Number Infantile Paralysis Case Up 50 Per Cent

On the eve of the infantile paralysis summer outbreaks, a recapitulation of the figures available show that the number of poliomyelitis cases in the country is running about 50% ahead of a year ago, it was announced today by Dr. Don W. Gudakunst, Medical Director of The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

As of May 31, the number of new cases this year were 642 as compared with 424 cases for the same period in 1944.

Sharp increases have been reported in the New England states, Middle Atlantic states, South Atlantic area, and the East South Central states. In the Pacific Coast and West South Central areas which have been hard hit during the past two years, there has been a noticeable drop in the number of new cases. The remainder of the country is running about the same as last year.

While the fact that there are 50% more cases in the country this year than in the same period in 1944, "this is not an alarming situation but it should be watched carefully," said Dr. Gudakunst. The medical director also declared that, "The National Foundation based on its experience of assisting in severe outbreaks of infantile paralysis during the past years, is in splendid condition to render real service to medical and public health authorities in an epidemic of infantile paralysis wherever it may occur. We stand ready and willing to help the state, county, and local health authorities at a moment's notice."

As a further aid in the fight against infantile paralysis, the National Foundation is distributing hundreds of thousands of bulletins entitled "When Polio Strikes" which includes many helpful hints for parents. It also contains a series of simple precautions to be taken by parents during the summer months.

Ten Food Stamps Valid On June 1

Five more red stamps for meats and fats and five more blue stamps for processed foods became valid June 1.

The red coupons are V2 through Z2, the blue coupons are D1 through H1. After June 2 the following stamps are not good: Red—Y5, Z5 and A2 through D2; Blue—H2 through M2; and sugar coupon No 35.

Point values in the immediate future are:

Meats, Fats, Etc.—Book 4 red stamps Y5, Z5 and A2 through D2 good through June 2, E2 through J2 good through June 30; K2 through E2 good through July 31, Q2 through U2 good through Aug. 31, V2 through Z2 valid June 1 through Sept 30.

Used Fats—2 meat points given for one pound of waste fat.

Processed Foods—Book 4 blue stamps H2 through M2 good through June 2, N2 through S2 good through June 30; T2 through X2 good through July 31, Y2, Z2 and A1 through G1 good through Aug. 31, H1 through L1 valid June 1 through Sept 30.

Sugar—Book 4 stamp 35 good for five pounds through June 2, Stamp 36 good for five pounds through Aug. 31. Next stamp valid Sept 1.

Shoes—Book 3 airplane stamps 1, 2 and 3 good indefinitely. OPA says no plans to cancel any. Next stamp valid Aug. 1.

Gasoline—15-A coupons good for 4 gallons each through June 21; 16-A coupons become valid June 22 for six gallons each B-6, B-7, C-6 and C-7 coupons good for five gallons each. Ration boards will accept applications for increase B rations beginning June 11.

Fuel Oil—Period 1 through 5 coupons good through Aug. 31. Last year's period 4 and 5 coupons also expire Aug. 31.

Berrien County Tax Rate Fixed At \$4 Per Thousand

A \$4 per thousand tax rate, plus a one-half mill for post-war contingencies, was approved Monday by the Berrien county board of supervisors in the adoption of the 1946 budget.

The tax rate is based on a county valuation estimated at \$104,000,000. Estimated expenditures were set at \$464,874 and estimated receipts were listed at \$53,000, leaving \$411,874 to be raised by taxes. The current budget, which is \$31,114 less than the budget for next year, was figured on an equalized valuation of \$118,000,000 and carried a rate of 3.2 mills. In the current budget there was a one mill debt service levy which was not spread in the new budget.

While in session Monday the supervisors approved the appointment of Ted Stebbens, horticultural specialist, as assistant county agricultural agent.

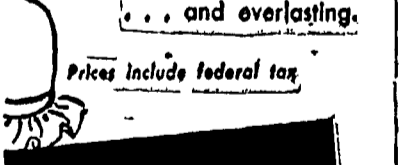
