Bucks Rally To Trim St. Joseph In '51 Opener

Phil Pennell's Home Run With The Bases Loaded Decides Game

Phil Pennell, 6 foot, 1 inch, first baseman of the Buchanan Bucks, and his 24 men had got the locals off to a flying start last Friday as the Bucks from St. Joe were defeated by a last ditch rally, 8-4. The victory was the first for the Bucks since it turned out to be the opener for both sides.

St. Joe led 3-2 going into the bottom half of the sixth inning and then the roof caved in on the big bad Bears as 11 men came to bat. Jerry Moulds opened the big frame with a free pass to first and Bob Rozzen singled over third into left field. Vic Schafer, with the count at 0-1 against him, took one in the side and also got the initial sack on the pitcher's mistake. Dick Scroggin, then singled down the first base line and Moulds scored to make the count lead 3-3. George Vincent lifted an easy fly to left field and lived on the play as the left fielder dropped the easy chance. Rozzen scored to put the Bucks ahead 4-3 and that brought Pennell up with the bases loaded. Phil kissed the first pitch some 400 feet a toss the road and four runs crossed the plate.

Vincent then went into the seventh leading 8-3 and had a no-hitter going. But with one out, John Gessonde broke the magic spell that was on top of his team as he singled into center field. The hit was followed by another and Vincent closed the game with a 2-hitter. He walked 8 and sent 11 back to the bench via the strike-out route.

To pick out some of the high notes of the game isn't easy but to any fan's liking would be the home run by Pennell. Vincent's triple in the third that led to Buchanan's second run, and a fielding play by Vic Schafer in the fifth inning that saved the Bucks some embarrassment. The Bears had the sacks loaded with 2 out and were trailing 2-1 at the time. Quaidous hit hard and topped one down the third base line. Basement Barn Structure On Guy Cauffman Fire And Contents Are Lost

The barn on the farm owned by Guy and June Cauffman, located about 6 1/2 miles northwest of Buchanan, was burned entirely to the ground as the result of a direct hit by a bolt of lightning shortly before noon yesterday (Wednesday).

The rain house, the only occupied log cabin extant in this section, has no telephone connections, and the call to the Buchanan fire department was delayed for that reason. Mr. Cauffman, an employee of the local Moccasin Court Federal Housing project, was in Buchanan. Mrs. Cauffman was at home. When the department arrived the structure had been leveled by the flames, only the burning barn floor remaining. Mr. Cauffman had not been actively engaged in farming for some time and the barn was used only for small storage, including garden tools and garden tractor. The barn was on a hillside with an upper structure and basement below. The house is located near the barn, and the roof of tar paper had already been scorched when the fire department arrived but was extinguished. The buildings were located about a quarter of a mile north of the Old Orchard corner on the Yellow Lake stone road, on a dirt crossroad.

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Woman In Good Condition At Niles Hospital

Her Three Children Sleeping In Home As Lovers Engage In Near-Fatal Clash

A sad and sordid tale of love came to a bedraggled end here early Monday morning when the pitied lover, Ted W. Hornus, 111 1/2 State street, St. Joseph, stabbed Mrs. Dora Nordin, divorcee, at her home at 214 Sylvan avenue, with a huge U.S. army mess knife, made by the firm Hornus worked for in St. Joseph, which he had presented to her several years before. The blade was 7 1/2 inches long and two inches wide.

Hornus was arraigned before Justice of the Peace Rex Lamb Tuesday and waived examination. He was bound over to the Berrien County Circuit court. Not being able to furnish the required bond of \$1,000, he was placed in the Berrien County jail.

Mrs. Nordin was taken to the Fa-vating hospital, where her condition was reported to be good. A knife penetrated the abdomen on the lower right side, cutting into the peritoneum sac enclosing the intestines, which were not severed. At home when the lovers met on their return from a local club at 1:30 a.m. Monday, Mrs. Nordin's three children, a 11-year-old boy and two girls, one 13 and the other 15, sleeping in a nearby room when the luptured romance climaxed in near-murder.

Statements taken by Chief of Police Jack Krugh from the principals conflicted in details. Hornus stated that he had kept company with Mrs. Nordin for about six years, but that she had gone out with him only occasionally during the past year.

He went to her home, he stated, Sunday afternoon and accompanied her to a local club, where they spent the afternoon and evening drinking and dancing with friends. There was an argument when he proposed to accompany her home after midnight Monday morning. Hornus went down town alone, and another man drove her home.

Hornus stated that he decided to walk up to the residence and see whether she had gone home. He stated that when he went to the back door, Mrs. Nordin met him and started cursing and striking him in the face and body. He and took from a drawer the large U.S. mess knife which he had given her.

Mrs. Nordin came at him, he alleged, and he tried to push her away in the struggle she was accidentally stabbed, he alleges. The oldest daughter came to the scene and tried to telephone the police, but he states that he took the phone away from her and the receiver was accidentally dropped to the floor, tearing the cord loose. He picked up Mrs. Nordin and laid her on the bed when Patrolman Weaver arrived there he found her on the bed and Hornus seated calmly in a chair nearby. Weaver first called a physician, then called the Swem ambulance to take the woman to the hospital, and took Hornus to the city jail.

Mrs. Nordin made a statement Tuesday afternoon only partially corroborating that of Hornus. She stated that she was with him at a club drinking and dancing Sunday afternoon and evening, but refused to accompany him home.

When she arrived home about 1:30 p.m., she alleges, she entered the front door and heard a noise at the back door. She went to close it when Hornus suddenly forced his way in with the knife in his hand. He struck her, knocking her to the kitchen floor. She felt the place where he struck her and felt a bulge, from which she knew that she had been stabbed.

She asked him to call a doctor but he refused during the scuffle the three children who were sleeping in a bedroom, were aroused and came to the room seeing her mother lying on the floor. The oldest girl ran to the telephone, but Hornus grabbed it away from her, tearing the cord loose.

As he was lifting Mrs. Nordin to the bed, she states, the young son grabbed the knife, which Hornus had laid on the arm of the davenport and ran and hid it. The oldest girl also ran to the neighbors and called the police.





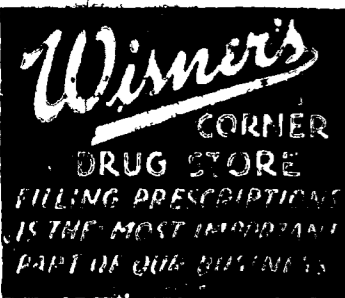

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Legislative News Letter

APRIL 21, 1951 (by courtesy of Don Peas and R. Faulkner, Representatives)

Ninety-one House bills were introduced last week. These include a series of eight bills, patterned after the New York laws, to protect society as well as help the sex deviate. These bills are the result of 18 months of intensive study of the serious problem by a study committee on sex deviates.

Another bill, resulting from an interim legislative committee's study, would create a Migrant Labor Commission.

A Michigan Seal of Quality bill, failing to pass in the last session was re-introduced.

Another bill would permit arrest without warrant in misdemeanor cases not cognizable by a justice of the peace. The Code of Criminal Procedure is amended in another bill to permit issuance of an order for interception of phone and wire communications by a judge of any court of record, upon oath by Attorney General, Prosecuting Attorney or any Peace Officer that there is reasonable ground to believe that evidence of crime may be thus obtained.

Still another bill would make state laboratories available to all licensed members of the healing professions.

A Judges' Retirement Act, long sought by the judiciary, was also introduced. Another bill would create and provide for establishment of county courts of record by the electors of the county or by the majority vote of the Board of Supervisors, and eliminate justice of peace courts or any fee courts.

A Board of Public Bookkeepers would be established in another measure dropped into the legislative hopper. These are but a few of the many bills coming in at the eleventh hour, so to speak.

The Senate did not concur in the House amendments to the highway bills, and they have been referred to a conference committee to have the points of difference between House and Senate ironed out.

Some of the session's most controversial bills were out on the floor for consideration. Among these are such bills as the Capital Punishment bill, a 40' bus bill, reviving the One-Man Grand Jury, reducing the work week of a policeman to 40 hours, and a fireman to 6 1/2 hours.

Of these only the 40' length bus bill and the capital punishment bill have been thus far considered. The bus bill had tough going when efforts to kill it were successfully fought off by proponents. Twenty-eight other states have a similar law.

The capital punishment bill provoked heated and drawn-out debate. A series of facetious amendments, such as death by various means including being stoned to death on the capital steps, mandatory execution of the governor signing the bill and of the legislators who voted for it should it be subsequently found that an innocent person was executed under the act, were fought off. An amendment to attach a referendum was criticized as "passing the buck to the people" by some, and defended by others as being justified in a matter of such great importance, was also defeated. The bill was finally advanced to third reading, and it is expected that the arguments will again be resumed when it is considered

on its final passage Friday, April 20.

The Senate-approved bill extending social security to state and local government employees was re-referred to committee because of a question as to the constitutionality of the language in the bill.

Out of respect to a great statesman, whose death has saddened the nation and freedom-loving people everywhere, the Legislature, even though faced with its largest work day of the session, met only briefly on Thursday the 19th, and passed resolutions expressing the State's and nation's sense of loss over the passing of U. S. Senator Arthur H. Vandenberg, and adjourned.

experience in Sweden, working chiefly with vegetable and small fruit production. He is also very interested in plant nursery work and greenhouse and flower growing.

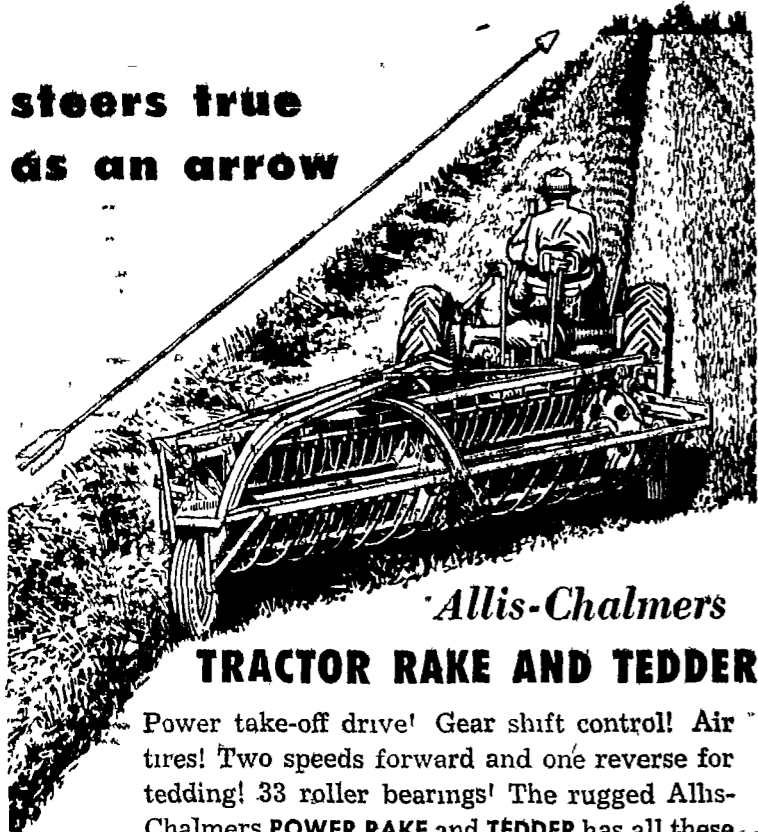
The program under which he comes to the United States is financed through Marshall Plan Aid to European countries, with the state and county Co-operative Extension Service responsible for the farm placement while the

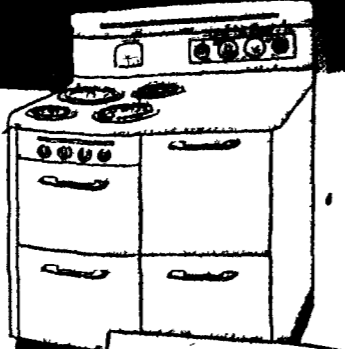

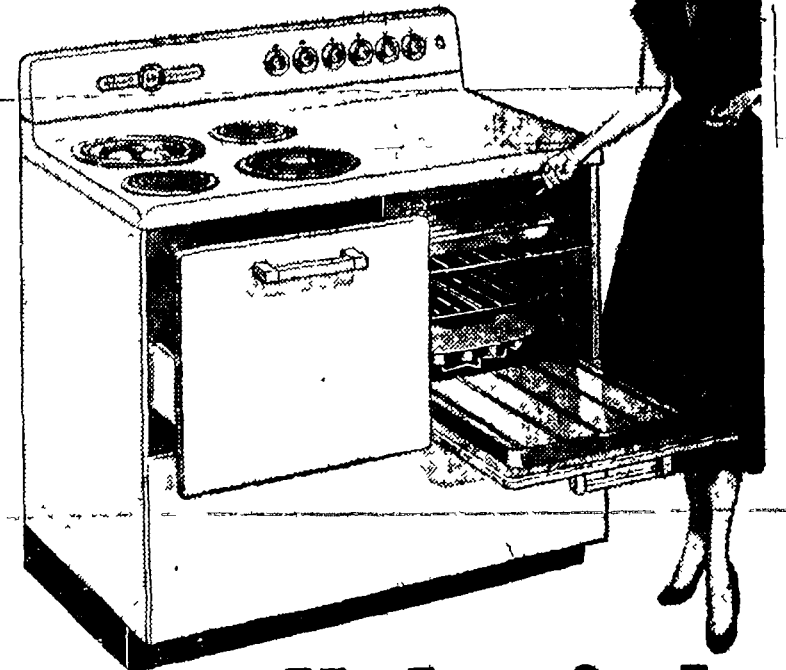
