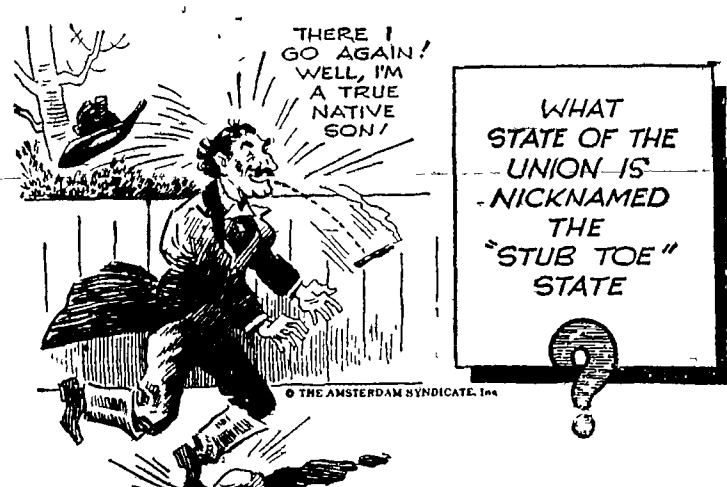

Granddaughter Of Mrs. Nora Korp Is Killed In Car Crash

Little Julie Ann Mendenhall, daughter of Lloyd and Helen Korp Mendenhall, Berrien Center, Mich., and granddaughter of Mrs. Nora Korp, Cayuga street, Buchanan, died in Lee Memorial hospital, Sunday afternoon, Dowagiac, from injuries received in an auto accident about 10 o'clock that morning three miles west of Cassopolis. She had suffered a skull fracture when the family auto overturned. Julia was born March 22, 1950, in Niles. Surviving are the parents, grandmother and four half sisters.

Her parents are still in Lee Memorial hospital. Mr. Mendenhall also has a skull fracture and Mrs. Mendenhall suffered a fractured right thigh and face cuts. Their condition is described as fair. Also riding in the car were Julie's two half-sisters, Wanda and Jean Mendenhall. They were thrown out of the car and were released from the hospital after treatment. Their parents were pinned under the car when it overturned and Julie was crushed between it and the second car.

The driver of the second car, Adrian Parker, Cassopolis, was also taken to the hospital with a fractured right leg and left arm. He was turning into the driveway of his home on county road 380, when Mr. Mendenhall saw him and threw on his brakes which caused his car to skid and crash into the Parker car.

This is the second time that tragedy has touched Mrs. Mendenhall. Her first husband, Edgar Harrell, Niles, father of two older daughters, Linda and Deanna Harrell, was killed during the last days of the World War II in Germany when his plane was shot out of the air.

Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon in the Swem Funeral Home with Rev. George Stull, Church of the Brethren, officiating. Burial was in Oak Ridge cemetery.

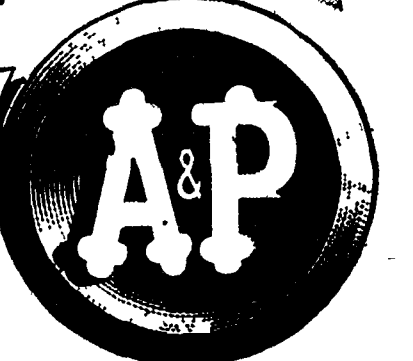

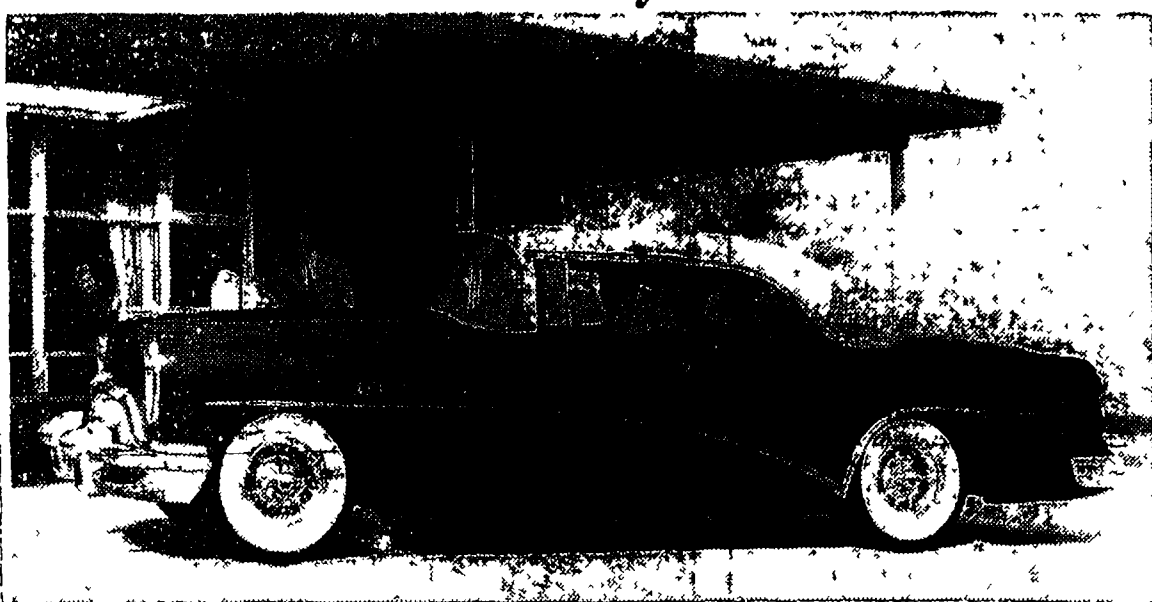

MSC Experts To Talk On Barnyard Economics Jan. 15

Berrien Farmers To Hold A Central Meet At Baroda H.S. At 1:30 P.M.

Farmers generally are not very happy these days, reports J. P. Hoekzema, county agricultural agent. Falling farm prices and high farm costs are worrying most farmers. To tackle this problem—and to bring out practical ways of solving it, Hoekzema has called a county-wide meeting which will be held at Baroda high school on Friday, Jan. 15, at 1:30 p.m. The meeting is entitled "Barnyard Economics — 1954 Model." A team of farm economists from Michigan State College, L. H. Brown and John Doneth, specialists, will help lead the discussion.

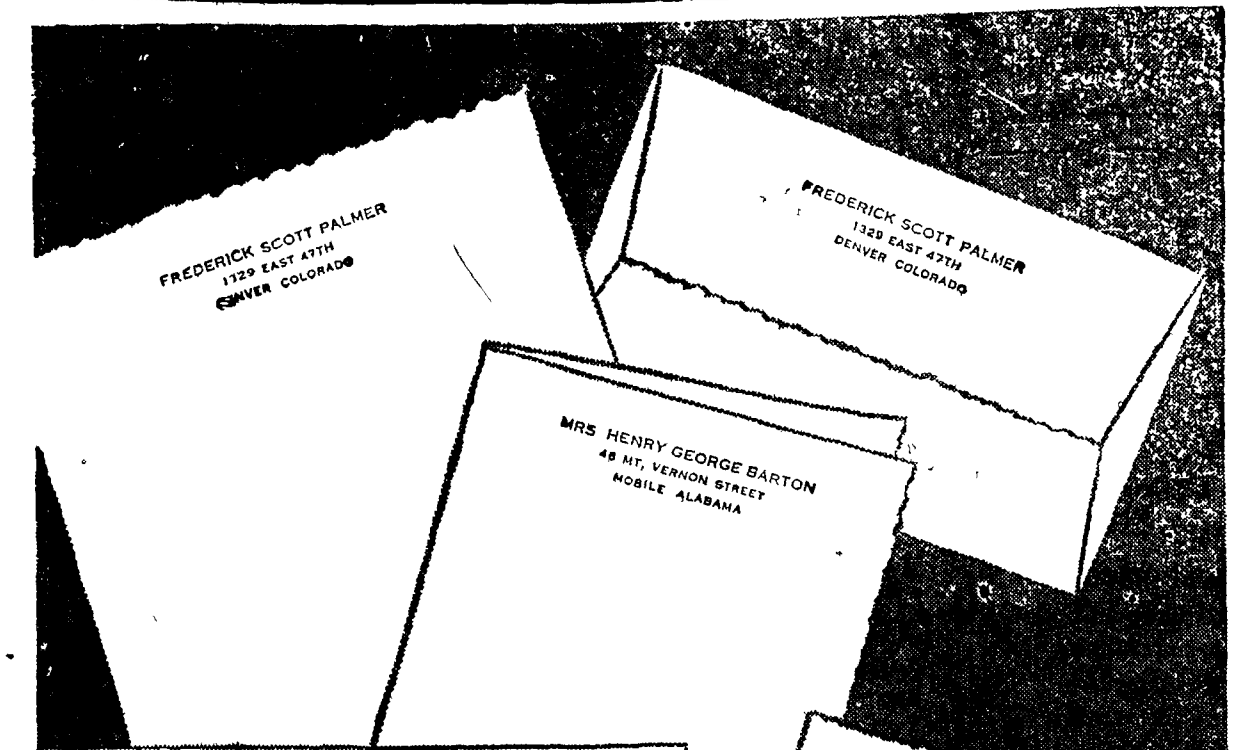
At the meeting, a number of "down-to-earth" guides to maintaining farm profits during economic conditions such as the present, will be presented. Much of the information presented will be based directly on the experience of farmers who have been successful in making good farm incomes in both good times and bad. Part of the key to success in times of falling farm prices can be described simply as "good farm managements," according to Hoekzema.

Some of the things farmers can do to ease the squeeze in the immediate future will depend on the farm outlook for 1954. This subject will be discussed rather briefly to provide a background for the broader discussion of the profit squeeze.

Also included in the meeting will be an outline of the latest changes in federal farm income tax regulations, and an explanation of the new state business receipts tax as it affects farmers. The "Barnyard Economics" meeting in Berrien county is one of a series which is being held in practically every county in the state during December and January. Many Berrien county folks will remember last year's hang-up "Barnyard Economics" meeting which featured the subject of dairy farm management. County agent Hoekzema promises that this year's meeting on another timely and important subject will be just as snappy and stimulating. Everyone in the county is invited to attend.

Farm Income Tax Bulletin Free At Office County Agt.

Why be in the dark about your 1953 farm income tax?

The answers are available in bulletin form at the office of J. P. Hoekzema, county agricultural agent.

The bulletin—1953 Farmer's Income Tax—was prepared by agricultural economists from Wisconsin, Ohio, Indiana, Michigan and the U. S. Department of Agriculture, notes Mr. Hoekzema. The bulletin, approved by the Internal Revenue Service, may be

obtained also from the Bulletin Office, Department of Information Services, Michigan State College.

Every person grossing \$800 or more annually must file a return, even though no tax may be due. The bulletin covers all problems and answers on farmers' income tax.

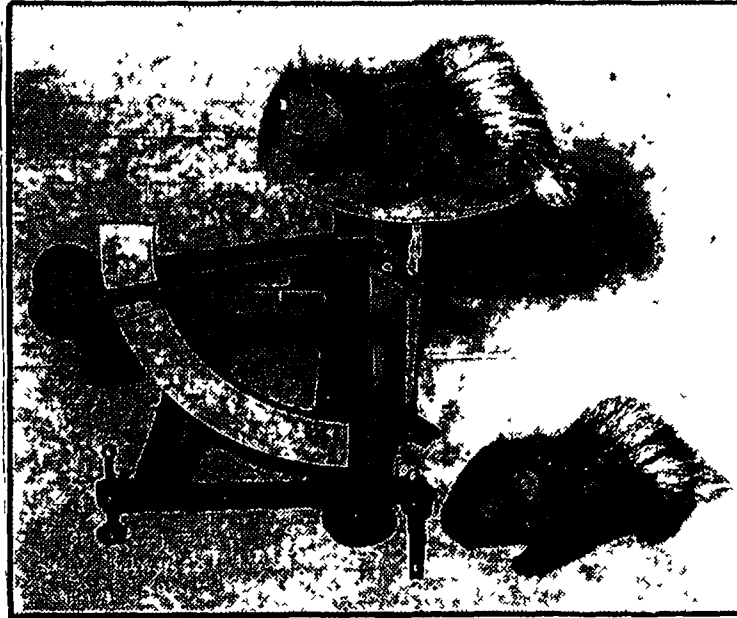

The winter dairy tour will be held on Friday, Jan. 8. Larry Johnson, extension specialist in dairying, and Arthur Bell, extension agriculture engineer, from M.S.C. will be present to help with the discussion and to answer questions asked by those attending.

J. P. Hoekzema, Berrien county agricultural agent, arranged the tour and picked out different breeds, different systems of feeding, different types of barns and milk house arrangements and also a bulk tank.

Itinerary Of Tour
9:30 a.m.—Larry Johnson, 2½ miles southeast of Three Oaks. Donner has 150 tons of grass silage in a trench, 100 tons corn silage in an upright silo and 80 tons hay. Has 65 head and wonders if he has enough roughage. Milks about 25 cows. Production of 11,000 pounds milk and 452 pounds butterfat with 223 cows last year. Has gutter cleaner. Fine herd of grade and registered Holsteins.

Has a Brown Swiss herd, has been changing over. Used both natural and artificial breeding. Has loafing area. Also milks at 10 and 14-hour intervals. Reports no difference in milk production.

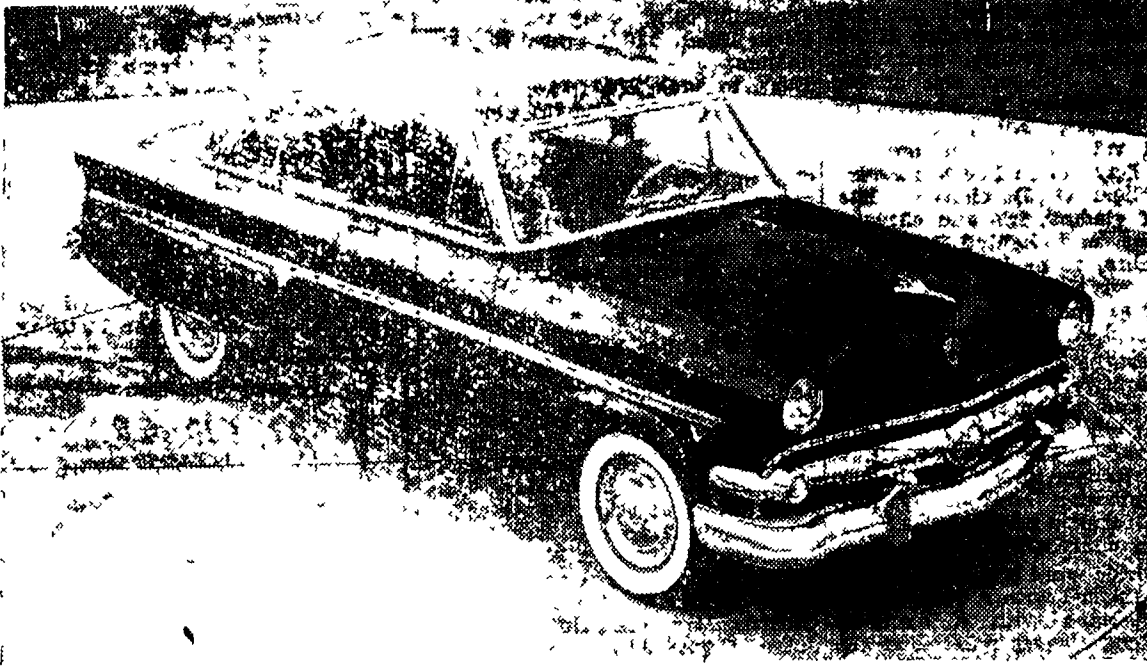

While America Blocks Foreign Trade

(Farm Bureau News)

Here sits America with agricultural surpluses. They have depressed farm prices, as we all know very well. Yet we have put the choke on trade with foreign countries with our tariff laws and restricted import quotas. We simply refuse to let other countries make dollars with which to buy from us. Sorry, isn't it? Well, it is more than that.

Let's take a look at the wide

And there is no use in getting a mirror—it isn't our selves. Russia has large stocks of grain and is making deals all over the place on a straight basis.

Denmark and Russia have signed an agreement under which Denmark is obtaining from Russia 50,000 metric tons of wheat during 1953-54. Added to this are oil cake, soybeans, cotton and timber. Denmark will ship butter, pork, and industrial products to Russia.

The Soviets are going to provide Iceland with 3,000 tons of

rye, 2-100 tons of bran, 360 tons of rice, 200,000 metric tons of gasoline and fuel oil. The Russians will get 111,000 barrels of fish.

The Reds will ship Norway 20,000 tons of barley and will receive fish, fats and wool in return. Finland will get 100% of its grain needs from Russia under a recent agreement. Finland uses 275,000 tons of wheat, 100,000 tons of rye and 30,000 tons of oats yearly.

Holland has signed an agreement to get 115,000 tons of grain from the Reds. India and Egypt

have also signed grain trade agreements with Russia.

Russia is now negotiating to buy large shipments of butter and meat from Australia and New Zealand. Three thousand tons of New Zealand butter has been sold to the Soviet and talks are under way for another 2,000 tons. Australia is dicker with Russia for the sale of 2,000 tons of butter. They, too, will help to improve Russian farm markets.

New Zealand would sell Russia a lot more meat, but their Meat Board only lets the bars down to 500 tons—at present.

If this sort of thing continues, if we continue to up our national debt to pay for higher and higher price supports and surpluses—if we continue to get more and more controls by a tough central government—Who Do You Think Is Winning The Cold War?

A tremendous loss of interest in air-conditioning is being reported from many points in the northern part of the country.

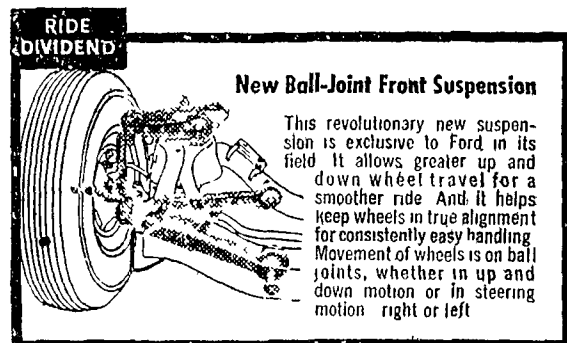
