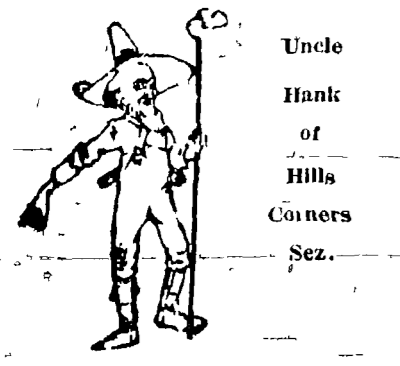

I. & M. Radio Broadcast Test Is Successful

Company To Install 200-Ft Steel Tower At Southeast Corner Of Garage

The balloon test Wednesday of the practicability of broadcasting throughout the Buchanan district of the Indiana & Michigan Electric Company was very satisfactory, according to Kenneth Mudge, district superintendent

The balloon was of the type used by the United States and other nations as a "barrage balloon" during war time and was in fact bought by the Indiana & Michigan Electric company from government excess war stores. The barrage balloon received its greatest publicity from its wide use over London to impede low stranding attacks by German planes

The balloon used was 25 feet long, with a lifting capacity of 100 pounds. It was inflated with 250 cubic feet of hydrogen gas and was successively hoisted to 100, 150 and 200-foot heights. It carried 100 pounds in antennae and other broadcasting equipment and was barely able to attain the 200-foot altitude. At that height broadcasting was very successful

Broadcasting equipment had been placed in the local I. & M. headquarters building nearly three years ago, but the 60-foot pole mounted over the building at that time to carry the antennae proved inadequate because of the fact that the local headquarters building is in a depression below the surface of the surrounding country

The company has a 200-foot steel tower ordered to be installed on heavy concrete footing at the southeast corner of the garage building in the southwest corner of the driveway

Carl Howe, Vice Pres. N.Y.C.R.R. Dies In Chicago

Lived Here In Youth, Was Graduate Of Local High School

Buchanan high school lost a distinguished graduate two weeks ago in Chicago, according to belated information arriving at the Record office

Carl Howe, vice-president of the New York Central Railway and a long-time resident of Chicago, died in that city about two weeks ago. He was the son of Charles Howe, who was a bookkeeper for the Buchanan Manufacturing company, a large turntable factory of the wood-working days

Charles Howe was elected county clerk while the county seat was yet at Berrien Springs, and moved there, where Carl was born. The family came back to Buchanan after the clerkship passed to other hands, and lived for some years in the home now occupied by Mrs Alvin Spennetts at 105 Lake, known to many as the former A. H. Klein residence

Fred Richter Has Picture Of Dayton's First Postmaster

Fred Richter, the post master and historian of Dayton, was a visitor in the Record office Monday morning, when he exhibited a picture of the founder and first postmaster of Dayton, Benjamin Redding, and his wife, Eunice Ann

He was born June 9, 1792, and she was born March 20, 1811, and died Feb. 11, 1882. The picture had been enlarged from a small, ancient tuncype into a very good 4x6 photograph through the efforts of Redding's great great grand nephew, Royce E Ingersoll, a retired admiral who lives in his ancestral home at LaPole, Ind., in summer and at Washington, D. C., in winter. The ex-admiral visited Richter at Dayton several times last summer. He is making an extended study of the Reddings and other branches of his ancestral tree.

Work Is Started On Outdoor Ice Skating Rink

Don Rith, Skilled Skater, And Former Rink Maker In Chicago, Is Leader

Work is now under way under the leadership of Don Rith in the creation of a winter outdoor skating rink on the lots owned by Buchanan School District No. 1 at Fifth and Moccasin as a prospective school site

Rith has already cleared the tract of a corn crop, with the aid of Ray Nelson and his tractor. He is now waiting for use of a city grader to even and level the ground preliminary to soaking the soil. It will then be ready for spraying to build up the ice. The tract cleared is approximately the proportion of a football diamond, and slightly larger, and would accommodate at least 150 skaters at one time

Rith has had long experience, having skated on Chicago rinks from childhood until World War II, about 18 years. He skated in the Chicago Tribune Silver Skates event for many years, and competed independently in the races at Chicago, in Madison Square Gardens in New York City, and in several smaller cities. He competed for a time as a member of a Chicago CYO team coached by Pete Miller, who was coach of the American skating team at the Olympic contests at Berlin in 1936

In 1944, while in the army, he competed in a race between picked service skaters, two each from the Army, Navy, Marines and Coast Guard, in a special race for service men only under the auspices of the Los Angeles Herald-Express Silver Skates tournament. He won second place, a Marine winning first

During four years he took part in a co-operative work by Chicago skaters, with the aim of eliminating Park in the city, and knows the methods and the difficulties. "Brown-Out" Of Public Lights Starts Here Mon.

Legion Plans For Christmas Lighting Are Out Unless Strike Lifts

Right on the eve of extensive plans for extra holiday lighting displays, a "brown-out" of commercial and public lighting went into effect here at 5 p m Monday, as the result of the federal government order affecting 21 states and intended to conserve the coal used in production of electric current

The order bans use of electricity for lighting store windows or advertising signs and for air conditioning and refrigeration except where essential. It requires a 25% cut in electricity used for street lighting, buildings except homes, and for running passenger elevators and escalators

All Christmas lighting displays are out. Small ordered even more drastic restrictions in electric utilities' service when their coal dwindles to a 15-day supply and a third stage of curtailment when coal stocks reach the 10-day stage

At the same time, CPA ordered utilities furnishing manufactured and mixed gas to curtail deliveries when their stocks fall to a three-week supply. It directed the electric power companies to make the greatest possible use of water power and fuel other than coal and to pool power supplies with other utilities

The ban will be taboo on the plans which were being made here under Legion initiation for extensive use of Christmas street lighting. It, of course, will not affect arrangements for Christmas decorations, including trees, which do not require lighting. The order bans store window lighting, either inside or outside, lighted signs, lighted theatre marquees and similar commercial use

Home power use does not come under the ban, although a request is extended to effect a 25% reduction in commercial buildings does not extend to residential use

Wheat Spirals To \$2.08 Per Bushel On Local Market

The I & M radio test was not the only big rise in Buchanan last week, as the price of wheat ballooned Saturday at the Buchanan Co-ops to \$2.08 per bushel, a record figure for the past 25 years

Wheat was alone in the grain commodities to make such a radical rise and the reasons were not entirely plan, according to Robert Koengshot, manager of the Co-ops. New corn had meanwhile dropped to \$1.05 per bushel for corn of average moisture content. Oats remained around the 50-cent mark, after a previous rise from 72 cents

Nels Nordin Is Back From Trip To Swedish Home

Reports Prosperity, Good Wages And Plenty Of Merchandise

Certainly one of the first, if not the first Buchananite to visit a land in Europe on a strictly private and personal mission since the "iron curtain" of war was lifted over a year ago, Nels Nordin arrived at his home here recently from a three-months absence during which he visited his native town of Mora, in Dalarna, Sweden

There he saw his parents and other members of his family and spent over two months in ancient Uplarna, enjoying the pleasant Swedish social life and also the joys of hunting and fishing in the Swedish mountains

He brought back with him a beautiful collection of Swedish handwork, including hand-woven wall pieces, table runners, rugs of several kinds, sweaters, woolsen-soled shoes, hand and machine-made Swedish knives, and other items of greatest interest to the younger element would be a Swedish bicycle made of the Swedish "light metal", mostly chrome, weighing about 30 pounds. On it is a bright light which is charged from a battery cell, in which the electricity is built up by a generator which operates to charge the battery when you lift the front end up and when the front wheel it has a skirt guard and a very compact and commodious package carried on the rear. The latter item is present because of the fact that Swedish youth are accustomed to make long vacation trips by bicycle, carrying their luggage on this carrier

Everyone, or nearly everyone, rides by bicycle in Sweden these days, Nordin states. Not many carry a car, although many makes of American cars are available. You can buy an American car in Sweden, if you have the money, Nordin reports. The brake oil buying is not scarce but price. You can get the popular model of Buick, 1946, any time you want to pay \$4,000 for it. Or a 1940 Ford or Chevrolet for from \$3,000 to \$3,600. And other makes in accordance. And you get the new tires that come with the car, but if you want replacement the only thing available is American recaps

There are no new tires on sale apart from cars in Sweden. And you will have to pay about 40 cents a gallon for gasoline and 75 cents a quart for motor lubricating oil. These high price differentials as compared with prices in the United States are due mainly to government import duties and luxury taxes. The Swedish government considers the private car as a luxury and tacks on high taxes. Although the only new cars are American made, there are many miniature cars of English, Swedish and some of pre-war German make. The price on used cars is high. Nordin's father sold a 1935 Plymouth without tires for about \$1,000. He sold it during the war because he could not get any tires at all then. It was bought by a taxi operator who could get tires on special permit

There are many buses taking up the slack in private passenger travel, and many of them still use the "gengas", the motor fuel generated from wood or charcoal by bulky generating equipment. Some of the buses have this bulky generating equipment built into the body of the bus, others tow it behind on a trailer. The buses carry sacks of wooden sticks, about five inches long and split. One Every so often they must stop, clean out the ashes in the wood-burning generator and build up the gas by wood fire about a half hour. If you operate a private car by "gengas", you have to work a half hour each morning generating gas before you start. The fuel you get is very cheap in terms of money, but high in cost of time and trouble. The count that. Practically all private car operators do count it and have discarded the "gengas" generators

Another instance of high prices because of government import and luxury taxes is cigarettes. You can get any of the American makes of cigarettes, Lucky Strikes being most popular in Sweden. But you pay the equivalent of 75 cents a pack. There are Swedish makes on the market advertised as "American style" cigarettes for which you pay 60 cents a pack. By far the best tobacco comes from America and the pipe tobacco to which the more economical resort is not satisfactory. These high prices are almost entirely due to heavy luxury taxes

The Swedish semi-socialist government has a policy of high prices. (Continued on page 4)

Tells Police Sunday That He Attempted Suicide

The condition of Henry Fowler, 36, remained critical yesterday as the result of a self-admitted suicide attempt, in which he stated that he placed a 22 calibre handgun in his body and fired a shot that entered on the left side about two inches below his heart and emerged on the right side of his back

In a conference with police in his hospital room Sunday afternoon Fowler said that he had fired the gun himself with the intention of ending his life

The bullet penetrated the stomach, in which two wounds were inflicted on entrance and exit, and also made five intestinal wounds. His wife had arrived at the city hall at 1:15 p m to call in the police, saying that he was threatening to kill himself. They accompanied her back and found him already critically wounded, lying on the floor of the living room—a dazed, shocked, and partly conscious condition. A physician arrived and he was taken to Pawating hospital, where he soon recovered full consciousness although suffering greatly from shock and internal hemorrhage

The bullet had made a clean hole about the size of a lead pencil. There was little external but considerable internal bleeding. The physician in charge gave him a fifty-fifty chance yesterday. He had received several blood transfusions

He had been drinking heavily, although it is said that he was not drinking the day the incident occurred. It is reported that he had been quarrelling with his wife over financial and other matters for some time, had absented himself from his home as much as a week at a time, and his wife had left his home for a month during October, returning about Nov 1. Both had gone to the police several times on the occasion of previous absences

Mr Brunelle, who has been minister of the Mt Pleasant church since April of 1942 when installation services were held, has endeared himself to the citizens of his community by his outstanding work in behalf of the young people of the community. He also has taken a very active part in all civic projects of the city and has worked untiringly in behalf of a better community life for the city and its surrounding communities

Nels Nordin Back From Trip To Swedish Home

(Continued from Page 1)
The Swedish economy is steadier than that of America and they are not afraid of a depression. The credit for their stability is due to the place the Swedes give to their home. A good house, a well-furnished house, and a well-provided house comes first.

"The Swedes are getting good wages," said Nordin, "a fair average in the factories is \$7 and \$8 a day, American money. But practically all of these factory workers have beautiful homes. I couldn't understand how they did it. You go into a home in a town or in a city apartment, as in one of the co-operative apartment houses in Stockholm and you see fine furnishings, beautiful birch 'blond' furniture, modern designed. I asked some of them how they did it. They told me it wasn't easy but that they worked, saved and built up a home a little at a time."

"Out in sections like Dalarna many of the homes have a room reserved for the old-time hand-made furniture, with the old Swedish designs. Each province has a different design, so that if you know them you can tell where they are made. They furnish their living quarters in very modern furniture, but they keep these rooms as memorials of the past. But the average Swede doesn't have a car and doesn't expect to have one. His feet are pretty well under him economically and fairly well planted on the ground ideologically. He is sold on his 'social democrat' government, but he is dead set against Communism. He is more against Communism than the American is and he knows better why. (Nordin didn't say this, but the writer knows it from the past). He doesn't like Communism because, while he believes in future progress and is not afraid of innovation, he is also conservative of past values. The rooms in the old houses devoted to beautiful old furniture are indicative of his thinking. He is a mixture of courageous innovation and stand-fast conservatism that is hard for an American to understand. He places a very real value on private initiative, but he is not afraid to place limitations when he thinks it encroaches on the public interest. He admires it, but all the same he is ready to take steps when a private monopoly runs up prices on a prime necessity such as flour. And he usually knows what steps to take.

Whether one or more of the springs is out of place, you can repair the cushion at home by a simple process. Usually, the old springs and cotton padding can be used again. You will need to make new pockets for the springs. A few feed sacks is the only material you need for this. With feed sacks you can also make a new mush cover for the spring unit. Some strong smooth string is all you need to tie the springs together. Report Galien River Project Is Unfavorable

Protests Must Be Received At Washington By Dec. 15

The following letter was received last week by the Record from the Office of the Division Engineer, Corps of Engineers, War Department, 20 North Wacker Drive, Chicago, Illinois, announcing an unfavorable preliminary report on the Galien River navigation and drainage project.

18 November, 1946
Notice Of Unfavorable Preliminary Examination Report On Galien River, Berrien County, Michigan.

It having come to the notice of the undersigned that you may have an interest in the investigations for improvement of Galien River, Berrien County, Michigan, for navigation, flood control, and

other purposes, concerning which a public hearing was held 5 June, 1945, at New Troy, Michigan, you are hereby informed that the preliminary examination thereon, authorized by Section 6 of the River and Harbor Act approved 2 March, 1940, has been made by the District and Division Engineers and is unfavorable to the desired improvements or to a detailed survey at this time. The principal grounds on which the adverse conclusion is based are that no desire has been expressed for or need evidenced of improvements for navigation, and that the costs of improvements for flood protection would be greatly in excess of the probable benefits to be expected therefrom.

You are further notified that all interested parties have the privilege of presenting their views on the subject matter covered in the reports to the Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors, permanent body sitting at Washington, D. C., to which all examination and survey reports of this character are referred. Parties desiring to present any statements or facts concerning the proposed improvements may be heard by the Board either orally or in writing. Written communications should be addressed to the Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors, Room 1336, Building T-7, Gravelly Point, Washington 25, D. C., and should be mailed in time to be in the possession of the said Board within four weeks from the date of this communication. If, however, you have important data to communicate to the Board which cannot be collected and put in shape

for proper presentation within 4 weeks, the Board should be informed of this fact without delay and request made for an extension of the limiting date for submitting information. If oral hearings are desired, dates for the same may be arranged for by correspondence with the Board.

Any further information needed may be obtained by application to this office or to the District Engineer, J. J. S. Engineer, Office 520 Merchandise Mart, Chicago 54, Ill. Copies of the reports will not be furnished or loaned for use outside of the office, but interested parties, including the press, will be permitted to make such notes of the contents as they desire.

Niles Township To Ballot On Sale Of Liquors By Glass

In a special election to be held on Dec. 10, the voters in Niles township will cast their ballots on the question of liquor sales by the glass. The schedule was arranged following the filing of petitions on Nov. 16 bearing 274 signatures, making it mandatory to bring the question to a vote.

Polls will be open on Dec. 10 from 7 a. m. to 8 p. m. and persons entitled to vote include those who are legally qualified at any regular election.

While sales of beer and wine have been approved by Niles township for some years, the question of liquor sales there has not pre-

viously been submitted to a vote. If the measure should be approved, it would be the first township in this vicinity to receive such sanction. If the electors should vote down the proposal, it could not legally be submitted to voters again for at least four years.

Plane Photography Wisconsin Forests Studied In Michigan

Samples of the newest work in aerial photography of forests, made incidental to the current aerial mapping of Marquette county, Wisconsin, are being furnished the Michigan conservation department's forestry division for observation.

Taken with infra-red film and a "minus blue" filter, the new-style prints are said to be so sensitive

to the various shades of green that discrimination of the various species of evergreens is possible. The timber is being photographed both before and after the leaves fall from the hardwoods.

Sample shots being furnished the Michigan foresters are of timber on the Michigan side of the twisting Menominee river, where the photo plane's lens necessarily crosses the state boundary. Reliability of the new photographic technique is to be checked by observations on the ground.
