Ample Fresh Fruits Available Over U. S.

New York, N. Y. - Late crops of fresh fruits and vegetables will do much toward relieving any scarcity of other food items during the coming winter... This is the view expressed by Harry A. Baum, general manager of A & P's produce-buying operations, based on latest reports from the U. S. department of agriculture, and from the company's field men in all parts of the country... "The outlook is encouraging," Baum said. "The orange crop gives promise of being ahead of last year's heavy production. The nation's grape supply will be a record one, with plenty remaining for domestic needs after a larger proportion of the crop is processed for war needs. The yield of other fruits is below that of a year ago, but most of these there will be a fair supply... "The vegetable situation is good, particularly with regard to basic vegetables which are most essential from a nutritional standpoint. The potato crop indicates a record increase of 90,000,000 bushels over last year... "The outlook for other major vegetables is promising. Acreage and growing conditions point to large yields of sweet potatoes, cabbage, lettuce and late carrots. Some smaller truck crops and less essential vegetables will show decreases from last year's large production, but on the whole will approach normal yields of the past few years... "Feasible, an important substitute for meats in providing protein, are expected to surpass last year's 2,500,000,000-lb production by 260,000,000 lbs. The peach crop is estimated 25 per cent larger than that of last season... Star Shells Star shells are shot from guns and then drift down suspended from parachutes.

Section 2. The Buchanan Public Library Board shall have full power to control the premises which the institution occupies, whether by title or rental... Section 3. The Buchanan Public Library Board shall have full power to receive, control and administer all funds or other assets derived from gifts or bequests, and to administer funds in trust for the benefit of the institution... Section 4. The Buchanan Public Library Board shall have within its jurisdiction the purchase of sites for a library building and to determine and to carry out plans for the erection of such building whenever funds for such construction may be available, with the proviso that arrangements for such construction shall be subject to the review of the City Commission... Section 5. The Buchanan Public Library Board shall have power to determine the form of its internal organization and to elect such officers as it determines to be necessary, and to define the powers and duties of such officers...
