Honor Won In Flying Fortress Raid on Sept. 6

Shot Down German Plane In Battle Over Meault Plane Factory

Sergt William E McIntosh, son of Mrs Mabel McIntosh, West Chicago street, and known to his Buchanan friends as "Babe," was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross on Sept 21 for distinguished service in the Flying Fortress raid on the Potez aircraft factory at Meault, France, on Sept 6

Sergt McIntosh served as a ball turret gunner on one of the Flying Fortresses, bringing down a German plane The decoration was received from the hands of Maj Gen Carl Spaatz "somewhere in England"

McIntosh had not been in England over two weeks when he took part in the raid Mrs McIntosh had received a letter from her other son in service, Charles McIntosh, written on Aug 31, saying that he had heard from Babe and that he had arrived in England and was stationed only forty miles away. The two brothers expected to meet that week Charles McIntosh had been in England since last spring, serving as mechanic in a ground crew in the air service

Babe McIntosh left for the service on Jan 26, 1942. He had gone to Chicago some time before and was working in a tin shop there At Jefferson Barracks, St. Louis, Mo, he was assigned to radio work and studied for the post of radio operator on a plane. From there he went to Tampa, Fla, and thence to Sarasota, Fla, where he went into training as a machine gunner, to combine the two posts From there he went to Massachusetts and then to Dow Field, Maine

Mrs. McIntosh and her daughter went to Bangor to visit Babe in July, when it was expected that he would leave. She said that at that time he was brimming over with eagerness to get across, and into action, to "get it over with" He was very enthusiastic about his work. However his unit was not sent over at that time, but instead went to a New Jersey post and waited several weeks There during the latter part of July he received an arm fracture in a plane crash

Babe came to Buchanan in 1934, when the McIntosh family came here from Chicago He attended school here, from 1934 until 1936 He was not much given to sports but played one year with the Future Farmers softball team His main hobbies seemed to be driving cars and making model airplanes. He was always of a "happy-go-lucky" type, but he gave his friends the impression that he was "never afraid of anything—a born dare-devil"

He was born in St. Louis, Mo., on Sept 14, 1910. Consequently he was 23 years old this past Monday. Charles McIntosh, also serving in England, is 25 years old Another brother, Clarence, now at home, is 17

The 35 decorations were all given to men who had participated in the Flying Fortress raids over occupied Europe Four of the decorations were awarded posthumously to men who had been killed or fatally wounded in action of the others, only 23 were present at the ceremony and three of them still wore wound bandages

The awards to the living included two distinguished service crosses, 14 distinguished flying crosses, and 15 Purple Hearts It was the first time that Flying Fortress men in this theater of the war received the DFC. Among them were three middle westerners, First Lieut Frank R. Beadle, Grand Rapids, Mich, Second Lieut. Robert C. Scheible, Akron, O., and Sergt William E. McIntosh, Buchanan, Mich Another Michigan man, Sergt William E. Schinke of Manistee, won the Purple Heart, while another Purple Heart was awarded posthumously to Sergt. Riley R. Wilsey of Racine, Wis., who was killed in the Potez aircraft factory at Meault, France, Sept. 6.

Only eight precincts in the entire district were unreported at the time of the above count Judge Ferguson was leading in local and county returns and was indicated as a two-to-one winner over the state

War Continues to Make Inroads in Local Faculty

Miss Bovee Resigns; Stark to Lower Enrollment Age For Kindergarten

The personnel of the Buchanan Faculty presents a changing picture during the first weeks of school with replacements arriving for the posts left vacant by Claude Carter and Dawn Gates, and a new vacancy with the resignation of Miss Jean Bovee, physical director for girls, who has resigned to go Oct 1 to Springfield, Mo., to enter government work in physiotherapy

Mrs Helen Swartz, formerly Miss Helen Wells, daughter of the late George Wells of Portage Prairie, will join the high school faculty on Monday of next week to teach mathematics, replacing Joseph Hyunk, who goes to the science department vacated by Claude Carter This is a temporary adjustment until a permanent science teacher can be secured Mrs Swartz taught 15 years in the schools of Plymouth, Ind., but comes only for the emergency here

Miss Bertha Flynn of Huntington, Ind, is replacing Miss Dawn Gates, who goes to teach at Beecher Heights, a suburb of Flint. A farewell party will be given Thursday by the teachers honoring Miss Bovee and Mr. Carter. Miss Gates has already gone.

Supt Stark states that if there is sufficient demand from the patrons the age limit for kindergarten entrance will be lowered It had been announced that only children five years old by Nov. 1, 1942, would be accepted Children who will be five by Jan 1, 1943, will be accepted if there seems to be sufficient call Supt Stark said that this was not considered good educational policy over the country, as it tends to let in children not ready for school attendance. Also it will increase the physical problem of caring for the children. However an assistant is to be employed for that department in the local schools

The enrollment of the high school was lower at the end of last week than at the corresponding date last year, because of a slump in attendance of juniors and seniors. The freshman class is larger than usual in the grades the enrollment is about the same as that of last year The enrollment in all grades is as follows: kindergarten 84; first 72, second 70; third 88, fourth 84; fifth 88; sixth 97, seventh 71, eighth 72; ninth 116; tenth 90; eleventh 68; twelfth 70.

At the end of the first week the enrollment for the junior and senior high school was 487, that of the entire school 1070.

They will send out notices later this week to their customers, informing them on the particular days when each section of the city will receive deliveries The action is taken to conserve transportation costs, in conformance with war needs of the nation

500 Women Are Wanted to Help Canning Food

Men as Well as Women May Register by Phoning 58, 59, or 1452 Niles

An appeal has been issued jointly by the Michigan Mushroom Company of Niles and the women's volunteer harvest committee also of Niles, for women volunteers from Buchanan to aid in canning tomatoes at the Niles Mushroom Company plant

This work is now in progress and will be concluded in a few days so that any volunteers should report soon They state that wages of 35 cents an hour are paid, and that if as many as six or more report for work from Buchanan, transportation will be provided There is a particular demand for aid in canning tomatoes now, since the crop is on the verge of spoiling, but afterwards there will be need for help in canning pears, apples and other fruit These products are being canned for army use

Men as well as women may volunteer for the work and may register by telephoning either 58, 59 or 1452 Niles. The plant-cannery will handle 100 tons of tomatoes every 24 hours, provided workers are available Women unable to work four or eight hours are urged to volunteer for two or three regular employees and officials regular employees and officials who are working 18 hour shifts

The Niles officials state that women may work for themselves, but state also that this represents an opportunity for church or other organizations with social or patriotic programs to make money for their causes

At least that is what they look like—the writer is no authority. The spear, if such it be, has several holes drilled through the point and the shank of the point, as though to permit tying it to the shaft

Pease found the relics, together with some Indian stone beads, in some loose gravel in the driveway at his home at 604 Days avenue. It seems likely that whoever hauled the gravel must have dug into a cache of Indian weapons and utensils. But to date Rev Pease has not been able to find out where it came from He would be pleased for any information on the matter.

To Place Large Map in Window Mich. Gas Office

Card Index of Names, Addresses and Information To Be Maintained in Library

A project was initiated in the past week through the Buchanan Public Library for the establishment of an information file on young men from Buchanan and surrounding vicinity now serving in any of the armed forces

There is at present no complete list of all local men in army and navy service In order to bring the list up to date—arrangements have been made for the construction of a map approximately 4x8 feet in dimension to be displayed in the window of the Michigan Gas and Electric Company at the corner of Oak and Front street This map is to represent only the United States, on which all military bases will be located. Small thumb tacks of pins will be used to represent Buchanan men, to be placed at their camp location and moved as they are transferred in the spaces at each end for the two oceans will be placed arrows pointing toward the various foreign lands where local men are serving. These arrows will be labeled as "England," "Iceland," "Australia," etc

Along these arrows will be placed the pins representing the men serving in these territories Attached to each pin will be a small piece of tagboard with an index number representing the man. As at present planned, different colored pins will be used to represent the different services

At the side of the map will be a typewritten list of the men serving from here, listed in alphabetical order. Opposite the name of each man will be his index number. For instance, if there are seven men whose last names begin with the letter T, they will be listed as T-1, T-2, T-3, etc., and the same for all other letters

With the pin representing the first man listed under T will be a small piece of tagboard paper with the number T-1 either typed or written in black ink. The map will then be placed about 12 to 18 inches from the plate glass, at a good reading distance. It is hoped that the people of Buchanan who have boys in the service or who have relatives or friends whom they are interested in, will report all names not on the map and the locations of such men, thus cooperating with the sponsors in keeping the file up to date

The map is under construction at the Buchanan Public Library now. The informal committee at work realizes at least part of the practical difficulties of the task they have undertaken and will doubtless find more as the work develops They realize that the listing of the men will always lag somewhat behind their transfers But the results of the project will depend mainly on the extent to which the public shows interest and actively cooperates in reporting 1 Men not listed on the map, 2 Transfers of men listed, 3 Incorrect names and placements

While the map and the listing cannot be perfect the committee selected the project as the most practicable means of bringing information on local men as nearly up to date as possible By checking the index numbers accompanying the pin representing each man with the typewritten list of names at the side, it will be possible to locate any man in whom anyone may be interested

The map will be made on a celotex background in which pins or thumbtacks may be easily inserted. It will be enclosed in a frame and over it an electric light will be dropped. It will be as carefully and attractively made as possible with the talent available. Under the supervision of Mrs. Lillian Vigansky at the Buchanan Public Library a card index file of information on local men in service will be maintained. Relatives and friends are invited to bring the addresses of the men there and have them listed, keeping them up to date. This will (Continued on Page 4)

The air group came to attention as the two generals marched onto the field to stand beside a table stacked high with military decorations. A moment later the men to be decorated came marching forward between the ranks of their comrades.
 One man did not march. Seated in a wheel chair beside the table, one handaged leg propped up on pillows, was Seigt. Frederick Rich of Erie, Pa. He was awarded the Purple Heart. Rich was wounded on Aug. 24 when the bomber on which he was a gunner was attacked by an enemy plane after a raid on a ship yard at Le-Tiat, France. The other heroes who still wore bandages were First Lieut. Eugene M. Lockhart, Hillsboro, N. C., and First Lieut. Richard F. Starks, Midway, Kentucky, who received the distinguished service cross. Lockhart was awarded the Purple Heart.

 An adjutant read the orders describing the particular action for which each award was made. Then Gen. Spaatz passed quickly down the line pinning on medals and congratulating the birdmen.

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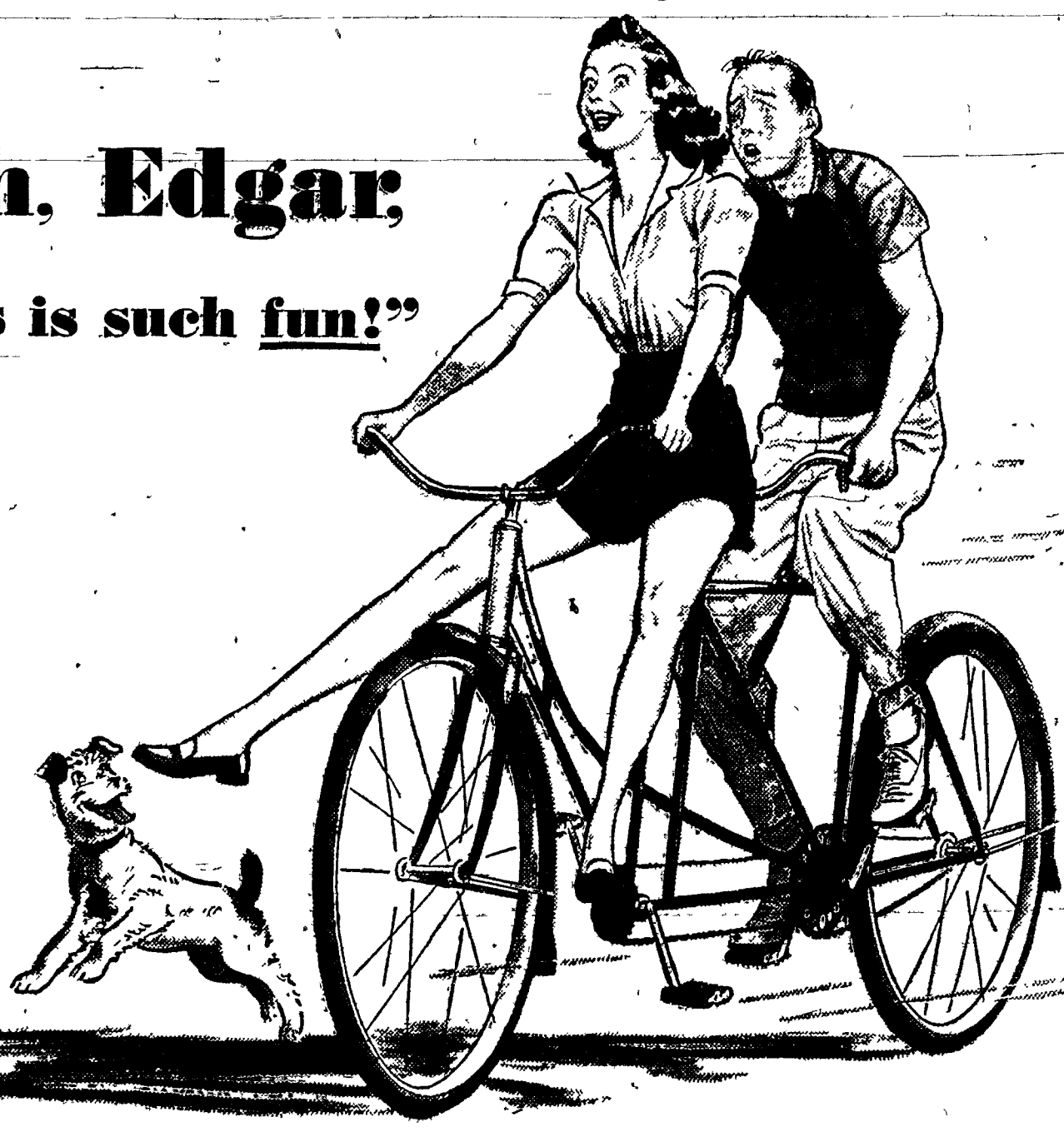

Mich Bell Offers

Plan For Extending Civilian Service

The Michigan Bell Telephone Company today announced a plan to install new service on a temporary basis for civilians in certain areas where installations have been restricted sharply because of the war.

George M. Welch, president of the company, said that applicants for new installations in the restricted areas are being offered contracts which permit the company to withdraw service on a 48-hour notice, in the event the facilities are required for the direct war effort or for the "public health, welfare, or security." That will permit many applicants to obtain service on a temporary basis who otherwise might not be able to obtain it at all. He suggested, however, that persons or firms planning to move consult first with the Telephone Company to ascertain whether service will be available at their new locations.

Welch said the plan is designed to afford service to the greatest possible number of persons wanting it, at the same time complying with orders of the War Production Board that adequate facilities be reserved to meet increasing military, war-production, and essential public needs. The telephone system cannot be expanded sufficiently to care for all increase of service demand, he added, because the materials required, such as copper and aluminum, are more urgently needed for weapons of war.

Rather than holding ourselves to arbitrary estimates of the extent of future essential demands, and denying service to civilians we propose to make service available to as many as possible by offering temporary contracts to applicants," Welch explained. "Whether it will become necessary to withdraw service on a 48-hour notice will depend upon factors associated with the service increase in a particular area, together with the growing needs of military organizations and war-production industries and for essential public purposes. Every effort will be made, however, to avoid such withdrawals. It may even become necessary to request individual-line users to take party line service so others who need telephones can have them or keep them."
