Work in A Cigarette Factory**

Guest at the home of her brother, Frank Bentley and wife, 214 Sylvan avenue, was Miss Ann Holdscaw, Winston-Salem, North Carolina.

Miss Holdscaw is an inspector in one of the R. J. Reynolds Tobacco company factories, making Camel cigarettes. In the large factory where she works Miss Holdscaw has the "last look" at the carton just as the finished and packaged product goes off the line, determining whether it is entirely full, properly packed and sealed, etc.

There has been no slump in the cigarette business, states Miss Holdscaw. Year after year the business goes on with a steady market. Every year January and February are a little slow, so the force works only four days a week. That to some extent is on account of the giving of cigarettes for Christmas. The force then works steadily eight hours five days a week until May, when the business speeds up two months because many people stock up on cigarettes before going on their vacation. During May and June they work 9 hours five days a week. After June they drop back to the regular eight hours, five days.

The Camel cigarette factories are kept spotlessly clean, with maintenance employees steadily at work while production is on. That is one of the reasons why the Reynolds' employees are loyal to the products of their firms. Miss Holdscaw said she would still walk a mile for a Camel.

This was the first time Miss Holdscaw had seen her brother in 15 years and the first time she had visited with him in 34 years.

Rain Believed Enough To Mature Corn

The Buchanan community faced well in rain relief this week, when a total precipitation of 1.57 inches, or half of an average monthly precipitation, fell in Buchanan, and similar totals in the farms of the community.

Barring very unusual hot and dry winds, this week's rain should be sufficient to mature the corn crop, which is considerably ahead of the ordinary season schedule here. In the majority of fields the stalks have been shooting ears and showing signs of silk for two weeks. The farmer's rule is that corn should ripen in 50 days or just a bit more after the first sign of silk is seen.

The second rain was accompanied by heavy lightning which destroyed a barn near Dayton and damaged a garage at the Cress Watson home at 504 Days avenue. No great amount of damage was done to I. & M. installations, states Supt. Kenneth Mudge, beyond that usually done by an average country storm. A number of transformers were hit, in most cases only burning out the fuses. The greatest damage was done to electric communications by the bolt near the Cress Watson home, which also burned out a transformer, shutting off lights for the southern part of the town until 11 a.m.

Much interest was shown in a test of arrow vs. bullet, during which metal containers of from four to eighteen inches in diameter were used. However, the same targets when filled with water, stopped the arrow very effectively but were shattered by all bullets, proving both weapons are very deadly and should be used with extreme care.

Buchanan Twp. Reports On Fire Dept. Progress

Progress on the organization of the Buchanan township fire department under the direction of Fire Chief Charles Wesner is going ahead satisfactorily, with a basic team of fire-fighters living in a radius of a half mile of the future fire station ready to take over at any time. The date for taking over will be Sept. 1.

Wesner states that this first crew will be the basis of the department force, for the simple reason that they are more quickly available than other members. It is now planned that those living further away will be organized on a sectional basis—a group of five or more in the southwest part of the township, another in the northern part, perhaps one in the section across the river. Under this arrangement, wherever the fire may be the basic team of members living near the fire station will always take the truck out, and if the fire is in a section remote from the station, the group organized for that section will be alerted so that they may be at the scene of the fire ready to take over when the truck arrives.

Ivan Price, supervisor, and the township board are now studying needed apparatus, particularly in the form of fire ladders. They do not like to get a siren, because both Buchanan city and Bertrand township have fire sirens, and at times when wind or other factors carry the sound more effectively, the city firemen cannot tell whether it is the city or the township siren.

To add a third siren so nearby would further complicate things. The township officials are studying three alternatives to avoid this. They went to Center township, south of South Bend, where the same matter is being studied. They had tested two special phone See TOWNSHIP Page 5

Drops Cigarette, Rams Building, Puts Bakery Out

Things happened fast at the corner of East Front and South Oak at 4:15 p.m. Saturday.

Two young women were driving east on East Front street, in a flashy new Mercury. They started to swing south onto South Portage. One of the young women dropped her lighted cigarette onto the car seat. Both the young women, rather lightly clad, turned their attention to a frantic search for the hot end of the cigarette. Meanwhile the car continued on its way making a complete half-circle swing toward the east curb, then around and then suddenly brought the ladies back to attention as it went over the west-side curb toward the rear end of the east wall of the Quality Bakery.

The driver stated later that when she finally looked up they were almost to the wall. She stabbed her foot at the brakes and the foot slipped from the brake to the gas pedal beside it. The car leapt ahead with added power and the right front corner went thru the double brick wall, and smashed with an angling impact into the 15-ton steel bakery oven.

The collision caved in about 100 square feet of the double brick wall, which was laid only three years ago. The impact of the corner of the plunging Mercury hit the east steel wall of the oven toward the southeast corner, shoving that part of the oven some 8 inches west. The entire oven was pushed out of shape and the revolving trays which carried the baking goods were pushed out of alignment.

The bakery equipment will be out of production for an undetermined time, stated Dale Burrows, except for the doughnut frying equipment. "In a fraction of a second they converted full-line bakery into a doughnut factory," remarked Baker Burrows as he ruefully assessed the damages. The heavy driving gears on the west end that operate the heavy revolving mechanism inside were pushed nearly out of mesh. Damages to the car were estimated at \$300.

Fire Destroys Barn, Contents, At Deering Farm Near Dayton

Fire caused by a bolt of lightning entirely destroyed the barn and all contents at the John J. Deering farm, located north of Dayton on the old Eastern Road, with an estimated loss of \$15,000, mostly covered by insurance.

Mrs. Deering stated that a bolt evidently ignited a large quantity of loose straw in the barn, and the flames grew very rapidly. Immediately after they heard the bolt, evidently very close, she went to a window commanding a view of the barn. Smoke was starting to pour from windows and from an opening made by the lightning. The barn held a large quantity of baled hay, and all of the farm machinery, including a new tractor that had never been used. A hundred and fifty chickens also died in the flames.

The bolt struck about 7 p.m. By the time the Bertrand Fire department arrived the entire structure of the barn was ablaze.

Fire trucks also came from Galien and Buchanan. They were unable to prevent the fire from spreading to a crib full of corn about 10 feet from the barn. The wind was carrying the flaming material and sparks away from the house, which was not in danger. The Bertrand department remained until 11 p.m. till all danger had been eliminated.

Lightning Bolt Hits Watson Garage With Minor Damage

A freak bolt of lightning hit the roof of the garage at the Cress Watson home at 504 Days avenue at 7:15 p.m. Monday night, burning some of the roof construction. The bolt first hit in the branches of a large walnut tree whose trunk had grown about two feet from the garage. The bolt apparently leapt from branch to branch in the tree and thence down to the roof. The fire department was called and made a fast run, putting out the flames before they had gained much headway.

Summer Dairy And Pasture Tour Shows New Methods

Interest was high, though the attendance was small, at the summer dairy and pasture tour held recently in Berrien county. One of the highlights was a talk given by James Hays, extension dairyman from M.S.C. Hays had charts to show that most folks have sufficient pasture during May and June, but the rest of the year there is a shortage. He showed that this could be remedied by using rye seeded about the present time for late fall and

early spring pasture. He also suggested using second cutting alfalfa-brome and ladino or sudan grass to help out in the summer. Reeds canary grass can be used from early in the spring until late in the fall—especially if enough stock is kept on it so it will not get woody.

John Kinyon, south of Buchanan, has been bringing the pasture in to the cows for the past two years. John said that it was a lot of extra work but that an acre of feed went at least one-third farther than when the cattle pastured it. Kinyon has 32 milk cows plus young stock on about 100 tillable acres so makes

most efficient use of the feed. He also has two silos filled with grass and will fill a bunker silo with corn silage. He feeds all the roughage outside.

Albert Payne, Gallien, is making excellent use of Reeds canary grass. He has 15 acres that gives feed for 20-24 cows and 15-20 ponies. Payne fertilizes this annually and has obtained top yields of good pasture.

Hays mentioned that all those visited were using larger amounts of fertilizer than had been recommended but all were getting top yields. Paul Smith, Gallien, is doing a fine piece of work in renovating pastures. Paul Kemble on the Ed Healey farm, Niles, has improved the quality and quantity of the roughage while Fred Young, Niles, is using large amounts of fertilizer on hay and pastures.

The tour was arranged by J. P. Hoekzema, county agent, and Leo Jones, S.C.S. representative.

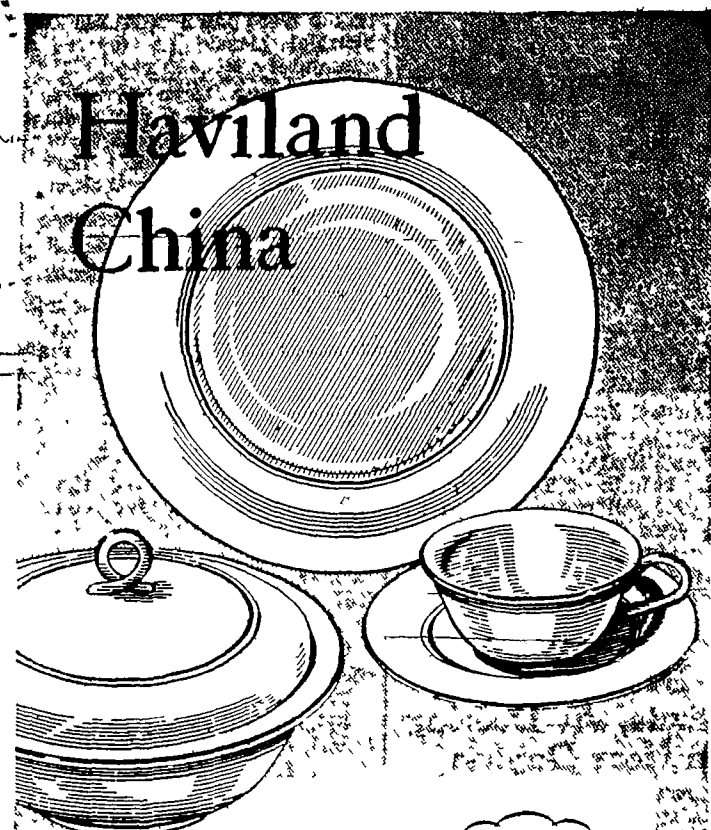

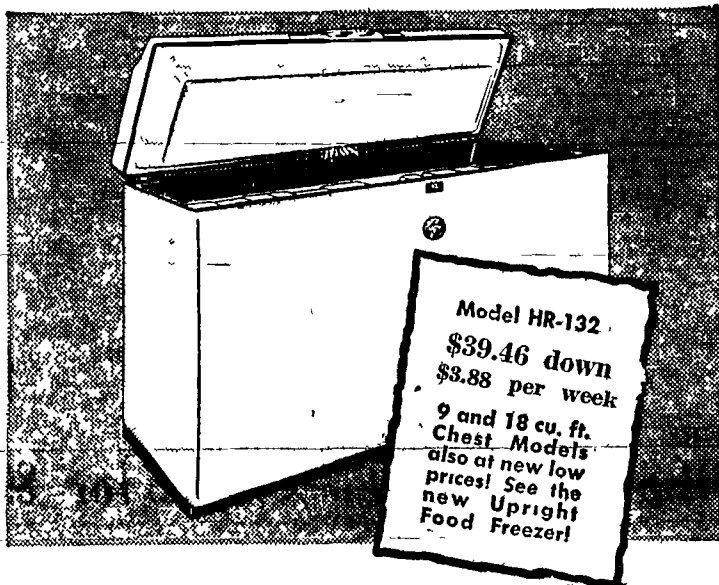

C.E. Earnings Up 23% 1st Quarter Of 1954 Sales

Clark Equipment company second quarter earnings increased 23% over the first quarter on sales that were 11% greater, George Spatta, president, reported today in a letter to shareholders.

For the six months ended June 30, 1954, Clark earnings were \$2,778,850, equal to \$244 per share of common stock. Sales for the period were \$51,717,732.

For the same period a year ago, earnings were \$3,071,230, equal to \$271 per share of common stock, on sales of \$55,131,904.

Profits on sales increased to 54% for the first six months of 1954 and 47% for the corresponding period last year, in spite of reduced volume brought about almost entirely by the curtailment of Government purchases.

Mr. Spatta said the second quarter upturn in business, together with estimates of third quarter deliveries against backlog, are indicative of continued satisfactory sales and earnings levels. He told shareholders he views the remainder of the year with "cautious optimism."

Clark's second quarter sales were \$27,171,074 and first quarter sales were \$24,546,658. Second quarter earnings were \$1,535,163, equal to \$135 per common share, and first quarter earnings were \$1,243,687, equal to \$109 per common share.

Part of the increased second quarter volume can be attributed to sales of the line of tractor shovels developed by Clark for the construction industry and for bulk handling applications. Deliveries of this equipment started in early May, and the third quarter will be the first full quarter to reflect tractor shovel sales.

A substantial backlog has been built up for the product, according to Mr. Spatta.

Clark's current assets as of June 30, 1954, were \$40,480,647 and total assets were \$60,593,094. On the same date last year, current assets were \$53,379,222 and total assets were \$71,711,076. (In the interim, \$10,000,000 borrowed from banks in a revolving credit arrangement was repaid.) Current liabilities were \$7,502,034 and on the corresponding date a year ago \$19,272,198.

During the past year, inventories have been reduced from \$25,128,812 to \$20,505,229.

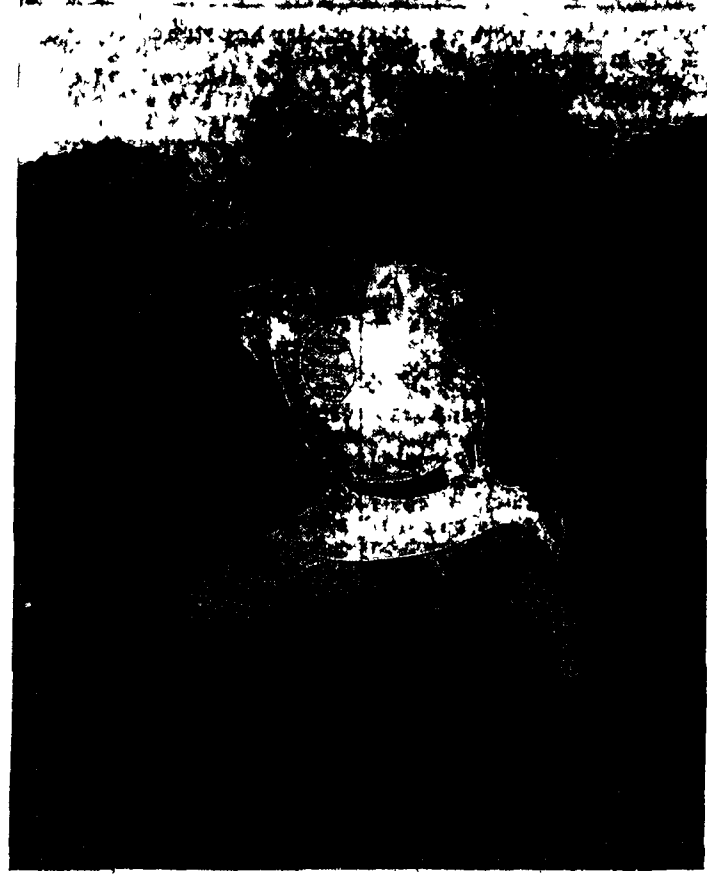

systems, probably powered by electronics.

In one of these types of phones the signal is set for installation in the homes of firemen.

In one of these sets the phone is installed in the home and has only one signal that cannot be changed or turned off. The only message that can come through it is the voice of the person in charge of the fire alarm signal. This is dependable, but is also expensive and also noisy, emitting too much sound that has nothing to do with fire alarms.

The other type is quieter, but its fault is that the signal may be changed or it may be shut off and left that way, in which case the official in charge of the alarm signal cannot contact the fireman on that phone.

Another idea is to install a horn similar to those on diesel engines, which carry well and have no resemblance to sirens. Or they might be able to depend entirely on the usual telephones, since there are sixteen men available within a half-mile.

Arrangements are in progress for setting up a telephone alarm center at the nearby Cielit Sult home, where Mrs. Sult, Sr., would be in charge. Three Sult families live in different dwellings on the premises and an inter-home alarm

could make them all available. This arrangement would be on the understanding that someone would be there at all times.

The township hall and fire station are now done as far as the structural work is concerned. The installation of utilities is not yet complete. A 78-foot well has been completed, which has a capacity of 50 gallons per minute or 3,000 gallons an hour under test. This well is to be equipped, according to plans now being studied, so that it may be used for rapid filling of tankers for relays to fires where there is not a good water supply.

One hundred-fifteen youngsters in ages from 7 to 15 years, registered for the American Red Cross "Safety in Water" swimming class at the Clear Lake Woods community beach Monday afternoon started Tuesday afternoon under the direction of Miss Gail Kaiser and Miss Marjorie Atkinson, both of Niles.

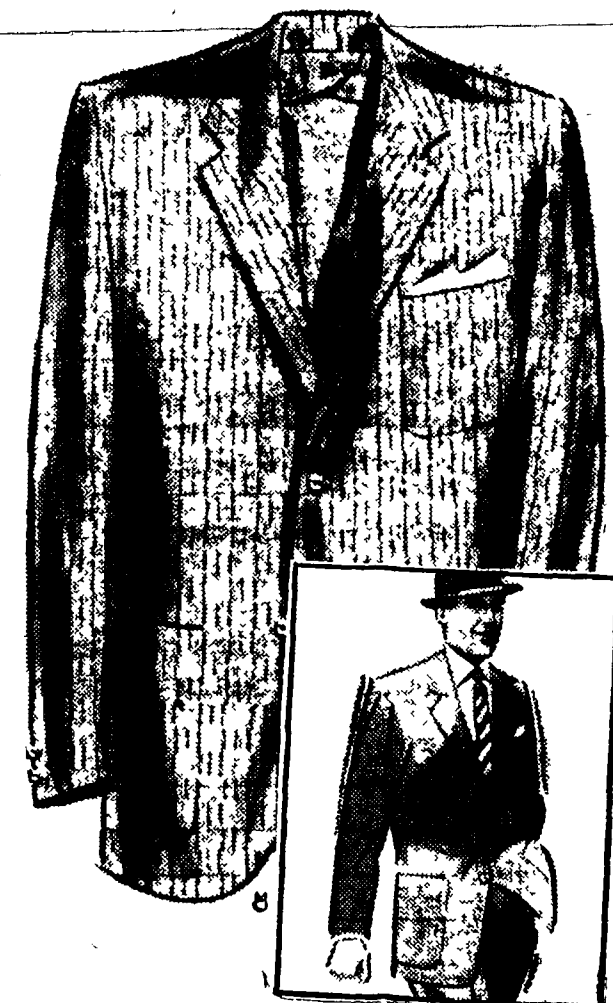

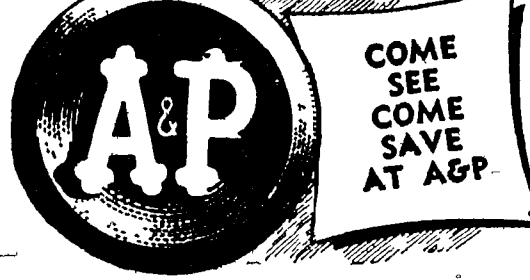

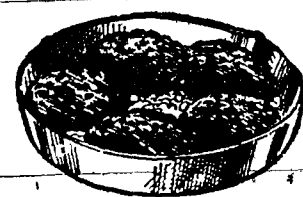

Lawrence Keller Killed In Auto-Motorcycle Crash

Tragedy on the highway struck swiftly again early Saturday morning when Lawrence R. Keller, 22, Buchanan, and Miss Charlotte L. Wogatzke, 16, Niles, were fatally injured when the motorcycle which they were riding crashed into an automobile at the intersection of Cleveland Road and Lemon Creek Road, immediately west of Baroda. The time of the accident was noted by police as 1:36 a.m.

The car, a 1937 Plymouth coach, occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Francis Wright of Stevensville, with the former driving, had driven west on Lemon Creek Road, which is the main street of Baroda, and Wright had made a slow right turn to the north. Keller and Miss Wogatzke were coming south at a high rate of speed. State troopers from the Buffalo station said that Keller had apparently put on his brakes, when he saw the car enter the road, perhaps thinking that it was crossing in front of him. The motorcycle skidded 89 feet across the center line and hit the Wright car head on. Both vehicles came to a dead stop at the point of impact and both were completely demolished.

All four involved in the crash were taken to Memorial hospital in St. Joseph. Keller had incurred broken legs and internal injuries and died at 2:20 a.m. less than an hour after the crash. Miss Wogatzke had sustained a fractured skull, other multiple fractures and internal injuries. She died at 8:15 a.m.

Mr. and Mrs. Francis Wright miraculously escaped with only minor injuries and were released from the hospital.

The background which preceded the accident was as follows. Lawrence R. Keller had volunteered in the draft and was scheduled to leave for his examination at 1:30 p.m. Monday. He and his close comrade, Gerald Thompson, were going out together Friday evening on a farewell ride. Both were unenthusiastic motorcycle riders and Keller was considered the most skillful among local riders.

Keller had with him Miss Charlotte Wogatzke of Niles, riding on the 3-foot-long double or "buddy seat." They went with Thompson to Silver Beach amusement park at St. Joseph. They rode south homeward on Cleveland Avenue Road when they met another motorcyclist whom they knew and they stopped a few minutes and talked together with their motors running. Then Thompson and the other rider started to go when Keller shut his motor off and told Thompson to go ahead, and that he would meet him in Galien, which was "straight on south on Cleveland Avenue."

Thompson went on and stopped in Galien, waiting about an hour. Thinking that Keller had probably taken a shortcut to the Wogatzke home Thompson rode on to Buchanan and hunted for him there, then went to Niles and hunted. Not finding him he went home, arriving in Buchanan at 8:30 a.m.

He was awakened at 6:30 a.m. when Mr. and Mrs. Enoch Swartz of Bakertown arrived and told of the accident, and that the girl in the accident had not been identified. Gerald Thompson went to the Buchanan police station, telling them he did not know the

girl but could give her first name and tell where she lived. He was advised to go to the Niles State Police post. A Niles trooper accompanied him to the Wogatzke home about two miles north on Pucker street and notified the parents. The mother asked Gerald to take her in his car to the hospital in St. Joseph. The girl had died before they arrived. Mrs. Wogatzke identified her as her daughter.

Lawrence R. Keller was born June 29, 1932, in Weesaw township, the son of Frank and the late Alta Keller. Their home was near Boyle Lake.

He had attended New Troy high school but quit before he was graduated. He had been working at the Studebaker plant in South Bend when he was laid off last December. Since then he had been working on farms until he left for the army. He was a member of the Methodist church of Buchanan. Survivors are his father, two sisters, Mrs. Alene Schedler and Mrs. Helen Moser (with whom he lived), both of Buchanan, by a brother, Walter,

Another horticultural special, sponsored by Michigan Fruit Canners, provides a total of \$32 in cash plus a trophy for the

outstanding strawberry project exhibitors. A \$50 defense bond offered as a memorial to the late Thomas E. Cain of Niles, will go to the boy or girl who provides the best dairy showman of the fair. Exhibitor of the grand champion beef animal will be presented a \$50 award sponsored by Raymond Huffman of Three Oaks. Huffman also is sponsor of another \$50 in cash prizes to go to the winners in beef, swine and sheep showmanship classes.

Exhibitor of the grand champion dairy animal will win a \$25 award offered by Dean's Dairy of Berrien Springs. The same firm also is again sponsoring the award of a registered dairy calf to an outstanding dairy project member who is interested in continuing in dairy farming.

Exhibitors of the grand and reserve champion Guernsey animals will win \$25 apiece provided by Hudson Brothers of Berrien Center. Winners of a dairy demonstration contest will get a total of \$50 sponsored by Producers Creamery of Benton Harbor.

A number of other special awards, with equally attractive prizes, are scheduled.

A beautiful model of a sports model car made by Virgil Exner, Jr., is now at the home of his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. George Exner, 206 West Front street.

Young Exner, now spending the summer vacation working in an experimental fibre-glass plant in Detroit, is seriously planning to follow the career of his father, who now has a world-wide reputation as a designer of cars.

He is now a student at Notre Dame, where he will enter his senior year in the engineering department this fall. The scale model now at the Exner home here was his project last year. The model is 36 inches long, the exterior body, hood and fenders made of fibre-glass, which is now being studied as a possible sub-

stitute for steel in car bodies. It is in some ways stronger and more resilient (bounces back to shape when indented) than steel, and is absolutely free from rust.

Young Virgil, Jr., was given a room of his own at Notre Dame in which to make his model. After it was completed it was mounted in the large Science Room for exhibition, with a guard in charge.

He is to enlarge this model into an actual car next winter, his father having already bought him the motor and chassis. He will be given a much larger room in the science department to make his car, and several other senior students are to receive credit for assisting him in building the real auto. Twenty-two years ago the Bethel Temple Church had its beginning. Although it began in a very humble way, it was not unnoticed by the city and town folks for the very first service was well attended. The first service was held in the Gross building over the old bank, and all seats were taken and many were standing in the stairway.

ways and the Gospel was preached under the mighty anointing of the Holy Ghost. Both young and old alike were obedient to the Word and many were baptized according to Acts 2:4. There are many in the church yet today that can witness to the healings and signs that followed the preaching of the Word.

Reverend O'Shea pastored the church for about two and a half years, at which time he was succeeded by Evangelist Gladys Dick. She pastored the church until August 7, 1944, and then resigned to go into evangelistic work. At this time the present pas-

tor, Reverend W. Ruff, came from Flint, Mich., where he and his family had lived for more than twenty years. When Reverend Ruff took over the pastorate, the congregation and Sunday school numbered about 59 on an average. He then began to make improvements on the building and the Sunday school began to grow. On New Year's Eve of the year of 1944, a revival began to break forth in the regular services that lasted until about May 31, 1945. Then a building enlargement was started and all through this building program new converts were added to the church. Again in 1949 the church was being pressed for additional room, both for Sunday school and membership, so another building program was begun in the month of May. The church was completely remodeled, adding Sunday school rooms, enlarging the auditorium and the building of an evangelistic quarters on the second floor for the accommodation of guests. A large assembly hall for receptions was built on the second floor also and all through this building enlargement program a number was baptized and filled with the Holy Spirit.

Shortly after this building enlargement was finished, the Sunday school broke all previous records with a number of 236. The record was again broken last spring with a number of 258, but this record was short lived as only a few weeks later the record was again broken by having 291 present. Our goal this fall is an attendance of 400, so come and be with us. On July 2nd this year new "Cushion-Base" pews of bronze oak with red leather pleated cushions were installed and they are not only beautiful but very comfortable.

The church has enjoyed a healthy normal growth all through the past ten years and has baptized 34 up to date since the first of this year. With this steady growth the church is now planning on another enlargement program within the next year or so.

We are happy to enjoy progress and growth with such a fine growing community as the City of Buchanan and we will be very happy to see many new faces of this community visit our 10th Anniversary and Dedication on Saturday, August 7, 1954. We would like to make many new friends in Buchanan that we haven't yet personally had the pleasure of getting acquainted with. The service will begin at 10 o'clock in the morning, continuing through the day and evening.

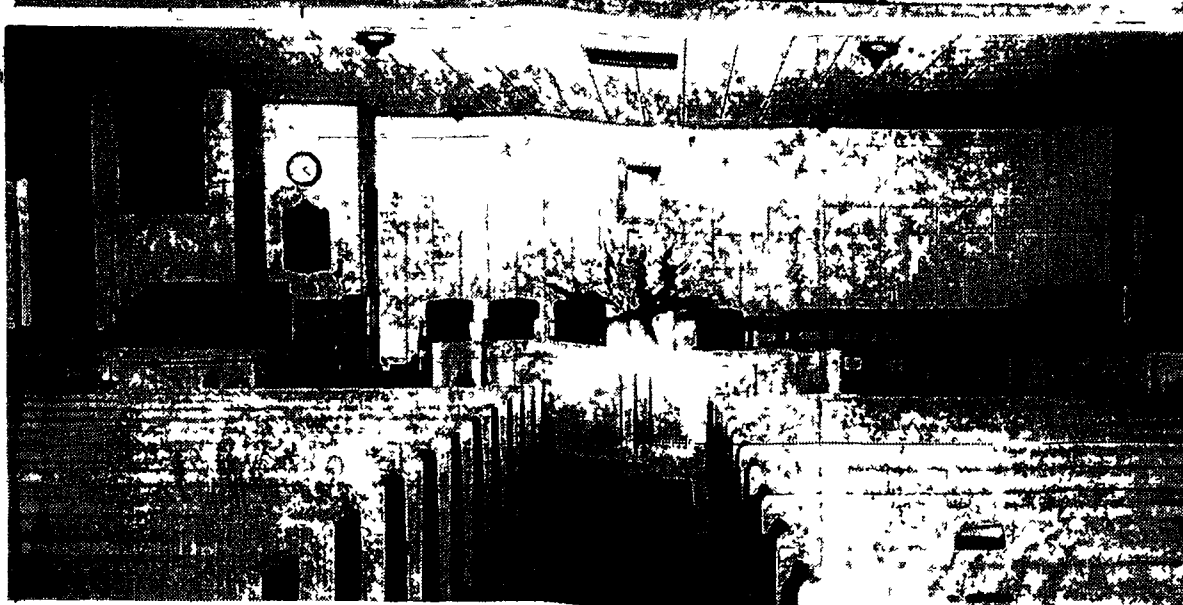
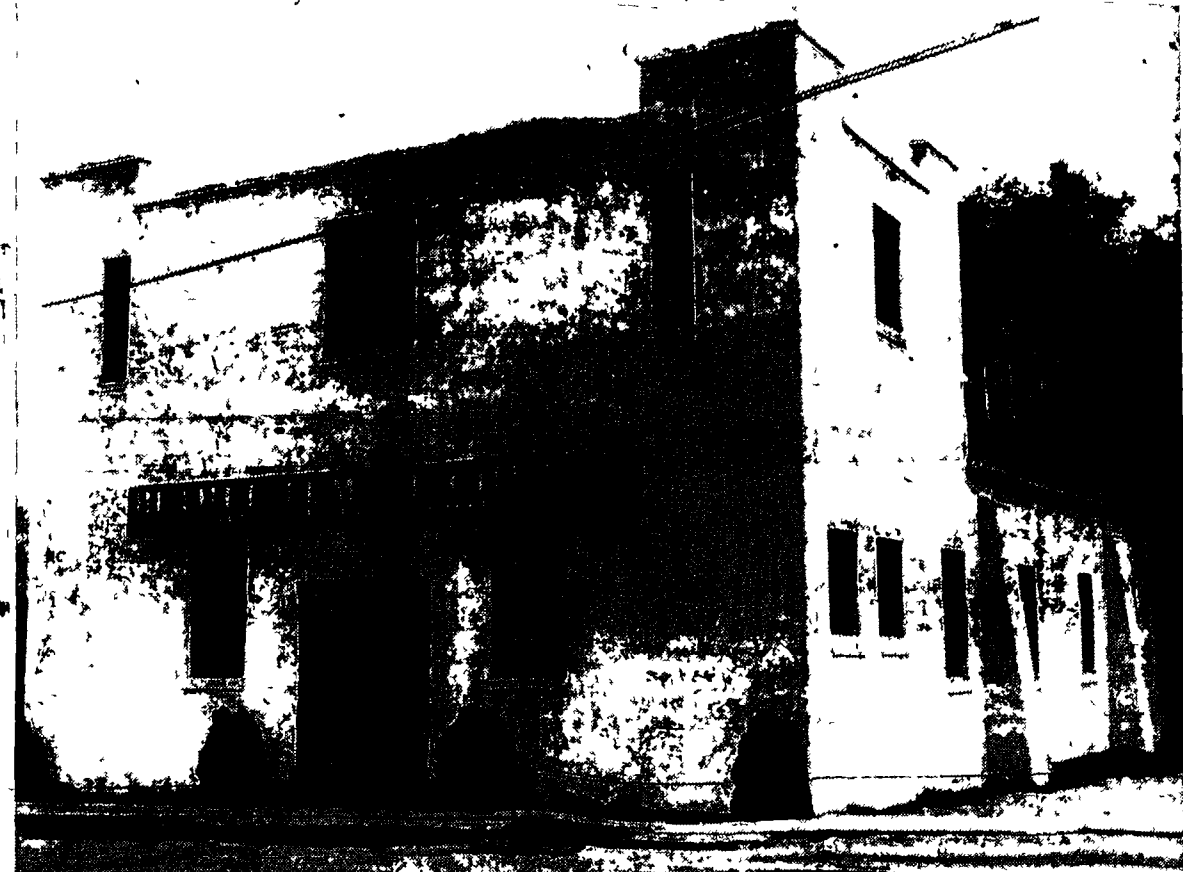

Spray Raspberries

Be sure to give your raspberries a thorough spraying with fernate after you finish the pruning job this summer. That's the advice from Robert F. Carlson MSC small fruit researcher. The spray is needed, he says, because of the anthracnose, or cane spot, epidemic this summer. Cool, wet weather helped spread the disease.

Doing a good pruning job, notes Carlson, means cutting out all the old canes and the weak and spindly ones. It's a good idea, he cautions, to burn all of the cut out canes. That's one way of helping to control diseases. Don't cut off tips of canes during the summer, he insists, it's better to let the new canes grow and tip them next spring.



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Requirements Set For Government Grain Loans

In order to clear up some of the doubt in the minds of producers which are interested in securing a government loan on their grain a few of the requirements are being listed.

1. If grain is covered by an allotment program, BE SURE your harvested acres was within the allotted acres for your farm.

2. On farm-stored loans bins must have the following specifications: tight roof, screened windows, protection from rats, mice and animals, damp-proof floor and good ventilation. The following precautions to assure safe storage are also advised: Before storing grain be sure bin has been thoroughly cleaned and all trash residue removed. All cracks in floor, walls and ceiling should be covered. Bins should be sprayed with 5% DDT or methoxychlor before binning the grain. It is not safe to store wheat with MORE THAN 14% MOISTURE. Examine grain once a week during the summer or early fall and once a month thereafter. If wheat becomes weevily treat immediately with an approved fumigant. If heating is evident turn immediately.

3. Grain must be stored at least 30 days before making application. Application for small grain loans will be made from time of harvest until the forepart of January, 1955.

4. Preliminary loan fee is 1¢ per bushel with a minimum fee of \$3 per loan paid at the time of making application at your local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office.

The basic loan rate for Berrien county is \$2.34 per bushel with a 4¢ discount for soft wheat, (white or red).

Other Berrien loan rates are: Oats, grade 3 or better, 77¢; Barley, grade 2 or better, \$1.21; Rye, grade 2 or better or grade 3 on test weight factor only, \$1.46.

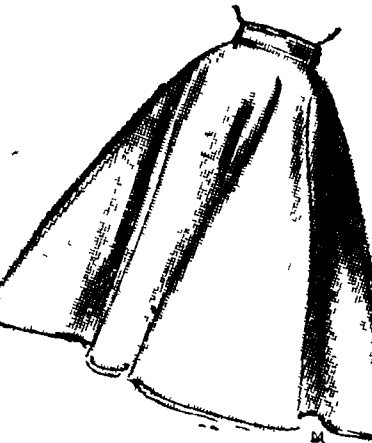

Court house round-up

ST. JOSEPH, MICH.—Berrien county's stately, steeped and, same say, stagnate courthouse is always the seat of county government. But at this time of the biennial, it also becomes the seat of county politics.

This year is even more so. For the very fate of the 60-year-old building hung in the balance of the Aug. 3 primary. The "Round-up" of necessity was prepared on the eve of balloting, but you will know by the time you read it how the vote came out, not only on the controversial building project but also on the nominations for county offices.

Nevertheless, dealing as it does with the seat of county politics, the "Roundup" can hardly avoid the "see-it" of county politics. Here are some of the observations it has made.

First instance, couldn't help but notice the way County Clerk Frank Duerr was scouting all over the county making sure every precinct polling station had enough ballots, pencils, poll books and all the official appointments to run a voting station. (Poll workers furnish their own coffee.)

First instance No. 2. Couldn't help but notice the way Phil Hart, Gov. Williams' hand-picked candidate for lieutenant governor stepped off a plane into the soup when he came here to stump Berrien county last week.

Seems the situation, which rent the ranks of the local democratic party, almost left Hart stumped, but he managed to verbally chop his way out.

At the invitation of one "good democrat," Carl A. Schultz, president of the Benton Harbor Malleable Industries company, Hart had planned a tour of the plant during his brief visit to Berrien county.

But then another "good democrat," Joseph Vega, kicked up the fuss. Vega, as local boss of the UAW-CIO, has been at loggerheads with Schultz ever since Malleable broke a CIO Local 880

strike against the firm two years ago, and, incidentally, broke the union in doing it.

Vega apparently just couldn't understand a democratic candidate touring a plant which had fought the CIO and minced no words saying so. Schultz couldn't understand why the word of one democrat should persuade a democrat not to hobnob with another democrat. He also minced no words saying so.

"I've been a democrat all my life," hooted Schultz. "But I'm beginning to wonder if the party is dead or if it's just necessary to clear everything with the CIO first."

Anyway, Hart backed up pronto by saying that he had learned only after arriving in Benton Harbor that the Malleable plant had been in the throes of labor turmoil for years and decided against the tour so it "could not be construed as an endorsement of one side against the other."

It'll probably be a long time before Phil will have "Hart" to set even a campaign foot into Berrien county again.

First instance No. 3. Couldn't help but notice more than one official thumb twiddling as board of supervisors proponents brought the \$2,500,000 county building-infirmity project to the balloting stage.

The board has been remarkably successful in the past in selling the county on such projects as a new jail and a new juvenile home. But the betting is pretty close on how the 2-million-for-5-years special tax levy now being proposed will come out.

Chairman Frank Small and other board members began a sales promotion campaign among county service clubs, but it backfired when one of the largest clubs as a result came out in opposition to it. The Twin Cities Rotary club felt the board should investigate all the facts of the existent county building-infirmity problems a little more thoroughly before undertaking to spend \$2,500,000 to correct them.

There was also some feeling that at least one or both of the projects would have a better chance of being supported popularly if they had been made separate issues on the ballot. As it was both projects were wrapped up in one yes-or-no package.

The board itself was almost unanimous in its belief that the need exists for both projects and that the financing plan as set up was a good deal for the county because it was predicated on a pay-as-you-go basis which would have eliminated the need for long term bonding and consequent high interest rates.

First instance No. 4. While Probate Judge Malcolm Hatfield was not directly concerned with the primary campaign, he hasn't let that stop his campaigning.

Three other candidates for the two Berrien circuit judgeships to be filled at the general election in November agreed to wait until after the primary to launch their campaigns so as not to burden primary confusion.

Not Hatfield. He's been out beating the bushes and decorating utility poles with his picture for the past couple of months.

The Hatfield-for-judge campaign was temporarily overshadowed this week, however, by a staff shuffle within the probate court he now runs.

Mrs. Francis Milton, who for the past four years had been in charge of adoptions of minor girls through the probate court, submitted her resignation this week.

Judge Hatfield accepted it "reluctantly" and simultaneously

asked Gov. Williams to appoint a successor. The successor suggested by Hatfield is Miss Mary Patricia Leonard. The post is known as assistant juvenile agent.

Miss Leonard, now living in St. Joseph, is a graduate of the University of New Hampshire.

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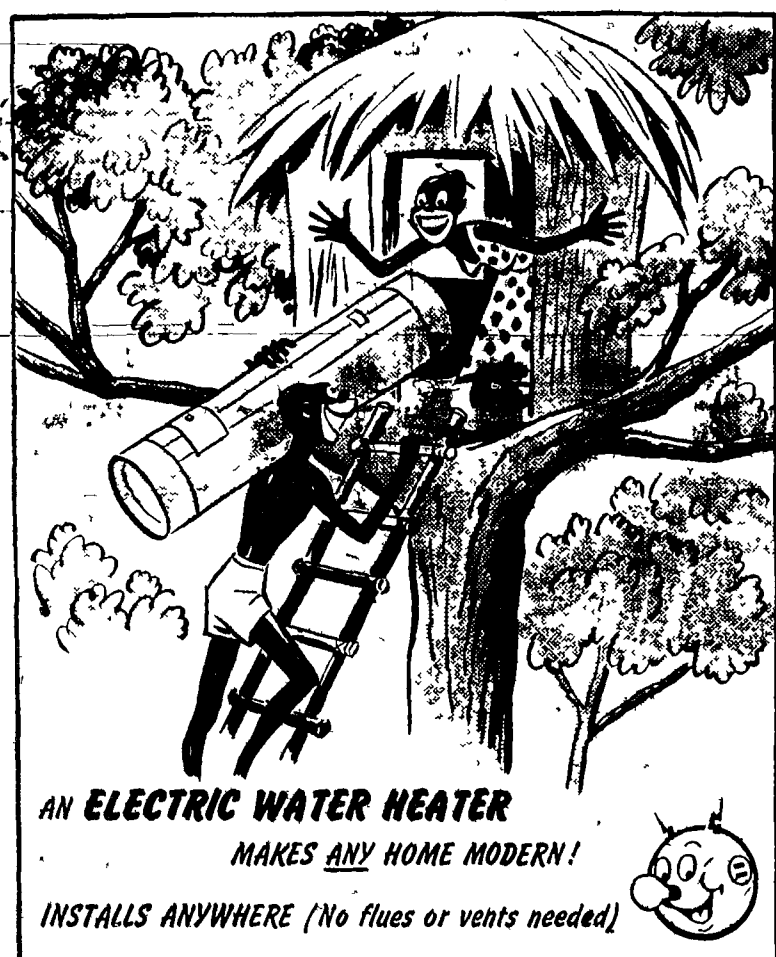

Enjoys America; Likes Popcorn and Blue-jeans

Here is pictured, in a relaxed moment, Miss Gisela David, German exchange student, who has also been to a considerable degree a genuine ambassador of good will to the Buchanan community for the past year.

She will leave Aug 9 for her home in Munich, Germany. Very many friends whom she has made here will sincerely regret to see her go.

For her part, Gisela asked that the following statement be made in her behalf. "I wish to extend my gratitude to the people of Buchanan who have accepted me with such great friendliness, and who have welcomed me, not as a stranger in a strange land, but

as really one of their own. In particular I thank the Rizor family, who have made their home mine. While I have been here I have thought of Mr and Mrs. Earl Rizor as my American dad and mother."

In a talk made before the Buchanan Business & Professional Women's Club several months ago, Gisela said that two of the many things that impressed her in America were blue jeans as informal wear for girls, and popcorn for informal munching. Both, she said, are unknown in Germany, and she would like to introduce them there when she returned home. As a result she was invited by the Record to have her picture taken wearing blue jeans and eating popcorn.

How did she come to be an exchange student? She read in the Munich newspaper, the Munich Mercury, that an examination was to be held for boys and girls who wished to become exchange students in American high schools, through the agency of the American consul in Munich.

The students must be between 16 and 17½ years of age. Gisela applied. She received a questionnaire form, which had to be filled out in 10 duplicates. Among the requirements were skill in speaking English, range of interests, personal background, leadership ability, influence on others, emotional stability, political awareness, capacity of being a good representative of her country.

All of these requirements Gisela lived up to. A long selective process had preceded her appointment as exchange student. In the final selection last summer all the candidates were graded on the above points. Gisela was one of 450 exchange students selected from among 25,000 applicants.

Her high abilities were soon in evidence here. She became a clear and fluent public speaker in English and this fact soon got around. As a result she has made 57 speeches in places ranging from St. Joseph to Battle Creek, before many kinds of organizations, including women's clubs, Lions, Rotary, Y Men's Club (Battle Creek), Girl Scout troops, and before many religious denominations. Finally her schedule became full and she was obliged to turn down further speaking engagements.

When Gisela returns to her home in Munich she will have three years more of her nine years of gymnasium to complete. These last three years will be an equivalent of a liberal arts college course in the United States.

In Germany the students who may have advanced schooling must be carefully screened. The minimum requirement for all is 8 years of elementary schooling. If the student wishes advanced schooling, he or she may enter the "Middle School" after completing four years of elementary school. This is the equivalent of an American grade and high school course.

Of if the student wishes to go further they may try out for the "Gymnasium School," which is the only avenue to university training. To qualify for the Gymnasium School they must rank in the upper 10% in scores made through a week-long test.

The students in the Gymnasium School are a picked group and the pressure of competition among them is intense. This is because opportunities per capita in Germany are far scarcer than in the United States. For instance Germany has an excess of 30,000 physicians, who cannot practice because there is no place for them. This excess was created by the great popularity of the medical courses after the end of World War II, and by the fact that many German physicians escaped to West Germany when the Russians took over in the East.

A great deal is done to create high standards of culture in the "upper tenth" of the Gymnasium and among the University school students. Munich has a large and beautiful concert hall, in which there are regular "student nights." On these occasions all the seats are on sale from box seats to gallery, at 60 cents each, on the basis of "first come, best seated." The students tend to flock more to the operas and the plays where a visible story is told. Plays are great favorites including the plays of Shakespeare of England, Moliere of France, and Goethe of Germany. Since school ended Gisela has enjoyed attending the summer camp at Crystal Springs, also Camp Warren, where she served as counselor. Her sponsoring agency in Buchanan has been the First Methodist church.

When she leaves on Aug 9 the Rizors will take her by auto-

mobile to Northville, near Ann Arbor, where they will have dinner and she will spend the night. On the following day, Aug. 10, she and the other German boy and girl students will leave by bus over the Pennsylvania Turnpike to New York City. They will leave New York City on Aug. 12 for Quebec, where they will spend a day. They will then embark on the small Italian liner Castel Felice, scheduled to arrive in Rotterdam, Holland, on Aug. 22. Gisela will arrive at her home in Munich on Aug. 23.

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To Many Fish in Great Lakes Waters

Too many fish is a problem seldom faced by lovers of the rod and reel, but the large number of underdeveloped finny fellows in Michigan's warm-water lakes makes a major headache for Michigan's Conservation Department.

"The problem is more complicated than it seems," says Dr. Justin Leonard, head of the Research Division in Conservation.

One of his important duties is to see that the state's lakes, rivers and streams are full as possible of fish to make sportmen happy and proud.

Dr. Leonard looks at this problem somewhat as a farmer looks at securing the highest yield of corn from a 40-acre plot. Although it is somewhat more involved, the basic factors are the same.

Everything practical must be done to make both water and land able to support the largest number of plants or fish.

The number of plants or fish must be limited to what can be supported.

When a farmer fertilizes, cultivates and thins out his corn, he gets the best return. A similar practice produces the most desirable fish.

"First we do everything we can to make a lake support more fish," says Dr. Leonard. "Then we seek to adjust the fish population to this level."

Southern states have been able to increase the productivity of lakes by 400% with the addition of certain fertilizers. Unfortunately this doesn't work out the same in northern climates. In fact, Michigan has found that adding fertilizers can kill every fish in the lake.

Difficulty here is long winters. Fertilizers produce greatly increased plant growth. When cold weather comes with ice and snow, light and air are cut off from the lake bottom. This causes many plants to die. The resulting decay completely absorbs the limited oxygen available. The fish are suffocated.

The Conservation Department is conducting experiments to find a fertilizer that is practical to use in this climate.

When too many fish inhabit a lake, none of them can get

enough to eat. This means very few grow big enough to brag about.

For this reason there are open seasons, or very short closed seasons, for several of the more common fish. In most warm-water lakes fishermen can try their luck anytime for crappies, rock bass, perch or calico bass.

There are only three weeks in April when it is illegal to catch bluegills and sunfish. Regulations concerning legal size have been relaxed.

More drastic means are used in other lakes.

Michigan pioneered the idea of using a chemical called rotenone to poison all the fish in a lake. When all are killed and the poison dissipated, the lake is stocked with trout. These soon grow well past legal size and become an angler's delight.

Constant fear of Conservation officials is that these lakes will be planted with other kinds

either knowingly by some well-meaning person or by a fisherman who innocently dumps the balance of his live minnow bait into the lake. This is why fishing regulations prohibit use of live bait in certain lakes.

The average pair of bluegills produces 17,000 young each year, perch up to 48,000, walleyes produce several hundred thousand eggs each season. It is easy to see that one pair of minnows grown to adulthood could soon stock a lake to the point where none of the fish could obtain sufficient food to grow big.

Officials worry too about people who might use goldfish for bait. A few of these under the right conditions would produce so many carp-like creatures that the lake would have to be poisoned.

Perhaps the biggest puzzle for Dr. Leonard is what happens to trout after streams are stocked. Previously it was the practice to stock angler trout in streams. The idea was that they would soon "go wild" and become good game fish. This did not work out.

At present Conservation men dump 7-inch trout into streams. According to their best research procedures, this helps substantially for three weeks to a

month. During this time, they estimate, from 25% to 75% of the trout are caught. But they cannot decide what happens to the ones that "get away." They cannot understand why they should die or what happens if they do. All they know is "they are never seen again."

The problem on the Great Lakes is different. There the trouble is too few fish. The enemy is the sea lamprey.

The state is working with the federal government to rid these waters of the eel-like parasite. Experts are sure that if they can "control" the lamprey to the extent that farmers control the corn borer, that the famous lake trout will be back in numbers almost as great as ever.

Electronic weirs have been set up across 28 outlets emptying into Lake Superior. These are designed to prevent the lamprey from swimming upstream where he can spawn. Because of the life cycle of the lamprey, it will be four years before it can be determined whether electricity is successful in breaking the important link of the lamprey's life cycle. In the meantime, continuous research is being devoted to other ways to attack this costly menace to Michigan's fish world.

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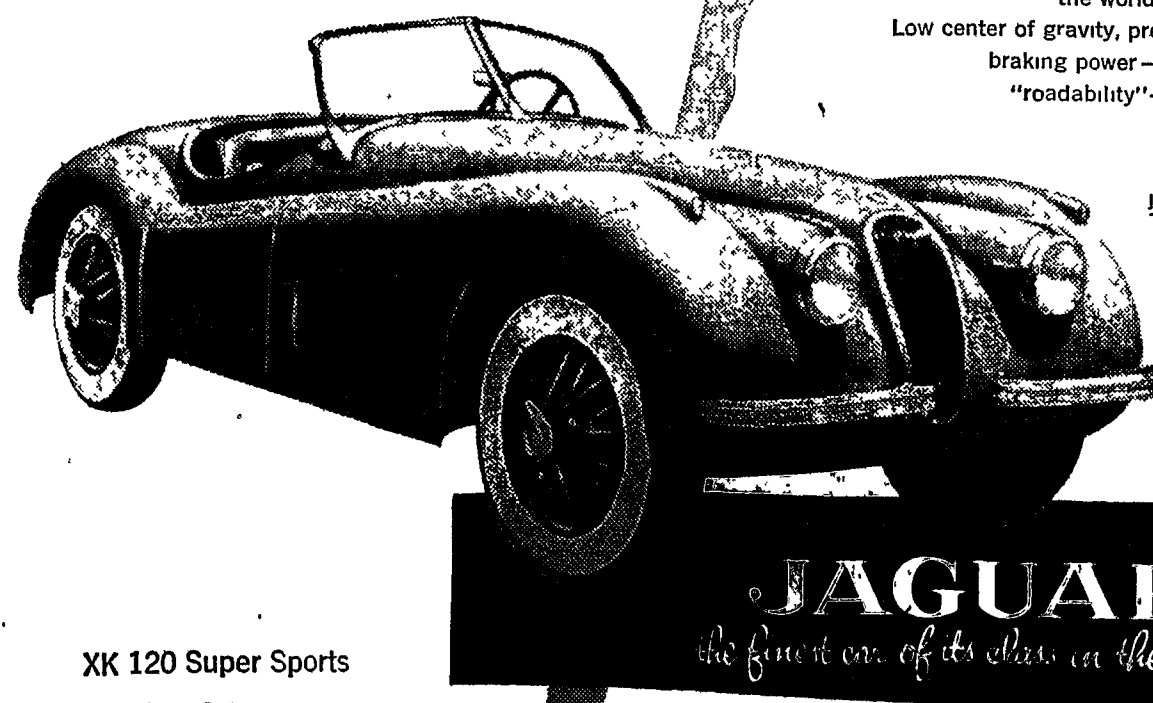

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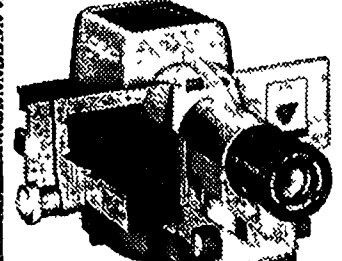

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Meet Your Merchant

This week we introduce Robert Monaghan, better known as Bob, the quiet and business-like proprietor of the 28-room hostelry known as the Hotel Buchanan.

Mr. Monaghan became proprietor of the business on July 25, 1949, buying from Floyd Burch. He came to Buchanan at that time from Dowagiac, where he had been a member of the city police force 11 years, including 5 years as chief. Previous to that service he had spent a number of years in the insurance business.

The main part of the building was erected during the Civil War, on a site which was razed by Buchanan's greatest fire, in October of 1862. This fire, starting in a sash and blind factory then standing on part of the hotel site, was swept by a hard

south gale until it had destroyed all of the business houses west to the street entrance where the Hollywood theatre building is now located and all on the north side from the corner of Main street eastward.

The 3-story building which is now the hotel fronted on Front street, housing a store on the ground floor in the beginning. In a short time it was bought by Archibald Dunbar and his brother, Sr., according to John Holmes, pioneer Record editor, and they converted it to a hotel, first known as the Dunbar House.

It had a history of various ups and downs since that time. For many years it was known as the Hotel Rex, changing to the Hotel Buchanan in recent years. The 1-story section to the east with the balcony above was added

dant point, such a star sometimes appears to move upward, Professor Losh continues.

The shower comes when bits of iron and stone enter the Earth's atmosphere at high speed, are checked and the resulting friction sets them burning and produces the brilliant flash "Most of them are consumed in their plunge," she says.

The Milky Way appears to split into two streams of stars, the western branch extending to Scorpius, the eastern through Aquila, the Eagle, to Sagittarius, the Archer.

Among planets visible this month will be Venus, moving eastward from the Sun. Saturn will remain the bright yellow planet in the Southwest and Mars, the brilliant orange-red object in the southern sky.

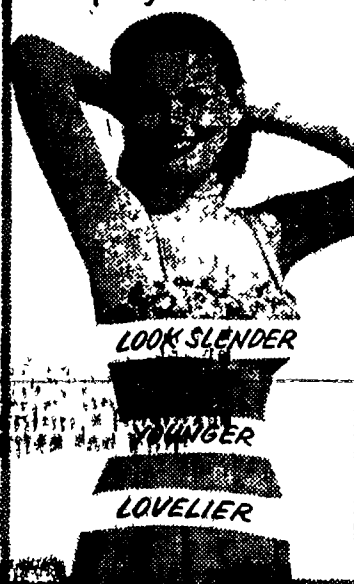

What about the beetles inside the house? Use the vacuum cleaner.

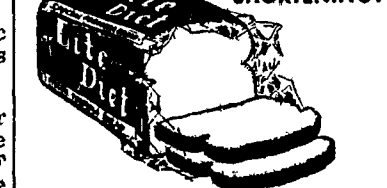
