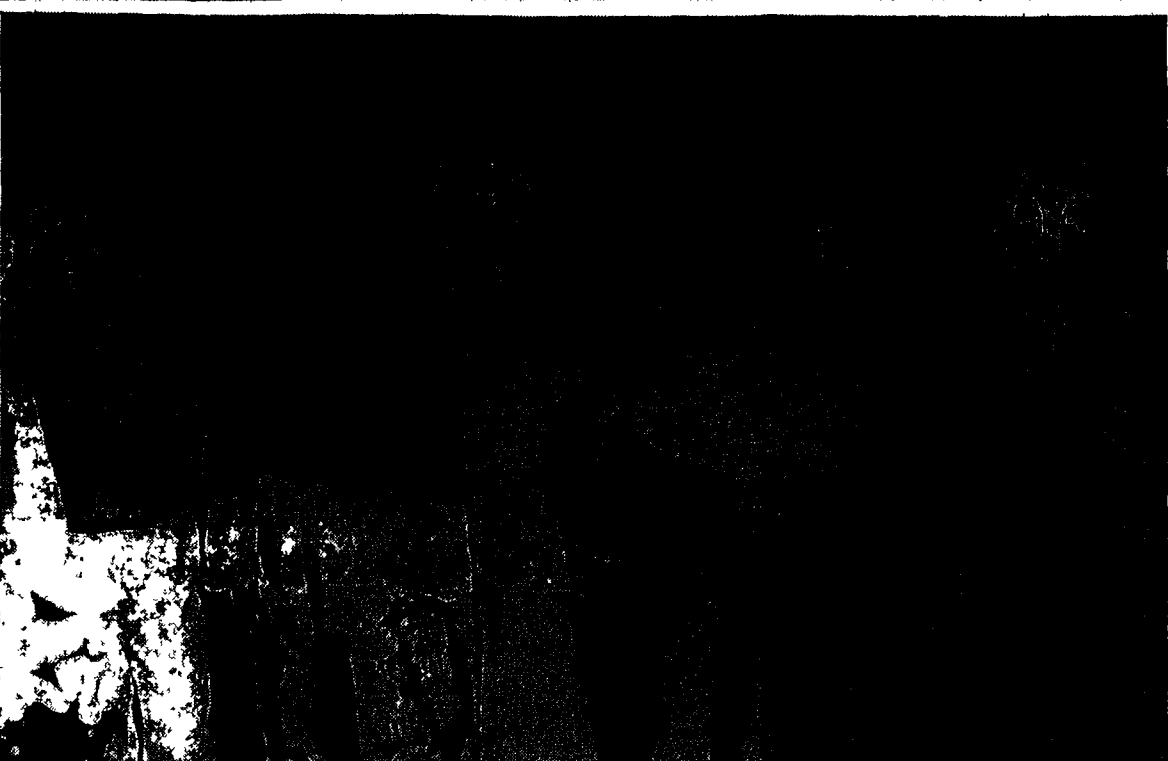

Buchanan Area Gets Estimated 12 Inches Snow

Old Man Winter arrived in Buchanan rather suddenly Sunday, Oct. 31, as a full foot of wet and heavy snow fell over the area around the city, and temperatures dropped Sunday night to 19 above zero on tested thermometers.

The weather bureau had previously prophesied snow flurries for southern Michigan, which were to be heavier toward Lake Michigan. As it happened there was no snowfall to speak of west of Galien, and only a light snow at Dayton, 4 miles to the southwest.

Buchanan farmers had just started the corn harvest. The preceding two weeks of fairly dry weather had enabled some farmers to plant winter wheat. Harvest of soy beans by combine had also made a start. It is believed that cool weather may prevent further corn sprouting, and that not much damage has been done yet, at least to the corn in the field.

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Farmers Netting Over \$400 Under Social Security

If you operate a farm and net \$400 or more, you'll be under the social security program on Jan. 1, 1955.

That's when you start to build up credit in the Old Age and Survivors' Insurance program for your dependents' protection and for your retirement, reminds J. P. Hoekzema, Berrien county agricultural agent.

To pay for this, the farm operator will pay a new tax on his 1955 income.

And Hoekzema reminds, whether you are beyond retirement age or not makes no difference on the tax. You must pay the self-employment tax as long as you continue to work — if you net farm profit is \$400 or more.

The tax will be 3% of your net farm profits up to and including \$4,200. The most anyone will pay per year will be \$126 per year — until the rate increases in 1960.

If you hire a farm worker and pay him at least \$100 per month in cash during next year, he also will come under social security. You and your worker each pay a tax of 2% of the worker's income.

Details on the social security program and how to figure your benefits are available at the county extension office, Hoekzema points out. Or you can contact a social security fieldman at 724 East Main street in Benton Harbor.

The weather was nasty and it was an off-year election, but neither factor prevented the good people of Buchanan from registering their sincere though hotly differing preferences at the polls Tuesday, when a total of 1,607 votes were cast. This represented a percentage of over 60% voting, with no specially hot local issue to fatten the turnout. The same was also true for Berrien county, with an estimated total of 40,000 voting on the basis of returns from 40 out of 69 precincts.

Regardless of the swinging political pendulums in other states, Berrien county, with a good assist from Buchanan, remained a citadel of safety for Republican incumbents, all of whom were elected or re-elected to office. Buchanan's two county Republican candidates, Representative Don Pears and Coroner R. G. Vastine went in by comfortable margins, both running ahead of the ticket in their home and three neighborhood township precincts. On the basis of early morning returns the G.O.P. incumbents appeared coasting in on 2 to 1 margins.

Of special interest in Buchanan was the adoption of the two amendments to the city charter. The two county projects seemed to be encountering varying fates. The two proposals to raise millage and create a sinking fund for a new county office building appeared to be losing, while the same proposals to create a home for the aged appeared winning.

Amendments 1, 2, and 3 were leading in Berrien county as in the entire state, but No. 4, on lotteries, was losing.

A report at 11 a.m. from the Benton Harbor News-Palladium news department gave the congressional vote as follows: Clara Hoffman (R), 59,902; Elferdink (D), 36,381. They furnished the following on the race for circuit judge: Hadsell, 18,926; Robinson, 20,310; Zick, 14,226; Hatfield, 12,342.

As the Record goes to press the incomplete returns indicate a turnover in state administrative offices, with Gov. Williams returning for a fourth unbroken fourth term in the gubernatorial chair, with a complete state corps of Democratic department chiefs around him. This forecast was based on the belief that the narrow margins of Democrat candidates at that time would be raised when Detroit returns, delayed by the breakdown of a vote-tabulating machine, are finally in. The delayed votes will come from precincts in which are normally heavily Democratic.

This year, of course, anything might happen.

Colvin Dist. Child Stricken By Polio

Glenda Lou, the three-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Dillenbeck, is receiving therapy treatment for polio at Mercy hospital, Benton Harbor. She had been stricken with the disease last Saturday. The family physician diagnosed her illness as polio. She suffered paralysis of the legs, one hand and the back of her neck, but attendants are confident that therapy will bring her back to normal.

The Dillenbecks, who reside on the road north of Colvin school, between Red Bud Trail and Main street, have four other children. All of them are well at present.

When Politics Were Hot - and Dirty

This is written on election day, Nov. 2, 1854, when it is doubtless a foregone conclusion that Buchanan will "go Republican."

"Going Republican" is a habit that Buchanan got into at an election approximately 100 years ago, when the new Republican party, born "under the oaks" at Jackson, Mich., nominated General John Charles Fremont for president.

Buchanan gave Fremont a good Republican majority, just as it has done for all Republican presidential nominees since.

George M. Dewey, the grandfather of Thomas E. Dewey, twice Republican nominee for president against Roosevelt and Truman, and now serving his third term as governor of New York, was the principal of Buchanan's first grade school at that time, and at the same time the most active Republican campaigner.

Dewey came to Buchanan from New England, arriving here in time to represent Berrien county at a gathering which first organized the Republican party "under the oaks" in Jackson in 1854. The red hot issue was the abolition of slavery. This was a natural "platform plank" for the Yankees, who

had predominated in numbers and even more in wealth and influence in the Michigan of the 1850's. The party was organized by the Puritan element who had emigrated heavily from Massachusetts and other New England states, as the European emigrants began to move in. During the time of heavy settlement in the 1830's and for a long time after, Michigan had a heavier percentage of Puritan stock than New England, the cradle of Puritanism.

Dewey was teaching in the log schoolhouses in the woods in 1854. He was a man of force and ability, and might even be called the founder of the Dewey political dynasty. He was never elected to high office but he held several important appointive offices, and he was all of his life a dynamic campaigner who championed his party in many interstate campaigns. He finished his life as publisher of a newspaper in Owosso, Mich., where his son followed as its publisher and where his grandson, Thomas E. Dewey, was born some 52 years ago.

Campaigning for the new Republican party in this region in the years before and during the Civil

War was fighting business. Many of the hardshelled Yankees who had come to Michigan for cheap public lands and who championed access to public lands as a principle, held to their old moorings, for some time after the cheap land issue was dead.

Dewey went sled-length in his adherence to abolition of slavery, alienating many of his fellow Republicans. There were at that time a considerable number of negroes in Niles who were runaway slaves or their descendants. Dewey consorted with them openly. He was seen playing cards with negroes. The card-playing itself was a sin in the eyes of many of his puritanical fellow Republicans, and while they believed in freeing the negro they did not believe in fraternizing with them.

When the 26th Michigan Infantry, mustered in in the fall of 1861, and, formed of volunteers from Niles, Buchanan, and adjacent cities, left camp at Niles via the Michigan Central for St. Louis, Mo., and points south, Dewey accompanied the troops. His experience was described jubilantly in the Niles Republican issue of March 29, 1862:

"Two cars were reserved, one exclusively for gentlemen, and one for ladies and the gentlemen who accompanied them. In the first-named car

Coach Bill Billings has fashioned a football machine that is rapidly gaining the respect of all schools in the area and also getting nervous glances from the two teams still remaining on the Buchanan football schedule.

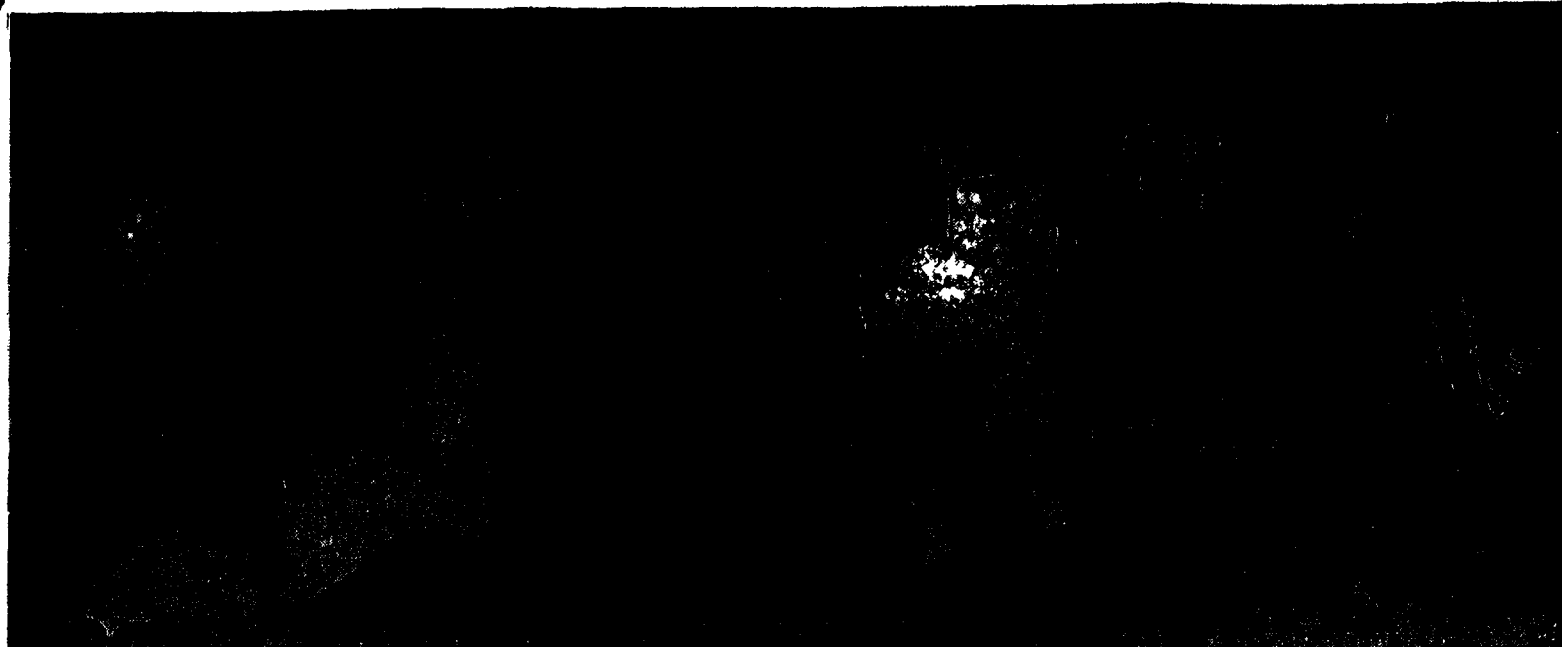
Friday night, the Bucks steam-rolled past once-beaten Hillsdale, 40-0 at Memorial Field. This marks the second week in a row that the Bucks have not permitted an opposing touchdown.

Rapidly improving and looming as potential all-state material were the one-two boys of the Bucks, Dodge Karpinski and Jim Conrad. Each back scored two touchdowns as did Dale Dellinger, to power the Buck attack.

Buchanan amassed 307 yards through rushing and passing while holding the Dales to 65. Only once did Hillsdale get as far as the Buck 40-yard stripe. The edge was decided in first downs also as Buchanan made 18 to the Dales' five.

Played in a snow fall, rain and wind situation, the game was surprising in that the Bucks did not seem bothered by the elements.

Conrad and Karpinski carried the ball down to the three and on the fourth play of the game



following the kickoff, Karpinski punched over. After that, it was mostly a mechanical devastation that the Bucks wreaked.

Following the kickoff, Buchanan held and took possession of

the ball on the Dale 41. Karpinski ran and passed and Steve Pendley passed once to power the next drive, Karpinski roaring over around right end at 3:36 in the first quarter.

The Bucks took over to start the second quarter and another drive this one starting on the Dale 47 culminated in a touchdown as Conrad plunged three yards off tackle for the tally. A 15-yard penalty at the start of the drive failed to slow the Bucks.

Aside from the long Hillsdale run of the evening by Ron Coon, a 21-yard sprint in the next series of plays, the Dales were effectively bottled up and the Bucks took over following a Dale punt.

However, the half ended before they could score again and the score of 19-0 held.

Kicking from their own two, the Dales punted poorly into the wind and the ball ended up where it started. Dellinger drove through center on the first play for the score. Pendley's kick was good.

It was Dellinger again later in the period on a ten-yard left end sweep for a touchdown. Pendley's kick was good and the score was 33-0.

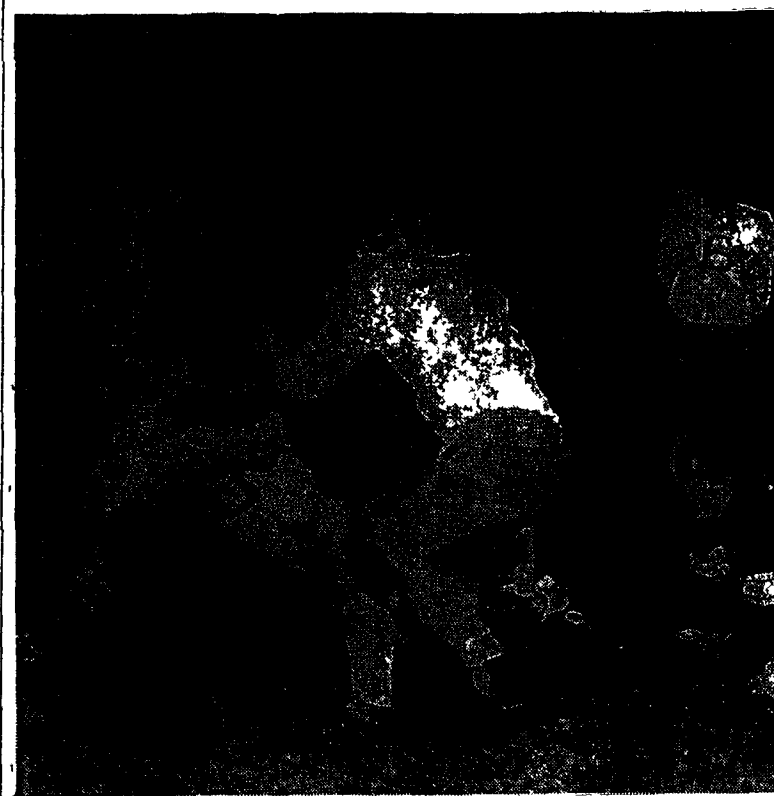
Only 1:33 remained in the final quarter as Buchanan's reserves played most of the time. However, they too, dominated play against the out-manned Dales, and Chris Schau climaxed a 74-yard drive by going ten yards for the score. Guard Bill Karpinski kicked the extra point.

Bright Stars Now In Nightly Skies As Days Shorten

The rapid shortening of the days from now until the middle of December will be the astronomical feature during November, according to Hazel M. Losh, University of Michigan associate professor of astronomy.

The sun will be moving south this month, causing a decrease in the daylight hours. By the end of the month the day will have shortened to about 9 hours and 20 minutes and the sun will be swinging in a very short arc across the sky in its daily path.

In the evening sky, Mars will still be with us, it may be easily identified by its orange color. Jupiter will be rising at about 10 o'clock and will be a bright object

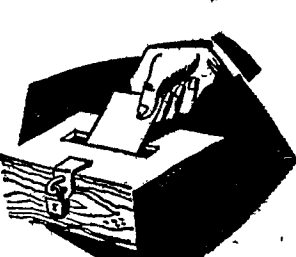

Road Commission Launches Program Pedestrian Safety

The State Safety Commission has again launched its annual fall state-wide program aimed at pedestrian protection, State Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler announced today.

"Hundreds of thousands of leaflets, posters, safe driving lessons, and radio and television announcements will be used to warn motorists and pedestrians of the special hazards of the season—greater hours of darkness, slippery pavements, dangerous weather and greater shopping crowds," Ziegler said.

"During the last 16 years 7,823 pedestrians were killed in Michigan and with traffic steadily increasing the hazards are greater every day," he warned.

The Commission is emphasizing the following safety tips to motorists:

- (1) Watch out for a pedestrian caught in the middle of the street between two lanes of moving traffic.
- (2) Let a pedestrian finish crossing the street on a red signal if he started on the green.
- (3) Look out for a pedestrian stepping back in front of you

when startled by another car.

(4) Beware of a pedestrian getting off a bus and walking around the front of it.

(5) Be alert for a pedestrian who may step from a wet highway shoulder onto the dry pavement.

(6) Keep your eyes open for pedestrians getting out of parked cars.

(7) Expect occasional "jay-walkers" between intersections.

(8) Slow down when passing crowds of shoppers waiting to cross at an intersection.

(9) Don't skid into a pedestrian on wet pavement.

(10) Don't turn left into a pedestrian on a green light—he has the "right-of-way."

The pedestrian has no physical defense against a ton and a half of steel. While he should obey the law the motorist must accept the major responsibility of looking out for him. Once he is struck and his head hits the pavement, it's all over for him.

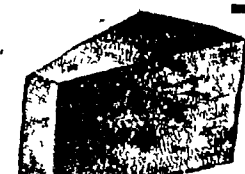

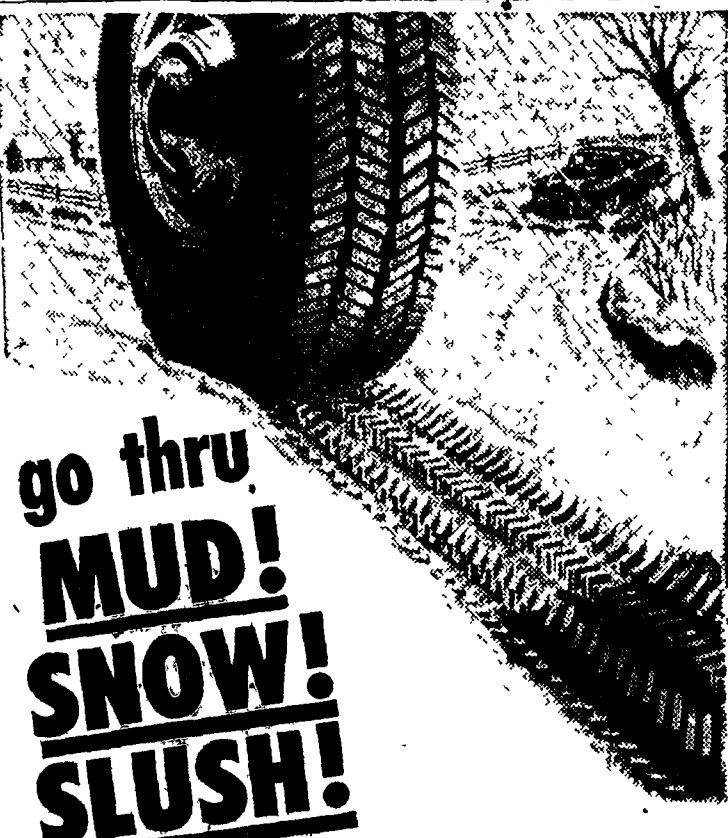

Court house round-up

A county court house is an interesting place as an election campaign swings into the home stretch. And this happens to be that week when all those unanswered questions will get answers, answers gained via the little "x" which is this nation's mark of freedom.

Ostensibly, one goes on as usual in the court house. People still come in to get marriage licenses and birth certificates, record deeds, and pay taxes.

But underlying all these routine chores, there is a tension that borders on excitement. That

tension is especially strong this year because of the hotly contested local issues this election has brought.

People all over the county are curious enough about the outcome of these local issues to turn out as much as 50,000 strong on election day, given decent sort of weather, to express their opinions on them. But court house workers are so much closer to the seat of these issues that they can't help getting all hepped up over the outcome.

So you see them in little huddles here and there about the

building. And if you could read lips, you'd find they were verbally reasking the same questions they've asked each other hundreds of times in the past several weeks.

"Who'll be the two circuit judges?" Or to be even more specific, "Will Malcolm Hatfield be one of them?"

"Will we get a new court house?"

Those are questions of vital concern to court house employees. They are the people who will have to work with the answers that the voters give.

Probably to no persons is an election a bigger headache than to County Clerk Frank X. Duerr, Jr. He's the man charged with

the responsibility of seeing to it that every person in every one of Berrien county's 68 precincts has a ballot to vote on when he goes to the polls.

Only this year, that means from seven to 10 ballots for every person going to the polls. That means that Duerr, this year, had to supervise the make-up, printing and distribution of something like a half-million ballots.

Berrien county is carrying a registration list of something like 65,000 voters this year and at an average of eight ballots each, you can readily see what that adds up to.

In addition, Duerr is responsible for seeing to it that the hundreds of people who are manning the 68 polling stations in Berrien county are properly instructed. He conducted no less than 17 different schools of instructions in various parts of the county to make sure every worker knows his job.

Michigan in the past four years has had two gubernatorial recounts. Duerr thinks another this year is entirely possible. He has put special emphasis on precinct workers doing their jobs right the first time so that Berrien county will not be one of the political goats in event another recount is in the offing.

So great a job has it been, in fact, that the work itself has almost crowded Duerr's own reelection campaign into the background. Duerr is a republican, and in a strong GOP area like

Berrien county, he should have little difficulty.

That is probably a good thing for Frank. He already suffers from ulcers.

Duerr is the one who has predicted all along that, given any kind of a clement day at all, at least 50,000 voters would traipse to the polls for this election.

That would tend to eliminate Berrien from among those counties that had Republicans all over the country in a fit of consternation over voter apathy. But it didn't stop President Eisenhower last week from bringing his personal fight against voter apathy into Berrien county—just in case.

County GOP chairman, Montgomery Shepard, received a telegram direct from the White House and over the President's signature this week calling upon him to do "everything possible" to persuade every voter to get out to the polls.

"I hear constantly about complacency and apathy toward this critical election. Friends tell me this is because the people are satisfied, on the whole, with the kind of program they are getting," the President wrote.

"It is unbelievable to me that good government cannot command as much zealous support as bad government commands opposition," the president concluded.

But as we said before, despite the election-inspired tension around the court house, business must go on as usual. And this week, labor had its day in the court house.

First a visiting judge, Charles O. Arch, of Hilledale, Mich., reversed a Michigan Employment Securities Commission appeal board ruling depriving 40 Kaywood Corp workers in Benton Harbor unemployment compensation benefits for time they lost following a 1952 strike.

His decision meant in dollars and cents, a Christmas present amounting to some \$10,000 for the 40 members of UE local 931 who struck the Kaywood plant for several months in 1952.

A MESEC referee originally had granted the employees' compensation claims, only to have that ruling reversed by the appeal board. Judge Arch ruled that the appeal board had acted in accordance with neither the law nor the facts.

The case grew out of the Kaywood's failure to rehire some of the strike workers after the walk-out terminated.

Secondly, a national Labor Relations Board hearing officer came here this week to look into demands for a representation election at Whirlpool Corp., the town's largest industrial employer.

This case also involved Amalgamated Local 931 which at the present time is the bargaining agent for the Whirlpool Corp employees as well as for those of a number of smaller plants in the area.

Two rival unions, the IAM-AFL and the IUE-CIO, are endeavoring to wrest bargaining rights away from UE.

IAM, in fact, right now claims the sympathies of a majority of Whirlpool workers, and on that basis petitioned the NLRB for a representation election IAM came with an array of witnesses to testify that alleged communist activities of IUE international officers had created "confusion and disunity among the rank and file of Whirlpool workers."

But UE wasn't about to give up without a fight. So strenuously did UE attorneys cross examine IAM witnesses in hopes of proving collusion between IAM and the Whirlpool management that the hearing failed to windup in the time NLRB had allotted it. It will be resumed and, it is hoped, completed November 18 in the court house.

The NLRB in Washington, D. C. will decide later on whether or not to approve an election in the plant on the basis of testimony taken in the current hearing.

Berrien Cancer Starts on Third Check of Smokers

One hundred and fifty members of the Volunteer organization of the Berrien County Cancer Society started today in their annual check-up in the third annual American Cancer Society's Smoking Survey.

The volunteers are under the direction of Mrs. Chalmers Colcord, R. N., Director of Professional Activities of the local Cancer Society.

Two thousand, three hundred and forty men were interviewed in Berrien county during the original survey in 1952.

This third Annual Follow-up of the Society's Smoking Survey will further clarify tobacco's relation to cancer as well as the important side issue of heart disease.

Researchers from the 10 ACS Divisions which participated in the study will check addresses and report on the men who died during the year. A complete medical study will then be made of the cause of death. This medical record will be matched with the man's smoking habits.

In the Michigan Division, far more men were interviewed than in any other single Division. The smoking habits of 36,166 men were recorded by more than 3,000 volunteers in the 73 counties participating in the survey.

It was originally planned that the study would require three to five years before any concrete conclusions could be drawn. However, the death rate difference between smokers and non-smokers became so pronounced after 18 months that the ACS announced the findings last June.

Since the original survey, 4,854 men have died, among these were 745 who smoked one pack of cigarettes or more a day. According to Dr. E. C. Hammond, ACS Director of the project, this was 819 more deaths than would have been expected if these men had died at the same rate as those who never smoked.

In the Michigan Division, there has been a total of 931 deaths, or 2.6% of the men interviewed. Michigan researchers have lost

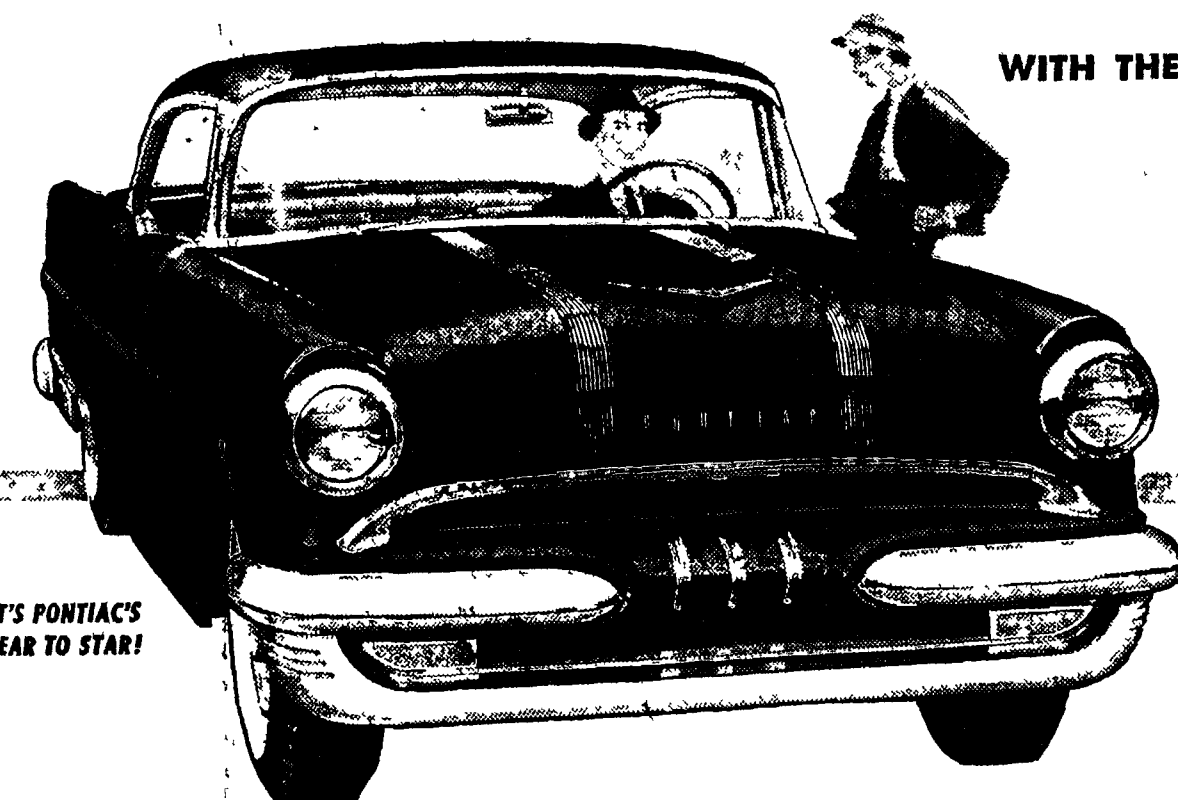

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Pollution Problem Solved in Kazoo

Sportsmen and resort owners breathed easier as the Michigan Water Resources Commission disclosed its latest stream and lake pollution survey.

Milton P. Adams, executive secretary, complimented industries on new waste disposal systems and said "marked improvement" had been made.

"We're complimenting the industries because they deserved it," he said.

It was just a year ago that

Michigan had its infamous fish-killing episode in Allegan Lake. Hydrogen sulfide in the Kalamazoo River at the same time gave off fumes which damaged the paint on nearby houses.

The survey, completed this fall, shows that pollution has been greatly reduced along the river, and in adjoining lakes. The fish are returning in great numbers.

Of the 15 sampling stations, one was above the city of Kalamazoo at Comstock bridge; three were inside the city; two below Kalamazoo and above Plainwell, two inside Plainwell, one at the Otsego dam; three below Otsego and above Allegan, and the final three were at M-89 and M-40 bridges and the municipal dam below Allegan.

Adams gave credit for part of the improvement to the Otsego Falls Paper Mills which disposed of its solid wastes and pulp mill liquors on the roads rather than in the river.

Others getting praises were Allied Paper Mills' Monarch Division, St. Regis Paper Co., Rex Paper Co., National Gypsum Co., Mill No. 2 of Kalamazoo Paper, and Divisions 4 and 7 of Sutherland Paper, the KVP plant at Parchment, Michigan Paper Co. at Plainwell and Mac Sim Bar Co. at Otsego.

The survey and the compliments to the industries ended a typical cycle — with the commission directing an operation aimed at keeping the streams and lakes for resorters and sportsmen.

Industries have been hailed before the commission, some of them taken into court, for polluting the streams with wastes. The result has been a new program of industrial waste development.

After it is all over, the commission will keep a continuing check on the streams and lakes — a part

of government not often understood.

Michigan is starting a program of education in the school system based on the principal that the younger generation must know about alcohol for its own and society's sake.

The State Board of Alcoholism isn't taking sides in the matter. Its director, Ralph W. Daniel, explains it this way:

"People have a perfect right to believe that drinking is bad. Others think differently. We just want to give young people the facts to go with what they learn at home."

He stressed that the home is where youngsters must get their first information about alcohol, and that the schools can help by teaching the economic, social and physical aspects.

Conferring both with state temperance leaders and educators, the Board of Alcoholism in cooperation with the State Department of Public Instruction, will sponsor a series of courses in elementary and high schools next year based on these points:

1. Alcohol education has the same aim as all other educations to develop wholesome personalities by promoting habits and attitudes that will be conducive to happy and healthful living.

"The boys and girls of Michigan are entitled to know about the economic, sociological and physiological effects of the use of alcoholic beverages," Daniel said.

2. Teacher training institutions should consider alcohol education in the preparation and training of teachers.

3. The major training responsibility for alcohol education lies with the classroom teachers. They could be aided by outside organizations, and state consultants.

4. The community, the school, and the students should be included in making alcohol education part of the curriculum.

5. Methods used in teaching about alcohol should be appropriate to the philosophy of the teacher and to the grade level of the student.

Draft-age students in college will have a harder time staying in school for graduate work after Jan. 1, 1955.

Col. Arthur A. Holmes, state selective service director, said the new college-deferment standards ordered by President Eisenhower will affect a large number in Michigan.

"It's going to hit a lot of them hard, but we don't know yet exactly how many," he said.

Now a student, to qualify for educational deferment, must be in the upper half of his class or score 70 on a special examination.

After Jan. 1, he will be required to be in the upper one-third of his class or score 75 on the tests. Hardest hit will be the big graduate school classes at the University of Michigan and Michigan State College.

Halloween Jokers Play Havoc With Milking Machines

The Buchanan police received a call from Mrs. Frank Keller at 9:15 a. m. Sunday, Oct. 31, stating that two milking machines at their home had been rendered useless by the theft of parts. She gave the name of a 14-year-old girl living south of Niles on Bertrand Road whom she thought might know something about it. The Keller farm is on the Boyle Lake Road, the third house on the left north of Wagner Road. She denied all knowledge of the affair. However, the police found several of the milking machine parts lying in the front yard. Confused with this evidence, the girl confessed to knowledge of the robbery and gave the name of another girl, age 14, in the Niles area, and the names of two boys, Joe Legus of Niles and Richard Kantowski of South Bend, each 17 years old.

The police called at the homes of the young people, ordering them to bring the parts home at once or warrants would be issued. The two boys came to the police station but brought none of the missing parts. They were ordered by the police to get the parts at once. They left and returned with a number of parts. Mrs. Frank Keller said that not all of the parts had been returned, about \$100 in parts values being still gone. She stated that the two milking machines would have to be reassembled by a Do-wagiac firm, in addition to all the extra labor from the loss of the milkers. The machines were re-assembled ready for use by 11 a. m. Monday.

The boys took the entire blame on themselves, stating that the girls remained in the cars and were in no way implicated. Mrs. Keller signed complaints necessitating the arrest of the boys. According to the preliminary questioning of the young people the theft was intended as a Halloween night prank and there was no intention of profit by the sale of the parts.

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Meet Your Merchant

Meet Mr. Wayne Castle, Jeweler And Citizen

This week Madame Luck (who is by no means the same as Miss Chance) presents as the weekly "Meet Your Merchant" feature, Mr. Wayne Castle, owner and operator of the Castle Jewelry & Gift Shop in Buchanan since 1946, and of the Blackmond's Jewelry & Optical Store of Niles since Oct. 11, 1954.

A relative newcomer with only a bit over 8 years residence in Buchanan to date, Wayne has nevertheless made himself a very useful citizen, in addition to creating for himself a very flourishing business.

Exactly how he got here and how he has done all that he has

since are still a bit of mystery. It seems that his friendly face rose like a full moon over the southern horizon on April 24, 1946, as he arrived from South Bend, and, first thing we knew, he was in business next door with a fistful of new franchises.

Wayne spent his youth and young manhood in South Bend, where he entered apprenticeship to a jeweler and watchmaker while he was still a student in high school in 1927. By the time he was through with his apprenticeship in 1933 business had hit bottom, and there were no openings for jewelers and watchmakers, or for any other skills as far as that is concerned. Wayne was lucky enough to get a job in the South Bend postoffice, while he waited for the dough to raise. As times bettered, he donned again that one-eye gimmick of the professional watchmaker and returned to the business of doctoring sick watches. For a short time, that

They made a deal and on the aforesaid April 24 he was just the other side of the partition from the Record, moving out the flower business and replacing it with a stock of watches and jewelry. Right away a new sign went up — "Castle's Jewelry and Gift Shop."

The business grew rapidly as Wayne began accumulating choice franchise lines in both gift and jewelry, including International Sterling silver, Haviland China and Imperial Cambridge, Fostoria and Imperial Candlewick dinnerware, and famous name brands of watches and diamonds.

Business grew rapidly and the trade area widened, as people came from as far as Benton Harbor and South Bend to buy at Castle's. On Oct. 11, 1954, Wayne widened his business still further by buying and taking possession of the Blackmond Jewelry & Op-

tical store at 301 East Main street, Niles. This involved adjustments in personnel, and Ed Karpinski, a skilled jeweler and watchmaker, was placed in charge of the Buchanan store, while Wayne took charge of the Niles establishment.

In spite of this rapid business expansion Wayne has played a large part in the community life of Buchanan. He served as a president of the Buchanan Business Association and has been continually active in that organization since its start in 1947 as head of the soliciting committee which passes on all solicitors in the business section, whether by Buchanans or outsiders, as a guidance service for the merchants.
