firemen assisted on two township fires Monday.

Bertrand firemen were called to 1305 Chapel Gate at the east end of the township about 10:20 Monday morning, where blowing trash ignited dry grass. Niles township assisted on the fire.

At 11 a.m. firemen extinguished a grass fire on Wiser road, and about 4:50 p.m. they were called back to the east end of the township where fire burned a narrow strip for about three-quarters of a mile along the river between Bertrand and West River roads. Firemen were at the scene until about 9 p.m. and called Buchanan city for assistance.

Buchanan township firemen received two calls within five minutes, shortly after 11 a.m. Monday. The first was to the Old Pletcher farm on Madson Lake road where grass was ignited by a break in a power line. The second call was to the LaVon Zeimer farm on Miller road, where a tenant was burning trash and it blew into a field. An old building was damaged by fire. When the second alarm was received, Buchanan city firemen were called to assist because of the strong wind.

Township firemen extinguished a grass fire at the foot of Moccasin bluff hills shortly before noon Tuesday. Chief Charles Wesner said it was started by children.

Clark Buys British Firm

Clark Equipment company has announced purchase of outstanding shares of Stacatru Limited, a British producer of industrial trucks. The purchase was made thru Clark Equipment Limited, a wholly owned British subsidiary of the U.S. company Clark. Clark has held a 33 1/3 per cent interest in Stacatru since 1957.

The shares were purchased from the British company of Austin Crompton Parkinson Electric Vehicles Ltd.

Walter E. Schirmer, Clark president, said: "The purchase of Stacatru will enable us to establish a more integrated European lift truck manufacturing and marketing operation. It will also enable us to expand the technical and engineering exchange first started when Stacatru was licensed to build Clark forklift trucks in 1957."

Stacatru employs approximately 650 persons at Birmingham, England, where the company manufactures 34 models of industrial trucks and sells Clark's complete line of internal combustion and electric trucks. The company exports more than 50 per cent of its products to European markets. 

Cost Per Serving

One pound of breast will give four servings at a cost of 15 cents per serving. One pound of whole fryer gives only one and one third servings at a cost of 24 cents per serving. To help you figure too, know that fryer legs give about three average servings per pound. So next time you check on chicken, check the cost per serving too.




