Business Fine--Future Vague-- Say Factory Heads at B.B.A. Meet

Remarkable Rise Clark Equipment Shown In Report

Sales Peak \$130,148,000 In 1951 Is 82% Above World War II High

The Clark Equipment company achieved an all-time sales record of \$130,148,000 in 1951, far above the peaks of World War II and nearly double its sales total of \$68,603,000 during 1950.

The excellent annual report released to stockholders of the Clark Equipment company this week is something new and more than usually informative in industrial business reports.

It reveals in its many tables an eye-opening picture of the continuing growth of a company which has been uniformly successful in meeting the needs of the present and steering into the future.

Detailed tables show its growth from the time of its reorganization as the Clark Equipment company in 1917 to the present from the total sale volume of \$3,360,000 in 1917 to its record total of almost 50 times that amount in 1951.

Through the ascending production scale in the 34 intervening years successive peaks occurred during World War I and immediately after during the boom years of 1928 and 1929, World War II from 1940 to 1945 and during the record civilian production and mounting war production sales from 1947 to 1951.

In every case but that of World War II, the high peak was followed by long and considerable dips, the most extreme being from the 1929 peak of \$15,635,000 to the subsequent extreme low of \$2,855,000 in 1932.

With the aid of Land-Lease orders in 1940 the sales totals passed the 1929 peak with a total dollar return of \$18,016,000. This combination of civilian and war production mounted to the high sales mark of \$77,036,000 in 1945, approximately 82% above the peak of World War II. Higher prices accounted for some but by no means all this increase as tonnage sales were also greatly increased.

"We closed our books in 1951 on all-time production," stated President George Spatta in a recent interview with a representative of the magazine "Investor's Reader." He added, "We are projecting a very good first quarter—probably over \$35,000,000. This year we will probably not attain the \$130,000,000 level but we should make just as much money."

All these company officials gave very informative talks concerning the development of their business and their present operations. While they all talked frankly, they were nevertheless unanimous in stating that while present business is satisfactory and is likely to remain so for a time at least in the immediate future, there are too many unpredictable factors in the national and world situations for any long range forecasts.

Then presence was indicative of the excellent relationship between industry and business in Buchanan, not created by the Buchanan Business Association exactly but certainly increased during the five years of its existence, since it provided a medium of getting together.

Mr. Stark, superintendent of schools, also gave a good talk, stating that the school board expected construction might be started on the new addition to the high school during May or June, provided that no difficulties develop in the meantime.

At the present time, it was stated, Buchanan has less than 1 1/2% unemployment, compared with an average of 6 1/2% in Michigan. The unemployment here, it was further stated, mainly represents temporary lay-offs occasioned by lack of materials or other short-range causes.

Dr. J. L. Godfrey Dentist Here 45 Years, Dies At 73

Death Comes Suddenly From Embolism As He Prepares To Leave Hospital For Home

A familiar figure is lacking from Buchanan now—Doc Godfrey walking to and from his office twice daily. Doc Godfrey carefully tending his lawn and yard and beautiful garden each summer and clearing his walks in winter.

So recently has he been an apparently vigorous figure walking briskly up Front street hill, that although he lived to the age of 73, his departure seems to those who knew him intimately and unbelievably.

He came to Buchanan 45 years ago to take up the practice of dentistry and had remained here since, the lifelong solver of dental problems for many Buchanan people and for others who had left but returned here for his services. His quiet courtesy and constant good humor made him a friend of very many, whether clients or not.

Joseph L. Godfrey was born March 4, 1879, at Colon, Mich., the son of Ervin and Lydia, Godfrey. He married Effie Sellers in Buchanan. She died May 16, 1928. He is survived by one son, John S. Godfrey of Donner's Grove, Ill., by two brothers, Clara E. of Morris, Ill., and Dr. Glenn Godfrey of Colon, by two sisters, Mrs. Eva Rex of Tiffin, Ohio, and Mrs. Ma Morris of Hartland, N. Y., by one grandchild. He was a life member of Buchanan F. & A. M. No. 68, also a member of Buchanan I. O. O. F. Lodge No. 75.

He died Sunday, March 30, at the Epworth Memorial hospital in South Bend, where he had undergone surgery and had apparently made a very satisfactory recovery. He had gotten up and was walking in the hospital, expecting to be taken home in a short time, when suddenly he was stricken by a pulmonary embolism and died at once.

The funeral was held at the Swem Funeral home Wednesday, April 2, at 2 p.m. with the Rev. E. J. Carlson in charge. Burial was made in Oak Ridge cemetery, with the following acting as pallbearers: Ralph Allen, Arthur Allen, Dr. Richard Kingery, Dr. Harry Beistle, Harley Raymond, Charles Ritzler.

The Story of Buchanan

Pioneers Lived With, Laughed At And Died Of Ague

How They Mixed Mirth And Misery In Days When All Had "Shakes"

If we want a complete picture of the trials and tribulations of the pioneering days in Buchanan we cannot overlook "fever 'n' ague."

The ague, later known as malaria fever, had its epidemic periods in warm weather, particularly in late summer and early fall. As a major disease in epidemic form it was peculiar to a relatively few years previous to and following the clearing and breaking of the land. The science of medicine was then very primitive, compared with the brilliant developments since. In fact nothing was known about the nature and origin of disease.

The settlers were scourged miserably with cholera, tuberculosis, "bilious fever," "lung fever" (pneumonia) consumption (tuberculosis) and other ailments, which they accepted resignedly, as the human race had done for thousands of years. When the Black Plague swept Europe in the Middle Ages the panic-stricken people flocked in huge masses to the cathedrals and prayed for divine help, passing the contagion as they played.

So it was in the first days of Buchanan. We know that certain species of mosquitoes carry the germ of malaria. The settlers only knew that they were plagued by both ague and mosquitoes between them they were utterly unaware that mosquitoes carried malaria infection was first definitely established by Ronald Ross, an English army doctor, in 1898. Koch, the German scientist, discovered the germ of tuberculosis in 1882 and in 1883 the germ of Asiatic cholera. But in the times of settlement here the germ theory had not been established.

So it was just taken for granted that they must accept such plagues, enduring or dying. Ague was peculiarly a disease of the days of first settlement, when the universal marshes produced dense throngs of mosquitoes which the dense woods harbored during the day.

At dusk each night the throngs of germ-laden miniature dive bombers came out from under the leaves and beset the cabin dwellers. The latter set up a defense perimeter of heavy smoke "smudges," but the mosquitoes died through and made so many direct hits that they retired inside and made a smudge there, choking, eyes streaming with tears. Even there they were not immune. Some gave up on the belief that their smudges merely served as the signal for attack. Mosquito bar and screens were unknown, so they laid in hot weather under heavy covers but, according to one account, were bitten nevertheless.

It was the general belief in the earliest days, ague fever was more malignant than later. Doubtless this was because the murderous burden of work during cabin building, clearing and breaking the ground wore down their resistance. At least there were many deaths at first, but latter the attacks were very rarely fatal and became the subject of rather grim jokes.

One early comer said that he entered a small village, finding all its streets overgrown with grass. Finally finding one street that showed some traffic he followed it to the graveyard. Church bells were rung every quarter of an hour as a signal for taking guinine. One pioneer wife rigged a harness for her husband so that while he sat and shook he rocked the baby and churned butter by ague power. Sawmills were run by ague power. The new power of steam engines was beginning to replace wind power for boat navigation and water power for manufacturing.



It was suggested that ague power was cheaper, the combined energy of twenty men with "the shakes" being sufficient to power a fifty-ton vessel.

The "shakes," which were violent tremblings accompanying the chills which started the attack, were periodic. There were two different malaria germs, one with a three-day cycle, and one with a four-day cycle. The more resistant sufferers might lick the disease after the first attack, or they might go through a series of three- or four-day cycles. Or if they had been bitten by carriers of both germs, the attacks could recur every day, or two days with one day's intermission.

So, it was said, the sufferer would time his attacks and then lay out his future program accordingly. There were cases for them, well days. Ministers would schedule their meetings for shakeless intervals. Lovelorn youth would time their calls on their heart's desire for their well days, and too often find the maiden shaking so violently that the deal was off.

The attack began with a "tired" feeling during which the stricken person stretched and yawned. Then soon came the shudders of the rigors and severe chills began with "cold streaks" chasing each other up and down the sufferer's back. At the height of the paroxysm the sufferer's teeth shook so violently that, according to one quite reliable writer, they rattled the dishes in the cupboards, which were shelves resting on pegs in the log walls. If the victim tried to rough it out he would have to lean against the fence while the shakes lasted. And his reward was usually a series of continuing cycles until he gave up.

The shakes lasted an hour or more. Then the sufferer ran a temperature, as high as 105 or 106 above normal. This stage was fortunately short, lasting from ten minutes to an hour. As the temperature went down the skin became warm and flushed and after an interval from a half hour to four hours heavy sweating began and the sufferer lapsed into heavy slumber which ended the attack. As stated before, it might recur several times at intervals of one to four days, depending on the nature and extent of the infection.

The summer of 1838 was remembered long as the "sucky summer" in Michigan. That year Dr. Charles Walsh, whose cabin home was on the south side of McCoy's creek opposite and a short distance below the present (1952) disposal plant site, wrote to relatives in New York state "Ague and fever of a very malignant character prevail in all of these rich, level countries. This year has taken thousands to their long home. I mean to try this country one more year, and if we continue sickly I shall then seek for some more healthy one."

During the 1838 ague siege, which lasted from May until the succeeding January, nearly every cabin was visited and in many every member of the family was prostrated, with no one to wait.

9 Candidates Run For 3 Seats On City Commission

Special Ballot To Be Voted On Gift Land To School For Part Of New Gym Site

Qualified voters of the city of Buchanan will go to the polls Monday, April 7, to participate in the 1952 city election with indications of considerable interest in the event.

Nine candidates have qualified by petition for candidates for three vacant seats on the city commission, created by the termination of the terms of Arthur Anderson, Thomas Irvine and Goldwyn Smith. This is a record number of candidates and serves to provide the voters with an excellent choice.

The candidates who have filed include two who are running to succeed themselves, Arthur Anderson and Goldwyn Smith. The remaining are Leo D. Boyce, John F. Cress, Herbert Henderson, Clyde Lombaugh, Roland Brado, Anthony Stone, George T. Deamung. The last-named candidate, Mr. Deming, served on the city commission from 1943 to 1945. The presence of such a wide field of choice should inspire the voters to turn out in numbers and exercise their right of franchise.

In addition Fred M. Eldridge is running without opposition for reelection as constable.

There will also be a special ballot on the proposition of a gift from the city to the school board of an area of land entirely belonging to the city and including a strip of land on the west side of the present high school grounds area measuring fifty feet wide east and west and 200 feet long north and south. This includes one-half of the former right-of-way of Water street, an unused thoroughfare recently vacated as a street by the city commission. The remainder is now included in Memorial Field. The grant will extend the present high school grounds fifty feet west, the purpose of the transfer being to add to the school area ground needed for the new school gymnasium.

AN EMERGENCY ORDINANCE TO DEFINE, REGULATE AND PROHIBIT THE ERECTION, INSTALLATION, OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF GASOLINE AND OIL FILLING STATIONS AND AUTOMOBILE ACCESSORY STATIONS WITHIN THE CITY OF BUCHANAN...

Section 1 For the purpose of this Ordinance certain terms, phrases and words shall, whenever used in this Ordinance, have the meaning assigned in this Section. Terms not herein defined shall have the meanings customarily assigned to them.

PERSON: Means and includes any individual person or persons, association, partnership or corporation.
ZONING ORDINANCE Means any existing Zoning Ordinance of the City of Buchanan.

Section 2 No filling station shall be erected, operated or maintained in the City of Buchanan unless and until a permit therefor shall have been obtained from the Buchanan City Commission. Application for such permit, addressed to the City Commission, shall state the name and address of the person or persons intending to erect and operate the filling station, and shall give a description of the proposed location of the said station together with plans and specifications, showing the size location upon the property of the building, pumps and other devices. Regardless of size, all filling station construction shall conform to Type 2, Semi-Fire-Proof construction as specified in Article XIII of the Zoning Ordinance. No flammable structure shall be converted to filling station uses.

Section 5 No permit for the construction, operation or maintenance of a filling station shall be granted unless and until a proper petition therefor has been filed with the City Commission. A "proper petition" shall be signed by the owners of at least a majority of the frontage of property within a radius of two hundred feet (200 feet) of the proposed filling station, exclusive of streets, alleys, and the property proposed to be used for a filling station. To determine what property frontage is included within a radius of two hundred feet, the center shall be the midpoint of the street frontage of the property proposed to be used for a filling station.

Section 6 Any act in violation of the terms of this Ordinance is declared to be a nuisance per se. Any person violating the terms of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof before a court of competent jurisdiction he shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for each offense or shall be punished by imprisonment...

ment in the City jail or Berrien County jail for a period of not to exceed ninety (90) days for each offense, or both such fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the court. Each day that a violation of this Ordinance shall constitute a separate offense.

Lions Complete 440-Yard Running Track, Memorial Field

\$6,000 Track At Only \$800 Outlay Donated To City

Many Companies, Firms, Persons Donate Labor And Equipment; All Cash, 426 Hours Labor By Lions Club Members

The 1952 Buchanan high school track squad are now sinking their spikes in a new track on Memorial Field, thanks to the energy and public spirit of the Lions club and a number of other individuals and companies which contributed work, equipment and materials. The track is an elongated oval around the football field, 440

yards long with an extension at the northeast corner for a 220-yard straightaway. The finish line for all races is in front of the stadium.

The track was carefully built in accordance with specifications for a good track but it will not be at its best until it is packed and settled by time and use. In it the Lions and their co-operators put man and equipment hours and materials estimated at not less than \$6,000 with a cash outlay of only \$800, none of which was charged against the taxpayer.

A total of 470 man-hours went into the work, of which 420 were contributed by Lions club members and 50 by non-Lions. In addition 190 truck hours were donated by non-Lions. Legislative News Letter

(Courtesy of Don R. Peairs, Representative from 1st Dist., Berrien County.)

Keeping up to schedule set a year ago, the House met the Wednesday, March 26, deadline of reporting out of committee, all bills that have any hope of passage this session (Bills in the Taxation and the Ways & Means committees are exempt from this rule.) This resulted in a renewed and stepped up activity with 48 bills and six resolutions coming out of House committees Tuesday and Wednesday to add to the already heavy calendar.

The House considered only a relatively small number of bills on Third Reading, devoting most of its time early in the week to meeting and recessing so committees could be receiving messages from the Senate and debating bills on General Orders.

We passed and transmitted to the Senate, the School Aid Bill of \$107,427,217.00. Also passed were bills increasing the per diem pay of members of the Cosmetology Board from \$10 to \$15, require registration of transient guests by operators of tourist homes, camps, cabins or trailer courts, and a bill to increase the annual salary of Supreme Court Justices from \$15,000 to \$18,500 a year.

This latter bill was previously passed by the Senate with the annual salary increased to \$20,000. (Refusal of the Senate to concur in the House amendment, and the House insisting on the \$18,500 figure, will all go to conference committee.)

Following a very heated debate, the House killed a resolution mentioned in a previous letter, calling upon Congress to submit to the Federal constitution relative to taxation.

The House adopted a Senate Concurrent Resolution providing for recessing between the hours of 11:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. on April 11 (the date set for the adjournment of this session of the Legislature) to permit observance of Good Friday.

The House appropriated a total of \$323,209,452 for general purpose general fund money in addition to capital outlay of \$9,159,159.00 for total of \$332,368,611 of general fund money recommended by the two finance committees, are now out on the floor of either the House or Senate for action, and although this total amount is 22 million dollars less than the budget recommended by the Governor, it represents an increase of \$21,590,059 over the appropriations for the same purpose a year ago included in the total above is the \$107,427,217 school aid money, and \$14,494,343 to retire soldiers' bonus bonds.

Of the above mentioned bills, the House has passed and transmitted to the Senate, the school aid bill as previously stated, as well as a bill appropriating \$6,633,798 for departments and purposes related to conservation, recreation and agriculture.

The House has also considered on General Orders and advanced to Third Reading, appropriation bills for the State Police and departments relating to public safety and defense, \$12,260,643, general government departments, commissions, boards and agencies, \$12,496,686, and regulatory services, \$6,826,007.

Also advanced to Third Reading in the House is the restricted fund bill totaling \$157,943,469 which is the highway trunk line money and the game and fish protection fund.

A deficiency bill in the amount of \$4,721,818 has been introduced in the Senate which will take care of the increased cost of food and clothing at the various state institutions, \$1.2 million dollars to supplement former appropriations for homestead tax exemption claims, and a \$500,000 supplemental appropriation for State at-large tuberculosis patients.

Also introduced in the Senate is a bill appropriating some \$21,885,400 for mental hospital building program. If the bill is given legislative approval, it will make a total of approximately 45 million dollars which has now been appropriated for mental hospital construction from the 65 million dollar bond issue voted by the people.

With the Democratic county conventions being held Monday evening, March 31, a long weekend is in prospect as the House adopted a concurrent resolution providing for adjournment from Friday until Tuesday to permit non-county party members to attend their county conventions. Senate concurrence is expected.


