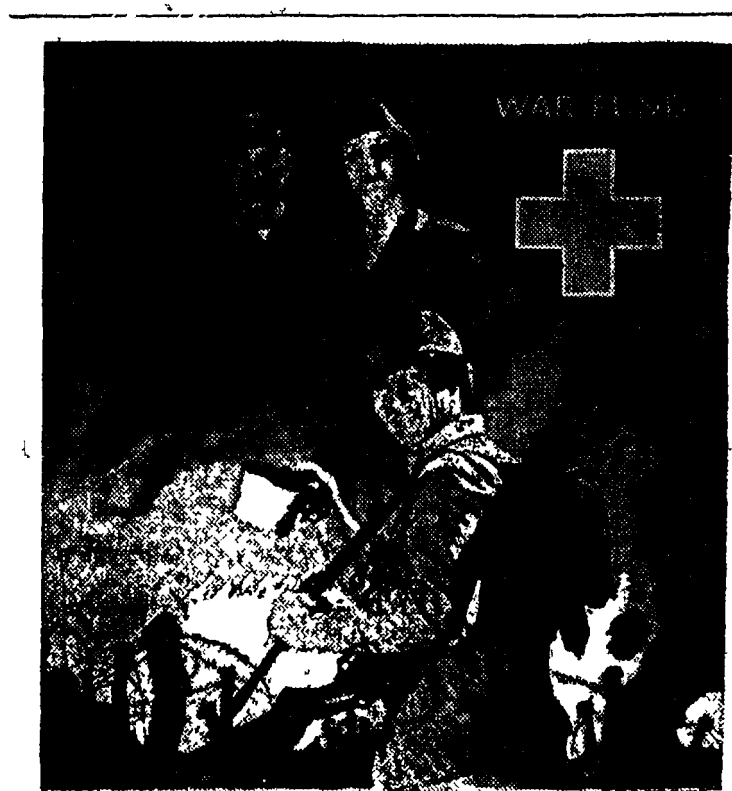

Rubber Output Up While official statistics are lacking, reports from the Americas indicate total hemisphere production of rubber now has exceeded an annual rate of 30,000 tons on its way toward an announced goal of 100,000 tons or more in 1944-45. Whether this goal is reached depends upon how successful rubber development authorities are in overcoming transportation, food supply, diseases and manpower obstacles to rapid increase in collection of wild rubber in the vast forests of the Amazon and Central America.

It is suggested that they should not be exposed to temperatures below 28 or 29 degrees in winter because of the danger of freezing. the army anyway? Why should I try to get a higher education, when I'm only the little dumbbell of my class? These are statements and questions made and asked by many people today.

Let us consider the first statement. I can get practically any job I want without lifting a finger. Perhaps this is true, that is, if your standards aren't too high. Some occupations demand a higher education than high school. Whether it is war time or not. Even though you can get many jobs today without a college education and even without a high school education, why should you allow yourself to accept these when you could get something better by a few years of study? Another factor to consider is that the war will be over some day and then you won't be as plentiful as they are now. After the war is over the person without at least a high school education won't be able to get a job. Many jobs will require a college education and just so, for aren't people who have advanced training usually more qualified to handle a particular position?

You who are draft age may think you have an argument against study, but actually you have no foundation for it. Have any of you ever talked to boys in the service about this? If you haven't you should. Most of them will tell you to stay in school as long as you possibly can and to study while you are there. Every bit of knowledge you can obtain will be of use to you in the service. Many of the boys who enlisted before they finished school and didn't study while they were in school, regretted it. Then motto is "Get an education while you can."

Now we shall consider you, the dumbbell in the class. Do you hold this title because you are really dumb, or is it because you don't try? In most cases it is the latter reason. There may be any number of reasons for your lack of interest in obtaining an education. If you stop to analyze the situation you will find there are many more reasons "pro" than "con." The more you learn the greater your desire for attaining a higher education becomes.

Many young people, and old

ones too, take the attitude that because the world is in such a state as it is, there is no reason for them to try to better themselves and change it.

You are wrong and they are wrong if they believe this. You are learning by the mistakes being made today and if you study and become educated you can help change conditions so that the same things do not happen again in the future. The young people of America must have an education because they are to be the leaders of tomorrow.

Library Installs A Dictionary of Authors of World

Biographies of more than 1850 writers who have, in a literary sense, flourished since 1900, are now available to local readers in Twentieth Century Authors, the 1577-page biographical dictionary of modern world literature just received at the Buchanan public library, Lillian Viganesky, librarian, announced today.

In preparation for over four years, Twentieth Century Authors presents narrative sketches of more than 1850 world literary figures who have published in English since the turn of the century. Included with the American and British authors are the better known Russians, Germans, Poles, Frenchmen, Swedes, Finns, etc.,

whose writings have been translated into English. More than 1700 portraits accompany the biographies. Information about hundreds of these authors is nowhere else available.

Twentieth Century Authors takes the place of two earlier, much-used volumes, Living Authors and Authors Today and Yesterday, both of which went through many editions before going out of print. The new book does not merely revise the sketches of the writers who appeared in the earlier volumes—every sketch has been completely rewritten, and there are 1050 more biographies in Twentieth Century Authors than in Living Authors and Authors Today and Yesterday combined.

The editors have dedicated Twentieth Century Authors to Eugene Petrov, the "Russian Mark Twain," the first author of the 1850 in the volume, to die an active service. To quote from the Editor's Preface "Scores of our authors are now in the service of the United Nations, leveling word or gun at the enemy. One gave his gallant life on July 2, 1942, in the tremendous defense of Sevastopol. To the memory of Eugene Petrov, soldier of freedom, this volume is dedicated."
