NOW IS THE TIME TO FEED THE BIRDS

Mrs. Warren Willard, 502 South Portage, who states that she wishes to remain strictly anonymous in this business, passes on the word that now, if ever, is the time to feed birds.

Practically all natural forage for birds is coveted at this time, and the word gets around fast in the avian world when food stations are set for them. Mrs. Willard has a bird feeder which swings with the wind, set on top of a post. She also has a garden bird bath which she sweeps clean from snow and uses as a feeder. The birds like the bath best and are swarming into it even before she finishes filling it. She buys scratch feed from local mills, also suet and fragments of meat which she fastens to trees, and also smears bacon grease and other meat fats on the branches and trunks of trees.

Several species of birds have been gradually disappearing from the Buchanan district over many years, states E. L. Abell, also a bird student, at his home at 421 Moccasin. Especially missing are the juncos, bluebirds, towhees and nuthatches. The juncos are better known by the old-fashioned name of "snow birds." They are marked by a black head and white breast. The towhee, about the size and with some of the colors of a robin, was once a favorite bird, because of its peculiar habit of scratching with its feet in the leaves for forage, just as a hen scratches. A bird that seems rare this winter is the cardinal.

Here's a chance to do some genuine "conservation" work by helping the birds through a wintry period that might mean famine to many of them. It costs a little, but it's a lot of fun.

Attic Fire From Defective Chimney Hits G. Weaver Home

Fire believed to have been caused by a defective chimney at the Glenn Weaver home at 312 Moccasin street, damaged building and contents Tuesday morning. The loss is estimated to have been \$1,000 or more.

The fire began in the attic of the two-story structure and burned out through the roof and down into a clothes closet below on the second floor. In addition to the damage to the building, the contents of the closet were destroyed, and considerable damage resulted as the water poured on the flames by the Buchanan fire department seeped through into the first floor rooms.

City Treasurer Reports 85 Pct. Of Winter Taxes In

Mrs. Esther Hamilton, city treasurer, reported the first of the week that 85% of the winter tax, including both school and county levies, was already in.

The total tax roll is \$255,863.17. Of this total, \$164,863.21 goes to the general school fund and \$86,477.08 goes to the special assessment for school construction. The remaining \$52,232.28 represents county taxes. The commission extended penalty-free payment of taxes until Feb. 9.

Home Destroyed Before Arrival Of Fire Trucks

Loss Includes Furnishings And Clothing Of The Family

Fire of unexplained origin totally destroyed the home of George Albrecht, on the Rynearson road about 3 1/2 miles Monday.

In the loss were all furnishings and clothing of the family. George Albrecht was in Buchanan at the time on his duties as a member of the Buchanan police force. His wife and two children were visiting his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Alex Albrecht, at their home at the intersection of Rynearson Road and the Mayflower road, 60 rods east of the Albrecht home. (The term "Rynearson road" is used for that extension of Rynearson street which swings south past the Fred Samson home, and then east on the Niles-Bertrand township line to the Mayflower road.)

The fire was discovered by Mrs. Ben Cauffman, who lives immediately across the road on the Niles township side. Mrs. Cauffman called the Morris Farm fire department, which in turn called the Bertrand fire department. The fire in the meantime gained momentum rapidly and the structure was leveled to the ground except for the chimney when the two fire departments arrived.

A neighbor who had been approaching by east from the east stated that he had seen smoke pouring from the northeast corner of the building. The house consisted of three rooms and a bath, and was valued at \$4,000. It was insured for \$3,000. Furnishings and clothing destroyed were valued at between \$1,000 and \$1,500, with no insurance.

Bill Strayer reports that he has begun his canvass of local industries, and will soon have more detailed information.

Mrs. Teresa Zelous and Mrs. Ruth Irvine report that they have nearly completed organization of the torchlight parade, scheduled for the night of Jan. 28. Their complete roster of helpers will be announced next week. Several clubs in Buchanan are planning special benefits, regarding which publicity is being delayed until plans are completed.

Some fourteen years ago five Scouts of Troop 41, with Leo Slate their Scoutmaster, braved the wintry elements during the month of December and had an overnight camping trip in the Warren Dunes on Lake Michigan, known to them at that time as Camp Wilderness. In spite of deep snow and low temperature they had a new experience and a very good time. This winter camping in tents became a tradition in the troop, through most people, including some parents, thought it was a crazy idea, as for several years they endured blizzards and sub-zero temperatures.

About five years ago the example of this camping troop, that knows no seasons and does not back up for anything, the weather man has to offer, caught on and the White Beaver District of the Scout Council held a winter camp at Madron Lake, for all troops in the district, with an attendance of about thirty scouts and leaders.

John Poulson, Once of Buchanan Dies in Florida

Enlisted From Buchanan in World War I, at Age of 16 Years

Word has been received here of the death of John Poulson, former resident of Buchanan, who died in his home in New Smyrna, Fla., Saturday, Jan. 2, at the age of 52. He was born in Chicago and came to Buchanan with his family when he was 6 years old. As a youngster he carried mail for the Clark Equipment company and when he was 16 years old he enlisted in the Army and served in World War I. He was the youngest Buchanan soldier in that war.

He was a member of Ralph Rumbaugh Post of the American Legion. Later he went to Florida and worked for many years as a buyer for Sears, Roebuck & Co., there, retiring in 1949 because of poor health.

He is survived by the widow, Jean; his mother, Mrs. Lillian Fuller Shearer, Deland, Fla.; a sister, Virginia Clausen, Deland; two brothers, Irving of Akron, O., and George of Toledo, O. Funeral services were held in Deland last Tuesday and burial was made in the Deland cemetery.

Invest \$20,000 City Funds On 90-Day Certif.

Set Jan. 25 For Hearing On Alexander Street Improvements

Following a recommendation by Manager Barklay Omans, the city commission at their Monday night meeting approved the investment of \$6,500 in Waterworks bond reserve funds in the Buchanan Federal Building & Loan. The commission also authorized the investment of \$20,000 of the city general fund in 90-day certificates of deposit. It was felt that while not a great deal would be realized by this investment, over a long range of time the continuation of that policy would mean considerable savings.

Public Improvements
The commission set Jan. 25 for the time of a public hearing on the necessity of curb, gutter and storm drainage on Alexander streets between Oak and Phelps, at an estimated cost of \$7,586.50. The city's share of this cost would be \$1,892.10. The share of property owners would be approximately \$3 per front foot.

An appropriation of \$698.79 was made to cover the city's share of payment on concrete paving for Roe street between Oak and Days Avenue. An appropriation of \$880.15 was made to cover the city's share in installation of the Portage-Days avenue storm sewer.

City Buys Police Car
Bids were accepted for the replacement of an existing police car and pick-up, the latter for the cemetery use. Frank Edmond was low bidder on the car at \$613 plus trade-in, also on the pick-up truck at \$813 plus trade-in. The truck replaced a GMC truck purchased in 1947.

Propose County Home For Aged, Berrien Center

Poorman Authorized To Buy Furnishings For The New Juvenile Home

Construction of a county home for the aged was proposed to the Berrien county Board of Supervisors at their January meeting, held Monday in St. Joseph.

The proposal, made by Leshe Speese, director of the county Social Welfare Board, was the result of a survey ordered by the board in December, when Mr. Speese reported that a minimum of 140 to 150 beds are needed. He suggested that a new home be constructed near the Berrien Center infirmary, as a solution of the problem, which is a nation-wide one. At present there are in private homes, 35 to 40 people, who are totally dependent on the county for support. Additional county facilities would mean that these persons could be cared for, leaving the private homes for those who can pay their way. No action was taken on the proposal but it drew some favorable comments.

Supervisor Robert Ticknor, St. Joseph, said that recent surveys at the University of Michigan show that the problem is at hand. "They suggest," said Ticknor, "that outside builders, such as fraternal organizations and churches, take an interest." He said that reports indicate the homes can be operated at a profit. The board authorized Frank Poorman, chairman of the Welfare Board, to parcel out purchases of furnishings for the new juvenile home. He recommended such action as there would be a saving of from \$500 to \$700.

The hiring of a court reporter was also approved and County Civil Defense director, William Burkett, was authorized to call a meeting of township supervisors, fire chiefs, trustees and constables to plan the part of the townships in the County Civil Defense program.

Daughter First Settler Here Is Taken By Death

Mrs. Nellie Royce, Daughter Russell McCoy, Buried At Fremont, Nebraska

Last week the Record received word from Mrs. H. H. Vande Walker of LaPorte, the following information on Mrs. Nellie McCoy Royce, a daughter of a famed Buchanan pioneer and the founder of the first sawmill industry here.

Mrs. Royce died Nov. 24, 1953, at Loup City, Neb. She was born to Russell and Esther Weaver McCoy on March 22, 1865, the last of 11 children, all born in Buchanan, and was one of the very few survivors of the first generation after settlement here. Her home while here was at 207 Main street, in a house which once stood on the lot where Mr. and Mrs. Albert Balthazor now live. The present home there was built by the late Newton Barmhart. She married William E. Royce, son of a Berrien county pioneer doctor, in 1884. They moved in 1886 to Fremont, Neb. Mrs. Royce had begun teaching at Buchanan. She taught at the Hills Corners school and attended a reunion of teachers and former pupils of that school in 1930. She continued teaching in Nebraska until 1940, for some time in the Omaha city schools. She was buried at Fremont, Neb.

She is survived by a son, Atty. A. E. Royce, now practicing law in Omaha, Neb., and by a daughter, Mrs. Mildred James of Elmhurst, Neb.

Mrs. Vande-Walker writes that both of Mrs. Royce's parents came to this vicinity by horseback from White Sulphur Springs, Va., and she from Canton, O.

State Asks "Buy Your Plates Early" - Avoid Rush

Early Action Will Save State \$10,000, Says Secretary Owen Cleary

Secretary of State Owen J. Cleary informed John Hattenbach of the Secretary of State branch office here today of the statewide campaign for the sale of license plates from Jan. 15 to Feb. 15. "All public service media have been solicited for their co-operation," Cleary said.

Newspapers, radio, television and theaters have all been contacted to carry the message "Buy Your Plates Early and Avoid The Rush."

"Also," Cleary said, "department stores, insurance companies and others have been asked to use this same message on the bottom of their statements. Others, such as grocery stores and gasoline stations, can help us greatly by placing a sign 'Buy Your Plates Early and Avoid The Rush'."

"I would be the happiest and most pleased man in Michigan," Cleary said, "if we had no line-up for plates on Feb. 28. Plate sales through Jan. 4 total \$24,177, an increase of 53% over last year."

The goal Cleary hopes to achieve by Feb. 15 is 1,500,000 plates sold. There are over 3,000,000 car owners in Michigan.

"We can save the taxpayers \$10,000 for extra help if everyone would cooperate to avoid the last minute rush."

Regular meeting of City Commission of the City of Buchanan, Michigan, held in the City Hall of said City on Monday, January 11th, 1954, at 7:30 P.M.

Vote Part-Time Desk Man To Free Man For Patrol

City Manager, Chief Police Give Facts And Figures On Police Work

The city commission authorized an appropriation of \$1,035.86 to cover the cost of the employment of four hours daily for a man at the desk in the police station. This will mean the release of a patrolman for street work four hours daily.

This appropriation was made following a review by the commission of the following considerations presented by the city manager:

A check shows that for overall manpower including desk clerks Benton Harbor has 188 men per thousand population. St. Joseph has 176, Niles has 183 and Buchanan has 148 men per thousand population. All figures are based on present force and 1950 census.

Small towns do not have the amount of crime incidence that larger ones do, therefore the F. B. I. in minimum manpower recommendation sets a differential for police protection in larger and small communities. The last report I read on this matter recommended 15 men per thousand population. We have not had the amount of crime incidence that the larger communities have. Part of this is due to our size and part of it is due to the fact that our department has been doing in the past year.

The matter of one or two men patrol has been a subject of controversy among law enforcement officers for some time. I quote our chief on this.

"In my opinion the one-man patrol car operation is more efficient for the City of Buchanan than the two-man car, because the number of patrol units is doubled and the City is divided into twice as many patrol areas as when officers ride in pairs. Consequently, the frequency of patrol is doubled, a police car gives twice the attention to a beat, and a police hazard is inspected with twice the frequency. The officer patrolling alone tends to be more effective for the reason that he is, on the whole, more likely to be alert."

"It is my opinion that when officers are placed alone in patrol cars that there should be at least two cars in operation at all times, and that both cars respond to complaints—where there is a chance that one officer cannot handle the complaint alone."

We presently carry 7 to 8 men in our police department. The discrepancy in even manpower is due to the fact that one desk clerk is used half time or full time as the need arises when an officer is on leave or sick. If we were to attempt to carry enough personnel to provide three men on duty at all times it would require eleven men in the department.

I have selected a typical week to give the City Commission an idea of the present coverage afforded.

Week of December 6, 1953 (168 hours)
9 hours, 4 men on duty.
56 hours, 3 men on duty.
93 hours, 2 men on duty.
8 hours, 1 man on duty (4 a.m. to 8 a.m. one day and 6 a.m. to 8 a.m. on two days).
It costs approximately \$5,500 a year to maintain a desk man including insurance, retirement, etc. It costs approximately \$4,300 a year to maintain a patrolman. I would recommend that if an increase in force is felt necessary it be made on the desk to release patrolman man hours from this duty.

A budget increase will be necessary to cover additional protection. I do not believe that quantity should be substituted for quality and feel that we can have much more confidence in fairly-paid well-trained men regardless of the size of the force. Our real valuation will increase this year, however, our personal valuation will decrease due to lower industrial inventories. It is too early to predict whether we will have an increase in valuation this year. If a decision is made to increase police protection it should be continued in the coming budget also.

I believe that one of our greatest assets is the ability to meet changing circumstances within our department and would therefore recommend that no action be taken in setting a policy on one or two man patrol or a given number of men on duty at given times. I feel this matter can better be handled by the police chief in light of experience and existing conditions.

One Killed As Car Hurtles Through Air Against Tree

Chicago Woman Crushed Beneath As Car Goes Down

State Police Note Icy Glare Where Car Left Paving

Mrs. Madge Jackson, 49, 5702 South Park street, Chicago, was killed about 8 p.m. Friday evening when the car in which she was enroute east on M-60 with her husband, left the pavement about a quarter of a mile east of Halls Corners and crashed into a tree on the south side of the right-of-way.

Her husband, Everett Jackson, 43, incurred a fractured hip and pelvic bone.

He stated that he was driving about 45 miles an hour when a westbound car entered his lane of traffic and forced him, off the road. The tracks indicate that the car, a 1950 Oldsmobile, left the pavement about 200 feet west of the tree. Apparently Jackson tried to right the car to avoid hitting the tree and the vehicle slid sideways with the front

toward the road, then left the ground hurtling through the air, falling in the air as it went.

Apparently it struck the tree wheels up, the first impact being on the rear left side and then across the heavy steel top, which was deeply creased. The right front door was open and Mrs. Jackson fell out and under the car as it came down. Jackson was thrown clear. That the car left the ground was indicated by the fact that the bark was torn off the trunk of the tree from about 4 feet to about 7 feet off the ground. Shattered bark was flung 20 feet beyond the tree. The tree, an elm 48 inches in circumference, or over 15 inches in diameter, withstood the impact of more than a ton of flying steel with no damage except several feet of lost bark. According to the State Police report the car left the pavement on one of the few icy spots on the highway.

The Swem ambulance was called but meanwhile two men from the Ford garage had extricated the body of Mrs. Jackson from beneath the car. On the arrival of the ambulance at Niles with Mr. and Mrs. Jackson, Coroner Franklin Rice, Jr., was called and pronounced the woman dead from a fractured neck and other injuries.
