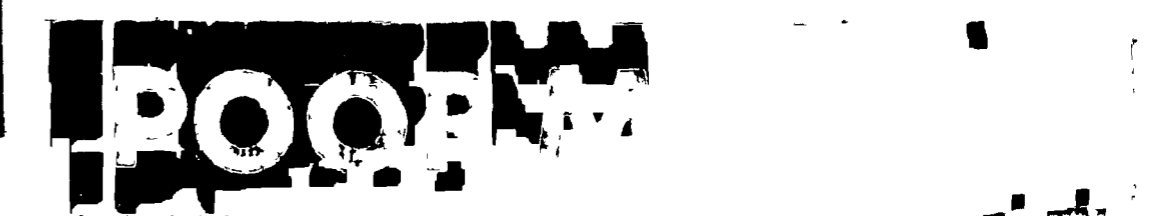

A SHOW-DOWN

The New Dealers, the Communists; Sidney Hillman, with his Political Action Committee of the CIO (and in truth he does not represent the rank and file of the CIO, for the overwhelming majority is patriotic and industrious) have ordered the people of this District to defeat me and elect in my place someone who they think will follow their orders, be their "yes-man", a "rubber stamp".



Inasmuch as they say they oppose me because of my voting record, it follows that they would have favored and they now favor the things which I opposed. Just where does that leave them and the man who is their candidate? Logically they support the measure I opposed.

Before Pearl Harbor I opposed war, as did 80% of our people. They criticize me for that opposition. Were they in favor of war? If not, why do they condemn me for my opposition?

Do my opponents and the candidate they would elect favor the retention in Federal jobs of the members of a party which would overthrow our Government by force; of those who would accomplish the same end by subterfuge?

I advocate every measure which will aid in winning the war as soon as it can be done with the least possible loss of life and suffering, and the return of our fighting men when this war is over. Do my political opponents and their candidate favor keeping our fighting men in Europe indefinitely to fight in any future wars in which European politicians may become involved?

I opposed the plan to haul down the Stars and Stripes, surrender our independence, hoist the flag of Union Now or some other flag, repudiate our Declaration of Independence, our Constitution. Do my political opponents now advocate the adoption of a new flag, a new form of government?

Because I insist that my country, our men—your sons, husbands and brothers—be given first consideration, my political opponents ask you to vote against me.

My position on every public question my voting record, is open to the people. It has been consistent. They have approved it. Now, if my opponents and their candidate believe in the opposite, that is, in hoodlugging, in waste, in extravagance, in inefficiency, in lawlessness and violence (and I opposed the sit-down strikes and all strikes in wartime), let them tell the people of the District the fact and no longer confine themselves to false charges about me.

Let them tell what they or their candidates, if elected, will do. Let them give some assurance that any promises they make will be kept. It is for the people of this District to decide whether they want Sidney Hillman, with his slush fund, to choose their Representatives, or whether they prefer to have a man who has confidence in our people—faith in our form of government.

150 Rural Teachers of Berrien Study Soil Conservation

Edward L. Murodock, county school commissioner said Monday that the series of tours and meetings held on soil and moisture conservation in connection with education in the county rural schools has been successfully concluded.

This series began Oct. 2 with a meeting at the Thompson's school where 34 teachers saw colored slides and were told the story of the loss of our greatest natural resource, the topsoil. They also were shown pictures on various methods by which soil and moisture could be held on the land and conserved for future posterity. This meeting was followed by tours at or near Eau Claire, Millburg, New Troy and South Lincoln schools. On these tours the teachers went into the fields to see strip cropping, sod waterways, contour planting and terraces and into the reforested areas to see first hand the growth of pine, spruce and black locust planted 6 to 10 years

ago. Many teachers agreed that seeing these practices actually in effect on the land was most convincing, Murodock said.

One hundred and fifty of the 160 rural teachers attended these tours and meetings which were conducted with the assistance of the staff members of the local U. S. Department of Agriculture, Soil Conservation Service office who have been working on acid and moisture conservation in Berrien county for the past nine years.

The climax of the soil conservation program for rural teachers was a meeting at Lansing on Oct. 13 and 14. This meeting was for the purpose of writing a conservation bulletin for elementary schools.

Attending the meeting were county school commissioners Edward Murodock, Berrien county, George Elkey, Ottawa, Mrs. Beryl Abbott, Benzie; Mrs. Gertrude Eastman, Mason, Lyle Torrant, Jackson, and Clarence Clark, of Wexford. Attending from the state department of education was Dr. Eugene Elliott, superintendent of public instruction.

Michigan State College was represented by L. R. Schoenman, Conservation Institute.

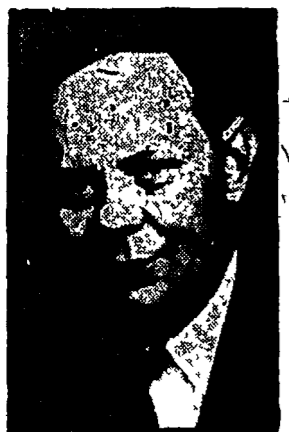
