Weather Forces Crop Price Down

Buchanan District Faced By Corn Storage Problem

Continued heat with the mercury in the upper eighties daily with occasional incursions into the lower nineties has been responsible for unusually fast ripening of peaches, with the possibility that many growers will fall behind and let part of their peach crop go to waste.

The glut of peaches has depressed the price to a top of \$1.50 per bushel at the market. With packing expense of 45c per bushel, exclusive of picking costs, the grower makes little, if any, profit at this price, states Robert Koenigshof of Buchanan Co-ops.

While the weather has been ideal for corn, the rapid development of what promises to be a near all-time record crop has had the effect of creating a price slump. During the past week the price at the Co-ops dropped from \$1.25 per bushel to \$1.07.

In height and exuberance—of foliage and in size and number of ears Buchanan has never had a corn crop, in the memory of this writer, as promising as the one now coming on. Many fields are now developed past danger of drought and nearly past danger of frost.

When the crop is showing no lack of moisture in most sections, there are dry spots showing west of Buchanan, either on account of less rain or lighter land.

In common with farmers of all corn producing sections, the Buchanan growers are faced with a storage problem, accentuated by the fact that the government has not withdrawn nearly as much of last year's crop from storage as had been expected.

Farmers who need assistance in providing their own storage facilities may take advantage of a special government loan available for the construction or purchase of new storage facilities on the farm or for additions to existing facilities, Mr. Kretschman of the county AAA said.

In general, this storage loan program provides maximum financing of 45 cents per bushel of the rated capacity, or 85% of the cost, whichever is smaller. The loans will be for terms up to 5 years, payable in equal annual installments, and at an interest rate of 4%.

Full details on this loan program may be obtained at the county AAA office.

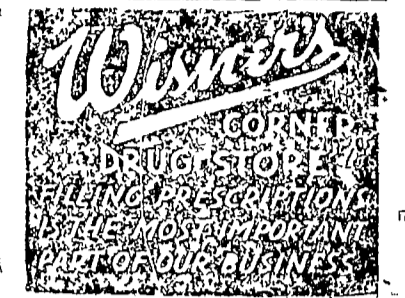

POORMAN'S RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Royal Meat Patties

Broadcast August 20, 1949

4 large onion slices, 3 tablespoons shortening, 1 1/2 inch thick 1 lb ground beef, 1 tablespoon butter or margarine, 1/2 cup rolled oats, 1 cup Fat Milk, 2 tablespoons flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, No. 2 can peas, drained

Remove centers from onion slices, leaving 2 outer rings from each. Cut centers fine, mix with meat, oats, 1/2 cup milk, 1 teasp salt and 1/2 teasp pepper. Shape into 8 flat patties. Cook onion rings slowly in skillet 5 min in hot shortening. Remove and save. Brown patties slowly on one side. Turn, put onion rings on top of patties. Cover, cook slowly to brown under side of meat. Meanwhile, melt butter, blend in flour, 1/2 teasp salt and few grains pepper. Stir in 1/2 cup liquid off peas. Boil and stir 2 min. Stir in 1/2 cup milk and the peas. Heat. Serve in the onion rings. Makes 4 servings.

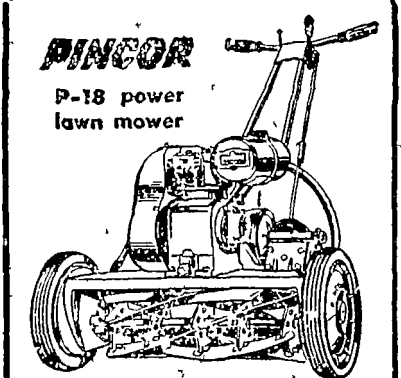

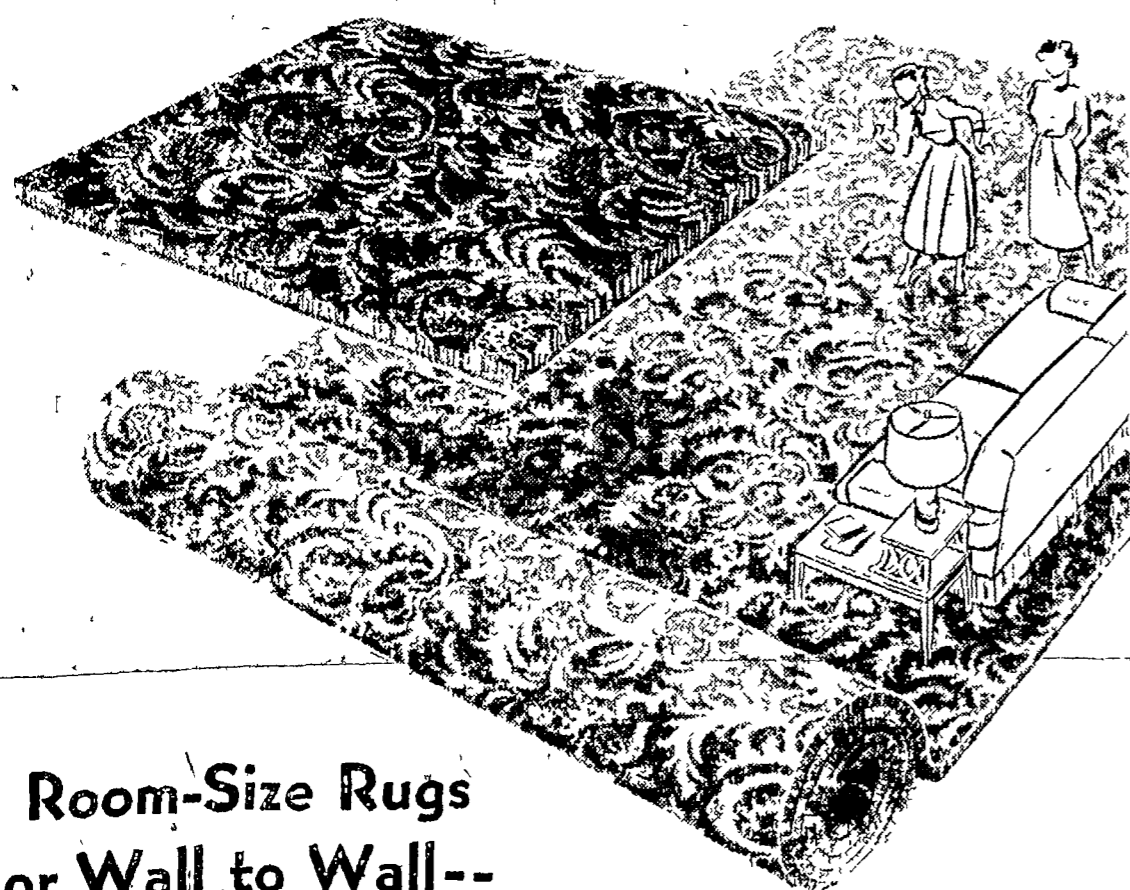

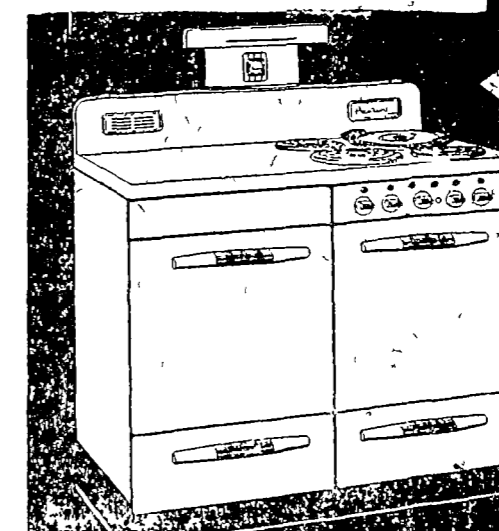

Jealousy Ends In Butcher Knife Murder Common-Law Wife

Harmon Green Held For Murder

Jealousy Believed To Be Factor In Wife Slaying

Harmon Green, 45, is being held without bail in the county jail at St. Joseph, pending examination on the charge of first degree murder of his common-law wife, Clara Green, 43.

The incident resulting in the death of Mrs. Green occurred about 12:50 a. m. Saturday, Aug. 13, in front of one of the small houses on East Fulton street and immediately beyond the northern limits of the Moccasin housing project.

Patrolmen Randall Couchman and George Burgoyne were accus-

ing through that district and had just turned off North Portage west on East Fulton when they heard a woman scream just ahead of them. They drove to the spot and found Mrs. Green standing in the street screaming and bleeding profusely from a knife wound in the abdomen. "He done cut me," she screamed to the officers, pointing to her husband, who stood near by. "Yes, I cut her," said Green. The officers called the Sween ambulance and dispatched the woman to the Pawating hospital. They then took Green to the city jail to hold him for examination.

Mrs. Green died about four hours later in Pawating hospital. In a statement from Green taken by deputy sheriff Robert Rinker later Saturday morning, Harmon Green readily admitted inflicting the fatal wound. He stated that he had gone to "a party" earlier in the evening and had taken the knife, which was a plain butcher knife they had used in the home, about 12 inches in length. He said that he carried the knife at his side up his belt, with his shirt over it concealing it. He said that after he returned home Mrs. Green told him she wanted to go to a friend's home, the adjoining house at 217 East Fulton street.

He stated that he objected to her going but she went anyway

Later he went to the house at 217 East Fulton and asked her to come home. She agreed to go home. Outside the house, Green said, "she took a swing at him" and he stabbed her.

Jealousy over the belief on the part of Green that she was running around with other men is believed to have been a factor. They had had several fights before, for which the police had been called in. No arrests had been made because no one would sign a complaint. On one occasion he had broken her arm, and on another she had cut him with a knife.

Both had been previously married and had parted from their mates without benefit of divorce. They had been living together about five years, their address at the time of the incident being at 215 East Fulton street.

An autopsy performed by Coroner William E. Niles, revealed that the woman's death had resulted from internal hemorrhages from the wound.

The Buchanan woman was born Aug. 31, 1910 in Madison, Fla. She came to Buchanan with her husband four years ago.

Survivors are two children by a former marriage, Miss Elizabeth Brown and David Brown, both of Oakland Park, Fla., and two sisters, Mrs. Mattie Mason and Mrs. Mazie Collins, both of Jacksonville, Fla.

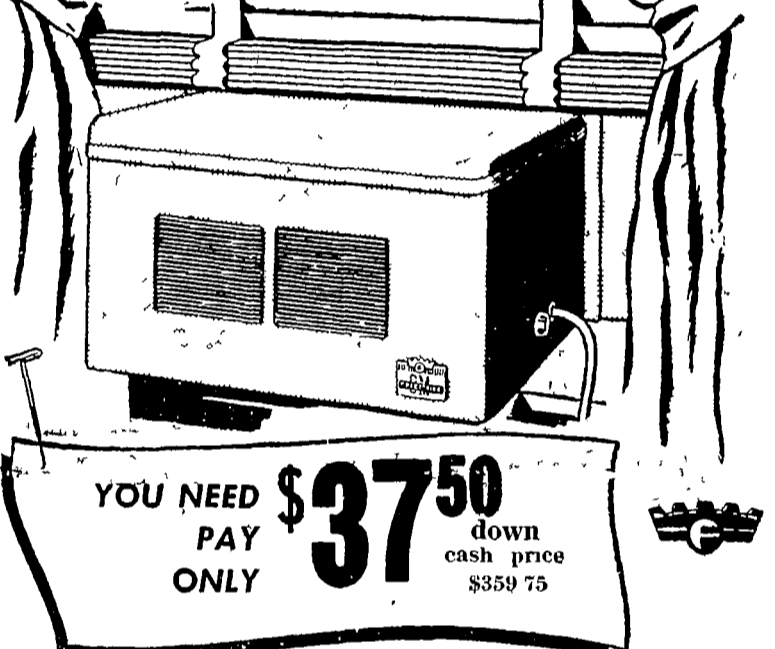

Anti-Aircraft Light Puzzles Local Public

Searchlight Of Type Used In London Air Raids Rakes Skies Here

Many Buchananites, excepting those who had witnessed London in the air raids, were mystified by a beam of light that swept the sky Friday evening for about 2 1/2 hours. The beam was made by a 60-inch searchlight brought here by the Shell Oil Company from Detroit to help Gus Fagras & Sons to celebrate the grand opening and 21st anniversary of their store.

The light was the property of the Detroit Illuminating Service. It was made by General Electric of Schenectady, N. Y., and is of the same type as the searchlights made by that company for spotting planes in air raids in many parts of the world where Americans served. The searchlight was mounted on a truck that carried generating equipment. The light operated on 78 volts, 150 amps, by means of a parabolic reflector that converged the light into one powerful beam. The operator who accompanied the equipment stated that it was rated 7 to 8 miles in carrying power but had actually been demonstrated to carry 25 miles on test between Ann Arbor and Jackson. The round ball or blob of light that terminated the rays a part of the time was caused by the light "bouncing" off low clouds.

County Ag Agent Gives Farm News The "Once Over"

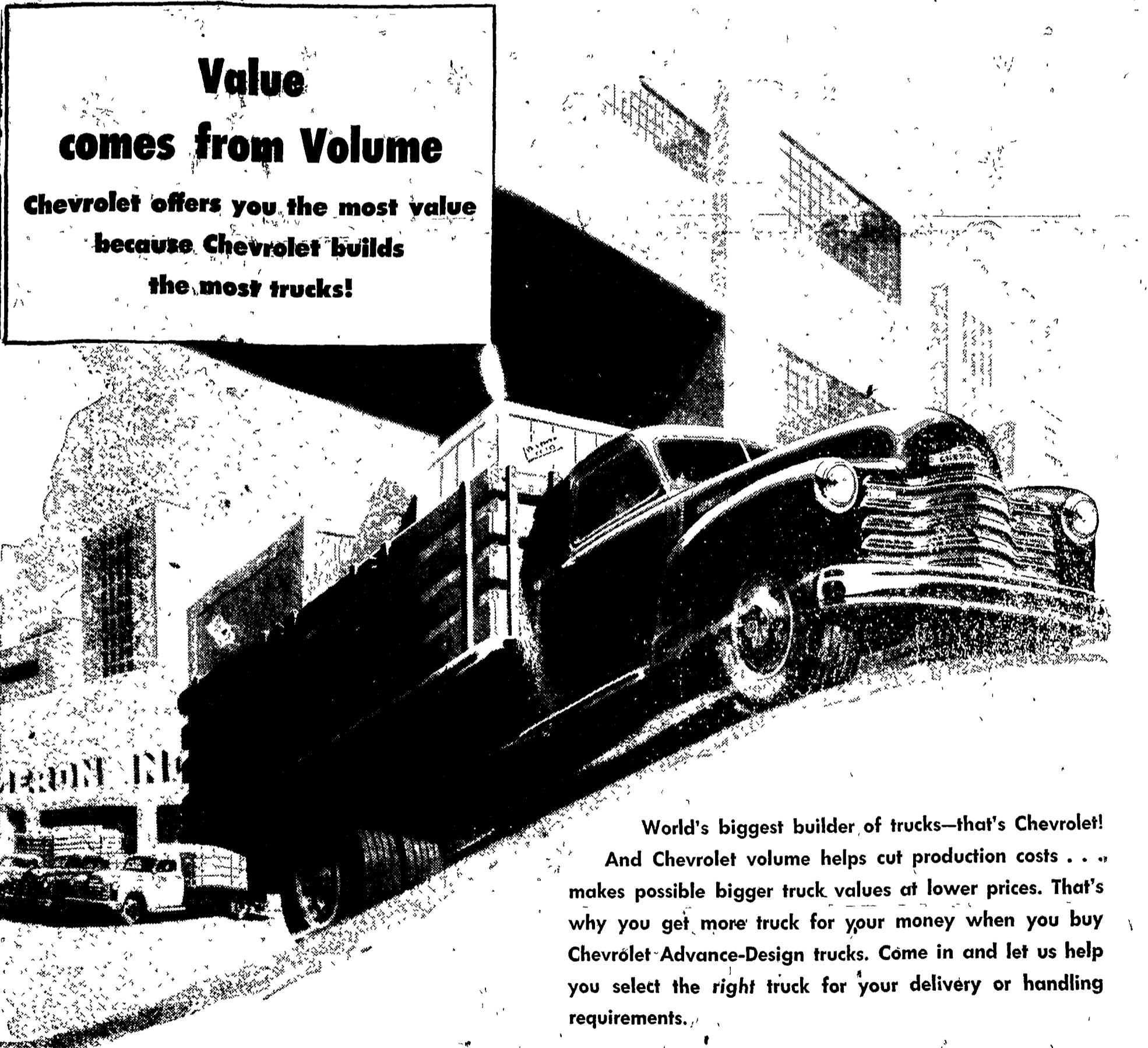

Visitors driving through Berrien county this summer have certainly seen some of the finest crops grown in this area for many years. Yields have been good on crops harvested and also look very good for fall crops. Rainfall has been sufficient to size up a very heavy set of apples, and also to keep corn growing through the hottest weather we've seen.

Charlie Smith from down south of Galien was telling me the other day that he is very pleased with the wheat, oats and hay crops this summer, and if possible, Charlie says the corn looks even better. Mr. Smith's son, Paul, who is working the farm with his father agrees one hundred percent. The Smiths are active supporters of soil conservation, dairy testing and Guernsey Breed association activities. As chairman of the Galien River Soil Conservation District, Paul extends a personal invitation to every farm owner or operator to attend the meeting on grassland farming to be held at the Harry Young farm, halfway between Niles and Buchanan at 7:00 p. m. Tuesday evening, August 23. Legume and grass silage and hay and pasture management will be featured during the evening program.

Harry Moxley, Michigan State College swine specialist, says that the use of good pasture is of great importance in pork production. One acre of good pasture, carrying 20 market hogs through the season will give a saving of from 15 to 18 bushels of corn and about 550 pounds of proteins. When good pastures are used, pigs gain about 17% faster and are ready to go to market two to three weeks earlier. With practically all economists predicting a sharp decline in hog prices in late August or September, this two or three weeks could mean a real profit increase.

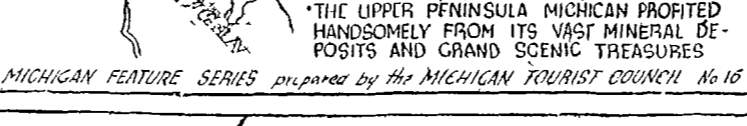

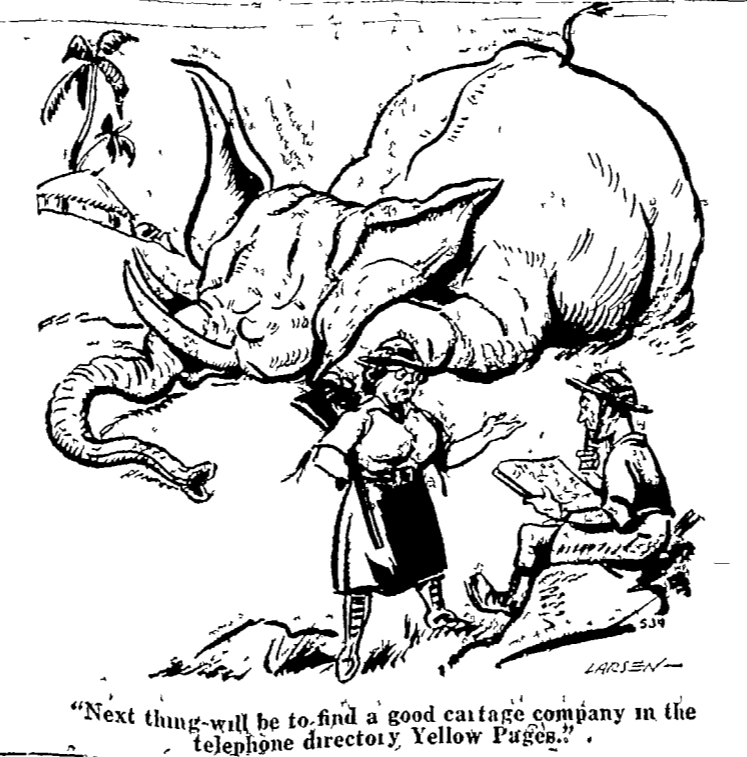

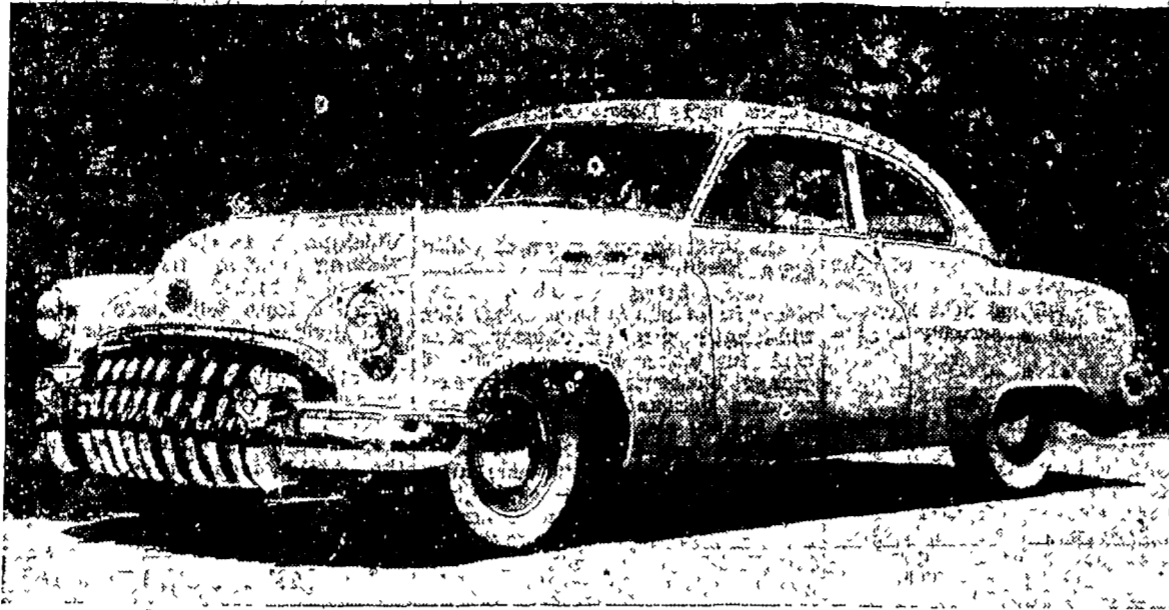

Buick Special Now On Display At Russell Garage

August To See Greatest Output In Buick's 46-Yr. History

Featured by a bumper and radiator grille design entirely new to the automobile industry, Buick's Special Series was introduced today with completely new styling and many engineering innovations. Long and sleek in appearance, the new Special is three inches shorter in over-all length on a wheelbase virtually the same as its predecessor which went out of production last December.

The new car retains the same solid, substantial appearance of its running mates—the Super and Roadmaster Series—with fundamental characteristics of Buick design presented in brand new dress. Dynaflow, Buick's torque converter transmission, is available as optional equipment.

The new series is presented in two body styles and three models—a six-passenger four-door sedan, a six-passenger two-door sedan, and a three-passenger two-door business coupe with added utility space in addition to ample luggage room in the trunk compartment.

High on the list of engineering achievements is the design of the combined bumper and grille. Developed by Buick and offered on the Special for the first time, this innovation was accomplished by placing the vertical bumper grille bars forward of the single-piece bumper.

Two bomb-shaped bumper guards, which also house the parking lamps, are mounted on the bumper.

New also are sweeping fender and body contours which individualize the Special from a styling standpoint.

The Buick centipoints, a Buick development of last year which

has been widely copied, are relocated in the Special and are oval rather than circles. They are mounted in the hood instead of in the fenders as on the Super, and Roadmaster Series.

Although the car is lower than its predecessors, Buick engineers accomplished this without sacrificing ground clearance or head room. Entrance room and leg room remain the same despite the rear seat being moved still further forward of the rear axle, providing added riding comfort for rear seat passengers. Easier parking and maneuverability are made possible by the reduced over-all length.

Many changes are incorporated in the interior of the body, most important of which is the 12 inches additional width at hip level in the rear seat. Interior appointments have been refined and the beauty enhanced by the selection of a grey stripe upholstery cloth which blends with matching colors used on the instrument panel, door trim and other painted panels.

Another important contribution to passenger comfort and safety is the introduction of a new principle in heating, ventilating and defrosting, with intake of available air being increased 83%. It incorporates a double method of heating outside air which enters through a duct behind the grille, passes through the defroster core, a water heated unit, then enters the car interior at the base of the windshield. An underset heater warms the air after it has cooled and redistributes it at floor level.

All instruments and gauges have been rearranged and are grouped on the left side of the panel with the speedometer above the steering column directly under the driver's eyes.

Underneath the lower hood is the Fireball valve-in-head straight eight engine which delivers 110 horsepower with conventional synchromesh gearshift and 120 horsepower with Dynaflow. The former has a compression ratio of 63 to 1 while the latter is 69 to 1.

The fenders themselves are one

piece and blend into the contours of the door and body in a graceful sweep to form a modernized version of the traditional full-tapered fender.

New materials and methods of installation have been combined to achieve greatly increased sound insulation. A one-inch mat, for example, is used on the dash to reduce transmission or engine sounds to a minimum.

An important contribution to riding comfort is in the change of the standard tire size from 650x16 to 760x15 in the new low pressure tire. Mounted on a rim one-half inch wider than formerly used, the new tire provides a total of 1,116 additional cubic inches of air per car. The use of the wider rim provides improvement in both directional and lateral stability.

Visibility to the driver and passengers has been greatly expanded in all directions. Windshield area has been increased 49% over the previous Special, and the rear window area has been expanded 56%. This, coupled with moving back of the windshield pillars and lowering of the hoodline, give much greater visibility and improves safety.

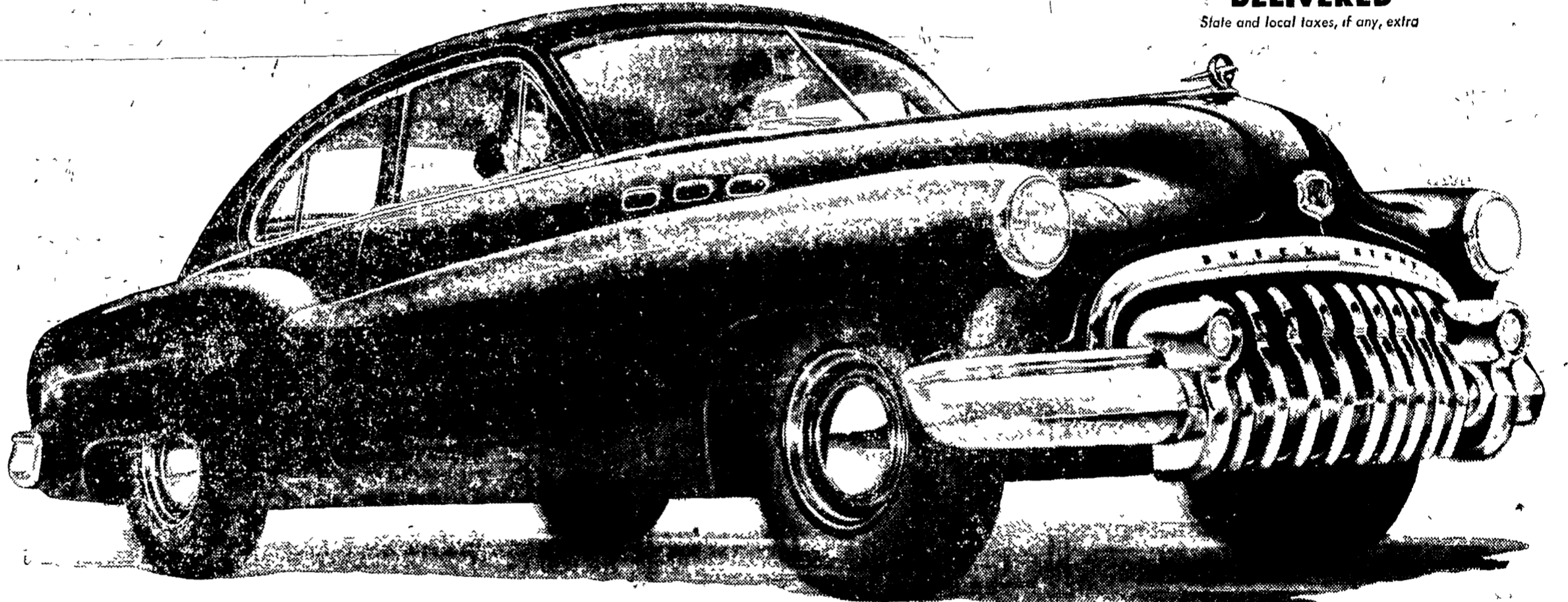
Added beauty, safety and convenience result from the use of a new type door lock and stationary handle. The lock is of the push button type while the handle blends smoothly into the door panel at both ends. The rear compartment lid emblem serves as a combination lock, emblem and handhold with which to lift the deck lid. Only a turn of the key inserted in a hidden lock in the center of the emblem is need to open the compartment.

With the Special back in the line, Buick plans expanded production for the remainder of the year using the current month of August, schedules call for the greatest output in Buick's 46-year history. In preparation for the Special many millions of dollars have been invested in new tools, dies and machinery, and new assembly lines will be used in plants located in various parts of the country.

Midshipman Ross, Annapolis, Takes Amphibious Training

John Lawton Ross, Second-Class Cadet at the U. S. Military Academy is now undergoing amphibious training at the Naval Amphibious Base, Little Creek, Va. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin T. Ross of 106 S. Detroit street.

There will be 880 Cadets and Midshipmen receiving amphibious training during the period of August 8 to 22.

Cadet Ross will have instruction divided into two phases. The shore phase will be held at the Naval Amphibious Base, Little Creek, Va., from August 8 to August 17. The afloat training will take place aboard ships of the Amphibious Force, Atlantic Fleet.

The amphibious training will include classroom presentations designed to present the art of amphibious planning and the techniques of amphibious operations, demonstrations by instructing personnel and conducted tours of installations and vessels utilized in assault landings.

The student officer will also witness the 4th Battalion of the Second Marine Division conduct a practice landing on the beaches at Little Creek. These seasoned combat veterans will establish a beachhead and give the Cadets instruction and valuable information in assault tactics.

Cadet Ross will witness and participate in the bombardment of Bloodworth Island, located in upper Chesapeake Bay. During this exercise the 4th Marines will be embarked in landing craft and advance to within 1,000 yards of the beach and return. Cadets will witness from ships of the Amphibious Force. Live supporting fire will be supplied by destroyers and Landing Ship Medium Rockets. Air support will be supplied by Air Force jets and Navy fighters and bombers.

Cadet Ross will take part in the final landing exercise at Camp Pendleton, Va. During this landing the Cadets will hit the beach and secure a beachhead. Following the assault they will witness paratroop drops of the 82nd Airborne Division and glider and helicopter resupply operations. Simulated gunfire and air support will be utilized for this landing.

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
