THE SHOE IS ON THE OTHER FOOT

In this section of this week's Record is a small story which, on first reading, probably won't generate much excitement among the members of our generation. And, this only proves that first impressions do not always count.

For years, we have urged our young people to "get involved", to be responsible, to take an active part in civic activities, and on "ad invitum".

Well, a group of these same young people have taken our pleadings at face value and have, in a sense, put the shoe on the other foot — now they are asking for our involvement, they want us to take an active part. For the life of me, I can't see how we can, in good conscience, refuse them.

On their own initiative, this group of senior students sought out Ellis May, assistant, high school principal.

Their purpose in this meeting was two fold: they wanted summer activities for their age group and they were seeking meaningful community involvement, not only for them but for underclassmen, as well.

As they put it, they wanted to achieve — on their own. Yes, they plan to call on adults, but primarily as resource people. And, achieve they have.

They have set up a formal committee, formulated some basic long-range goals and are setting out to realize these goals.

Their first project is a dance this Saturday evening in the high school study hall. Calling on adult resource people, but doing the work themselves, they have made arrangements for the hall, ordered the necessary items of sustenance (coke, and the works), hired the band and set up their own publicity.

Long range goals include more dances during the summer vacation, making available volunteers to help in the summer recreation program at the high school and at Memorial park, setting up of specialized recreation programs for the summer and working toward the re-opening of the Youth Council.

While the youth would seem to be working for themselves, in reality it is we adults who will be the biggest benefactors. "We want to show the older generation we can be a force for good in our town," said one teenager, "but, at the same time, we want to know they care — and," he continued, "we want them to join with us."

A young girl chimes in, "We would be tickled if the parents would come up and try our dance." "Yeh," said another, "we think it would be great if they'd care enough to join with us, have fun, laugh with us and socialize with us."

And yet another, "We'd even try their round and square dancing, if they'd try ours."

These young people are, in their way, making a sincere effort to bridge the "generation gap." To us they offer their culture, the one thing that makes them individuals apart from everyone else. As corny as it may sound, they are offering their greatest possession.

To bridge the gap requires an exertion of force from two directions. See SCOTTY, Page 3.

Gnodtke To Challenge Pears For House Seat

William Gnodtke, 311 W Fourth St., today announced that he has filed as a Republican candidate for State Representative from the 43rd district. Gnodtke, a well known druggist in Buchanan for 26 years, is currently a sales representative for Wallace Investments of South Bend.

In his bid for the seat, Gnodtke will challenge Don R. Pears, who served in the post for six terms from 1951 to 1962, and was defeated in a bid for the congressional post held by Edward Hutchinson (R-Mich). He was again elected to the state house seat in 1964 and successfully sought reelection in 1966. He was named Speaker of the House in 1959 and 1961.

Gnodtke has been a member of the Berrien County Board of Supervisors since 1957. In this period he has served as County Board chairman for two years, served four years on the Finance committee, has been chairman of both the Salary and Legislative committees, and has served on the Equalization committee.

Sees Bureaucratic Danger — In making his announcement, Gnodtke said he was vitally interested in keeping governmental control at the local level. "We are constantly in danger of being swallowed up by the federal government. A dynamic state government is the last stop-gap between the people and the federal government. We must reverse the alarming current trend and return our government to being of the people, by the people and for the people."

"I believe that my knowledge of the problems of local government and the people it represents," Gnodtke continued, "will allow me to better represent the

CRISIS FACES SCHOOL BOARD

Waste Disposal Plagues Galien Elementary Plans

The Galien school board learned Monday night that it may not be able to open the new elementary school addition unless a solution can be reached with the Department of Conservation regarding the waste disposal system.

Law Is Specific — According to Fred Graeber of Maurer, VanRyn, Ogden and Natall, architects, the Department of Public Health and the Water Resources commission has no alternative under the law, but to delay the project unless certain conditions are met. At the present time the school is served by eight septic tanks, which dump their effluent into the village of Galien storm sewer system, this in turn empties into the Galien river. Because of the remodeling program, the State of Michigan agencies have to approve the system.

"One solution to the problem is to spend \$12,823 for a sand filter system which would be good for only 5 to 10 years," Graeber told the board. "Another alternative is to seek a temporary waiver of the order so that other methods can be explored. Recently a northern Indiana school had to spend over \$30,000 for a complete disposal system," he added.

The board went on record to seek the temporary waiver because of the added financial burden a sand filter type or other method of disposal system would place on the district. A resolution was passed to request a waiver until September 1, 1969 and also that the Galien schools will pursue, with vigor, the urging of the village of Galien to install a suitable sewage disposal system.

Union Election Set — The school board was informed that a recertification union election would be held for all cooks, custodians and bus drivers Friday, June 21, from 11:30 until 1:00 p.m. on whether the non-professional employees still desire to be represented by the Building Service International union.

Discuss Proper Dress — For almost three hours the school board met in closed-door session with Mrs. Robert Marshall concerning proper school dress. No decision was reached by the board during the session.

Accept New Program

The members of the school board accepted a continuous reading program at the Moccasin school.

In September, the primary reading program at the school will be an organizational arrangement in grades 1, 2, and 3 to provide continuous reading growth. At that time, students will continue working from where they stopped in June. Each child will master required skills before being advanced to a new learning step.

Under this plan, according to Richard Dougherty, assistant superintendent of schools, no student will pass or fail. "He will, hopefully," said Dougherty, "encounter only continuous and successful learning."

Other Action

In other business, the Board accepted the report of election canvassers who named Gordon Schneider and David L. Hanson as successful candidates to fill the two four year terms on the Board and June Wessendorf as the successful candidate to fill out the unexpired two year term on the Board.


—received Acceptance of Office forms from the newly elected Board Members and certified their election.

Buchanan Man Arrested For Rural Burglary

State Police of the Niles post arrested Delmas Wayne Shumaker, 18, Rt. 1, Mend road, Tuesday evening, on a warrant obtained from the county prosecutor for breaking and entering of an unoccupied building.

On Wednesday, June 12, State Police received a complaint that the home of Phillip Whittier of Glendora road had been broken into and a chest of assorted mechanic's tools stolen.

Troopers sought the warrant for Shumaker Monday following their investigation of the incident.

When arraigned before Niles Municipal Judge Edwin Donahue, Shumaker demanded examination and bond, set at \$500, was not furnished. He was remanded to the custody of sheriff's deputies and returned to the county jail.

Shumaker, at the time of his arrest Tuesday, was serving a four-day jail sentence handed down by Justice of the Peace Harold Jackson Saturday.

Buchanan city police arrested Shumaker shortly after 6:30 p.m. Saturday on Terre Coupe road when he was observed driving an automobile without license plates. Further investigation revealed he could produce no proof of insurance coverage for the 1957 auto he was driving.

His car was impounded and he was taken before Justice Jackson and fined \$15 and costs for his lack of insurance and \$25, costs and the four-day jail term for driving without plates.

Date of his examination has not been set.

Mrs. Glenn (Gertrude) Hushower, 54, 514 Michigan St., was fatally injured Tuesday evening, shortly before 8 o'clock, in a two-car crash at the intersection of the M-60 bypass and Portage Road, southwest of Niles.

She was pronounced dead on arrival at Niles' Pawating hospital by County Medical Examiner John R. Bruni who attributed death to multiple internal injuries.

Riding With Husband — Mrs. Hushower was a passenger in an automobile driven by her husband, Glenn, 58.

According to State Police troopers Larry Harju and Louis Frizzell of the Niles post, Hushower, northbound on Portage road, was crossing the divided highway and had stopped for the yield sign at the north side of the bypass median.

The officers said their investigation showed that Hushower proceeded to cross the westbound M-60 lane, apparently not seeing a car driven by Michael J. Totten 20, 1309 Oak St., Niles. The Totten auto struck the Hushower car at the door of the passenger's side.

Leaves Roadway — After the crash, officers said the Hushower car traveled more than 150 feet from the roadway, coming to rest at the front door of the Gillette Fruit farm sales stand, located at the northwest corner of the intersection.

Totten was taken to Pawating hospital where he was treated for a bruised knee. Kelly Patrick, 18, 2440 Rebecca Lane, Niles, a passenger in the Totten car, was also treated for bruises. Hushower, also taken to the Niles hospital, required no treatment.

Troopers Harju and Frizzell are continuing their investigation of the crash.

Buchanan Native — Gertrude Elsie Hushower was born in Buchanan, Dec. 31, 1913, the daughter of the late Clyde and Ella Bristol. She was married to Glenn L. Hushower in St. Joseph, Sept. 22, 1934.

Mrs. Hushower is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Joanne Siefert, El Monte, Calif.; three sisters, Mrs. Bernice Rolif and Mrs. Shirley Benson of Buchanan and Mrs. Betty Bauch of South Bend. A brother, Ellsworth Bristol of Buchanan and three grandchildren also survive.

Services will be held Friday, June 21, at 2 p.m. in the Swem Funeral home with Joe R. Johnson, pastor of the Church of Christ of Buchanan, officiating. Interment will be in Oak Ridge cemetery.

Julian Hughes Seeks New Seat On County Bench

Julian E. Hughes, former Berrien County Probate Judge and a practicing attorney in St. Joseph has announced his candidacy for the office of Circuit Judge for Berrien county.

Hughes, 46, was judge of Probate court from 1956 to 1964. He did not seek reelection in 1964 and has been in private practice since.

In making his announcement, Hughes said, "I wish to announce my candidacy for the office of Circuit Judge for Berrien County. This is a personal decision based on the belief that I have the necessary background and experience to properly fulfill the requirements of this important judicial office."

The bench seat sought by Hughes was created under a new state law signed by the governor, June 12, giving the county a third circuit bench.

The entry by Hughes was the first since the proposed office was created. Hughes and his wife, Evelyn J., have four children, Brad 16, Jeffrey 13, Rob 8 and Thomas 6. They live at 176 Higan Park, Benton Harbor.

ten years in his present post. In announcing his candidacy, Griese said he will continue to provide the county with good law enforcement within the limits of manpower and equipment made available to the department.

During the ten years he has been in office, complaints made to the department have increased from 6,800 in 1957 to almost 12,000 in 1968.

As a part of department reorganization, the Sheriff's Substation, located in Buchanan, was replaced with a "zone" organization which divides the county into five areas, each assigned a patrol car during each tour of duty. Griese made no comment on the reestablishment of the south county substation in his announcement Friday.

OFFICIAL MINUTES

Bd. of Education School District No. 61

The regular meeting of the Board of Education, District No. 61, Berrien County, Buchanan Public Schools, was called to order at 7:30 p.m. on June 17, 1968, at the High School building Members present Mr. Ellis, Mr. Harker, Mr. Schneider, Mr. Stout, Mr. Post, Mr. Flennar, and Mrs. Wessendorf. Absent None. The President recognized Mr. David Hanson, newly elected Board member, and welcomed him to the Board of Education. Mr. Stout requested that the 'May minutes be changed to read, "two half scholarships to Interlochen be awarded band members." No monetary stipulation would be made hereafter. Mrs. Wessendorf requested that the experimental curriculum budget item be stipulated to read, "not to exceed one thousand dollars." The minutes of the May Board meeting were approved with these corrections.

A letter of resignation was read from Mr. Donald W. Reed, Ottawa School Principal, effective June 17, 1968. Motion by Mr. Post, seconded by Mr. Harker, that Mr. Reed's resignation be accepted. Unanimously carried. Motion by Mr. Schneider, seconded by Mr. Post, that bills in the amount of \$220,617.85, of which \$197,907.30 is for salaries, be approved. Unanimously carried.

Motion by Mr. Stout, seconded by Mr. Post, that the report of the Board of Canvassers for the June 10, 1968, annual school election be accepted as read. Unanimously carried. The report indicated 718 votes were cast for the 4-year term with two members to be elected. Gordon Schneider received 264 votes and David Hanson received 222, votes, winning the two offices. For the two year unexpired term, 366 votes were cast with June Wessendorf receiving 362 to win that seat on the Board. Mr. Bailey informed the Board that the Affidavits of Acceptance from the three newly elected Board members have been received and will be placed on file.

Mr. Stout, seconded by Mr. Flennar, presented the following resolution: RESOLVED: That the School Board for the Buchanan Public Schools takes this opportunity to officially record its appreciation of, and thanks for, the many years of loyal and conscientious service to the school children of Buchanan, Michigan school district by Mrs. Goldie Rotzlen, Mrs. Margaret Snyder, and Mr. Lawrence Decker, who retired at the close of the school term this month. Mrs. Rotzlen having taught in the Buchanan area school system for eleven years and elsewhere for seventeen years, Mrs. Snyder having taught eighteen years in the Buchanan school system and elsewhere for eighteen and one-half years, and Mr. Decker having taught in the Buchanan school system for twenty four years and elsewhere for fifteen years.

RESOLVED FURTHER: That the Secretary of the Board be, and hereby is, directed to present each of the aforementioned teachers a certified copy of this resolution as an expression of the Board's appreciation and thanks and best wishes to each of them. Ayes Members: Ellis, Harker, Schneider, Stout, Post, Flennar, and Wessendorf. Nays: Members: None. Resolution declared adopted by an affirmative vote of the seven Board members present. At the recommendation of the High School Principal, Mr. Trull, motion by Mr. Harker,

seconded by Mr. Schneider, that three half scholarships be granted school publication members to attend a summer workshop in Journalism at the University of Michigan. The three students designated to attend are: Greer Vastine, Deborah Sands, and James Hagey. Unanimously carried.

Mr. Dougherty announced the hiring of Mr. Norman Kiesger, Assistant Superintendent, Business Affairs.

A Notice of Final Hearing from the County Tax Allocation Board was read. Results of said meeting allocated a maximum tax rate of 9.00 mills for the Buchanan School District as opposed to 9.05 mills previously allocated, the 05 mills being deducted to establish a county based computing center.

The Municipal Finance Commission approved the transfer of \$1,217.70 from the Kansas Debt Retirement Fund to the Buchanan Public Schools Debt Retirement Fund.

Motion by Mr. Stout, seconded by Mr. Flennar, that the Industrial Appraisal Company be instructed to appraise the school property at a fee of \$960 plus \$86 for the first year's service. Unanimously carried.

Mr. Dougherty presented a proposal for a continuous reading program to be initiated at the Moccasin Elementary School in grades 1, 2, and 3 this coming school year. Motion by Mr. Post, seconded by Mr. Stout, that such a program be instituted. Unanimously carried.

The summer library program which will operate at the Moccasin Elementary School for two mornings a week for six weeks this summer was discussed and approved.

Mr. Dougherty presented three proposals of the Curriculum Council. Motion by Mr. Schneider, seconded by Mr. Harker, that Proposal I (a change in the report card for grades 1-3) be adopted. Unanimously carried. Proposal II (the report of the Industrial Arts Department) was tabled until the July meeting. Proposal III (the Houghton-Mifflin series, English for Meaning, be purchased for grades 1-6, and the combination history-geography textbook, Mankind in Time and Place, from Silver Burdette be purchased for grades 4-6) was unanimously carried upon a motion by Mr. Stout, seconded by Mrs. Wessendorf.

Motion by Mr. Stout, seconded by Mr. Post, that the Board of Education commend the Curriculum Council for its fine job of reviewing various portions of the curriculum this year and for its future plans. Unanimously carried. Gifts were presented as follows: \$268.04 from the disbanded High School PTA, \$30 for the elementary schools from the Buchanan 30 Club, and \$30 for the secondary school from the Buchanan 30 Club. Motion by Mrs. Wessendorf, seconded by Mr. Post, that these gifts be accepted with appreciation and the administration be authorized to apply these gifts as requested by the donors. Unanimously carried.

The Buchanan Co ops presented to the Buchanan High School Agriculture Department the use of 5 acres of their new farm as a land laboratory. Motion by Mr. Harker, seconded by Mr. Schneider, that the use of this land be accepted, and the Secretary of the Board be instructed to write a letter of appreciation to the Buchanan Co ops. Unanimously carried.

A statement was read from the Hanlin Rifenberg Agency informing the Board that liability coverage is afforded the school for the land rental program. The Superintendent's annual report was read by Mr. Bailey. The President of the Board expressed appreciation for the many years of service given to the school by Mr. Bailey, and appreciation to Mr. Harker as he retires from the Board of Education. Meeting adjourned at 9:30 p.m.



He and Dr. Dick Jochems are carrying on a campaign to warn parents of the danger of children becoming involved with rabid animals during the summer months.

City Health Officer Cites Rabies Danger

"Now that school is out and children are on vacation, the hazard of wild animal bites is greatly increased." This is the warning of Dr. Dick G. Jochems, Buchanan city health officer.

"All citizens," said Dr. Jo-

chems, "should be aware of the danger of rabies infection." He pointed out that parents should caution their children not to pick up any stray or wild animal. While rabies is most often associated with dogs, other domestic and wild creatures even those as small as cats and chipmunks, can be carriers of the virulent infection.

"Wild animals in a healthy state will normally avoid humans," the doctor explained, "it is usually when they are ill that they can be approached and handled. A sick or injured animal is dangerous to handle," he warned.

If a child is bitten by an animal, Dr. Jochems advises the wound should be thoroughly washed with soap and water, followed by an application of a good antiseptic. He pointed out this procedure applies to small wounds as well as serious ones, since all bites present the danger of infection.

After cleansing the wound, the following steps should be taken:

- report the bite to the County Health department, 695-3887, ext. 281,
- report the bite and location of the animal to the Berrien County Dog pound, 471-7531, between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.;
- see your doctor for his advice;
- if possible, keep the animal under observation for a period

of ten days to see if symptoms develop.

—If the animal dies or is found dead, make sure notification to the health department and dog pound is made immediately.

Berrien county has not had a case of rabies in the last nine years. "However, we cannot afford to relax our vigilance," said Dr. Jochems, "since a reservoir of rabies virus remains in such wild animals as foxes, bats and skunks."

Deputy Dog Warden Francis Morley is assigned to duty in the south county area. Morley pointed out that citizens should not take it upon themselves to dispose of any animal after it bites a human. "The doctor, the veterinarian and the health department will make the final decision before advising us to dispose of the animal for laboratory examination," Morley said.

Morley indicated that if it becomes imperative that the animal be killed, it is very important that the blow or shot not be directed to the head of the animal. Dr. Jochems and he agreed if brain tissue is damaged or destroyed, it is then extremely difficult or impossible for the laboratory to make a satisfactory examination of the animal for rabies.

Dr. Jochems warned that if for any reason the animal cannot be given a satisfactory examination, a bitten child or adult may have to undergo a series of painful rabies shots—one each day for 14 days.

- Children should be warned:
- Do not tease animals
- Do not touch wild animals.
- Do not attempt to pick up an injured animal
- Do not try to take away food which an animal is eating.
- Do not neglect any type of animal bite
- If bitten, see a doctor as soon as possible

"That period of time, the five Fridays, is necessary so that our office can do the necessary administrative work required by an election," Mrs. Hamilton said.

Persons who have voted in the last two years do not have to register unless they have moved during that time.







Basis of College Support: Tax Monies

Some students do not realize or are unappreciative of the public investment in higher education. Many seem to feel that student tuition pays the entire cost of operating a state university. Statistics show that for every dollar the student pays in tuition, an average of three dollars is contributed from public funds.

During the 1967-68 school year, citizens of Michigan paid \$204.6 million to help finance 15 state-supported schools. Tuition amounted to \$79.2 million. State support varies between schools, but averaged \$1,202 per student for the school year just completed. This represented a range of \$714 per student at Central Michigan university to

\$1,817 at newly established Saginaw Valley State college. Although enrollment increased over the 1966-67 school year, total state appropriations declined about \$9 million.

Indications are that it will increase substantially next year. The public owns the state education institutions. The student pays part of the cost of operation. He receives an education which permits him to appreciate life more fully and earn a better salary.

New Date
Farmers — Your Week" is changed.
Farmers Week, 1969, will be held March 17-21 on the Michigan State University campus. This is six weeks later in the year than previously. The change represents the first time in more than 50 years that

farmers will not meet early in February for their many meetings, demonstrations, displays and fellowship.

Two biggest factors bringing about the change are the weather and their space needs.

Snow and ice have plagued the farmers in recent years. In 1966 most Farmers Week events had to be canceled because of the blizzard which dropped 36 inches of snow a few days before.

MSU enrollment and student needs have made it increasingly difficult to provide facilities. The university would like for the large groups of farmers. The current date falls between terms at MSU, so the number of students is reduced sharply and much more display space is available.

In setting the March date, Thomas K. Cowden, Dean of the College of Agriculture and Natural Resources, expressed the hope it will permit more farmers to visit the campus under more pleasant circumstances.

igan Week. For 15 years Michigan's Apple, Cherry and Bean Queens have toured coast to coast and appeared on practically every network variety show in existence. Each girl represents an agricultural product of which Michigan is either a national leader in production or is near the top.



She finishes with acrylic paints after gluing the "hide" to mass onite.






Carl Brunks Feted By Golden Age Club
