Sinn said the current ordinance probably is enforceable and in fact was a good ordinance when adopted in 1970, but it needs updating because of changes in the township and in court interpretations of other zoning ordinances.

The "Zoning Districts and Map" section also needs revision, according to Sinn. He thinks the existing districts are too vague and should be redefined and clarified, and additional districts added.

Similar problems exist with the current industrial districts, according to Sinn. They are inadequate to accommodate orderly, harmonious and safe industrial development.

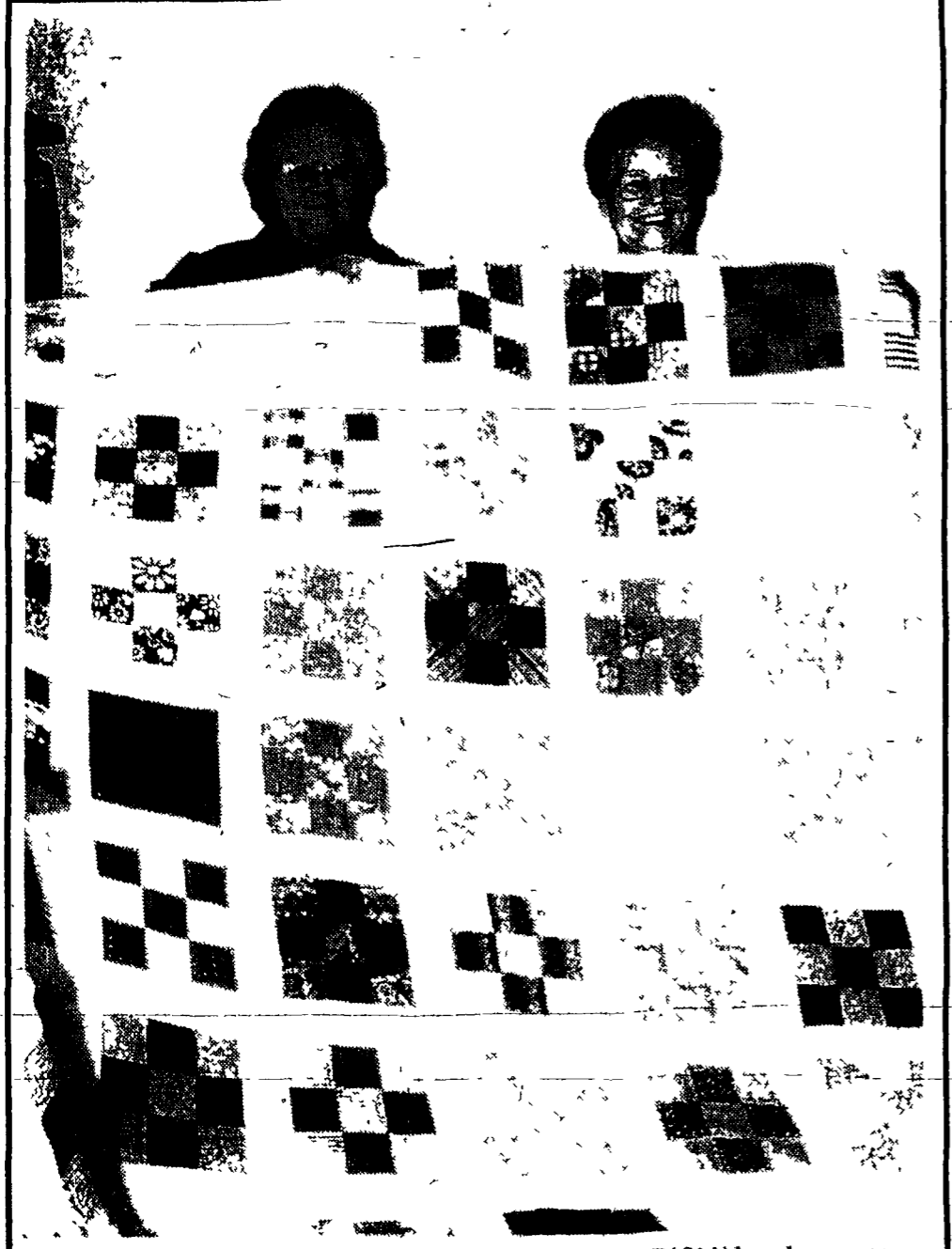

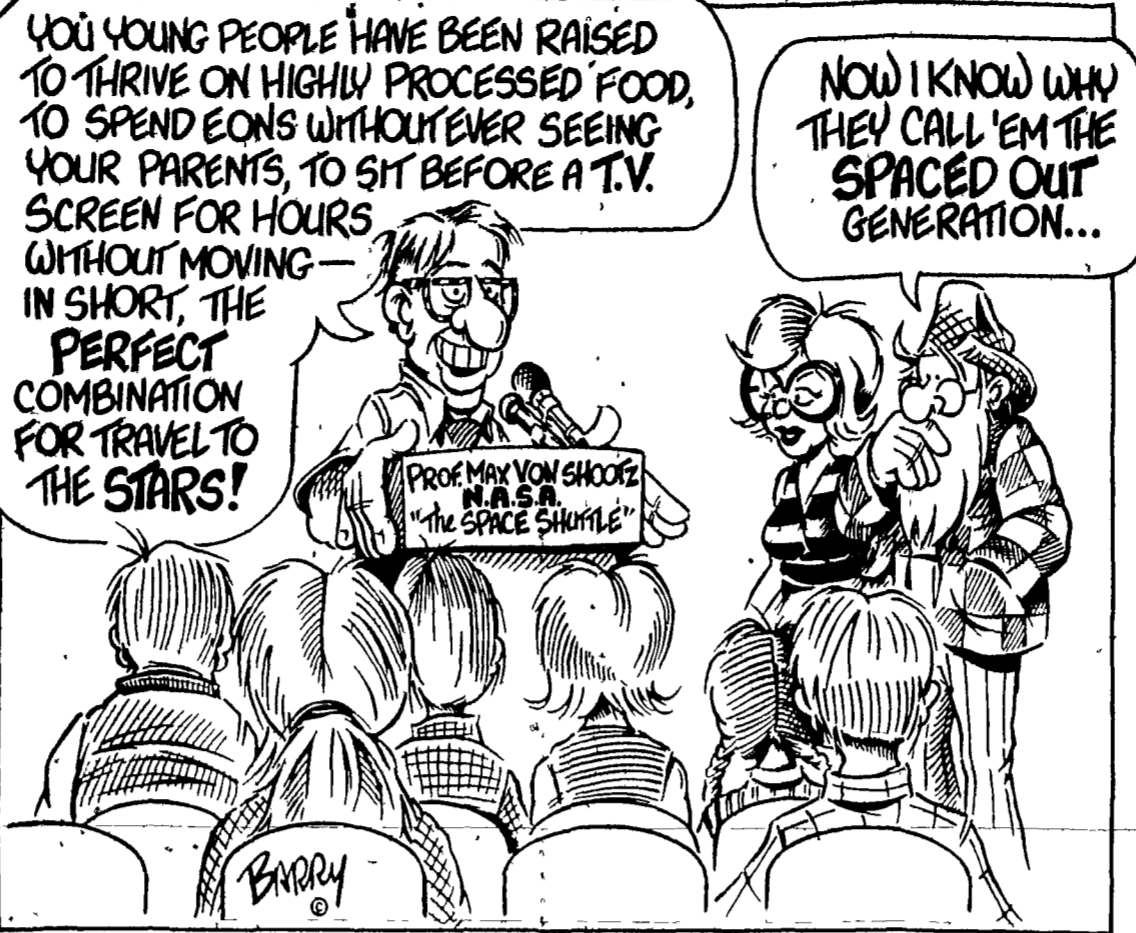

Reflexions by Bobbie

Whenever I take a walk through our Oak Ridge Cemetery I am impressed by the dates on some of the markers. Those lying close to the ground are becoming more and more difficult to read, being either covered with moss or badly eroded from time and weather. I've been pushing back the moss that wants to cover my great-grandparents' stones, but one of these days I'm afraid the names will no longer be recognizable. As it is, the dates are hardly visible.

My great-grandmother Lydia as well as her father Nathan Harding are buried here. He died in 1881, and was somehow an ancestor of our one-time President Warren G. Harding. I heard this at a young age, but I was told in somewhat hushed tones by my mother not to broadcast the fact. This, of course, confused me, but in later years I came to the realization through my readings that President Harding's personal and political lives "left something to be desired," shall we say. Recently I began to pursue the family lineage, but cannot locate any information which would indicate relationship, so I must assume it is very indirect. And what terrible things did Warren Harding do? Well, for one thing he married an older woman—and that was in the year 1891. Also, she was a divorcee. As if those two "no-nos" weren't enough, his administration suffered a few financial and political scandals.

Since Mr. Harding's presidency, the public has come to learn more about the private and public lives of our chief executives, and few are flawless. In my genealogical pursuits I became interested in the wives of our presidents and I began looking for material that could tell me more about these "first ladies" of the land. I'll be sharing this with you in the next few columns.

In recent years we've all seen the wives of the presidents become increasingly important not only in the social but the political life of the capital city. History books have glorified some and criticized others who have lived in the White House. The very first lady, Martha Washington, never lived in the White House but no doubt she entertained in her home in Mount Vernon.

So we can begin with Abigail Adams, wife of John, who from all historical reports had a stiff ceremonious style of greeting visitors. It was somewhat like the royal British way of holding court. This should not surprise us, for after all there had been no precedent for entertaining in the White House and it was only natural for a shy woman to follow the customary social ways of her fatherland, England.

But entertaining in the White House began in earnest when Thomas Jefferson became elected. A widower, he lived alone, but he expressed his wish to make the White House a place of gaiety. And so the wife of his secretary of state assumed the duties of official hostess. Dolley Madison was not only attractive, well-groomed and gregarious, but also had a talent for creating unusual and very tasty dishes. She was popular, had no children, and therefore had the time to plan parties.

For the next eight years Dolley was the center of attraction in the White House. She began a round of parties, frequently bringing out the cream of society. Adept at small talk and at helping put everyone at ease, she was extravagantly admired and praised. She was indeed the first "hostess with the mostest," and apparently did not hesitate to use the social scene to further the interests of the president.

Legend has it that she inadvertently created the first ice cream. It seems that she had left a dish of cream cooling outside the house too long, and when she realized it was almost frozen she got the idea of sweetening it and serving it as a dessert. (More on the first ladies next week. ...)

Off the Record

There are periods of time when serving on a local government body doesn't really mean much. Decisions made aren't very earth-shattering, and the effort involved isn't very great. This is not one of those time periods.

All three of Buchanan's major local government bodies (City Commission, Township Board and School Board) have recently made and will continue to make important decisions that will impact the future of the districts they serve.

The times are tough and the leadership we have will determine our ability to make it through.

Perhaps never before has it been so important that we have good public officials — not mediocre, but good. Mediocre won't do.

Recently, the township board replaced one of its members. Paul Spaulding resigned for personal reasons and the group was left with a vacancy.

Choosing his replacement could have been a problem. Three different candidates had strong support among the four remaining board members, the appointment process appeared to be headed in a vicious political cycle.

Board members escaped the problem, however, by selecting Dave Reitz as a compromise candidate. Reitz' ability to govern effectively is yet to be seen (he has been a member of the board for less than a month), but there is no reason to doubt it.

He and the board will face some tough decisions in the not-too-distant future.

In the city, the subject of appointments is especially important. Commissioner Robert Hoven has announced his

resignation, and the commission must replace him within 30 days of the acceptance of that resignation.

Hoven has been a member of the commission for about two years and has been involved in some major decisions. His replacement will probably face even more.

The five-member commission may have to replace another member in the near future. Tom Jacobs has announced his candidacy for the 11th District County Commission seat vacated by Richard Proud. It's impossible to predict a winner in that race, but Jacobs received more write-in votes for the position than any other candidate in last November's general election.

Should his bid prove successful, the commission would have to appoint its second new member this year, and that is significant.

The current commission has shown much courage in recent months by looking head-on into the city's future and making tough decisions that are in the best interest of the city.

The commission can be described as daring, but two new members screen candidates carefully and appoint a person (or persons) that will show equal courage and leadership in deciding Buchanan's future. It would be unfortunate to see the recent trends on the commission reversed by new members with less foresight.

The commission should set high standards when choosing Bob Hoven's replacement (and any future replacements). The city deserves it.

House Report

Before leaving office, Governor William G. Milliken signed into law legislation that enables local school districts, or intermediate school districts, to collect one-half or all of their property taxes in the summer, from July 1 to Sept. 14, without penalty or interest.

School taxes are normally collected in the winter. Cities and townships send bills on December 1 and collect taxes until mid-February without penalty. Some Michigan school districts already participate in summer property tax collections under existing law which enables a city or township to make such collections if requested by the school systems. The bill signed into law last month gives school systems an alternative if the city or township government refuses to grant the summer collection request.

If such a case the school district would have until April 1 to negotiate with the county treasurer to make the collection. If no agreement is reached by April 1, the school district may then proceed with the collection of the taxes on its own if it desires.

The school district must notify the city or township by April 15 of its decision to collect the taxes itself. The city or township then has 15 days to decide whether to reconsider its previous refusal and agree to do the billing and collecting.

However, if the city or township still refuses to participate in the summer collection, the school district

three years was not less than their household income. In other words, summer tax collection would not apply to these persons, since Feb. 15 is the deadline for winter tax payments under the present system.

The intent of this law is to provide school systems with

operating capital when the school year begins in the fall, and to avoid the necessity of short term borrowing by school systems for start-up costs. When the current school year began last fall, interest paid by Michigan schools for short term borrowing to cover early expenses amounted to \$80 million.

Straight Talk

Over the past few years, many people have insulated their homes, installed set-back thermostats and automatic damper closers, covered their windows, all in an effort to cut their fuel consumption. They find that they are using much less fuel to heat their homes this winter, but their utility and heating fuel bills are up 10-20 percent. Our fuel reserves are higher than ever, we have an oil-gas-coal glut from coast-to-coast, and inflation is way down. In a free enterprise system, when supply is up and there is a glut, the cost should go down, not up, but that isn't happening with energy. Rates are up 20-40 percent in more parts of the country.

Under our free enterprise system, the consumer is king-queen, makes demands for what is needed and business attempts to satisfy those needs. When consumers make excessive demands and there is a shortage of what is wanted, the price rises, the profit increases, and there is an incentive to more businesses to jump in along with increased production by existing suppliers, to help satisfy the demand. Once the supply increases, prices should come down.

If you have doubts about the system, take a look at new products and observe, even with inflation, what happens to prices. My current wrist watch is superior to the multi-hundred dollar digital watch I bought in the 1960's, and it cost 10-20 percent of that original watch price in today's inflated dollars. My younger daughter's new calculator does more than the one I bought in 1966, and sells for about one-fourth the price. My new personal home computer was selling for five to six times its present price just one year ago.

Why, then, with the glut in fuel for energy, isn't the free market reducing costs?

Since no one denies that there is a glut in fuel and that reserves are growing, or that inflation is way down, and that the fuel industries have been living "high off the hog" with excessive profits designed to encourage development, growth and a glut to reduce prices, why do prices keep going up? Since no one denies that we encourage conservation to cut demand for energy, increase available supply and reduce cost, why do prices keep going up?

Why are Americans facing higher fuel bills when they are using less and the gas oil-coal surplus keeps rising? In most businesses there would be sales at reduced prices. Yet here some of our biggest advocates of freedom and decentral are not letting the free market system work. That is hurting all Americans.

The truth, simply stated, is that our natural gas industry is interestingly organized. Sometimes we find the public utility which sells energy to the customers has rates based on the ability to pass through whatever costs it incurs in buying from pipeline companies, so there is no incentive to buy at a low price. Sometimes the public utility which sells the energy to the customers also owns or is involved with the pipeline company that keeps increasing prices, and it may even be associated with the company that develops and operates the wells.

To get around possible claims of interference with the market, some utilities have separated themselves from their pipeline and development entities, who were financed and grew with utility profits. The separation eliminates the profits the utility made from its pipeline and oil-gas properties.

In some cases, the utility may not be involved with a sister company, but may have entered into stupid contracts at excessive prices, based on its ability to pass through to you and to me this higher cost. Those contracts are not in the public interest and like contracts by the mob "to kill" should not be enforced.

You have to know that there is something wrong when you see market forces of excess supply and reduced demand, while prices go up at the expense of consumers. Instead of talking about it, our state and federal agencies that look at our utility monopolies should jump in and do a little shaking up. The fuel industry people ought to restudy how our free enterprise system is supposed to work. It would appear that some of the fuel-energy industry people are understudying J. R. Ewing and his crew of selfish and self-centered "pigs" from that "Dallas" TV show.

When are the leaders in the fuel-energy industry going to wake up to the fact that Americans will not tolerate getting kicked around, mugged and having their pockets picked. They never learn! They shouldn't wonder about the reaction which is coming.

TALES of an OLD TOWN

An attempt to reproduce a cross section of the American scene as witnessed here through the past century

(Editor's Note: This is the 35th installment of a series written by former editor Walter C. Hawes. It began in the April 20, 1929 edition of the Berrien County Record and ran for approximately 5 years.)

CHAPTER 35

Drifting Down the St. Joe River in the Good Old Summer Time

Among the unpowered craft designed for floating excursions down the St. Joseph was the "Rudder Grange" which Fred Gawthrop built for Jack Miller, superintendent of the Hatch Cutlery company.

Gawthrop was in actual charge of the boat and managed it commercially on the river for several summers, taking parties to Berrien Springs or to St. Joseph according to order. Mr. Miller must have been a man with a literary turn for his boat was named after the houseboat of Frank R. Stockton's classic tale, "Rudder Grange."

The boat was larger than the Buchanan Fishing Club's craft being 6 feet wide and 24 feet long with sleeping accommodations available aboard if desired. It had a canopy top with ends screened in, and mosquito bar on the sides. The

boat had 12-inch sides and a draught of from 6 to 8 inches in the water. Each end was decked over. On one end was a boxed in oil stove for cooking. In the middle of the boat was a table with a seating capacity of ten, swung from the top. When not in use it was raised to the ceiling and the chairs were folded and piled on top of it.

Sometimes the boat was hired by several married couples for drifting trips to St. Joseph. Gawthrop could furnish separate sleeping accommodations for three couples by curtaining off bedrooms in the middle. The bottom of the boat would be filled with straw secured from some stack near the river, and blankets placed on top of it. Sometimes these drifting trips took a whole week. Gawthrop had a section of T-rail for an anchor. The rail had a hole drilled in it with a ring in it, and several feet of chain on it, with added rope. When desired he would drag the anchor while the excursionist fished in favorite spots or bathed or paddled about on the shallow riffles. If he wanted to stop the craft entirely all he had to do was to let out more rope and let the anchor to the bottom. At each end was a twelve-foot pole fixed in a socket for steering, which was done by pushing against the bottoms or sides of the stream.

Gawthrop furnished transportation only, the excursionists furnishing their eats. Often George Boyer went along to cook. Gawthrop would rustle the food, hitching the craft to the bank and visiting the neighboring farms to buy fresh milk, eggs, chickens or anything else available. There was an ice box on the boat and ice was bought from farmers who usually had well-stocked ice houses. A favorite place for replenishing the larder was the old Dunbar farm, where Earl Frank and Clarence Dunbar lived as boys, on the present Bear Cave grounds. Exclusive of eats the charge for transportation to Berrien Springs and return was \$1.50, to St. Joseph and return \$3. On the Berrien Springs trip Gawthrop used to hire Newt Batchelor's carryalls to meet the boat at the lower end to bring the passengers back to Buchanan. John Wynn would also be there with his logging trucks to haul back the "Rudder Grange." Wynn also hauled the craft back from St. Joseph, the regular charge being \$6. Several times the craft was towed back to Berrien Springs from St. Joseph by the May Graham.

Some summers Gawthrop was steadily occupied all summer hauling these excursion parties. It was very common for several couples to hire the boat for cruises lasting from a weekend to a full week. When Gawthrop finally gave up the business the craft was sold to a group of local people who continued to use it for their own private excursions for several seasons.

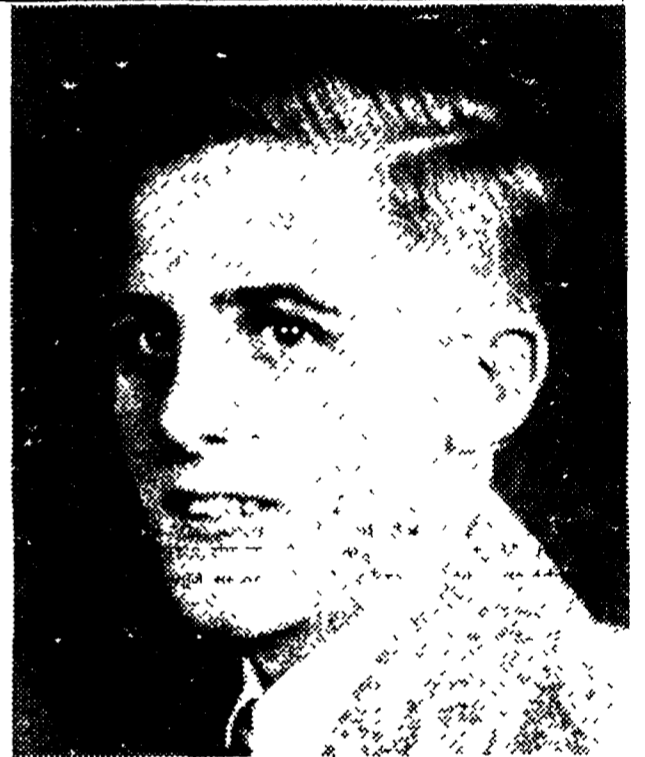

Bucks meet more adversity

There are many quotes about what adversity makes a team into, and all of them are good things. If these quotes are accurate then the 1982-83 Buchanan Bucks will be the best team in the state by season's end.

That may not be true, but the Bucks are a much better team than their 2-8 record suggests. They definitely played exciting basketball last Friday, as they lost their sixth game by less than 10 points, this one to Brandywine, 57-55 in overtime.

The game seemed as each team held the lead several times. Each team had 48 points from the field and the game was won at the free throw line with Brandywine making 9 out of 16 compared to Buchanan's 7 out of 17.

The game began with Dan Ditto hitting a 15-foot jump shot to give Brandywine its first lead. But after Brandywine's

early lead, the first quarter belonged to Buchanan, as at one point the Bucks reeled off seven unanswered points to take a 16-9 lead as the quarter ended.

The second quarter became one of surges, as Brandywine employed a press to pull to 16-15 until Matt Remmo hit the front end of a 1-1 two minutes into the period. For the rest of the period the scoring moved more slowly as Brett Cole gave Brandywine a 21-19 lead at 3:13. This score stood until Rick Matthews hit Tim Crouch on the back door to tie it up at 21 at 1:58. The lead then changed hands twice, until Carl Harris stole the ball for a lay-up and was fouled for a three-point play, giving Brandywine a 28-24 halftime lead.

The third quarter saw Cecil Walker and Eric White go to work giving Buchanan a 41-40 lead to start the final period. During the final period

neither team was able to clinch a victory as Buchanan's rebounding kept Brandywine from second chances, and Buchanan's inability to hit free throws kept it from securing the victory. With Buchanan leading 53-51 with 9 seconds to go, Brandywine took the ball the length of the court, put up a shot, and got the rebound to tie the score at the buzzer.

The overtime became a period of turnovers for both sides. Buchanan scored first

midway through the period, as C L Warren hit from inside. These were Buchanan's last points, as Martindale tied it up and Carl Harris hit a jump shot at eight seconds to give Brandywine the 57-55 victory.

C L Warren lead all scorers with 20 points. Eric White lead all rebounders with 12. Buchanan shot 48 percent from the field compared to Brandywine's 42 percent.

Poor concentration hurts Buchanan

Mental mistakes once again took their toll on the Buchanan Bucks varsity basketball team last Tuesday. The Bucks committed 22 turnovers and 17 personal fouls, and the Berrien Springs Shamrocks took advantage of the errors.

The fouls were especially harmful to Buchanan. Berrien players shot 74 percent from the free throw line in their 42-39 victory over the Bucks. The one-pointers, in fact, iced the game in the fourth quarter for the Shamrocks, who shot 8 for 8 from the charity stripe in the final stanza.

Berrien Springs' 14 free-throw points made up an even one-third of its final score.

Buchanan Coach Steve Bender blamed his team's lack of concentration on the floor for its mistakes.

"Our attention span is limited," Bender said. The coach said the type of offense his team is using requires constant movement from the players. Too many times, though, a player would lose his concentration and stand still, the coach said. And that usually caused the play to be unsuccessful.

The Buck offense wasn't a total failure during the game. In fact, Buchanan began the game executing the game plan perfectly. In the first period, the Bucks found men open near the basket several times and scored on easy layups.

The Bucks also had an excellent defensive first quarter. The Shamrocks were unable to get the ball inside to their big men, and their outside shots failed more than they succeeded on the game. Berrien Springs shot only 31 percent from the field.

The Bucks did a superb job of containing the Shamrocks'

leading scorer Steve Stover. The 6-foot-2-inch senior forward was averaging 18 points a game going into the contest but managed to score only three points against the Bucks. And all of those points came from the free throw line.

Stover's presence on the court was limited because of three quick fouls in the first quarter.

Buchanan scored the game's first seven points and had a 10-2 lead at one point. The Bucks ended the period with a five-point lead.

But the Shamrocks fought back in the second period, taking advantage of Buchanan's seven turnovers. When the quarter was over, the score was tied at 22.

Offensively, the third quarter was poor for both teams. Berrien shot 4-15 from the field and the Bucks shot 3-8. At the charity stripe, Buchanan missed three out of four. The Shamrocks took a one-point lead into the final period.

The teams' defenses controlled the first half of the fourth quarter. No points were scored during the first three-and-a-half minutes of the period. Buchanan was the first to score, and the Bucks twice had three-point leads.

But the Shamrocks responded with eight straight points, turning a three-point Buchanan lead into a five-point Berrien lead with less than a minute to go. Berrien Springs shooters managed only two field goals in the quarter, but that was all they needed to complement their perfect free-throwing shooting.

Bill Koch led the Shamrocks with 16 points, Troy Wright followed with 12 points and 11 rebounds. Tim Crouch's 11 points led the Bucks. Cecil Walker had 10.

LMC grants still available

A further grant of \$300 has been awarded to Lake Michigan College in addition to its earlier grant in October of \$3,727 with which to provide free tuition for vocational courses for men and women in selected population categories, according to Sylvia Coleman, LMC financial aid officer.

Of the \$4,027 total award, only about \$1,500 has been expended to date which means that funds still are available to pay for 109 credit-hours of college work at the in-district tuition rate of \$23 per credit hour, Coleman indicated.

Thus, funds are available for seven to nine full-time college students or an even greater number of part-time students, Coleman said. She indicated that the funds are available for college vocational classes this spring semester,

summer, and fall semester, 1983.

The grants were awarded to the college by the Michigan Department of Education in compliance with the federal education tuition reimbursement program for special populations.

The free vocational training is for four classes of people, Coleman indicated. They are displaced homemakers, part-time homemakers or wage earners, single heads of households, and persons seeking training for work not normally considered traditional for his or her sex.

According to Coleman, further and more detailed information about the vocational courses and the program requirements can be obtained from the LMC financial aid office by telephoning 927-3871, Ext. 213.

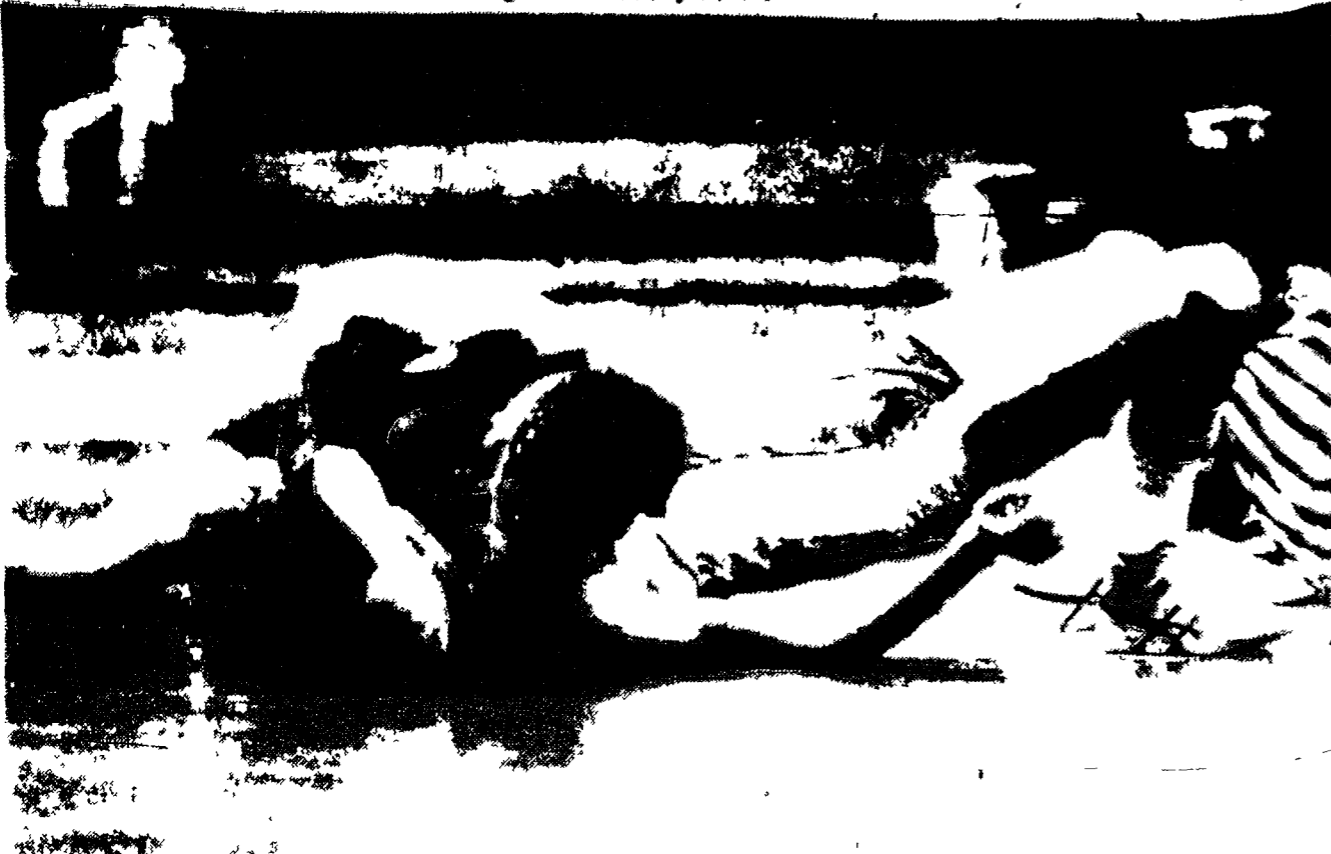

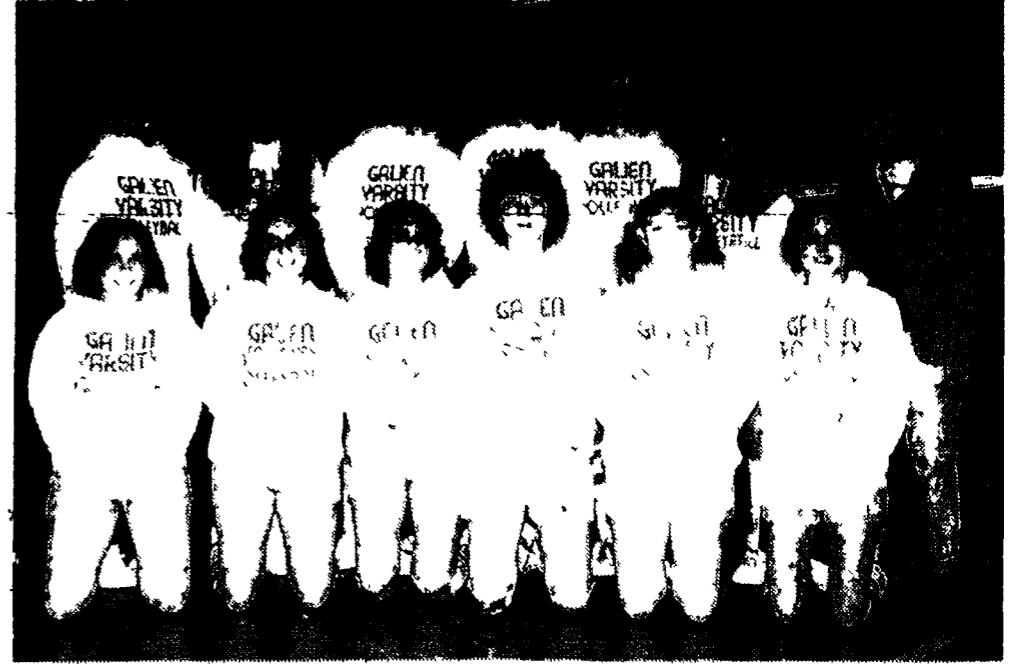


Wrestlers defeat Berrien

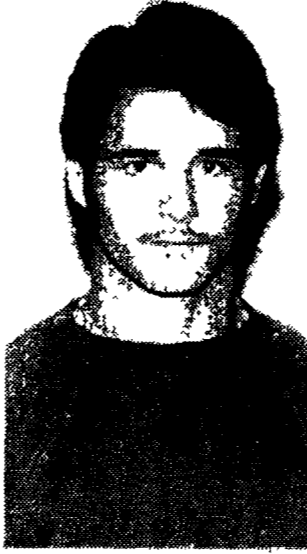

God has a plan

The text for Pastor Robert Hess' message this week was Isaiah 6:1-8. The title of the message was "Yes or No"

Pastor Hess began his message by stating that when God places a person on this earth, God has a purpose for that person to fulfill. He noted that this was evident in God's message to Jeremiah (Jer 1:4-5) God told Jeremiah that even before Jeremiah was formed in his mother's womb, God had a job for him.

When Isaiah was approached by God with God's assignment for him, Isaiah realized that he was not prepared for the assignment. Therefore, he made the statement found in Isa 6:5 When Isaiah acknowledged his shortcomings, God took care of the problem and Isaiah accepted his assignment.

How many of us today have an assignment that we will not do because we feel that we are not well enough qualified to undertake it. How many feel unclean, and fail to carry out their God-given

responsibilities because of this. If we acknowledge our shortcomings to God, and turn from these things and turn to God, he will forgive us and prepare us for the work as he did Isaiah.

Pastor Hess noted that if Isaiah had refused to do as God wanted him to do, we would be missing a very important book in our Bible. Note the message about the birth of Jesus Christ which is found in his writings, (Isa 7:13-14; 9:6-7) and his coming reign upon earth. Note the messages of comfort and assurance as is found in Isa 26:3-4. What happens when we trust in man rather than God and make alliances with man and forget the promises and restrictions of God is found in Isa 30:1-3.

The message of God's love and Christ's sacrifice is found in Isaiah 53. This is probably the most often used reference in the Old Testament when showing what Jesus did for mankind.

Isaiah 64:6 tells us why we can never obtain salvation by good works. According to God,

our best is no better than filthy rags in the sight of God. That is why Jesus had to die. Only his righteousness could purchase salvation for mankind.

The final example was Isaiah 1:16-20. Here God calls to a backslidden nation. He calls them to repentance. What a message to Christians who have slipped away from their daily walk with God.

If Isaiah had said "NO" when God gave him his assignment, look what we would have missed. Is God calling you to service? Are you saying yes or no? What blessing is someone going to miss because of your answer?

The First Missionary Baptist Church is located at 925 Chippewa. Sunday school is at 10 a.m. followed by worship service at 11. BTC and Youth meetings are at 6 p.m. and worship service at 7 p.m. Wednesday service is 7 p.m.

Last week Rev. Hezekiah Davis, the former pastor of the church, preached the messages that God laid on his heart. The messages were very uplifting and challenging to all.

'The Best is Yet to Come'

illness, natural tragedies, accidents, etc will trust and believe in God and do what they should do, it will get better. The eighties are going to be the years of the Church, continued Rev. Pierce. "People are starting to come back to church. People ask if things will get better for them. Rev. Pierce concluded by saying that God works good in all things if we trust him — Good will come because God has promised that it will. B. G. 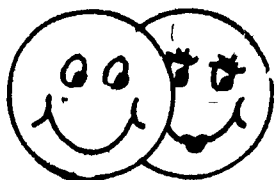

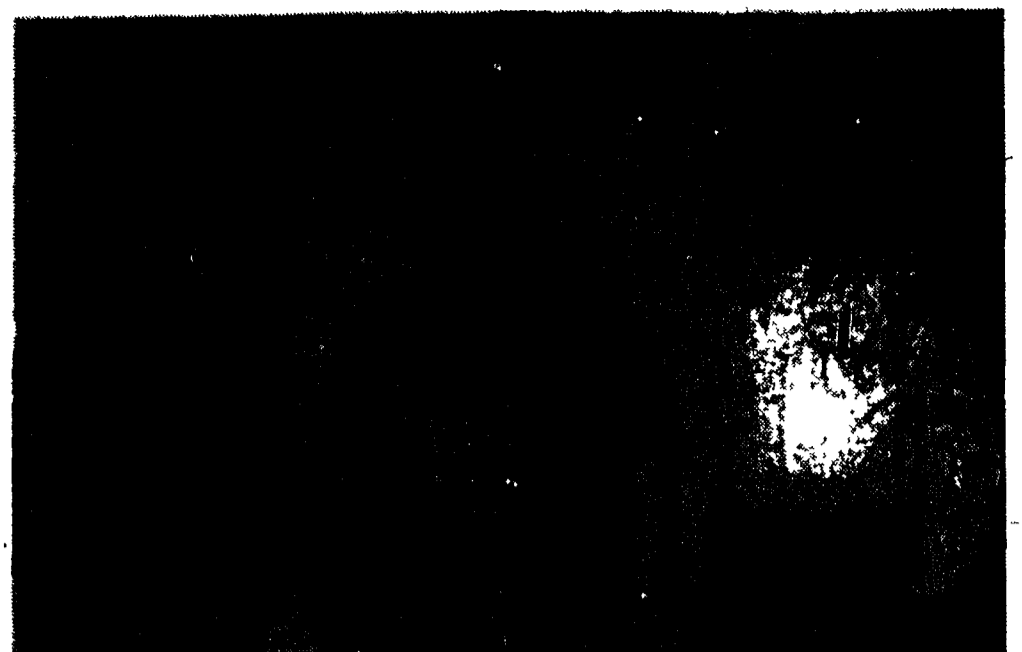

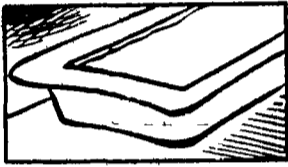

Horsin' 'Round

Seems like January and February is the time for clinics, seminars and work shops on showing, training and judging. The new year has barely gotten under way and already I have attended two very excellent clinics!
At Kettunen Center at Tustin the sessions, included a most interesting section on Draft horses. This area of breeding is enjoying a resurgence of popularity.
Clydesdales, Belgians and Percherons are the most popular of the Draft breeding. It wouldn't surprise me to see an occasional horse show with a Draft class or two.
A side note from that session was about the lovely Busch Commercial that has the Clydesdale horse running along the edge of the beach. How that is accomplished is interesting. The Clydesdale, Baron by name, is hauled with a mare in season to the filming location. Baron is taken out of the trailer and the mare is taken to the

end of the filming shot. Naturally when released, Baron runs eagerly to his friend. I watch that commercial with more interest than ever now!
Terry Thompson did a nice, but too brief Reining Horse Clinic at Michigan State University last Saturday. His emphasis was on starting the reining horse, performance horse or even gaming horse out on the right foot. By this he stressed all the proper ground work and time. Horses that are going to work well in any of the above areas, need to have tremendous understanding of what is expected of them and a calm collected attitude.
His advice to teach response to the rein and leg pressure and leg cues should be heeded by any rider. Help your horse do all that he can by working with him to two track, give to subtle cues and work with a balanced rider. A rider who throws himself all over the horse trying to get a change in leads is just showing the world that

the proper ground level training hasn't been accomplished.
My only regret with Terry's clinic was that he didn't do more with reining patterns and scoring reining rides. A fairly

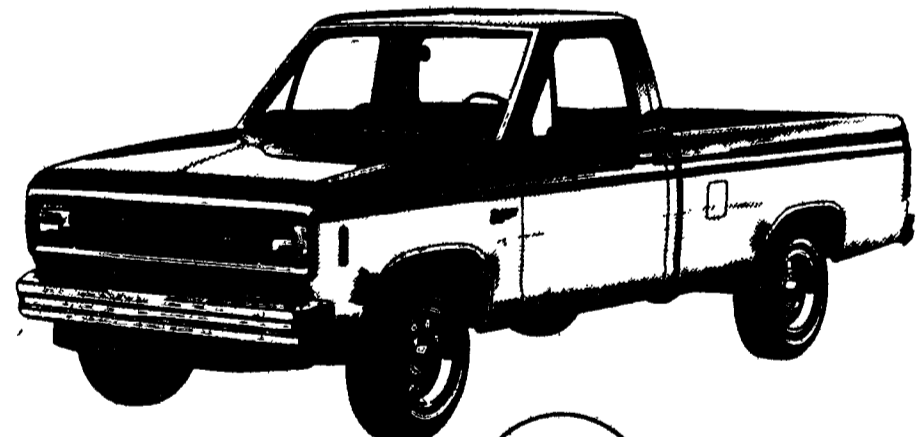
