Middle School Move is Made

Buchanan's new middle school is now in operation. Last Friday, it looked as though it wouldn't be finished enough for anybody's use, but a great many people pitched in over the weekend to get things in shape. Then on Monday, the teachers, with the help of many students, moved their materials and equipment into their offices and teaching areas.

There is a great deal of color in the new building, with a great deal of use of oranges and yellows. The lockers are brightly colored, and many of the panels used for room dividers add to the brightness.

The whole concept of open classrooms is still untried here. In many cases, the full effect won't be experienced because there are still some partitions to certain areas which are not in place.

In a few instances, the students will have to make do with inconveniences and distractions as last minute installation is still in progress. The all-purpose area to provide facilities for physical education and a cafeteria area are still far from finished, and the sections of floor must be put in place. The central area where eventually the library books will be kept needs quite a bit of work.

On Tuesday, middle school students were conducted through the new building, and the complicated process of finding their lockers was completed. By Wednesday morning, everything was in good enough shape so that regular classes could be conducted. As principal Richard Proud said, he could plan to go home at five o'clock for a change.

Superintendent Richard Dougherty praised the work and cooperation of teachers, students and interested citizens in the accomplishment of the complicated move. He said that he hopes in the near future to have the public see it, and he hopes that open houses can be arranged.

A Minute With Mary

Helping Your Children Adjust to a Move

Moving to another city can be a very traumatic experience for a child. But it needn't be, says Jeanne Brown, Extension family and child science specialist. Giving children extra attention before, after and during the move makes the adjustment easier. Often, parents are so busy they neglect to give the children any extra reassurance.

The children, meanwhile, have new fears - that they will fail in their new school, won't be able to make new friends or will be "different" from the others. Parents must help their children gain self-confidence in their new neighborhood.

To help dispel fear, Mrs. Brown suggests talking to your children beforehand about the move and explaining why it is necessary. Let them discuss it and ask questions. Take their questions seriously and help them find the answers. Listen to their complaints and help them find solutions.

Include your youngsters in all the plans, so they won't feel left

out. Let them know what a great and wonderful adventure a change can be. Have frequent family talks about the move.

A trip to the new community before the move may help. If this isn't possible, show them pictures of the new location.

If the children are old enough, let them help choose the color scheme and furniture arrangement for their rooms. Younger children can also be involved in such planning. Try to be patient, loving and calm. If you are tense and worried, the children will also feel unhappy and insecure.

On arrival, don't be in a hurry to get settled, unless absolutely necessary.

Ride around the new town, so everyone can become familiar with the community. Invite neighbors' children in for snacks. Investigate scouting, church and school activities, 4-H and other groups for children.

If distance permits, invite hometown friends to come visit for a weekend. Encourage your children to bring home new friends. But don't push them about making friends - it may take time.

If your children are shy, try a small, informal party (e.g. popcorn and cider) for neighborhood children.

More than 6 million children, ages 5-13, move each year. With a little love, understanding and time, almost all will adjust

Explore Indoor Light Gardening At Fernwood

What looks like one wall of the great Hanging Gardens of Babylon is really the indoor light garden exhibit of Fernwood, Inc., to inspire a "could be" chapter of the American Indoor Light Gardening Society, to meet for the second time Sunday, January 12 at 3 p.m. at Fernwood, Inc.

What is indoor light gardening and why garden under artificial lights? Though it is a relatively new method of gardening for the public, the simple basics have been picked up by thousands of Americans as a popular hobby or pastime now sweeping the country. Seventeen Indoor Light Gardening Society Chapters have sprung up in recent months with such cities as Ann Arbor, Cleveland, and Chicago report overwhelming attendance. Gardeners and non-gardeners alike share the exhilarating experiences of growing plants under lights year around!

Here are the simple basics. A standard fluorescent fixture is purchased from an electrical supply store ranging in price from \$12-\$20 depending on size, length, etc. Reflectors usually come with the fixture which increases the light intensity. A combination of one fluorescent cool white and one warm white tube are then placed in the fixture. The unit is suspended 12-15" above a tray or grouping of plants and left on 12-14 hours every day for maximum results. The greatest advantage of light gardening is the easy control of light intensity, day length, humidity and temperature for the plants. There are no cloudy days in a light garden and it is more efficient than a greenhouse in use of energy, at a fraction of the cost.

What can you grow? Anything you would like to grow can be arranged. Desert cacti, herbs in the kitchen, ferns in the library, lettuce and tomatoes in the basement, or flowers and foliage plants in the living room. All these and many more. The light garden is almost as versatile as the interest of the gardener, from growing wildflowers and alpine to starting annuals from seed for next summer's garden.

Because neither a window sill nor a backyard are necessary, this kind of gardening has great appeal. Apartments and homes everywhere can add a decorative bit of green with minimal care and great sense of pleasure derived in the action.

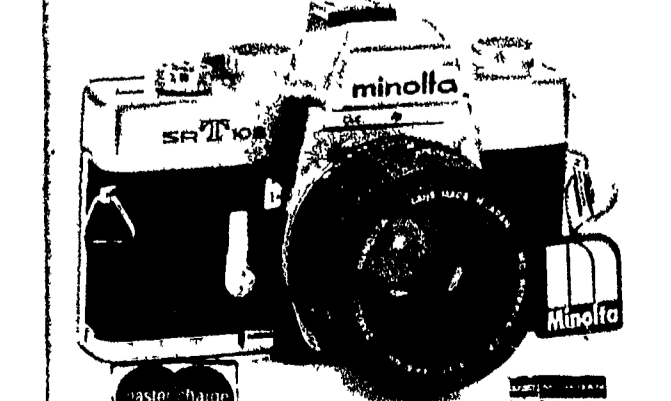

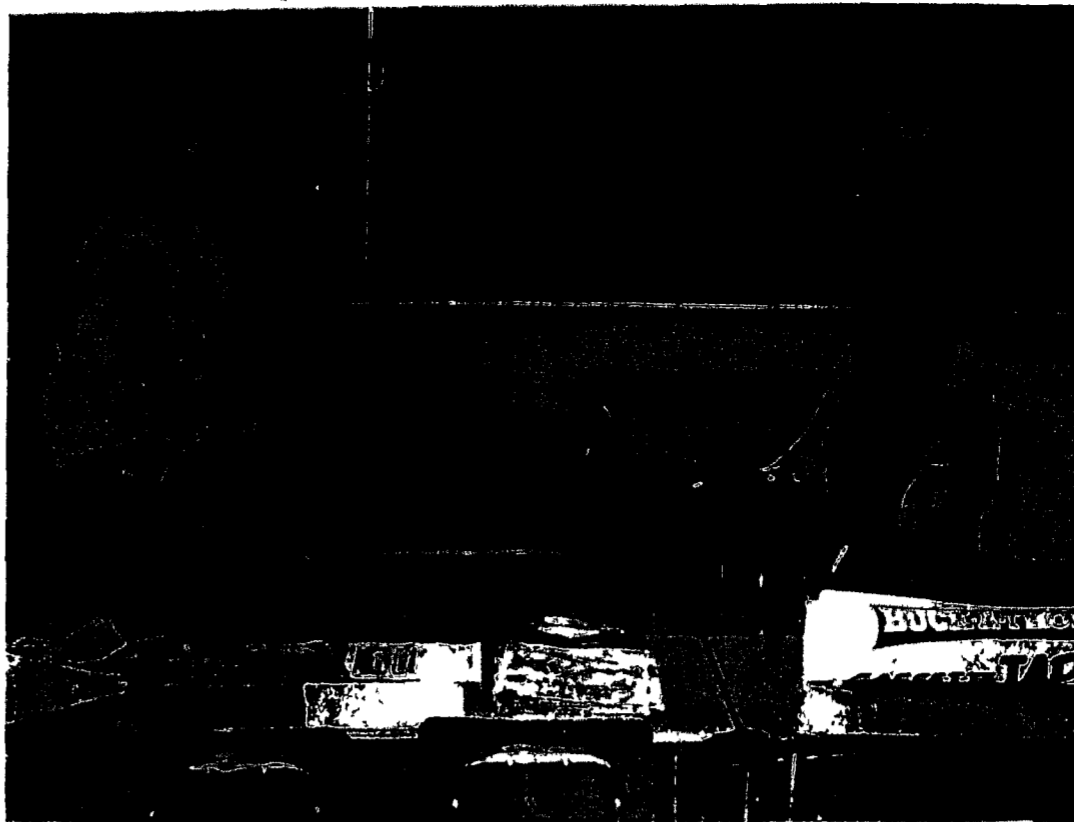

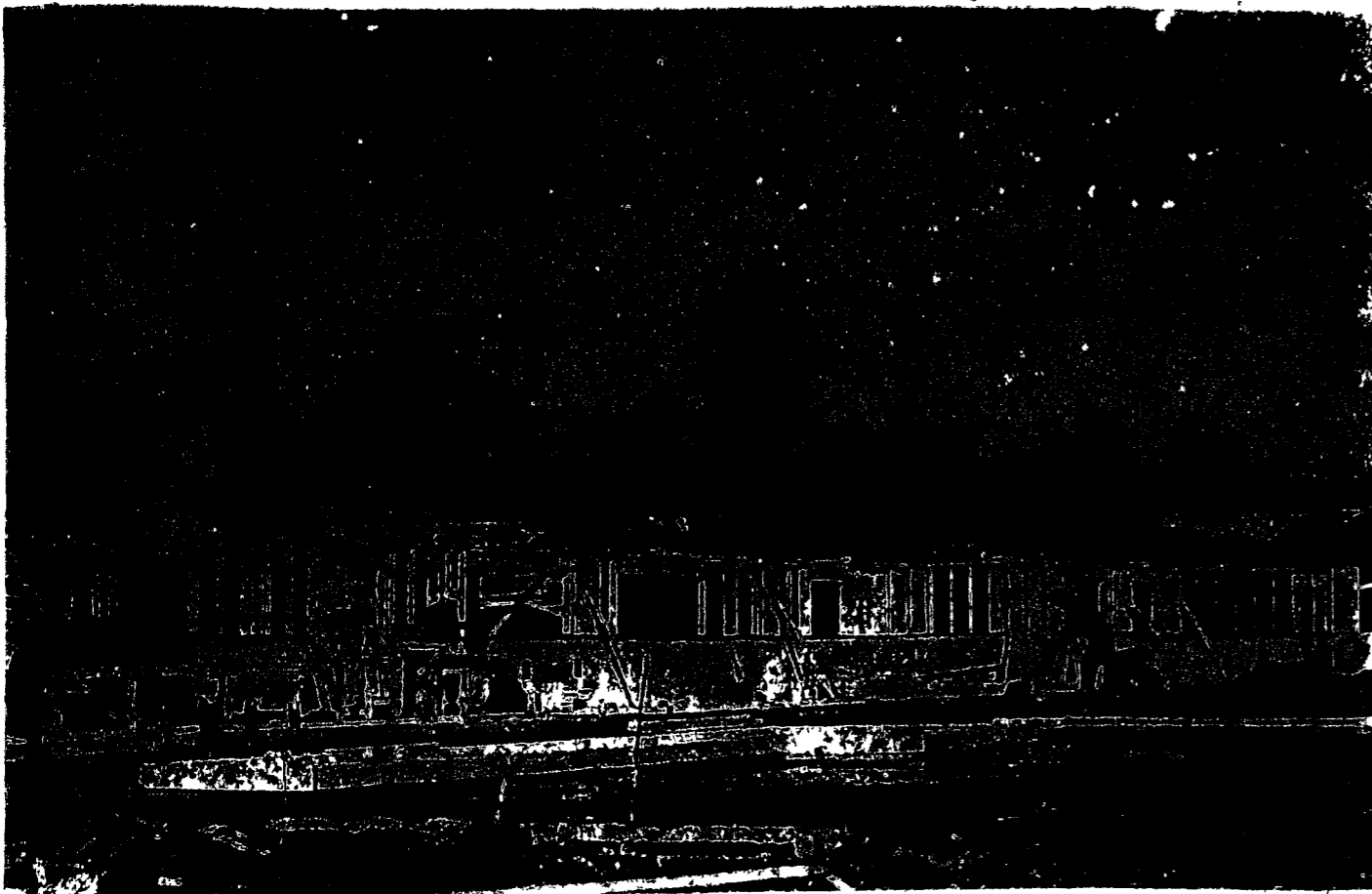

Snowmobile season swoops in once again

With it comes a reminder — and some information — from the Department of Natural Resources

January 1, 1975, marks the start of a new registration cycle. The Department points out, and all machines must be licensed for another three-year period. There's also a requirement that both automobiles towing snowmobiles and the machines themselves must have motor vehicle permits before entering a state park. The permits are normally available at the park entrances.

If you're wondering where to take the snowmobile this year, the DNR has some suggestions in a brochure that can be picked up at regional and district headquarters, the DNR Detroit Information Office, Highway Information Offices and the Lansing office of the Michigan Tourist Council.

The publication includes maps with legends pinpointing locations of snowmobile trails, their length and a phone number for questions about condition of the snow

Nine new trails, adding 233 miles to the state's snowmobile trail system, have not yet been listed in the guide

They are Greenhills, Michigamme State Forest; Chandler Hills, Jordan River State Forest, North Branch, Otsego State Forest, Bear Lake, Kalkaska State Forest, Silver Creek, Black Lake State Forest, East

Devils Lake, Alpena State Forest, Gladwin Refuge, Tittabawassee State Forest, St Helen to Roscommon, Houghton Lake State Forest, and North Missaukee and Lake City North, Missaukee State Forest

Employees in Politics?
Should public employees have the right to become politically active — and remain on their jobs at the same time?

The Michigan house said yes to that question earlier this month, when members voted 83-9 for a bill sponsored by Democrat Howard Wolpe of Kalamazoo. The measure authorized public employee involvement in politics without the workers first having to obtain a leave of absence from their jobs

The bill didn't make it through the Senate, however

Wolpe isn't giving up. He says he'll reintroduce the legislation in January and is "confident" the new Legislature will pass it. "This is a basic constitutional issue," Wolpe says, adding that current practices deny to public employees a right which is available to other citizens.

In addition to allowing public employees to become candidates for any elective office without that leave of absence, the bill grants them the right to work for any candidate or issue in an election, to be a delegate to a state district or county political convention, or to be a political party committee member

More for January
At least two other topics — school strikes and fair campaign practices — may be on the agenda when the Legislature

returns in its new session next month

House Speaker-elect Bobby Crim, D-Flint, is seeking a law providing for binding arbitration in school disputes. Crim, a former school teacher himself, says binding arbitration would be the "court of last resort to see that our kids and our teachers are back in the classroom"

There's particular concern about possible teacher strikes next year, since many two-year contracts written in 1973 will be expiring

The fair campaign practices commission bill already is in the hopper in Lansing, but there's no time between now and the end of the session to do much about it

The bill's sponsor, outgoing Republican Sen. William Ballenger of Lansing, says he hopes it will be reintroduced in January, or be made a part of a Common Cause initiative proposal dealing with campaign reform

Ballenger's bill would grant the commission the legal status — and money to operate. It also would empower the commission the legal status — and money to operate. It also would empower the commission to conduct hearings into complaints, make and keep records of testimony and impose fines

By John Le Carré

The author of The Spy Who Came in From the Cold has written another novel full of intrigue and mystery. This one deals with a British intelligence unit which operated successfully during the war, but has been having serious problems since then. Among the top five men in the organization, there is somebody who is acting as a double agent with the Russians

There are some difficulties for an American reader because some of the English jargon is hard to follow, and the author intentionally obscures many points so it's sometimes difficult to determine just who's doing what to whom

There are some good characterizations. The main character is a man who had been eased out of the spy organization and whose wife has left him for another man. A secondary character is a former spy whose cover was blown on a difficult assignment, presumably by the double agent

Grow Herbs Indoors

Make meals a little more interesting this winter with herbs from your own indoor herb garden.

All you need are a window box or flower pots, some garden soil, water, sunlight and an occasional dose of houseplant fertilizer, says J. Lee Taylor, Extension horticulture specialist at Michigan State University.

"Most herbs don't need any special treatment," Taylor says. "Care for them like any other houseplant, keeping in mind that plants like chives, that are cut often, need more frequent fertilization"

The easiest herbs for beginning herb gardeners are basil, chives, mint, parsley, sweet marjoram and rosemary, the specialist suggests

Mint, chives and rosemary are perennial plants — they continue to grow year after year. The others are annuals — they complete their life cycle in one growing season and must be replanted again each year

When you harvest your indoor garden depends on the herbs you've chosen, Taylor says. You can snip leaves from parsley and chives as soon as the plants have

grown a good number. Rosemary is harvested at full bloom; basil, sweet marjoram and mint are best harvested before they bloom

To dry these herbs for later use, tie them loosely in bunches and hang them in a ventilated, dust-free room. Or spread them loosely in a frame of clean hardware cloth, screening or cheesecloth. You can also dry the leaves on flat trays

"Always dry herbs in a cool room," Taylor advises, "and keep them away from heat and sunlight"

Store herbs in tightly covered jars in a cool, dry cupboard where they will not be exposed to light

I'd like to stop smoking—but I'm having a hard time. Even my husband can't help me, and he's tried everything from hiding my cigarettes to replacing them with the bubble gum kind! Although I'm still hooked, I would at least like to find out which brands have less tar and nicotine than others. I'm sure this information is available from the government, but where?

—K. C., Midland

Write to the Federal Trade Commission, 6th and Pennsylvania Avenue, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20580. Ask for the latest cigarette testing results which lists tar and nicotine content for 130 brands of domestic cigarettes. With this information, you'll be able to compare.

Of course, if you want to smoke the brand that's lowest in tar and nicotine, stick to the bubble gum kind!

I was glad to see that Congress finally wised up and got rid of that stupid seatbelt interlock requirement. I don't mind using my seatbelt, but it was ridiculous to make us buckle-up just to start the car! Now that the interlock requirement has been scrapped, can I have the pleasure of ripping the blanket-blank thing out of my car??

It became legal to disconnect the seatbelt-ignition interlock system the day after Christmas 1974. But unless you are a pretty good mechanic yourself, I'd suggest you get some trained help: don't rip it out with your bare hands! Cars made after February 24, 1975, will have a new and better system, which should not be disconnected. The interlock, the new system will allow you to start your car even if your seatbelt is not fastened. However, a buzzer will go on for four to eight seconds to remind you to buckle-up.

ORDINANCE NO. 216
AN ORDINANCE TO GRANT TAX EXEMPTION TO METAETEA COURT II, A MICHIGAN STATE HOUSING DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY FINANCED HOUSING PROJECT, PURSUANT TO 1966 PUBLIC ACTS 346, SECTION 15A, AS AMENDED.
THE CITY OF BUCHANAN ORDAINS:
TAX EXEMPTION
SECTION 1: Metea Court II, a Michigan State Housing Development Authority project, being a housing project eligible for tax exemption pursuant to Act 346 of the Public Acts of 1966, Section 15A, as amended, is hereby granted exemption from taxes
PAYMENT IN LIEU OF TAXES
SECTION 2: In lieu of taxes, Metea Court II, a Limited Dividend Housing Association, sponsors of Metea Court II, shall pay to the City of Buchanan on August 15th of each year hereafter, a sum equivalent to five (5) percent of the total shelter rents, as defined by the above stated Act, available for charge by Metea Court II, a Limited Dividend Housing Association, from said Metea Court II during the preceding twelve (12) months ending as of June 30th of each year hereafter
EXEMPTION PERIOD
SECTION 3: The tax exemption and payments in lieu of taxes as specified in Section 2 hereof shall remain in effect for so long as Metea Court II shall be a qualified housing project as specified in Paragraph 1 of the above mentioned Act
PROJECT EXEMPTION
SECTION 4: The tax exemption granted herein shall apply to Metea Court II as a completely qualified housing project
SECTION SEVERABLE
SECTION 5: Sections and parts of this Ordinance shall be deemed to be severable, and should any section or provision of this Ordinance be declared by any Court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional or invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of this Ordinance as a whole or any part thereof other than the part so declared to be unconstitutional or invalid
This Ordinance shall become effective on the 24th day of December, 1974
