This roving trophy and a roving "Cow-bell," the trophy awarded to the winning men's team of each meet, are the coveted prizes of each field shoot. Teams consisting of the four top scorers of both sexes vie for the possession of both prizes. Consequently, it is with great pride that we report that the Bend of the River Ladies Team, consisting this week of Louise Earl, Hilda Pudell, Marie Long, and Margaret Beaver, are the first to bring home the horn, with a total of 951 points, a lead of 65 points over the next highest team, Cobus Creek.

Bumper Crop Looms

Corn Knee High Two Weeks Before 4th July

The 1954 corn crop has been breaking all growing records in the Buchanan district, and many fields planted about May 10 were already well over knee-high, two weeks before the 4th of July, according to Robert Koenigshof, Buchanan Co-op manager.

The combination of heat averaging over 90 degrees daily and plentiful rain has been ideal for corn.

During the five days from the evening of June 16 of last week to

Monday, June 21, a total of 165 inches of rain in three showers was reported at the Co-ops recording station by Floyd Fedore.

While there is some evidence of wheat blasted by the combined heat and moisture, the grain crops have been maturing very rapidly on the whole, with very little evidence of damage. It is now expected that farmers will enter the barley fields with their combines soon after the first of next week and will be in the wheat fields very

soon after July 4, ten days ahead of the usual harvest beginning.

Clifton Conrad, Berrien county fruit specialist, states that there is a good set of peaches, with no damaging June drop. In fact there is a heavy over-set of blossoms on the earlier Hale Haven crop, that will require heavy thinning. The apple crop has not been diminished, visibly by June drop and the tree fruit have in general been maturing fast with no damage from heat.

Jack Wilson, acting chairman of the Buchanan Business Association committee for the annual Fourth of July fireworks display at Memorial Field, announces that the committee has bought the same display which was very popular last year.

For homes in the cost bracket of \$10,500 to \$13,000, which is the range desired here, loans are available at a 5% down payment, plus approximately \$200 for "closing costs," including appraisals. Board To Pay Contract Price On Completion

A contract was let for the construction of a 50x54 addition to the manual training shop of the Buchanan high school and for re-roofing and repairs on the present shop building to A. H. Mollberg, local contractor, at a special meeting of the Buchanan district school board Tuesday evening.

The addition will be 54 feet wide east and west and 50 feet long, north and south, to be attached on the south end of the present manual training building. The total \$24,135. The board fortunately has the entire amount in hand and will pay the contract total on completion which will be not later than Sept. 1, according to contract terms.

This new addition will permit the removal of the mechanical drawing and drafting classes to the shop, thus freeing for other uses the room in the high school building they previously occupied. The additional room will also add to the efficiency and safety of shop operations, which have been recently badly overcrowded by the growth of attendance.

The Buchanan high school was fortunate to secure shop equipment in machines to a total value of \$100,000 without charge from the United States government during the disposal of war surplus materials after World War II.

Over 300 students were enrolled in the department last year. The faculty for the coming year will be: Ray Miller, general shop; Bill Runkewich, trade shop co-ordinator; Art Cavanaugh, general shop for junior high students. The latter is a new addition to the faculty.

The Record met Taylor's and lost 5-5. For Taylor's 8 runs and 10 hits, for the Record 5 runs, 3 hits.

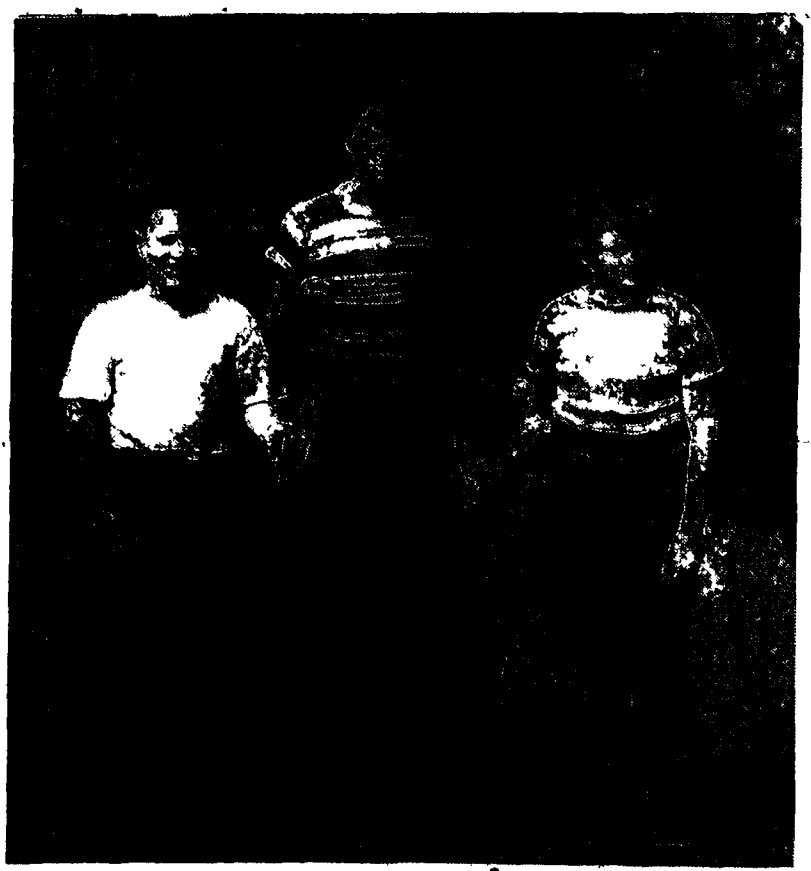

Death Is Winner When You Drive In Wrong Lane

The recent traffic accident in Maryland in which 10 persons lost their lives because one of the two drivers was traveling in the wrong lane is a glaring example of many accidents of that type which could be avoided by obeying the law and using common sense, said State Police Commissioner Joseph A. Childs in commenting on the state safety commission's current "Share The Road" campaign.

Childs is a member of the commission.

"Crossing the yellow line or passing on a hill or curve is just like playing Russian roulette, except that the consequences can be much worse," Childs said. "Only the person who pulls the trigger dies in Russian roulette, but the wrong lane gambler also involves others when he loses."

"Head-on collisions have frightful results and these are accidents due to drivers being where they shouldn't be and need not be in the wrong lane."

Childs also pointed out that many times careless and negligent drivers are the cause of accidents to others, but are not involved themselves. Failing to give a warning when turning, cutting in too soon after passing and improper passing are some of these causes.

Dora Lee Kohn To Direct Recreation In Childrens Camp

Dora Lee Kohn, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wilber Kohn, began work Monday as counselor and recreation director for underprivileged children at a camp maintained by Christopher House, one of the Federation of Settlements and Neighborhood Centers serving through the agency of the Welfare Council of Metropolitan Chicago.

The camp is located on the Elk Grove Forest Preserve in the outskirts of Chicago. Dora Lee and the children under her charge will be taken to the camp daily by bus. She is spending this week in studies preparatory to her work. The children under her charge will be from seven to fourteen years of age. The Chicago Y.W.C.A. recruited the young women in charge. Fork-Lift Powered By Liquefied Gas Is Given Approval

Underwriters' Laboratories has granted its first approval and listing for a fork-lift truck powered by liquefied petroleum gas (LPG) to Clark Equipment Company's Carloader model machine, it was announced today by W. E. Schirmer, Clark vice-president.

"Industry has long recognized the desirability of LPG-powered fork-lift trucks, especially for indoor operations," Mr. Schirmer said. "Warehousemen have frequently objected to the irritating exhaust fumes from gasoline-powered machines. With LPG, the fumes, if any, are colorless and odorless."

"Widespread application of LPG for fork trucks was held up until a system could be devised that would meet Underwriters' Laboratories standards of operational reliability and safety. The fact that the Carloader has met UL requirements should give great impetus to wider use of LPG-powered fork trucks."

The LPG-Carloader is a standard model fork truck in 3,000-5,000 pound capacities, equipped with conventional, Dynatork or Hydrotork transmission, factory-modified for LPG operation.

The simple unit developed by Clark consists of a heavy-duty fuel tank, vaporizer-regulator and a simple, rugged air-gas carburetor. The system draws fuel from the tank in liquid form, which is vaporized before it reaches the manifold. This means that even in extremely cold weather, there is little difficulty in starting; it is claimed.

Fast Re-fueling
To refuel the LPG-Carloader, the fuel tank is removed in a matter of minutes and simply hooked to the LPG storage unit and fuel pumped in, a hand pump can also be used effectively. Spare tanks are available if it is desired to keep a stand-by full tank. The fuel tank is rated at 1,600 pounds pressure, and is equipped with a safety-relief valve which bypasses pressure in excess of 275 pounds.

Clark expects to have UL-approved and listed LPG-powered fork trucks in other models in the near future.

Carelessness In Driving Tractors Is Courting Death

A girl, 7, suffered a fatal skull fracture when a tractor passed over her. A man, 38, died of a crushed chest and broken neck after a tractor tipped over on him. A man, 75, suffocated while a tractor pinned his head in the soft earth.

Farm accidents like these, endangering lives from childhood to old age are repeated every year. Twenty-two of the 30 fatal farm accidents from machinery in 1952 involved tractors, according to David Steinkne, extension safety specialist at Michigan State College. The majority of such accidents occur when the tractor overturns into a hole or ditch or — because of improper hitching — overturns backward.

The rules for safety include: stay away from ditches; don't turn at high speeds; keep the brake pedal locked together when traveling in road gear; prevent backward tipping by hitching trailing implement or objects to the drawbar; tipping sideways can often be prevented by spacing the rear wheels as wide as possible.

Steinkne adds that one of the best safety devices that can be put on your tractor is a good, safe driver.

Dental Health

(Following is one of a series of a series of articles on dental health being presented by the Tri-County Dental Society in co-operation with the Berrien County Record.)

Fluoridation — Costs and Benefits
Fluoridation of a community water supply is shaping up as the best public health bargain of all time.

For less than 15 cents per person per year, the ravages of tooth decay are being reduced as much as 85% in communities throughout the United States.

The cost of a single filling would pay for the fluoride for one person for many years.

The late Dr. John G. Frisch, of Madison, Wis., as chairman of the fluoride committee of the Wisconsin State Dental Society, which pioneered in the procedure, used to say:

"There can be no question as to whether a city can afford it, but whether any city can afford to be without it."

There are to date more than 300 communities which have rallied under the banner of fluoridation to protect the future health of their children's teeth.

They have been able to show that adjustments of the fluoride content in a water system was feasible from an economic standpoint. Cost of equipment has been found to range from several hundred dollars for a small town to several thousand dollars for a medium-sized city. From an engineering standpoint, according to a water works association, the mechanism of adding fluorides to the water supply is no more involved than adding chlorine.

Fluorine is not a medicine any more than chlorine. It is not a cure-all. It cannot eliminate tooth decay. It can do nothing about teeth that are already decayed. It is a preventive which in some communities has reduced the incidence of tooth decay by two-thirds.

Where objection to fluoridation of a water supply has been raised, the principal objectors usually have been druggists, healers, members of a religious group who believe fluoridation constitutes medication and those who fear an economic threat to the sale of such items as vitamin and mineral preparations.

According to the American Dental Association, those opposing fluoridation, for the most part have used "false, misleading and emotional charges" based on "undocumented and unscientific supporting material."

John Knapp Tells Tale Of Escape From Coal Mines

"There's material for a good novel in every man's life, if you can only dig it out," according to an old saying of the writers' trade. Or if there's not material for a major novel, enough for a good story at least.

So we learned as we called on John Knapp, of the Knapp Shoe Repair shop, after we had drawn his name for the "Meet Your Merchant" feature this week.

"Have you spent all your working life in the shoe repair business?" was our first question. No, said Knapp, he had started out in young manhood as a miner in the soft coal fields of southern Illinois. That was when he first married and lived near DuQuoin in Perry county. The miners were supposed to make high wages. But the trade of coal digging was not all it was cracked up to be. Two trouble was, part-time work. Only in relatively rare rush periods did they work a complete six days a week. Usually it was not more than four or five days, and just as often it was two or three days a week.

When the miners came up on the "cages" from the coal beds 200 to 400 feet underground they did not know whether they would

return to work the next day. That they found out regularly at 7 p.m., when the workers were notified by mine whistles whether or not they would work on the morrow. There might be a half dozen or there might be two dozen mines in a coal camp, as the mining settlements were called. But the miners knew all the whistles. Each mine had two signals, one for "work tomorrow" and the other for "no work."

Then came the longer shut-downs, sometimes caused by strikes, but just as often by decision of the mine operators when they were overstocked with coal.

It was a company shut-down that finally decided Knapp. He then had a family of five to feed. He decided that he would try something else. So he left the coal fields and moved to Bridgman in 1926. A friend at Bridgman, Mich., wrote them that three of them could get farm work there. So they came and made their living by farm work for awhile, until Mr. Knapp became ill. His illness required an operation, after which he was told that he would not be able to do heavy work for a long time.

So Mr. Knapp had to take another look at life. He couldn't do general farm work, so what? He decided to learn something—he could do with his hands that did not require heavy work. Mr. Knapp had talented hands that learned easily. He just opened a shoe shop in Bridgman without

previous training and went ahead. In 1935 Mr. and Mrs. Knapp moved to Buchanan and opened a shoe repair shop in the room where they still continue. Their two elder sons, Clarence and Ray, had already flown the family nest, but the two younger ones, Henry and Homer, came here with them. The two boys attended high school and were graduated, Henry in 1940, and Homer in 1942. Henry went on to Michigan State College, where he had a fine scholastic record, graduating with an engineering degree. He is now employed at Michigan State College as the state inspector of construction of new buildings at the college.

Homer did his stint in World War II and returned, living and working for awhile in Niles and then going to California for his health. He joined his oldest brother, Clarence, an employee in the experimental department in the Consolidated Air Corps plant. Homer now works in the production force of Consolidated. The other son, Ray, is a public accountant in Kokomo, Ind.

Meanwhile Father and Mother Knapp continue in their shoe repair business, with a volume of patronage that indicates Buchanan people believe they know their shoes. It has paid off better than coal mining. Also Mr. Knapp does not have to concern himself too much with how John L. Lewis makes up the mind of the coal industry.

rageous figure! I guess I just like people," she said.

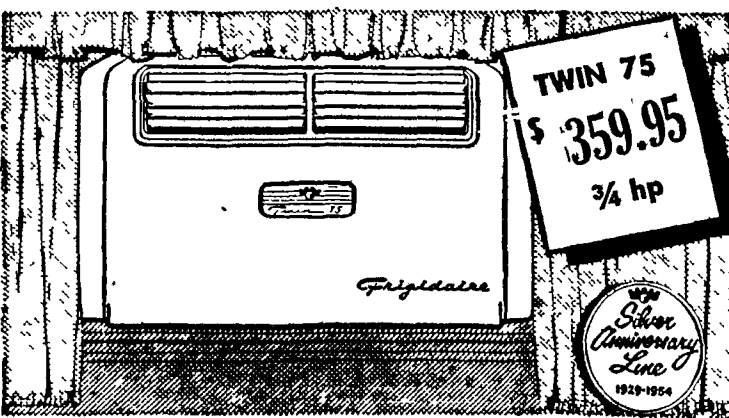

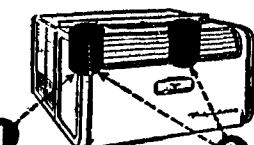

The Story of Buchanan



Hoop-Skirts and Hats in Store-Factory Age

An interesting feature of the pioneer business in Buchanan during the times when it first became apparent to us from the advertising in the files of old newspapers is the number and variety of enterprises that were half store and half factory.

The merchant, with or without helpers, made the goods he or she sold. Typical were the shops of the harnessmakers, shoemakers, tailors, dressmakers, milliners, even watchmakers, and others.

Competition in these lines was developing in factories in the eastern seaboard states and advancing westward. Progressively their goods were appearing in local stores. But the local merchant-manufacturer still competed in the home market. Factory prices were not enough cheaper to overcome both the cost of transportation and the inertia of the pioneer, who still liked to go to the home town tailor or dressmaker and give an order for

exactly what he (or she) wished. After the turn of the century, however, the machine-made products increasingly replaced the home-made products.

We select for illustration the merchant-manufacturers two women, Mrs. Philander P. Dunning, milliner and hoop-skirt manufacturer, and Mrs. Esther Parkinson, milliner. They are selected because it just happens that much more is remembered about them and their products (because they served women) than is known about the production of other shops. Between the two, they covered over 60 years of mercantile life in Buchanan.

Mrs. Dunning had her establishment first on Main street and later in a frame house later known as the home of Mrs. Beatrice Viele, razed in 1942 to make room for the new postoffice grounds. Mrs. Dunning is believed to have started her enterprise during the late 1850's when hoop-skirts were the rage. She is listed as a hoop-skirt manufacturer in the Berrien County History & Directory, published by Edward Cowles in 1872. During all that time hoop-skirts were the universal wear for both social life and church. Esther Montague Winch, in one of the interesting letters written by her to the Record in the early 1900's, related the acute embarrassment of a Buchanan woman whose husband would not permit her to wear them so she had to attend church in a "slinky skirt."

The hoop-skirt was made of fabric mounted on and secured to

a frame of wires of varying circumference, smallest at top and progressively larger toward the bottom. There were usually about 5 or 6 hoops, which were wrapped with tape. They were suspended by tape and bands from a cloth belt at the waist, which fastened by a buckle at the side, somewhat like that in the rear of a man's vest.

The balloon-like hoop-skirt hung from the waist and was moulded by the contours of the body for about a foot, and thence on the expanding frame of wires. There were a half dozen or more strands of tape suspending the frame, depending somewhat on the distance around the inmate.

They had to be worn with some know-how and circumspection. When the wearer sat down, for instance, she must first pull up the wires in the rear until she sat on them, or the entire bottom of the hoop might tilt sharply upward. The universal long panty-lette with a ruffle at the bottom extended, of course, below the bottom of the skirt. Nevertheless, and all-in-all, however, it was best to know how to handle the hoops.

The second representative of the hand-made age, Mrs. Esther Parkinson, had a hat factory and store for 36 years in the room at 111 Main street, now (1954) occupied by the Hall Brothers Television Service. Her occupancy began in about 1890. Mrs. Parkinson is remembered as a lady of dashing style and some beauty, but she also had a strong practical turn and a love for people. She remained in business there

until in 1926 when she literally "died with a thimble on her finger" as she had often wished. Her vivid personality has kept her memory green among many people still living.

Hers was the last "milliner's shop" in Buchanan, extending far over into the era of factory-made hats. However, she retained to the end a number of "old-timey" clients who preferred to get their hats made to order by Mrs. Parkinson. She knew the milliner's art, which was an intricate one with much detail. Special materials, special threads, special needles were required.

Mrs. Parkinson had a reputation as an "artiste" in making hats. The first step in creation was moulding a wire frame. Over this she might shape a base of buckram, a strong black and white fabric made from several fabrics glued together, for a stiff base. This was shaped to order and then covered by velvet or silk, with a facing of chiffon or organdy shirred by hand in delicate frills.

Or the base might be of Tuscan straw, imported from the province of Tuscany in Italy. This straw came in narrow strips wrapped on a base of pasteboard, about 4 to 6 inches wide and a foot long. Beyond these bases of course there was an immense variety of decorations, including ornamental flowers, bows of ribbons, or even ostrich plumes (though the latter were not worn much in Buchanan).

When Mrs. Parkinson opened her shop in the 1890's the ceiling price for her hats was probably \$1.50 to \$2.50 and in the latter days of the home-made hat the top was rarely over \$4.50 or \$5 (and that was thought to be a lot of money).

Her flair for friendship made her shop a sort of unofficial community center and restroom, especially for the country women who came to town with their babies or their smaller children. They came not only for her hats but for her advice in matters of health, busi-

ness, and in the where-to-get, what-to-do realms.

For all her artistic skill, she had a down-to-earth knowledge of and feeling for people. And she was not above lining up a row of second-hand stoves or furniture in front of her shop. It would not be fair to call her a character, she was an attractive type of an age that is past.

Mrs. Parkinson has a daughter living in Buchanan, Mrs. Ethel Siregaman. However this story came mostly from others, so no personal responsibility can be held by her for the facts in the above.

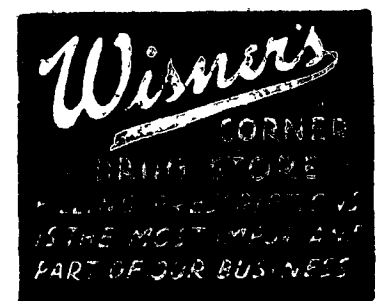

Rose Fancier Enjoys Rich Rewards

Robert Bachman's seven years of self-education as a backyard rose fancier paid off richly in satisfaction and in recognition, when a beautiful Crimson Glory rose entered by him in the annual show of the Roseland Rose Society at the Studebaker Hall, South Bend, last week was awarded the title of Queen of the Show as the finest single rose shown. The substantial part of the award is a gold cup. His garden occupies about 600 square feet in the rear of his home at 306 W. 3rd street.

The Crimson Glory is a species of the hybrid tea family, which consists only of large single roses. Robert grows the hybrid tea varieties mainly, with a few beautiful Floribunda Cluster types commonly known as double roses. He also has in the rear of his garden a number of the ancestral favorites such as Ramblers and others.

In all he has 150 roses which he bought from floral houses in the root form and many others that he started himself. The cost of the purchased roots averages about \$1.75, so Robert has a back-yard investment of about \$250 in original cost alone. However this is only a start on the overall cost. Every seven days during the growing season he sprays all roses with a spray mix of insecticide and fungicide. Also he must respray after each rain.

But he is richly repaid in a constant succession of blooms during four to five months every year. The roses begin to bloom about June 1 or a week before, and continue blooming until frost, with the finest showing and richest-colored blooms during the fall. All in his garden (unless a species or two in the old-fashioned garden at the rear) are ever-blooming. This means that they bear successive cycles of bloom spaced from three to four weeks apart.

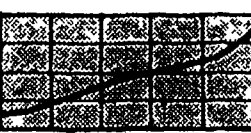

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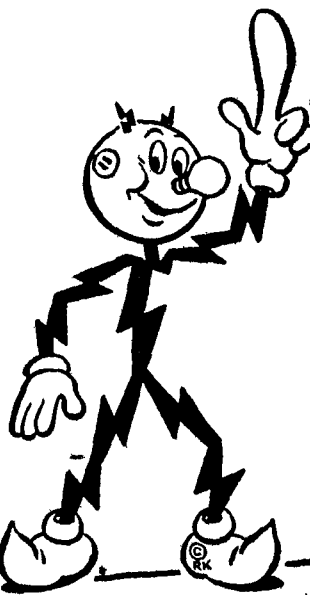

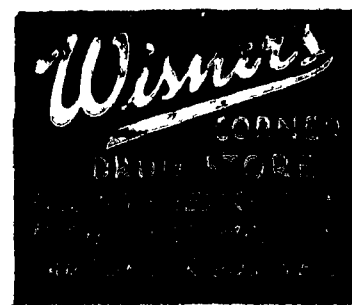

Wray Farm, 97 Years In One Family, Is Sold

Miss Norine Wray and her mother, Mrs. Callie Wray, have sold the ancestral farm of 100 acres to A. A. Mendenhall from near Cassopolis, after 97 years of family ownership. The farm is on the Warren Woods Road, about 1/2-mile west of its intersection with Wagner Road.

The former's grandfather, Riley Wray, bought the land from a Mr. Mason, who was very likely one of the early speculators, and took possession in 1857. Wray built the original log cabin, with a ladder up the wall through an opening of the floor to the second story. That cabin remained along after the "big house" was built in 1887, and is remembered by Miss Wray, who played in it as a child. The first frame house and barn still stands in excellent condition. In the 40x40-foot barn the frame is of 10x10-inch white-pine beams, held together by pins, and stands as four-square as when it was built.

The farm was operated by Riley Wray to 1887, when his youngest son, William Wray, took over. After William died the place was farmed by a son and daughter, Frank Wray and Miss Norine Wray, until the former died a year ago May 6th.

Miss Norine Wray and her mother, Mrs. Callie Wray, age 88, have moved to 107 W. 4th street, the former D. D. Pangborn residence.
