

Following West On Vacation Trip Of Doris Fuller

Westward ho, fellow travelers, up the Cody Road to Yellowstone Park, the oldest and largest national park in the United States. Entering the park at the east entrance, we rode through 51 miles of mountain grandeur as you follow the Shoshone River valley. The road follows the edge of the river bank and in some spots you look down, down to the rushing whirling river below. Mountains border the road on one side and the river the other. On the high cliffs you find rock formations resembling the Chinese Wall, a camel, Mt. Punch and the Holy City. Anyone that has traveled the Cody Road will remember it with delight. In Yellowstone Park there are numerous hot springs and geysers besides deer, bears, antelopes and moose. The most celebrated feature of Yellowstone is "Old Faithful" geyser which erupts every hour. There are many other geysers but "Old Faithful" is the only regular one. Many of the hot (boiling) springs are beautifully colored. If you get a whiff of something that isn't too pleasant, it is one of those steaming sulphur springs. Yellowstone Lake is another great attraction with its famous Fishing Bridge. The lake has a shore line of 100 miles and is 300 feet deep. In Yellowstone Park as in any other national park you don't need a fishing license. During the tourist season lodgings are very difficult to obtain. We left Yellowstone at the north entrance at Gardiner, Mont. Montana is wide open concerning gambling. We arrived in Gardiner about 10:30 p m, and all I could see was taverns. This town is supposed to have every kind of gambling game known. We traveled north to Butte, the city built on the side of a hill. Now we were in the Rockies. The mountains were high and the roads were good except those that were under repair. The mountains were covered with all kinds of evergreen trees. In the higher elevations snow could be seen along the roadsides and the trees had a scarce relief after miles of wide open plains. The climate was cool and the countryside green. Lumbering, mining, cattle and sheep raising are about the only sources of income in Idaho and Montana. We saw many gold mines and deserted mine shafts. We spent one night near Wallace, Idaho, in a canyon about 150 feet wide. At the particular spot where we were a road, large swift, muddy river and motel were across the canyon. Did you ever stop to realize how little of the sun some people in these valleys

see, especially when the valleys run east and west. People could talk for hours about the mountains and valleys, but seeing is appreciating. Leaving Idaho and going into Washington, lumbering was the principal occupation. We saw places on the sides of the mountains where the trees had been cut off and all that remained were the stumps. It seemed almost impossible to do lumbering on the steep sides of the mountains. The trees are extremely tall and straight and averaged 30 inches in diameter. I don't wonder any longer when the telephone poles come from Because of the rocky soil the fence posts, telephone poles and mail boxes are kept erect by piling stones around them and bracing them with sticks. The next place of interest was Grand Coulee Dam located at Grand Coulee, a city only 11 years old. The dam is the largest in the world and is twice as big as Niagara Falls. It is 20 stories high; 8 below the surface of the ground and 12 up. It contains 8 1/2 miles of tunnels. Enough water flows over it in one second to supply the city of Spokane (122,001 population) for one day. The water is pumped through tunnels to the dam. It collects less than one per cent silt behind the dam while one eastern dam collects 20 per cent. In 25 years the dam will pay for itself. The temperature down at the dam is 20 degrees cooler than in the city of Grand Coulee. Now a canal is being built to irrigate the country surrounding this area is a rim rock hundreds of feet high.

B. H. S. Ag Students Push Field Projects

(Continued from Page 1) year, all these project workers bring to the classroom the special problems that have confronted them, and they are discussed by the entire class.

Usually the projects do not cover every phase of crop production in the community, since some crop lines are not adapted to projects. Consequently the instructor must round out the course by instruction that will cover the farming of the district. This summer, for instance, there are no projects in beef production, beans, oats, orchard culture or chickens. The course must cover all these fields of production. Animal husbandry and crop instruction are related very definitely to the pro-

jects which are currently undertaken. The activities of the department cover these three main fields: supervision of actual farming programs, promotion of the Future Farmers of America organization, regular classroom work.

Active membership in the Future Farmers of America is considered very beneficial, says instructor May. It is a service and recreation organization where the boys get together and talk over their projects, pursue athletics as softball or basketball, and organize picnics and other social entertainments. Also the organization is encouraged to undertake and carry out service projects for the improvement of the community.

Responsibility to the student's own community is promoted through the course. The general crop field, including all types of agricultural production in the community, is surveyed in the fall. During the fall and winter the projects of the past summer are analyzed in class work. In the following spring organization work is undertaken on the field projects for the coming summer.

Projects for this summer are the following: Duane Bunker, a quarter of an acre of garden. Richard Clark, two acres of corn. Russell Clifton, fifty ducks, one pig. Gerald Marsh, a quarter of an acre of garden. Elwyn Noggle, one-half acre potatoes, one-quarter acre of garden. Richard Politt, two hogs. Bill Swann, four acres of potatoes. Ralph Swartz, seven acres of corn. Albert Wesner, five acres of wheat, cow and calf, sow, quarter of an acre of strawberries.
