Many people have been asking recently: "When will they build the new library?"

The only answer is: When the building fund committee attains the \$47,000 goal. The total cash in hand to date approximates \$40,000, \$7,000 short. The committee is hopeful that the total will be raised yet this winter. It is in fact planning to submit the plans to contractors for bids this winter—if the total \$47,000 is in hand. That would mean that the library would be built next spring.

Money is needed. If any of the interested questioners have not given, or wish to give more, they can help us in the way we most need help—by giving in the measure that they are able to.

Remember, fellow citizens of Buchanan, when you give to a library you are helping to create something that is "not for a day, not for a month, not for a year—but always!"

When the library leaves the old home for the new, it will leave a hundred year structure to enter another that may house it for another century. So in planning it we must plan for the generations at least. We have an important commission.

Said the famous historian, Thomas Carlyle:

"The founding of a library is one of the greatest things that we can do with regard to results. It is one of the quietest things; but there is nothing that I know of that is at bottom more important."

Our library of books has long outgrown its present quarters. To meet the growing demands of a growing community we need a new library home. To attain it we need your help.

Hospital Drive Reports Success

Says Farmer Not Barred From Hunting On Own Land By Sign

There is a widely current belief among farmers that if they post "No Hunting or Trespassing" signs on their farms they will not be permitted to hunt on their own lands.

The Record consulted a man whose business it is to police hunting during open seasons. He stated that it is not specifically stated so in the laws and it is not logical to infer that a land owner posting such a notice would bar himself from hunting on his own land. He had never made an arrest on such grounds, he stated and he had never heard of anyone else doing so. Although farmers must conform to legal seasons in both hunting and fishing, they, their family, or their regular employees may hunt on their farms without a license. It is not reasonable to suppose, said this source, that a farm owner would bar himself by writing or having printed a notice and posting it on the fence.

Bids Indicate Court Housing Units To Go For \$400 to \$912

A total of 54 bidders thronged the small entry-way into what was once the Moccasin Court housing project headquarters Tuesday afternoon and made a total of over 2,000 bids on a total of 72 properties, following which they wended their several ways, wondering if they had bought anything.

They will all know within ten days, stated Mr. C. R. Baechler, Realty Officer, Public Housing Administration, 185 North Wabash, Chicago, Illinois. For the total number of bids represents a rather intricate tangle, and several days will be required to accurately sift out the actual buyers.

The 72 properties included 12 single housing units and 60 double housing units. Of the 54 bidders present 35 entered bids on all or nearly all of the units. But only four of them signified that they wished to buy all the properties. In fact eleven of them indicated that they would take only one property. The great majority of the 35 total or near total bidders wanted six or less houses. Above that there were a half dozen bidders for 8 to 20 properties.

This resulted from the arrangement permitted whereby one could bid on all or any part of the properties, indicating at the same time how many he would take. If any of his bids are successful, he cannot select his properties, as that would result in conflicts of choice and be relatively impossible. The Housing Authority will allot the houses to the successful buyers.

The range of bids on the 72 properties was from \$25 to \$912. No awards have been made but it was evident from the chat of buyers and bids that the saleprice of the properties would range from \$400 to the top figure of \$912.

It was believed that the buyer who would get the largest number of properties would be the Starr Lumber company of 201 W. 36th street, Chicago. This company made bids for all of the properties, indicating that it would take all if successful. Most of the bids were \$511.89 on the double units with lower bids for poorer or single units, all the bids ending in

Last Friday evening the solicitors for the Buchanan Community hospital had a dinner meeting at the campaign headquarters according to Dr. Leslie Crosby to report on the progress of a general hospital available to all doctors in this area.

Dr. Crosby further states: "About half of the area has been covered with gratifying results. All business establishments contacted, with the exception of one, have joined in contributing toward the hospital. Some of the amounts have been very substantial. Labor donations have exceeded expectations."

"There was a discussion of construction costs. Figures presented showed that by modern design and careful planning and competent supervision, the cost per bed could be kept below \$5,000 which is below national average, and equivalent to some of the additions recently made by Michigan hospitals."

"The problem of maintenance was discussed, and it was brought out that every osteopathic hospital in Michigan has made its own way and most have shown a 2 to 5% profit. There are two exceptions to this, namely the Riverside hospital which receives Federal grants for expansion, and the Detroit Osteopathic hospital, which was included in the Greater Detroit Hospital Drive."

"The question of keeping the hospital beds filled received lively discussion. It was pointed out that graduates of the Osteopathic Schools of Medicine take care of 1,750,000 patients in this state, and that these physicians in New Buffalo, Three Oaks, Galesburg, Berrien Springs, Buchanan and Niles care for over 16,000 patients."

"National surveys point out that there should be five hospital beds for each 1,000 people. Therefore, the many patients who are now sent elsewhere could be taken care of here in the Buchanan Community hospital."

"The question of Federal aid was brought up, and it was stated that we already have had substantial aid from the state and Federal agencies in planning and design. Furthermore, we are not asking for Federal aid until such as available for expansion of a geriatric and convalescent section."

Observers estimated that the Starr company would get from 25 properties up to a certain Carl Scigliano of Ponton, Mich. made bids on all properties, most of his bids ranging from \$600 to \$778, but indicated that only eight properties would be purchased. Carl will doubtless get the eight houses. A Cleo Brown of South Bend entered high bids on all properties, but will buy only one. Individual buyers who were interviewed gave various intended uses. A large percentage were from the fruit belt and were buying for tenant houses. Asked about zoning restrictions one considerable buyer indicated that townships would not interfere with the summer use of units for fruit pickers if such houses were back of orchards or otherwise hidden from the road.

Others intimated that a good sale outlet is for cottages on lake fronts. One large buyer was believed to be bidding to get units to set up in outlying and poorer suburbs of Chicago.

"There's a big market for this kind of stuff," said one buyer. "You would really be surprised. The prices that you could get for the run of the units would be from \$500 to \$1,000. They're easy to take down and transport."

Buyers were present from four states. South Bend had seven bidders, as did Benton Harbor. Decatur and Buchanan had five each. Niles had four. Farthest bids were from Dayton, Ohio, Detroit and Muskegon, Grand Rapids and Lansing. A large number were scattered through the southwestern Michigan fruit district.

The buyers will be given 120 days to remove their purchases. Three properties had been purchased by William O. Moore, Edward Smiles and Earl Lewis of Buchanan by a previous arrangement.

Mr. C. R. Baechler, the federal Realty Officer from Chicago, stated that the scale of prices offered were very satisfactory and the results of the sale were good.

Court house round-up

Like Berrien county supervisors are finally about to make up their minds one way or the other about whether the county should undertake to do something about Lake Michigan's insatiable appetite.

For nearly a decade now, the lake has been nibbling away at the county's valuable shoreline. "Gobbling" might be a better word, for the coastline often disappears in huge hunks. The whole process of the disappearing shoreline is called erosion.

St. Joseph city several months ago discovered that federal matching funds are available for coastline surveys by the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers. Such surveys are supposed to come up with answers to what can best be done to combat erosion. They are also supposed to provide plans and cost estimates for whatever off-shore installations may be required.

St. Joseph immediately took steps to get such a survey, but army engineers suggested that a better survey could be made if at least 20 miles of coastline was involved. St. Joseph has only about three miles of coastline it can call its own.

Lake township supervisor Theodore Katzback therefore decided to propose that the county make the survey a county-wide project. But the proposal was referred to committee and there it has lain for the past three months.

The proposal involves a \$4,300 appropriation by the board, about half of the total cost to the local units of government for the survey. The rest would be contributed by the cities and townships directly benefiting from the survey.

Last week St. Joseph city fathers decided again to take the bullish lake by its whitecapped horns. They appropriated \$2,000 for its share of the survey cost and coupled it with a request that the engineers come in and survey the city shoreline whether or not the county goes along.

Conservation committee chairman Chester Hocker of Coloma, followed immediately by getting this committee together with the board of supervisors' finance committee. Finance chairman William P. Sawyer, Three Oaks, said the money is available if the board wants too appropriate it.

But he also added a point of a fight which may arise over the appropriation. "I think it's a waste of money, personally," declared Sawyer. "But they asked me if we had the money and I had to tell them we did."

Hocker will have a resolution to make the appropriation prepared for presentation to the board when it convenes in regular session next Monday. Meanwhile, the lake chews on.

BEETLE BATTLE—The virtual rain of death by which Berrien county hopes to wipe out a threatened invasion of Japanese beetles, an insect with an appetite for green vegetation which is just as insatiable as the lake's appetite for valuable shoreline property.

This proved to be one fight about which the supervisors didn't quibble. When told a month ago that there were Japanese beetles existing in the county, the supervisors reacted like the little bugs were already chewing on the lettuce in their own personal wallets. They appropriated \$7,200 to finance the beetle battle without batting an antennae.

It is in reality a three-way battle against the little invader which is as prolific as it is voracious. The federal government lacks in with the equipment, the state "ag" department the manpower, and the county the spray material to be used.

Dental Health

(The following is an article on "Your Dental Health" being presented by the Record in cooperation with the Tri-County Dental Society.)

The Causes of Gum Disease
Serious damage can be done to the gums and many tooth sockets by irritation.

The chief source of irritation is calculus, popularly known as tartar.

Calculus is a lime salt derived from saliva. It is soft and gelatinous for a time and clings readily to rough surfaces. After about 24 hours, however, it hardens into a stone-like mass and cannot be brushed away. A dentist's metal instruments are required to remove it.

The calculus, once hardened, begins to pile up along the neck of the teeth at the gum margin. Like a sliver in a finger, it sets up a local irritation. Bloods begin to stagnate, leading to inflammation and gingivitis. This permits additional accumulation of calculus and more irritation, setting up a vicious cycle.

Dentists have found other causes for breakdown of gums and other tooth-supporting tissues. Malocclusion, or irregular alignment of teeth, can be a factor. Teeth that do not come together properly increase the tendency of food and bacteria to accumulate at the gum line.

Another cause is the failure of opposing teeth to touch, which is a form of malocclusion. Just as a paralyzed leg withers from lack of use, so does a tooth and its supporting structures degenerate from lack of function.

Some investigators have suggested that there is more gum breakdown, known as periodontal disease, in smokers than in non-smokers.

Drying out of the linings of the mouth through mouth breathing is one of the more commonly overlooked irritants.

Besides the local irritating factors, many dentists believe that general bodily health has much to do with gum breakdown.

Gums, like any tissue of the body, are susceptible to general disturbances, such as nutritional deficiency. An upset in hormonal balance in the body may also be a contributing factor.

However, the claim that anxiety, worry and nervousness influence periodontal disease has not yet been substantiated.

Fun To Eat Apple A Day Another Way

Want to eat your "apple a day" in new and different ways? Apples can be served as appetizers, main courses, salads, desserts, candies and in-between-meal snacks.

Roberta Hershey, extension foods and nutrition specialist at Michigan State College, advises the time is here to store this fruit which is chock full of vitamins and minerals. Whether they are canned, frozen or kept in cold storage, your apples will be there throughout the winter to prepare just as you want.

Miss Hershey suggests baking apples to take advantage of the large amount of vitamin C in the peel. Varieties which are excellent for baking are Jonathan, Stayman, Winesap, and Wolf River. Her baked apple recipe includes a meringue topping.

Party Baked Apples
½ cup dark corn syrup, ½ cup water, ¼ teaspoon cinnamon, 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind, 1 tablespoon butter, 2 tablespoons sugar, 4 large baking apples. Meringue: 1 egg white, 2 tablespoons sugar.

Combine first 6 ingredients and bring to a boil. Remove from heat. Core apples, pare upper half. Place in baking dish. Pour hot syrup mixture over apples. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) about 1 hour, or until tender, basting frequently. Remove from oven. Beat egg white until foamy, gradually beat in sugar. Top each apple with meringue. If desired, insert blanched shredded almonds in meringue and dot with chopped, drained maraschino cherries. Return to oven and bake 15 minutes longer.

Apple punch is another way to please family or guests. 1 quart apple juice, 1 cup pineapple juice, 4 or 5 sprays crushed mint, juice of 1 lemon, ½ cup of sugar.

Combine the ingredients, chill thoroughly and serve with ice.

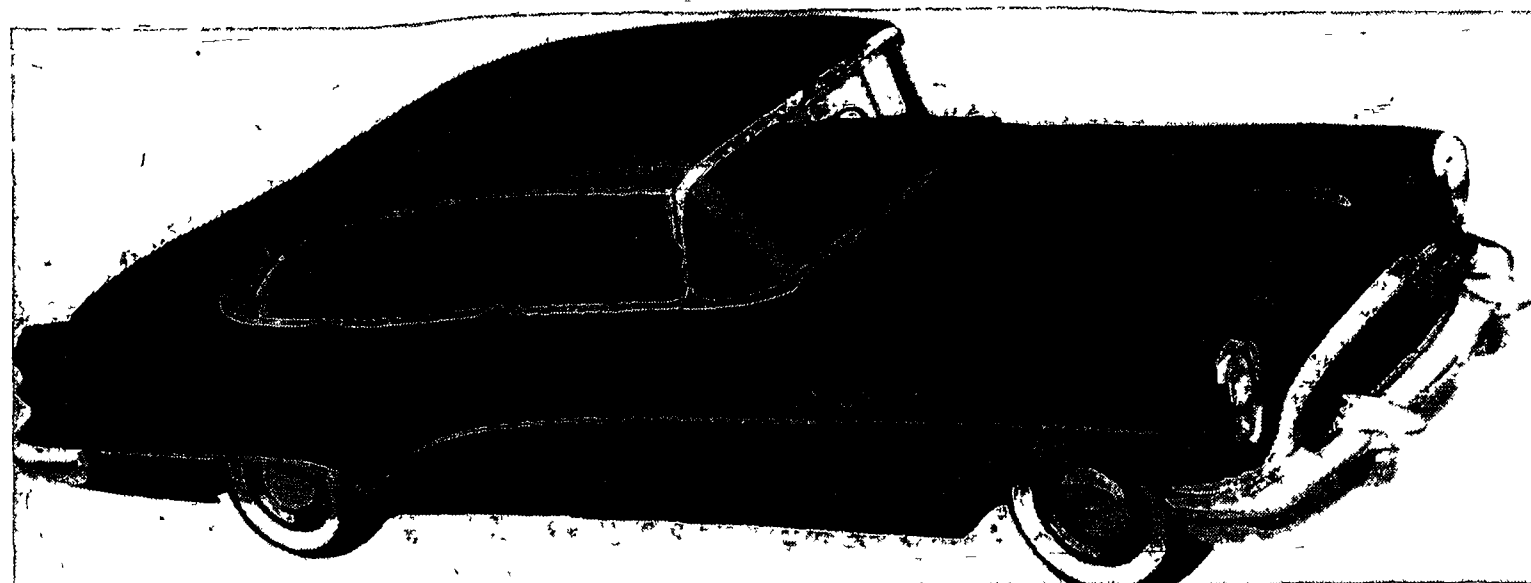

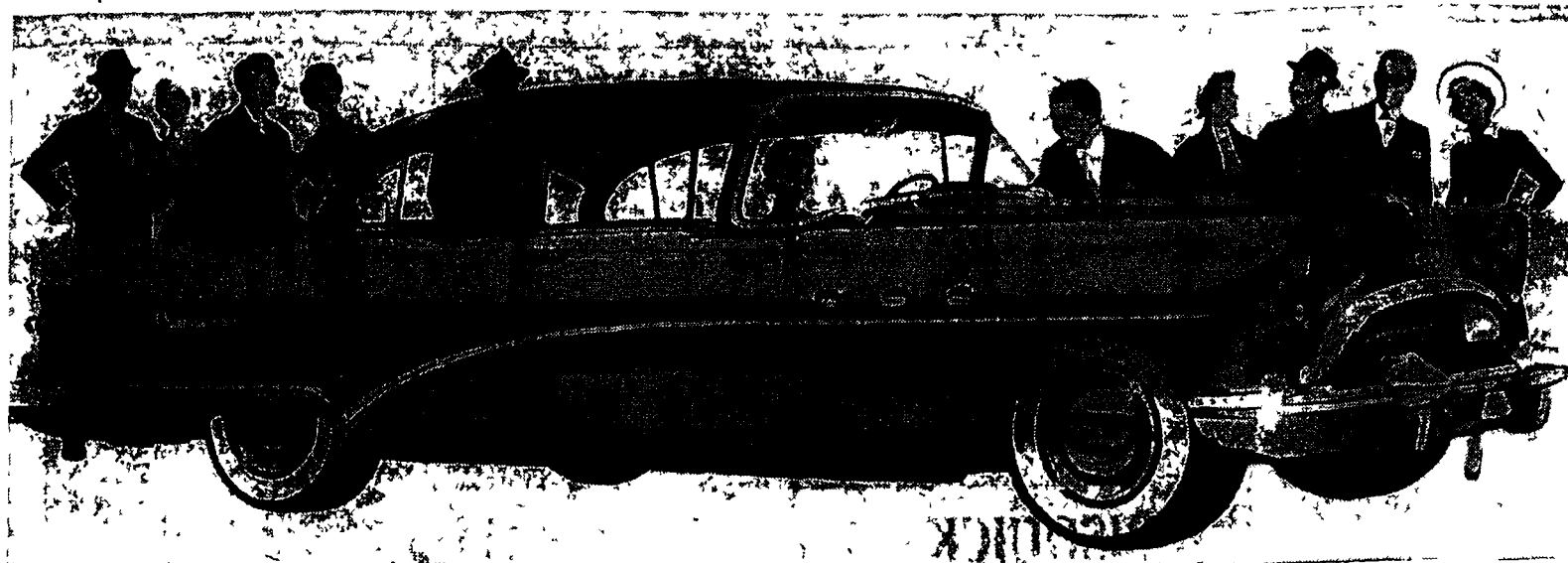

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The Pro and Con On Amendment No. Two

The following is in part a digest and in part a literal reproduction of an article in the current issue of the Michigan Educational Journal written by Hugh Schram, Michigan Educational Association Director of Publications, explaining the so-called "Conlon Proposal" which will be presented to the voters at the Nov. 2 elections as Proposal No. 2. This proposal offers a revision of the sales tax diversion amendment to the state constitution which was passed by popular vote in 1946.

While Mr. Schram is, indirectly at least, a laborer in the field of education, it cannot be assumed that his interpretation might be partial, since the schools will receive little if any more money under the proposed plan than under the present form. The author of the bill, Roljo G. Conlon of Lenawee county, merely proposes what he believes to be more business-like methods of

collection and distribution of sales tax money to the schools. Michigan voters will be asked for a "yes" or "no" vote on four proposed amendments to the state constitution of Michigan at the general election Nov. 2.

Most difficult to understand and decide will be the amendment listed on the special ballot as "Proposal No. 2," which presents a revision of the sales tax diversion amendment which has provided the channel by which a share of the state sales tax has poured into the school treasuries since its adoption by popular vote in the election of November, 1946. This amendment provides for the following:

Why Vote For Proposal No. 2?

1. One cent of a state sales tax levy shall be divided so that (a) 50% is distributed to school districts on the basis of the school census and (b) 50% goes to cities, villages and townships on the basis of population.

2. The legislature must appropriate for the schools a percentage of the previous year's total sales tax collection, and this must be in addition to any other constitutional allocations (including that which is distributed under No. 1 above). This percentage must be at least equal to the ratio of legislative educational grants in 1945-46 to the sales tax revenue of the previous year, 1944-45. The figure which was thus established is 44.77% of the previous year's collection. An additional 16.67% of the sales tax paid to the school districts according to census, raises the total present school share of the sales tax to 61.44%. The proposed revision of the sales tax diversion would grant 66.67% of sales tax revenues to schools.

However, according to Mr. Hugh Schram, the fact that the proposed revision would not require any of the allocation to be paid to schools on a census basis would undoubtedly result in increased state grants to teacher retirement funds. That, plus the cost of collection, would mean that the schools would not get any more money under the new plan.

Proposal No. 2 would eliminate a feature of the present form of the amendment which could have troublesome results. As it stands now there is a two-year delay from the collection of sales tax until its eventual payment to the schools.

The legislature now makes appropriations of sales tax money to the schools on the basis of the collections of the previous year, and does not pay the resulting monies to the school districts until the year following. For instance, the legislature of 1950 based its appropriation of sales tax receipts to the schools on the amount collected in 1949, but did not actually pay that amount until 1951. This results in a two-year drag during which anything might happen.

For instance, if there had been a considerable decline in sales tax receipts during that two year period, the legislature, because of declining revenues, might not have been able to meet the payments based on a period of prosperity two years before.

This has been labeled the "time bomb" feature.

2. It would help to eliminate a possible situation such as that which occurred in 1952-53 when the state's general fund did not have enough money to pay the schools the amounts due them at certain times specified by law.

3. Current sales tax collections specified for schools would be set aside automatically and could not be used for other state purposes.

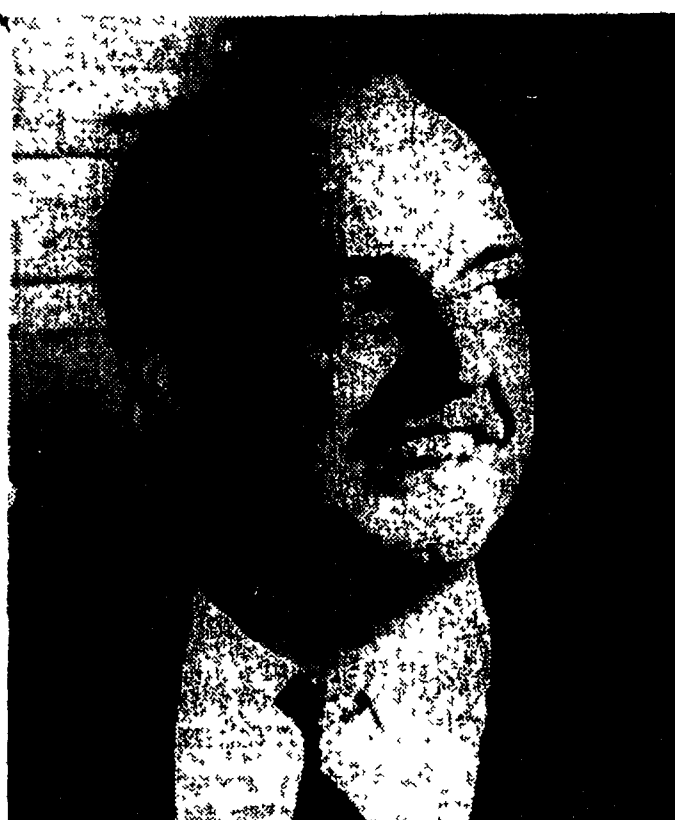

Points You Should Consider

1. The proposal provides no change in the one-sixth share to local governments, except for a few cities having state penal or mental institutions. Those cities will get the one-sixth share on the basis of one-half the number of persons in the institution.

2. Financing schools and other government services, local and state, cannot be separated. They must be complementary.

3. The legislature can appropriate more general fund money for schools and for retirement if they so desire. This situation will not be changed under the proposed revision.

4. The 1946 sales tax would still be basic if the proposal should be adopted.

Why Vote Against Proposal No. 2?

1. It would provide no increase in funds for the schools.

2. If the retirement appropriation goes to more than 5% per cent, the state aid for school operation would be less than it is under the present law.

3. It may create a division of school people over how much should go for school operation and how much for retirement each year.

4. Even the 7 1/2% maximum for retirement would not be enough, at some future date, to finance adequately the school employees' retirement funds.

ADD—THE PRO AND CON—5. It would fix into the constitution for many years to come, in a manner most difficult to change, provisions which do not necessarily solve the retirement problem.

6. It would limit the sales tax rate to 3%. To freeze the sales tax is to close the door on this source of revenue.

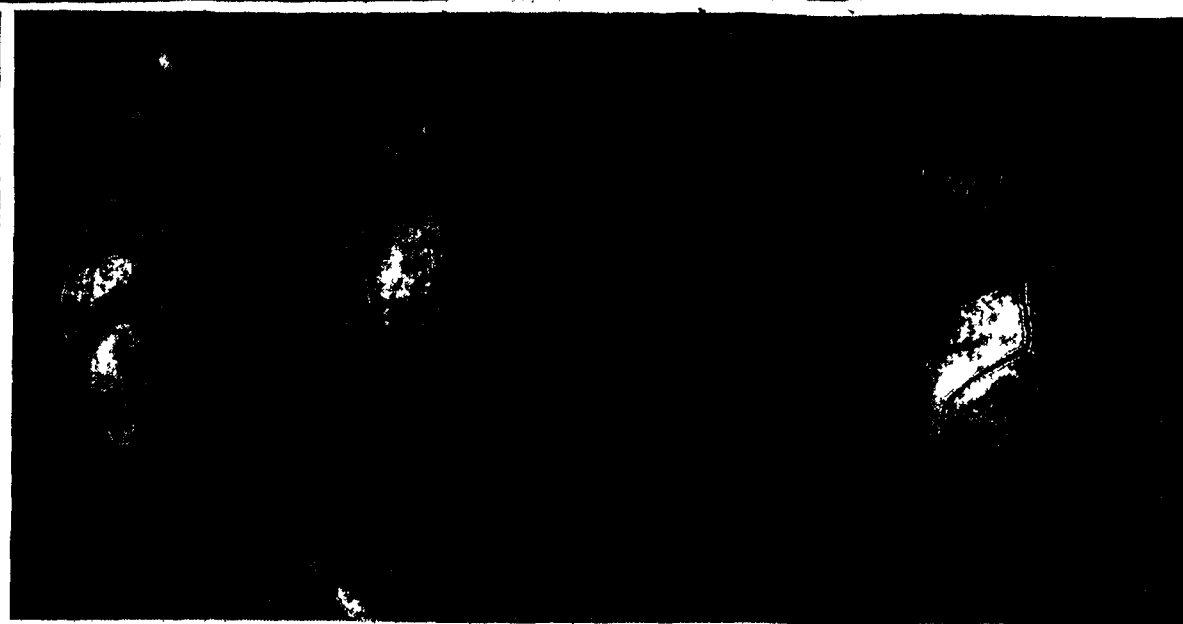

1,000 Farmers At Corn Field Day

The estimated 1,000 farmers who attended the Corn Field Day held under the auspices of Michigan State College at the Leonard Babcock farm saw some very good corn and received some valuable information, some of which was pertinent mainly to farms with heavy clay soils.

The heaviest yield was 127 bushels per acre (rate) from a plot which had a population rate of 14,700 stalks per acre and which received fertilization at the rate of 200 pounds per acre of 5-20-20 commercial fertilizer, and ten loads of manure per acre.

The tests proved that on a clay-type soil such as the Leonard Babcock farm the conventional tilling consisting of plowing, discing once and dragging twice gets best results.

The plots at the Leonard Babcock farm did best for an average return in response to the following tillage plowing, discing, dragging twice with a "clod-buster." This treatment produced at the rate of 119 bushels per acre. Doubling the tillage after plowing produced less, 113 bushels per acre. Minimum tillage, meaning a rotary harrow or a clod-buster after the plow, produced an average of 82 bushels per acre, and furrow planting produced 84 bushels per acre. The wide spread between the lesser tillage and more tillage proved convincingly that the more complete process paid on heavy land.

However, four years of previous experimentation on lighter sandy lands indicated that conventional tillage produced very little, if any more, per acre than the "minimum tillage" and is consequently not profitable. The difference was conventional, 71.6 bushels; minimum, 71 bushels on the heavier land, and 45.8 bushels conventional and 48.5 minimum on the lighter sands.

The tests also convincingly demonstrated that the medium stands, 14,000 to 17,000 per acre, produced the most corn. It was also proven that big ears do not mean the best yields. Best returns were secured from rows 40 inches apart with plants nine inches apart in the row. These bore ears averaging ¾ pound that yielded more corn per acre than

bigger years on wider plantings. The tests also proved that any speed rate over three miles per hour meant more skipped and irregular planting and correspondingly smaller yields.

The overall practice program suggested by the tests was, conventional tillage, planting at rate three miles an hour or less, rows 40 inches apart, plants 9 inches apart in the row; fertilized according to soil needs, the 200 lbs. of 5-20-20 plus manure getting the best results.

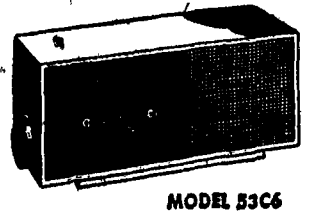

Meet Your Merchant

Robert Olson Is Coming Along In The Oil Business

Believe it or not, Miss Allene Arney, office manager of the Woodworth Agency, pulled Bob's Zephyr Station out of an envelope last Thursday morning—it wasn't such a big envelope either. In fact it was the drawing for the "Meet Your Merchant" feature of this week.

Robert Olson, much better known as "Bob," is just a farm boy who is now pushing along in the oil business. When the writer first knew him he was running a Standard Oil station on M-60 at Bakertown and pushing a 100-acre farm ahead of him at the same time.

He came from Chicago in 1933 when he wasn't "too big of a boy." The family then consisted of his mother, himself, and two brothers. They settled on a farm southeast of Gallien. Bob finished grade school at the Currier school, and then went to the Buchanan high school, from which he was graduated in 1939. While he was in the senior year he was already carrying the burden of the farm work on the 100-acre farm.

His farm equipment totaled three horse-power, each power wrapped up in a horsehide.

The year after graduation he entered the employ of the Clark Equipment company, still running the farm too. In late 1941 he transferred from the Clark Equipment company to the Bendix plant in South Bend.

Then on Nov. 22, 1942, he enlisted in the U. S. Navy and went to the wars. He wound up the war in the South Pacific, after two years of service with a submarine crew. His boat was in the closing sea campaign which captured



the Philippine Islands. His boat was in the expedition that bombed Subic Bay.

On receiving his discharge in January of 1946 he returned home and resumed work in the Bendix plant. He quit that work to open the oil station on M-60. In April, 1951, he left that situation and opened a Standard Service station at the northwest corner of the intersection of Front and Portage streets.

He remained there, building a fine business, until June of the present year when he opened a Zephyr Service station in his own building on his own land. He had bought two lots on the north side of East Front street west of the Skyline Drive, with a frontage of 160 feet and a depth to the north of 200 feet. The extra lot now has a house on it, which he will rent until he needs the extra space for his business.

In the meantime Bob has been building a home, raising a family and making a place for himself in the life of the community. He married Mildred Blanchard of Crown Point, Ind., on May 22, 1949. They now have three children: Deborah, aged 3½ years;

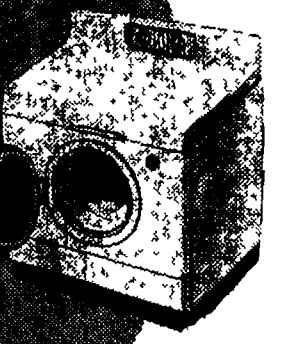

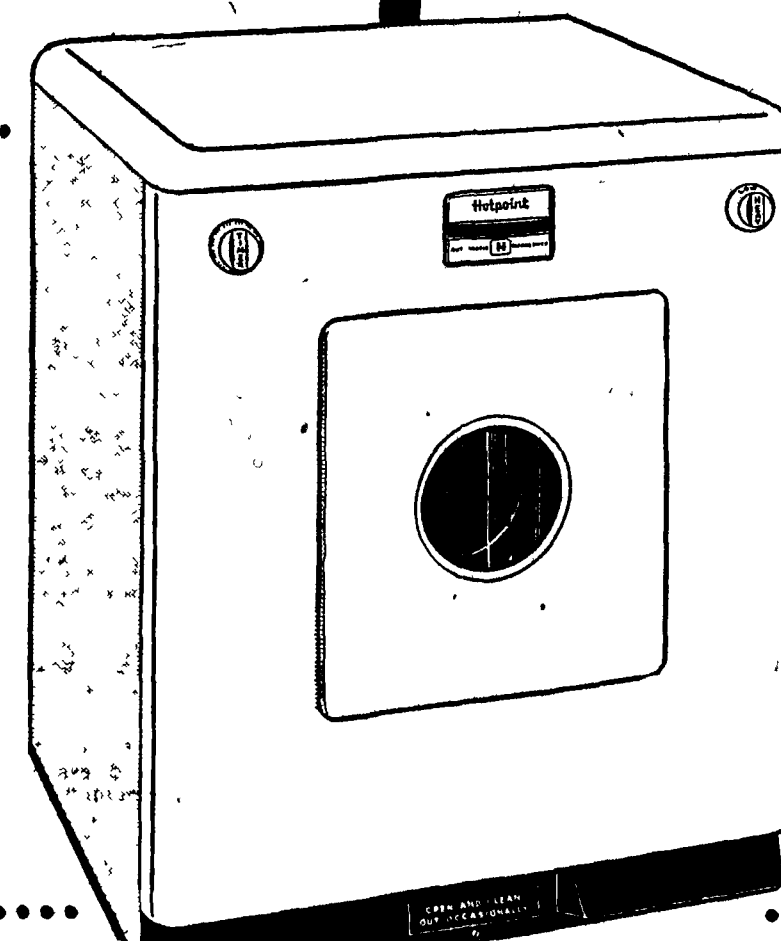

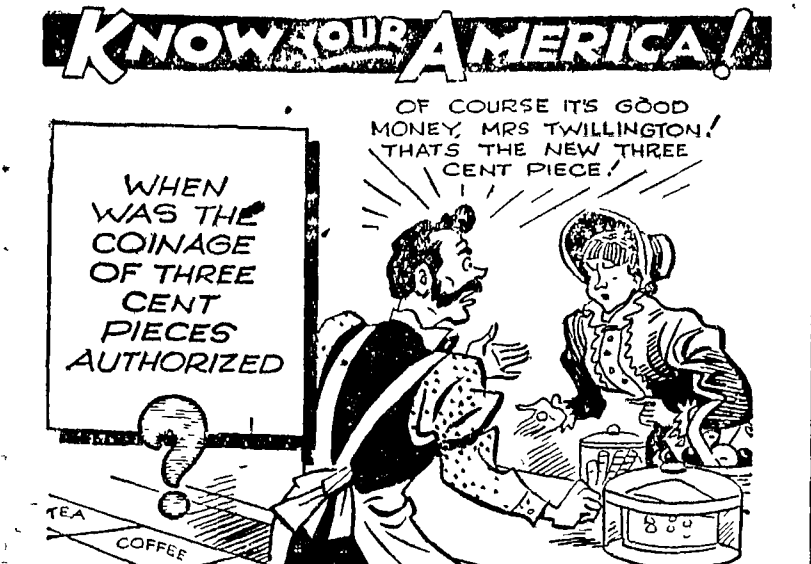

Don Leonard and Other Candidates Will Stump County

At 10 o'clock Leonard will do sidewalk campaigning in the city of Benton Harbor on Main street,

arriving at the Berrien County Republican headquarters at 256 W. Main at 11:00 for consultation with anyone who wishes to confer with him. At 12:00 Leonard will be the guest of honor at a luncheon to be held in the Tropical Room of the Whitcomb hotel,

sponsored by the Berrien County Republican Committee. Tickets will be available at the hotel for \$1.25 each. At 1:35 Leonard's motorcade heads for Stevensville, arriving there at 1:45. Bridgman has been scheduled for a stop at 2:15. From there the Leonard party will journey to New Troy, arriving there at 2:45. A stop is scheduled at Harbert at 3:15. Leonard will then go to New Buffalo, where he will meet with local Republicans at the Orchard Inn at 3:45. In order to get the gubernatorial candidate over as much of the county as possible, County Republican Chairman Shepard has obtained a helicopter. Leonard, the pilot, and Shepard will leave New Buffalo via helicopter at 4:15, and arrive at Three Oaks at 4:30, where they will confer with party func-

tionaries and do a brief stint of sidewalk campaigning.

The gubernatorial candidate will arrive at Thomas Stadium in Niles at 6:00 o'clock. The helicopter will land in the Stadium proper. From 5:00 to 8:00 p. m. a mammoth rally and barbecue will be held in the Thomas Memorial Stadium. In the event of rain the activities will be transferred to the Niles Armory. Tickets to the barbecue are \$1.00 per adult and all children accompanied by their parents will be admitted free. Attorney Keith Ball of Niles is general chairman. He emphasizes that the dinner will be a complete barbecue dinner with "all you can eat." In addition free soft drinks and ice cream will be generously dispensed to children and adults. The gates at the Thomas Stadium will be open at 5 p. m.

All of the State Republican candidates together with Senators Potter and Ferguson and Congressman Clare E. Hoffman, are expected to attend Leonard and the attending Republican candidates will don white coats and aprons and assist in serving the barbecue.

Oct. 8 has been designated by the National Republican committee as National Precinct Day. On that date, throughout the nation, Republicans are scheduled to gather in all their precincts for precinct meetings. The high point will be a national televised appearance of President Eisenhower and Vice President Nixon from 9:30 to 10:00 p. m. in the evening.

Montgomery Shepard urged every precinct captain to immediately schedule a precinct meeting for that evening in front of a television set. Locally the program can be viewed over WKZO. The reason for specifying that station is that the Michigan State Central Republican committee has tentatively planned to immediately follow the Nixon talk with Gubernatorial Candidate Don S. Leonard and Senator Homer Ferguson.

This presentation by the national and state committees to the "grass roots" level of the Republican party is primarily designed to facilitate precinct captains and block captains in getting out a record vote. County Chairman Shepard emphasized that had each precinct in the state of Michigan gotten out one additional republican vote two years ago, it would have meant the election of a republican governor for the State of Michigan. The Berrien County Farm Bureau announced that it will hold a "Meet Your Candidate" Night on Thursday, Oct. 14, at the Youth Fair Memorial building in Berrien Springs. A farm bureau spokesman emphasized that this meeting is open to all candidates regardless of party affiliation and will be sponsored by the Berrien County Farm Bureau. The meeting is scheduled to get underway at 8 p. m.

City of David Fights To Hold Colony Property

A suit in Benton Harbor represents the City of David religious colony's fight for its very existence.

The colony filed suit this week against three grandchildren of the late "Queen" Mary Purnell, founder and spiritual leader of the cult. The grandchildren two weeks ago started action in probate court to claim as Mary's legal heirs the very property the colony now holds as its own.

Colonists asked in the suit and got a temporary injunction restraining the probate court from making a routine appraisal of the properties in question, and also restraining the grandchildren from taking possession or using any of the property.

The colonists went direct to the circuit court to fight the move instead of fighting it in probate court, leaving Probate Judge Malcolm Hatfield no alternative but to go ahead and appoint the grandson, S. Coy Purnell, of Benton Harbor, the executor of the Purnell "estate." With Purnell in the fight to be recognized as Mary's legal heirs are his two sisters, Mrs. Hattie Marks of near Benton Harbor, and Mrs. Lucille Lunt of Put-in-Bay, Ohio.

Mary's grandchildren claim the colony's property was legally in Mary's name at the time of her death. The colonists' suit recognizes that an error was made in recording the property, but claim that their late, respected leader knowingly had signed away her claim to it when she became sole trustee of the property.

City of David members look upon the ownership of property as "begetting sin." Even Mary could hold it only in the name of the trust under which the colony was organized back in 1930.

Colonists are disturbed, of course. The grandchildren's move is a threat to their security. But life goes on in the colony with the complete faith that their interests will ultimately be guarded by some power even higher than the courts.

Scouts, Radio Hams Plan Co-operation In Disaster Service

A mobilization drill to test the readiness of Explorer and Sea Scouts and amateur radio operators of Berrien county for disaster service will be held Sunday, Oct. 31, when a simulated tornado "strikes" Berrien Springs. The "disaster" is being arranged through the cooperation of the Southwestern Michigan Council of Boy Scouts, the Amateur Radio Emergency Corps, Civil Defense Corps, Michigan State Police and Berrien County sheriff's office.

The alert will be flashed from Berrien Springs by short wave radio to key "hams" throughout the county. They will notify other amateur operators and Scout leaders, and units will converge on Berrien Springs in private cars.

Headquarters will be set up in the Lions club house. Mobile short wave units will be set up at such strategic points as the fire station, telephone office and police headquarters to provide communications.

Scouts will be organized into first aid, messenger, patrol and guard groups and will be assigned duties of the type they would be called on to perform in case of a real natural or man-made

disaster, according to Kenneth Creamer, field executive of the Southwestern Michigan Council.

A speed limit of 40 miles per hour has been placed on all cars taking part in the mobilization, and state, county and village officers have been requested to help in traffic control.

The exact time of the test is a secret.

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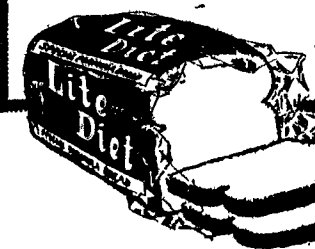

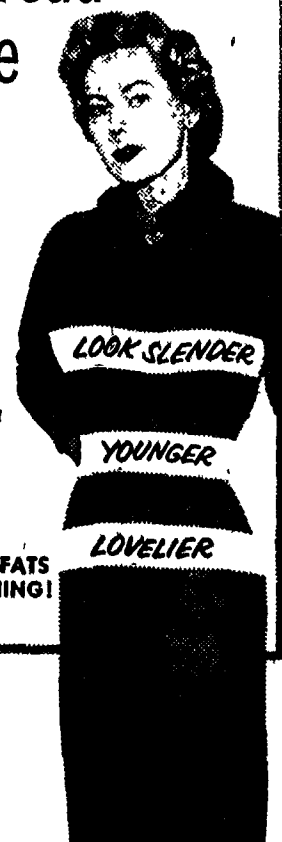

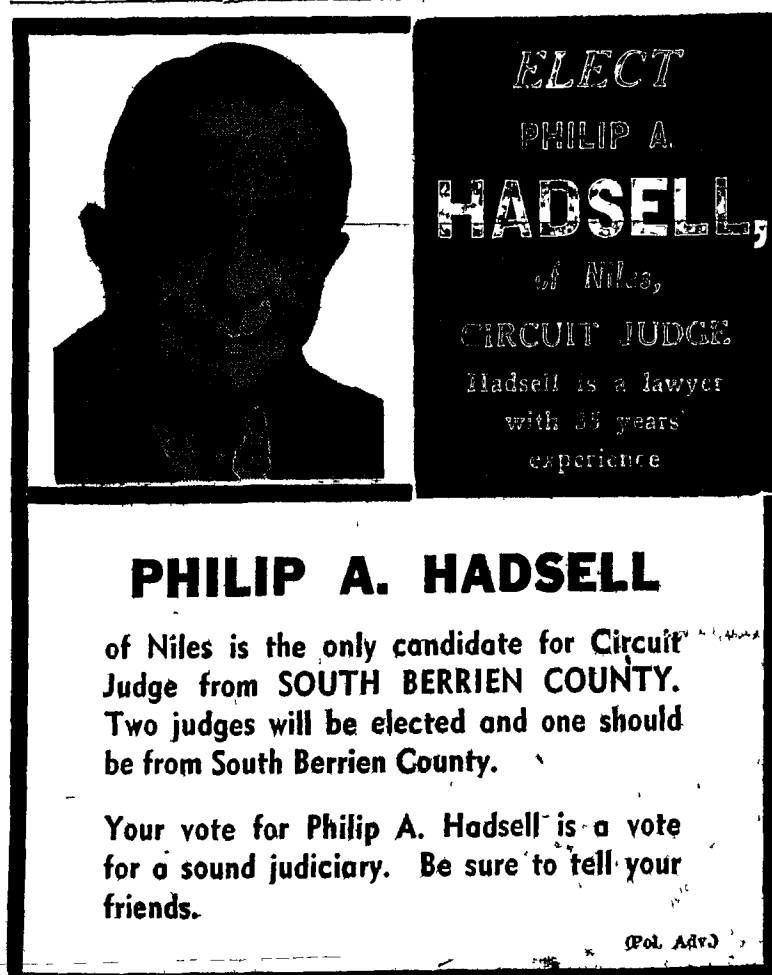

That's the warning from Arthur Bell, Michigan State College extension agricultural engineer. With cold weather coming the moisture from the soil will condense on the floor boards and joists. Then it won't be long before the wood will start to decay.

Bell points out that the remedy is simple. The cover, laid on the wet soil under a house, acts as a

barrier against the rising moisture. The cover may be asphalt coated paper such as roll roofing, laminated papers with a waterproofing material, or thin metal foils. He advises lapping the cover 2 or 3 inches.

When the soil is covered under the house, says Bell, it is possible to safely close the ventilating spaces on the foundations in cold weather to conserve heat. He also suggests nailing a 1-inch insulation on the bottom of the joists underneath the house.

David G. Steinicke, extension specialist at Michigan State College, points out that next week's campaign will stress four points—careful use of machinery, safe stoves, keeping children safely away from matches, and how to save your life if caught in a fire.

The Fire Prevention association sounds this warning: Don't give fire a place to start.

You will get the most food value from fresh fruits and vegetables if you prepare them correctly. Cook vegetables in their skins whenever possible. Chop fresh foods for salads JUST before serving.

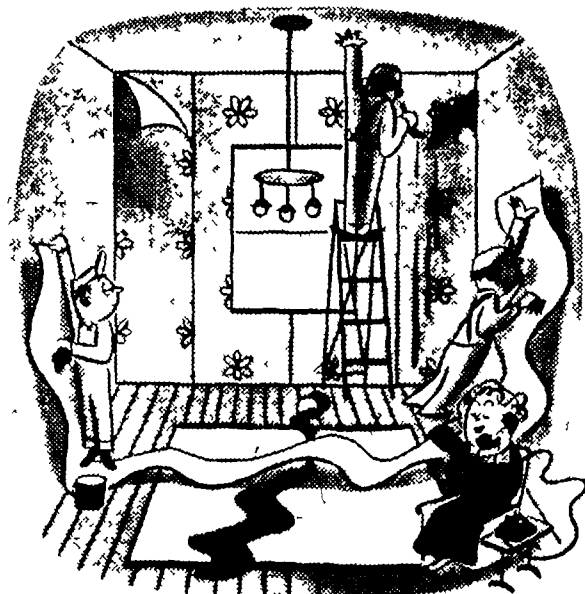
