Of the 1100 children between the ages of six and 16 years enrolled in the Buchanan public schools, over 500 are not enrolled in any church or Sunday school in the community. Letter From Richard Troutfetter To The Buchanan Record; Buchanan, Michigan. I just received my first copy of the Record after arriving overseas in England.

I was reading the "With the Boys in Service" and noticed that Donald Longworth was also somewhere in England in the Eighth Air Force. As soon as I finish this letter I am going to write to the E T O headquarters and maybe they can find out what his address is. If so I may be able to find him and talk of old times back in good old Buchanan, and you can't really imagine what it would mean to be back there again.

It really means a lot to me to get my copy of the Record as scarce and far between as it is, but even if the news is old it sounds good to me and then again I can find out what my old school pals are doing in the service.

I know the people of Buchanan are doing all they can towards the war effort, but one thing I think means most to us boys is to get plenty of mail from folks at home.

I suppose that you will print this letter so I will take this opportunity to say hello to everyone and all my friends there at home. The people of Britain are sure very nice to us and treat us marvelous and make a guy feel at home.

Well, for now I'll have to close with, so long and hope to get the Record regular all the time.

Lee Lundquist Writes. The Record was loaned several letters written by LeRoy Walquist, now fighting in Italy, to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Walquist. Selections from the letters follow.

Oct. 29, 1943—We had a fairly good trip coming over, which is all I can say. We saw several flying fish and sharks and the water was every shade of blue that you can imagine. We are in North Africa now. The living conditions among the natives are the worst I have ever seen. It's only a feeble description to say they are filthy. The first thing that caught my eyes was the old fashioned freight cars. The first time I saw them I thought they were oversized grain boxes on low-wheeled wagons. The natives raise good horses, small donkeys, camels and generally a bunch of kids.

The days are warm and the nights cold. There are quite a few cacti, cork trees and fig trees. I have been in Casablanca a few times. Some of the buildings are fairly modern, but the transportation is mostly donkeys, horses and bicycles.

Nov 10—There are plenty of Arabs around here. The only thing we can buy is oranges and French candy. The candy is made from figs and dates. I nearly became sick on it Sunday. This is the rockiest place I have ever seen. North Africa seems to be mostly rocks.

Nov 15—Our company from Ft. McClellan is still pretty much intact. We have quite a bit of French candy but it is not half as good as our good old American candy. One thing they have here is wine. It is powerful stuff. The rainy season is starting here in North Africa.

Nov 25—Today is Thanksgiving day and we spent an enjoyable day wading through the mud of North Africa. Everyone is sitting around the tent writing this evening. It is the first time we have had to write in almost a week. The Arabs have a herd made up of donkeys, goats, cows and sheep grazing behind the tent. They also have some roosters that have a habit of crowing about midnight. If those roosters crow again tonight we will have chicken for dinner tomorrow. We have learned what the forty and eight freight cars is like the last couple of months.

A girl from the Red Cross was kind enough to drop nuts in one of the how lines last night. Everyone was pushing everyone else trying to get in her line. Dec. 5—It's Sunday today and we aren't doing much of anything but lying around. I am lying on my shelter-half in the sun trying to write some letters. I just finished washing out a bunch of clothes which gave me a dollar when I was on furlough and wanted me to call. The sun is shining and that dollar some time use. The money I am sending in any way you please. Dec. 12—I am now somewhere in Italy. Due to the war the living conditions of the people are much the same as in Africa. A person can really appreciate the United States after seeing how these people live. We bought some nuts and apples today. I was surprised to find apples in a place like this. Dec. 19—The sun is shining and it's really a pretty day here in Italy. There is a herd of sheep and goats in a field near our tent and a small Italian boy is trying without much success to ride one of the goats. After being unassigned for about eight months I have finally joined a division and am feeling quite good about the whole thing. I am sleeping in a pup tent with a guy named Woolard. He is in one of the pictures I took at Ft. McClellan.

She married Elmer Rouse in 1927. He died in 1935.

Complete Lease on City Tract To C. Hubbard

City Sells Land Along Creek Between Dewey and Third to Clark Equipment

The arrangements for lease of a tract 230 feet long north and south, 80 feet wide on the north end and 65 feet wide on the south end, situated south of Smith st., between the mill race and McCoy's creek were completed Tuesday evening at a special meeting of the council to hear objections.

No objections were entered after the city commission had explained to people present interested in Athletic park that the leased ground is not on the tract donated in 1922 to the city for park purposes, but is on a tract to the north between that tract and Smith street, which the city bought from the late Charles Treat for potential factory locations at the time a site was given to the Ward Refrigerator company. The tract leased lies between the tennis courts and the ground reserved along the creek for a drive into the park. The north line is about 20 feet south of Smith street, the city having reserved the ground between because it is traversed by the water main from the pumps in the park.

The city also completed arrangements for the sale of about 40 feet along the west side of McCoy's Creek to the Clark Equipment company, for \$100, to be used for future building purposes by that company.

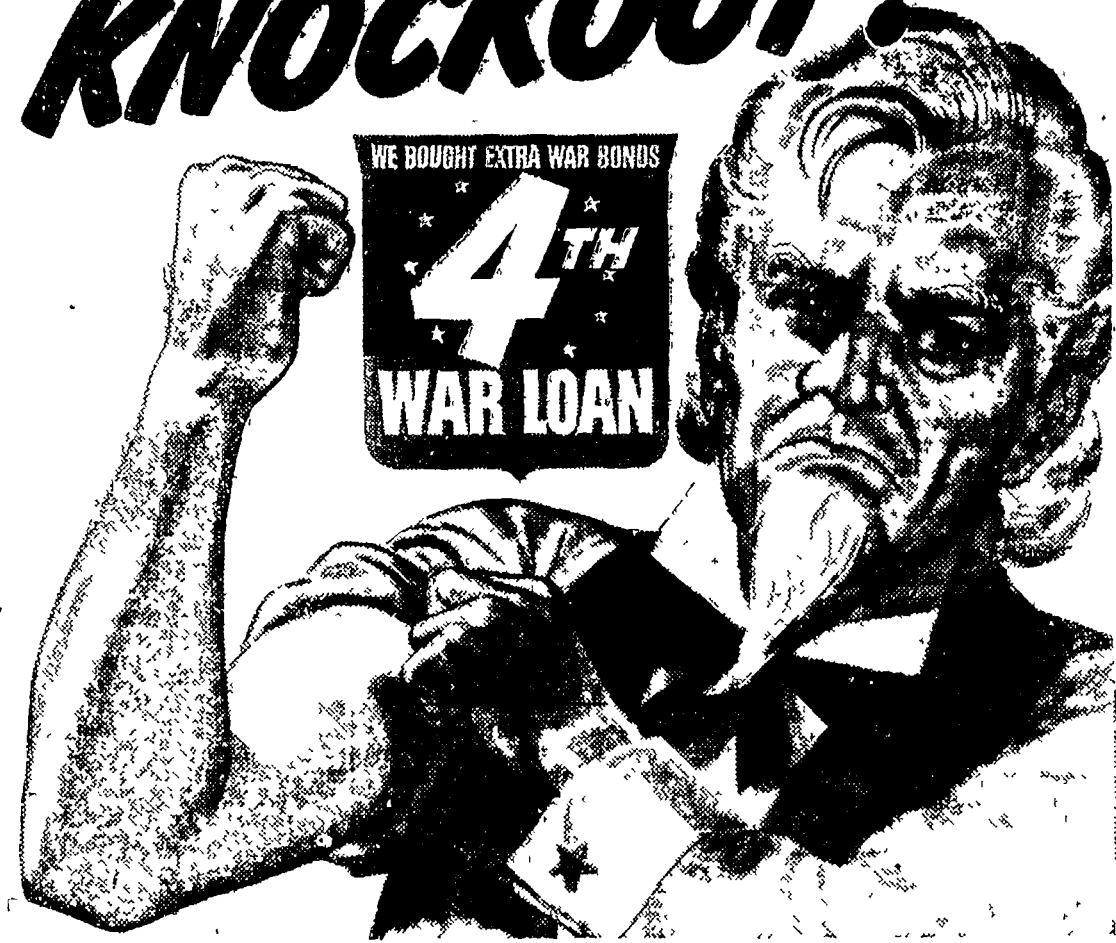
