Clark Employee Learns Son, Missing in Action, Is German Captive

Locals Defeat Dowagiac 27-20

Had Believed Him Killed In Action In Italy Sept. 19

Other Son, Edward DeMorrow Jr. Committed Suicide in Army Service

Edward DeMorrow, Lakeside, circle saw operator in the drill department of the Buchanan plant of the Clark Equipment company, was rejoicing the first of the week over receipt of news that his son, believed to have been killed in action in the Italian campaign Sept. 19, is a prisoner of war in Germany.

The news came Sunday evening in the form of a dispatch from the International Red Cross, which stated that a letter would follow later. The relatives had received back all the letters they had written with "Missing in Action" stamped on the envelopes, and had accepted the belief that he had been killed.

He had enlisted in the army 2 1/2 years ago, previous to the entrance of the United States in the war and had been serving in the Mediterranean theater of operations for eight months previous to his capture. Before enlistment he worked in the Auto Specialties plant at St. Joseph.

The news lifted part of the shadow of a second tragedy from the DeMorrow home. For a year ago their other son, Edward DeMorrow, Jr. was called home from an army camp by the sudden death of his mother and while at home committed suicide.

Judge Hatfield Reports on Cases

Probate Judge Malcolm Hatfield frankly admits that November was the most trying and hectic month that he has encountered during his eleven years on the bench. Although the Judge finds that the war has not greatly increased the number of cases that ordinarily pass through the court, he is convinced that it is indirectly responsible for the severity of many of the offenses that he was required to preside over.

As an illustration, there was the case that was called to his attention by the Secret Service, and F. B. I. in which a woman was alleged to have written threatening letters to prominent people throughout the nation. When the officers called at her home it was discovered that a swastika and also a picture of Hitler hung on the wall. After two doctors testified that she was insane and an officer swore in open court that she had admitted that she was the Sun Goddess of the Japanese, the Judge committed her to the Kalamazoo State Hospital. Unfortunately, due to the fact that the hospital is overcrowded with women patients, this woman is still at large.

Another case that came under the observation of federal and county police officials alike, was that of the teen age boys who drove stolen automobiles over the state line into Indiana. Then, there were the gangs of boys who destroyed tombstones and stole gasoline. Also, for the first time in the history of the Court its Judge was required to preside over a hearing in which a fourteen year old murderer was involved.

In addition to the above mentioned cases, Judge Hatfield also committed seven additional insane patients to the State Hospital, heard 31 cases of juvenile delinquency, presided over the hearings of 15 neglected and dependent children, confirmed six adoptions, returned ten run-away minors to their parents, and took up the driving licenses of four reckless traffic violators. Eight crippled and 14 afflicted children were cared for at state expense by the Court throughout November.

In the Probate division, 39 deceased and seven guardianship estates were closed.

However, November saw 34 new deceased and six guardianship estates opened. The Court computed \$15,476.79 in new inheritance taxes and approved of administrators paying \$3021.42 in such previously determined taxes.

Two drain proceedings were authorized, as was the change of name of an adult.

Judge Hatfield denied two requests for secret marriages and performed another.

The Court also took under advisement 143 petitions by administrators and guardians before acting on same.

He is survived by his wife, Susan, and a daughter, Mrs. Harry Koster of Brooklyn, N. Y. Because of her serious condition the widow does not know of his death.

Mrs. Wentzle Ruml (Salome Beardsley), wife of Dr. Ruml, prominent physician of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, died suddenly of a heart attack in Boston on Nov. 24. She and Dr. Ruml reached Boston Nov. 21, planning to attend the installation of their son-in-law, Dr. W. K. Jordan, as president of Radcliffe College, and to celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary on Thanksgiving day.

Tales of An Old Town

An Attempt to Reproduce a Cross Section of The American Scene, As Witnessed Here Through the Past Century

In Which Mr. Richter Winds Up Account of Early Schools

By Fred Richter Chapter 3 By looking back through my scrapbook I find that one of John Holmes' articles written about 42 years ago comes to my aid in naming some of the school teachers that taught in the first-built schoolhouse in Dayton, later known as the Elshah Allen home.

In his article he says that he walked two miles to attend Dayton school, attending only during the winter months from 1864 up to and including 1867. The different teachers were then as follows: George H. Chidester, Arnold Pierce and Sarah Black. The latter was a sister of George Black and died only about 14 years ago.

From 1868 to 1895 there was still a large attendance at the school. In 1895 Jess Goodenough was teaching about 50 pupils. The teachers I remember before 1895 were Stella Baker, Mary Reynolds, Wilfred Stryker, Charles Rittenberg, Laura Smith, Dana Roberts, Elmer Finney, and Henry Sallisbury, many of them still living.

Six years later, in 1901 there were still from 40 to 50 attending the school. C. D. Jennings was school commissioner at that time, and I have received a list of all of the schools and the attendance in each school from Mr. Jennings. Eugene Ferguson was our township clerk and he appointed me as township officer. Mr. Farran and myself, with a horse and buggy, proceeded to visit all of the schools of the township to see if all of the pupils were attending school.

It was a slow job and it took several days to visit all of the schools. From those days up to the present time there has been a gradual decline of the attendance in school district No. 1. Now there is an attendance of only from 15 to 18. Some will say that I am partly to blame for it. But let's forget that and let bygones be bygones.

According to the history of Berrien County written in 1879 the first school of which any reliable information may be found, was taught by Philo Sanford in a small log cabin on what was then known as the Borden farm.

In the summer of 1836 Lucy Howe taught in a cabin on the farm of her father, Frederick Howe, four months in the summer and three months in the winter. Frederick Howe came to Portage Prairie from Massachusetts, settling on what is now the Emory Rough farm. He is the great grandfather of Charles Howe, now living in Buchanan, and was the grandfather of the late Fred Howe and A. F. Howe, both of whom died recently.

She received 20 shillings per week for teaching, whatever sum that meant then in prewar currency it would have been about \$5. But the patrons thought that too much and she taught in the winter term at the rate of \$2.50 per scholar. However, tradition has it that few of the parents paid her. So much for the alleged sturdy honesty of the pioneers.

He was born May 14, 1878, in Buchanan township, the son of Gottlieb and Sarah Kool. He lived his entire life in Berrien County. He married Verna A. Brewer Aug. 15, 1906, in St. Joseph, Mich.

For many years he had operated a fruit farm a mile west of Buchanan, had worked as a carpenter and as an employee of the Clark Equipment company, quitting the latter employ last February on account of ill health.

He was a member of the Hills Corners Christian Church. Survivors are his widow, two daughters, Mrs. Karol L. Douglas of Dayton, O., and Mrs. Majorie M. Batchelor of Buchanan, by five grandsons; by the following sisters and brother, Mrs. Minnie Ingalls of St. Joseph, Mrs. Lela Lucas of Baroda, Mrs. Ida Rounady of Buchanan Rural Route, Mrs. Edith Seal of Niles, and Clyde Kool of Galien.

Mrs. Reta Rogers Is Acquitted of Charge of Murder

Judge Warner Dissatisfied With Verdict; Lectures the Defendant

Mrs. Reta Rogers was released from the county jail at Cassopolis and returned to her home in Buchanan a free woman early Friday, as the result of a verdict of "not guilty" returned by the jury at 8:30 a. m. that day.

The jury of six women and six men had been in sessions since 3:15 p. m. Saturday, deliberating over 12 hours. Judge Warner, who was in charge of the case, expressed dissatisfaction with the verdict, admonishing the defendant that there was nothing in the testimony submitted during the four-day trial that was to her credit. He then told her to go home and take care of her children.

Atty. Stewart B. White, Niles, counsel for the defendant, continued his closing argument after the court opened Thursday noon. When he had concluded the prosecution, Asa K. Hayden, took only about 15 minutes to close his case for the state.

Judge Warner then instructed the jury that it could return one of four verdicts—first degree murder, second degree murder, manslaughter, or not guilty. He told the jurors anyone has a right to defend himself against imminent danger, even by killing unless there is some avenue of escape.

Doctor Says Army Might Cure Ulcer

Military Life Might Prove Haven of Peace.

KANSAS CITY.—Among other reasons for joining the army: Stomach-aches.

For, declares Dr. Walter C. Alvarez, professor of medicine at the Mayo foundation of the University of Minnesota, army routine may cure many stomach ailments.

"The high-strung, intensely ambitious man who may have been driving himself to ulcers in his business," he suggests, "may find military life a haven of peace.

"Others will do the planning for him. He'll relax, forget his personal schemes, and presently find that army chow goes through his food canal without so much as a whimper, much less a growl."

Other nonmedical cures for stomach ailments, he said in an interview, might include:

Raise in pay; a vacation; a change in job; or even the difficult decision to quit trying to become a big shot.

Of course, he added, army life is no sure cure for ulcers.

Many a little man, he declared, finds that war hazards intensify rather than cure ulcers.

"But the man whose nervous energy in private life may have been upsetting his stomach could quite possibly find better health taking orders from Uncle Sam."

On the other hand, those subject to military worries "are at a tremendous disadvantage. They can't get a glass of milk every two hours as they should do in private life. The tensions of war may knock them out before they ever get close to an enemy bullet."

Among others who need to calm down if they would avoid ulcers, he listed:

Women who are social climbers.

Dishwashing Regulations.

In most communities, the regulations regarding dishwashing call for the use of hot soapy water followed by a rinse in boiling water or live steam. They specifically forbid sloshing the glasses hastily in cold water, as it is well known by health authorities that transferable germs are not removed from the rim of glasses in that way.

Oil in England.

Old history books mention oil in England in 1867. Seepages of oil in coal mines have been common. The most productive of these, found in 1847 at Alfreton in Derbyshire, dwindled to nothing after yielding seven to ten barrels a day for more than a year. This oil was refined into lamp oil, lubricating oil and candle wax.
