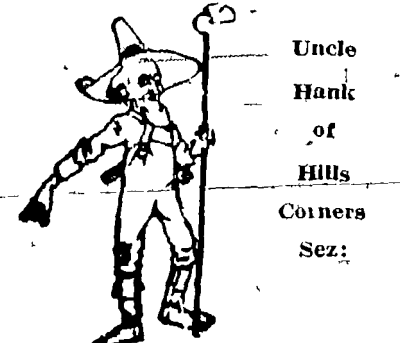

At an inquest held in the Swann Funeral Home at 8:30 p. m. Monday by County Coroner William Fitch, Carl Newsom, 19, 106 Hobart street, was absolved by a jury of six local men of responsibility for the tragic and pitiable death of 12-year-old Martha Blaine Batten, daughter of Mr and Mrs Ross Batten, 601 Days avenue, from a wound by a .22 rifle bullet about 5:30 p. m. Wednesday evening, Oct 2.

The jury included John Shanahan (foreman), Charles Babcock, Harold Boyce, Ralph Allen, E. C. Hoffman and John Ponz. Testifying were Carl Newsom, Lorraine Hanson, Police Officer Chester Shepherd, Deputy Sheriff Robert Rinke.

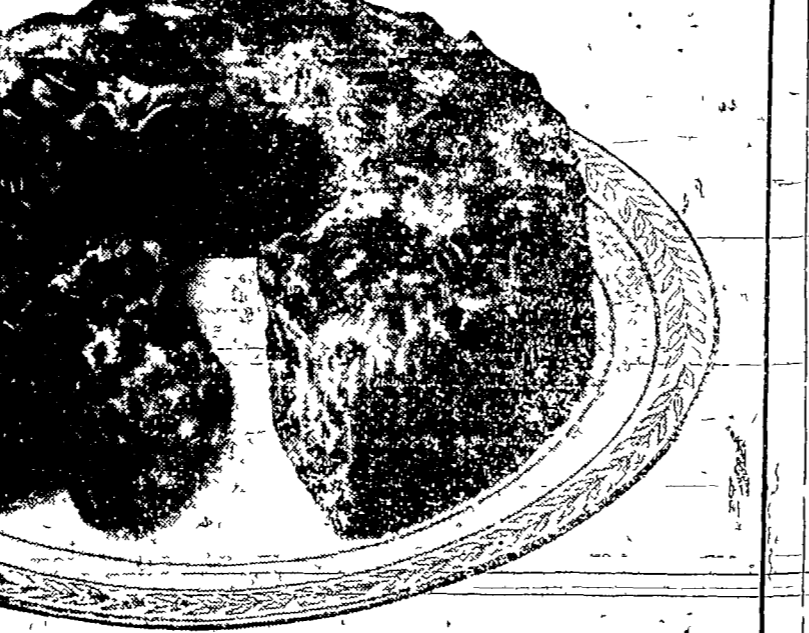

Discolored Plants

Plants discolored by yellow leaves with green veins may need iron. A cup of iron sulphate (coppers) applied to 10 square feet immediately about the plant will supply the iron which is lacking. Results should begin to show in about three or four weeks. For a slower, but more lasting effect, make a heavy application of decayed grass clippings or other decayed vegetable matter, or a cup of sulphur applied to the soil about the plant.

Foremen Must Be Leaders Of Men, Says Ken Yost

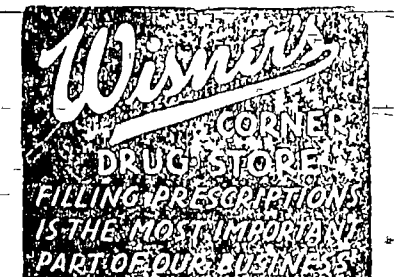

 The plant was originally designed for is only a by-product. Because they are not "orientated" in their jobs, American foremen actually waste a great deal of plant production by their rivalries with each other. Healthy competition between foremen deteriorates into antagonisms and undercutting. Not only does healthy competition break down into personal antagonisms, but they develop antagonisms between levels of management, particularly between top and lower levels of management.

The solution is to build in foremen an appreciation of the significance of their position, and a spirit of teamwork. The size of the men in foremanship must be built up to the size of their jobs, since the job cannot be cut down to fit the man. The greatest death in America, said Yost, is not any lack of physical assets but of sizeable men.

There is no lack of competent technical engineering, said Yost, but there is a lack of a beginning of the greatly-needed science of physical engineering management, especially in the level of foremanship, has to achieve the knowledge and the technique of successful human relationships. The recent crystallization of the people of the United States into

pressure groups, he said, is actually the building of group hatreds. This means national disintegration. It means the destruction of that old association in which the nation was an aggregation of competing individuals. It means wiping out our national heritage of ambition and unobstructed opportunity, he stated. And if continued it may mean the degradation of the nation among the peoples of the world.

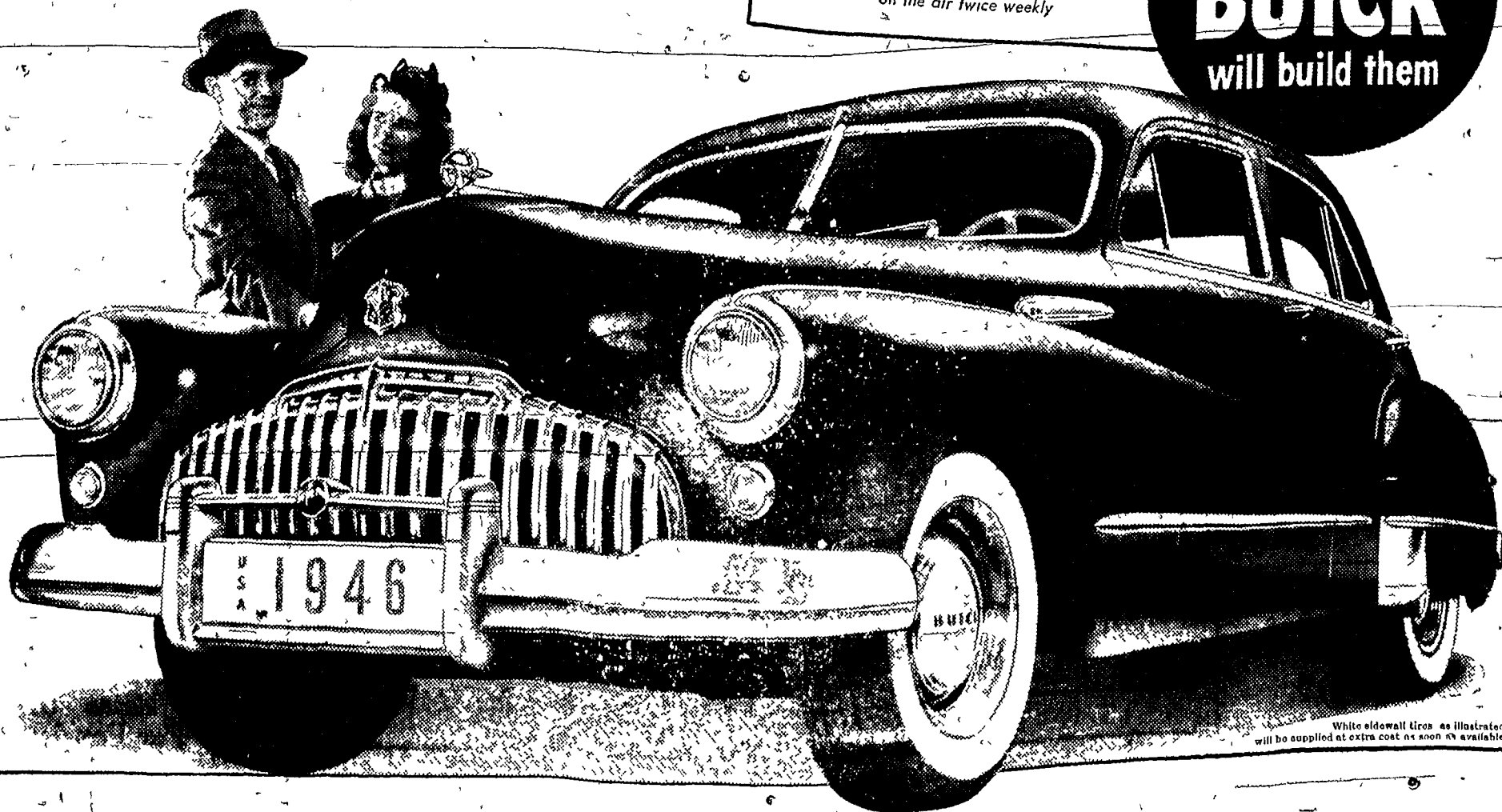

Potatoes And Hay Chief Sufferers; Corn Crop Well-Matured

The late potato harvest is starting this week with prospects for an under-normal crop because of extreme moisture shortage during nearly all of the growing period. The rainfall during July was registered at the Indiana & Michigan Electric company hydrolite plant as 6.16 inches as compared with a normal of 2.50 inches. The rainfall locally during August was 1.07 as compared with a normal of 2.37 inches. The rainfall locally during September was 1.94 as compared with a normal of 3.18 inches. The total rainfall for the three months locally was 3.97 inches as compared with a normal for that period of 8.05 inches. The precipitation during the last three months of the growing season here was accordingly only 38% or a little over one-third of normal. The average to date is even lower, as there was no rain during the first eight days of October up until Monday night. The October normal is 2.74 inches, and consequently there should have been 7.1 inches of precipitation during that period.

The frost of Sept 28 killed potato vines north and west of Buchanan but is only reported that the vines were only about 50% killed south of Buchanan, where many potatoes are grown. Consequently in that territory the potatoes are not wholly matured, however on some farms they are already being harvested.

The September and October weather to date has been ideal for the curing and ripening of corn, and in all but a few very late planted fields the crop is fully ripened. However a week of drying weather is still needed to reduce the moisture content suitable for storage.

The clover and alfalfa crops were below normal in yield in this district and pastures are correspondingly short. Farmers who have their hay fields fenced separately are now pasturing the third cutting of alfalfa. Some farmers even turned their stock in on the second crop. The September rains served to start the growth so that there is excellent pasture where it is not possible to pasture the hay crops, many farmers are now feeding their dairy herds hay and grain.

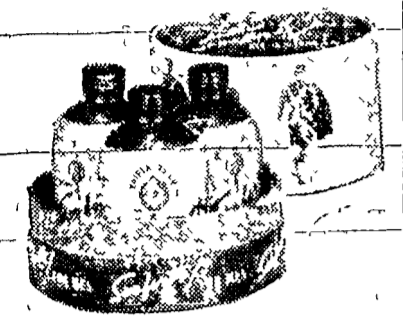
