Gets Doll Made By Son Mrs. Hosea Coultas, 112 Smith street, has received a novel gift in the form of a "looper" doll, from her son, Hilmer Coultas, who has been in the station hospital at the Army Air Base Dyersburg, Tenn., made by him while convalescing under the instruction of a Red Cross recreation director. He accompanied the gift by a copy of the air base paper, "Vox Prop," which contained two pictures of himself and a fellow patient making the dolls and showing at a Red Cross exhibit.

A "looper" doll is akin in many ways to a rag doll, except that it isn't made of rags, but of loopers. Loopers are the salvaged tops of cotton and rayon stockings, cut off at the factory, rolled, cut open and dyed.

The patient setting out to make a looper doll for wife, daughter, girl friend or mother, first makes a weaving frame with nails and a square frame of wood, the loopers being woven in this frame.

After about four hours of weaving the patient will have made enough squares of varied hues and design to start the work of putting the doll together. The finished doll represents about eight hours of work and is usually as attractive as though made professionally.

Chuck Leazenby Gets High Honor As Aerial Gunner

Distinguished Flying Cross Added to Aid Medal and Oak Leaf Clusters

An Eighth AAF Bomber Station, England—Veteran of 10 months' aerial combat as a Flying Fortress waist gunner, S/Sgt. Charley O. Leazenby, of 303 Miller St., Buchanan, Mich., has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross in the European theatre of operations.

Sgt. Leazenby won the DFC for "extraordinary achievement" during 25 combat missions over enemy-occupied territory. He also holds the Aid Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters.

Assigned to the lead crew of his squadron, Sgt. Leazenby has flown the majority of his many missions in the lead ship of his group formation. Most of his missions were accomplished aboard the Fortress "Martha II" and "Rotherhith's Revenge."

Though he has been to Berlin twice and has participated in attacks on Stuttgart, Emden, Mannheim and other vital German cities, Sgt. Leazenby was most impressed by seeing Hamburg, Germany, converted into a raging inferno by tons of American incendiary bombs.

"Hamburg was a mass of flames and smoke from one end of the city to the other," he said. "I didn't see how anything could be left alive down there."

Returning from Stuttgart, his Fortress "Martha II" ran low on gasoline and lost altitude all the way across the English Channel. When the pilot eased the big bomber in for an emergency landing at an RAF fighter base just inside the coast, two of the four engines sputtered and died from lack of fuel.

Sgt. Leazenby has had one close call. During an attack on Emden, an explosive bullet from a German fighter blew up just behind him in the waist. He and the other waist gunner were hurled to the floor by the concussion, but neither was injured.

Son of Mr and Mrs Ralph Leazenby, Sgt. Leazenby is a former employee of the Clark Equipment Co., Buchanan. He has two brothers also in uniform, Pfc. James Leazenby with the Field Artillery in Northern Ireland, and S/Sgt. Ross Leazenby is serving with the U. S. Navy Seabees.

Sgt. Leazenby enlisted May 1, 1942, and was sent to Jefferson Barracks, Mo., for basic training. He then attended air mechanic's school at Chanute Field, Ill., and Boeing Specialist School at Seattle, Wash.

He completed aerial gunnery training at Wendover Field, Utah, and won his wings and a promotion to sergeant there Jan. 9, 1943. After combat training at Blythe, Calif., Pyote, Tex., and Dahart, Tex., he flew overseas to join his present outfit in June, 1943.

Jesse F. Viele, Former Business Man Here, Dies

Jesse F. Viele, 69, former Buchanan business man and longtime resident of this community, died at his home at Crane's Nest, 4 1/2 miles north of Buchanan on the Berrien Springs stone road at 5 50 a. m. yesterday (May 24) following a short illness.

He was born in Monroe, Mich., Feb. 24, 1875, the son of William and Mary A. Viele. As a boy he moved with his people to Chicago as a young man, entering the Kent Law School. After studying law here and one-half year at the University of Michigan, he was admitted to the bar and went to the Upper Peninsula in Michigan, where for twelve years he conducted a vacation resort. He married Beatrice Mansfield in Buchanan Dec. 31, 1908.

They moved to Buchanan to live in 1917. In 1921 he bought the Hotel Rex (now the Hotel Buchanan), which he conducted twelve years, selling it in 1933. He had worked for the past two and one-half years preceding his death.

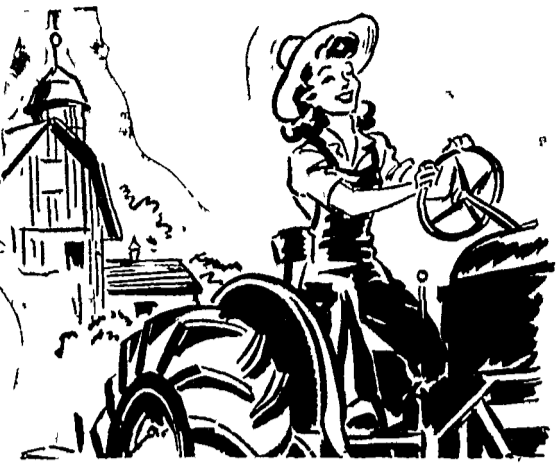

Judge Malcolm Hatfield today announced that he would seek re-election on the non-partisan judicial ticket as judge of the Berrien County Probate and Juvenile Court.

Although Judge Hatfield has done a splendid piece of work in reorganizing and operating the probate division of his Court, these accomplishments are known to few persons outside Berrien County. However, his work with emotionally maladjusted youngsters and problem parents soon caught the attention of the press of the nation and as a result many mag-

azines and newspaper articles have been written concerning his accomplishments. One such article was selected by General Theodore Roosevelt and the Staff of Readers' Digest for publication in the Reader's Digest Reader.

Another honor which came to Judge Hatfield was when he was chosen along with Father E. J. Flanagan, Raymond Moley, Major George Fielding Eliot and Will Durant to lecture on the famous Town Warming program. This resulted from the fact that his publisher permitted hundreds of religious, agricultural and trade magazines and weekly newspapers in all parts of the nation to carry excerpts from his book "Children in Court."

While Judge Hatfield has received many attractive offers to leave the bench, he prefers to remain in Berrien County and continue the task he has undertaken. Furthermore, as large numbers of juveniles will continue to pass through the courts as a result of the general unrest caused by the war, Judge Hatfield realizes that experienced judges will be needed as never before during the trying months ahead.

born in Oronoko township and was educated in the grade and high school there. He was with the New York Central Railroad a number of years, and when World War No. 1 broke out he was with

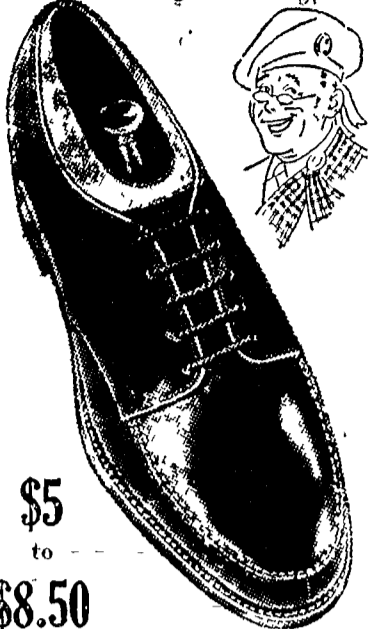

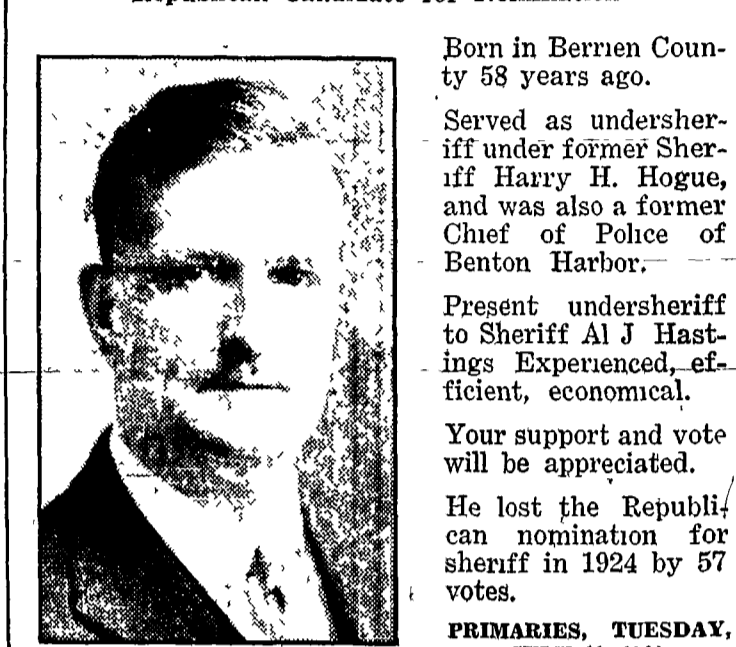

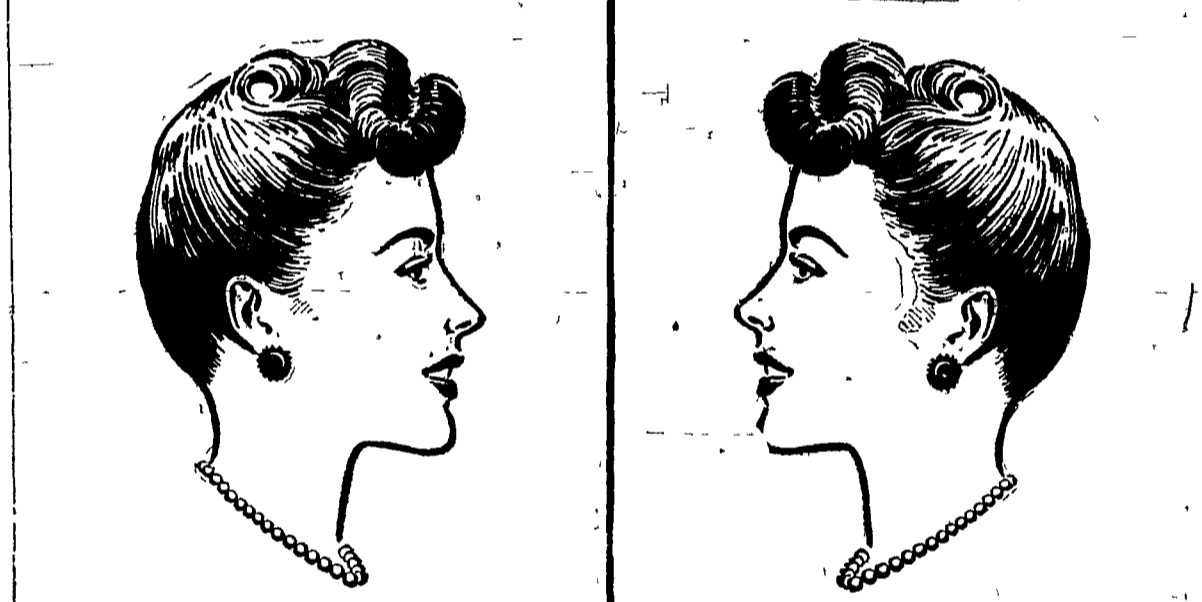
