The election of a Mayor pro tem was taken up. Commissioner Smith nominated Commissioner Deming, but failed to receive a support.

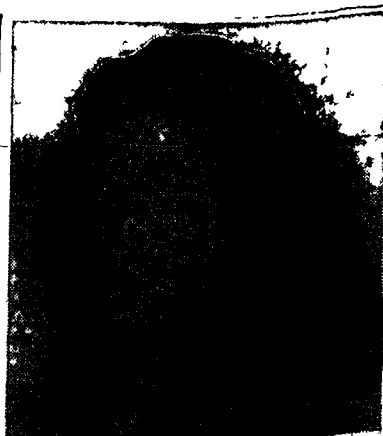
It was moved by Commissioner Hagley, seconded by Commissioner Deming, that Commissioner Smith succeed himself as Mayor pro tem for the ensuing year.

Commission Sets Apr. 19-23 Clean-Up Week

Next week, April 19, through April 23, will be City Clean-Up Week, according to the decision of the City Commission at the Monday evening meeting.

During the five days of the Clean-Up, Monday through Friday, the city trucks will rove the entire city, picking up all rubbish, leaves and trimmings which are set at the curb. During Clean-Up week the department will pick up grass and leaves piled on the tree-lawns without containers. During regular weekly collection they are not picked up unless in containers. General rules will be eased up for the "Clean-Up" period. However, trees and shrub trimmings and brush must be tied in compact bundles. Leaf and dead grass rakings must be piled on the tree-lawn at the edge of the curb AND NOT RAKED INTO THE GUTTERS.

Cities and towns in general are dating their Clean-Up weeks ahead in anticipation of heavy traffic through this section during the blossom period, and especially for the Blossom Festival Parade.

However, there is a much more important purpose—that of taking advantage of the co-operation of the city in ridding your premises, both house and lot area, of accumulated rubbish that adds to the peril of fire, and tends to lower the neatness of your community.

City To Refund 25% Main Assessment

Owners of lot frontages on East Front street east of the Liberty street entrance will receive refunds of approximately 25 per cent of the special assessments for installment of a water main recently completed.

The line is a six-inch main extending east from Liberty to the city limits, servicing Poorman's Recreation, the Wisner Motor Sales, Inc., and the root beer drive-in of Harold Smoke, and eventually the developers of the new vacant lots.

The refund was made possible when construction costs ran 25% below estimate, due to the fact that the City Department of Public Works installed it under very favorable circumstances.

The refunds will be paid on a pro rata basis to owners of record as of April 15, 1954.

The department was called again about 1 p. m. to the home of Denny Baber on the Madron Lake Road six miles northwest of Buchanan. An oil heating stove had exploded. Damage resulting was the destruction of the stove, a hole burned in the floor beneath it, several pieces of living room furniture damaged and smoke damage in the living room and adjoining rooms.

Night Riders Of The Aerial Waves Entertain Lions

Larry LaKashman, Leading Ham Operator of Area Explains Ham Wizardry

"CQ—calling CQ, W8RAE Portable calling CQ, over!" Buchanan Lions listened intently as Larry LaKashman, the outstanding radio amateur in this area, contacted W8UFM, portable automobile transmitter operated by Lion Al Kahn.

The men of Electro-Voice staged an outstanding amateur radio demonstration for the Buchanan Lions club Thursday evening, April 8, at the American Legion building.

The program was under the direction of Leon Al Kahn, president of Electro-Voice, including an informative talk by Larry LaKashman, vice president of the firm, also a member of the progressive team.

Larry, better known in radio circles as W8IOP and the holder of many ham radio awards, told of the rapid progress of amateur radio and of its rapidly-developing uses outside of entertainment for the operators. The amateurs maintain radio networks for emergency civil defense service. The hams have demonstrated their value in affording emergency outlets in disaster areas where all other means of communications have broken down.

All this work has been done entirely free of charge. The hams have contributed in a great degree to the technical advancement of the radio industry, such as screening of transmitters to reduce interference with TV. They have inaugurated an extensive use of ultra-wave frequencies. The ham operators, riding their hobbies hard in their home installations, are without question one of the most public-spirited research groups in the world.

On hand for the evening's entertainment were 60 Lions and their guests, including W8PDC (Fred Riley of Niles), Tom Strandhan of Pittsburgh, Pa., and Caryl Herman of Buchanan.

Law Catches Up With Principals Riley Break-In

Former Employee Rileys One Of Two Charged In Robbery

A chain of circumstances soon caught up with Rex Kenton and Samuel Baker, who admitted breaking into Riley's News Depot at 5:30 a. m. Sunday, after questioning by Chief Jack Kuehl in the South Bend jail. The links in the chain were a damaged rear right fender skirt, the police radio and an observing South Bend patrolman.

The operations of Kenton and Baker began about 5 a. m. Sunday when Kenton broke into Harry's Inn at 100 River street, Niles, operated by Harry Wisner. Wisner, knocking him down then ters under his tavern. He heard the sound of breaking glass and footsteps above and ran outdoors, armed with a piece of pipe. He saw Kenton climbing out a side window with a case of beer. Wisner rushed up and took a swing at him with the pipe. Kenton parried the blow with his arm and hung the case of beer at Wisner, knocking him down. Then he ran for the car in which Baker was waiting near by. As the car started off Wisner threw the pipe, damaging the skirt of a fender.

Apparently Kenton and Baker drove to Buchanan, parking on North Portage. Baker remained in the car and Kenton went to the rear entrance of Riley's off Oak street. Kenton had worked at Riley's about six years ago. He put a glove on his right hand and crashed a pane of glass adjacent to the lock of the rear door, turned off the lock and entered. He took a small change tray from a cash register containing about \$12 in change and a check for \$10, picked up four cartons of cigarettes and headed back to the car.

Then they started east again on the Niles-Buchanan road, turning south at Mayflower Road. They reached their quarters in the Marquette Hotel at 413 South See LAW Page 5

Niles Men Talk On United Fund, Economic Study

All business men and women of Buchanan, and others interested, whether members of the Buchanan Business Association or not, are cordially invited to attend a dinner and program of very special interest under B. B. A. auspices at the American Legion home this Thursday evening, April 15.

Dinner will be served by the ladies of the American Legion Auxiliary, which is a guarantee of a good feed. The after-dinner program will be as follows, although not necessarily in the sequence given here.

Talk by William Botts, secretary of the Niles Chamber of Commerce, on the operation of the "one-drive" United Fund plan for union of all canvasses in one master canvass, to which citizens may contribute for a year by cash payment, pledges or by withholdings from their salaries of wages on a year-around basis. This plan was first used at Niles last year after the Community Chest operation had stalled far short of quotas.

Talk by Davis S. Miller of Niles, chairman of the Economic Development Committee, recently organized in Niles for a thorough study of the economic resources and skills of the community. The Niles organization was initiated by the Niles Chamber of Commerce in 1952 when executives of that body decided that needed factual information on aspects of economic life in Niles had never been compiled and made accessible for reference at any one place. With the aid and advice of the Continuing Education Department of the Michigan State College, the movement finally developed into the organization of an inter-city group for such study, comprising representatives from Niles, Benton Harbor, Ypsilanti, Grand Haven, Midland, Jackson, Saginaw and Cadillac. What finally resulted will be told by Mr. Miller at this evening's dinner meeting.

Following the talks by the Niles guest speaker, there will be a series of short reports by leaders of industry, business, the city, schools and by Robert Koengshof, of Buchanan Co-ops, Inc.

City Operates Within Budget

Manager Omans reported all city departments operating well within their budgets for the first three quarters of the 1953-54 year.

In the detail of snow removal costs have exceeded the allotment of \$4,000, running up to over \$4,800. This resulted from a larger-than-average snowfall for the past winter. However, substantial savings are anticipated in other work of the D. P. W. and it is believed that it too will be well within the limits set.

The financial position of the city has benefited from a lower than average cost in fire-fighting to date.

City Exploring More Room For Off-St. Parking

The city commission authorized City Manager Omans to check the feasibility of an eastern extension of the city parking area across McCoy's creek, with a view to effecting another entrance and exit from North Portage.

Manager Omans and Atty. Desenberg had contacted the present owner of the area, who said that he would be interested in a bridge-culvert over the creek north of the Red Bud Inn, providing an entrance to parking in the rear and that the price he would ask for the area would be influenced somewhat by the city's plans for covering the creek.

If the city purchases the property it will consider straightening the hair-pin curve of McCoy's creek between Front and North Portage streets. Manager Omans stated that considerations so far favor a culvert starting 90 feet north of Front street thence east to North Portage, approximately 220 feet. Manager Omans roughly estimated the cost of such culvert at \$8,020.00. He stated that the cost would remain about the same whether a pipe arch or a wall arch was used. The above estimate does not include the cost of filling the lot to grade, or other area improvements.

Purchase of the property and installation of the culvert has been under consideration for some time, as one way of affording more off-street parking.

Frank Hickok Is Superintendent Cemetery, Parks

The appointment of Frank Hickok to the post of Cemetery and Parks Superintendent was confirmed at the Monday meeting of the city commission.

Hickok begins his work at once but will work with Supt. A. E. Clark until June 30, after which he will take full charge. In addition to supervision of cemetery work Hickok will also have full responsibility for the maintenance of all city parks, tree lawns and parkways.

Maude Slate Complimented By City Board For Work

Recreation Board Endorses Operation Youth Council

Miss Maude Slate, supervisor of the activities of the Buchanan Youth Council since it was first provided with an equipped field house on New Years Eve, 1942, received a warm letter of commendation from the Buchanan Recreation Board 10 days ago.

The letter follows:
"Dear Miss Slate, Your interesting and informative report on the Youth Council activities was read at the April meeting of the Buchanan City Recreation Board in its entirety.

"The board, by official action, wishes to commend you on the manner in which the Youth Council is conducted and for the wide scope of activities which are made possible through your own personal endeavor.

"The large following at the Youth Council, as revealed in your report, is fitting proof on the intense interest and personal loyalty that goes into the operation of a most successful, well-rounded Youth program, such as we are fortunate to have in Buchanan."

In her report Miss Slate furnished the following information on the operation of the Youth Council and its activities:

The "Rec" is open, Monday through Friday from 3 to 5 in the afternoon and from 7 to 10 in the evening. On Saturday

it is open from 2 to 5 in the afternoon and 7 to 10 in the evening during the nine months of the school year. Youth of the 7th through the 12th grades, make use of the facilities. This rule is not rigidly applied, as high school graduates not going to college are free to come, also youth who dropped out of school before completing high school. The understanding is that "people who are clearly in the 'adult' bracket may not use playing facilities.

Members of the Youth Council, an auxiliary group which co-operates with the supervisor in the conduct of the room, qualify as follows: attendance at the Buchanan schools from the 7th through the 12th grades, 5 hours of maintenance work (sweeping, window-washing and the like), 2 lessons each in 2 different games. To retain their membership they must do at least two hours of maintenance a year. The game lessons are required because they include care of the playing equipment, also members who learn how to play the games handle the equipment more responsibly.

The Y. C. now has 155 members. Since its organization 392 have qualified for membership. After graduation they are kept on an inactive list. The Y. C. has a governing board of 11, including a president, vice president, secretary, 2 representatives from each grade, 2 members-at-large. This board meets the last Wednesday of each month to plan activities (dances, parties, game tournaments), act on mat-

ters of discipline and arrange game schedules. They enact most of the rules and furnish substantial aid in carrying them out.

Monday and Wednesday nights weekly are for Y. C. members only as a reward for their work requirements. The president, JoAnn Goodrick, has credits of 150 hours and continues adding more. Each new member receives a membership card and a felt YC emblem. No pupils in the six grades are barred from membership, but membership is not compulsory.

Different merit pins for consecutive attainment of added work credits are awarded as follows: 15 hours and active committee work, bronze pin; 25 hours work and active committee work, silver pin; 70 hours and active committee work, gold pin. Usual committee work includes planning, dances, clean-up, special events and activities, tournaments. To date 48 members have won the bronze pin, 15 the silver pin, and 3 the gold pin.

Each year tournaments are held and prizes awarded as follows: pool for 7th-8th-9th grades; table tennis--for 7th-8th-9th grades; table tennis for 10th-11th-12th grades; badminton, chess, super-chess, checkers. Only members may participate. Prizes are pins or playing equipment.

No attendant may play pool or badminton until they have had two lessons, which may be applied to Y. C. membership. Instructions are also given in table

Alleged Agent US Civil Service Canvassing Here

Sells Correspondence Courses With Job Guarantee

Recently a young woman living near Buchanan was contacted by a solicitor who alleged that he was a representative of the United States Civil Service commission, authorized to enroll prospective candidates for the service for a correspondence course, with a position guaranteed by the successful completion of the course.

The cost of the course was to be \$120, with a down payment of \$10 required for enrollment. The young woman signed for the course and paid the \$10. She then became suspicious and called Charles Wesner, Buchanan postmaster, inquiring whether any such solicitor could be a bona fide representative of the U. S. Civil Service.

Wesner informed her that no such connection could be possible. The United States Civil Service is not soliciting candidates for jobs and awards such positions only to those who qualify for them in examinations held under Civil Service auspices.

Now examinations for this area are given only at Benton Harbor. The Niles post office is an information point but gives no examinations. However, Postmaster Wesner is the local representative of the Civil Service Commission.

Stiffer penalties on driving infractions face youthful offenders tried in the juvenile traffic court, states Malcolm Hatfield, judge of the County Probate Court.

Present and future traffic penalties have been defined as follows:

Reckless driving 90-day suspension of operator's license. Driving a vehicle which has defective mechanisms 30-day suspension of license.

Second offenders will automatically be turned over to the secretary of state's office, Judge Hatfield said.

New sentences are about three times heavier than before. Juvenile court handles traffic cases involving drivers through 17 years of age.

Attorney Zick Candidate For Circuit Judge

Attorney Karl F. Zick, former Prosecuting Attorney of Berrien County, today announced that he will be a candidate for nomination as one of the Circuit Judges of Berrien County to be nominated at the primary election August 3.

Attorney Zick is a native of Berrien County and comes from an old line family which settled here long before the turn of the century. He was born in Stevensville in 1903 and his family moved to the city of Benton Harbor in 1918. He attended the Benton Harbor Public Schools and graduated from the Benton Harbor High School in 1927, at which time he was awarded the original Exchange Club Scholarship for being the best all around athlete and student. His Liberal Arts education was obtained at Olivet College, and in 1933 he graduated from Marquette University College of Law. He successfully passed the Michigan Bar Examination and was admitted to the practice of law in Michigan in the fall of 1933.

Mr. Zick began the practice of law in the office of Attorney Charles W. Gore and remained associated with Mr. Gore until his appointment as Assistant Prosecuting Attorney in 1939, serving four years in that capacity. In 1942 Zick was elected Prosecuting Attorney of Berrien County after winning the Republican nomination for such office in a bitterly fought, primary election with his opponent Joseph W. Kilham, the present Prosecuting Attorney. He was re-elected in 1944, and declined to run for a third term because of his desire to engage in private practice.

Mr. Zick is a partner in the law firm of Small, Zick & Shaffer of Benton Harbor, this firm consisting of Atty. Zick, Robert P. Small, and Miss Zoe Shaffer. Zick was elected to the Benton Harbor Charter Commission in 1944 and served one year as a member of the commission, which formulated the new Benton Harbor Charter, he is also past president of the Berrien County Bar Association.

In making his announcement, Mr. Zick states as follows: "My friends, including many lawyers, who are supporting my candidacy for Circuit Judge are convinced that I possess the essential qualifications and necessary experience for such a high position. In my twenty years as a practicing lawyer I have had eight years experience in the Prosecutor's office and twelve years experience in civil practice. In my civil practice I have been associated with two of the leading lawyers in the community, both former Prosecutors. I feel that my experience as Prosecuting Attorney is especially valuable in view of the fact that one of the principal reasons that

a second judge-ship was created in Berrien County was due to the enormous criminal work of the Circuit Court."

Mr. Zick is married and resides with his wife and family on Hillandale Road in Sodus Township. He has two daughters, one a student at the University of Michigan and the other a senior at Benton Harbor High School. He is a member of the First Congregational Church of Benton Harbor, the Benton Harbor Lions Club, of which he is a past president, the Elks Club, the Berrien Hills Country Club, and is the president of the Benton Harbor High School Alumni Association.

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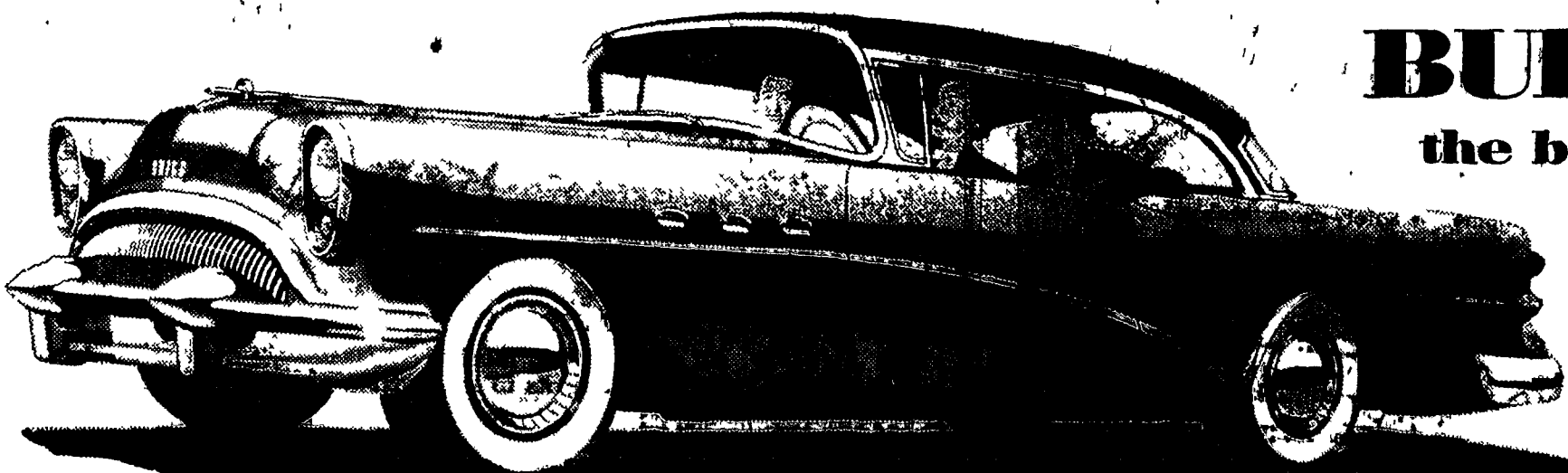
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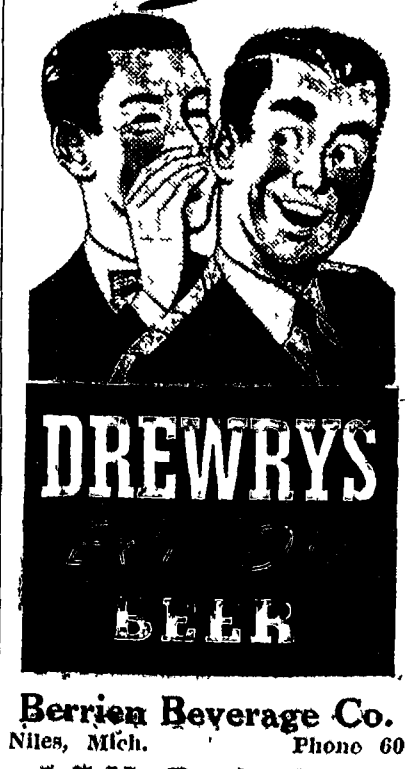
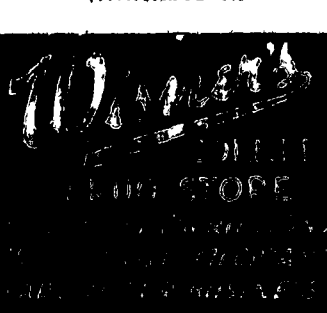
