## SCHOOL ASKS WIDENING 5TH STREET

### Ordinance Allows Freer Use in Less Space in Class B Residence

#### Second And Final Hearing Will Be Held Mon., Oct. 15

Planning Commission To Use Large Zoning Map In Explanation

Those who attend the second and final public hearing on the proposed City Zoning Ordinance, to be held Oct. 15 in the commission room at the city hall, will see a large map on one of the walls of that room, illustrating graphically the location of the six various zones. There, with the map at hand, the members of the City Planning Commission can explain the why and wherefore of their locations far better than is possible in print.

Class A Residence occupies by far the greater part of the sections of the city reserved for residence. Class B Residence districts is limited to certain sections of lots on both sides of North Portage street from Fourth street north, and on both sides of Days avenue from Chicago street to Jordan street.

Class B Residence was created to accommodate residents who wish to have less restrictions, both as to size and use of houses and yards. Some families, limited in number of members, or perhaps single persons, may wish smaller houses and may not wish to be burdened with the care of larger grounds. In this zone, consequently, the minimum floor space requirement per family is only 400 square feet as compared to 600 square feet in Class A Residence, the requirements in both classes of course being limited to construction after the ordinance becomes effective. Only 2,000 square feet of lot space will be required per family for new construction, as compared to 4,500 square feet in Class A Residence.

In addition to the residential and limited professional and home occupational uses permitted in Class A Residence districts, the following additional uses will be allowed:

1. Multiple dwellings, hotels and apartment houses
2. Hospitals or sanitariums for other than the insane or feeble-minded, with certain requirements for building location and lot space
3. Buildings used for philanthropic purposes and similar entertainment purposes.
4. Clubs, social, recreational and community center buildings, excluding such as are carried on for business such as bowling alleys and dance halls.
5. Nurseries for children.
6. Storage garages for non-commercial vehicles. In addition such limited business as dining rooms, drug stores and news stands, if their business is such as is usually conducted in hotels and apartment houses.

#### The Story of Buchanan

#### How Buchanan Got Its Name

#### Why It Was Named For James Buchanan 15 Yrs. Before His Presidency

This writer has attempted an orderly development, as orderly as other duties permit, of the story of Buchanan, with a bit of emphasis here and there on themes that seemed to lack attention in other local history writings, such as the significance of the work done by Isaac McCoy and by the first surveyors.

This week the installment will be in the form of an interlude in answer to an urgent question by a reader, who wanted to know why Buchanan was so named, and why it would have been named after president James Buchanan, when it was started and titled 15 years before he assumed the presidency in 1857.

The name of Buchanan was first given to the township in 1837, and to the town five years later. Buchanan township was named by the Michigan state legislature, which at that time was splintering names of prominent Democrats all over the map of the lower part of the Lower Peninsula, where settlement was in progress.

The reason for imposing such names was not entirely partisan. The Democrat party was still dominated by one of its greatest leaders, who had stepped out of office to give place to his chief political lieutenant, Martin Van Buren on March 11, 1837. Seven days after that event the Michigan legislature, entirely Democratic in complexion, approved an act setting up Buchanan township, on March 11, 1837. In defining the township the act also gave it its name.

On Oct. 29, 1829, the Michigan legislature approved an act naming and defining 13 new counties. One of the following nine was named after officials of the Democratic national administration, Andrew Jackson having lately taken office for the first of his two terms. Barry (after William T. Barry, Postmaster-General), Berrien (after John M. Berrien, Attorney-General), Branch (after John C. Branch, Secretary of the Navy), Cass (after Lewis Cass, then governor of Michigan Territory and Secretary of War after 1831), Eaton (after John H. Eaton, Secretary of War from 1829 to 1831), Ingham (after Samuel D. Ingham, Secretary of the Treasury), Calhoun (after John C. Calhoun, vice-president), Jackson (after Andrew Jackson, president), VanBuren (after Martin VanBuren, Secretary of State) for many years afterward the above group were commonly known in Michigan as "the cabinet counties".

James Buchanan was not a member of the cabinet but was a senator from Pennsylvania from 1834 to 1844. When he entered the Senate, Michigan, with the stream of emigration through the Erie canal and Lake Erie, approaching high tide, was clamoring for recognition as a state. The required population had been reached, but Congress delayed, pleading that the boundary dispute between Ohio and Michigan had never been settled, and must be settled first. Michigan also had a boundary complaint against the state of Indiana. All this will be referred to more fully later.

The point bearing on the naming of Buchanan township was that James Buchanan became to an extent the champion of Michigan in a fight for admittance as a state that lasted two years. The fight almost reached the status of interstate bloodshed in the clash that has gone down in state history as "the Toledo war", when Ohio and Michigan troops faced each other for a short time during the climax over the dispute over the mouth of the Maumee river.

Feeling ran high in the backwoods settlement and the name of James Buchanan as Michigan's champion spread wide by print and word of mouth. Michigan was then enthusiastically Democratic in politics. The Democrat party was the party of the frontier, and its leader, Andrew Jackson, was the frontiersman's darling, if you could apply that degrading name to a man so ag-



gressive and dominant Jackson and the men around him had in fact been wholeheartedly on the side of the frontiersmen when their interests were at stake. They had promoted the land laws the woodsmen wanted, they had promoted military posts for the safety on the frontier's western-most limits, they had worked for the extension of roads, canals and railroads that would provide transportation for their products. Consequently it does not seem likely that the majority of the 27 families in Buchanan township at the time of its organization were opposed to the township's name. Dr. C. C. Wallin, the first supervisor, was indeed a Whig (a political counterpart then of the present Republican party). Soon afterward he became deeply embittered against the Democrats in general, owing to a misunderstanding over the entry of his land which resulted in the total loss of land and improvements. This will be another story.

John Hamilton laid out the village plat in 1842, and it was recorded on July 21 of that year under the name of Buchanan. The promoter of a town plat had the sole right to name it, although Hamilton may have consulted the half dozen families then re-

National Specialists Talk On Problems Of Guiding Youth Today

The National Vocational Guidance Association held their National committee meeting at the Kellogg Center for Continuing Education at Michigan State College, East Lansing, some thirty guidance workers and Michigan, including John Flynn, local high school counselor, were invited to sit in on the meeting and hear reports by various officers of the organization.

Dr. Donald E. Kitch, chief, Bureau of Occupational Information and Guidance, State of California, outlined the program that is being carried out in California. He spoke rather proudly of their Junior College program and the role guidance is playing throughout the school program in his state.

Dr. Mary Drucker, assistant state director of guidance in Ohio, spoke on the work being done in her state. She emphasized the cooperation that had been achieved between the schools and the state employment service in placing graduates and those who leave school early. The value of the U.S. and state employment testing service was stressed in assisting youth to select vocations intelligently, rather than by the trial and error method.

#### Too Narrow For School Traffic Main To Moccasin

The widening of Fifth street from Main to Moccasin avenue was recommended by the Buchanan school board to the city commission in a letter read at the second September meeting of the latter in the city hall Monday night.

The present right-of-way is 32 feet wide, leaving a street clearance of twenty feet from sidewalk to sidewalk. The presence of the Moccasin school results in heavy traffic in certain hours over this street, and the allowance of parking on one side leaves the street narrow for traffic. A chief complaint of the school authorities is that when there is snowfall, the city snowplow throws snow on both sidewalks, rendering them impassable for foot traffic.

The school board authorized City Manager Gunn to offer Mrs. Belle Wagner \$1,000 for Lots 22 and 23 in the block, which parallel the street. If as the plan of the board that if the lots can be bought, one of them will be used as a site for the Girl Scout cabin, which will be moved there from Kathryn Park.

It is planned that Fifth street would be widened to a 50-foot right-of-way. This would leave a street 40 feet wide exclusive of sidewalks, and the avenue of traffic would be 30 feet wide, with a five-foot tree lawn on either side.

Alternatives in the event that ground for widening the street does not become available would be to eliminate parking entirely, or make the block a one-way street for east-bound traffic only.

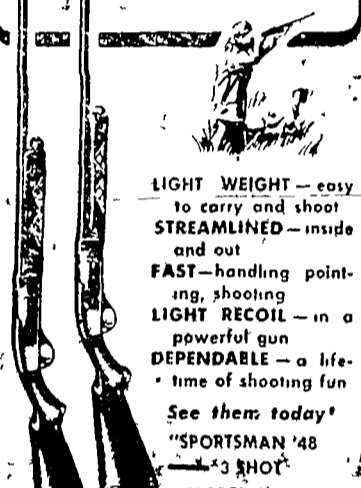

siding within the plat's boundaries. Whether he also wished to honor James Buchanan, or merely followed suit after the naming of the township cannot be said, but the latter course was common. The city of Lansing when it was platted in the wilderness in 1847 as - the state capitol site, was named after the township in which it was located, after a long dispute of over a number of more or less "political names". The city of Benton Harbor, laid out in 1860, merely continued the name of the township of Benton in which it was located, and which had been organized and named by the state legislature in an act approved March 11, 1837, doubtless a part of the same act which organized Buchanan township. In the case of Niles, the procedure was reversed, the town having been platted and named before the township of Niles was organized.

Or since the absence of complete information has led to some supposing, perhaps it was some skulduggery in the legislature. Already in 1840 there was a cry in the state to move the capitol from Detroit (then a frontier city of about six or seven thousand population). The constitution adopted in 1835 provided that a permanent location somewhere in the interior be located in 1847. In addition to the argument that the state capitol should be further from the national boundary, considering its destruction during the War of 1812, it was also pleaded that "no poor man could become governor, as the salary (then \$1,500) would not support him in the gay city, while it was sufficient to enable the poor but ambitious man to live in the simplicity of the interior villages".

The influence of the gay corrupt city of 6,000 people was evident in other ways. When important measures were pending before the legislature, "the influence of the social circle and of ladies' society was brought to bear upon members, and many will remember that the influence of 'qual parties' and 'quiet suppers was often alluded to as the principal motive for the passage of many important acts of legislation".

Since these influences were never matters of record, we cannot say. The naming of the township Buchanan may have been determined by cold-blooded political considerations. Or it may have been the equal. Or the ladies.

No one can really ever know why a town which has voted in the Republican column from John C. Fremont in 1856 to Thomas E. Dewey in 1948 was named after a Democrat. It might have been the pay-off to James Buchanan for his lip-work in the Senate. Or it may have been "just one of those things".

bition must not distort true human values.

In all organizations we must eliminate red tape and meaning less procedures and requirements that do not allow for the adaptation to individual needs.

On Emergency Action During Civil Defense

Article 3: On Emergency Treatment Of Broken Bones

BONES (This is the third in a series of five articles prepared by the Michigan Office of Civil Defense dealing with emergency action to save lives.) Broken bones show themselves in several ways. A limb bent at an odd angle, or one which cannot be moved without great pain, is probably broken. A grating sensation in the limb, or a point of tenderness or swelling usually indicates a break. Ends of bones often protrude through the skin in handling such cases while waiting for trained help to arrive, extreme care must be taken not to further injure the victim. There are six rules for emergency care. They are: 1. Do not try to set a broken bone, or push broken pieces of bone back into place. 2. Do not move patient unless necessary to save his life. If patient must be moved, use a splint. 3. Fasten splints above and below the point of break. 4. Use a sling in collar, shoulder, arm, and hand injury. 5. Never move a broken neck or back victim, unless he will die if not moved. 6. A broken bone, if treated improperly, may cause permanent and crippling injury. The best advice in a case like this is to do nothing you do not know how to do. If you have taken Red Cross First Aid training, you will know what to do. Red Cross Training Courses are available to any person who desires them. Every adult American should know First Aid. It may save a life.

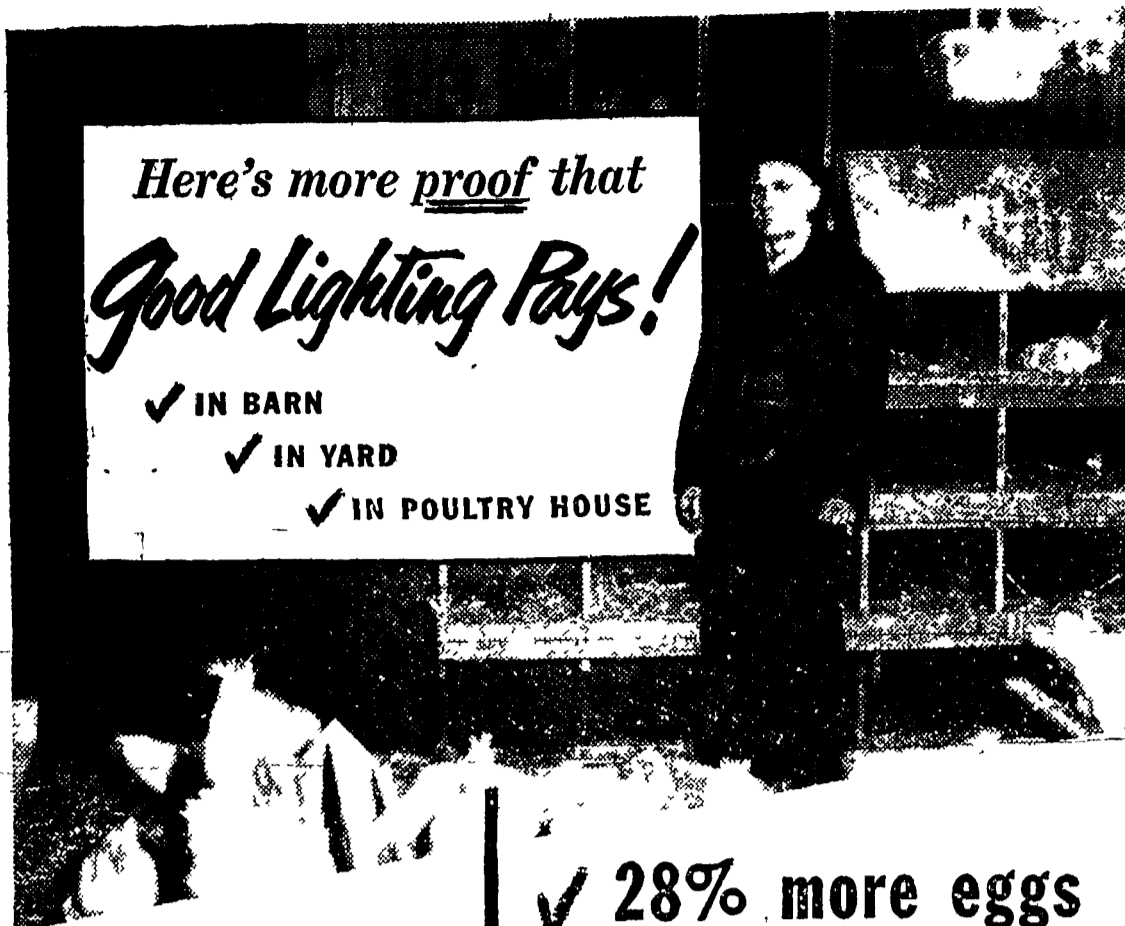
Free Classes On Economy Of Energy Start At Niles On October 15

Free classes for Berrien county homemakers to teach them how to live and work with less strain on their energy, will begin on Oct. 15, at Niles and Oct. 16 at Benton Harbor, it was announced by Douglas Donald, M.D., Detroit, president of the Michigan Heart Association.

The announcement is of special importance to all women who are incapacitated by heart disease. The classes, which are a free community service project of the Michigan Heart Association, are designed to fill the doctor's prescription of "take it easy" by showing the homemakers how to save time and energy.

Mrs. Ruth Kettenun, work simplification representative from Michigan State College, will demonstrate how the women may do various household tasks with the equipment on hand using less effort. Work simplification started in industry and the same principles have proven successful in house work. Using simpler and easier ways with less bending, lifting, climbing and reaching means a tremendous saving of time and energy which lessens the strain placed on the heart by reducing the physical effort expended by the housewife. Benton Harbor classes, Oct. 16, 18, 23, and 25 at the Josephine Morton House. The Cardiac Housewife Program is made possible by the Michigan Heart Association through funds received from united campaigns in many Michigan communities. The complete course of instruction is being offered in this area by the Michigan Heart Association through the cooperation of the Berrien County Medical Association and the Home Economics Extension Service of Michigan State College.

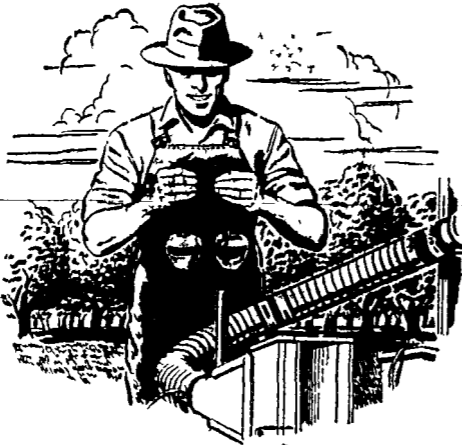

Electrostatic duster developed for farmers

This farmer is holding two apples which were dusted with the same amount of insecticide. The apple on the right had insecticide blown on it from a conventional dusting machine. The heavily coated one on the left was dusted by a new electrostatic process developed by agricultural engineers at Michigan State College. As it leaves the duster's nozzle, dust is highly charged with electricity from special equipment carried on the farmer's tractor and is strongly attracted to plants or fruit, covering them underneath as well as on top. Laboratory tests have reported coverage up to eleven times greater than that accomplished with dusters not equipped with the electrostatic device. Information on this new electrostatic dusting process for insecticides or fungicides can be obtained from the Michigan State College Agricultural Engineering Department, East Lansing.

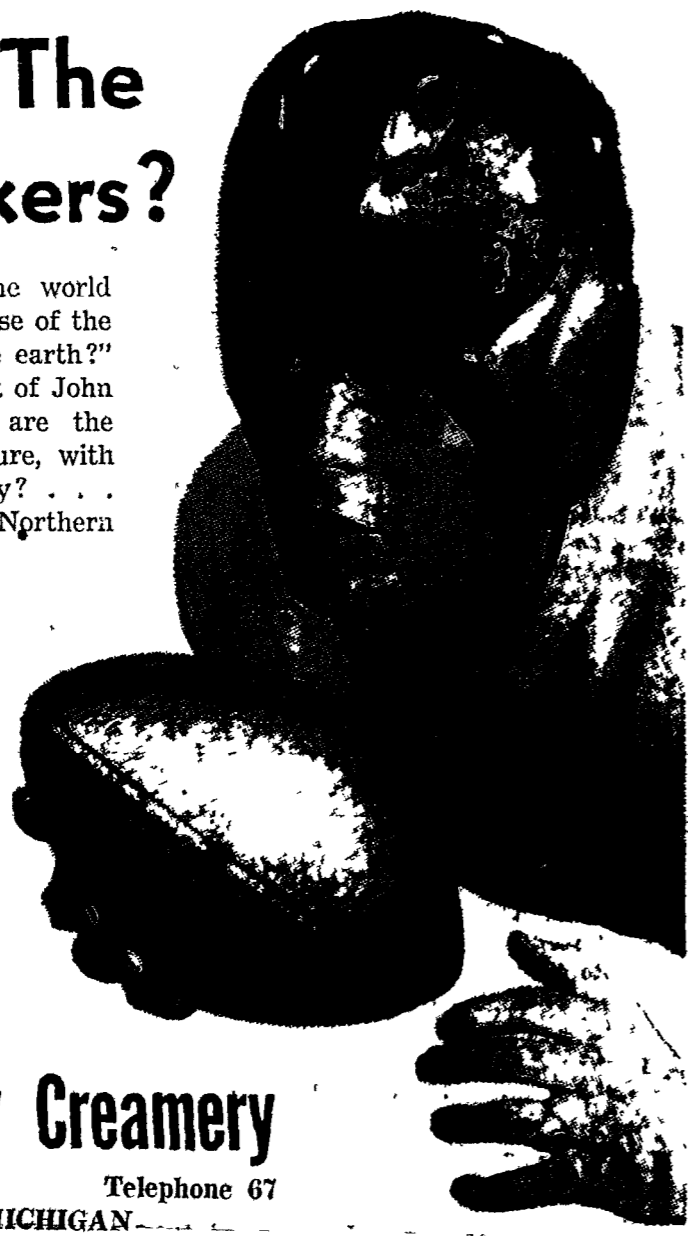

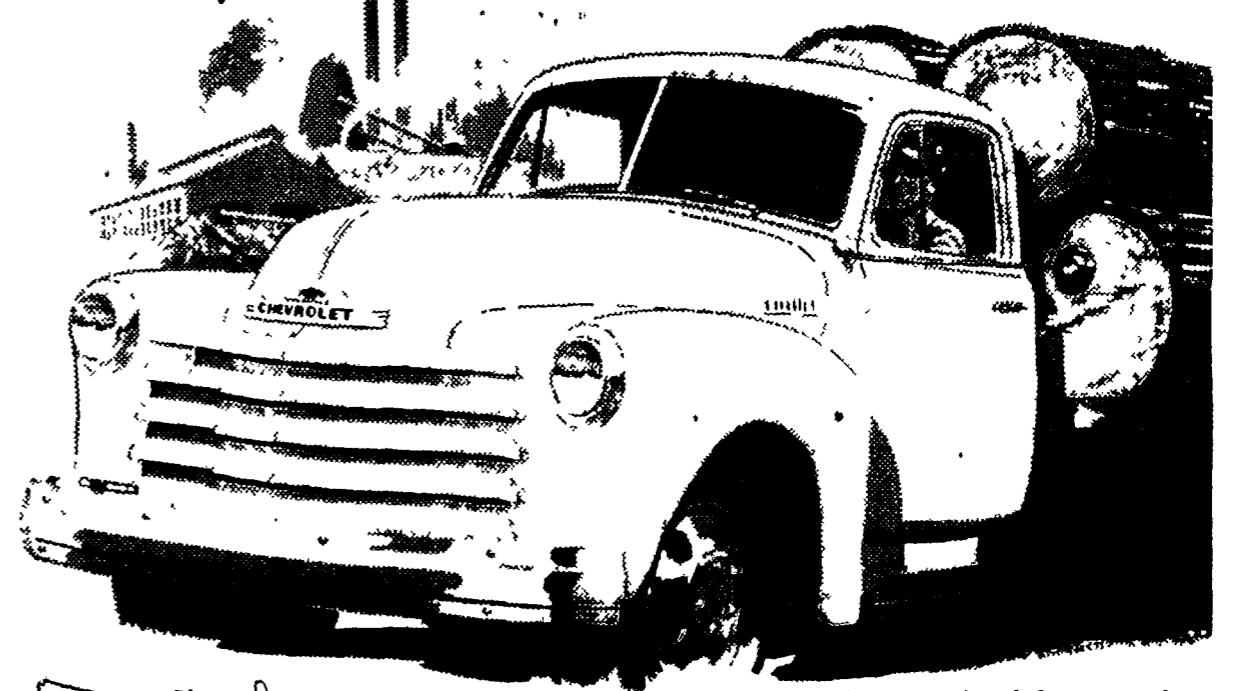
