Registration For First Aid Training Classes Is Now on At City Hall

Classes Start April 10 And 12

Free Instruction Offered In Valuable Skill At No Charge

Registration for training in first aid as a principal aim of the local civilian defense program is now in progress at the office of the clerk in the city hall.

Classes for women at the Youth Council building under the direction of Maude Slate will start Tuesday, April 10. Classes for men will start Thursday evening, April 12, at the Moccasin school gymnasium, with Leo Slate in charge. Details of these classes will be published next week.

These classes afford the people of Buchanan not only an opportunity to be of use in the case of a war emergency but also to learn a very valuable skill that will stand them in good stead at all times during their lifetime. They have now a chance to learn a life-saving, injury-relieving technique that will serve them in peace as well as in war, and to learn it from competent instructors without charge.

It would seem that, whatever private opinion anyone may have on the likelihood of atomic attack, the offer of first aid instruction is worth everyone's while.

The only charge likely is a small one for two textbooks on First Aid which would be valuable to have at all times in any home.

There should be a good turnout, war or no war. There could be a war.

Buchanan Leads In Fluoridation Of Water Supply

Tri-County Dental Society Asks All Cities In Area To Adopt Practice

During December, 1950, the city of Buchanan instituted the fluoridation of the Buchanan water supply as a measure of dental health, particularly for the young people of the city. The treatment is being continued from the funds accumulated to the credit of the water department, without any addition to the water rates.

Last week City Manager C. Leland Gunn received from the Tri-County Dental Society the following resolution recommending the practice in all cities in its area of Cass, VanBuren and Berrien counties.

"Whereas there is a rapidly accumulating body of data derived from direct studies of the artificial addition of fluoride to drinking water, and

"Whereas these data provide convincing evidence of the safety of this procedure and of its benefits in terms of reduced dental decay; therefore be it resolved that in the interest of public health the Tri-County Dental Society recommends the fluoridation of municipal water supplies, in accordance with the standards established by the Michigan Department of Health, in all of the cities of Berrien, Cass and VanBuren counties, wherever practicable."

Buchanan had already been treating its water with fluoride for four months. It is believed that it is the first city in the three counties to install the process.

In case Buchanan residents are not aware of the source of the placards titled "Survive Under Atomic Attack," they are the gift of the Clark Equipment company. The company printed several thousand for the employees of their Buchanan, Jackson and Battle Creek plants, and an extra 2,500 to cover every home in Buchanan.

The placards contain clear and complete instructions of the best-known safety procedure in the event of atomic attack. They should be posted in a conspicuous place or at least carefully preserved for an emergency. Meanwhile it would also be advisable to memorize the procedure given.

INTRODUCING YOUR WATER DEPARTMENT

There's at least one commodity which everyone in Buchanan uses daily in considerable quantity which has not advanced in price since 1893.

You'd never guess the one we mean, so we'll tell you. It's water, the people in Buchanan are today buying their water at the same price that was paid when the town first began merchandising it in 1893.

Recently on old pamphlet was discovered in the city containing the village ordinances. The pamphlet was printed by the Berrien County Record.

The ordinance contained the following schedule of charges for city water service:

Dwelling house, five persons or less, \$3. Add 50 cents for each additional person.
Bath tub, four persons or less \$2. Add 50c for each additional person.
Sprinkling, 66 ft lot or less, \$3 (Larger lots pro rata).
Wash basin, self-closing valves, \$1. Each added basin 50c.
Water closet, \$2.50. Add \$1 for each extra water closet.

Total minimum charges, \$11.50. The "self-closing faucets" then required for "wash basins" were the type that had to be held open by the hand while running.

The above annual charge of 11.50 breaks down into a charge of \$2.875 per quarter for only moderate conveniences. If a home had an extra lavatory, \$1.50 per annum would be added, raising the quarterly charge to \$3.25, regardless of the water used.

In the case of metered water, consumption was 500 gallons or less daily the charge was 40c per thousand gallons with one reduction to 35c per thousand for larger consumption.

At the present rate on metered water stands at 20c per thousand gallons and is graduated down to 2c per thousand gallons for large amounts.

City Purchases New Police Car

The city commission purchased a new police car at the Monday evening meeting, following their policy of buying a new car every year. The net cost to the city was \$400.37, after the allowance for the used car was deducted. The car purchased was a 1951 "Fordomatic". The 1950 car had 35,000 miles on its odometer, and had naturally reached the time when approaching \$150 in renovation work would be needed. The police car is controlled by several different individuals and in traffic patrol is suddenly forced into high speeds, even before it is properly broken in, to meet the emergency of clocking speedsters. It is subject to more rugged wear than the average car.

Amend Fire Ordinance

The commission held the first reading Monday night of an extended amendment of Sec. 2 of City Ordinance No. 58 relative to the "fire limits" for the business section.

The amendment will remove some of the stiff regulations regarding the use of "non-combustible materials" in building construction which have been outmoded and are no longer required by the National Fire Board for Class A construction. Some material which is inflammable when used alone are not so used in combination with other materials, as in certain types of built-up roofs.

Dump Garbage On Rural Roads

The good old habit of loading up the back end of the car with the family output of garbage and rubbish dies hard in Buchanan, and notwithstanding the present and practically universal disposal services, according to Ivan Price, supervisor of Buchanan township, who appeared before the city commission Monday night to complain of the profaning of country roadsides in this manner.

Sale Athletic Park Land Is Taken Off Ballot

Discovery Of 1946 Approval At Special Election Is Reason For The Withdrawal

The issue of a special vote of the electorate approving or rejecting the sale of such parts of the former Athletic Field not essential to city needs was withdrawn from the April 2 balloting by action of the city commission.

Reason for the withdrawal was that the city clerk had found records of a special election on the same issue held in Buchanan June 18, 1946, in which the electorate approved such sale by a vote of 370 for and 71 against.

The reason for the vote, then as now, was the desire of two factories in that area to buy more site area in the limits of Athletic Field. It was the opinion of the commission, as advised by the attorney, that the 1946 election actually disposed of the issue finally and that there is no need for another vote.

The resolution preceding that 1946 election was submitted by Commissioner Al Mun and seconded by Commissioner Claude Imhoff. The resolution then held the proviso which would not be needed now, that such transfers should occur after the completion of Memorial Field, and when the sport facilities of the new field rendered those of Athletic Field unnecessary. It specifically intimated that at such time as the city had no further need for such parts of Athletic Field as were not reserved for municipal needs (such as for water production), the needs of the Buchanan Steel Products Corporation and the Hubbard Tool & Gauge for more site land should be considered, though terms of such transfers were not indicated, other than to state that "and money recovered by the said City of Buchanan from the purchase of any part of Athletic Park shall be expended only for park and recreation purposes."

Passage of the measure required not less than 60% majority of the electors voting. The measure actually carried by a vote of 84% for and 16% against.

Days Sidewalk Starts This Week If Steel Arrives

Work is scheduled to start during the coming week on the rebuilding of the sidewalk culvert over McCoy's creek on the west side of Days avenue from No. 2 street to Front street, the only question mark being the arrival of steel.

The contractor, the Berrien County Construction company, has signified its readiness to do the work at once. Delivery of the required steel is promised for this week. When it comes it will be piled on the west side of Days avenue.

The construction will include 535 linear feet of reinforced concrete, the cost of which will be shared equally by the city and the three adjacent property owners, which are the Buchanan Co-ops, the Indiana & Michigan Electric company and the Tonnellier estate, owners of the Hotel Buchanan property.

Nephew Of Mrs. Albert Siekman Is Killed In Korea

Mrs. Albert Siekman, Sr., received word Tuesday that her nephew, Pvt. William Grieschen, 25 years old, of St. Joseph, had been killed in action in Korea, March 8. A son of Mr. and Mrs. William Grieschen, Pvt. Grieschen was a veteran of World War II, and while he was not in any of the battles, he was in Japan when the war ended. He was recalled from the US Army reserves, Oct. 25, 1946, and assigned to the 24th Division. He was well known to the young folks of Portage Prairie.

Ground Clearing Is Started On Site Of New Clark Building

Work was begun by the Christian Construction Monday in pouring the foundation and floor for the new location to which the material-storing building to the east of the front axle (old Drill) building which is to be moved to a location directly to the north to make room for the construction of the structure to be erected by the Austin Construction company of Chicago.

Work has also been started clearing a strip of orchard recently bought at the rear of the Clark property, to be used in part by the new building site and in part for a parking lot to the east of it. The new structure will house the Heat Treat and Axle departments which are to be moved from the former axle building to create space for the expansion of the new material-handling truck department at the Buchanan plant.

Anderson's New Dairy Building Ready By April 1

Harold Anderson's new "milk house", incidentally rated as one of the most beautiful and sanitary in construction in southwest Michigan, to say nothing of northern Indiana, will be ready to move into by April 1, states the contractor and builder, Kenneth Gearhart.

The 50x100 foot dairy structure, built of attractive ivory glazed tile with black trim at top and bottom, is one of the finest improvements to be added to the Buchanan business section in many years. It is as attractive outside as inside. The interior is divided into nine rooms, not counting two toilets.

The sales room in front, 16x36 in dimension, and the processing room, 30x36 feet in dimension, each has contrasting walls, with light blue below and ivory above. All other rooms have ivory walls. They include bottle-washing room, 20x24 feet, garage, 30x50 feet, milk storage room, 12x28 feet, hardening room, 9x12 feet; two packaging rooms, 12x16 feet each.

The floors are of emery aggregate providing a very hard and very sanitary room base. The windows are of glass block, with interior surfaces flush with the walls, so that they can be more easily washed down. Around the base of the walls is a narrow gutter, 6 inches wide by 8 inches deep, all of which converge to one outlet into the storm sewer. These gutters catch the water from wall-washing and also drain the floors. Taking the place of pipe drainage under the floors, they remove the hazard of frozen pipes. The roof is of steel, with no under-ceiling.

The building is set back from the sidewalk 48 feet. In the event that more room should be needed it is likely that the building will be extended in that direction. Car parking facilities 32 1/2 feet wide will be available for customers on each side of the building.

Plumbing is being installed by H. H. Banke, wiring by Robert Bowers, and refrigeration by J. C. Ovington.

Proposed Amendment To The State Constitution Relative To Annual Regular Sessions Of The Legislature.

No. 1. A Joint Resolution of the 1951 Legislature proposing an amendment to Section 15 of Article 17 of the State Constitution providing for annual regular sessions of the Legislature.

(Proposal No. 2)
Proposed Amendment To The State Constitution By Adding A New Section To Article X, Authorizing The Payment Of A Death Benefit Bonus With Respect To Military Service.

No. 2. A Joint Resolution of the 1951 Legislature proposing an amendment to Article X by adding a new section thereto, to stand as Section 25, providing a bonus of \$500.00 to survivors of persons in military service who have died or shall hereafter die from service connected causes, between June 27, 1950, and the termination of the state of national emergency.

Morris Farms Report Record Run Maple Sap

Started Tapping Trees Feb. 19; Now Making Last Heavy Sap Gathering

This has been one of the best seasons for the maple sap run in many years, states Rex Milhon, superintendent of the Morris Farms, east of Buchanan.

The Morris Farms sap-gathering force was making what they believed would be their last heavy sap collection yesterday (Wednesday) afternoon, but will be boiling the sap the rest of this week. They started tapping the trees on Feb. 19.

Weather conditions since then have been ideal for quantity and quality, because of a prolonged daily variation above and below freezing temperatures. On the days when the mercury consistently remained below the freeze mark, the sap would stop. Then when the swing above and below 32 degrees began again, the sap would flow heavily as at the start of a new season. There has been no succession of several unusually warm days such as sends the sap up into the buds, starting growth and giving the sap a bitter taste.

The F.C.C. Plans 65 New TV Channels!

The Federal Communications Commission announced on March 22 its plans for 65 new TV channels in the UHF (ultra high frequency) range. Here is a statement from a Chicago newspaper of March 24:

"The possibility of new channels (14 to 83) poses no major alterations problems for ZENITH sets

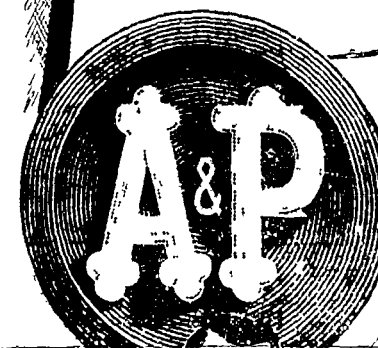

1st Three Months 1951 Very Dry In Buchanan District

Rainfall Total First Three Months 60% Normal
The first three months of 1951 have been dry—much dryer than they seemed, because of the fact that a comparatively light snowfall in January and February accumulated because of very little thawing weather.

The recordings taken for the first quarter at the local Indiana & Michigan Electric company power plant at Buchanan were as follows in inches of rainfall:

1951 1950 Normal
January 2.10 4.19 2.44
February 1.35 3.29 2.40
March 1.07 2.43 3.21

Consequently the rainfall, with only two days lacking in March, has been only 60% of the normal and only about 40% of the 1950 precipitation for the same period which kept the ground frozen well into March, there has been little loss from thawing, but the drought conditions will be soon manifest unless rain or snow comes.

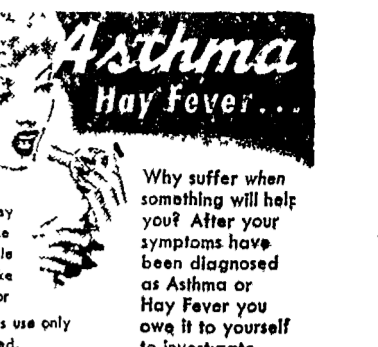
